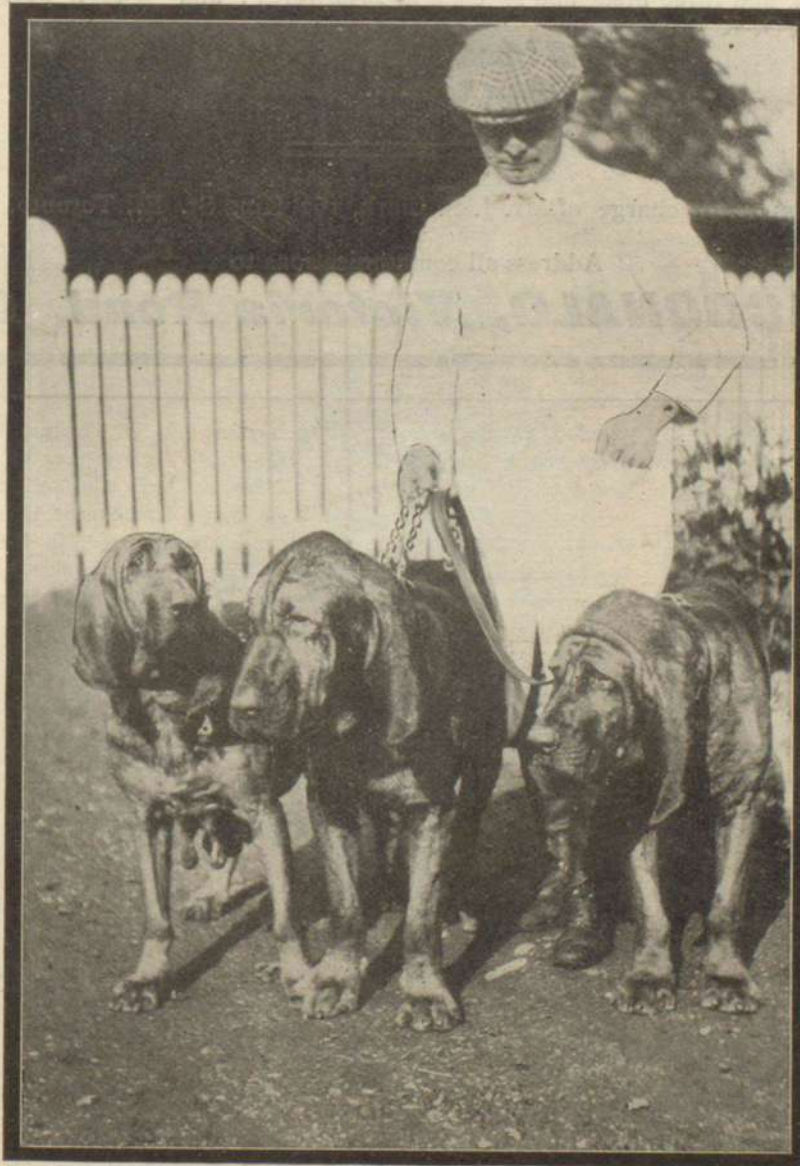

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"Soggarth Aroon"—Death of Rev. Father O'Gorman, Gananoque, famous as the owner of the Irish Terrier Ch. Celtic Badger, and admired by all who knew him.

Soggarth aroon, beloved father, was indeed applicable to the late Rev. Father J. D. O'Gorman, a man with a heart as warm as any that ever beat on the Green Isle and with a sympathy and love so wide that they were big enough to embrace all that came under his influence, be they of his faith or not.

There was nothing narrow about Father O'Gorman, his the wide charity that knew no creed. His the love that embraced all nature and not any circumscribed part. A good loser, he was also a good winner and no man ever enjoyed a victory more than he did. As a man we loved him, as a sportsman we admired him.

While his chief affections for dogs were centered on the Terrier that bears the name of the land of his birth, he was cosmopolitan in this way as in others and had at the time of his death several Bostons of more than passing merit. The dog that brought the greatest fame to his large kennel of Irish Terriers was Champion Celtic Badger, a dog brought over from Europe to win at New York and who did so, and in addition took premier place at all the principal shows in Canada and the United States.

His home paper, the Gananoque Reporter, thus writes of him:

Last Monday afternoon, about five o'clock, Rev. John D. O'Gorman, priest of Gananoque, Lansdowne and Howe Island, breathed his last. His death was not expected, though some weeks his friends had been anxiously hoping that a change for the better would take place.

He was son of Mr. Daniel O'Gorman,

a gentleman farmer, and owner of 400 acres of land in the County of Cork, Ireland. The estate was known as Maule House, Boherby, thirty miles from the city of Cork. There the deceased was born in 1860. He was educated at the College of Maynooth for the priesthood, and came to Canada in 1884. For a few months he was attached to the Bish-

op's Palace at Kingston, and was then appointed curate at Prescott, where he remained two years. He was curate at Belleville three years, and was then, in 1889, appointed to Gananoque.

The seventeen years of his residence here have been marked by success in his work. Through his efforts the old church was replaced by a large and beautiful

structure, with presbytery attached; a new church was erected in Lansdowne; the congregations have been largely increased, and vigorous activity infused into every phase of church work. He had hardly located in Gananoque till he was known to everyone. He was aggressively devoted to his pastoral duties and loyalty to his church. But in other matters he was one of the community and everybody's friend. Genial, sociable, witty, full of life, quick to respond when assistance was asked, a sound adviser, a sympathizer in everyone's troubles, his popularity and influence grew and extended as the years went by.

He was known extensively throughout Canada and the United States, through his lectures, and his connection with exhibitions. As a speaker he was fluent, his language choice and his illustrations to the point; so that his addresses were always entertaining and instructive. He was an admirer of clean sports, and took a lively interest in high bred dogs and horses. His Irish Terrier Celtic Badger is famous in Great Britain and America, having competed at all the principal cities on both sides of the Atlantic, and never failed to take first place.

Father O'Gorman was a man of fine presence, weighing 240 pounds, well proportioned, and the picture of robust health; in the prime of life, and with the prospect of many years of usefulness before him. Last July he conducted a pilgrimage to St. Anne de Beaupre. Special trains were run on all the lines of railway from points as far west as Oshawa and Peterboro. He attended personally to the details of or-

ganization, advertising and distribution of tickets, a most fatiguing task, as all had to be done in a limited time; and he went with the excursion to Ste. Anne. He was not feeling in best condition when he left home, and the trip seems to have worn upon his strength. But he was in good spirits when he returned, and elated with the success of the pilgrimage, which was largely attended, and conducted without a mishap or unpleasantness. He was busy for a few days settling up matters in connection with the trip; and then went under treatment for an ailment that at the time was supposed by his friends to be nothing serious, needing only rest and care. But as the days, and then weeks, went by without improvement, and medical specialists were called in, it became known that his case was critical. For the last three weeks or more he had been gradually failing. Some days he would appear bright for a time, only to sink again into a steady decline. Dr. Bird was his constant medical attendant, though other local doctors and some from other places were called for consultation. His disease is stated to have been enlargement of the liver, and ulceration.

The Funeral.

The funeral took place Thursday forenoon. In his lifetime Father O'Gorman had expressed a desire, if his death occurred here, to be buried on Howe Island, and that wish was carried out. His Grace Archbishop Gauthier and about forty priests of the Diocese, with others from outside, were in attendance. The body was placed near the altar in the church Wednesday evening, where it remained during subsequent services. The church was draped in mourning, the altars, pulpit, pillars and statuary being covered and wound in black, with black streamers from side to side overhead. Mass was celebrated at five o'clock Thursday morning, and several times at intervals later. At 9.30 a full choral mass was celebrated by the archbishop. The church on that occasion being filled in every part, and a large crowd of people filling the grounds and street outside. Town and country people, of all creeds and classes, were there. Rev. Fathers Hartigan, of Deseronto, Kingsley, McCarthy and Read, assisted at the mass. Father McDonald, of Portsmouth, conducted the musical part of the service, Prof. Stonistand, of Brockville, acting as organist, and Father Me-

Donald and Father O'Conner, of Napanee, taking the solos.

At the close of the services, Rev. Father Welch, of Providence, Rhode Island, an intimate personal friend of Father O'Gorman, preached an appropriate sermon, giving a sketch of deceased's life, and dwelling upon his excellent qualities.

The pall-bearers were Messrs. Neil McCarney, Thos. Roach, Bain Shields, T. D. O'Connor, P. Conlin, M. McDonald, M. Lappan and Angus McDonald.

Father Mehan, who for some time past has been Father O'Gorman's assistant, directed the procession. In front marched the members of the Catholic societies, a long line two abreast; then the hearse,

churches, and the town bell, followed in regular stroke.

A hearse and carriages met the boats at Howe Island wharf, and conveyed the remains and followers to the cemetery, a mile and a half distant, where the remains were placed in a substantial brick vault, built specially.

Father Welch addressed the people on similar lines as he followed here.

And so the tale is told. His life was full of work, full of interest, full of charity, "and the greatest of these is charity," a truth that dog men, possibly, are too prone to forget. Would that we had more like him.

Leaving the church, the procession passed by way of Stone, King and Main streets to the railway wharf, where the remains were placed on Mr. Charles Macdonald's steam yacht Kate, and conveyed to Howe Island. The steamer Where Now took a full load of passengers up, and numerous private boats also went up, among them being Mr. George Taylor's conveying the clergymen of three Protestant churches and other friends.

As the procession started, the bells of St. John's church tolled, and the bells of the Presbyterian and Methodist

In 1903 and 1904 the story of Father O'Gorman and Celtic Badger is a story familiar to all.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

Championships: One of the very necessary parts of the work to come before the Rules Committee of the Canadian Kennel Club will be the arrangements to be made allotting the ten points that now go to make up championship. As our readers are aware, the rule governing championships was at the annual meeting, on motion of Dr. Ford, changed from a certain number of wins to a minimum of ten points. Where these ten points are to be won, and how, will be part of the work of the committee that it was left to the President, Mr. Jno. G. Kent, to appoint.

After some thought, and without in any way attempting to forestall the committee's report or to influence the members of that committee in coming to a decision, it appears to us that the number of points should be based, not on the number of entries, but on the actual number of dogs present at a show.

And why? will be asked. For the reason that there can be no cavil at the latter. The dogs may be counted by an appointed official and the proper document for filing at the C. K. C. office certified to by him. We believe our show officials to be honest; indeed, we may say we know them to be so, but this hardly enters into the argument. Remove all temptation to inflate the total by bogus entries and then no question as to integrity can arise.

Location also must be taken into account, especially as now practically none but C. K. C. wins will be recognized. Taking one hundred as the unit, a unit should have more value in the extreme east and in the extreme west than in the more populous—from a fancier's standpoint—portions of Ontario and Quebec. The Canadian Kennel Club can afford to be liberal, but with a liberality tempered with wisdom.

Whether the valuable and handsome championship cups and medals now offered so freely to all comers by the C. K. C. should in future be confined to members only is a question that enters in here too. There seems to be considerable opposition by many loyal supporters of the Club to the present free and easy method of awarding

championship cups—mark—paid for by the members of the Club, to any one who is able to make the necessary wins, member or not. We can't advise here. Inclination says, every privilege wide open; caution whispers why should some men pay for other men's trophies? We leave it here for the present, having every confidence in the ability of those appointed by the Club to deal with the matter.

No Dual Position: While on the question of rules, we want to express an emphatic opinion, and that is that no man should try to serve two masters, in the acceptance of a judging appointment at a show where he is an exhibitor. We say with no hesitation whatever that the C. K. C. new rules should state positively that no one shall judge at a show, no matter how small, at which he is an exhibitor. We have seen so much injury ensue from this dual judge-exhibitor position, not so much perhaps in dogs as in other branches of live stock, that we desire to doubly emphasize what we have written.

Beagle Wins: It should be noted in 1905 Stud Book that the following wins have been omitted: Beagles under 13 inches, H. Card's Little Blue Cap; first open and winners, bitches, H. Card's Elora Pearl. These wins will be inserted in the 1906 Stud Book.

Othello for Boston: Mr. Goebel has recently refused a good round offer for his stud Boston Othello, preferring to retain the dog. He will be shown next month at the Boston Specialty Club Show, where we wish his owner luck.

The Late Father O'Gorman's Dogs: We understand that the dogs owned by the late Father O'Gorman have been placed in Mr. Lyndon's hands for disposal. The famous Champion Irish Terrier, Celtic Badger, is included in the lot, together with twenty or thirty other Irish Terriers, about a dozen Bostons, and a brace of Foxhounds.

Collie Sales: Mrs. Gordon, during the past few months has been particularly happy in the number of Collie sales consummated. But two puppies now remain in the kennel, a dog by Southport Sculptor and a bitch by Wishaw Clink-

er. Mrs. Gordon has also sold three Yorkshire puppies, retaining the dog of the litter, whose advent we recently noted.

The new owner of Wellesbourne Victory has had the dog shipped to him, not waiting until spring as he originally intended. Five matrons, with the two puppies noted above, at present comprise Mrs. Gordon's kennel, though we wouldn't be surprised if something Byron-ic came Torontowards.

Catalogue Arrangement of Breeds: The sub-committee of the American Kennel Club, consisting of Messrs. Jas. Mortimer, E. M. Oldham, and A. P. Vredenburg, appointed to bring in a report as to the order in which the different breeds shall be printed in premium lists and catalogues, has handed in the following arrangement:

Large dogs—Bloodhounds, Mastiffs, St. Bernards, Great Danes, Newfoundlands, Russian Wolfhounds, Deerhounds, Greyhounds, Owtechars (Russian Sheep Dogs), Esquimaux Dogs.

Medium size dogs—Foxhounds (American), Foxhounds (English), Pointers, English Setters, Gordon Setters, Irish Setters, Retrievers, Griffons (Sporting), Chesapeake Bay Dogs, Basset Hounds, Irish Water Spaniels, Clumber Spaniels, Sussex Spaniels, Field Spaniels, Cocker Spaniels, Beagles, Dachshunds, Whippets, Collies (rough), Collies (smooth), Belgian or German Sheep Dogs, Old English Sheep Dogs, Dalmatians, Poodles, Chow Chows, Samoyedes, Boxers, Pinschers, Bulldogs, Airedale Terriers, Bull Terriers.

Small size dogs—French Bulldogs, Boston Terriers, Fox Terriers (smooth), Fox Terriers (wire), Irish Terriers, Scottish Terriers, Roseneath Terriers, Welsh Terriers, Skye Terriers, Dandie Dinmont Terriers, Bedlington Terriers, Black and Tan (Manchester) Terriers, White English Terriers, Schipperkes, Chinese-crested Dogs, Mexican-hairless Dogs.

Cage dogs—Pomeranians, English Toy Spaniels, Japanese Spaniels, Pekinese Spaniels, Pugs, Toy Poodles, Yorkshire Terriers, Maltese Terriers, Toy Terriers, Griffons (Bruxellois), Chihuahuas, Papillons, Italian Greyhounds.

Willamette: Mr. Frank C. Watkins, Portland, Oregon, is asking for the registration of the word Willamette as his prefix.

Barrie Sales: Mr. Dymont has sold a red Collie puppy to Dr. Morris, Hartford, Conn., the second one Dr. Morris

has had from this kennel; another to Mr. W. McKernon, Toronto, and his Bull bitch puppy to Mr. Keith, Toronto.

Bloodhounds in the Hunting Field.

The finest and most celebrated pack of Bloodhounds in existence in England to-day is the property of Henry P. East of Chislehurst, owner of the Holmleigh Kennels. The pack consists of twenty-five Bloodhounds, which Mr. East hunts regularly during the season, two or three days each week in his country, which lies between Southampton and Swindon, with headquarters at Andover. Mr. East has done more good in the proper breeding of Bloodhounds than probably any other man in England. He has, at great loss, killed in four years no less than seventy-two couples of weak and worthless hounds that were absolutely useless to breed from, so that all this bad blood is gone, and only those hounds of the strongest constitutions and the very best scenting qualities are left in his pack.

It is a pleasure to see these Bloodhounds at a meet. They are big, up-standing black-and-tan hounds, on the best of feet and legs, the muscles standing out on their bodies like rope. They look ready to run fifty miles at any time without turning a hair. They have been trained to follow a man and to find him in the country without his boots being previously doctored by any artificial scent—but it would be unreasonable, in the very nature of the scent, to expect the hounds to do so in a thoroughfare through which countless thousands pass. The Bloodhound being trained in England to-day, however, is the most useful animal in Europe for the purpose of tracking, particularly in rural districts, where there are few people to disturb the line which he has to travel; for even if the wind blows the scent two hundred yards or three hundred yards out of its original course, the Bloodhound has the power to discover this and keep his head down upon it wherever it has gone.

The home of Mr. East is only twelve miles from busy, bustling London town. Consequently many distinguished city people are always to be found at his meets. A very interesting and quite unique fact regarding the Holmleigh pack is that the owner's sister, Miss Ida East, is the field master. Miss East also occasionally helps to whip

in. She is very generally regarded as one of the most brilliant horsewomen in England, and is usually in ahead of the other riders at the "death." Fine riding and good hunting horses are exceedingly essential to success in a man-hunt behind the Bloodhounds, as the pace the hounds travel in a good scent is wonderful. The Holmleigh pack have galloped ten miles over country with-

out a check in half an hour. Fox-hunters will be somewhat sceptical over these figures, because ten miles in anything under fifty minutes would be accounted an exceptionally vast thing with Foxhounds. At the same time, "hunting the clean boot" and hunting a fox are entirely different, and to bring a Foxhound and a Bloodhound together on a strong scent that would afford a mutually fair and reliable test of their relative speed would be a most difficult task. At least it may be allowed that on a favorable line the Bloodhound can show extraordinary pace. Many a good horseman, with a

thorough knowledge of the country he was riding over, lost sight of a well-trained pack.

Judging the Bloodhound merely by his points, one would sooner believe

wonderful feats have been recorded by followers of Bloodhound packs to demonstrate the pace at which they can travel over a line on a good scenting day. Man-hunting with Bloodhounds

years old, and was "blooded" to Foxhounds by the late Duke of Beaufort. He is 59 years old and has travelled all over the world, having hunted and shot in America, across the Rockies, from New York to San Francisco, Ceylon, Australia, New Zealand, but declares that there is no country so beautiful as the wild west countries of England, hunted over by the Devon and Somerset Stag hounds, and which affords so many peculiar advantages for enjoying the new fad of hunting human beings with Bloodhounds.—Globe.

Mr. Douglas P. Stewart was a happy selection for secretary, and discharged his duties with consummate skill and courtesy. He was ably assisted by Mr. Hillsdon. With Mr. Ostell, of Montreal, as chief ring steward, a ring was never better served, and we hope other shows may secure his able services. Were this possible, the long delays in getting dogs into the ring would be greatly modified. Other members of the club worked hard, and we are informed that the show has a good balance over and above expenses for next year.

Of the dogs themselves, a great deal of quality adorned the benches. A St. Bernard with size and typical head could win at most shows. A very good sort of Newfoundland exhibited by His Excellency the Governor-General, was greatly admired. Most of the others were at Toronto. Mr. W. P. Fraser had good classes of Fox Terriers, and judged in his usual painstaking manner. In smooths, Mr. A. A. Macdonald had a comfortable win with that quality little dog, Aldon Cadet, also winning the special for best smooth Fox Terrier. Owing to illness, the Oxford Kennels' Oxford Blue was unable to be present. They have a good one in bitches with an Alton-bred one. Mr. Sands, of Toronto, was also successful. Wires brought out some good specimens. In dogs, the best was Carleon, owned by Mr. Stamford, of Montreal. He has a good body, coat and front, but could have been greatly improved in appearance. Miss Eadie's entry was again ring shy, and had to pay the penalty, nice dog as he is. Mrs. Webster showed a promising Matchmaker puppy

and won well. This lady's other entries were a well-bred looking lot. Mr. Goodwin did well with Smallwood Duty, good head, ears, front and coat.

Other classes were mostly a repetition of Toronto. Cockers were a strong lot, due to the entries of Miss Eleanor Macdonell, who showed her usual strong team. Mrs. Parmlee secured the special for best in show with her beautiful black, Lady Eileen. D'Arcy & Moore were also successful with a good lot.

Collies—It was Toronto all over again, except Mrs. Gordon's Southport Sarah, who never looked better.

Setters were light classes. Pointers were a battle royal for the Outhet team and plucky Mrs. Waters.

The keenest interest centered in the judging of the handsome cups for best of all breeds and best kennel of four. This was a difficult matter to decide. The former cup fell to the wonderful Bull Terrier Haymarket Blazer, owned by Mr. Elliott, and shown a bit heavy, but winning with something to spare. The team prize went to the Outhet Pointers, with Mrs. Gordon's Collies reserve.

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Some Classes at Toronto—Notes by Dr. C. Y. Ford.

Collies—September was always an off month for anything but a ten months' old puppy, with little or no coat; an otherwise good dog is badly handicapped. Dr. Henry Jarrett, the master of the long famous Chestnut Hill Kennels, was the judge, and is probably the best authority on the breed in America. His careful, painstaking manner was a great feature.

Nothing of great account came forward in dog puppies. The successful dog, Balgreggie King, who has had his ups and downs since coming to the country, was in great coat and condition, a big dog, lacking refinement in head. In any other color the well known Coila Kiltie, shown in good form for this time, was a good winner. There is no denying his good head and ears. The bitches were an unusually good lot, many likely breeders of good type being shown. Mr. Jos. Reid brought out a slashing big tricolor puppy, Janet of Rosemount. She has great length of head and good ears. She would do with more bone. She only met defeat by Cairngorm Surprise, a dark sable bitch of the best quality. Though not in bloom, she carries a coat of good texture, and a head, ears, legs and feet of the best. In good condition few would equal her. Mrs. Gordon was well up with Nith Marvel, and a grand big bitch she is; properly mated, she should breed a champion. Cinderella, Mr. Hill's good tricolor, is always hard to beat; a grand type of bitch, with a rare body. There were a number of very useful bitches shown, that are just the type to breed winners from.

Old English Sheep Dogs—A small but representative collection. A surprise came when Edward Rex was placed over Sir Wallie Harkaway, whom we much prefer.

Cocker Spaniels—The large entry—a world's record—that greeted that sound judge, Mr. W. T. Payne, must have been a compliment from exhibitors that showed their faith and sincerity in his judgment of the breed he has been so long identified with. Never before have so few poor specimens been shown at a Toronto Show, which goes to show the progress breeders are making. Of Cockers of merit, there were many. About all the breeders that have made Canada famous were on hand with home-bred exhibits, the result of care-

ful matings and much study, and not a question of buying. This only goes to show that the traditions of the Canadian National Exhibition are what they were intended to be—a great exhibition of products produced by the exhibitor—a breeder's show.

To give a detailed account of the huge classes would mean a whole number of the Gazette being devoted to this purpose. The best dog was declared to be Mr. George Douglas' Hermit, a most serviceable black dog, whose faults are his front and wavy coat. Operator, from the same kennel, came next in order, a good sort of Cocker. There is still room for a high class black dog, as the present lot have too many faults to rank as first class. In the parti-color class the veteran George Dunn was made happy by scoring with Combination, an aptly named one. Miss Macdonell was well up with Knoydart Blue Boy, shown in Knoydart condition, which means the best. In red dogs there was nothing to approach Knoydart Coronet. This is a beautiful Cocker, and looks a sire. The bitches were a better lot than the dogs. Mr. James Clark, who was so badly treated at Buffalo last spring, came to his own with his lovely little Rosalie. This

is a Cocker hard to find fault with. In head, eye, body and coat she is all that can be desired. A trifle more bone would improve her, but she looks like keeping right at the top. Mrs. Parmalee was second with her high quality Lady Eileen, who owns a beautiful head and ears. Mr. Geo. Douglas whipped in third with the well-known Flora Hunter. In parti-color bitches Mrs. Parmalee did well with the good-bodied though big Idahurst Rye. In red bitches Miss Macdonell added another blue ribbon to the long list already attained by her beautiful bitch Knoydart Cherry, probably the best red Cocker in America. Mr. H. G. Charlesworth, who has been breeding Cockers many years, had a big and attractive exhibit and was successful in several instances.

Fox Terriers—Charles Lyndon, whose careful matings made the Norfolk Kennels famous, was the judge of these classes. The feature this year was the large number of one-dog exhibitors who retired when the big kennels monopolized the prize lists, but who have now come to life again—a most healthy sign for all that goes to make true sport and anti-professionalism. Smooth dog puppies, brought out Aldon Truant, a quality son of Aldon Tipster.

He won handily, and was soon sold to a breeder in Ohio. His breeder, Mr. Thos. Jones, who has been an ardent fancier for some years, was indeed proud. He was also the breeder of the second prize winner, Binks. Mr. Morris came third with a well-bred looking Terrier, Royal Blue. The best smooth dog was declared to be Mr. Rutherford's Warren Berger, a Terrier with a good head, ears and expression, and good front. He is inclined to be sway-backed. Levenside Lexicon, a new one, seemed the lucky dog of the party. Oxford Blue, a very much improved dog, was again successful, but both were fortunate to beat the smart Aldon Cadet. Smooth bitches—Mr. Rutherford was again to the fore with a neat one in Warren Daffodil. The same owner's Warren Jenny, a beautiful bitch in head expression, body and front, was easily the best of the smooths. Mr. Sands showed a rare-fronted one in Broadway May. Mr. Wm. Morris, who has been in Terriers for a long time, was made happy by winning the Canadian bred class with Blue Stocking, a poor shower.

Wires—In puppy dogs, Mr. Rutherford again won with Warren Brittle, a rather plain-faced one with a good front. Mr. Lynn was second with Coastman, whose coat does not give him license to pose as a wire-haired Fox Terrier. Mr. Arthur Atkinson brought out the best of the lot in Ox-spring Billie, the best youngster seen out in some time, a rare head, keen expression, absolute front and good coat. He soon changed hands, going to the kennels of that good judge, Mr. W. P. Fraser. In the open class old Sel-wonk Topper could not be denied. Bar an uncertain coat, he is a wonderful Terrier. Miss Eadie's Cavall, a beautiful-fronted dog with a true wire coat, was very ring shy, which destroyed her chances. Bitches—The best of the lot was Mr. Strawbridge's Radnor Racket, good front, head and coat. Mrs. Webster brought out a promising sort in Bytown Belle, who looks like growing the right way. The same owner's Bytown Queen is a bitch of much quality.

Irish Terriers—Robbed of Father O'Gorman's usual display, these classes were not of especial interest, though several Canadian bred Irishmen showed that the breed was on the upgrade. There is no better blood to be found anywhere than we have in Canada at

the present time; judicious matings are all that is required to produce winners of the first class. The Drumclaph Kennels of Montreal brought forward a good team headed by the imported dog, D. Fairplay, who owns a good head expression, bone, legs and feet A1, and good body and coat. There is just a bit too much lumber about him which deprives him of the quality he should have with his many other good points. He looks a sire. Thornecroft Tipster, second, is a dog of good quality but on the light side. The bitches were a good lot. Mr. Miller introduced a home-bred puppy in Fiscal Fancy, and she has rare quality throughout and only wants time to make up into a high-class specimen. Her breeder, Mr. Morlock, of Guelph, is to be congratulated on breeding such a good one. We shall watch his further breeding operations with interest, as it is breeders of this sort that make the shows. Red Caprice, from the Drumclaph camp, made a good second. She was in poor condition, but is a good one with quality. Mr. Morlock was well up with Wellington Peggy.

Airedale Terriers—After his serious nervous breakdown, all were pleased to see Mr. Joseph A. Laurin showing his grand team, personally. Master Royal and Mistress Royal were left at home, but their kennel mates with the Colne prefix, including several promising youngsters, bred at home, gave evidence of what is being bred by the plucky Montreal fancier.

Scottish Terriers—No big classes, but lots of quality. Mrs. W. P. Fraser was successful with her sturdy little bitch, Scottish Jewel, and Mr. W. R. Goodwin was winning with a brace of good ones.

Bedlington Terriers—Mrs. K. B. Coleman, a fancier in every sense of the word, sticks to this quaint breed with true tenacity. This year she came to her just deserts and carried off the prize for the best team of all breeds—a popular award.

Welsh Terriers—Miss Beardmore supported this breed in right royal style, and many prizes fell to her share of the spoils. It is indeed a pleasure to see a lady take up a breed of this sort and stick to it. Success must come in the end, and Miss Beardmore is now

enjoying the fruits of her labors by winning with Terriers of her own breeding.

Skye Terriers—As in years gone by, Mr. George Caverhill supplied most of the winners, that are so well known.

Boston Terriers—A record entry for Toronto. With careful use of the good blood now in Canada, and as Canadians are breeders of dogs, we shall expect to have history repeat itself, as it has in other breeds of Terriers now being successfully bred in our midst. A dog like Mr. J. Cromwell Cox's Lord Anthony should do a lot of good. Space fails us in going farther into details.

Masonic—A Comparison—Toronto Show and the Canadian Kennel Club Eulogized—Comments made by Mr. Mason on some of His Classes.

The following notes are from the vigorous pen of Mr. Charles H. Mason, the "all-round" judge at Toronto. The original appeared in the paper he edits and manages, "Man's Best Friend," New York.

The story of Toronto would be easily told were it not for the large entry and the excellent quality of the exhibits in many breeds. Last year, owing to the new entry fee arrangement and the selection of Mr. Harding Cox as judge of many breeds, was a banner event in the history of dog shows in Canada, and many friends of the Canadian Kennel Club believed that the managers would have a hard task this year to secure as many dogs and entries and exhibitors as were on hand a year ago. There was really no cause for alarm, as all records were easily eclipsed, as the catalogues prove. There were this year about 750 dogs and 1,350 entries, including the Foxhounds and one or two others, which, owing to a mistake, did not get into the catalogue, so that the splendid total of last year—683 dogs and 1,310 entries—was easily beaten. It is also gratifying to note an increase in the number of exhibitors, as well as of visitors, at the show, and we believe we may safely assert that the gate also beat all past records; in short, the show was a success in all its features, and it was by long odds the best show of dogs ever given in Canada. The broad-gauge policy of catering to the dog-breeding majority instead of to wealthy cliques and to handlers and managers, is putting Canada far ahead of the States, just as was bound to be the case when the latter's mistaken course became known to all. The Canadian Kennel Club says we want breeders, not buyers. The American Kennel Club says we want buyers, not breeders; and, as it is the breeder who becomes an expert, and not the buyer, the average Canadian fancier is much better posted than his neighbor. The Canadian Kennel Club says: the profits to the Canadian breeder. The American Kennel Club says: the profits to the English breeder and to the handlers and managers, with the result that the Canadian Kennel Club is respected and beloved, whilst our

own is generally regarded as the greedy parent of the vicious and dangerous system that has accomplished much for cliques and nothing for those who have been its main support. In the matter of wealth, there is no comparison between the Canadian breeder and the American buyer, and yet, notwithstanding his advantages, the buyer is being eclipsed by his less wealthy neighbor in all that goes to make up a successful breeder, a genuine fancier and a real sportsman. Is it not time to change our course and hark back to the methods of the days when shows were given for the worthy purpose of improving the breeds of dogs and for the sport of winning when one owned the best? There is no dog show trust in Canada, no professional managers trading in judges whilst judging themselves and giving exhibitors their men in exchange for entries and specials and other considerations. There are no specialty

clubs manipulated in the interests of two or three wealthy men and sheltered under the downy wings of the governing body. The shows are open to all and the management of them has but one aim. Supply houses do not give shows in Canada to advertise their wares, guaranteeing the prizes and the judge, the benching and the feeding, etc., etc. The governing body does not stand for that sort of thing. So Canada goes to the front as a breeder, just as England did, and has never been known as a purchaser, except to produce. When the same policy shall be adopted here we won't find the shows padded with 30 or 40 per cent. of absent dogs entered to give the show "points" and make believe that the managing judges can secure as many paid entries as the honest and legitimate manager who manages not for his own pocket, but for the success of his club. The Canadian exhibitor cannot go to a

professional managing judge and secure a judge for his own dogs in exchange for a consideration. He must accept the judge appointed by the Dog Show Committee. He is not permitted to drive exhibitors from the shows by securing his own man and the prizes before the show comes off. The Canadian Kennel Club does not stand for that, and when there is a show it is an open show, and the profits are not gobbled up by a professional manager. A secretary is paid to do the necessary work and those who are identified with the show lend a hand in managing it when that is necessary. All pay the same fee to compete. There are no cut rates for handlers and no prizes fixed for them to win. They are paid by their employers and are a civil set of men, who do not insist on being paid three or four times over for doing something. They do not steal that they may take their families around bedecked in finery. What they owe they pay, and they do not seek excuses for robbing those who give them credit, believing them to be honest.

These are some of the reasons why dog shows in Canada are more satisfactory from every viewpoint than those given by gamblers in the States for their own benefit, and we do not believe that graft shows, whether controlled by the trust or not, will have any chance of success in the near future.

Much might be written about this, the greatest of all Canadian shows, and of those influences which have helped it attain its present proud position, but space does not permit. One noteworthy feature was the large number of ladies who exhibited in all the popular breeds, and many of these graced the show by their presence; in truth, beauty was conspicuous by its presence rather than by its absence, as is too often the case.

Wolfhounds had nearly three times

as many entries as last year, when there was only one exhibitor. This year there were ten exhibitors. King Richard II., a dog of good size and bred by Mr. John G. Kent, was easily the pick of his class. He was nicely shown by Miss W. Minon. His head and eyes are only fair. Vintka II., a Valley Farm bred one and a good bitch, was second in limit, and Champion Boyar, also out of coat, was second in open. The winner was in great shape and won easily in the latter class, not so easily over Vintka, that is sound as a bell and would be hard to beat had she more size and a better head. Kohina won over this bitch in the open for the sex by reason of her superior head and neck, size, and top, with the exception of shoulders, where she has gone quite thick. The second also scored heavily in front and not a little in coat. It was close, with lots of room for difference of opinion, but the winner is of the best type and the hardest sort to get. Greyhounds were eight under the entry of last year, but the old winners were out of it. Coldstream, in shape for the first time, just won from Cymbeline, a grand dog in many respects, but overshot a bit and hardly right in the flank or in face, whilst the winner is moderate in head and not any too good in shoulder. He had a close call, and Cymbeline may yet beat him. Defender, a well-bred looking one that shows age and acts badly on the near hind leg, was third, whilst in the open, the plain-faced Kitty Grey just managed to get ahead of him for third place, both of them being inferior to the first and second.

Thirteen entries in English Foxhounds, against seventeen last year. Jesabel, the best fronted one, scored and is quite a nice bitch. Americans had forty-nine entries, against twenty-two last year, and the quality was there. Col. E. Morell and Mr. W. E. Moran showed the pick of the entries.

Bulldogs are improving, and here Mrs. Cartright showed a large kennel, which accounted for many prizes. But the pick of the classes was seen in Peggy Stone, a pretty, dark brindle of great quality, albeit not very good behind. Vinemount Lord Angus, that beat all the dogs, was in superb condition and that helped him to victory. He is high on the leg. Somebody said a champion from the States went down. We are not interested in spotting cham-

pions. The bitches were far superior to the dogs and were a very nice lot, the best we have ever seen in Canada, and by far. French Bulls have not taken hold in Canada, and were poorly represented, as usual.

Bull Terriers were a grand lot, the best we ever remember having seen, and Mr. James G. Walters covered himself with glory as the breeder of nearly all the prize winners of note that were shown. The class for Canadian-bred dogs and bitches teemed with quality, and of the dogs in competition not one was poor. The Bull Terriers, with nearly eighty entries, and a uniformity of type and quality seldom seen, composed the best, though not the largest, class in the show. The Walters team was the closest kind of a reserve for the best four of a breed in the show, and would have won but for one rather poor set of teeth. The splendid quality of the classes proves what our breeders can accomplish when they are not driven to the wall by mug-hunting buyers, and the aim of all should be to stop buying abroad, that our breeders may accomplish what the Cocker breeders and Boston Terrier breeders and Bull Terrier breeders have done when the wealthy mug-hunter has not had a chance to balk their every effort to put their kennels on a self-supporting basis.

Toy Dogs were much better than are usually seen in Canada. Miss Grace Meredith's Italian Greyhound is too large and off in color, and Miss Melvin Jones' brace lack symmetry, and the dog dog was in poor condition. In Pomeranians Mrs. F. L. Hutchinson's Little Mary was a pretty and rather easy winner in her class and also of the special for best of the breed. Her coat is not all that is wanted, but in size and in style she is with the best of them, and her head is by no means a poor one. Redcroft Nipper won for Mrs. Macdonald in limit, in open and in winners for his sex, whilst Redcroft Coonie in the same ownership won the novice for Canada or United States bred ones. Mrs. Charles Best and Mrs. C. C. Shannon showed some fair Toy Spaniels, but the pick of the lot was the Prince Charles—Dainty Duchess exhibited by Mr. D. R. McClelland, and to her was awarded the special for best Toy Spaniel. Yorkshires, with the exception of Ch. Oatlands Straight Tip, were a very poor lot. The winner shows quality in coat, but there is not enough of it, and his color is not quite clear on the body coat.

SOME INTERESTING C. K. C. CORRESPONDENCE.

PELICREE BLOODHOUND ALEXANDRA BLACKWELL.

Nelson, B.C., Aug. 27, 1906.

Referring to the alleged incorrect pedigree of Bloodhound bitch Alexandra Blackwell, No. 8110, I see in the August copy of the Canadian Kennel Gazette a copy of the minutes of the meeting of the Pacific Advisory Board of the C. K. C., held at Victoria, B.C., May 18th, 1906; also a copy of a letter you received from Mr. W. J. Devitt, of Trail, B.C., in which he accuses me of trying to do him all the injury I possibly could. I do not know why you should pick this letter out of all the correspondence and publish it, as you say it may help lead to an equitable decision. I would therefore ask you to kindly publish all the correspondence in connection with this matter, so that the public may know what has been done, and I think in fairness to me, after what Mr. Devitt has said in his letter of May 26th, 1906, this should be done.

All I have asked for in connection with this matter is to have the registration of Alexandra Blackwell, C. K. C. 8110, cancelled, and have given my reasons very plainly, and I cannot understand how the Pacific Advisory Board could accept such a lame excuse as Mr. Devitt has given for using the pedigree of my bitch, Queen Alexandra, A. K. C. 59876, saying that it was carelessness in copying the wrong pedigree, where this bitch, which he now calls Queen Alexander for convenience, and which is the true mother of Alexandra Blackwell, No. 8110, has no registration certificate at all, and is only (to use Mr. Devitt's own words to me) an arant mongrel.

Unlike Mr. Devitt, I refrain in my correspondence from personalities.

WINNERS CLASS.

H. B. Donovan, Esq., Sec. Canadian Kennel Club, Toronto, Ont.:

Dear Sir,—The question has come up here in regard to the show held last year, and also this year. As I wrote you at the time of holding show here in 1905, we were all without previous experience in holding shows, and fixed our class as we thought to the best advantage, but we neglected to provide a winners class in any of the breeds, and now the question comes up: Are wins made in 1905 and 1906 going to be allowed towards championships?

I might say that there are only one or two cases in point: First, the Labrador Retriever Shot, owned by W. M. Hill, who won first in open class in 1905, first in open class, 1906, and the Challenge Cup for best dog in the show; also Holyrood Conquest, owned by Mrs. C. Rodden, winning first open, 1905, also best dog in show, any breed, 1906, first open best non-sporting dog in show.

In further reference to both of these dogs I might say that although we did not have a winners class, the winners in the other classes all came into competition against both these dogs in the specials for the best of the respective breeds, and although there was no winners class the special class virtually was the same thing, and as this would count two points for each of the above dogs, and as their owners are anxious to show these dogs again at the Coast this spring, we would like to have this question settled now. I might say I am awaiting your reply to answer a letter received from Mr. Hill lately, and that I was unable to answer, not knowing what your decision would be. Technically, I suppose these wins should not count, but think under the circumstances they should be allowed.

One reason we had for not having winners class last year and this year was that we did not consider the bulk of dogs shown should be entitled to awards in the winners class, even if they won in the open, but of course if we must have a winners class, and if it will have to be for all breeds, this

at the present time we do not think is really advisable for the good of the club, but think it would be better to leave the question open and let it be settled by awards of special prizes, instead of having a winners class for all breeds, and in this way a really good dog will get all coming to him, and ones that are really not up to the mark, although able to win, will not be forced into a winners class. Dear Sir,—Yours of Aug. 18th received. Unless winners classes were given by you, as secretary, in list of awards sent, then of course they could not count as matters of record. It is not absolutely necessary that you provide a winners class in each or any breed. This is supposed, where not printed, to be left largely at the option of the judge. No wins at any show but those made in winners classes count towards championship. This is the only ruling that I could give under our rules and constitution, but if you desire to have a special case made of it, and will write me to this effect, I will be glad to lay it before the Executive Committee. I fear, however, that no exception could be made in the case of any particular dog, as the awards are altogether in the hands of the appointed judge or judges.
