We shall miss him here, but any regret we may have in losing his services is tempered with the congratulations that follow such an important step upwards for Dr. Bell.

By the way, we were unaware that another well-known dog show superintendent was now a Winnipegger. We refer to Mr. A. Percy Mutchmor, formerly of Ottawa, whose well-known "fist" we were glad to see some days ago. Dr. Bell. Mr. Mutchmor; Mr. Mutchmor, Dr. Bell.

Mr. John Bowden, secretary-treasurer of the Brantford Kennel Club, tells us that Dr. C. Y. Ford will be one of the judges at their show, to be held May 24th and 25th.

We like these show dates. Two days is quite long enough for a show the size of Brantford's. The venue will be the same as that of last year, the dog show being held in connection with the horse show.

The Canadian Kennel Club will be asked to recognize the Griffons Korthals as a distinct breed. They are practically unknown in Canada. Has any Gazette reader a knowledge of them?

Bostons still keep gaining in popular favor here, and we hear of many transfers. Mr. Meadows has sold Queenie to Mr. Elliott,, a toy bitch to Mr. Mc-Candish and Beauty to Mr. C. A. R. Warren, the Collie breeder, all of Toronto. The following bitches have visited Max Boy: Mr. Warren's Beauty, bitches from Mr. Barry, Mr. Donsar and Mr. Johnston, Toronto, and Mr. Meadows' own bitch, Cricket.

Mr. W. J. Bulloch, of Gananoque, has purchased the Bostons Dr. Ted C., 7702, and Vixie, 8321, recently advertised.

Mr. Geo. H. Carley, Hamilton, tells us he sold both the Fox Terrier bitches advertised in last Gazette, and this by

March 21, one going to Vancouver, the other to Collingwood.

Mr. Carley has again dipped into French Bulls, having imported a good dog for stud purposes. He has done some winning, is called Galopin and has a skull measuring 17 inches in circumference. We hope Mr. Carley's breeding experience with these miniatures may prove happier than former attempts.

Sales of Scotch Collies this Spring are good. I have orders for shipmen. during the next two weeks of thirteen. I must congratulate you on the advance made in The Canadian Ke uel Gazette. Is there any way the \ madian Kennel Club could get the United States authorities to recognize Canadian registration and permit our dogs to be shipped to the United States duty free, as the Canada customs allow their dogs to come into this country? Many a good sale is lost by the United States customs charging duty. If a man believed in the old law of an eye for an eye, I would say treat them the same as we are dealt with, but I don't think that is sportsmanlike, though I think we should be treated in a better spirit of equality.

This is an old trouble. As a matter of fact, the United States customs recognize no Canadian live stock registrations, from horses down. We had this thoroughly threshed out with the Dominion Live Stock Commissioner not long ago, but his and the department's efforts were of no avail.

The services of Mr. Macdonald's quartette of stud Fox Terriers are offered to breeders in this issue. They include Aldon Tipster, that has done so much winning; Aldon Captain, a St. Leger dog; Aldon Colonel, a grandson of Ch. Veracious, and Aldon Rasper, by Sabine Reynard.

Mr. William Morris, Toronto, who is getting together quite a good kennel of Fox Terriers, is placing at stud his young dog, Dark Blue, by Norfolk Blue. It is enough to say that this dog is bred the same as Norfolk Dark Blue, with a cross of champion Norfolk Veracity. He was bred especially by the Norfolk Kennels for stud purposes and is one of the best that kennel left in Canada.

We understand there is a movement on foot to amalgamate the Collie clubs now existing in Cauada under one name and management and to hold joint shows in future under C. K. C. rules. This is a step forward and one that we have more than once hinted at broadly. Wins made at a show such as that just held at Montreal are quite as valuable as are those at more pretentious fixtures.

Mr. Lyndon is now into Fox Terriers on his own account, the San Francisco kennel of which he was manager being about to be disbanded. Honors by purchase don't pay and don't satisfy in the end.

Amongst the dogs taken over by Mr. Lyndon are Wandee Wish, W. Doris, W. Florence and several others.

Mr. W. M. Clendening, Hamilton, is this month offering for sale, at real bargain prices, several Fox Terriers, including several bitches in whelp that should prove valuable investments. They are beautifully bred and are in pup to dogs of just as good blood lines. In fact one, Clifton Prudence, has been mated to Champion Norfolk Richmond. There are also three smooth nine months' old dogs by the same sire that will be fully described on application to Mr. Clendening.

Mention of Norfolk Richmond reminds us of the fact that this valuable stud dog is now in British Columbia, having been purchased by Mr. R. G. S. Anthony, Devonia Kennels, Vancouver. He should do well out west, being the kind of dog that lasts and is a proven sire.

Mr. Clendening is not going out of Fox Terriers, in fact is just now negotiating for a crack dog in England.

The address of Spratt's Patent Canadian branch should be noted at the foot of their announcement on back cover page.

Amongst the dogs offered for sale in this issue are several beautiful quality Collies, including a famous winning bitch offered by Dr. Ford, pair Bull Terriers by Champion Boswain by Mr. C. Windsor, London; several grand Collie puppies by Crescent Kennels, Toronto, and high-class Terriers of several breeds by Mr. Goodwin, of Vinemount. In bargain ads. are several that are "bargains" surely.

The Ontario Kennel Club's show, Toronto, closed with an entry of over 400, numbering 260 dogs. This is all, if not more, than the hall can comfortably hold.

A few days since, when we had a letter from Thomas Lemon, Mitchell, telling us of his troubles, we did not imagine that in a week or two all his troubles in this life would be over. Mr. Lemon moved to Fort William, was taken with the prevailing epidemic of malignant typhoid and quickly succumbed.

Mr. Lemon was one of the quiet breeders. He seldem showed and his greatest achievement was the exhibiting of the black Cocker bitch Irene at Toronto some few years ago, where Mr. Parker Thomas gave her all that she could win. What condition can do was shown in this bitch. She was a picture. Irene produced several winners afterwards.

Just as we go to press we get further particulars of the Brantford show, where Dr. C. Y. Ford will take all classes but Pointers and Setters, these two breeds being down to Mr. John Dunbar, of Toronto. Entries close on May 14th, with the secretary, Mr. John Bowden, to whom applications for lists should go:

Mr. Fred. S. Haines, O.S.A. Meadowvale, Ont, has just painted a very life-like oil of the Black and Tan Terrier, Parliament Dime, a reproduction of which will probably appear in a near issue of Gazette.

Mr. Haines is devoting his entire time and talent to animal subjects, principally canine, and has several paintings on view at McKenzie's studio on Yonge street just now that are well worth seeing.

It is with regret that we learn that Mr. W. R. Goodwin purposes leaving Canada to reside in Newark, N.J. Mr. Goodwin finds the United States customs laws so exasperating and delays so frequent that this move is almost forced upon him.

Mr. Goodwin is desirous of taking a string of Canadian dogs round the circuit, and will be glad to hear from any owner who feels disposed to show his dogs with practically no risk. We can speak without prejudice of Mr. Goodwin's very faithful care of the dogs in his charge.

Surely the Bulldog breeder's life "is not a happy one." Mr. Goodwin had the misfortune to lose Vinemount Folly's litter, Miss Aubrey's puppies had to be removed from her, and, to crown all, two good puppies succumbed to distemper, a total of fifteen puppies within a few weeks.

However there are others, and Vinemount kennels are importing two new bitches, both winners on the other side, and they are also negotiating for the purchase of a new dog who should be able to make it warm for the very best in America.

Mrs. Gordon, the enthusiastic owner of the King Edward Collie Kennels, is very busy just now with a multiplicity of Collie babies, the result of the matrimonial ventures that we noted some time ago. There are by the famous Wishaw Clinker, two dogs and two bitches; Southport Sculptor is responsible for three; Southport Pendragon is the sire of a grand dog puppy, and Mrs. Gordon's own good Collie, Wellesbourne Victory, is the happy father of a trio, two dogs and one bitch. All are sable and white in color and as healthy as can well be. Of course, there is more than one champion-in embryo-in this big lot.

#### A DOG'S DEVOTION.

A pathetic instance of a dog's devotion to his master is interesting eit izens of Valparaiso, Indiana. A week ago James J. Gray, a mail carrier, died. A faithful shepherd dog which used to be his constant companion now goes over the dead man's route a couple of times each day, starting age ending at the postoffice. The almost frantic efforts of the animal to find the object of his affections among the employes at the government building have resulted in many efforts to divert it from the quest, but to no effect.

# Short Barks.

#### FROM ENGLAND.

The Stock Keeper relates a sharp incident that took place at the Bolton show. Of course nothing of this kind ever occurs in Canada. The paragraph is as follows:-

"A smart piece of work took place in Bolton show, so we are told. This is the story: An exhibitor took her dog into the ring and in the clearing out process was turned out with nothing but barren honors. Forthwith a much better known exhibitor collars the dog promptly, takes it into the ring again and has the satisfaction of getting a second place for the otherwise prizeless exhibit. How's that, umpire?'

Ch. Regal Stone, that has more than once carried all before him and was purchased as an unshown dog for £500, is dead, the result of ulceration of the stomach. His sire was the renowned Rodney Stone.

Irish Terrier, in the Stock Keeper, writes of his favorite breed, using the following pointed paragraphs:

"At the last general meeting of the London and South of England Irish Terrier Club, it was proposed 'that the scale of numerical points be altered to effect the total disqualification of undershot Terriers, "undershot" not to include a slight irregularity in the placement of the teeth.' This is one of those wenderful propositions, born of practical inexperience, that general meetings have to put up with, and which result in time being wasted. Where would the 'slight irregularity end, and the 'undershot' commence, and how would it be possible to control the judges in such a matter, or even insist that every mouth should be examined if they did not choose to do it? But there, I suppose these impossible suggestions will be made from time to time, and if they do nothing else, they cause a little amusement.

"Everyone dislikes undershot or uneven mouths in Terriers, but the extent to which the fault shall be penalized will always depend upon the individual view held by the judge officiating, and some will be more severe than others. From a utilitarian point of view a Terrier can bite well enough with an uneven mouth, can see equally well with a light eye, and hear equally well with badly carried ears, and while the

points laid down by specialist clubs guide judges to a certain extent, they are not necessarily regarded as a mathematical basis upon which awards must of necessity be given, and never will be by the men who draw the best entries. Exhibitors object to 'cut and dried' judging, and like a little sporting uncertainty, provided they know, or think they will have, a run for their money. Hence it is that new judges nearly always draw a good entry."

By the way, the well-known name of Stock Keeper is now a matter of history, the name having been abandoned for that of The Dog Times, our contemporary disposing of its poultry and pigeon department. The Dog Times will in future be exclusively devoted to dogs and the price has been reduced to the popular penny.

We are not troubled much here with controversy as to the proper color of Great Danes for the simple reason that unfortunately we have not many of the dogs in this country. "Danois," whose writings we always read with much interest, refers to the matter as follows:

"An opinion on color has just been pronounced by the Great Dane Club of Germany, Berlin, which is of much interest to our Dane breeders in general, and to breeders of Harlequins in particular. The German Great Dane Club has been asked by one of its members whether the 'Dalmatian' markings in a Harlequin Dane are faulty. The following is the answer of the above club (which may be considered as a resolution: 'The markings of a Dalmatian in a Harlequin Dane are faulty, because a Dalmatian has small, round, regular black spots, whereas the markings in a Harlequin Dane must be, before everything else, "broken ' that is to say, irregular, and not too large, but, at the same time, they must not be too small. Of course, large, flat black spots, covering, for instance, a whole part of the body, are also faulty."

Manchester show closed with 2267 entries, about 200 less than the entry for 1905. The breeds unusually heavy, as we would see them here, are as follows: Bloodhounds, 49; Mastiffs, 26; Newfoundlands, 37; Retrievers, 123; Old English Sheep Dogs, 50; Dalmatians, 45; Dachshunds, 85; Scottish Terriers, 121; Skye Terriers, 80; Dandie Dinmont Terriers, 41; Schipperkes, 136. The above breeds we seldom see represented at Canadian shows in any number, some of them not at all.

Is too much being sacrificed to straight fronts in the Scottish Terrier? Evidently one English expert thinks so and is emphatic in his expressions of disapproval in Stock Keeper:

"I have several growls from some of the oldest breeders of Scottish Ter-

riers at the manner in which we are endeavoring to bring the Scottie to the front as an absolutely straight-legged Terrier. A great danger exists, and is making itself felt, that this point may be too much labored, and that in so doing the general type and expression are apt to become submerged to such an extent that before many generations have passed the Scottie will be merely a prick-eared, moderately shortlegged brindle Fox Terrier, with a beautiful teacup-handle tail. To my mind, however, there is still great hope, as I feel sure we have breeders amongst us who will never countenance this, but do their level best to combat it by trying to breed something really good of the right stamp. Reverting to the extremities just previously mentioned, namely, tails, at many of our present-day shows there is hardly one that is not too gay. Tail carriage may seem a small matter, but the prevalence of gay ones shows how quickly a fault increases if it is condoned. Whilst I am on this matter I should like to point out how we are losing the big hindquarters. Many

owners seem to entirely lose sight of this most essential feature. In addition to this we seem to be getting flatribbed bodies, and are drifting from the sturdy, powerful, independent Terrier to the pretty, expressionless lightboned sort. The worst thing that can happen to the breed is, I am sure, any marked departure from the real old typical Scot."

The same paper comments as follows on the dry wash system. We have seen it here more than once in connection with another breed:

"Probably no breed of dog has improved so much the last few years like the Old English Sheepdog, and this was most apparent at the club's annual show, which was held at Ward's Riding School, Knightsbridge, on Tuesday last. The entry was most satisfactory, both to the judge, Mr. F. W. Wilmot, and the committee, whilst the quality and evenness of type were remarkable. The arrangements were left in the capable hands of Mr. E. T. Cox, the show secretary and manager, and by the assistance of volunteer stewards, chief amongst which we noticed

competing. Mr. Wilmot, as is known, is a rare sticker for shoulders, but we must say we do think on this occasion he in some cases carried it a little too far, as, after all, good shoulders, necessary as they are, are not everything. This is the only reason we can assign for the hard usage one or two got, and on the other hand for the high positions some luckily held. However, one thing is certain, the judge, in arriving at his decision, only sought to please one person, and that was himself. There is no doubt but that something will have to be done to stop the most objectionable habit some people indulge in-the cleaning of their dogs with chalk, just on the moment of entering the ring. We noticed several cases, done openly, as if there was nothing in it, a specimen in particular when in the ring shook itself, and the powder came off in clouds; in fact, if this rapidly growing evil is not checked, judges will certainly have to don white ducks in which to do their duties. Seriously, it is a matter in which the club should move, otherwise we fear fanciers of other breeds may take exception, and thereby cause unpleasantness to arise. However, a word to the wise will doubtless be sufficient."

# Notes on the Buffalo Show.

If any body of canine devotees deserve credit for an honest effort to fraternize and popularize dog shows, that are fast becoming mere travelling circuses, it is the whole-souled, genial body of men who are banded together into the Buffalo Kennel Club. These "Circuit Shows" are undoubtedly necessary to keep up the interest in dogs and to educate the public to the fact that dogs are property, and mighty valuable property, too. There is no denying the feeling that has grown apace, that dog shows, under their present regime, are in the nature of a trust, and trusts spell annihilation to the small exhibitor of slender means. That the Buffalo Kennel Club are making an honest effort to reform some of these ills must have been apparent to all those who came in contact with the members and officers of their recent show.

The opening day found President Bleistein acting as host to many exhibitors, at a magnificent luncheon given at the Buffalo Club. Many like courtesies were tendered to visitors during the week. The autocratic spirit that dominated some shows was pleasantly absent here. Mr. Oldham, as superintendent, was ever willing to do all in his power for exhibitors, and his genial manner did much to maintain the happy tenor of the show. Exhibitors from a distance, who had a friend along, or fanciers who had come dogless, were extended the privileges of the show. These little acts of kindness and attention and freedom from pure commercialism will bear their own fruit in years to come. Canadians were especially well treated, and though the American Kennel Club saw fit to deprive them of entry in the novice classes -a healthy sign for Canadian breeders -special novice classes were provided for dogs from Canada, an act of generosity and friendliness that savors of true sportsmanship. Of the actual dogs from Canada there were about a hundred, and very few finished outside the money. Of the judges, about the same coterie that go from show to show were present, with that excellent sportsman and capable judge, Mr. W. P. Fraser, sandwiched in. More of his sort are needed, and needed badly, in the judging ring.

To pass on to the dogs themselves, excellent quality was to be found in nearly all of the most important and popular breeds.

St. Bernards were headed by the Canadian bred dog Duke of Watford, who seems to improve with age. A grand, big, sound dog he is. His daughter, the aptly named Ch. Baby Beautiful, seems invincible. Dr. Wesley Mills and Mr. Stableford may well be proud of the strain they have founded.

Great Danes brought out a really grand puppy in Dr. Irving R. Johnson's Tanrid Vom Inn. He looks like growing in the right direction, and won all he was asked to here.

Russian Wolfhounds were represented solely by the Valley Farm Kennel's entries. This big kennel seems to have about cornered the breed.

English Foxhounds—The Toronto Hunt sent on two whips with five couples of hounds that were an ornament to the show. They were shown in fine fettle, which looks as though the hounds of this pack were once more in capable hands. The star of the collection was Sankey, superlatively good in bone, legs and feet, with more quality about him and less lumber than is generally seen.

In Pointers Mrs. Charles Waters, who always exhibits her dogs in a fearless fashion, was in the money in every class, and has a collection of much merit.

Cockers were big classes, but judged indifferently by Mr. Mortimer, who did not seem at all at home. Canada supplied most of the winners, the chief honors falling to Miss Eleanor Macdonnell, James Clark and George Douglas. Mr. Mortimer's first startling deeision was the placing of the big coarse Chip Adair, who has no claim at all of being a show dog, over George Douglas' Flora Hunter and James Clark's Rose Lee. The latter is a beautiful black, with a well moulded head, dark eye, and grand body; in fact, just about the best black bitch out. Flora Hunter fails in eve and behind the shoulders, otherwise a good bitch.

In Limit and Open George Douglas brought out a surprise in a four-year-old black dog that had been playing the role of companion to a man ignorant of his good qualities. He has a really good head and muzzle, and well placed ears, grand body, and very fair legs and feet. When in first-class condition he will be at the top of the tree. At present his coat is rough, and needs close attention. His fault is a rather light eye. He is a good sporting size. Kuroki, the New York winner, was sec-

# Montreal Collie Club Show.

The Montreal Collie Club held its eleventh show of Collies on March the 10th at the Victoria Rifles' Armory Hall, with about 150 entries.

This club is fortunate in having a popular president, a live secretarytreasurer, strong committee and active members, and it was, therefore, no surprise that the show was a success, financially and otherwise, and that there was the best average lot of Collies we have seen together. With some alterations in classes, the show held on another day than Saturday so as to give outsiders a chance to get home before Sunday, and, if possible, held under C. K. C. rules (no reason why it should not .- Ed.), this could easily be made one of the greatest events for Collie fanciers.

The writer was asked to officiate as judge, and as this was my first experience in Collie judging, I naturally made some mistakes. I am glad to say, however, that I heard very little "kicking" and trust that exhibitors and spectators alike realized my difficulty and accepted in a sportsmanlike spirit my endeavor to judge only the dog end of the chain and follow the type that is my ideal in a Collie.

Cairngorm King, a large upstanding sable and white, in good coat and condition and a fair head, had low ears and a dull expression that kept him from higher awards. Good ear carriage is closely combined with expression and both are essential to a Collie of modern type.

Among the dogs there were many that a few years ago would have won out, but there are better dogs now and this speaks well for the progress so notable of recent years.

One very good dog had an obstinate ear that, in spite of the skilful manipulation of our friend, Mr. Outhed, insisted upon being "prick." He got past in two classes, I think, before being detected. Another, also a fairly good one, had two prick ears with suspicious marks from carrying weights. The general fault, however, was low ears or coarse heads.

In puppy bitches Rannock Festive won the Braehead Cup for best bred by a member, closely followed by Cairngorm Fancy, a nice bitch but too small. In novice bitches I made two mistakes. First Sheila pleased me at first, but I think she got more than her due; also Newport Queen, a good, rangy bitch with beautiful head and ears, is very light in bone and lacks substance, which, above all things, is necessary for a working Collie. In another class she was put back and Cairngorm Surprise should have been reserve in winners' class. The quality in bitches was more even than in dogs, but we need more substance and size.

Apart from the rather difficult task of judging thirty-one classes of Collies, I must say that I thoroughly enjoyed my outing. The splendid entertainment given by the club, the meeting of many good fanciers of a kindred spirit and the kind invitations extended by so many old and new friends will not soon be forgotten. Among others, I cannot refrain from mentioning the well-known breeder and judge, Mr. Joseph Reid. I have known Mr. Reid's reputation for years. As Mr. Reid took me under his protecting wing (I was his guest over night) I have some hope that my first judging of Collies had not been all blunders. In company we paid a visit to Mr. W. O. Roy's kennels next morning, Ch. Balmoral Baron and Rex at home, and how many more I cannot tell. Later (if the columns of The Gazette may be open for me) I shall have something to say about those dogs.

Members of the Canadian Kennel Club are not exempt from taxation but kennels of registered dogs, up to any number, may, under an Ontario Statute, be licensed for a fee of \$10 per annum.

The Beagle that you refer to is not eligible for registration.

Am enclosing a clipping by which you will see that Mr. — is a patyou will see that Mr. — is a patronizer of unrecognized shows and as I always understood that it was against the C. K. C. rules to show at these shows, I would not take any part in them. Now I think he is taking an unfair advantage of myself and others (members of C. K. C.) who stick to these rules. You know the reason I don't show at these shows and am told quite often that it is because I am afraid to show against him. Really I cannot see much advantage in belonging to C. K. C. if one can go and break the rules like this.

While the Canadian Kennel Club does not recognize wins made at shows in Canada not held under its rules, it does not attempt to penalize either its members or others for exhibiting at these shows, and there is nothing in our rules that says so, a rule of this kind we should think would look too much like coercion.

#### FACTS AND RUMORS.

Mr. and Mrs. W. P. Fraser report an unprecedented demand for Scottish Terriers, a demand which, unfortunately, they cannot at present supply. They have recently sent a bitch to visit Mr. H. W. Lacy's grard headed Hebden Pibroch.

Mr. and Mrs. A. A. Maedonald seem to take kindly to the "circuit," having been present with their entries at New York, Buffalo, Detroit, and are also visiting Pittsburg and Atlantic City. The trophies alone gathered in by Rederoft Darkie, the exquisite little Pom, would just about stock a sideboard. These good fanciers, determined to keep abreast of the times, have added to their already strong team several importations, consisting of smooth Fox Teriers and Toy "Poms" of the best blood obtainable in England.

It is proverbial that the true fancier is born, not made. One who begins as a boy rarely forsakes his hobby till his days are numbered. The multimillionaire who goes in for dogs late in life, becomes intoxicated with success, at first, but usually soon sells out and is forgotten. 'Twenty stud dogs' and 'a hundred brood bitches' don't make true fanciers. It is the man with one or two well-bred bitches that has yearly mated them with forethought and judgment, who wins in the long run. Never breed to a dog because his stud fee is low, or he happens to be near home, unless you know he suits your bitch and is fashionably bred.

Hardly have the Norfolk Kennels of Fox Terriers disbanded and gone into oblivion than their successors, the Wandee Kennels, who took over many of the dogs and Charlie Lyndon to carry on the good work, than we hear their wealthy owner, Mr. Harley, like Mr. Gooderham, has tired of the game and has hoisted the 'for sale regardless of cost' flag. Pumor tells us that a big Texas kennel is about to disband and quit what has been a very expensive pastime. It was ever thus—the one-dog man wins in the long run.

An effort was made to induce Dr. Wesley Mills, the distinguished McGill professor, to don the ermine at Brantford. Unfortunately Dr. Mills' university work prevented his accepting. A few years ago the "Mount Royal" prefix was a familiar one at the best shows, and belonged to dogs of many breeds. A man of Dr. Mills' calibre is an ornament to dog shows and the judging ring.

Dr. C. Y. Ford has sold, at a long price, his winning Collie, Otterburn Baron, to a wealthy gentleman in Scranton, Pa. This young dog came out at Buffalo last year under Mr. Ashton, the English judge, and successfully defeated the New York winner

in the puppy class.

Dr. Ford has, we hear, tempted Mr. T. H. Stretch, the great English breeder, to part with the young sable and white dog, Ormskirk Marshall. He is a son of the undefeated Champion Squire of Tytton, for whom Mr. J. Pierpont Morgan is said to have offered \$10,000. His dam is Park Piccolo, by Champion Parbold Piccolo, the wonderful stud and snow Collie. The blood of this dog is bound to be eagerly sought after by up-to-date breeders, and he comes at a time when he is most needed.

#### THE PACIFIC COAST CIRCUIT.

In your March issue of the Gazette you publish the date of our spring show as arranged for April 7-11. If you have not been already informed, I would like to point out that the date has been altered to oblige another Pacific Coast club, and the show will now take place in the second week of May.

To make our shows a success it is necessary that all of them shall follow in close succession, so Vancouver starts the ball rolling, a week later comes Victoria, then Seattle, Portland and San Francisco. In order to induce fanciers to make the circuit, very good premiums are offered to handlers bringing large strings. For instance, Vancouver offers \$75 for the largest string of dogs brought by a handler from points out-

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side of British Columbia; \$25 for the second largest.

Then there is \$30 for the largest string brought by a British Columbia handler, and a second cash prize.

It is possible there may be a change in the judges now, as we cannot decide on a Cocker judge, and Major Taylor, of Rutherford, N.J., has offered to take the whole thing. He will judge at Portland later. The matter of judges is a difficulty away out here that you in the East probably know little of. It costs so much to get a good Eastern judge here, and one that can judge all classes is almost imperative in such a case. The club does not get the support that one would expect from the townspeople. Still, we must remember that Vancouverites are a busy, hustling crowd these days, and that the day is not far distant when we shall also have a leisure class, if they don't all go back East with their "wads," and who will take a keen interest in dogs as they do elsewhere.

We have to congratulate ourselves upon one thing, however, and that is the accord which now exists between all the Pacific Coast clubs. Victoria stands by Vancouver, and the split in the Washington factions has been repaired, so this alone should considerably improve the entries all round.

The stock in the country has improved since last year owing to importations, and there are more coming.

You complained of meagre information, so I concluded to give you more for next time. Our worthy Secretary is very busy, both privately and in the club's interests, and cannot write many long letters. With kind regards.
