NOTES AND COMMENTS

St. Clair Collies: Hollyrood Polly, now owned by Mr. Shepardson, Sombra, Ont., has returned from a visit to the great winning Collie, Ch. Harwood Piccolo. Harwood Piccolo is a winner of 200 first and specials, under 41 different judges. St. Clair Beauty, by Ch. Wellesbourne Hope, is on a visit to Col. McEwen's Hollyrood Professor. These meetings will surely produce winners.

Inferno: The str'king picture that adorns the front page of Canadian Kennel Gazette is engraved direct from a photo of Mr. John Miles' famous Bull Terrier Inferno, now a better dog than ever he was.

It will be remembered that at the recent Canadian National Show Inferno did all that was asked of him, winning right through h's classes from puppy to winners. He topped this by taking the special award of best Bull Terrier in the show.

In his report, Mr. Claire Foster, the judge at Toronto, highly eulogized Inferno and says he "is the best Bull Terrier out for a long, long time," a decision that was generally agreed to.

Collie items: Dr. Ford has bred his Ch. Wishaw Leader bitch, Otterburn Constance, a winner at the late Toronto show, to that great sire, Parbold Pierrot, and he is hoping that results may do some good to Collies in Canada.

Otterburn Ornament is proving such a successful sire that it really was unnecessary to go outside the kennel, except for change of blood, and the subsequent extended operations that follow such a change.

Bull Terrier bits: Mr. E. C. Powell, Vancouver, in proposing Mr. G. C. Israel, of Olympia, Wash., for C.K.C. membership, tells us that Mr. Israel is the Vancouver Kennel Club's hon, representative for his district. Mr. Israel is a Bull Terrier breeder and has been Mr. Watkins' chief opponent in the show ring for the past three or four years. He has lately purchased Edgewood Biddy, who cleaned up things at Philadelphia last year. He also owns Williamette Peer, and expects to purchase Bloomsbury Bo'swain.

Business this time: Mr. Chas. Lyndon is giving up his extensive kennels at Scarboro and is going into business in Toronto. This does not mean that he is giving up dogs entirely, but that his operations in this I'ne will be greatly lessened.

A New Pom: Mrs. Macdonald has just imported the brown Pom. bitch Prinzesschen, winner of reserve championship at Crystal Palace. She is by Ch. Haughty Prince, is very tiny, and has a coat of the rich, dark shade, now becoming so rare.

Why not others: A pleasant feature of the late Fox Terrier Show in B. C. was the part taken by the ladies, who provided light refreshments in the shape of tea, coffee, cake, etc., during the show. Indeed the help of the lady members of the club was greatly appreciated. Next year the show will be repeated, but with it is confidently hoped an entry of not less than one hundred dogs. The Club has now the substantial membership of thirty-eight and this is being augmented monthly.

Bull bits: Mrs. Cartwright has been so unfortunate as to lose her good old Bull bitch, Miss Chirgwin. Soon after moving to Kingston she was, one morning, found dead in her kennel. She had a "little trouble" with Lennox Benita, another lady of the same abode, and it is probable that over-exertion was the cause of death, as her wounds were quite trifling. She was nearly ten years old and had done good service both on the bench and in the kennel. Being a great pet of Mrs. Cartwright's, she is much missed.

Royal May, a daughter of the bitch whose death we record above, is showing in whelp to Ben Jordan, so that the blood lines of the old favorite will not be lost to the kennel.

Mrs. Cartwright states that her Lennox Bendigo beat Duke of Buckingham in winners class at Ottawa. a matter that is being investigated by the Canadian Kennel Club. The reverse is given in the secretary's official catalogue fyled with the C.K.C.

Daddy's Double: Mr. R. G. Stanley Anthony, of Vancouver, has three very promising pupples in his Dartmouth—Rats litter. One is all white and so resembles Champion Daddy, who figures so prominently in his pedigree, that he is to be registered under the suggestive name prefixing this paragraph.

Pitt-falls: Mrs. Pitt has been unfor tunate in losing, by premature birth, her Japanese Spaniel's litter of three, though she is in part recompensed by the arrival of the sturdy family of Poms that are now offered for sale.

We should greatly have liked to have seen a few Canadian bred "Oriental troubles" on our benches. Better luck aga'n, we hope.

Tipster Dead: Mr. A. A. Macdonald is lamenting the death of his sterling Fox Terrier Aldon Tipster, who was killed in a fight. While able to hold his own at fair odds, he could not stand the drubbing that three other dogs gave him, and succumbed to his injuries.

BRITISH COLUMBIA FOX TERRIER CLUB—FIRST ANNUAL SHOW.

NUMBER OF DOGS, SIXTY-TWO-WINNERS' VALUE, TWO POINTS.

The British Columbia Fox Terrier Club held on the 14th of November its first annual bench show of smooth and wirehair Fox Terriers at the Athletic Club, in Vancouver, B.C. This competition was not, however, confined to members of the club, but was open to the world, and the club is to be congratulated on the success of its first venture.

The catalogue enumerates 65 Terriers, and it is safe to say that admirers of smooths and wires were well rewarded for attending the little one-day show, and must have been surprised at the quality of many of the exhibits.

The smooth division numbered 40 out of the 65 on the benches, and included well-known winners, and very keen interest attached to the meeting at this special show of several canine celebrities who had met before on more than one occasion.

The classes were ably handled by Mr. Frank Turner, of Victoria, as judge, well known for many years in canine circles on the Pacific Coast, and who got through his arduous and responsible duties with carefulness and conscientiousness, and although, as everyone knows, it is impossible to please all exhibitors, his awards were approved of in most cases. A pleasing feature was the large number of ladies present, following the awards with interest and criticism. At the close of the day the specials were presented by the president of the club, who prefaced this ceremony with a short speech, given under difficulties, as the impatient barking of the dogs rendered almost inaudible many of the words of encouragement and congratulation in which Mr. Bruce expressed himself. Mr. Bruce is a sportsman in the true sense, and it was stated that his exhibit in open smooth dogs, Leander Club, was imported from England expressly to make a sensation at this show. This dog, however, did not attain a higher position than V.H.C., having had to meet Champion Covesea Speedy, once known as Puget Speedy, as well as Ch. Revelry and that excellent dog Dartmouth, whose home is in the kennels of Mr. Anthony, in Vancouver, and who had a host of admirers. Ch. Covesea Speedy is owned by Mr. George Florence, of Victoria, and has won championships in the United States and in

British Columbia. He was born in Seattle, his sire being the celebrated English champion Daddy, who won the championship of England three years in succession. Daddy was imported to Seattle by the owner of the Windy Kennels, of that city, his breeder, Mr. Redmond, considering him the best Terrier ever produced in England. Since his arrival on the coast he has been entered in competitions against Speedy, and has suffered defeat at his hands on three occasions, under three different judges. Speedy took the highest honors of the show here recorded. His kennel companion, Champion Revelry, now 7 years old, and as fit as ever, got third, whilst the Vancouver dog, Dartmouth, owned by Mr. Anthony, a big winner already, was placed between them as second.

The decision in this keenly contested class of eight entries was the big event of the day, and had been looked forward to by Fox Terrier men in adjacent towns for a long time.

Taking smooth puppy dogs, Mr. Welsh's Beau Brummell, placed first, is a promising youngster, with good head and eye; and Mrs. Forrests' Terry Boy second, perhaps a bit large for his age, is an attractive sort. The third prize went to Miss Macpherson's stylish Sumshine Baron.

In novice, first and second were repetitions of the previous class. Mrs. T. B. Chappel obtained third with Gentleman Loc

In limit, the Bellew Kennels, Seattle, secured first with Sabine Renown, not, however, in the best condition. Second went to Sunshine Beau Brummell, and third to Essex Snowball, rather full in eye.

In open smooth bitches Mrs. J. J. Bostock's Reminiscence (champion) maintained her hold on first position, although not looking at her best. She has often shown herself better, and in the winners class had to give way to an equally high quality tan-marked young bitch, who has at this show made her debut. This new comet is named Spider, and is owned by Mrs. Chappel. She won in a class of eleven in puppies and fifteen in novice, and would have won right through limit and open if she had been entered for these, as she got the winners. It is prophesied that this little bitch will be heard of again, all she wants now being a rough country and lots of Terrier

The Terriers shown by Mr. J. W. Welsh, the courteous and popular secretary of the show, were all of correct type, and showed their breeding in the ring, and they fully deserved the honors they brought to their owner. Mr. Welsh has been one of the chief pillars in the Fox Terrier world in Vancouver for a long time, and there is no doubt but that to him is due the gratitude of every Fox Terrier fancier in this part of Canada for his having always bred the proper stamp of Terriers and shown them, for other men of smaller experience to keep in their mind's eye and beat them if they could.

In wire hairs 25 dogs put in an appearance, but were of such different types that the judge must have felt his task a puzzling one. It may be taken for an axiom that a present-day wire hair has rarely a wiry, harsh, straight coat,

such as were to be found in the rough. broken counties of England 40, or even 20, years ago. The reason for the falling off in the special, the chief characteristic of the breed from which, in fact, it got its name, is well understood by wire men, but is a subject requiring rather delicate handling in the conditions attending this breed at present dog shows.

In puppies, dogs, the entries numbered five. First went to Rogue, a good, symmetrical, well set up youngster, good head and well carried, small ears, strong in foreface and jaws, but soft in coat, well prepared by clipping; on the big side, but a taking sort. This was the winner at New Westminster last month.

In novice dogs, the puppy winner, Rogue, had to give way to a new one for the first place, viz., Punch, whose great fault is his size. He is all white, with lots of Terrier about him; beats Rogue in coat, weighs 23 pounds, and should have paid the penalty for his weight and size. In this class came out two young dogs, Tinker and Tear'im, shown by Mr. H. C. Chiene, with natural coats. They are real typical Terriers, proper size, wi h the keen, workman-like look that wire hairs should have. They won third and reserve.

In the next class, limit, Punch and Rogue again came first and second, with Mr. McAuliffe's Essex Pedro (late Jack) third. The latter is a keen, nice-headed little dog, with a good deal of black on body and good, hard coat. He deserved his ribbon. Reserve went to Tori, a real Terrier, of correct size, and the "varminty" look that suggests badger's earth or foxes' holes. He is broad in front, and coat is too open and not of very hard texture, still a taking and good Terrier, who shows you what he is "au naturel," and not what he has been altered to.

Eight came together in the open class, Punch winning first, after a struggle with Ch. Sunshine Bristles, second, and Rogue, now coming in third. These three are all on the big side, and had better look after themselves when they meet something smaller than themselves but better quality than any of the remainder of the class. Cannington Bristles, who won so much in Vancouver in May last, here only got V.H.C. He does not show well, and does not fulfil his younger pro-

In puppy bitches only two came out-Daisy and Blossom—and in novice bitches Judy and Blossom, who won in the order of their names. Limit bitches brought out seven. They were of various types, Judy, a small, tan-marked, compact, good boned, but soft-coated one, winning from Weaselle, who was placed second, and who is a smart, keen Terrierlike Terrier, looks a workman, and was not gotten up. R. P. Forshaw's Mistress of the Robes was awarded third. This order was repeated in the open class, the winners going to Judy.

Hearty goodfellowship prevailed, and many were the pleased greetings of old friends as they again met unexpectedly at this enjoyable little one-day show. Prominent among those attending were most of the well-known Terrier men and many fanciers of other breeds, who could not be kept away, and fanciers came from Seattle and other distant parts. The officers of the British Columbia Fox Terrier Club are to be commended for their efforts, and especial thanks should be given to Mr. Welsh as secretary.

At the next annual show care should be taken to get a better hall and larger ring for judging, a wart of room in the ring crowded the dogs together and did not give the judge a chance to see the dogs from a sufficient distance por the handlers a chance to show them off.

The Act for the Protection of Sheep and to Impose a Tax on Dogs—Chapter 271, R.S.O., 1907.

(Published by the Ontario Department of Agriculture)

1. Subject to the provision in the next following section, there shall be levied annually, in every municipality in Ontario, upon the owner, possessor or harborer of each dog therein, an annual tax of \$1 for a (one) dog, \$2 for each dog more than one, and \$2 (\$5) for a bitch, provided, nevertheless, that the owner or possessor of a kennel of pure-bred dogs which are registered in the "Canada Kennel Register," may in any year obtain from the treasurer of the municipality a certificate of having paid to such treasurer the sum of \$10 as a tax upon such kennel for the year, and upon the production thereof to the assessor, the owner or possessor of such kennel shall be exemp from assessment and any further tax in respect thereof for the said year. 53 Vic., c. 62, s. 1.

Remarks: The amount of taxes that should be imposed upon dogs was a matter upon which correspondents were not agreed. The amount suggested varied from nothing to \$10 each. The majority, however, varied from \$1 to \$2 for each dog, and from \$5 to \$10 for each bitch. The Association, in deciding upon the amount of taxes, kept in view the fact that useful, well-cared-for dogs should not be heavily taxed, and they consider that persons should be discouraged from keep-

In raising the tax on bitches to \$5 and allowing the tax on kennels of pure-bred dogs to remain at \$10, the desire was to confine, as much as possible, the breeding of dogs to these kennels.

2. Upon the petition of twenty-five ratepayers the Council of any city, town, township or incorporated village may provide by by-law that the said tax or any part of it shall not be levied in said municipality. 53 Vic., c. 62, s. 2; 55 Vic., c. 55, s. 2.

Remarks: Correspondents were of the opinion that the tax on dogs should be compulsory, and that section 2 of the Act should be struck out. The meeting of the Winter Fair also passed a motion asking for compulsory taxation.

3. The assessors of every municipality within which a by-law has not been passed as provided in the preceding section, shall at the time of making their annual assessment, enter on the assessment roll, in a column prepared for the purpose, opposite the name of every person assessed, and also opposite the name of every resident inhabitant not otherwise assessed, being the owner or keeper of any dog, the number and sex of dogs by him owned or kept. R. S. O., 1877, c. 214, s. 3.

4. The owner, possessor or keeper of any dog shall, when (be) required by the assessors to deliver to them, in writing, a statement of the number of dogs owned or kept by him, whether one or more; and for every refusal or neglect to do so, and for every false statement made in respect thereof, he shall incur a penalty of \$5, to be recovered with costs, before any Justice of the Peace having jurisdiction in the municipality. R. S. O., 1887, c. 214, s. 4; 53 Vic., c. 62. s. 3.

Remarks: The changes in sections 3 and 4 are particularly for the purpose of securing a better enforcement of the Act.

5. The collector's roll of the municipality shall contain the name of every person entered on the assessment roll as the owner, possessor or keeper of any dog with the tax hereby imposed in a separate column, and the collector shall proceed to collect the same, at the same, time and with the like authority, and make returns to the treasurer of the municipality, in the same manner and subject to the same liabilities in all respects for paying over the same to the treasurer as in the case of other taxes levied in the municipality. R. S. O., 1887, c. 214, s. 5; 53 Vic., c. 62, s. 4.

6. In cases where persons have been assessed for dogs, and the collector has failed to collect the taxes, authorized by this Act, he shall report the same un-

der oath to any Justice of the Peace. and such Justice shall, by an order under his hand and seal, to be served by any duly qualified constable, require such dogs to be destroyed by the owners, possessors or harborers thereof, or by a constable, and for the purpose of earrying out the said order any constable may enter on the premises of the owner, possessor or harborer of the dog ordered to be destroyed, and destroy such dog; and in case any collector neglects to make the aforesaid report within the time required for paying over the taxes levied in the municipality, he shall be liable to a penalty of \$10 and costs, to be recovered in the same manner as provided in section 15 of this Act. R. S. O., 1887, e. 214, s. 65; 53 Vic., c. 62, s. 5; 56 Vic., c 46, s. 1.

7. The money collected and paid to the clerk or treasurer of any municipality under the preceding sections, shall constitute a fund for satisfying such damages as arise in any year from dogs killing or injuring sheep or lambs in such municipality; and the residue, if any, shall form part of the assets of the municipality for the general purposes thereof; but when it becomes necessary in any year for the purpose of paying charges on the same, the fund shall be supplemented to the extent of the amount which has been applied to the general purposes in the municipality. R. S. O., 1887, c. 214, s. 7.

8. In case the Council of any city, town, township or incorporated village deems it advisable that the tax by this Act established should be maintained, but that the application of the proceeds thereof by this Act provided should be dispensed with, it shall be lawful for such Council by by-law to declare that such application shall be dispensed with;

and thereafter during the continuance of such by-law, the sections of this Act numbered 6, 7 and 17 to 21 inclusive, shall have no force or effect in the municipality within the jurisdiction of such Council; and the moneys collected and paid to the clerk or treasurer of the municipality under the remaining sections of this Act, shall be the property of the municipality, and shall be subject to its disposition in like manner as other local taxes. R. S. O., 1887, c. 214, s. 8 (1); 53 Vic., c. 62, s. 8; 55 Vic., c. 55 s. 1.

Remarks: As will be noticed by Table VIII., a number of municipalities which collect taxes on dogs take advantage of the above section to dispense with the payment for damages done by dogs to sheep, and use the moneys so collected entirely for other purposes. The correspondents claim that this is a great injustice to the sheep owners, and express the desire to have this clause repealed.

Protection of Sheep.

9. Any person may kill—

- (a) Any dog which he sees pursuing, worrying or wounding any sheep or lamb;
- (b) Any dog without lawful permission in any enclosed field on any farm which the owner or occupant thereof or his servant finds giving tongue and terrifying any sheep or lamb on such farm; or
- (e) Any dog which any person finds straying between sunset and sunrise on any farm whereon any sheep or lambs are kept;

But no dog so straying which belongs to or is kept or harbored by the occupant of any premises next adjoining the said farm, or next adjoining that part of any highway or lane which abuts on said farm, nor any dog so straying, either when securely muzzled or when accompanied by or being within reasonable call or control of any person owning or possessing or having the charge or care of said dog, shall be so killed unless there is reasonable apprehension that such dog, if not killed, is likely to pursue, worry, wound or terrify sheep or lambs then on the said farm. 56 Vic., c. 46, s. 2.

New Brunswick Kennel Club Show, Held at St. John, Nov. 12, 13 and 14.

NUMBER OF DOGS PRESENT, ONE HUNDRED AND FIFTY-ONE-WINNERS VALUE, ONE POINT.

Mr. H. W. Lacy judged all classes at this, the first show held in New Brunswick, under C.K.C. rules, and reports as follows in his paper, the American Stockkeeper:

With the Salvation Army citadel on one side of the street and a dog show on the other, the good people of St. John had a choice of going straight to the demnition bow-wows, or somewhere in the future less tangible. St. John evidently preferred the former alternative, judging by the attendance at the first show given by the New Brunswick Kennel Club. Favored by charming, bracing weather (a visit to this pine ladened air is an unexcelled tonic), the latest show was superior to all others we have had the honor to pass the awards upon.

The coming of exhibitors from other parts was an innovation that pleased the good sportsmen of St. John immensely, and there are no better sports than the local owners of dogs at the Queen's Rink show, for, though time and again they were beaten by dogs from the outside kennels, they took it all good naturedly. At the first show held in St. John the exhibitors were inclined to question the judge's opinion, but happily for the latter's peace of mind, they have come to see things in another light, and realize that perhaps, after all, the judge did know one breed from another.

With the exception of some of the entrants brought from Montreal and Toronto and Nova Scotia, the general class of the exhibits showed little improvement; in fact, in some breeds, like Collies and St. Bernards, and Newfoundlands, Wolf Hounds, Greyhounds, Setters, Pointers, Bull Terriers, and so on, there is a falling off in numbers and quality, and there will continue to be until the owners seek outside blood and grade their stock. They recognize this necessity in horses and cattle, and they might as well do so in dogs. There is plenty of enthusiasm, and this backed by a little enterprise will soon put the Brunswickers in the right way.

Practically, the most of the show was composed of just the ordinary dogs seen along the highways; that is, that may be identified by breeds. Consequently the judging of such classes is not altogether a sinecure, and one turns with joyful relief to a sort that looks like something good.

From Montreal came Mr. Brown, president, we believe, of the Canadian Bulldog Club, who again, has "business" in St. John just about show time, and brought down four very nice Bulldogs, the entry in this breed being the best quality one of the show so far as all round merit goes. Then there was Alec Ross, with a combination team from Montreal, whose merits will be spoken of further on. Mr. W. N. Clark came all the way from Nova Scotia, and, we believe, was the first exhibitor from the island country. The visit of these gentlemen and Mr. Finley will do a lot of good to the dog interest of St. John.

As the awards are published in the local papers and those from outside St. John will be mentioned as we go along, it is but necessary to give a resume of the breeds where quality deserves. St. Bernards were very moderate, the best being a smooth, Mr. McGivern's Lolo, with well shaped, but small head. There was a well formed Newfoundland in Captain, of the Blackwall entries. The Greyhound was faulty. Foxhounds were just as good as the American classes here, with the Philadelphia cracks out of the way. Pointers were a fair lot, nothing bad, nothing top-top; the best was the puppy, W. A. Harrison's Boy, who scored in head and front over the second, Kaye's Chum. English Setters contained nothing but what would here be termed ordinary. A nice, level orange and white, none too good in front, MacGoughey's Stoughton Ben, that from the name presumes that the Old Bay State had something to do with his nativity, was easily the best of her sex. A fair Gordon was shown.

The Cockers were chiefly good, sound sporting examples of the breed, and the judge went for this type, combined with necessary quality. The best of the lot was a very nice parti-color bitch, St. C. McKell's Toots, a smart mover, and with a better muzzle and a little less fat around neck and shoulders, would do most anywhere. Another nice one is Mrs. McClellan's Nellie, a pretty red, that might be cleaner in head and straighter



When I asked him what fault he had with my dog, he said: "His hair is too coarse," which was certainly not true. He had as fine a coat as any dog in the show. This dog won afterwards, under an experienced judge, first and winners at Ottawa.

I don't want anyone to think I am jealous of Mr. Saunders or anyone else. All we breeders want is fair play, and he has a very good bitch in Rote Hexe Forst.

The Dachshund.

The Dachshund is one of the most ancient breeds of dog in existence. He belongs to the canis pugnaces venantes class. The first traces of the Dachshund are to be found in Austria and Germany, where the aristocracy used them for hunting fox, badger, and other animals.

The Dachshund is very courageous. He will tackle anything, and will fight to the death. Tradition tells us that the King's royal foresters crossed a breed of dog with the wild ferret, a certain kind of wild ferret in Germany, which is five times as large as the ferrets here. Certainly they do resemble a ferret in general appearance and in many other ways. The male Dachshund, like the male ferret, has often been known to kill their young when they reach the age of four months. For this reason I always separate the young from the old ones when six weeks old.

The Dachshund needs searcely any training. They take to hunting as naturally as they do to eating. He follows the scent the same as a Beagle or Bloodhound, and gives out plenty of tongue. He can pick up a trail where a Beagle would pass right over so cold a

He is also an ideal house and watch dog, and becomes very attached, although he will readily make friends with his new master. Not long ago my wife lost one of the breed in a department store. He stayed at the counter where he missed her all day and night, and would not let anyone pick him up. When I went there the next day he was still waiting there.

In Germany they are having great sport with them. An artificial burrow is made, then a fox put in, and the Dachshund is then sent in, and has to drive

the fox out of the burrow. They will do more good on a farm than any other breed, killing vermin. They are so keen to hunt that they are always working. They are just slow enough not to overrun the trail, as so many of our speedy hounds do, and in this way they actually gain time.

The general appearance is dwarfy, short legged, long bodied, with sturdy figure, and well developed muscles. Colors-Red, reddish yellow, tan, black and tan, chocolate and tan, chestnut, liver; also dappled, or tiger colored. In this latter class we have the gray tiger and red tiger. The tigers are very popular in the United States at present. The writer has just imported a handsome gray tiger stud dog by Spitzbub, A.K.C. 39902, ex Hepe II. It is said to be the only one in Canada of its kind.

It seems a shame that the Dachshund breed is so neglected. He can compare favorably with any popular breed, besides being a useful little fellow.

show has been held with about 70 dogs entered and full 62 benched. It is certain that a small extra effort would have benched 75, making a three point show, without gathering in any culls, too.

There has been a great advance in quality this year, due chiefly to the importation of bitches in whelp from England, although the local production of earlier imported stock, notably King Elfs and Daddys, have been the heaviest winners.

There is such a variety of blood here now for the size of the place, and such good young stock about, that it is a question whether anything under four figures will secure anything in the East or in England that is better. Certainly a man would be foolish to risk a high-priced importation before he has seen what the Western dogs can do in the East, and, it is sincerely to be hoped, the next twelve months will show that.

Judging from the remarks made on the decisions at the spring show, we seem to have learned a lot about Fox Terriers this year. The favorite was beaten in the spring, and has been hopelessly out of it ever since; and, strange to say, he was the favorite of those who "have bred Terriers all their lives, don't cher know. "

We learned, too, that because a dog came from So-and-So's kennels, and cost such and such a figure, "cut no ice" in the ring. The best dog has gone on top, no matter who judged, even in spite of the judge's own prejudice.

I wonder does dog fancying alter a man's nature entirely so that he becomes quite irrational when on that subject? I know of two or three fine fellows, one the best loser I ever knew, who always said about a certain dog that they could not see anything in him, and then, when he goes on top again, they say, "Well, he's a hard dog to find any fault in." This dog is no good between shows.

A lady friend of mine, who is very fond of dogs, says she hates shows and doggy people because they are so jealous of one another. "Do you know," she said at the recent Fox Terrier Show, "the first thing I heard when I came in was your friend, T. M., saying to Mrs. So-and-So how glad he was Dartmouth was beaten in the open."

Well, really, I wasn't a bit surprised. This dog Dartmouth, by Cadger of Oaks, a typical son of Daddy, who has also done some good winning, was the surprise of the Spring Show. He is out of Filey Nelly, a beautiful bitch, now dead, unfortunately, as she could produce lasters.

He has gone on winning, in spite of much adverse criticism. He took second to Ch. Speedy last week, having twice beaten this dog this year, but he topped such dogs as Ch. Revelry, Sabine Renown, and several other well known winners, and took first for best Fox Terrier bred in British Columbia.

He will go east as soon as the shows start, as there are still some who say he could not win in first-class company, and his owner is anxious to find out what they know.

I should think the sensation of the recent show was a little bitch named Spider. She is a most perfect specimen of her kind, but almost a "pocket edition." She is just a year old, and weighs 13 pounds, but her symmetry is splendid. She has a wonderful head, and looks like a laster. She cleaned up the bitches section, beating even Ch. Reminiscence, a most classical Terrier of correct size.

The best young dog in the smooths was undoubtedly Sunshine Beau Brummel, out of a bitch from Mrs. Bennett-Edward's kennels. If he wears well for another twelve months he'll do lots of winning.

Sabine Renown was a disappointment. We expected so much. He has many good qualities, but also some glaring faults, and he showed badly.

One hears a good deal about type. This expression, like "class" in a field trial dog, is evidently hard to explain; but it seems to me that the correct type is generally the winner-if you own him.

There was some grumbling, of course, at the recent show about decisions. The dogs that won were the ones that went in to win, and looked like it. For those who are not satisfied, there are other shows coming on and other judges. Opinions may vary but cut and come again, friends. We'll be there to greet you.
