B. C. FOX TERRIER CLUB. ANNUAL MEETING.

The annual meeting of the B.C. Fox Terrier Club was held on January 9th, 1908, at which nearly every member of the club was present. The President, Mr. W. D. Bruce, occupied the chair.

On request of the Vancouver Kennel Club, the Fox Terrier Club suggested the following for judges for the annual show of the Vancouver Kennel Club. Jas. Mortimer, Geo. S. Thomas, Parker

Thomas, Chas. Lyndon, W. P. Fraser, Jas. Lindsay and E. N. Barker.

Mr. H. Burns presented the Club with a \$110 silver cup, to be governed by the London Fox Terrier Club rules, the other conditions to be left to a committee.

The secretary's report stated that the Club was organized January 14, 1907, to promote the interests of the Fox Terrier in British Columbia. It started with seven members and had grown to thirty-nine, including two lady members. The Club donated, during the past year, four cups to the Vancouver Kennel Club, and one to the Calgary Kennel Club, in addition to providing for cups for firsts and prizes for seconds and thirds in twenty-three different classes at their specialty show. The first annual show was held on November 14, at which there were sixty-six dogs and one hundred and twenty-five entries. The show was a success financially also.

The election of officers resulted as follows: President, W. D. Bruce; Vice-President, J. J. Bostock; Secretary-Treasurer, E. C. Powell. Committee—F. W. Welsh, W. H. Archer and R. P. Foreshaw. Veterinary Surgeon, C. M. Henderson, V.S. Delegate to the Pacific Advisory Board to the C.K.C., E. C. Powell.

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NOTES AND COMMENTS

Irish Water Spaniels in the West: Mr. Taylor, of Edmonton, was in Toronto on the 6th, and his description of the Irish Water Spaniels' work in the West, on land and in water, was eulogistic. Strong enough to retrieve a goose or swan, hardy enough to stand any cold, the Irishman, Mr. Taylor thinks, is the ideal dog for rough work.

Poms sell: Mrs. Pitt tells us all the Pom puppies she offered for sale went quickly and many more could have been disposed of. Mrs. Pitt kindly adds that she wishes to thank the Gazette for it. The Pom is a hardy little beast—we saw two on the street at night lately, when it was below zero—if treated properly and not too greatly pampered.

Collie arrived: Mr. Shephardson's St. Clair Beauty has whelped seven puppies to Holyrood Professor (five males), all sables, with wide white collars and the finest litter of puppies ever whelped in the St. Clair Kennels.

Fox Terrier breeding: Geo. W. Bailey, Clapton Kennels, Ottawa, has bred the smooth Fox Terrier bitch Little Dutch, purchased by Mr. A. A. Macdonald in the old country, to Sabine Resist. Bred to the great stud dog Oxonion, she gave Mr. Macdonald and his famous Aldon Kennels Aldon O'Rion, a good one beyond question. Mated to such a stud dog as we know Sabine Resist to be, through his daughter Warren Reward, acknowledged the best smooth bred on the continent, Mr. Bailey, with ordinary good luck and fortune, should become possessed of a genuine flyer, more especially when we look at the breeding of Little Dutch, Dukedom, ex-Lady Leger, litter sister to Ch. South Cave Leger. And as a gentle reminder we note Sabine Resist is a litter brother to Oxonion, the stud dog of the day in Britain. Ottawa is coming strong in Fox Terriers, with

the Oxford and Clapton Kennels acquiring the pick of the best breeding through pedigreed bitches and using the best stud dogs available.

Col. McEwen's new Collie: We tell elsewhere what Wishaw Chance did at New York this month, making his American debut there. He is a handsome slashing tri-color by Big Busbie, ex-Hawkhead Violet and won his spurs at Lanark, Scotland, where he took three first prizes, afterwards taking two firsts at Edinburgh and three firsts at Carlisle.

Parbold Provost: Mr. Hugo Ainscough, of Parbold, England, the world's record breeder of champion Collies, has been induced to place his latest crack sable and white dog, Parbold Provost, at stud in America, and the dog is now at Mr. W. Ormiston Roy's kennels in Montreal. His owner considers this one of the best dogs he ever bred and there is no higher honor in Colliedom than to be classed as one of the best of the "Parbolds," which include such a galaxy of champions as Southport Perfection, sold for £1,005; Parbold Piccolo, sold for £500, and possibly the greatest Collie sire of all time; Southport Student, Parbold Purity, Ballyarnet Faultless, the greatest bitch in England to-day, and it is a moot question if a better has ever been produced, and upwards of a dozen other champions.

Parbold Provost is a son of Parbold Professor (now deceased), whose sons and daughters are the best Collies living, and include Ch. Annandale Professor, the present Scottish champion. Mr. Mason's Ch. Southport Student; Mr. Stretch's Ch. Ballyarnet Faultless; Mr. Untermyer's Greystone Gallant, etc., etc.

Provost should prove a great boon to breeders on this side of the water, as it is the first time in the history of the

breed that such a noted fancier as Mr. Ainscough has placed one of his crack Collies at the service of American breeders.

Provost is described as a big, racy dog, with a long head beautifully chiselled, lovely ears and the best eye and expression imaginable—a true "mixture of kindness and craft." He is young and consequently unimpaired by stud work in England, and he will, no doubt, worthily maintain the high reputation of the world-famous kennel of Parbold Collie sires, from whence he springs. The photo from which the illustration on our front page was made, was taken when Provost was eight months old, and before he was in full coat, but it will show what a wonderful Collie the dog is.

Mr. Roy will endeavor to keep the dog in Canada, as he is the best Collie he ever saw and the most likely looking sire. It must surely be an honor to Mr. Roy that Mr. Ainscough should evidence such confidence in his Collie knowledge and trustworthiness as to place such a specimen in his charge.

The Collie Folio for December, 1907, in its art supplement, contains a portrait of this exceedingly handsome dog with a description of him and his pedigree in detail. The latter is a study.

Erie, Pa., Show: That sound and sensible judge of Terriers, Mr. W. P. Fraser, Toronto, is scheduled to take Fox, Irish and Airedale Terriers at the Erie, Pa., show, to be held on March 10 to 13th next.

Airedales coming strong: Mr. Laurin has sent several good Airedales West lately, including Colne John Dole, to Mr. Chas. A. Burns, of the Horse Repository, Toronto. It will be remembered that the O. K. C.'s last show was held in the Repository, and from seeing them here and at the Canadian National show, Mr. Burns became enamored of the breed.

She was bred by Robert Tait of Wishaw, Scotland. Her sire was Ch. Heacham Galopin the sire of Ch. Wishaw Clinker. Her dam Shawton Lass by Ch. Rightaway. Shawton Lass was litter sister to Ch. Barwell Masterpiece. Wishaw May was the dam of several good ones, one of the best being Coila Kiltie, the winner at Boston of first in American bred classes; New York, 2nd in American bred classes; Ottawa, 4 firsts; Toronto, 1906, one first, two seconds, etc.

Wishaw May's chief performances were five firsts Paisley under Stretch, three firsts Glasgow under Webster, one first, one second Manchester, September, 1900, three seconds, Toronto, October, 1900, four firsts Danbury, 1904, first Ottawa, etc.

In her last litter she produced a nice bitch puppy by Brothie Piccolo, he by Parbold Polygamist, by Ch. Parbold Piccolo.

Mr. Burnes' aim is to develop a producing strain.

Minutes of the Pacific Advisory Board to the C.K.C., Jan. 11, 1908. (Official.)

A meeting of the Pacific Advisory Board of the C. K. C. was held in the office of H. S. Rolston, Esq., Saturday, January 11th, 1908, at 5 p.m.

Present—C. M. Rolston, Esq., Vice-President for British Columbia, in the chair; H. S. Rolston, Esq., Vancouver Kennel Club; E. C. Powell, Esq., B. C. Fox Terrier Club; Granby Farrant, Esq., New Westminster Kennel Club.

The chairman, Mr. C. M. Rolston, said he wished to take this opportunity of thanking everybody for electing him to this honorable office. It was an honor to be elected a vice-president of the C. K. C., but where the office was a dual one, the one already mentioned and also chairman of the Pacific Advisory Board, a branch of the great Executive, with full powers for everything in dogdom on the Coast, it was indeed a double honor and one which he felt proud to fill. He said that this meeting might almost be termed a re-organization meeting, as only one of the old Board remained. As we were all new members, he read over the agreement forming the Board, so that all might know their duties, and stated that as the late secretary had not turned over the books, etc., that the reading of the minutes of last meeting would be deferred to the next meeting, and that the first order of business would be the election of a secretary.

Moved by Mr. H. R. Rolston, That Miss Davie, Victoria, be secretary.

Moved in amendment, by Mr. Farrant, That Mr. E. C. Powell, Vancouver, be secretary. Mr. Powell refused to vote.

The chairman then declared Mr. Powell elected by his casting vote.

Moved by Mr. H. S. Rolston, seconded by Mr. Farrant, That to avoid all misunderstanding in the future, the secretary write a circular letter to the secretaries of all kennel clubs in British Columbia, instructing them in their duties towards the Pacific Advisory Board; that all applications for dates, etc., deposit for show, protests, premium lists, marked catalogues and listing fees, should be made to the secretary of the Pacific Advisory Board, and that he write the secretary of the C. K. C., asking him to forward anything which should be sent to him in error. Carried.

Moved by Mr. H. S. Rolston, seconded by Mr. Farrant, That unless something unforeseen occurs, the next meeting be held during the annual show of the Vancouver Kennel Club. Carried.

Mr. H. S. Rolston, That the secretary, write the late secretary (Mr. McConnell), asking him to forward all books, papers, letters, etc., in connection with the Pacific Advisory Board, to the secretary; also any unfinished business, and full particulars of the Bodley medal. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Farrant, seconded by Mr. H. S. Rolston, That this meeting do now adjourn. Carried.

THE BLOODHOUND IN CANADA.

The English Bloodhound, introduced here about fifteen years ago by Mr. George B. Sweetnam, of Toronto, did not obtain a serious footing in Canada until Messrs. C. H. Hall & Son, of King, Ont., proprietors of the Dartmoor Kennels, imported a brace from England and another from Vermont, thus combining the best English and American strains. The result has been phenomenal. Canada's Pride, that caused a sensation at the Industrial Exhibition in 1906, was the first Canadian bred of note, and would have reflected credit on any kennel in the world. Then came Turk, owned by Col. James Mason, with his marvellous trailing instinct. Many an evening last summer visitors to the Queen's Park were entertained by a man-hunt. Recently Dr. Herbert A. Bruce, the eminent surgeon, has purchased a typical specimen of this most estimable breed from the same kennels. The Canadian authority describes this Bloodhound as possessing a beautiful long, lean head, with abundant wrinkle, good legs, feet and earage, and excelling in body.—The Globe, Toronto, 27th January, 1908.

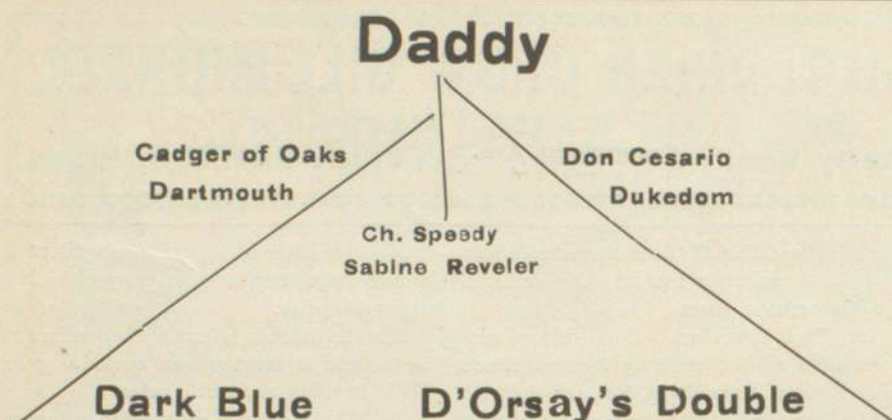

NOTES FOR NOVICES.

By Captain C. J. Wilkie.

Worms in puppies are a constant source of worry to old hands and novices alike. Few puppies, if any, escape these parasites entirely, and in nine cases out of ten sickness arising in a previously healthy litter after three weeks of age is due to the presence of worms. Some breeders consider it unwise to give any vermifuge to puppies under

eight weeks of age, but others dose their puppies whilst still on the dam, on the principle that it is easier to get rid of the immature worms than later on, when the intestines may be blocked by the fully developed specimens. I have had recent experience of a litter dosed when only two weeks old. The puppies were not thriving, but subsequent to the administration of medicine numbers of round worms were expelled, and the puppies made excellent progress. I have myself administered Ruby at four weeks of age to a litter of five puppies, all of which got rid of numerous round worms, whilst three of them also passed tape worms, a fact which surprised me, as it is difficult to understand how tape worms get into such young stock. The puppies were greatly benefited, and rapidly improved in condition. Had I waited till they were two months old they would have lost much valuable time even had they survived. Whilst quoting these cases I do not wish the novice to infer therefrom that it is wise, as a general rule, to medicine young whelps. On the contrary, by means of judicious diet, he should endeavor to avoid the necessity of medicine, but when the novice finds his young stock is losing ground he may find it necessary to make use of a mild vermifuge.

Even when a strong litter of whelps are drawing on the bitch's milk supply, her teats should be carefully examined now and again, as, from one cause or another, it is not uncommon to find a hardening of the udder, which, if neglected, may end in trouble, and perhaps the formation of an abscess. Gentle rubbing until the milk runs freely is, as a rule, all that is required. If the bitch has to get in and out of a box care should be taken to remove any nails or splinters from the edges, as in getting to and fro the hanging teats may be injured, and such injury at times results in the entire loss of the teat, to say nothing of the check which is likely to be caused in the development of the whelps, if inflammation makes the glands tender.

As a general rule puppies change their teeth without trouble, the second tooth pushing out the corresponding first tooth, but at times the first teeth, especially the eye teeth, are very obstinate, resulting in the second teeth growing out alongside the first. This sometimes results in wrong placement, spoiling what would otherwise be a good mouth. The whelps should be given big

bones to gnaw at, and if the old teeth do not come away in good time they should be loosened daily with the finger and thumb. If the puppies have trouble with their teeth their gums become very sore, and dyspepsia is often the result. The puppy acquires a "wormy," thriftless appearance, with more or less bareness in coat, especially about the eyes and ears. If the puppy does not now get proper treatment it will go rapidly from bad to worse. If worms are present they will develop rapidly, as they flourish in inverse proportion to the health of their host. Ignorant people will tell the novice that the puppy has the distemper on him. A little Epsom salts in milk, or soft food, is very useful, as a rule, together with care of teeth and diet, sufficient to restore tone to the system. In obstinate cases of dyspepsia the compound rhubarb pill may be used. The pills can be purchased in 6d. boxes, holding about two dozen pills. One given at night for several days will seldom fail to bring about a marked improvement. Round worms may be present in the stomach, but, if such be the case, a dose of areca nut will cause them to be vomited. I am myself a great believer in the compound rhubarb pill for dogs, and only quite recently they undoubtedly saved me a good bitch. Only ten days from whelping the bitch suddenly manifested signs of severe indisposition—diarrhoea and violent vomiting. A few weeks previously she had been treated for worms, but I gave her a mild dose of areca nut and castor oil, and she both vomited and passed sound worms, but without any apparent benefit to her general condition. All food was refused except small quantities of raw meat, which was either vomited or else passed through her undigested, together with watery discharge. The following day she was prostrate, refusing all food. I gave her a rhubarb pill. The next day she was again willing to eat raw meat, so I continued the pills daily for a week, by which time her motions had become almost natural. Although very weak still, she whelped successfully, and did her puppies well right through.

When puppies are teething the ear carriage is commonly very faulty. The novice need not be alarmed at this, because the ears will resume their correct carriage as soon as the irritation caused by cutting the teeth subsides. Unfortunately, at about nine months old, when some of the smaller breeds, such as Terriers, are often otherwise at their best

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for show purposes, the cutting of the back teeth causes waywardness in the ears, ruining the pup's chance in keen competition. As before stated, the trouble is only temporary, and the novice should not be persuaded to endeavor by surgical means to make the ears resume a correct carriage.

Fleas are a great pest in some districts, and become a very irritating factor in puppyhood. As puppies must have their liberty in order to develop properly, and as they gather the fleas from the ground, it is often almost an impossibility to keep them free from these pests. Cement floors, disinfectants, lime, and cleanliness will prevent these troublesome insects from breeding in the kennels. Washing with soap and diluted disinfectants, or grooming after the use of insect powder, aids in keeping the coat free from them, but, unfortunately, in some districts, especially in the summer, half an hour's run in the country is sufficient time in which a puppy may collect a complete army of fleas. The insects are injurious in that they keep the puppy in a state of constant irritation, and, moreover, are the hosts of a species of the tape worm, so every en-

deavor should be made to prevent them establishing themselves in the kennel. Dirt of any kind in the kennel is sure to harbor vermin.

Dogs given to killing poultry are a source of trouble and expense, both to the owners and neighbors, and it is a very simple matter to accustom puppies to live at peace with poultry. Of course, it is the nature of some breeds, such as Terriers, to chase and kill, but if Terriers are brought up in association with fowls they will never show any desire to injure them. If a dog shows a desire to hunt and kill poultry he should not be kept from them, but taken under control amongst some quiet feathered stock, and corrected when he shows an inclination to chase. He will soon get used to the smell of the birds, and after a few lessons I have never found any difficulty in breaking the worst cases. Terriers kennelled in view of poultry, which they can see but not get at, work themselves into a frenzy of excitement, but, if once properly broken, will when liberated run amongst the fowls without taking any further notice of them. I have observed that bitches with weaned whelps will sometimes kill

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fowls, although they have not been known to do so, or indeed to take any notice of fowls, at other times. Those who have studied the habits of the vixen with cubs will have observed how she will go to a distant farmstead for supplies, leaving rabbits and poultry near her earth unmolested. In like manner I have known bitches go far afield to hunt for food for their whelps, although the bitch and whelps are well fed at home. Should a bitch, not accustomed to stray away at other times, be absent for any length of time when her whelps are about five weeks of age, the novice will do well to watch for her return, and if she has nothing in her mouth he should try to see her vomit. I have had a bitch day after day return with a dead fowl and drop it amongst her whelps. Needless to say such a bitch should not have her liberty, as, apart from damage to poultry yards, she is apt to devour undesirable food and vomit it for her puppies. I cannot suggest a cure in such a case, except to take the puppies from her, for it is for them she kills and not for herself. I read not long ago in an answer to a correspondent who complained that his bitch with whelps had suddenly taken to killing poultry, that perhaps tying a dead fowl to the bitch's neck would cure her. It would be of no use, as she would offer it to her whelps and the fowl would quickly be torn to pieces. I think the only safe plan is to keep her confined, and if she is not valuable get rid of her.—Our Dogs.

NOTES FOR NOVICES.

The breeding season is now at hand, when a few hints to novices, amateurs, and others may be of benefit to them, on the principle that "a stitch in time saves nine."

These earlier hints refer more particularly to bitches about to be bred from than to those who have already been mated, although these will be reached before the subject is concluded.

Experienced breeders endeavor to avoid winter puppies, well knowing how difficult it is to rear them, as a rule, except under the most favorable conditions. I am inclined to think that winter bred and born puppies make the hardest dogs, if the kennel conveniences are such as to minimize the drawback of enforced confinement, and other conditions are favorable, such as roomy, capacious and well appointed kennels, covered runs, coupled with great care and attention. If these conditions are not present, it is better for the average breeder to eschew winter puppies altogether, which otherwise are likely to grow up rickety and ill-formed, and do neither the breed nor breeder any good.

To avoid winter puppies, bitches should not be mated between July and January. If they come in season between that period, much better to allow them to miss, and I may here say that it is always beneficial to a brood bitch to give her a miss now and again. She herself is stronger, her progeny are stronger, and she is likely to pay more attention to her puppies by having a periodical rest from maternal cares. Some breeders have a rule of breeding from their bitches at every alternate heat, which is a very good plan.

The winter rest question applies probably more to bitches that are kept out of doors than to Toys, which are kept indoors and therefore under more artificial conditions and where the atmosphere can be kept at any given temperature. But the other question of missing bitches oestrus now and then applies with equal force to the Toy breeds, being beneficial in all cases.

The question is often asked whether it is policy to breed from a bitch at her first heat, or miss her and breed from her at her second. Any answer to that question, to be sound, must depend upon several circumstances. One, and probably the most important, is the incident of whether the bitch is, or is not, an early developed one. Both dogs and bitches vary very considerably in the way they grow and develop, some maturing at a much earlier age than others. Then, again, there is the question of whether great size is required, which is the case in St. Bernards, Great Danes, Mastiffs and in Newfoundlands, Irish Wolfhounds and Deerhounds in some cases, where the dogs or bitches are undersized.

In no case should I advise bitches which are not strong or are late in maturing to be bred from at their first heat, nor yet in cases where they mature early, if great size is a desideratum. If, however, size is not material, it is better to breed from strong, early matured bitches at their first heat, because then their bones and frame are supple, and they are able to get through their accouchment with greater ease than when their bones become more set. Another reason why it is not advisable to breed from old dogs or bitches in the case of the big breeds is, because, as one or the other get into years and especially if they have done much service to the state—in this case, kennel—in the matter of reproducing their species, their constitution and stamina become somewhat impaired, with the result that their progeny become "smaller and smaller and beautifully less," much to the chagrin of the enthusiastic breeder.

Where diminutiveness is aimed at, however, just the very opposite course to what I have already sketched should be adopted, and indeed that is the very method, or one of them, coupled with selection, of course, which experts adopt to bantamize the several varieties of the canine species, and produce perfect specimens in miniature, which seems to be the aim of the fancy now-a-days in most of the Toy breeds.

This subject of breeding for either size or diminutiveness is a very wide and intricate one, and of such interest and importance as to merit an article all to itself, which I hope to give at a later date.

Bitches from which it is intended to breed should be kept entirely away from

all dogs, out of both sight and sound, before they come in season and for a little while after they have been mated. It is undesirable that a bitch should see any dog during that period other than the one to which she is to be mated, so that there may be no fear of any defects from mental impression of other dogs being made upon her progeny, which both science and practice have proved to be possible, although, of course, but rarely occurs.

It is a very good plan, in the case of bitches that are to be bred from, to put them through a course of treatment for worms just before they are due in season. It is assumed, of course, that owners of stud dogs keep their dogs free from these canine pests, for if one or the other is infested with them at the time of service the progeny are sure to be early victims to them, and possibly they will carry off the flower of the breeder's efforts before they have time to bud and blossom. More puppies die from the effects of worms, probably, than from any other disease or ailment to which canine flesh is heir.

The symptoms of a bitch coming in season are, of course, well known to the experienced breeder, and to most dog owners. Others there are, however, who seem to be more or less ignorant on the subject. Almost all bitches come in season twice a year, that is to say about every six months, but they vary a little sometimes, some bitches showing a lapse of a year between their heats, and others even more than that, whilst a fewer number never come in heat at all. A bitch first comes in heat at from seven to ten months old, but even in this case there is not a hard and fast rule, considerable variation being shown.

The first sign of a bitch's approaching heat is its desire for the society of and frolicsomeness with the male sex, coupled with an enlargement of the vagina. Shortly a colored discharge is seen, which lasts for a few days, varying from about two to ten. This discharge becomes clearer as the inflammation of the

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vagina subsides, and the bitch's heat gradually leaves her, and she then assumes her normal condition.

The best time to mate a bitch is directly after the colored discharge has ceased. If this is done, one service is quite sufficient, but if any doubt exists as to the correct moment having been hit upon, a second service, with an interim of not much more, nor much less, than 24 hours, is advisable.

It is an old fallacy in dog breeding that a stud service cannot possibly be effectual unless what is called a "tie" takes place during copulation. Such a condition is not at all necessary to ensure fruitful intercourse, but it is always more satisfactory when it does take place, because it is natural in dogs.

After a bitch has been served she should be kept isolated, quiet, and away from other dogs for a time. Her feeding and treatment, both before and after service, should be just the same, with this proviso, that she should not be allowed to get into obese condition, which is not favorable to bitches breeding, since their inner parts as well as their outer frame are abnormal, and this is more or less against conception.—Our Dogs.

EXPRESS COMPANIES AND THEIR DOINGS.

I have just returned from a trip to Vernon, the centre of the Okanagan

fruit country. We spent a month there, and took Dartmouth along. He enjoyed himself hugely. Although our winters at Vancouver are very mild, we get a shocking amount of rain, with a glorious day or so in between. Not so at Vernon, though, for there the winter is a long spell of glorious weather. Up to Xmas day there was no sleighing and the ground was so dry that one could have played tennis on the lawns. Before we left we had sleighing, but hardly enough skating to satisfy us.

Bright sunshiny days were the rule, and overcoats were seldom needed, as a wind is very rare. What a climate to raise winter puppies in!

One could feel the effect on oneself in this electrical atmosphere. The desire to get out of doors cannot be restrained, and one leaves the window wide open at night, rising fresh as a lark, no matter what revels occurred the preceding evening, or what hour one retired.

So also I noticed the difference in my dog. Lively as he is at all times, he broke loose entirely there, spent most of his time under sidewalks and stores, hunting cats and vermin. But what a burden a valuable dog can become!

One day my horse put his sharp-shodden hoof on the dog's front paw, cutting it to the bone. Trouble of course. On my way home, at a junction, although I took care to see the dog's crate on the truck ready for the baggage car, when the train rolled in, he was left behind, and arrived 24 hours later. Imagine my concern on going to get my dog at Vancouver and finding him heaven knows where.

We pay for the transportation of our dogs, but the C.P.R. decline to take any responsibility for their safe-keeping, no matter how valuable they may be.

Landing at St. John once I had two in a crate, and I know they were 36 hours
