## NOTES AND COMMENTS

Mr. W. A. Twigg, Kingston, in congratulating us on the improved appearance of The Canadian Kennel Gazette, does not forget that printer's ink and paper cost money, and sends us a stud card for his Cocker Spaniels Red Ross, Spinks, and Minto. Puppies and grown dogs may also be had, and in colors to suit the purchaser.

Mr. George H. Carley, Hamilton, is offering a snap in two Fox Terrier bitches, both in whelp to Champion Norfolk Richmond, that should go by wire to some Terrier man who wants a good thing. Look up the sale ad. and see what their breeding is. It could not be better. Telegrams have preference.

Mr. Robert McEwen, Byron, has just received the stud Collie, a hint of whose arrival we had a little while ago. He has been aptly named Holyrood Clinker, and is by Seaham Clinker, by Champion Wishaw Clinker. His dam is the champion Rightaway bitch, Alice Rightaway. Could better breeding be asked for. We don't think so. Col. McEwen is always generous with his importations, and no exception is made in this case, as we see that Clinker has at once been placed at the service of breeders, and at a ridiculously low fee too.

The newly organized Ontario Kennel Club will hold a show in Toronto on Good Friday and the Saturday following. We understand a substantial list of specials is being collected.

Mr. Maurice Alford, R.N.R., Charlottetown, P.E.I., has imported from England the black flat-coated Retriever Prince Zulu Nero. Nero represents a breed that is practically unknown in

Canada, with the exception of a few specimens in the North-West, and we hope his owner may afford breeders the opportunity of viewing him at the forthcoming Montreal show.

Mr. Walter Sands is placing his imported Fox Terrier, Broadway Briar, at the services of devotees of the breed. Briar was bred by Mr. Francis Redmond, and is a dog of the very best producing lines, and a good specimen himself.

Professor Wesley Mills, Montreal, kindly conveys his congratulations in the following note:

If I have delayed my congratulations on the great improvement in the form in which the Canadian Kennel Gazette has recently appeared, it has been due solely to being excessively occupied. In this advance I rejoice and still more, that the Gazette still continues to maintain that high tone which has characterized it from the first.

There are many shows on the tapis just now, and several have already claimed dates with the Canadian Kennel Club. There should be more, especially in the older Provinces of Ontario and Quebec. These provinces hardly show the sportsmanlike spirit that one would expect. Why is it? It wants some hard-working few in each town or city to enthrone those who hang back, to stir up those who are sluggish.

The second annual meeting of the Alberta Kennel Club was held Feb. 17th, and the following officers were elected: President, A. E. Cross, Calgary; Vice-Presidents, E. D. Adams,

Calgary; G. W. Hill, Pincher Creek, Alta.; W. M. Hill, Strathecona, Alta.; Secretary-Treasurer, Chas. Rodden, Calgary, Alta. We will hold our show this year as last, at the Calgary Exhibition Co's Fair in July, and there will be a number of handsome prizes given. At present we are promised one gold medal and five cups, and some other prizes. We will also offer a \$25 prize for the best working dog on sheep, trials to be on the grounds during the Fair. So Mr. Chas. Rodden tells us.

Although this is only a small show, yet outsiders need not be afraid to send their dogs, as they will be taken care of better than at many shows we know of, as the work is not done by paid help, but by the members themselves, and this means a lot. There was not a single complaint last year.

The show will be held under C. K. C. rules, and a competent judge will be appointed. The committee are now "looking for a man" to fill this most important position.

There is talk of a kennel club being inaugurated in the West that will embrace Calgary and Northern Alberta.

Mr. W. F. Cameron, of Strathecona, Alta., has recently added several good Collies to his kennels, including a dog out of Coila Janet and a bitch by Coila Laddie, ex Wishaw May. A bitch recently imported from Scotland is heavy in whelp to a good sire. There is evidently no abatement in the wave of popularity that the Collie is having in Western Canada.

Cascade Kennels, Ottawa, are offering breeders the services of the black and tan Cocker Cascade Romany, a brother to the noted Romanv Rex. The dog is siring some good puppies, and the fee asked is a mere bagatelle.



Dundee Collie Kennels, Dundee, Mich., are giving Collie men the opportunity of breeding to Ellwyn Astrologer, and are selling a book on the training of Collies "from their youth up," indeed prior to that, beginning with the parents.

Rev. Thos. Geoghegan has just returned to Canada after a protracted visit to his ancestral home, Dunboy House, County Down, Ireland, whither he accompanied a loved brother who had been taken dangerously ill in New Orleans. We thought "Father" Geoghegan, as he is affectionately called by his poor people in Hamilton, might have a doggy item or two for us, but he was so occupied with other matters that he had no time, and indeed, little inclination, to give to "man's best friend."

Mr. Bowden tells us that his good Foxhound, Fairfax Bud, is growing quite popular as a stud dog, matrons visiting him from as far distant a place as New York. Several litters by the dog show great promise.

At a meeting of the Board of Directors of the Victoria City Kennel Club it was decided to hold their forthcoming show from April 11th to 14th, under C. K. C. rules. Vancouver show, also under C. K. C. auspices, will precede this, the dates chosen being April 4th to 7th.

It is a matter of regret to us that further details have not been sent us, but we may state that Mr. Geo. B. Borrodaile, of Medicine Hat, has been engaged to judge all Setters, Pointers and Retrievers. Other breeds will be taken by gentlemen thoroughly conversant with their qualities, and men who have had long experience in Britain.

Then comes Montreal, whose energetic canine organization intends repeating the successes of the past years, and if possible, to excel them. The dates are convenient, May 29th, 30th, 31st and June 1st, and at this season we invariably have pleasant weather conditions.

Mr. C. H. Mason, New York, will judge all classes except Collies, which breed will be taken by a specialist, Mr. Black, of Harrisburg, Pa.

Mr. Jas. R. Innes, who has done so much in his official capacity for the Montreal Canine Association, tells us the first cheque he received was one for one hundred dollars from Lord Strathcona, which augurs well for the special list.

Catheart Kennels, London, have two extremely well-bred wire bitches that will go at a bargain to the first comer.

At the recent annual meeting of the Canadian National Exhibition, Toronto, Mr. Jno. G. Kent was elected a director "by a large majority," and at a subsequent meeting of the board he was unanimously appointed chairman of the Dog Show Committee, a position that for some years he has so ably filled.

From the annual report of the association we find that last show's gate receipts made up the neat sum of \$3,527.45, while the entry fees made \$1,909.50. These combined go to make up a big nucleus for a show, and the management can afford to be liberal, especially as the whole management, including superintendent, secretary and "help" (mostly wooden images) cost but \$654.40. By this it may be seen that economy is the order of the day, and that no "grafting" is possible. It cost \$191.47 for dog food, supplies, etc.

The manager of a large kennel in New York, and one who is in close touch with canine matters in the United States, writes us pretty freely on the recent A. K. C. enactment. He seems to strike a note that has not heretofore been touched on, and his opinion is worthy of consideration. He writes:

I cannot help but note at this opportunity to you my sincerest regrets at your allowing yourselves to make a mountain out of a mole-hill by a lot of mischievous folks, who will only laugh at you and desert you after they get you into endless strife and troubles. As a silent and disinterested reader of all this disagreeable controversy over a most insignificant trifle (your dogs are not cut out here, only from the "scrub" class, for those that cannot win elsewhere), that is in a fair way to lead to long-lasting and serious consequences, which I honestly feel is the aim and true motive of those men in the States that are encouraging you with their constant "sick him." You must honestly

confess that the States are the "market" for both "us" and "you," with really more trade than both of us can handle, if we devote our time to business, instead of scratching one another's faces like a lot of little vindictive girls. For the sake of the sensible breeders and men in your country, do not spoil their trade in the States by going too far with this foolish matter, and causing action, eventually, that may really cut your men out of more, or even all classes. Your men can ignore this one insignificant class. What does a "novice" amount to? Let your men come right along and fight the important puppy classes, and show their year's work in youngsters, the limit, and open for all, and the specials; this will keep them busy enough, and if they win they can command the market and the dollars.

As your true friend, I assure you that you owe it to your own folks to let this foolish matter drop and maintain a silent dignity, as becomes a body of men representing such an organization as you do. It will be by far the wisest and eventually the most effective course for you to have pursued. Bitter words are long remembered by all men, hence least said, least regrets and repairs. The men who are so industriously "sicking" you two bodies at one another are working against their own interests, but they will only realize this when it is too late and much harm has been done.

You two organizations are no different from two men fighting in the street, the "sickers" will keep you both at it so long as you are foolish enough to pummel one another. When you are both "well done" they will hoot at the one who got the worst of it and cheer the other fellow, and in all cases desert the one who got the worst of it. Everybody is with the winner, yet both men are fools, well pummeled and disgraced.

In the interest of the silent, sensible, non-notoriety-seeking majority of your breeders and fanciers (who are the mainstay and backbone of the business), do not allow the "sickers" to arouse your vindictive spirit in this farce; leave the match burn out, it will soon be forgotten, but not so if you drop it into the shavings bin of the large sawmill, and this is a sensible parallel of this case. There are incendiaries though who would have you drop the match in the shavings just to see



a large blaze, so long as the sawmill does not belong to them. Those fools do not realize that better men than they are will have a difficult task in checking the conflagration of the mill, lest it extend to the homes of the incendiary fools, and perhaps the entire town.

Men on this side who are still friends of yours in a genuine democratic and brotherly, fraternal spirit, who have common sense enough to realize that there is more than room enough for all honest breeders both sides of the line, are beginning to feel a little nettled at this fool talk about being non-producers, a cutting insult to all breeders in this country that provokes bitter troubles. If this keeps on we will be forced to expose this bugaboo for self-preservation. Canadians, like ourselves, bought their producers in England and America. Take all your "imported" Canadians away and what have you? Now don't get us into facts, statistics, etc.; let the match burn out, be men of good sense.

Owing to the rapidly increasing business in the Dominion of those well-known canine caterers, Messrs. Spratt's Patent, a depot has been opened in Montreal as a distributing point for Canada. We welcome them, and do so heartily, as from experience we know the value of their goods, that we hope may in the future grow in favor, as has been the case in the past. #### IRISH TERRIERS. LETTERS ON RACY TYPE.

To the Editor of The Stock Keeper:

Sir,—I was pleased to see from Mr. Franco's letter, which appeared in your issue of May 3rd, that at last one of the admirers of the Irish Terrier has raised the question of what is the true build of an Irish Terrier.

I have waited to give older fanciers than myself the preference of taking up this matter, but as none of them have yet done so, I now venture to break the ice.

I am not surprised to hear that many breeders who have followed the judging and press reports of the principal shows this year should be anxious to know what really is the right build,

as the awards and press opinions are so confusing.

The Irish Terrier Club's official description distinctly says that the back and legs should be moderately long; and, further, "the dog must present an active, lively, lithe, and wiry appearance, lots of substance, and at the same time free from clumsiness. They must be neither cloddy nor cobby, but should be framed on the lines of speed, showing a graceful racing outline."

I think the above proves conclusively that a true Irish Terrier should not be a short-backed dog, but well up on his legs, a shade long cast in body, a dog that looks like galloping, but still with plenty of bone and substance, and not whippetty; a dog, in short, that even if he were white, could not possibly be mistaken for a wire-haired Fox Terrier; there should be a distinct difference in build, as well as color, between an Irish Terrier and a wire-haired Fox Terrier.

As some judges are at the present time awarding prizes to short-backed dogs of the red Fox Terrier type, I think these facts cannot be brought too prominently before breeders, so that they may know what is really the true type. I should be glad to know if some other breeder will ventilate his opinion on this most important question to all lovers of the true Irish Terrier.—F. M. Jowett.

## Short Barks.

### FROM THE UNITED STATES.

A kennel club has been inaugurated in New Bedford, Mass., called the New Bedford Kennel Club. A show is proposed for next month under A. K. C. rules.

Washington, D.C., Dog Show had 630 entries, with 410 dogs.

Buffalo Show is on as we go to press. The following is the entry, which should be most satisfactory to the promoters: Airedale Terriers, 19 entries; 11 dogs; Beagles, 39, 21; Black and Tan Terriers, 6, 4; Boston Terriers, 153, 78; Bull Dogs, 22, 12; Bull Terriers, 57, 28; Chow Chows, 12, 6; Clumber Spaniels, 8, 5; Cocker Spaniels, 90, 53; Collies (rough), 80, 41; Collies (smooth), 8, 8; Dachshunde, 24, 15; Dalmatians, 27, 14; English Setters, 42, 27; English Toy Spaniels, 17, 11; Field Spaniels, 3, 3; Foxhounds (American), 11, 7; Foxhounds (English), 22, 12; Fox Terriers (smooth), 53, 31; Fox Terriers (wire), 49, 26; French Bulldogs, 32, 16; Gordon Setters, 8, 5; Great Danes, 40, 21; Greyhounds, 8, 6; Irish Setters, 16, 11; Irish Terriers, 47, 23; Maltese Terriers, 1, 1; Miscellaneous, 4, 4; Old English Sheep Dogs, 12, 5; Pointers, 63, 37; Pomeranians, 14, 6; Poodles, 14, 7; Pugs, 12, 8; Russian Wolfhounds, 11, 7; Scottish Terriers, 12, 6; Skye Terriers, 3, 3; St. Bernards (rough), 32, 17; St. Bernards (smooth), 13, 8; Toy Poodles, 4, 4; Toy Terriers, 1, 1; Welsh Terriers, 6,

4; Yorkshire Terriers, 5, 5; Foxhounds (pack), extra, 7. Totals, 1,117 entries, 628 dogs. Report in next issue.

The American Stock Keeper for Feb. 24th, published in Boston, rubs it into the home show in no uncertain terms, that evidently combined with other complaints, have worked a cure, judging by the communication from the New England Club secretary in this issue of Canadian Kennel Gazette.

We find that we were in error in stating that Mr. Dwight Moore had been elected chairman of the A. K. C. Committee on Constitution and Rules, to which committee the American-bred fiasco was referred. Mr. Edward Brooks was elected to this chairmanship by a vote of twenty-three to twelve, Mr. G. M. Carnochan being the defeated candidate.

### FROM ENGLAND.

Stock Keeper says that Capt. Gerald Clay is about to start on a trip to the United States. We should be pleased to see him in Canada.

The same paper tells us that Cockers at Cruft's show were a poor lot, barring very few, nor was the number shown large.

Mr. Robert Tait, of Wishaw, has sent across the pond three Collie matrons, all in pup to his great dog, Ch. Wishaw Leader. Their destination is New York.

Three to three and a half pound "Poms" seem to be the thing desirable in this breed, judging by the remarks of Our Dogs. That many can be bred from in safety also appears to be correct, though the risk and anxiety attending such proceedings must be great, greater, possibly, than the game is worth.

The Great Dane Club, in its "report for 1905," issues the following notice: "A most important step has been taken by the club in the passing of a resolution at the Kennel Club Show that the club adopt the standard for colors as used by the 'Deutscher Doggen Club,' which is as follows: Brindles—Ground color from the lightest yellow to the darkest fawn, with black oblique (transversal) stripes. Fawns, blues, blacks—In various shades; they may have a darker shade on the muzzle and round the eyes. In the above four col-

ors the nose must be black, and the eyes and nails dark. In blues a lighter eye is allowed, but not a wall eye. White markings are only allowed on the front legs and on the toes. Harlequins—Ground color white, with irregularly broken black patches spread (preferably symmetrically) over the whole body. A few grey patches are allowed. Glassy or wall eyes, flesh colored and spotted noses, and light nails are not faulty.

The above is now official, and it only remains for us to set to work with new vigor in order to facilitate the task of the Great Dane Club, who, I am sure, will be glad to learn that I have letters from several well-known influential breeders in Germany, and have also read in German and Dutch fancier papers remarks much to the credit of the Great Dane Club and its members. One of the oldest Great Dane breeders writes me that the resolution will bear its excellent fruits in the near future.—Stock-Keeper.

## Notes on the New York Show.

BY DR. C. Y. FORD.

In the present era, progress in all directions seems to be the feature of the age. This is emphatically so in the kennel world, and was never before so marked as at this great canine carnival. Though Americans are extravagant buyers, and a cable will procure an invincible team of almost any breed in England, there were strong evidences this year that more time and thought are being expended in breeding and making proper use of the many excellent imported specimens available to breeders on this continent. Several North American bred specimens were more than a match for dogs imported at great expense. Speaking of American-bred dogs, it was refreshing to Canadians to hear nothing but condemnation from the best class of Americans over the narrow-minded and unneighborly action taken by the A. K. C. in their unsportsmanlike discrimination against Canadian dogs. The dignified attitude taken by representative Canadians was greatly admired. As usual, Canadians accounted for a large percentage of blue ribbons with dogs bred in the Dominion. That Canadians are successful and intelligent breeders was the general consensus of opinion. To go into the merits of individual exhibits, even of Canadian origin, at this gigantic show, would mean exhausting work, and an extra edition of the Gazette. We shall briefly touch upon a few likely to be of interest.

The larger breeds have been neglected of late by breeders in Canada, which is doubtlessly due to exorbitant express charges and inadequate prize money. The champion St. Bernard, "Baby Beautiful," is by a Canadian-bred sire of the excellent blood and scientific matings of Dr. Wesley Mills and Mr. Stapleford.

The Valley Farm Kennels' wonderful exhibit of Russian Wolfhounds was quite the attraction of the show. These beautiful and classical animals are making rapid headway in popular favor. With such an enthusiast as Mr. Kent to champion the breed, Canada should take a leading part.

The exhibit of Spaniels this year was truly remarkable, and a great compliment to Mr. E. M. Oldham, whose long

connection with Spaniels in general seemed to qualify him for his thankless task. As the judge of Sporting Spaniels at New York usually comes in for general condemnation and lampooning, after his duties are completed, Mr. Oldham knew what to expect, and to say he received a bountiful supply of what those who had preceded him had received is putting it mildly. Mr. Oldham is too old a hand to be perturbed by mere criticizing, and from the ring-side he seemed to judge carefully and without wavering when his mind was made up. That he made mistakes no one can deny, but then, where was there a judge who didn't? The exhibit of Irish Water Spaniels by the Rev. T. Moore Smith was a treat to behold. It looks as though this useful breed would take on new life. It would have been dead and buried long ago, in America, but for the efforts of Mr. T. A. Carson, of Kingston. Field and Clumber Spaniels were all numerous. Cockers, as usual, were a great display. The parti-colors are fast outstripping the blacks in point of merit. Mr. H. K. Bloodgood, of the Mepal Kennels, benched a kennel of great excellence. His Mepal's Iris, a white bitch with lemon markings, was declared the best Cocker in the show, being placed over our old friend, Romney Rye. This bitch is a truly sporting Cocker, being of a sensible size, and

a beautiful mover. Mr. Bloodgood's team contained Cockers of high merit, and were an object lesson to breeders. Mr. James Clarke, of Toronto, as usual, accounted for a liberal share of the prizes. Kuroki went through to winners for Mr. Clarke, and a useful black he is, though not of the high class of Mepal's Norman, whom he was lucky to beat. He was sold at a good figure; in fact, Mr. Clarke disposed of all the Cockers he cared to at this show. The

**FULL TEXT OF AGREEMENT ENTERED INTO BY THE CANADIAN KENNEL CLUB AND SHOW-GIVING CLUBS OF THE PACIFIC COAST.**

Memorandum of agreement entered into between the Canadian Kennel Club and show-giving kennel clubs on the Pacific Coast of Canada, regarding the government of kennel affairs on the coast:

1. That a Pacific Advisory Board be established.

2. That the Advisory Board have full discretionary powers to deal with protests, disqualifications, suspensions, etc. To receive and approve of premium lists and catalogues of clubs on the coast giving shows under C. K. C. rules. All powers subject to clause 5 of this agreement.

3. That the Advisory Board be made up of delegates, one from each club on the coast holding an annual show, and of a vice-president of the Canadian Kennel Club resident in British Columbia, the latter to be chairman of the board, and to have the casting vote in case of a tie. All delegates to be members of the Canadian Kennel Club.

4. That these delegates be elected annually from each club at a general meeting.

5. That the Advisory Board have the practical management of kennel matters on the coast, subject to Canadian Kennel Club rules, i.e., that any question regarding kennel interests on the coast shall be submitted to the Advisory Board and dealt with by them, subject to the approval of the Executive of the C. K. C. in Toronto.

6. That the Advisory Board have power to grant dates for the holding of shows on the coast.

7. That the Advisory Board shall meet at least twice in each year, and that due notice of such meetings be given to all clubs.

8. That a full report of the proceedings had at all meetings of the Pacific Advisory Board be sent immediately after each meeting to the Canadian Kennel Club at Toronto.

9. That nothing in this agreement shall be retroactive.
