NOTES AND COMMENTS

Black and Tans: Owing to sickness, Mr. J. H. Farley, of Cleveland, Ohio, has been obliged to drown the Black and Tan Terriers Velvet and Flossie R., and also a puppy or two, a loss that will be felt in a breed that is in such few hands. The rest of the dogs in Mr. Farley's kennel are sound and in good condition. Mr. Farley is well known to many Canadians, spending as he does a great part of his time in the Dominion.

Acadian: Mr. R. N. Clark, Berwick, N.S., is greatly interested in Bostons, and is applying to the C. K. C. for the registration of the prefix Acadian and of the kennel name Acadian Boston Terrier Kennels.

. . .

A New Boston: Mr. Meadows continues his activities in Bostons, and has purchased Bad Boy, a winner at the specialty show, and a good one. He weighs exactly 17 lbs. and no more, is a dark golden brindle, with white collar; blaze and feet, and 11/2 inch tail. Bad Boy is a half brother to Ch. Dick Dazzler, who went from puppy to winners last February in Boston and is the only dog that ever defeated Ch. Fosco after he had gained the title of champion. He is also a half brother to McAlvin's Nance and many other New York and Boston winners. He is by Dazzler, out of Jessie. This was his first appearance in the ring. In the novice class, 17 to 22 lbs., with 27 dogs in the class. He won fourth; Sir Frisco was first, who was also second in the dog puppy class of 46. In the limit class of 39, Bad Boy came second; here he beat Sir Frisco, the winner of the novice class, and the judges told Mr. Meadows "three of them" had he been shown in the novice class with a ball, as he was in the limit, he would have

won with ease. Some of the dogs he defeated were: Sir Mortimer, Brockton Boy, Captain Manning, Viking, Jun., Sir Frisco, Captain Parker, Revilo Quentin, Pirate, Paul Anthony, Sir Anthony, Pontiac, Kinsman's Billy, "Dr. Bonyman's Bunty," Captain Hooker, Boylston Doctor, and the sensational Todd.

Still More: Mr. Meadows bought two bitches at the same show, that will be bred to Bad Boy; indeed, four matrons have already visited him since his transfer. Another purchase of Mr. Meadows is Daisy G., the dam of Lady Lu, the puppy that did so well at Toronto in September. This bitch also has been mated to Bad Boy. Several other bitches have already been booked to him, but the dog will be placed at public stud in January, and it is guaranteed will weigh in a described.

Enter Bulls, Exit Cockers: Mr. H. M. Dyment, Barrie, is disposing of the remainder of his Cocker Spaniels and going in for Bulldogs. His first purchase consists of a brace of puppies from the Leone Kennels, Irvington, N.J. The dog of the two is by Carthusian Cerberus, a well known sire in England. Amongst his get is such a well known name as Ch. Heywood Duchess, she in her turn being the dam of Ch. Kitty Royal. The dam of Mr. Dyment's puppy is Lil Ingoldsby, a daughter of Mr. H. St. John Cooper's great dog Ingoldsby Lawyer. The bitch of the brace is a brindle by imported Thornton Boy, ex Ingoldsby Queen. Mr. Dyment next spring intends importing a good stud dog and a bitch in whelp.

Ontario Kennel Club: Last month this live club, that is in reality a Toronto club, held its first monthly show in St. Leger's Hall, Queen street west, when Bull and Black and Tan Terriers were criticized and judged by Mr. W. Hammall and Mr. S. Gordon. The Bull Terriers were placed as follows: F. Lewis, Wychwood Dick, first; P. O. Garoghty's Togo second, F. Smith's Wychwood Battle third. In bitches, J. Miles' Epsom Countess, first; C. D. Baker's Berwick Starlight, second; G. F. McFarland's Wentworth Edith, third. In Black and Tans the following order prevailed: F. Radcliffe's Electric Light, first; R. F. Robinson's, Laddy, second. In bitches, Jno. Jenkins' Polly, first; Mr. Dickert's bitch second. The hall was open to all dog lovers, and was well filled. The club is making rapid advances and the spring show under its auspices is looked forward to with great interest.

Poison: Mrs. Gordon is in sad trouble over the death by poison of her choicest Collie puppy, the pick of the season's operations. The dog was by the famous Ch. Southport Sculptor, ex. Southport Sarah, and was destined to make his debut at New York. An unusual noise drew Mrs. Gordon's attention to the dogs one evening last month, when the Sculptor puppy was found to be suffering from a dose of poison, and despite all care he shortly died. One hundred dollars reward is being offered for the conviction of the guilty party, who richly deserves severe punishment.

"The Good Die Young": Mrs. Best of Rochester is mourning the loss of her great Toy Spaniel Sultan of Zulu, that did so well in Toronto last September, taking first in puppy class and reserve winners, when ten months old. This win he repeated at Batavia, N.Y., beating several older dogs. Mrs. Best, has imported several good Blenheims and King Charles', and hopes to show heavily next season.

Uncle Sam's High Fence: Mrs. Best was fortunate in winning a C. K. C. championship cup, which is held up at Niagara Falls pending the payment of duty. This is a matter over which the C. K. C. has no control. Trophies of this kind should not be subject to Customs duty.

What the C. K. C. is: While on this matter, we may allude to another that it seems hard to disabuse the minds of exhibitors of. The Canadian Kennel Club is a governing body, it does not give shows or hold competitions. The secretary is frequently written to as if he were responsible for the sins of omission and commission effected at different shows, and more particularly that held in Toronto in September. This show is held under the auspices of the Canadian National Exhibition, is managed by a committee appointed by that body, and the Canadian Kennel Club, under whose rules the show is held, is not responsible for any part of the work of the show, errors and omissions, delay in the forwarding of specials, etc. These are matters purely within the control of the shows' internal management. What the C. K. C. has to do, and endeavors to do, is to see that its rules are lived up to by both the management and their patrons. For instance, the C. K. C. has nothing to do with classes for local exhibitors, green classes, etc. Awards in these classes are not recognized as wins and do not become part of the club's records. As a matter of fact the novice classes of the Canadian National shows of 1905

and 1906 are not in accordance with C. K. C. rules, being limited to a certain section of the country, and so wins in these classes are, as far as the C. K. C. is concerned, as if they had never been made. They do not exclude from future wins in a legitimate novice class, and a winner in a legitimate novice class was again, as far as the C. K. C. rules go, quite at liberty to be shown in the limited novice class given at the last Toronto show. This was very fully explained at the annual meeting of 1905, held in Toronto.

C. K. C. Executive: A meeting of the Executive Committee of the Canadian Kennel Club will be held in Toronto on the second Friday in January. This early and preliminary notice is given so that the members may be able to make such arrangements as well enable them to be present.

A. K. C. Rules: The new show rules adopted by the American Kennel Club, and coming into effect January 1st, 1907, are printed in full in this issue. In view of the early amendment and rearrangement of Canadian Kennel Club rules, the A. K. C. rules should meet with a good deal of interest. As is well known, C. K. C. rules were originally formed largely on those of the A. K. C., and doubtless, as far as possible and as different conditions permit, this policy will again be adopted.

Collie Sales: The St. Clair Kennels,

of Sombra, Ont., have made many nice sales of Collies lately, including dogs, to H. Hinrichs, Chatham; J. W. Henry, Bradshaw; E. Hoffner, Cincinnati; Rev. P. C. Ryan, Michigan; E. Frank Groff, Detroit, and a good young stud dog to W. C. Cummer, Wallaceburg.

More of Them: The Vanguard Collie Kennels, Namao, Alta, is another concern that finds sales for this useful dog heavy. Mr. Wilson in writing us says.

"Sales have been good with me, as usual, this fall. Have sold puppies and had enquiries from far and near. Am answering (this mail) letters of inquiry from Saskatchewan, British Columbia, Girard, Kansas, U.S.A.; Athabasca, and several local, and only have eight puppies left at present that are old enough to ship, but have others coming on. Also expect a litter out of imported Sunshine Violetta, by Vanguard Leader, about Xmas, as she is due about Dec. 24 or 25. Am looking for something good from this mating. Mr. G. A. Hull, a friend of mine in Calgary, sent his Alberta Queen to be bred lately to my Parkdale Rightaway. This also ought to produce something for the show, as P. R.'s breeding cannot be beaten. He has sired a lot of good ones that will likely be heard from sooner or later, when we get a C. K. C. show up here, and as for Alberta Queen, she is a good one of the finest breeding, too. Never mind, we will have some champions of our own raising in the west. Just give us a little time that's all we want."

Dogs Present: Despite A. K. C. Rule II. (in effect Jan. 1st), where it states that championship points shall be rated on the actual number of dogs "entered." we stick to our plainly expressed sentiment that points should be based on the actual number of dogs "present," quite another matter.

Yorkshires for Canada: Our Dogs of November 24th says: The Canadian Yorkshire Terrier fancier to whom Mr. Day, of South Shields, has lately sent some winning specimens, was Mr. Mackay, of Hamilton, who is hoping to found a first-class kennel of this breed, and so far has not been disappointed in his importations.

A New Bull: Mr. W. R. Goodwin, Vinemount, has bought in England the Bull bitch Miss Dolly.

Pom. Sale: Mrs. A. A. Macdonald, Toronto, has sold the Toy Pom. Redcroft Coonie, a litter brother of the sweet little Champion Redcroft Darkie, to Mrs. Graham Babcock, of Colorado Springs. Coonie, who weighs 41/2 lbs., was a first prize winner at the Canadian National in September, and also won the American Pomeranian Club's special for best American bred.

Bitten ?: By the way, in the Toronto Telegram Mr. Macdonald discourses on the weights of Poms., and speaks out in a manner that leaves no room for discussion as to what he intended to say. Possibly Mr. Macdonald could afford us just as interesting information on the dying question, When is a black not a black? for instance. The paragraph in question reads:

The weights of Toy Poms., like fish stories, lead to sad misrepresentations, which is only a polite word for a much shorter one. The most popular lie in this connection is, weight 31/2 lbs. A dog which actually weighs as little as that, when he is fully grown, is a very rare article even in England, where diminutiveness in size has been studied as a fine art. Even reputable (†) breeders and exhibitors are shameless in their published statements of their Poms.' weights. In England, more than in America, there is the greatest dishonesty in this respect. Let any one who thinks of importing Poms. from England make very careful enquiries before accepting the weight as 31/2 or even 41/2 lbs. The former is likely to turn out to be 6 and the latter 8. The only way to deal with such cases is to report them to the kennel club under whose jurisdiction the vendor is, and lay a charge of fraud. For fraud it is, bare and ugly, just as much as the giving of false pedigrees. There are some who will not have their dogs weighed, preferring to guess their weights. guess is invariably on the low sidemost likely 31/2 lbs. The result of all this is that the honest fancier, who states truthfully what his dogs weigh, often loses a sale, as the purchaser cannot bring himself to believe that a Toy Pom. can weigh 5 to 6 lbs. and still be small. As a matter of fact, a 5-lb. dog is a very small specimen. The 3-lb. dog usually exists in the fertile imagination of a dishonest vendor. When he does really exist, his existence is a precarious one, for the hasty pedestrian, whose thoughts and interests are elsewhere, may blot out his earthly career, like the lady who stood on the chair to wind up the kitchen clock and

stepped down upon her 3-lb. Pom. with fatal results.

A New Bull Terrier: The Franklin Bull Terrier Kennels, Toronto, of which Mr. G. F. McFarland is proprietor, have made an investment in a stud Bull Terrier that, judging by the local enquiries for the services of such a dog, should prove a rapidly paying one. This is the all white Edgewood Rudyard Kipling, the sire of Ajax of the Point, Mr. Claire Foster's famous winner. Kipling is also the sire of many other winners, including Ring Director, Volunteer, Edgewood Bonnybred Beauty, etc. He is a winner himself, has sired and will produce winners. His breeding is classic, his sire, 'Arrie, going back to such noted names as Bendigo, Magnet, Edgewood 'Arriet, etc., while on the dam's side, Majestic, his breeding is quite as correct; in fact, Bendigo again appears here. Majestic is by Gully the Great, ex Lansdowne Thelma. We wish Mr. McFarland all sorts of good luck. Bull Terriers continue to grow in favor in Canada. There are great possibilities before this breed, and we have had a hint as to more than one "dark horse" that is to look for the judge's favor at Toronto next aut-

___ A LIFE SAVER.

By August Wolf, Spokane, Wash.

This is something about a maverick saving the life of W. E. Mason, of Grangeville, deputy game warden of Idaho, when he was lost in the mountain wilds of the Northland, east of Spokane, Wash., a short time ago.

Mason, accompanied by Wiliam Abbey went into the mountains the middle of November on a big game expedition and they camped in the forest without roads or trails. The second day of their stay Mason rode his cayuse to the snow line, where a storm was raging, and on the descent he tumbled from his mount, fracturing three ribs and sustaining severe gashes on the head.

The warden was unable to find his way to camp, when he recovered consciousness. He was cold, hungry and faint from the loss of blood, and dragged himself to the shelter of a fallen tree, where the stray dog-homeless, probably deserted by a miner in abandoning his shack-found him. The dog licked the prostrate man's face and hands, checking the flow of blood, and snuggled close to the man during the terrible night, when cougar, lynx and bears prowled around.

With the break of day the dog vanished and Mason struggled back to his camp, where the searching party found him unconscious upon the floor. The party had been out three days and was about to abandon the search, when Abbey suggested going back to the cabin.

"The dog saved Mason's life," said

Abbey, in Spokane. "He was without means of protection against the wild animals, and too weak to defend himself. He might have died in the shack, but the mongrel is entitled to the credit, and if there is such a thing as finding the animal we will do it and take it to Grangeville, where it will have a happier home than any dog in the Northwest."

Mason had been taken to his home, where the attending physicians say he will recover. They, too, declare that the dog in licking the man's wounds prevented the fever from rising. Mason has instructed Abbey to outfit the party and to taking care of the animal the rest of its life.

American Kennel Club.

New Rules Governing Dog Shows. Taking Effect January 1, 1907.

The following rules must be published in the premium list of every show:

Section 6 of By-Laws.

Rule I.—No show is recognized unless the official endorsement of the premium list, together with the rating of the show in winners' classes, signed by the secretary of the American Kennel Club, is published at the head of the classification.

Rule II.—Every show is guaranteed one point toward a championship. All shows to be rated on the actual number of dogs entered, as follows: 1,000 dogs or over, five points; 750 dogs and under 1,000, four points; 500 dogs and under 750, three points; 250 dogs and under 500, two points; under 250 dogs, one point.

The Pacific Advisory Committee shall have jurisdiction in all states west of the Easterly boundary of Montana, Wyoming, Colorado and New Mexico. All applications for membership and dates and all communications should be addressed to the secretary of said Pacific Advisory Committee.

All shows authorized by the Pacific Advisory Committee to be rated as follows: 400 dogs or over, five points; 300 dogs and under 400, four points; 200 dogs and under 300, three points; 100 dogs and under 200, two points; under 100 dogs, one point.

Specialty clubs holding shows confined to their own breed, four points.

The total number of points required for a championship is ten. (See Rule VII., Section 7).

Rule III.—The word dog, where used in these rules, includes both sexes.

Rule IV.—The breeder of a dog is the person owning or leasing the dam at the time of service.

Dogs bred and whelped in the United States, and dogs whelped in the United States by a bitch purchased by a citizen of the United States in any foreign country, and subsequently bred by him to a foreign dog, shall be considered American bred. All dogs bred otherwise shall be regarded as foreign bred dogs.

Rule V.—Every dog entered under these rules must either be registered or listed with the American Kennel Club previous to being exhibited. The fee for registration is one dollar, and for listing 25 cents. The registration of a dog gives the privilege of competition during its life. The listing of a dog gives the privilege of competition only for the current calendar year.

The penalty for non-compliance is cancellation of winnings except when a club states in its premium list, "This club assumes the collection and forwarding to the American Kennel Club of all listing fees."

Rule VI.-Every dog must be the bona fide property of the person making such entry on the day of closing the entries. If an entry is made in the name of an agent, and the name of the owner is not given, the win of the dog shall be cancelled. The entry must clearly identify the dog to be exhibited by name, and, if known, its date of birth, names of sire and dam, and the name of its breeder. Should any of these particulars be unknown to the exhibitor, it must be so stated on the entry blank. If the dog is already registered in the American Kennel Club Stud Book, the stud book number of the dog must be given with the entry. The right to exhibit a dog cannot be transferred by the owner by agreement, bargain, sale or lease.

Rule VII.—If the name of a dog which has won a prize at any show recognized by the American Kennel Club has been changed, the old name must be given on the entry blank and published in the catalogue until such time as it wins a prize under its new name. The name of a registered dog cannot be changed after December 31st following the date of registration

Rule VIII.—If a dog has been entered without being identified as directed in Rules IV., V., VI. and VII., a fine of one dollar shall be imposed by the secretary for each error, unless fraud shall be shown, in which case the win shall be cancelled.

Rule IX.—No entry can be made in a kennel name unless that name has been registered with the American Kennel Club. The partners in a kennel will be deemed equally culpable in the case of fraud perpetrated in their name. The term "exhibitor" shall mean an individual or co-partnership exhibiting as an individual firm or kennel name. Pen-

alty for infraction of this rule, cancellation of win.

Rule X.—The person presenting the identification paper shall be recognized as the agent of the owner in the latter's absence, and his receipt for prize money shall be binding on the owner, unless notice to the contrary is indorsed on the identification paper.

Rule XI.—The authorities of any show may decline any entries they see fit, or may remove any dog on account of disease, vice or other cause.

Rule XII.—Dogs may be entered for exhibition or for specials only if so stated on the entry blank; but any dog entered for competition and received at the show building must compete in all the classes for which it is entered, and failing to do so, shall be fined an amount equal to the entrance fee for each class. Dogs competing for specials only must be entered in one of the regular classes in which they need not compete.

Rule XIII.—The age of a dog shall be calculated up to and inclusive of the day preceding the show. For instance, a dog whelped April 30 shall not be eligible on May 1 of the following year to compete for dogs under twelve months of age.

Rule XIV.-Exhibitors are responsible for their own errors in making out their entry forms. The win of a dog wrongly entered or improperly shown shall be cancelled and entry fee forfeited to the club holding the show, except as provided for in Rule VIII. If the American Kennel Club cancels a win subsequent to the closing of the show, the exhibitor must return to the club holding the show, by registered mail and within 30 days after receipt of notice to that effect, all prizes won by the dog. Penalty for non-compliance with this rule shall be suspension of the exhibitor until restitution is made and receipt for same filed with the American Kennel Club.

Rule XV.—The regularly appointed veterinarian alone shall determine the physical condition of dogs during the show. When appealed to by the judge or when giving an opinion on a protest to the Dog Show Committee, he shall immediately render his decision in writing.

Blindness, deafness, lameness, castration or spaying shall render the dog ineligible to compete at any show, except when the veterinarian is satisfied

that the deafness or lameness is temporary.

The Show Committee shall be empowered, in case the regularly appointed veterinarian shall be incapacitated to serve, to appoint another veterinarian to take his place and act for him in all things.

Rule XVI.—The appointment of judges shall rest with the club giving the show. A judge must be a person in good standing with the American Kennel Club. After the list of judges has been published in the premium list it cannot be changed, unless an appointed judge is unable to fill his engagement. The committee shall then have the right to fill the vacancy.

All the classes of any one breed of dogs must be adjudicated upon by the same judge or judges, acting in conjunction. In the event of an appointed judge not officiating, it shall be optional with the exhibitor before commencement of judging the breed to withdraw his dog or dogs from competition and from the show, in which event his entry fee shall be returned.

A judge, upon the complaint of anyone actually engaged in the handling or showing of a dog during the judging of a class, may, if in his opinion the complaint is warranted, order from the ring any person guilty of intentional or deliberate interference with any dog therein competing.

Any person ordered from the ring as aforesaid, shall be prohibited from further handling or showing in any class during the continuance of said show. A judge may order from the ring any person not employed in showing a dog.

Full discretionary power is given to the judge of each class to withhold any or all prizes for want of merit. The judge's decision shall be final in all cases affecting the merits of the dogs. If the win of a dog is cancelled, the next dog in order of merit shall be moved up and the win shall be counted in every respect the same as if it had been the original award. For this purpose the judge shall place one dog "Reserve" after regular prizes are awarded if a dog of sufficient merit is available.

Rule XVII.—No exhibitor is permitted to affix any award, sign or notice on the bench, of any prizes not won at that show, unless it is specifically stated on such notice the name of the show where such prizes were awarded and the year in which that show was held. For violation of this rule the exhibitor shall forfeit any prize or prizes won at that show.

Rule XVIII.—The superintendent, the secretary of the show, veterinarian or club official acting in any of these capacities, cannot exhibit or officiate as judge at the show.

Rule XIX.—A protest against a dog may be made by any exhibitor, or any member of a club of the American Kennel Club, but must be in writing, and be lodged with the secretary of the show club within seven days of the last day of the show. No protest shall be entertained unless accompanied by a deposit of \$5 (to be returned in case the protest is sustained), except the same is lodged by the secretary of the American Kennel Club, which may be made at any time.

Rule XX.—An appeal may be taken to the Executive Board of the American Kennel Club, but such appeal must be forwarded to its secretary within seven days of the decision being rendered, together with a deposit of \$10. If the decision is sustained, the deposit shall

be forfeited to the American Kennel Club, but if the decision is reversed, then all deposits must be returned to the appellant. In the jurisdiction of the Pacific Advisory Committee, appeals to be made to that committee in the form prescribed.

Rule XXI .- A person or club guilty of misconduct of any kind in connection with dogs, dog shows or field trials, may be suspended by the president of the American Kennel Club, or in his absence by the vice-president, or by the committee of the show or trial where the offence was committed.

Rule XXII.-The disqualification or suspension of an owner shall apply to all dogs owned by him or connected with the perpetration of a fraudulent act, and no dog so disqualified is eligible for entry at any show under any ownership.

No person under suspension or sentence of disqualification can make an entry, exhibit or take a prize, act as agent for an exhibitor, or take a dog in the judging ring at any show held by a member of the American Kennel Club.

The privileges of the Stud Book are withheld from all persons under suspension or disqualification, for registration of dogs owned or bred by them.

The Executive Board is, however, empowered to use such discretion in the enforcement of this penalty as shall protect innocent parties.

Rule XXIII .- No person shall be disqualified without due notice and formal charges and specifications, and an opportunity given of being heard in his own defence.

Rule XXIV.-No claim against a club for unpaid prizes shall be valid unless filed with the secretary of the American Kennel Club within six months of the last day of the show held by such

Section 7 of By-Laws. (Classes.)

The following rules under Section 7 of the By-Laws as amended, were adopted as follows:

Rule I .- The classification shall be confined to established breeds, which may be divided or limited by variety, weight, color, height or sex and otherwise, as provided for in the dog show

New classes may be added if publicly announced before date of closing, except Winners' Classes, which must remain as endorsed in premium list.

Rule II .- The Puppy Class shall be for all dogs over six months and not exceeding twelve months of age, and no entry can be made of one under six months, or whose date of birth, breeder, sire or dam is unknown.

Puppies may be permanently removed from a show after their classes have been judged, whatever those classes may be, but may be so removed only after the close of a show in any evening.

Puppy Classes must be judged not later than the second day of the show.

Rule III.-The Novice Class shall be for American bred dogs only, never having won a first prize at any recognized show, wins in the Puppy Classes excepted. The entry blank must state name of breeder and the words, "Bred in United States."

Rule IV .- The Limit Class shall be for all dogs never having won four first prizes in said class at any recognized show, but no dog having been recorded champion shall be eligible to this class.

Rule V .- The Graduate Class shall be for all dogs having won four first prizes in Limit Class at recognized shows, but no dogs having been recorded Champion shall be eligible to this class.

Rule VI.—The Open Class shall be for all dogs of any age over six months.

Rule VII .- The Winners' Class shall be open only to winners of first prizes in any regular class at the show, giving at least three of the before-mentioned classes, one of which must be the Open Class. The Winners' Class can be divided by sex, provided the required three classes are also divided by sex.

Winners' Classes cannot be allowed where two or more breeds are combined.

The judge shall withhold the award of "first" in this class should he be of the opinion that there is no dog of sufficient merit to justify such award. Before awarding "Reserve" in this class the dog or dogs having been placed second to the winner in any of the classes must be brought before the judge for competition with the remaining dogs in said Winners' Class. No class winner can be withdrawn or withheld from competition in the Winners' Class. No entry fee shall be charged for said competition in Winners' Class.

The winners of ten points in this class, under three different judges (at least three points of which shall have been won at one show), excepting, however, at five point shows, when two wins under different judges will be sufficient, will thereby become a Champion of Record, be so registered by the American Kennel Club and if registered in the Stud Book will be entitled to an American Kennel Club Championship Medal. Duplicate medals for Champions cannot be issued.

Rule VIII.—The Miscellaneous Class shall be open to all dogs of established breeds which have not been otherwise provided for in the premium list, either with a class for the breed itself, or in combination with other breeds.

Entries in this class must specify the breed of the exhibit. Failure to comply with this condition shall cancel the award.

Rule IX.—The term Field Trial Record, as used at all dog shows, applies only to public trials where competition is open to all.

Rule X.—In estimating the number of prizes a dog has won, no award received by it on or after the day of closing of the entries will be counted.

Rule XI.—In any class where there is a limit of weight the person in charge of a dog entered in such class may claim of the Show Committee the right at any time after the opening of the show and before the judging, to have the dog weighed, and the weight of the dog shall be registered and hold good at the time of judging.

Any competing exhibitor or handler shall have the right to demand the weighing or measuring of any dog during the judging of the class, other than those whose weight has been officially registered. Any subsequent protest must be made in the formal manner provided for in these rules. The club must provide scales for use of the exhibitors or judges and designate official weighers.

Rule XII.—Dog Show Committees may provide such classes for dogs of recognized breeds as they may choose, provided they do not conflict with the conditions of the above-mentioned classes.

Rule XIII.—Established breeds shall be such breeds as are eligible to registration in the Stud Book, and such breeds as may hereafter be made eligible for such registration.

A list of breeds recognized by the American Kennel Club must be published in every premium list, excepting those of specialty clubs confined to their own breed.

American Kennel Club.

Rules Governing Clubs. The Following Rules are for Guidance of Clubs. Not to be Published in Premium List.

Section 8 of By-Laws.

The following rules under Section 8 of the By-Laws were adopted, as amended, as follows:

Rule I.—The following rules governing clubs holding shows are published for the guidance of Bench Show Committees only, publication in premium lists and catalogues not permitted.

Rule II.—Any person or persons acting in any official capacity, paid or unpaid, including that of judge, secretary, superintendent, steward, clerk of a show or as an officer or member of a Bench Show Committee of any club holding a show in the United States of America, under any rules antagonistic to the American Kennel Club, shall be disqualified and debarred from all privileges of the American Kennel Club.

Rule III.—Any active member of the American Kennel Club may hold a show under American Kennel Club rules, provided it abides by all rules of the American Kennel Club.

Rule IV.—The use of a club's name for show purposes cannot be transferred to any other body or person.

Rule V.—Applications for dates must be filed with the secretary of the American Kennel Club for approval by the Executive Board or such sub-committees as may be empowered to grant dates, subject to final endorsement of the premium list by the secretary, of which a copy in duplicate must be submitted for approval before publication.

In the jurisdiction of the Pacific Advisory Committee applications for dates must be filed with the secretary thereof and copies of the proposed premium list must be submitted to him in triplicate for approval and endorsement.

Rule VI.—No premium list is valid without this endorsement, which must be printed in such list at the head of "Rules Governing Dog Shows." One copy of the premium list must be forwarded to the American Kennel Club immediately after publication and before distribution. Penalty for non-compliance, \$1 per day.

Two copies of the premium list must be forwarded to the secretary of the Pacific Advisory Committee immediately after publication by clubs within its jurisdiction.

Rule VII.—The duration of a show shall not exceed four days. Applications for dates must be accompanied by a fee of \$25, which will be forfeited in the event of the show not being held.

Rule VIII.—Entries shall close not less than seven days prior to the first day of the show. No alteration of the advertised date of closing shall be allowed. Penalty for accepting entries after advertised date, \$5 for each entry.

Rule IX.—The date of closing of entries of any show is an official part of that show, and a person eligible to make entries must be in good standing at the time of the closing of its entries. No entries can be accepted in the name of an agent only. Penalty for each entry, \$2.

Rule X.—No entries can be accepted from any person who is not in good standing, a list of such persons must be obtained from the secretary of the American Kennel Club before the closing of the entries. No person under sentence of suspension, disqualification or expulsion can be employed in any official capacity, or exhibit, or give or take a prize, or act as agent for any exhibitor, or show a dog in any judging ring. Penalty for violation, \$5 for each offence.

Rule XI.—The premium list must contain the dog show rules of the American Kennel Club; also a list of the officials under whose management the dog show is to be held, who, with the exception of the paid employees, shall be held responsible for the payment of all prizes within sixty days of the last day of the show, in default of which the said officials shall be suspended or disqualified for such time as the American Kennel Club shall determine.

Rule XII.—All claims against a club for unpaid prizes shall be outlawed unless made within six months from the closing of such show.

Rule XIII.—No special prize can be accepted or offered by a club after the opening of a show.

The show officials will be held responsible for the payment of all special prizes advertised in the premium list or catalogue.

All prizes must be in accordance with description in the premium list. Prizes of gold or silver must be of the purity of United States coin. If money prizes are offered, a fixed amount for each prize must be stated.

Rule XIV.—In default of the payment of prize moneys within sixty days of the last day of a show, the officials of such show, except paid employees, shall be suspended for such times as the American Kennel Club shall determine, or be disqualified.

Rule XV.—Every show must provide a printed catalogue, in which is given all particulars required of exhibitors in entering dogs as provided in Section 6, Rules VI., VII. and VIII. of the "Rules Governing Dog Show." It must also contain a list of the officers under whose management the show is held.

Rule XVI.—A catalogue, marked with the winnings, and duly certified to by the secretary or superintendent, must be filed with the American Kennel Club within seven days after the closing of the show. Penalty, \$1 per day.

Clubs in the jurisdiction of the Pacific Advisory Committee must forward to the secretary thereof two marked and certified copies of the catalogues.

Rule XVII.—The following rule must be observed in the arrangement of said catalogue. The name of the owner and then the name of the dog and registration number immediately follows the catalogue number, followed by further particulars as called for in Rule VI., Section 6. The catalogue must be in book form, and not exceed in surface size 6 x 9 inches, nor less than 5 x 8 inches.

Rule XVIII.—A club may assume the responsibility of collecting and forwarding to the American Kennel Club any listing fees, which fact must be stated in the premium list. Such fees collected must be forwarded to the American Kennel Club within seven days from closing of show, accompanied by a complete list of same. Penalty for non-compliance, \$1 per day.

Rule XIX.—Upon notification from the secretary of the American Kennel Club that there are still unlisted dogs, the show club must pay for same within fourteen (14) days after such notice,

in default of which said club shall be suspended.

The amount deposited with the appli-cation for dates cannot be applied as payment of said fees.

Rule XX.—Every show must have a qualified veterinarian, who shall be in attendance the evening preceding, and during the progress of the show, and no dog shall be benched without having been examined and passed by him. The veterinarian is required to personally inspect the dogs on the benches and the quarters where the dogs are exercised or crated, before 6 p.m. on the opening day of the show, and at least once during the morning of each day, and a written report submitted to the Bench Show Committee. Dogs suffering from contagious diseases must be ordered from the building. Failing to com-ply with this rule, if protest is made and sustained, the club will be fined \$5 for each offence.

Rule XXI.—In the event of a protest being filed in accordance with Rule XIX., Section 6, of the Dog Show Rules, the Show Committee shall at once meet and decide upon it, giving both sides the opportunity to be heard together and its decision rendered in writing.

Rule XXII.-If a protest is lodged subsequent to the show it must be cided by the committee within 20 days from its receipt. Five days' notice of the date and place of the meeting for that purpose must be given to all par-ties interested, and decision rendered as above.

Rule XXIII .- The Bench Show Committee may suspend any person for mis-conduct at its show, notice of which must be forwarded within twenty-four hours to the secretary of the American Kennel Club, who will refer it to the Executive Board at its first meeting, for action.

Rule XXIV.—The secretary of the American Kennel Club must enforce penalties for violation of rules, and reserve same from deposit made with ap-

plication for dates.

Rule XXV.—No entry shall be accepted of any puppy under six months

Rule XXVI.—A dog wrongly entered cannot be transferred by the show officials. Penalty, \$5.

Rule XXVII.-For any violation of the rules not otherwise specified, or for conduct prejudicial to the best interests of the American Kennel Club, such action may be taken and penalty imposed as may be deemed proper.

Rule XXVIII.—Such regulations additional rules may be adopted for the government of any show as shall be considered necessary, provided they do not conflict with any of these official rules.

Rule XXIX.—The classification at all shows must be arranged and published in the premium lists and catalogues in the following order:
