## NOTES AND COMMENTS

Mrs. A. A. Macdonald's Toy Pomeranian, Redcroft Darkie, is by Fox Hill's Dandy, ex Lady Brown, and was bred by his owner. Born May 18, 1904. His wins include: Buffalo, 1905, 1st novice; 2nd all other classes to Endcliffe Perfection; Toronto, 1905, 1st limit, 2nd all other classes to Ocean Prince, special for best dog in Canada (any breed), born since Jan. 1, 1904; New York, 1906, 1st American bred, 2nd limit and all other classes to Beautiful Billy; Buffalo, 1906, 1st limit and all other classes, special for best dog (any breed) owned in Canada, special for best dog shown by a woman; Detroit, 1st limit and 2nd all other classes to Ocean Prince; Pittsburg, 1st limit and all other classes; Atlantic City, 1st limit and all other classes. He has won the special for best American bred dog no less than seven times.

Mrs. Macdonald has sold for \$500 the chocolate Pom, Beautiful Baroness Brown, recently imported from England. Amongst this lady's other importations were two black dogs and a chocolate dog.

Oxford Blue, the Ottawa stud Fox Terrier, is siring some grand puppies, Dr. Webster having an unusually nice litter by him. The dog's owners, the Oxford Kennels, have also a nice lot of five, six weeks old, from their Oxford Daze.

The Ottawa dogs are doing well and will make a raid on the Montreal ribbons the end of the month. Many entries will go from the Capital.

The Ottawa show will be held this year from September 11th to 14th. Of course under C. K. C. rules.

Mr. W. D. Bruce, of Vancouver, who has been spending some time in England, brought with him on his return two excellent wire bitches from the kennels of Mr. C. A. Scott Didsbury (near Manchester), Lanes. One of them is Maid of Millgate, by the crack dog Royston Ringleader, ex Leeds Bumble Bee, and was bred by Mr. Tom Ashton. She is in whelp to Millgate Minor, who won special for the best wire dog or bitch at Derby in March last.

The other, Mistrue of Millgate, is by Millgate Result, ex Schoolmistress and after leaving the steamer whelped three puppies (one dog, two bitches) to Millgate Bristles. These bitches, as

well as being classically bred, are excellent show specimens and should, with their progeny, do much to help the breed on the coast.

Belvidere Adam Bede, A.K.C.S.B., 75-348, is the property of Mr. Elliott E. Gowey, Superintendent of Schools, Braceville, Ill., and was imported through Mr. Geo. Raper by George S.

Thomas. He surpasses in bone and coat, good straight front, correctly carried ears and is full of character. He was known in England as Westfield Randolph and first shown in America as Endcliffe Pitcher. He is a winner of many firsts in England and of the Scottish Kennel Club's gold medal for best Terrier in show at Howick, winning four firsts at that place. Winner of firsts at Cashaeton and New Orleans, America. Sire of Westfield Newsboy and Westfield Vanity, first prize winners at Edinburgh, Galashiels, Arbroath, Dundee, Musselburg, etc., in Great Britain.

Mr. Walter Sands, Toronto, has imported a Redmond bitch by Dukedom in whelp to Dragon that should, if breeding operations prove successful, do much to augment the quality already existing in this kennel.

Mr. A. A. Macdonald has also been across the water for new blood, or rather old blood of the right kind. His importations include a bitch by Dark Blue in whelp to Dukedom, one by Oxonian, in whelp to Dark Blue, and two daughters of Dark Blue. Surely a sufficiency of "Blue blood."

This issue of the Gazette will be too late to help the Brantford entry, which closed on the 14th. The class list is quite a handsome one, and in addition to the regular classification contains no less than six pages of specials. Indications as we close are for a large and better show than ever before.

Mr. Clendenning writes us: "The April edition of Gazette reached me on Friday, and on Saturday I received from Mr. Sands, Toronto, a letter pur-



chasing Clifton Prudence. In addition I had wire from a man in Pembroke for her, but of course had to disappoint him."

Mr. H. S. Tibbs, Toronto, who always has a Cocker bitch or two of quality in his kennel, has sold to Mr. C. A. Young, Brookline, Mass., a daughter of Red Rupert and Rosie O'Grady, called Rosie Rupert.

We are pleased to know from Mr. McEwen that his recent importation, Holyrood Clinker, is meeting with favor, no less than ten matrons having been to him since the end of March.

Mr. McEwen also tells us of the arrival of a choice Ch. Wishaw Leader young bitch in whelp to Wishaw Retainer, the only living son of the sensational Wishaw Stormer that was carried off by distemper after making his first great record. This kennel is in a better position than ever before to breed good ones this year.

Then comes Dr. C. Y. Ford's news of the safe arrival and settlement of the crack sable and white Ormskirk Marshall, by the famous Squire of Tyton, ex Park Piccolo, Piccolo being by Parbold Piccolo, out of the Wishaw Clinker bitch Halghton Lady. This young dog is strongly inbred to Parbold Piccolo and Wishaw Clinker and should prove an excellent investment for breeders.

Mr. H. S. Tibbs reports a nice litter of Cockers, two dogs and a bitch, on March 17th, by Golden Duke, ex Rouge Etoile, that is by Red Simon II, ex Rosie O'Grady.

Mr. F. Carney, of Chicago, has bred his Boston to Mr. Meadow's Max Box that added at the late O. K. C. show to his previous record.

We understand that the owners of the Dartmoor Kennels purpose importing another pair from England in the near future.

trophies than for any previous show held by our club. The general interest is also greater.

Our entries will close May 22nd, and it is important that all entries be in at that time, as positively none will be accepted after that time.

The Portland Kennel Club is in a prosperous condition; was recently incorporated, and with the gentlemen who now comprise the club its future existence is well assured.

## Ontario Kennel Club Show, Toronto, April 13 and 14, 1906.

What can be done on short order if hard work and lots of it is employed was indicated at the first show of the Ontario Kennel Club held under C. K. C. rules, in St. Andrew's Hall, Toronto, on April 13th and 14th. Close quarters was the order of the day, especially for the big ones, but they did not suffer much in a two days' show, and "needs must where the devil drives." About one hundred entries had to be returned, and as it was the hall was crowded to its utmost capacity. Following are the officials of the show and the names of the judges.

The greater part of the work fell on Mr. Carley's shoulders, and we write confidently when we say he acquitted himself well. We want him again. Mr. Watson, Mr. Williams and

Mr. McEwen are old hands, and of the others Mrs. O'Rourke added to our limited list of lady judges. Unfortunately she had little to do. Mr. "Billy" Hammall "won out" as a superintendent, and the neat wire fixings and clean benches, etc., told of his forethought. The attendance at the show was all that could be asked for and all the hall would hold.

There were good dogs—a plenty, and bad ones—lots of them, and many in between.

Mr. Kenyon's Cash had the Mastiff classes to himself. The winning St. Bernard is a fair one with a decent head, the rest are poor.

The Bloodhound was not well shown, thin and poor and coat staring; he has a good head for a puppy, but is a bit flat sided and rather unattractive in color. We have seen many worse Danes than the puppy. The bitch is a poor one. The new Russian Wolfhound, Czar of Tabboff, is a big dog with a long and lean head, shown very thin and for this reason and for his rather flat sides we presume he was put behind the well known Kubelik. Kitty Gray was the best Greyhound with Mr. Coulter's entries well up. Foxhounds a nice lot and good ones won. Quite a nice little lot of Cockers that we missed seeing in the ring.

Collies were prominent, though they did not give Mr. McEwen very much trouble. Mrs. Gordon's kennels were largely represented, her beautifully turned Nith Marvel getting winners. A new dog in Edgbaston Dandy won out, a rich colored one without exaggeration in any point, carries a heavy coat and is excellent in head and ear. There were several nice Collies and quite a good collection of bobtails. Bull Terriers were a poor lot. We thought the winning bitch puppy, Ambrosine, easily the best and the only one with much pretention to correctness in foreface and eye. Stockwood Flyer is snipey, and Dufferin Ben Hur is surely too heavily marked in head to pass as a first prize winner.

The one Dachshund is toyish and the Black and Tans with such specimens as Selwonk Duchess and one or two others were good.

The toys were not large classes, but had a few good ones, including the brace of Yorkshires, Otland's Straight Tip and Fan, and the Black and Tan Leda.

was the only entry. He has been too well fed and has outgrown himself. He stands on good legs and feet, and is full of Pointer expression. In puppy bitches Cobalt Bloom was the only entry. She is a promising youngster and will undoubtedly be heard from later. Open and limit bitches, Queen Flo was alone in both classes. She is a beautiful bitch and one that it would be hard to find fault with.

English Setters had only two entries, both dogs. Ned Wakefield, the best of the two, and Morgan Melrose, are both coarse and their condition did not add to their appearance.

Irish Setters made a very good showing with fifteen dogs benched. With one exception the dogs were of a very even color, a good dark red. Puppy dogs, Dungarven Paddy first, is a tidy sort, good coat, shade light in the eye. Tyrone Garry second, has a snipy muzzle and too prominent an eye. Barney, third, is a nice pup but wants age to strengthen his legs as he wobbles when he moves. Novice dogs, Dungarven Duke, first, is short in muzzle, and full in eye, and strong in skull, he is a tidy dog with a nice coat. Glen M., second, is a good type, but shown in poor condition, his feet are not good.

Limit dogs, Shamrock, first, is a dog with a good coat, but has head enough for a Mastiff, he was shown too fat. Larry P., third, is out at shoulders, but otherwise a nice dog, good head

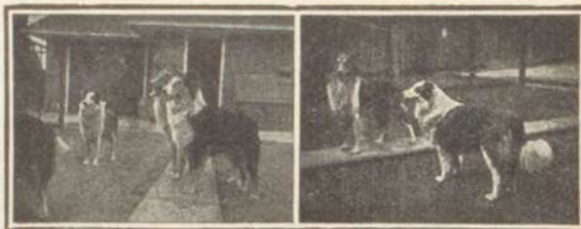

and nice coat and a good mover, should have gone higher in his class.

Open dogs, Young Larry, first, is strong in skull, built on cobby lines, has good legs and feet and a good coat. Tim of Rathalm, second, is a little on the small side, about the only fault to find in him. He is a showy dog and a good mover. Camp, a good old dog, showing age and a bit stiff in front, was V.H.C. in this class.

Puppy bitches, Tyrone Elma, is a bit coarse in head, muzzle snipy, tail too long, and carried too high. Peggy O'Moore, second, is a nice bitch, but shown too gaunt, she is about six months old, and with time will make a good one.

Limit bitches, Maid of Kerry, first, was shown too fat, in condition she should make a nice one. Shanna of Rathalm, second, is a sweet little bitch but is so bad at shoulders that all her good qualities go for nothing.

Open bitches, Nora Shannon was alone. She is a lovely Setter with a good coat and abundance of tail and leg feathering. She is a stylish mover and a good shower, but is a trifle light in eye.

### MR. CARLEY'S CLASSES.

Bulldogs—The best in dog classes was Ivel Demon, a light brindle, with good skull, splendid ears, well shaped body, a little plain in face, good tail, good bone and shoulders; a sound, sturdy dog of much quality, and put down in con-

dition. The bitch classes brought out Vinemount Miss Aubrey, a bitch with perfect shoulders and legs, good bone, short in body, beautiful ears; if she had more layback would be very difficult to beat her. Mrs. Cartwright's dogs were absent.

Boston Terriers—A very nice exhibit for Canada, showing that they are certainly coming into vogue here. The puppy classes were poor. The dog classes included two good ones in Max Boy and Schuyler Bob, two very taking Terriers, and the competition was between these two in dog classes, Max Boy winning out. He is a good Boston, with splendid skull, eye and muzzle, good body, and plenty of bone. Schuyler Bob is a very taking Terrier, but loses to Max Boy in substance. The bitch classes were graced by the appearance of Manley's Molly, a most typical specimen, wonderful expression, good skull, face and muzzle; a beautiful bitch. Her faults are carriage of tail and lack of some teeth; when excited she carries her tail too gaily.

Airedale Terriers—The winner, Colne Lucky Royal, is a puppy of much substance, good legs, splendid expression, color and coat good, and a grand size. If he does not thicken up as he grows older, should be heard from again.

Irish Terriers—The puppy class was a disgrace to the breed, and does not speak much for the future of the Irish Terrier in Canada. The puppy class entries should have all been turned out



of the ring. The best dog was Inner Guard, a dog with good color, very long, lean head, badly carried ears. Tipperary Harvester would have given an account of himself but for lack of coat. There was nothing in bitches to awaken interest.

Scottish Terriers—Only two bitches; the better one was Vinemount Satanita, a long-headed one, ears carried badly, and lacking that keen expression so characteristic of the breed.

Welsh Terriers brought out Miss Beardmore's quartette. The winner, Brynhir Baker, has a long head, good ears, splendid coat, and more substance than any of the rest. The second, Grisby Brynhir, a very good Terrier, but too wide in skull. The whole quartette showed much quality, and were put down in splendid condition.

Fox Terriers (smooth)—The winning dog, Aldon Colonel, is a very showy dog, with grand straight front, good bone, shoulders clean, extraordinary long lean head, with good eye and expression. He is too large and carries his tail gaily, but is so stylish and has so much quality that his faults are smoothed. The Oxford Kennels of Ottawa showed two dogs of much quality, Oxford Blue and Oxford Warrener. They had very few faults, but seemed listless and out of condition; had they been in better shape, no doubt they would have been placed higher up. They will be heard from again. The bitch class brought out Burlington Bluebell, a red marked bitch of quality. Her only fault is at the shoulders, where she is a little thick. She is not an extraordinary long-headed bitch, but has a head of clean

Another excellent bitch was Oxford Fairplay, and she has much quality; a very trappy bitch, which would have given Burlington Bluebell a good run if she had the expression and fire of the latter.

Fox Terriers (wire)—This class had nothing to cause much attention.

I regret that owing to my not taking notes I am unable to go into detail regarding all the dogs that came under my notice.

The Ontario Kennel Club members are to be congratulated upon successfully carrying out the show under adverse circumstances.

Mr. Lacy, in the Stock Keeper of April 21st, is quite outspoken in his desire to elevate the dog and decries the use—unfairly—of the dollar. We are glad to see it. Abuses go so far, they reach a point so far below the decency point, that they must needs correct themselves, by simple balance of right against wrong. His admission, too, that U. Sans are not, in the major-

ity breeders, simply endorses something that the Gazette had to say a little while ago. Money never has and never can make a "breeder." Money can buy, it cannot, in this way, produce, at any rate beyond one generation. The "breeder" must have that innate fitness, ability, "knack" that does not go with money. In a way the poorer man is compelled to "breed" for the reason that he has not the wherewithal to purchase his way to an elevated position in fancy ranks. So here's to the "breeder"!

But we will let "H. W. L." speak for himself. He says:

The sycophantic slobberings that seem to be a phase of our very modern style of kennel journalism are gradually undermining the good work of years, so that honest criticism is a most unwelcome guest. It will be a bad day for the fancy and the breeding interests of America when the man and paper who dare to tell the truth are in danger of death through the sword of Damocles—the withdrawal of advertising by those who must depend upon sycophantism and toadyism for their fancier life. But then a fancy that is fed by importation of high price winners "made in England" is the direct cause of this baneful state of affairs. Importations of the very best stock in breeds that are young or being revived in popularity are necessary sometimes; but when this is done with, let the material be used intelligently to build up strains and kennels that will be a credit to our breeders' intelligence and patience. No wonder "Dollarland" is used as a reproach when we consider the wholesale immigration of champion "has beens," and prevailing winners that are

brought over to smother the aspirations of the home breeder, who sees no redress for his modest efforts but a protected novice class and the American bred classes.

In the old days of the American fancy when newspaper controversies were rife on the merits of this or that winning dog, somebody wrote—Whither are we drifting? It's an exclamation that bears repetition. The issue is plain—is our fancy to be the dollar or the dog? (Dog in Canada.—Ed. Gazette.)

In several breeds, Fox Terriers for instance, a few breeders imported with wise forethought the best that could be procured, not so much with a view to winning prizes, but rather to produce something that would compare more than favorably, and even eventually beat the high priced emigrants. This is the right sort of progression. The importer seldom "lasts," for the mere gathering of blue ribbons with dogs that are bought abroad soon palls. And why not? The incentive is lacking that spurs the true fancier to hours of mating study which results in bringing out a dog that wins and which, through the care lavished on his raising, seems to him as a child of his own. Nothing is dearer in a fancier way than the w.s. over rival kennels with dogs that were bred at home, and whose development he has so anxiously watched. This is the backbone spirit of a "fancy," and is to-day the mainspring of the great success in breeding dogs and other live stock that attends the efforts of the English breeder. No matter what breed he takes up he develops a "class" and style that is uniform and an improvement as a show dog.

Should it be a foreign breed about which there is little known, like the Chow, he licks it into a fashion that suits his ideas of what the type should

be, improves it in various minor details that have been neglected in its own country, and if popular, as the Chow has become, there are some grand classes of not one or two specimens at the best shows, but scores. So it goes pretty nearly all through the breeds, until one can spot an imported crack at a glance.

One will exclaim—but we have not the time! Nonsense. Many of their best dogs are bred by workingmen and the middle class, and it is worthy of note that the "pros" who go around the country pot hunting do not breed their winners, as a rule, but pick them up wherever their practised eye alights on a good one.

But what have we done with the very best examples and blood of twenty years? Practically nothing, and the emigrants are to blame for it in a majority of breeds. Those who imported the cracks became tired in time and sold out, and those who bred to their dogs were content to breed again to the produce, not because it might be suitable, but because it was by the imported crack, and so on until the strain degenerated to a mere semblance of the breed. Long distances and express charges may be saddled with some of the blame, as well as stud fees that, taken in conjunction with these causes, make the burden or risk the harder to bear for the average dog owner. Still these are drawbacks that would not stop a man who was determined to breed to the best and most suitable were he imbued with the right fancier spirit.

Let us look through the breeds a moment and see where we are. We have a lot of grand St. Bernards from the other side, the best that money could buy, and the very best that were ever benched—Sir Bedivere, Hesper, Alton, Princess Florence, Rustic Beauty, Le Prince, and a host of others that our present winners could not hold a candle to. Yet with it all, what can we show? A good ordinary class of dog that, however, cannot compare in numbers with the old days and in the main owes for the best to a dog that could scarcely get into the money. But for Remnant and the intelligent use of him made in the nick of time, we should indeed be in sorry plight for representative St. Bernards, and the Wilowmeres and Altas are rich in this strain. With all our German stoicism and persistence the Great Dane is still far behind. We did take a spurt when the Montebellos were on the wave, and it was a sorry day when they listened to the suggestion that they were killing competition and so dropped out. We have nothing to stop the emigrant, though a few fairly good home bred come to the top, but they lack finish and class.

In Greyhounds it is the same, yet we have had the very choicest Greyhounds in the world, and the very best blood, and we cannot begin to show the classes we could fifteen years ago. Our money winners are emigrants.

Russian Wolfhounds have made a spurt owing to the enthusiasm of one kennel, but we are even now judging

by those exhibited, in danger of producing a strain of stock that is weedy and light, and unless more size and substance is introduced, the end of the boom is in sight. Type is all right, but there is such a thing as getting it too fine, for we must remember that the Wolfhound is used, or should be used, in a very rugged sport that requires lots of bottom and strength. Deerhounds we have lost, since Col. Thayer dropped the game, and what classes we could show fifteen and twenty years ago and mostly home bred,

too! The modern fancier would be surprised to hear that the Deerhound at one time formed a breed around which a lot of general interest centered. Mr. Page still keeps a few, and can be depended upon for a good home bred one at New York. Perhaps Mr. Spackman will bring about a renaissance.

Our Pointers, at least those we are allowed to see on our benches, have gone back. We can produce a good fair average Pointer, but years ago we had much better, and the old-time Beaufort is still a goal that seems unattainable. How is this when we have the best blood? Perhaps the reason is they are raised too much in kennels, for no breeder can make much progress who does not walk his puppies, i.e., farm them out to be raised.

The English Setter, until six years ago, had become a reproach, but during this period, thanks to judicious importations, we are making good headway and the old-time displays are in danger of being eclipsed. But what a lot of good English Setter blood has been allowed to run to seed in America. Still, we are in the woods, for the latest winner from England takes the rosette, and they are not paying so much attention to the show Setter over there as they used to. We have two or three good home bred dogs that can win, and this suggests a future.

Irish Setters make no headway, and the great classes of the old days of the eighties are but a dream, and we fear will never be duplicated, and the same may be said of the Gordons, though we must say that Philadelphia shows suggest there is still local life in the handsome old breed.

One of the very few breeds upon which we have not depended for the emigrant is the Cocker Spaniel, although for our best Fields and Clumbers we still have to import. In Cockers we have evolved a general type from the old stock, and should have gone along splendidly, had not the silly Toy craze upset everything in the way of a useful Cocker, and left the blacks sprawling, so to speak. With saner judgment

in the ring we are getting back to something better, but until we resort to the old lines of blood that may run over the foolishly prescribed weight of 24 lbs., little headway will be made. Our best Cocker to-day is bred from English stock of recent, comparatively, importation. But when all is said and done the Cocker is our breed, and it is American, and barring the Toys, something to be proud of. Had the English paid the same attention to the breed, could we have beaten them? It must always be remembered in this connection that Canada did a great deal more than we did this side the border, but with the retirement of some of the old breeders the old cunning seems to have forsaken the Dominion.

Now we come to Collies, a breed we have fiddled with some twenty-five years. We have followed it intimately in that time, and there never, scarcely, was a period when the home bred ones had not to give way to the emigrant, and with all our large breeding operations a second rate winner over there can put us out of business in either sex. No one can deny the class and quality of the best imported Collies, and no one can deny that we do not breed their like; with the very best champions and blood at our hands, we still must look to the novice or American bred classes for leading honors. There are one or two exceptionally good home bred, but

the average does not improve. Coming to Beagles, we have something to be proud of, for we have bred some fine average stock from the material first imported. We got on the Toy and chunky line after a while, but sensible heads prevailed, and with judicious importations and the desire for good uniform build that did not consider heads as the paramount issue, the breed was guided into the right channel, so that now we can show teams that even old England cannot beat, so we are told, except through individual specimens. The American Beagle, we say again, is a product to be proud of, and while we are on this line a word as to greater attention to well formed heads that would make the breed about perfect is apropos, but never let it be done at the cost of the rest of the dog.

Bulldogs, with all the grand array of blood that we have had—in fact we have drained England of its best—crippled them for the time being, some say, and the twenty years' endeavor, are still dependent on the last steamer. Bull Terriers make no headway, and the best are imported from a country that is not giving much attention to the breed. Still we can strike a good average gait in the breed if we go to Canada for them. The Boston Terrier is our own breed, and with all the drawbacks it has encountered stands to-day a monument to a lot of good fancier loyalty

and striving for a type. In numbers, general average of quality, and its evolution from a very mixed parentage, it has become a breed that we can look upon with pride, and one that is, moreover, the backbone of our shows. If the same enthusiasm and dogged persistence was infused in several other breeds, would they not make similar headway? The French Bulldog is another that is doing well at the present stage of the breed, and a good deal of the reason may be found in the same State and sort of fellows who built up the Boston. We still have to depend upon the dollar Francaise for the best, but the most serious trouble is the judging that favors one day the English, one day the French, type of Toy.

The Fox Terrier among the Terriers is the one breed that has gone steadily forward, keeping intelligent pace with prevailing fashions in type, and it must be said that in this breed fashions change almost with the regularity of the female bonnet. This progress is due to the persistent efforts of a few true fanciers. Our average in smooths and wires is comparatively equal to the Old Country, and we have bred individuals that have beaten the best importations. One very seldom sees a really poor specimen at a show, and the fact that the best are still imported means little, for it must be the very best they have—the choice of their thousands to our hundred, to beat our best. Where are we in Irish Terriers all these years? All the best are imported, and the very

prominent home bred cracks we have brought forward may be counted on less than one hand. The Scottie is doing better of late, and if the gait is kept up may hold its own in average, but the winners are imported, and it need not be a high-priced one. Welsh Terriers make no headway. The Canadians have saved the Black and Tan Terrier and opened the eye of an old-time English judge of the breed, but we on this side could do nothing with it. In Dachshunds we have done better, and our German fellow citizens seem to have brought their breeding acumen along with them, and can produce some good specimens of the type we stand for, so that it must be a very tiptop one from the Fatherland to down our best.

Coming to the Toys, we are simply not in it, and a second rate English winner will go to the top over our best native breeds, and as for Poms. and "sich," our "big round ones" still travel across for the best. There is one little bright spot in the Canadian son of Fox Hills Dandy that should point to what could be done on this side. But the swallow does not make a summer, neither does one good one here and there spell the strength of a breed.

The above should make the serious pause, not to flare up at the writer, but to lay plans to improve our standing in the dog world, so that the reproach that we are a nation of buyers whose buying capacity must be toadied to, shall not hold water much longer. The solution of much of the difficulty is in the pail. The Englishman breeds a lot and drowns a lot—we don't. We breed lots and we hang on to them or sell them; these are in turn bred from, and so it goes. But they have to be fed; the owner gets a raft of dogs he can do nothing with, becomes weary, blames the climate, or the smarter one or something, and drops out. Those who laugh loudest are the license clerk and expressman; but shall they laugh last? No. Take a leaf out of the poultry

and pigeon breeders' book. England has to send to America for the best feathered stock.

Field and Fancy, that used to wear its trousers turned up at the end and elevate its gamp when it was raining in "dear old Lunnnon," is now on the same strain against the "made in England" dog, with the difference that much that it prints is objectionable and offensive.

## FROM ENGLAND.

Dr. Carey, the secretary of the Irish Terrier Club, in his annual report, brings up several pointed questions referring to the breed in which he is interested, that are commented on by the Irish Terrier expert of the "Dog Times" in the following terms:

Dr. Carey devotes eleven pages to his remarks and review of the year's doings, but some of the opinions he expresses are open to argument.

One in particular, where he suggests that "scrapping," or fighting in the ring is a desirable thing. I say most emphatically that it is not, as not only is it a nuisance to the judge and makes his task more difficult, but it is detrimental to the appearance of the dogs. By all means let them swagger and walk round one another at a respectful distance, but to encourage fighting in the ring as evidence of "fire, life and animation" is a grave mistake, and if this is necessary to enable a judge to form a correct opinion of a dog's merits, it is not saying much for the judge.

The complaint that many persons have against Irish Terriers who want a dog for a companion is that they are "such fighters," and consequently another breed is often chosen. To encourage fighting, therefore, is clearly detrimental to the interests of breeders who want to dispose of surplus stock in order to help defray expenses, and it is certainly no pleasure to the owners of show dogs when they are afraid to ever let them run loose lest they should get into trouble with the first dog they meet.

should not show themselves in a ring in the same way that Fox Terriers do, without necessarily springing at each other's throats, and although the Doctor's experience of "five and twenty years ago" (when cock-fighting and man-and-dog fighting, etc., were in vogue) may have been attractive at that time, we are supposed to be more civilized now.

Notwithstanding these differences of opinion, however, on the dogs of the present day, and what they should or should not be, there is but one opinion as to Dr. Carey's merits as secretary of the Irish Terrier Club, for he has spared neither time nor trouble in the interests of Irish Terriers, and it will be a black day for the Irish Terrier Club if he ever decides to relinquish the position he has held with such conspicuous success for so many years.

The same paper, in its issue of April 20th, rather deplores the flattening out of the St. Bernard boom of some years ago, and says that in St. Bernards Mr. Jagger took out with him at Christmas a young smooth St. Bernard, a grandson of Ch. Florentius, and one that if spared will make history in smooth St. Bernard

ranks in America. Mrs. Jagger, in the old days, has sold many a worse for £500, whilst this grand youngster had perforce to go at £25, a change from the days of the St. Bernard boom surely.

In the same issue, and referring to the same breed, the following pointed and amusing paragraph is printed.

We have been favored by the honorary secretary of the St. Bernard Club, the Rev. W. P. Blakeney, with the annual report of the club. Narres Elye, J.P., writes a capital article on the "Earlier days of the St. Bernard Club," from which we cull the following amusing paragraph: In closing this very brief account of the earlier days of the St. Bernard Club and the dogs exhibited at its shows, I may perhaps be allowed to add two stories of committees which have always amused me. One referred to a dog sold to America, when a member said: "I have always wondered why—sold—to America." The late Mr. Sweet in his dry way said: "Perhaps to improve the breed of St. Bernards in England." It is unnecessary to remark that Mr. Sweet was not an admirer of the dog in question. Another rose from the mistaken habit of quoting great puppy weights, which came into fashion after the glories of Pinlinmon had caused rather a craze for size. One very popular member used to be a good deal chaffed about his puppy weights, the animals being in his opinion "as lean as a rail" or "in just hard condition," though others thought them too fat. A present leading member of the club, business being over, suddenly startled the committee by saying: "Now, Mr. President, let us see who can tell the biggest lie about our puppies' weights! What do you think, X, of a puppy only 16 weeks old weighing — lbs?" naming some quite impossible weight. The heavy-weight man turned round with anxiety on every feature. "No! Have you really one that has reached that at the age?" Reply: "Well, no, I have not at present, but I may have some day; you never can tell." Tableau! Many other good stories might be told of those happy days, but some would be at the expense of other people, so are best left unprinted. The booklet is il-

If successful prize winner stock is any criterion of the value of a stud dog, then probably Ormskirk's best stud Collie will leave England on Friday next by the ss. "Armenian" for Nebraska, U.S.A.

Ormskirk Hope is the dog, and Mr. Stretch has sold him to Mr. H. Harvey, of Harvey's Dog Farm, Clay Center, Nebraska, U.S.A. We trust Hope will continue his marvellous results as a sire in America as he has in England. The breeding is high, being by Ch. Balgreggie Hope, ex Kirkdale Cora, one of our best English brood bitches.

Among the long line of winners by Hope are: O. Hopeful, O. Terry, O. Victorius, Shrewsbury Hope, Ebberleigh Hope, Ebberleigh Hopeful, Craigelea (£200 was refused for him), O. Sapphire, and O. Glenhope, who won championship at last Belfast Show.

Ormskirk Faith is Hope's sister, who, after a successful winning career in England, continued the same in Germany, and won more championships on the Continent than any other Collie bitch.
