NOTES AND COMMENTS

A. K. C. Affairs: Canadians take little interest nowadays in the affairs of the American Kennel Club. The A. K. C. is practically a dead letter here and for this reason for the past few months we have not used the mass of correspondence sent us, a great part of which is in circular style and of which knowledge may be obtained through the weekly kennel papers of the U.S. Mr. Vredenburg has been bitterly assailed in more than one direction, and we may add from some unexpected quarters. In fairness to the secretary of the A. K. C. we must state that in his official correspondence Mr. Vredenburg has always been most courteous to the secretary of the Canadian Kennel Club, and there exists a personal friendship between the two secretaries that is none the weaker because he of Canada has frequently not been able to see through the glasses of Mr. Vredenburg.

The A. K. C. secretary has been classed recently as a czar, an autocrat and such like. He is exactly what the American Kennel Club has made him. His critics should recollect that—a part cannot be greater (stronger) than the whole. The Club is the responsible party and not the individual. If Mr. Vredenburg is autocratic, it is the result of a system that has been for years un-American. It cannot be denied that for many years he has worked hard and assiduously for the A. K. C. He has seen the Club grow in power and wealth, largely due to his efforts. But it is the power of the few, and he undoubtedly is the essence of the few.

A most critical time has been reached in the affairs of the A. K. C., brought about largely—not altogether—by the recent incorporation of the Club,

an act that, we have it on the authority of one of the leading legal lights in the U. S., is entirely illegal and that cannot be supported on any good ground. The "other side" threaten the law, disruption and all sorts of penalties, but we hope that wiser counsel may prevail and that the lion and the lamb may be induced to lie down together. Which is the lion and which the lamb we must let our readers decide for themselves.

London to the Front: A new kennel organization is the London Canine Association recently auspiciously launched in the "Forest City." The following are the officers: President, Col. Robert McEwen; Vice-Presidents, that good all-round sportsman Dr. J. S. Niven, and Dr. F. F. Drake, who favors the Fox Terrier; Secretary-Treasurer, Mr. Fred. L. Wood; Executive Committee, Messrs. Graydon, Smith, Fillman, McCarroll, Saunders, Thomas, Oke, and Dr. Smith.

It was finally decided to hold a show under C. K. C. rules, in connection with the Western Fair the week following Toronto. A building is being provided, and cash prizes will be offered.

Winnipeg Show: The dates of the Winnipeg dog show are July 16th, 17th and 18th in connection with the big annual exhibition held in that thriving city. The classification, as outlined in last issue, has been largely increased and a most attractive list of special prizes will be an added claim for entries. This list will include several unique medals not offered before in Canada. We know this, because they have passed through our hands en route to the West. Entries close on

July 4th and the judges' names will be announced in the next issue.

Alberta Show: The third annual show of the Alberta Kennel Club will be held in Calgary on July 10th, 11th and 12th under C. K. C. rules, when Mr. Chas. Lyndon will judge all classes. Good cash prizes, as well as an excellent list of specials will be offered and a much better turn-out than has yet been secured in Calgary is confidently looked for. Mr. Charles Rodden, the secretary of the Club, will be glad to send premium lists to all who apply for them and to afford any other information in his power.

Change of Location: Mr. A. D. Wilson, the well-known western Collie breeder, late of Namao, Alt., is now located at Edmonton, where we shall expect the Vanguards to hold up their end.

An Airedale Club: Admirers of that sturdy tyke the Airedale Terrier should read Mr. Wrightson Thorp's letter in this issue and then decide to help in the formation of a club in Canada to further the interests of the breed. A strong, hardy, useful, all-round dog, as is the Airedale, should find many advocates here.

A Boston Prognostication: It wouldn't surprise us to know that Bostons would be divided by weight into at least two classes at the big autumn show in Toronto. The growing popularity of the dog warrants it.

A Club in Edmonton: We learn with a good deal of satisfaction that there is every prospect of a live kennel organization being formed in Edmonton, Alt., in fact about thirty names are already

available as a nucleus. A not far distant show under C. K. C. rules is more than a possibility.

Bostons at Buffalo: Mr. Geobel, of Mitchell, was the successful Canadian candidate at Buffalo, his stud dog Othello being placed third in open class and his Goebel's Tess winning first in limit and second in open, on which we congratulate him.

Queenston Collies: Mr. W. W. Armstrong is starting a Collie kennel at Queenston, Ont., where his Busy Izzie C, 8771, on April 14th whelped the remarkable litter of thirteen to The Mayor, a winner of second at Buffalo, and a well bred one too.

Lennox Farm Bull Dogs: A nice brindle bitch, the property of Mr. J. H. Crocker, Toronto, has just paid a visit to Lennox Bendigo, the beginning of the dog's stud career. He should prove of value.

Mrs. Cartwright's kennel would have been represented in Montreal but for the fact that at least express charges should be in view. It is an expensive item sending or taking dogs such a distance with a ribbon in view and without being a "dollar-hunter," this is the view Mrs. Cartwright takes of it.

The good die young: In dogs as in humans this appears to be true. Mr. F. W. Britton's good young Irish Ter-

rier, the novice winner at the late Ontario Kennel Club Show, was chained a bit too long one night, the consequence, he hung himself. As the dog was sold at a good figure, it makes it all the harder on this good fancier. But he will try again.

Ottawa Show Days: The Ottawa show will extend over four days, Sept. 17th, 18th, 19th and 20th. Bear these dates in mind.

Bull Terrier Advents: The Franklin Kennels', Toronto, Bull Terrier bitch, Wentworth Edith, has whelped a nice litter of an even half dozen to the stud dog of the kennels, Edgewood Rudyard Kipling. The puppies are a fine, healthy lot, came at a good time, and Mr. McFarland is open for congratulations on the fact that they are all pure white.

A Bull family of nine: Mr. G. J. Stephens', Collingwood, good Bull bitch, Agawa Wrinkles, has again presented her owner with nine strong, healthy puppies, by that grandly bred little white dog Tremail Temagami, this being the second litter of nine by this mating. Mr. Stephens thinks, as Messrs. Trimble do, that no mistake was made in the purchase of this dog. Five of the puppies, which are solid brindles and brindle pied, are offered for sale this month at extremely reasonable prices.

Transfers Crowgill: Mr. George W.

Southcott has legally transferred to Mr. Frank Britton his right and interest in the prefix Crowgill and the kennel named Crowgill Kennels. Mr. Britton will in future use them in connection with his kennel of Irish Terriers.

COAT IN COLLIES.

It is evident that coat in Collies must "cover a multitude of sins" judging by the recent decision at Buffalo between the two Canadian dogs Edgbaston Dandy and Southpost Star, placed as named.

While a good Collie carrying a grand coat, Dandy is a poor mover, and has neither the type nor quality of his younger and more vigorous rival.

This is a direct reversal of Mr. McEwen's placing at the O. K. C. show and this gentleman knows a Collie, what he should be and how he should move.

THE BUFFALO DOG SHOW.

Again success crowned the efforts of those substantial men who make up the Buffalo Kennel Club. There can be no gainsaying that dog shows, to be elevated to the position they deserve, must have the best people at the helm. This was the case at Buffalo, as we find represented as sponsors for the show, men who stand at the very head of affairs in business. Of course, this does not exclude the many good fanciers whose pockets and position in life are of smaller proportions. They, in truth, are the backbone of the fancy. The judges, too—of which there were eleven—were of a sort to inspire confidence in a majority of cases. Here there was a noticeably pleasing lot of amateur gentlemen fanciers officiating, and consequently more interest. There are hundreds of good dogs in the country, and more being bred each year; still we find popular breeds represented at many shows by a mere handful of entries. There must be a cause, and we trust a remedy, for this paucity and seeming lack of interest on the part of exhibitors. From time to time innovations are exploited in the form of new classes and other allurments. "Variety classes"—in which all breeds compete together: classes where champions are barred, and so on. Except from a spectacular standpoint, these classes merely add more shekles to the bulging pockets of the professional handler, the prize usually falling to the lot of some well-known rounder, who is sent "on the circuit" by his rich owner, and plays his well schooled parts week after week. "Let the best win" is the verdict of all true lovers of sport, but surely the lesser lights are not to be crushed out? There are numerous ways by which a breeder of a good puppy can have a chance to win a prize without being subjected to an impossible handicap. It seems only just and fair, that in the protected classes—puppy, novice, and so on—should have the largest prize money and most prizes. Surely no good can be done by giving the lion's share to a dog that has become a champion, or well-known celebrity?

Canadians were well treated at Buffalo, special classes and prizes being given for dogs "bred in Canada." This courtesy, apart from mere gain, deserves a vote of thanks from the Canadian fancy. As before stated, the pro-

motors of this show are men of such independent means, that a good "gate" was subservient. We are, however, pleased to report that the attendance was excellent, and of the best class of people. Mr. Oldham and Captain Johnson superintended matters in a style free from autocratic demeanor, being most attentive to their duties and to the comforts of exhibitors and their friends. The dogs themselves were a representative collection numbering over six hundred, with the usual generous supply of absentees—more's the pity.

To briefly touch on some of the exhibits, it may be said that the larger breeds were few in numbers owing to exorbitant express rates. However, there were sufficient present to give one an idea what good specimens should be. In Bloodhounds, Dr. Knox, who is doing so much for this noble breed, was as usual successful. Champion Magician is indeed remarkable in head and expression. Great Danes, owing to Dr. Irving R. Johnson's splendid exhibit, were well represented. This exhibitor is apparently breeding along scientific lines and providing a type that have both size and quality. Russian Wolfhounds were few in number, the Valley Farm Kennels having just about formed a trust in this breed. Pointers were big classes with keen competition. Mrs. Waters, whose indomitable pluck deserves unstinted praise, was well up with the cracks, carrying home a blue ribbon with her well-known Lord Bang, as well as several other prizes, Nellie Jingo, Jingo's Della both being in the money. Mrs. J. P. Russell was second in a strong class with Lady Russell, a bitch of beautiful quality. Mr. Kendall, of Simcoe, was a first prize winner with Lady Simcoe. Cocker Spaniels were judged by Dr. S. J. Bradbury, who is indorsed by the Spaniel Club. The doctor has been identified with Spaniels for many years, and always a close student of the breed. Though he did not please all—what Spaniel judge ever did—he judged in a most painstaking and conscientious manner in a wretchedly lighted ring.

The show of Cockers was an object lesson to those fortunate enough to be present, as it brought out Mr. Bloodgood's cracks, all of which show careful breeding and Cocker type. Mr. James S. Clark was also present with

a good entry, and as usual was very successful. Mr. Wm. McDonald, of Hamilton, and Mr. Geo. Dunn, of Woodstock, were represented. Mr. George Douglas' usual good entry was much missed. Mr. Clark won both puppy classes with Voltaire and Mystic, respectively. The former is a light red and white dog by Ch. Mepal's Shotover, by the beautiful headed Mayflower. He is a sound Cocker, a trifle too high on the leg, but a good mover. His head and eye are above the average. A dog likely to make a sire. Red dogs were, on the whole, very poor in quality. In patri-color dogs, Mr. Bloodgood came to the fore with Mepal's Shotover, a red and white. This is a sporting Cocker of high quality and the sire of the wonderful Mepal's Iris. It's a pity a dog of this sort is not available to Canadian breeders. Black dogs had at least two good ones. Mepal's Norman, first, is all a Cocker in body and bone and type. Though rather strong in skull and wrong in front, he is far and away above the average, and looks a sire. Kildare, second, was well shown by Mr. Clark. He has improved since New York and to-day is just about the best black dog in the country. Beautiful head and eyes and grand coat. At present not as matured in body as he will be later, but a rare little dog, and a good mover. In red bitches there was no denying Mr. Clark's Mayflower, who though a bit long cast, has a beautiful head. Mr. Bloodgood's champions Mepal's Hilma and Mepal's Iris are indeed a beautiful brace. On the day the former won, but we prefer the latter. Hilma is a black and

white, of the low, cobby order. Typical head and eye, good bone and feather, and full of Cocker character. Her fault is a poor front and shoulders. Iris is white with lemon markings, and decidedly the sort of Spaniel that would appeal to English judges, and lovers of a sporting type. She is just a trifle weak in muzzle, but so superlatively good in body, coat and bone, and such a mover, that her charm can't be denied. We believe she has produced a wonderful litter to Mepal's Norman—blood that is bound to tell. It is this adherence to blood-lines and type that is the secret of Mr. Bloodgood's success in breeding Cockers. Light boned specimens, devoid of coat and feather—so typical of the breed—are not found in his kennels. Certainly Cockers are not what they once were. Though we find many entries, after a few are deducted the remainder are of very poor stuff.

Collies—The Princess De Montglyn—a democratic and charming sportswoman, judged these classes in a most painstaking and thorough manner. The Princess is not one of the autocratic high and mighty sort, but loves dogs for themselves, and has a warm hand-

shake for those of like taste. She never tires of "talking Collie" with an enthusiast of the breed. In 1900-1901 her Collies were winning laurels at the foremost British shows. Her famous quartette depicted in the well-known picture "Four by Honours," consisted of Champion Barwell Masterpiece, Champion Old Hall Shamrock, Old Hall Beatrice, and Lily Rightaway. Ch. Old Hall Shamrock, still a good Collie, was present at the show, and he and his royal mistress are inseparable companions, having visited all the capitals of Europe together. The Collies at Buffalo were, on the whole, disappointing. The Greystone Kennels' cracks were unfortunately absent. The puppies, in the dog section, were not up to much. The battle lay between Mr. Wheeler's Edgbaston Dandy, the English winner Alloway Ambition, and Mrs. Gordon's Southport Star. E. Dandy, in rare coat and condition, and this time moving better, won. A. Ambition, a very big dog, with a head of extraordinary length, was second. On examination he was found to have a very much overshort mouth. While a reasonable amount is quite allowable, a "pig-jaw" is a serious fault. S. Star

though undersized, has few faults. He was quite out of coat and condition, which must have accounted for his position, otherwise he looked an easy and comfortable winner. The bitch puppies were a good class. Hillham's Hope, a big seven months' puppy, had a field day, winning special for best Collie in show. Her body, coat and bone are of the best, and she has a sweet head, ears and expression. Following her came Eleanor of Chumleigh and Otterburn Mermaid, both promising. In the limit and open class Mrs. Gordon's smart bitch King Edward Prunella was second to Hillham's

Hope. Like her kennel mate, she was quite out of condition.

Fox Terriers were skilfully judged by Mr. Winthrop Rutherford. It is a very great pleasure to see a man of this sort in the judging ring. Small classes were the order of the day. The Sabine Kennels, with a wonderful lot, must weary of constantly winning with little or no competition. However, they well deserve their successes as they mostly won with home-bred specimens. Dug puppies went to Sabine Renown, a beautifully moulded Terrier with few faults. Mr. Sands made a good second with his smart youngster Broadway Double, who was handicapped by too much loose hair around his neck. He is the right size, and full of quality. In the remaining classes the Sabines reigned supreme with Receiver, Recluse, Fad and Faddist—all beautiful specimens with few faults. The best smooth dog was Ch. Sabine Resist, who later won the special for best of all breeds. This is a most exquisite Terrier. It is questionable if even Veracity in his palmy days could beat him. In head, ears, eyes, expression, he is all one could wish. His neck, shoulders, bone and front are superlatively good. He has wonderful ribs and a short, compact body, and a coat of the right texture. All in all, we never remember seeing a Terrier that filled the eye more. That he is a great sire we know, for it is enough to say that Champion Warren Remedy is by him, and she did him honor by being declared the best of all breeds at New York. Sabine Resist was bred

by Mr. Desmond O'Connell and is by Dark Blue, ex. Overture. He is now owned by Mr. A. F. Nelson. Wire-haired Fox Terriers were also few in number. In dog puppies, Major G. M. Carnochan, whom many thought had left the fancy for all time, made a re-entry and showed that the Cairnsmuir prefix still lived. In Cairnsmuir Outlaw—a suggestive name—Major Carnochan has a very smart youngster. He is heavily marked with a good head, ears, expression, absolute front, and a natural wire coat. As he is only seven months old and quite big enough, we fear he won't retain his present good qualities. Though beaten in some classes, he was able to take the measure of Ch. Endcliffe Penant. Endcliffe Penant, a tan marked dog with a rare front, scored in limit and open with Rowsley Jester, the much-boomed white dog, second. Welsh Terriers were light classes, Champion Sunny King being the best.

Black and Tan Terriers—The best was Ch. Duchess of Cornwall, bred by Mr. McLean, of Hull, P.Q.

Airedale Terriers—Canada was represented by Mr. James W. Bain, who was well to the fore.

Beagles—Messrs. Smith, of Guelph, did well with a team of little hounds that did them credit.

Pomeranians. Mrs. A. A. Macdonald's entries were sadly missed, but Mrs. O'Rourke, of Hamilton, did well, also winning the cup for the best from Canada. C. Y. Ford.

THE VANCOUVER SHOW.

The Pacific Coast is coming fast, especially in the matter of shows. The Vancouver show opened May 1st in as fine a hall as to space, light and air as we have been in for many a day, consequently there was comfort everywhere for dogs and men, and as dogs were exercised outside, the show odors were entirely absent. The show ran smoothly and was excellently managed from start to finish and well benched. Had many Eastern friends been present in this Riviera of Canada, at this time of the year, the climate itself would have been sufficiently seductive without any added frills to make them feel they were having a good time. B. C. is beautiful in May, in fact lovely at any time, and has a climate.

The catalogue was arranged, as has often been proposed in the East with the small dogs first, so judging started with little dogs, going on by degrees till we reached the St. Bernards at the end.

There was but one toy, a Yorkshire, and a pretty good one, though not in long coat. The Pom, a fair one, concluded the small dogs, and then we drifted to Scotties, a typical lot. Dandies were a surprise, a very nice lot of six, three in each class, the winning bitch, a capital one, beating several good ones recently imported. Dachshunds, small in number, but very representative, one good looking dog arrived too late for competition.

Boston Terriers were good, several puppies looking far more promising than one would expect here and the breeder is lucky to do so well at the start with this breed.

Fox Terriers are making quite a stir, especially owing to the organization of a local club, but size on the whole needs brushing up or rather down. A good puppy won in smooth puppies, and is by first in winners dogs, viz., Dart-

mouth, who went through from novice to winners, a neat, high quality dog by Cadger of Oaks. The second in novice is a local favorite by St. Leger, but thick in shoulder, short neck, lumpy skull and fine in muzzle, good coat, legs and feet. Third, Devon Mack, grand legs and feet, good body and coat but too big, light in eye and heavy in ear. One of the best, Essex Snowball, was put back for bad teeth. Nothing to remark on in limit. Open dogs, Dartmouth, novice winner, still on top in head and ear, cleanness of front and general quality, was followed by Cevessa Speedy, a very catchy dog, very neat in body and well shown, but cut away before the eye and has poor feet. The puppy bitch winner though showy is blocky and light in eye. The novice bitch, Rats, was the best, the only show bitch in the crowd, her chief fault being in front. Devon Fox, second all through, is good in body with a grand coat but short in head. Wire hairs were of all sorts. The dog winner, Jori, though not very strong in head, is neat, the right size, and has one of the best natural jackets seen for some time and had not been touched up by the barber or had his hair pulled, a most useful little dog by Briar Cackler, that is

also sire of the winning bitch. Second, Cannington Bristles, very young but may soon be a star, by a Go Bang sire, Cairnsmuir Gossoon out of a Barkby Ben mother and Aldon Donna. He strongly resembles Ben. The other dogs were either too big or too amateurishly trimmed. The winning bitch, Victoria Weasselle, is by the winning dog and neat, sound and a nice wire bitch. Second, Essex Nancy, a very showy and most promising bitch puppy of just six months will beat a lot of them if he goes on right. Capital head and ears, good front and style and a shower.

Irish Terriers fairly numerous, with dogs weak, but two neat bitches first and second. These latter might make their mark if a little bigger.

Bull Terriers were noticeable for a big, good looking son of Edgecote Peer. This dog, though rather light in eye, is very typical and sound. The only other one that came near him was Whitecoat Wonder, by Woodcote Wonder.

Airedales, the best we ever saw out here and if they go on as these are will be very strong, for it would take some of the flyers to make these run.

bitch, deserved all she got. Nice type and sound. An old dog of a good sort was shown, but he was lame.

Cockers run strongly on the Pacific and a class of black dogs was good, though coats needed attention. The winning bitch, Carrie Dean II., and Jesmond Ruby are much above the average. A very neat dog in Red Duke landed his class. Springers—a most popular variety here for field and bench—created quite a stir with eleven coming out and a goodly lot well shown. "Shades of New York, etc., what has a working Spaniel to do in a show?" But he is here, and to stay.

Irish Water Spaniels—ten—the biggest and best lot we ever saw on the continent.

English Retrievers, one, a useful bitch. Labradors, three, two neat dogs, the second carrying his tail badly and too strong in head. A smart bitch in Sceptre beat the others for the special. Chesapeakes—one—just fair.

Pointers—On the whole a moderate lot. A useful dog, light in eye and rather poorly shown, was first in three classes, with a strong black and white second in limit. In open the same. In field trial class, Glee Boy, a strong muscular and typical pointer won and took winners. There was nothing remarkably new in bitches, Queenie, an old favorite, taking winners, and we believe her championship.

English Setters were a strong turnout, though absolute stars, not too numerous, and on the whole they were not up to "coast" form. Flett's Count, winner in novice, is a very showy orange belton with grand head, well shown, not too good behind. Second, Marquis Ito, a racy, good looking field puppy, not quite ready. Flash

won in limit, a very smart young dog by Rockline Young Roy—Roy's Lady, and later took winners. In open dogs, Rockline Young Roy, not too well put down, had to give way to Flett's Count. Bitches were nice, quite a good one in Pearl Montez, winning in novice from a typical bitch that lost in shoulders, by Mollie C. Pearl Montez is by Stylish Sergeant—Bess Montez, and Mollie by Albert's Rumney Ranger—Albert's Nora. The star of the show came out in open Rockline Flirt, a lemon ticked bitch by Malwyd Bob—Albert's Rosalind, and the best in America is none too good to meet her and might go down. This was Flirt's first appearance.

Irish Setters—Prince took dog winners, a fine big dog, long head, well filled out from start to finish. He stands over a lot of ground and only fails in being not quite straight in front. Ch. Jeannot, a good dog always, is not as fresh as the winner. Jeannot II., son of this dog's novice winner, is a smart puppy with rather a gay tail. A very pretty bitch by Ch. Jeannot—Darie's Maggie, an old friend, was the best bitch, but could have been put down better. When right she is a very good bitch.

Gordons were chiefly conspicuous for the presence of one good dog in Messenger Boy, who took winners, followed by Alberta Gyp not far behind in a nice puppy.

Collies, big classes and most promising, the greatest fault being uncertain ears. In this point Glen Tana Monk excelled. Some of the home-bred ones were more than creditable both in dogs and bitches; big, well coated, and well grown.

Greyhounds—Fair.

St. Bernards—Open dogs was a close thing between two good brothers, soundness of limb carrying Victoria Chief to the front over Star of the North, but there was a fine, sound puppy that came third that should be heard of again. A nice but immature bitch puppy was the best bitch.

Quality ran high when it came to general specials and the best were picked out in most breeds so the outlook is most promising for dogs in the future at Vancouver.

A banquet was held the third night at which fifty sat down and enjoyed themselves thoroughly. Mr. Colin F. Jackson, the president of the club, was a most efficient chairman and was supported on his right by Sir Chas. Tupper and the American Consul, Col. Dudley, who is largely responsible for the organization of the club and who owns a capital parti-color Cocker in Hisa. I am writing this on the C. P.R. boat going down Arrowhead Lake in B.C. and most eastern Canadians have no conception of what they have in their West in climate, beauty of scenery, nice people and good dogs. Go to Vancouver for a good time and if you wish to know what "welcome" means. The boundary fence between the U.S. and Canada is also not as high as in some parts of the east where kennel matters emanate from a New York source. One of the most delightful features of this show is that tea was served every afternoon by the ladies, the proceeds going to the show. Altogether a show in this country is not only a doggy event but a friendly and sociable convention by those who are fond of outdoor life where sporting dogs are sporting dogs.

WITH THE WEIGHT DIVISIONS. STANDARD OF THE BOSTON—

The general appearance of the Boston Terrier is that of a smooth, short-coated, compactly built dog of medium station. The head should indicate a high degree of intelligence, and should be in proportion to the dog's size; the body rather short and well-knit, the limbs strong and finely turned, no feature being so prominent that the dog appears badly proportioned.

The dog conveys an impression of determination, strength and activity. Style of a high order, and carriage easy and graceful.

Skull—Broad and flat, without prominent cheeks, and forehead free from wrinkles.

Stop—Well defined but indenture not too deep.

Eyes—Wide apart, large and round, neither sunken nor too prominent, and in color dark and soft. The outside corner should be on a line with the cheeks as viewed from the front.

Ears small and thin, situated as near corners of skull as possible.

Muzzle—short, square, wide and deep, without wrinkles. Nose black and wide, with a well-defined straight line between nostrils. The jaw broad and square, with short, regular teeth. The chops wide and deep, not pendulous, completely covering the teeth when mouth is closed.

Neck—Of fair length, without throatiness and slightly arched.

Body—Deep and broad of chest, well ribbed up. Back short, not roached. Loins and quarters strong.

Elbows—Standing neither in nor out.

Fore legs—Wide apart, straight and well muscled.

Hind legs—Straight, quite long from stifle to hock (which should turn neither in nor out) short and straight from hock to pastern. Thighs well muscled. Hocks not too prominent.

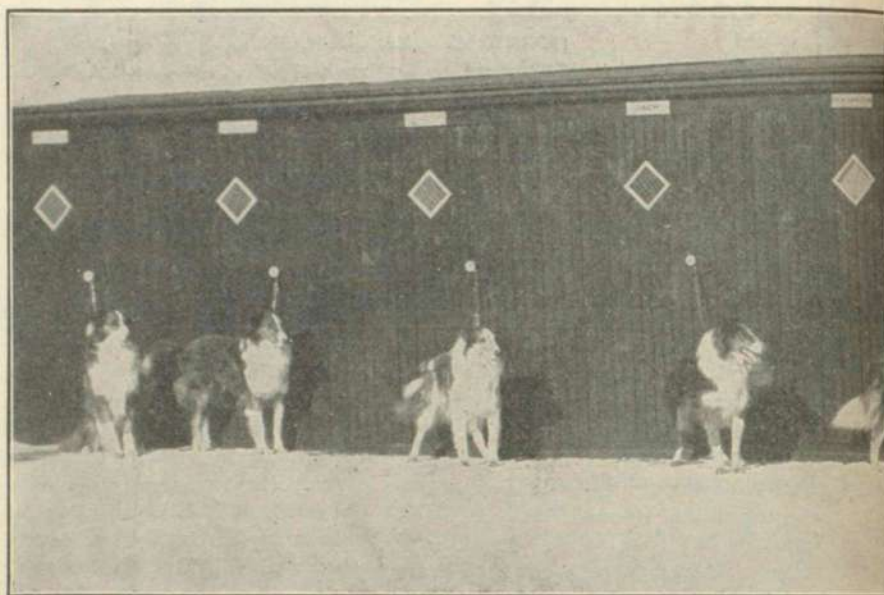
Feet—Small, nearly round, and turned neither in nor out. Toes compact and arched.

Tail—Set on low, short, fine and tapering, straight or screw, devoid of fringe or coarse hair, and not carried above the horizontal.

Color—Any color; brindle, evenly marked with white, strongly preferred.

Markings—White muzzle, blaze on face, collar, chest and feet.

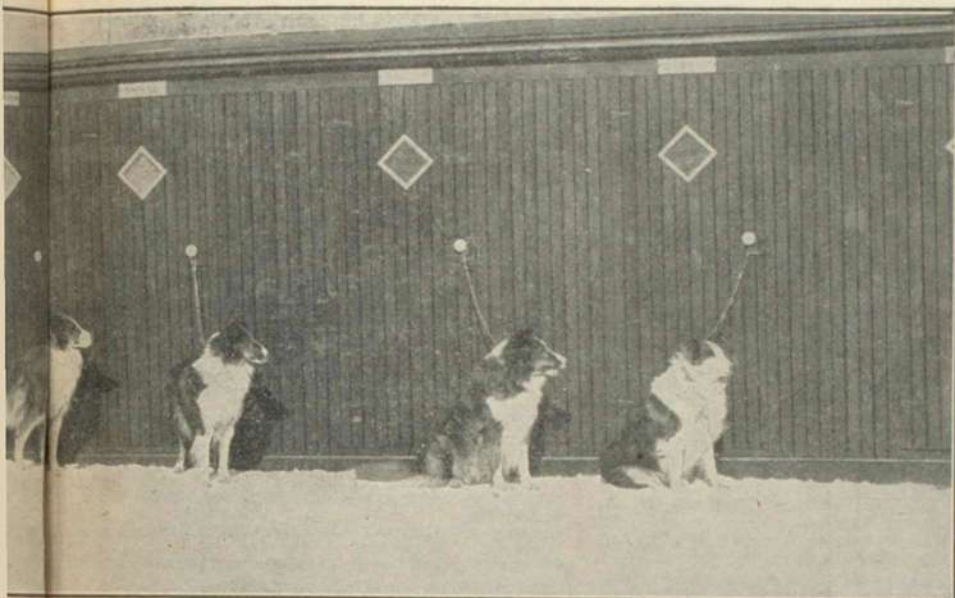

NOTES FOR NOVICES.

By Theo. Marples.

The question of trimming Terriers' coats has for years been a knotty problem for the Kennel Club (which we are not going to attempt to solve here) owing to the lengths to which exhibitors have carried the practice, or, in other words, to the shortness to which the coats of dogs have been reduced by the clever tonsorial artist, which sounds somewhat paradoxical.

We cannot here recommend the use of barber's No. 1 clippers, the knife,

scissors, rasp, or other implement of canine war for the purpose of bringing a long woolly coat more into keeping with present-day requirements, and prior to a show carefully dressing it with a solution of alum or other substance, in order to temporarily harden its texture to the touch, and thus deceive the judge, because such practices are against the penal clauses of the K. C.'s code for the preparation of dog's coats.

What is called stripping is the process of clipping off the entire coat of a

dog, which is sometimes required on grounds of sanitation and humanity. But such process greatly improves a bad coat, and at a certain stage of its growth gives it all the appearance of a good coat. That is why dogs are so often "stripped" purely for exhibition purposes. Some contend that this stripping is illegitimate; others that it is not. At any rate, that it is beneficial to a soft coat is beyond dispute. Of course, dogs so treated can only be exhibited during a certain stage of growth of the coat.

"Necessity is the mother of invention," and the necessity for an even, crisp coat in most of the broken-haired Terrier varieties, such as wire-haired Fox Terriers, Airedale, Irish, Welsh, and Scottish Terriers, has suggested the manufacture of a special comb, with short, sharp prongs, which, when carefully used, will not only remove the soft hair, superfluous and otherwise, but may be so manipulated in its use as to make all irregular hair more regular.

Terriers must be trimmed, and so long as trimming in any form is permitted the practice will always be more or less abused, and especially in the face of the fact that even among experts there is a difference of opinion as to what is and what is not legitimate. It has been held in the High Courts even that it would be absurd to expect an exhibitor to take into the show ring an animal which had not previously been subjected to a certain amount of preparation, and it is the "amount" of preparation in connection with dogs which forms an ever-recurring bone of contention in the ranks of the fancy—a case of every dog wanting a "bone," and those who have not got it snarling at those who have!

Taking Fox Terriers first, the smooth variety may, of course, be dismissed, as they require so little trimming as to be hardly worth discussing. The wire-hairs are the trouble, when Nature has given them a long, soft coat, as against a moderately short, crisp, wiry coat, which is the correct thing. But a soft, long coat has its advantages even, in that where a dog is, say, a bit snipy, or not dead true in front, the trimming of the coat can be so manipulated as to make the jaw of the dog look strong to the end, the curvatures of the fore-legs carefully regulated by the coat,

and so given the appearance of being perfectly straight, and long feet made to look short by a removal and rounding of the hair.

It is this form of deception which goes so much against the grain of the honest breeder and exhibitor, who complains that such dogs are being used in the expectation of propagation of good heads and fronts, whereas their snipy forefaces and irregular fronts are being perpetuated, all of which is perfectly true. It is in this that the evil of illegitimate trimming lies.

This said, there are counterbalancing benefits in connection with trimming. It often reveals the true shape and outline of the dog, which would be obscured somewhat if the dog was in the rough, and even in cases in which incorrect formation is obliterated and correct anatomy falsely substituted by tonsorial manipulation, we are given a picture of the ideal which is a distinct gain as a model to breed to, but not from.

Experts are rarely deceived by "faking," and when experience is bought by novices, it is always the most beneficial and permanent, and often the cheapest in the end—"Our Dogs."

Retrospects for 1906.

From the English Kennel Gazette.

BULL DOGS (MINIATURE).

By Lady Kathleen Pilkington.

When asked to take up my pen to write on the subject of Miniature Bull Dogs during the year of grace now swiftly drawing to its frigid close, it was distinctly with a feeling of cheerfulness and pleasure that I raised the said pen from its inky idleness and commenced.

Many great changes have marked 1906 for lovers of the Bantam Bull, and nearly, if not quite, all of them are changes for the good. The tendency in all enthusiastic minds to idealize the real, instead of striving to realize the ideal, however hopeless that might seem, has been greatly checked in the effort to make Miniatures really resemble their bigger brethren writ small, instead of being feeble, and often grotesque, caricatures of them, has been commendably noticeable. Excellent classes have been seen at the leading London shows, and at an ever-increasing number of country ones, where half-starved and weedy specimens, if not wholly extinct, have been far rarer than has ever been the case in previous years. Greater attention has been paid by judges to the condition of exhibits, and the ever-increasing confusion arising from the very unsatisfactory line of separation between Miniature and French Bull Dogs has finally culminated in a regular court of enquiry held at a recent date by the Kennel Club, where delegates of both the aforementioned clubs, as well as others from the various big Bull Dog clubs, were invited to attend and state their views. The upshot was in every

way satisfactory, the Miniature Bull Dog Club undertaking to banish bat ears forever, and look upon them as an absolute disqualification, while the French club gave the same undertaking as regards rose ears. A month's grace was allowed in which to sort out the sheep from the goats; in other words, to collect all bat-eared specimens into the French, and all rose-eared into the Miniature fold, should their owners so desire, but after January 1st, 1907, no further changes would be allowed, and no inter-breeding of any kind permitted. No retrospective legislation of any kind took place, to the great relief of all concerned, and a pleasing feature was the extreme friendliness and cordiality with which all the delegates of the clubs interested approached the matter, and, considering the amount of feeling and ink expended on the question in past years, we may add, each other. Under the new regulations the Miniature and French Bull Dog Clubs are now as far apart as the poles, and none of the various petty disputes and disagreements of the past should be possible. The rule doing away with bat ears absolutely was a welcome one to most breeders of the Miniatures, and though it has hit a few exhibitors rather hard, we feel sure, for the good of the breed they love, which it undoubtedly is, they will not mind making a sacrifice. So long as bat ears and their attendant train of evils in the shape of frog-faces, domea skulls, and general Toyishness of appearance were allowed at all on the show bench, so long also would the Miniature Bulls have remained at a standstill and made no progress to speak of. Whether these attributes are charming or the reverse, is not the question. The point is that they assuredly are not the right attributes for Miniature Bull Dogs, and their definite banishment cannot but re-

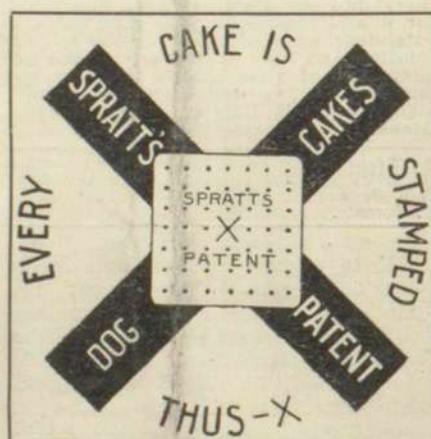
