NOTES AND COMMENTS

Mr. Colin F. Jackson, of Vancouver, will judge all classes at the Calgary show, dates, July 10th, 11th and 12th, and we hope that this means that British Columbia will give him loyal support. This is the only show in the Northwest held under C. K. C. rules, and should be supported by every breeder who desires to see his dogs' wins become matter of record. A liberal classification has been provided, and the best of care is promised. Silver and bronze medals take the place of cash for first and second awards.

Mr. Albert Goebel, Mitchell, has added the Boston Fosco II, a son of the celebrated Fosco, to his kennel. He is the first puppy sired by Fosco, and is a well set up cobby little fellow that should mature into about a 16-pound specimen.

The wins of Mr. A. A. Macdonald's Aldon Cadet include first novice, first limit and reserve winners (to Aldon Tipster) at Brantford, and first novice, limit, open and winners and three specials at Montreal, the only times shown. He is beautifully bred, being by Aldon Captain by St. Leger, ex. Aldon Duty, out of Velveteen by Ch. Veracious, ex Vandalia by Ch. Valuator. St. Leger is by Visto by Ch. Venio, in fact the dog's breeding is full of the "V" blood.

Mr. R. H. Trimble was invited to judge at Winnipeg, but was not sure that he could spare the time for such an extended trip.

The Board of Directors of the Winnipeg Industrial Exhibition have decided to hold a bench show in connection with their annual exhibition, which is to be held in the city of Winnipeg from July 23rd to 28th, the

bench show taking place on the 25th, 26th and 27th, under the rules of the Canadian Kennel Club. It is the intention of the Association, if this show is a success, to hold one annually, and as it will be held under the auspices of the Western Canada Kennel Club, whose officers are taking a very great interest in it, the event doubtless will become an annual fixture. A very liberal classification has been prepared and the prize money—as in all things in the West—is of a generous nature. The appointment of judges has not yet been made, and it is expected that some of the eastern

men will officiate at it. The fancy in the Northwest is growing considerably and doubtless in Pointers and Setters the entry will be a very large one, as Winnipeg is the centre of a great hunting district.

Messrs. Trimble's, Toronto, latest Bulldog importation, Tremail Temagami, a King Orry dog on his sire's side, and a Ch. Stockwell on dam's side, the blood lines which produced the

great Prince Albert, is one of the kind described as being a "big little 'un," only thirty-six pounds, with a skull bone and substance sufficient for a fifty-pound dog, a winner on the other side. His legs and feet are of the best; quarters, roach, and general outlines are all Bulldog; his tail is one of the best short-kinked kind, making, all told, a combination hard to beat, while his expression is the much sought for keep-away kind.

His quality and breeding make him a most desirable cross for leggy, weak-faced bitches. The introductory fee of \$10 to first twelve bitches should result in his book being filled at once. He is under three years old and a vigorous, active dog that will put a stamp of quality on his progeny.

We look for good results from this chap, and think him a distinct acquisition to Bulldogdom in Canada, more especially as it seems more difficult to get little dogs with stud quality than larger ones.

Messrs. Trimble have sold a half interest in him to Mr. G. J. Stephen, of the well known Agawa Kennels, Collingwood, Ont., where the dog now is. Book will be closed as soon as twelve are entered and stud fee advanced. Tremail Trueston, one of Messrs. Trimble's matrons, shows unmistakable signs of his ability as a sire.

Mr. Falconer's Collie bitch Bonnie Belle, a daughter of Balmoral Piccolo, has visited Mr. Johnston's imported Craigmere Clyde, a mating that should prove productive of the right kind.

Mr. Thomas Moore, Montreal, has purchased from Mr. Marsh, London, England, breeder of the Fox Terrier Ch. Dusky Admiral, a winner of twenty championships and the sire of over one hundred winners, a son of

this great Terrier, called Donington Admiral. He is a nineteen-pound dog, carries a hard wire coat, good head and long foreface, with an excellent front and keen Terrier expression. His eyes and ears are of the right sort and he excels in back.

It is a matter for congratulation to learn that Mr. Goodwin finds it unnecessary to leave Vinemount, and that his kennel of Bulldogs, by the way, to be largely augmented, will remain in Canada.

Mr. R. N. Clark's Boston bitch has whelped seven, all dogs, to his Pluto, and not a straight tail in the lot. Good for Nova Scotia. Berwick should soon house many good Bostons.

The Somerset Kennels, Toronto, grow prominent in the Cocker world. At Brantford this kennel took eight ribbons on nine entries, including two firsts, four seconds, a third and reserve winners, and their five entries at Montreal were all well placed.

The well known St. Bernard Champion Mayor of Watford, graces our front page this month. We are proud of him. He is Canadian bred, the winner of innumerable prizes and the sire of a large number of prize winning dogs and bitches. More than that, he is the grandsire of such dogs as Wilmore Judge, proving that he not alone is a typical specimen himself, but has the power to transmit his good qualities to his progeny—a rare combination.

Montreal is to be congratulated on the magnificent entry that faced Messrs. Mason and Black the last three days of May and the first of June, and it took all four days to complete the judging. It must have taken some effort to pull up an entry of about 1,300 and 460 dogs, and to Secretary-Treasurer McInnes and his committee is due all the praise. This is the day of classes ad lib, but such a classification seems necessary to draw out an entry, and a total of nearly five hundred dogs is a big show.

While the entry at Brantford was rather disappointing to the show's promoters, it is matter for congratulation to know that the show was a financial success, indeed a little profit resulted. It was remarked that few dogs were

present from adjacent places, especially Hamilton, that sent such a nice entry last year, and this is a feature that needs the keenest attention. It will have it, too, next year, or Secretary Bowden will know the reason why. Get out the local and nearby dogs and the distant ones will look out for themselves. They are after the coveted winners' prize, a step towards a championship.

The Irish Terrier, Fiscal Fighter, will be withdrawn from public stud during the months of July and August. He is a young vigorous dog of intense style and correct character, the true Irish expression, and can justly claim to be directly bred from the best Terriers of modern times, as a glance at his pedigree will show. He bears a strong resemblance to and has many characteristics of his famous sire, Ch. Colin. He has a long powerful head, dark penetrating eye, properly carried ears, a level top, with dense, hard wiry jacket of the desired color. He is built on lines of strength, speed and endurance so characteristic and essential to this breed, and is free from the so-called fashionable Fox Terrier type of which we see so much of late.

This dog is a winner on both sides of the Atlantic, and from his first litter produced the two young winning dogs, Dominie and Wellington. Since his importation in September last he has beaten three high-class champions and other celebrities. His height at shoulders is 16¼ inches, length of head from end of nose to top of occiput is 9¼ inches, and in symmetry he is a model type. He should make an invaluable stud dog and do a lot of good to the breed here.

Mr. J. A. Meadows, whose dogs were very successful at Montreal, purchased while there and prior to the judging, the Boston Vet IV., a son of the famous Vet. He is a light brindle lightweight, under fifteen pounds, and is bred from several generations of lightweights. He won first puppy in a class of four, first novice in a class of ten, and was placed second to Max Boy in the limit class. He should prove an acquisition to Boston circles in Canada.

Mr. A. A. Lees, the well-known Bulldog enthusiast of Hamilton, is certainly a subject for sympathy. Just

three weeks ago he imported the winning Bulldog Kelvin Punch, and now the dog is gone, the result of an accident in the elevator in Mr. Lees' establishment.

Kelvin Punch was recently shown at Birmingham, and won the special for best in show over such dogs as Good Lion, Perrita, Old Square Gip, Pressman and numerous others. His untimely death is a distinct loss to Canada, as from his breeding and individual excellence he should have proved of great value as a sire. He had any amount of substance and wonderful bone.

Mr. Lees tells us he "feels like giving up the game," but he is too earnest a fancier for this, though the loss of Punch is by no means his first serious setback.

From Man's Best Friend we learn that Mr. T. A. Armstrong, late of Ottawa, is now in charge of Mr. W. T. Payne's Cockers at Kingston, Pa. Armstrong knows a Cocker, has had good ones and is one of the steady, careful fellows without fads.

Congratulations to Miss Eleanor Macdonell, Kingston, on the breeding of a champion Cocker, Knoydart Cherry, whose recent win at Montreal under Mr. Mason gives her the desired prefix. May it not be the last!

BRANTFORD SHOW.

This show, held in connection with the Brantford Horse Show—an excellent combination—was a most enjoyable two days' outing. The band of men who conducted affairs are true fanciers in every sense of the word. Mr. John Bowden, the secretary, was most attentive to his duties, and made the goodly number of visitors from a distance feel at home. Mr. Kerr was on hand to superintend matters and got the dogs into the ring promptly.

Though not a large show, a good deal of quality was to be found in many classes. In some of the larger breeds it was deemed advisable to withhold first prizes, and especially winners' classes, as with little competition and careful dodging about at small shows, the first thing we know a H.C. dog is proclaimed a champion—perchance without competition. This state of affairs should be safeguarded against by the Canadian Kennel Club, and the champion title made only obtainable by points and proper competition, especially the latter.

St. Bernards were very poor. Mastiffs had one entry, Crash, who, though undersized and in poor condition, is a typical specimen of a breed fast disappearing from dog shows. Russian Wolfhounds, two, of which Czar of Lamboff has more size and substance than the puppy Cossack. English Foxhounds—Queen Foxie, a bitch with a beautiful head and grand body, legs and feet, would be hard to beat in a class for American Foxhounds, to which she properly belongs. American Foxhounds—Several very speedy looking hounds, of which Mr. Bowden's Ch. Fairfax Bud was best. A nicely balanced hound with a good body and sound legs and feet. Several of his progeny were on exhibition and stamped him as a successful sire. Bloodhounds—Mr. Well's Bronze Plate well deserved his win and will be heard from again.

Irish Water Spaniels—Nora Shannon, on the small side, has a good coat and is quite above the average all round. Cocker Spaniels—The classes were well filled. The winning black dog has a very fair head and good body. The best parti-color was Miss Macdonell's Knoydart Blue Boy, an active little dog with a short compact body and a grand coat, quite a good sort of head. Mr. Tibbs showed several reds of more than average merit. Mr. Clarke sent

on Lady Pauline, who was very ring shy, but was well ahead of the other blacks in head, ears, eye and body. Miss Macdonell's beautiful red Knoydart Cherry continued her winning career and was put down in good condition. She now becomes a champion, a title she well deserves.

Collies turned out well and furnished a surprise or two. Puppy dogs supplied two much above the average, of which Sefton Ralph scored. He has good quality throughout, and a head and ears that are typical. In the older division the struggle lay between Edgibaston Dandy and Mrs. Gordon's Southport Seabright. The former owns a good head and ears, but he is light and shelly in body and his inability to move suggested unsoundness, a serious fault in a sheepdog. S. Seabright was declared the victor, scoring well behind the head, which, however, is a very good one. His ears were well carried in the ring. Wellesbourne Victory was third.

Puppy bitches introduced Col. McEwen's recent importation, Holyrood Wish, a daughter of Ch. Wishaw Leader. She is a grand big one, excellent in body and coat and a head and ears of much merit. With luck she should win many a prize and is the best Collie the writer has seen her popular owner exhibit. Nith Marvel is a very big one of good quality, but handicapped by an uneven mouth. She should breed a flyer if properly mated. Osset Ideal, third, is a tricolor with a good coat and neat head and ears. Mr. F. A. Metcalf showed some promising puppies, as yet immature.

Bulldogs—Mr. Goodwin's rare brace, Lord Angus, a brindle of the highest class, and Vinemont Folly, an excellent specimen, were a great attraction and an object lesson of what Bulldogs ought to be. Bull Terriers—Several light weights of high quality came forward. Wychwood Dick, the winning puppy,

has a good head and eye, and is a shapely youngster and most promising. Mr. James Wilson showed some light weights that would do well at the big shows. There were classes for "Pit Bull Terriers," which surely must be contrary to Canadian Kennel Club rules. Boston Terriers—Several entries of these popular and attractive Terriers. The struggle lay between Mr. Meadow's Max Boy and Mr. Anderson's Shuyler Bob. The former scored handsomely in head and body. The latter's eye suggests blindness, but he is a cocky little dog.

Beagles—A good entry, of which the Smith Bros. supplied most of the winners. Yodeler, who did so well at Toronto last September, was quite the best and few can equal him. The puppy, Smith's Farewell, a son of Ch. Windholme's Powerful, has a grand head and will be a hard one to beat later on. Rouen and Pretty Peggy are both good ones.

Irish Terriers—A very indifferent lot mostly. Smooth Fox Terriers—These were good classes, thanks to the entries of Mr. A. A. Macdonald, who had a good team on hand. The puppy winner, Aldon Cadet, a heavily marked son of Aldon Captain, is one of rare merit. He has excellent legs and feet and a short back; head and ears good. He should have a successful career. His lack of maturity put him behind the well known Aldon Tipster, who looked well and now becomes a champion, a well deserved distinction, after a long career of fearless showing. His owner now proposes to retire Tipster to the stud.

In bitches Aldon Diversion, a wonderfully long-headed white bitch with a good front, had a comfortable win over Mrs. Smith's Minnie M., who has a good body and front. Wires—Several fair specimens till we met Mr. Atkinson's stylish young dog Oxspring Dookie. He has a good coat, legs and feet and a head and ears above the average. The best of the bitches was

white, of the low, cobby order. Typical head and eye, good bone and feather, and full of Cocker character. Her fault is a poor front and shoulders. Iris is white with lemon markings, and decidedly the sort of Spaniel that would appeal to English judges, and lovers of a sporting type. She is just a trifle weak in muzzle, but so superlatively good in body, coat and bone, and such a mover, that her charm can't be denied. We believe she has produced a wonderful litter to Mepal's Norman—blood that is bound to tell. It is this adherence to blood-lines and type that is the secret of Mr. Bloodgood's success in breeding Cockers. Light boned specimens, devoid of coat and feather—so typical of the breed—are not found in his kennels. Certainly Cockers are not what they once were. Though we find many entries, after a few are deducted the remainder are of very poor stuff.

Collies—The Princess De Montglyn—a democratic and charming sportswoman, judged these classes in a most painstaking and thorough manner. The Princess is not one of the autocratic high and mighty sort, but loves dogs for themselves, and has a warm hand-

shake for those of like taste. She never tires of "talking Collie" with an enthusiast of the breed. In 1900-1901 her Collies were winning laurels at the foremost British shows. Her famous quartette depicted in the well-known picture "Four by Honours," consisted of Champion Barwell Masterpiece, Champion Old Hall Shamrock, Old Hall Beatrice, and Lily Rightaway. Ch. Fox Terriers were skilfully judged by Mr. Winthrop Rutherford. It is a very great pleasure to see a man of this sort in the judging ring. Small classes were the order of the day. The Sabine Kennels, with a wonderful lot, must weary of constantly winning with little or no competition. However, they well deserve their successes as they mostly won with home-bred specimens. Dug puppies went to Sabine Renown, a beautifully moulded Terrier with few faults. Mr. Sands made a good second with his smart youngster Broadway Double, who was handicapped by too much loose hair around his neck. He is the right size, and full of quality. In the remaining classes the Sabines reigned supreme with Receiver, Recluse, Fad and Faddist—all beautiful specimens with few faults. The best smooth dog was Ch. Sabine Resist, who later won the special for best of all breeds. This is a most exquisite Terrier. It is questionable if even Veracity in his palmy days could beat him. by Mr. Desmond O'Connell and is by Dark Blue, ex. Overture. He is now owned by Mr. A. F. Nelson. Wire-haired Fox Terriers were also few in number. In dog puppies, Major G. M. Carnochan, whom many thought had left the fancy for all time, made a re-entry and showed that the Cairnsmuir prefix still lived. In Cairnsmuir Outlaw—a suggestive name—Major Carnochan has a very smart youngster. He is heavily marked with a good head, ears, expression, absolute front, and a natural wire coat. mouth, who went through from novice to winners, a neat, high quality dog by Cadger of Oaks. The second in novice is a local favorite by St. Leger, but thick in shoulder, short neck, lumpy skull and fine in muzzle, good coat, legs and feet. Third, Devon Mack, grand legs and feet, good body and coat but too big, light in eye and heavy in ear. One of the best, Essex Snowball, was put back for bad teeth. Nothing to remark on in limit. Open dogs, Dartmouth, novice winner, still on top in head and ear, cleanness of front and general quality, was followed by Cevessa Speedy, a very catchy dog, very neat in body and well shown, but cut away before the eye and has poor feet. The puppy bitch winner though showy is blocky and light in eye. The novice bitch, Rats, was the best, the only show bitch in the crowd, her chief fault being in front. Devon Fox, second all through, is good in body with a grand coat but short in head. Wire hairs were of all sorts. The dog winner, Jori, though not very strong in head, is neat, the right size, and has one of the best natural jackets seen for some time and had not been touched up by the barber or had his hair pulled, a most useful little dog by Briar Cackler, that is

also sire of the winning bitch. Second, Cannington Bristles, very young but may soon be a star, by a Go Bang sire, Cairnsmuir Gossoon out of a Barkby Ben mother and Aldon Donna. He strongly resembles Pen. The other dogs were either too big or too amateurishly trimmed. The winning bitch, Victoria Weasselle, is by the winning dog and neat, sound and a nice wire bitch. Second, Essex Nancy, a very showy and most promising bitch puppy of just six months will beat a lot of them if he goes on right. Capital head and ears, good front and style and a shower.

Irish Terriers fairly numerous, with dogs weak, but two neat bitches first and second. These latter might make their mark if a little bigger.

Bull Terriers were noticeable for a big, good looking son of Edgecote Peer. This dog, though rather light in eye, is very typical and sound. The only other one that came near him was Whitecoat Wonder, by Woodcote Wonder.

Airedales, the best we ever saw out here and if they go on as these are will be very strong, for it would take some of the flyers to make these run.

Bulldogs—Moderate, though Sarah Drummond, a useful looking brood

bitch, deserved all she got. Nice type and sound. An old dog of a good sort was shown, but he was lame.

Cockers run strongly on the Pacific and a class of black dogs was good, though coats needed attention. The winning bitch, Carrie Dean II., and Jesmond Ruby are much above the average. A very neat dog in Red Duke landed his class. Springers—a most popular variety here for field and bench—created quite a stir with eleven coming out and a goodly lot well shown. “Shades of New York, etc., what has a working Spaniel to do in a show?” But he is here, and to stay.

Irish Water Spaniels—ten—the biggest and best lot we ever saw on the continent.

English Retrievers, one, a useful bitch. Labradors, three, two neat dogs, the second carrying his tail badly and too strong in head. A smart bitch in Sceptre beat the others for the special. Chesapeake—one—just fair.

Pointers—On the whole a moderate lot. A useful dog, light in eye and rather poorly shown, was first in three classes, with a strong black and white second in limit. In open the same. In field trial class, Glee Boy, a strong muscular and typical pointer won and took winners. There was nothing remarkably new in bitches, Queenie, an old favorite, taking winners, and we believe her championship.

English Setters were a strong turnout, though absolute stars, not too numerous, and on the whole they were not up to “coast” form. Flett’s Count, winner in novice, is a very showy orange belton with grand head, well shown, not too good behind. Second, Marquis Ito, a racy, good looking field puppy, not quite ready. Flash

won in limit, a very smart young dog by Rockline Young Roy—Roy’s Lady, and later took winners. In open dogs, Rockline Young Roy, not too well put down, had to give way to Flett’s Count. Bitches were nice, quite a good one in Pearl Montez, winning in novice from a typical bitch that lost in shoulders, by Mollie C. Pearl Montez is by Stylish Sergeant—Bess Montez, and Mollie by Albert’s Rumney Ranger—Albert’s Nora. The star of the show came out in open Rockline Flirt, a lemon ticked bitch by Malwyd Bob—Albert’s Rosalind, and the best in America is none too good to meet her and might go down. This was Flirt’s first appearance.

Irish Setters—Prince took dog winners, a fine big dog, long head, well filled out from start to finish. He stands over a lot of ground and only fails in being not quite straight in front. Ch. Jeannot, a good dog always, is not as fresh as the winner. Jeannot II., son of this dog’s novice winner, is a smart puppy with rather a gay tail. A very pretty bitch by Ch. Jeannot—Darie’s Maggie, an old friend, was the best bitch, but could have been put down better. When right she is a very good bitch.

Gordons were chiefly conspicuous for the presence of one good dog in Messenger Boy, who took winners, followed by Alberta Gyp not far behind in a nice puppy.

Collies, big classes and most promising, the greatest fault being uncertain ears. In this point Glen Tana Monk excelled. Some of the home-bred ones were more than creditable both in dogs and bitches; big, well coated, and well grown.

Greyhounds—Fair.

St. Bernards—Open dogs was a close thing between two good brothers, soundness of limb carrying Victoria Chief to the front over Star of the North, but there was a fine, sound puppy that came third that should be heard of again. A nice but immature bitch puppy was the best bitch.

Quality ran high when it came to general specials and the best were picked out in most breeds so the outlook is most promising for dogs in the future at Vancouver.

A banquet was held the third night at which fifty sat down and enjoyed themselves thoroughly. Mr. Colin F. Jackson, the president of the club, was a most efficient chairman and was supported on his right by Sir Chas. Tupper and the American Consul, Col. Dudley, who is largely responsible for the organization of the club and who owns a capital parti-color Cocker in Hisa. I am writing this on the C. P.R. boat going down Arrowhead Lake in B.C. and most eastern Canadians have no conception of what they have in their West in climate, beauty of scenery, nice people and good dogs. Go to Vancouver for a good time and if you wish to know what “welcome” means. The boundary fence between the U.S. and Canada is also not as high as in some parts of the east where kennel matters emanate from a New York source. One of the most delightful features of this show is that tea was served every afternoon by the ladies, the proceeds going to the show. Altogether a show in this country is not only a doggy event but a friendly and sociable convention by those who are fond of outdoor life where sporting dogs are sporting dogs.

WITH THE WEIGHT DIVISIONS. STANDARD OF THE BOSTON—

The general appearance of the Boston Terrier is that of a smooth, short-coated, compactly built dog of medium station. The head should indicate a high degree of intelligence, and should be in proportion to the dog's size; the body rather short and well-knit, the limbs strong and finely turned, no feature being so prominent that the dog appears badly proportioned.

The dog conveys an impression of determination, strength and activity. Style of a high order, and carriage easy and graceful.

Skull—Broad and flat, without prominent cheeks, and forehead free from wrinkles.

Stop—Well defined but indenture not too deep.

Eyes—Wide apart, large and round, neither sunken nor too prominent, and in color dark and soft. The outside corner should be on a line with the cheeks as viewed from the front.

Ears small and thin, situated as near corners of skull as possible.

Muzzle—short, square, wide and deep, without wrinkles. Nose black and wide, with a well-defined straight line between nostrils. The jaw broad and square, with short, regular teeth. The chops wide and deep, not pendulous, completely covering the teeth when mouth is closed.

Neck—Of fair length, without throatiness and slightly arched.

Body—Deep and broad of chest, well ribbed up. Back short, not roached. Loins and quarters strong.

Elbows—Standing neither in nor out.

Fore legs—Wide apart, straight and well muscled.

Hind legs—Straight, quite long from stifle to hock (which should turn neither in nor out) short and straight from hock to pastern. Thighs well muscled. Hocks not too prominent.

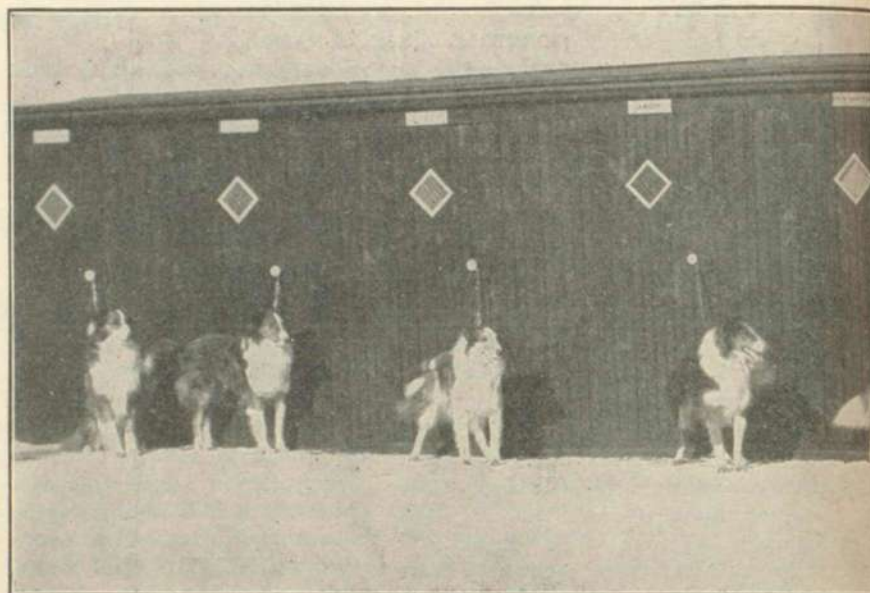
Feet—Small, nearly round, and turned neither in nor out. Toes compact and arched.

Tail—Set on low, short, fine and tapering, straight or serew, devoid of fringe or coarse hair, and not carried above the horizontal.

Color—Any color; brindle, evenly marked with white, strongly preferred.

Markings—White muzzle, blaze on face, collar, chest and feet.

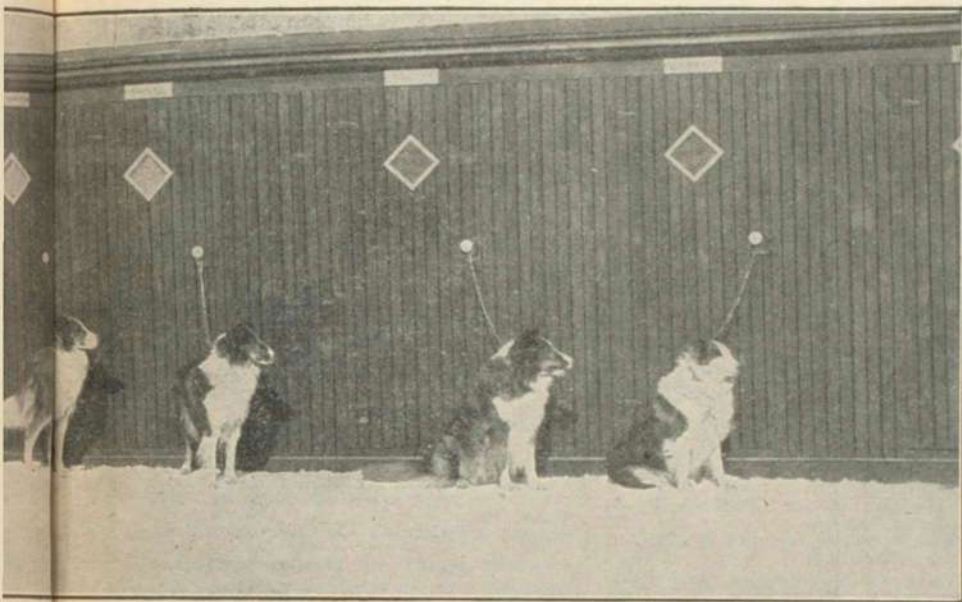

NOTES FOR NOVICES.

By Theo. Marples.

The question of trimming Terriers' coats has for years been a knotty problem for the Kennel Club (which we are not going to attempt to solve here) owing to the lengths to which exhibitors have carried the practice, or, in other words, to the shortness to which the coats of dogs have been reduced by the clever tonsorial artist, which sounds somewhat paradoxical.

We cannot here recommend the use of barber's No. 1 clippers, the knife,

scissors, rasp, or other implement of canine war for the purpose of bringing a long woolly coat more into keeping with present-day requirements, and prior to a show carefully dressing it with a solution of alum or other substance, in order to temporarily harden its texture to the touch, and thus deceive the judge, because such practices are against the penal clauses of the K. C.'s code for the preparation of dog's coats.

What is called stripping is the process of clipping off the entire coat of a

dog, which is sometimes required on grounds of sanitation and humanity. But such process greatly improves a bad coat, and at a certain stage of its growth gives it all the appearance of a good coat. That is why dogs are so often "stripped" purely for exhibition purposes. Some contend that this stripping is illegitimate; others that it is not. At any rate, that it is beneficial to a soft coat is beyond dispute. Of course, dogs so treated can only be exhibited during a certain stage of growth of the coat.

"Necessity is the mother of invention," and the necessity for an even, crisp coat in most of the broken-haired Terrier varieties, such as wire-haired Fox Terriers, Airedale, Irish, Welsh, and Scottish Terriers, has suggested the manufacture of a special comb, with short, sharp prongs, which, when carefully used, will not only remove the soft hair, superfluous and otherwise, but may be so manipulated in its use as to make all irregular hair more regular.

Terriers must be trimmed, and so long as trimming in any form is permitted the practice will always be more or less abused, and especially in the face of the fact that even among experts there is a difference of opinion as to what is and what is not legitimate. It has been held in the High Courts even that it would be absurd to expect an exhibitor to take into the show ring an animal which had not previously been subjected to a certain amount of preparation, and it is the "amount" of preparation in connection with dogs which forms an ever-recurring bone of contention in the ranks of the fancy—a case of every dog wanting a "bone," and those who have not got it snarling at those who have!

Taking Fox Terriers first, the smooth variety may, of course, be dismissed, as they require so little trimming as to be hardly worth discussing. The wire-hairs are the trouble, when Nature has given them a long, soft coat, as against a moderately short, crisp, wiry coat, which is the correct thing. But a soft, long coat has its advantages even, in that where a dog is, say, a bit snipy, or not dead true in front, the trimming of the coat can be so manipulated as to make the jaw of the dog look strong to the end, the curvatures of the fore-legs carefully regulated by the coat,
