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NOTES AND COMMENTS

Vancouver show: The dates granted by the Pacific Advisory Board to Vancouver are May 13th, 14th, 15th and 16th, 1908. Mr. George S. Thomas, of Hamilton, Mass., well known as a professional, is to judge all classes.

Pacific Coast circuit: The Coast circuit arranged to date is:

Oakland, Cal., April 8-11.

Portland, Ore., April 29 and 30, May 1 and 2.

Seattle, Wash., May 6-9.

Vancouver, May 13-16.

Another well known dog man, this time a Canadian, Mr. Chas. Lyndon, judges at San Francisco. Mr. Thomas judges at Portland also.

Victoria show: From our old friend, J. W. Creighton, we learn that Victoria expects to have the best show ever held in the city, the committee has secured a large number of specials, and in addition are paying two dollars for first, and one dollar for second in every class. While this money is not large, the entry fee is correspondingly small.

Best Canadian in show: Commodore of Clipstone, Mr. Wrightston Thorp's great Airedale, won at Buffalo the special for best Canadian dog in the show, under Mr. James Mortimer. He competed against such cracks as the Bull Terrier Inferno, the beautiful Collie King Edward Waterwitch, the Airedale Culmington Nettle, and others. Commodore was in the ring till the last, for cup for best of any breed in the show being beaten by the beautiful Fox Terrier Ch. Warren Remedy.

Signs of the times: The new Cocker Spaniel Club will have no "official list" of judges. The Collie Club of America,

at its annual meeting in New York, on Dr. Ford's motion, abandoned its old custom, and this club will also have no list that bears the word "official." Show committees may safely be trusted to appoint men familiar with such prominent breeds as these and will now have a free hand, unhampered by any questions as to what "the club" would do in the event of a judge being appointed who did not bear the hall mark of official recognition.

A Boston bit: Mr. Richardson's Boston has whelped six puppies to Sully Punch, all dark brindles with perfect markings. Four have screw tails, two short kinks.

Hamilton show: Dr. C. Y. Ford has been invited to judge the Hamilton show April 10th and 11th, but has not yet been able to say definitely that he could accept.

Poison: Mrs. Jardine, a Manitoba admirer of the handsome Collie, is mourning the death by poison administered by carelessness, or worse, of two of her winning specimens of this breed, Barney, one of the lot taking medal for best kennel at Winnipeg in 1902, and Mollie of Manitou, a successful competitor at the same show last year. The carelessness of trappers or others who care little for the suffering of poor beasts or the loss to the owners of such valuable dogs is put down as the cause.

Mrs. Jardine has two ten months' old youngsters, Barney and Bruce, that she hopes, if all goes well, to show in the fall.

London Dachs: Mr. W. Saunders, London, whose purchases in the Dachshunde line we noted some months ago, has now added quite a nice liver and

tan from the late Dr. Motschenbacher's kennel. She is a grandly bred bitch, being by Ch. Flott M., out of Ch. Topsy M.

St. Clair: The owner of the St. Clair Kennels, Mr. G. M. Shepardson, who keeps pegging away in the commendable effort to breed a Collie flyer or two, has recently sent two Elwyn Perfection bitches to Col. McEwen's new Collie Holyrood Professor. Mr. Shepardson has had several enquiries for the Professor puppies he advertised.

Bloodhounds at Buffalo: Mr. Sweetnam is to be congratulated on drawing a record entry, for Buffalo, in the breed with which he has for so long been identified. Buffalo usually gets two or three Bloodhounds, this year they had eighteen entries. Mr. Sweetnam was also warmly congratulated on his placing of the dogs, many of which had been placed in exactly similar positions in England.

Hamilton reorganizes: Mr. R. Colvin gives us the good news that Hamilton, once a great dog centre, is to the fore again.

Mr. Colvin was the only Canadian exhibitor of Bulldogs at New York, where he succeeded in getting first open dog and bitch, not exceeding 28 pounds, and reserve open dogs, bred by exhibitor. The winner in the 28-pound class was also bred by him. He says:

"We have reorganized the local club (Gore Kennel Club), which will henceforth be known as the Hamilton Kennel Club, and are going to hold a local ribbon show for two days on April 10th and 11th, and if this show proves a success, we will conduct an open show later on."

Appendix II.

Regulations as to the preparation of dogs for exhibition:

A dog shall be disqualified from winning a prize, or from receiving one, if awarded, at any show held under Kennel Club rules, save and except in such cases as are specified hereunder, under the head "Exceptions" if it be proved to the committee of the show:

1. That any dye, coloring, whitening, or darkening matter has been used and remains on any part of the dog.
2. That any preparation, chemical or

King Edward's Collies: Rather a funny incident occurred at New York. A man was examining the winning bitch from Canada, shown by Mrs. Gordon, Toronto, whose prefix, King Edward, is now so familiar to us. Turning to his cata-

logue? Has it not developed into an abuse in the hands of some, so called "professional" dog men? These are live questions just now that are animating the minds of those who have the good of the dog at heart.

At the fifty-second show of the Kennel Club, England, held last October at the Crystal Palace, the following was part of the rules. Should the Canadian Kennel Club take this matter up, or is it still in the province of the judges and

3. That any oil, greasy or sticky substance has been used and remains in the coat during time of exhibition.

4. That any part of a dog's coat or hair has been cut, clipped or singed, or rasped down by any substance.

5. That the new or fast coat has been removed by pulling or plucking in any manner.

Note—The coat may be brushed and combed, so that old or shedding coat and loose hairs may be removed.

6. That if any cutting, piercing, breaking by force, or any kind of operation or act which destroys tissues of the ears, or alters their natural formation or carriage, or shortens the tail, or alters the natural formation of the dog, or any part thereof, has been practised or any other thing has been done calculated in the opinion of the committee of the kennel Club to deceive, except in cases of necessary operation certified to the satisfaction of the Kennel Club Committee.

7. That the lining membrane of the mouth has been cut or mutilated in any way.

EXCEPTIONS.

1. Shortening the tails of dogs of the following breeds will not render them liable to disqualification:—Spaniels (except Irish Water), Fox Terriers, Irish Terriers, Welsh Terriers, Airedale Terriers, Old English Sheep Dogs, Poodles, Toy Spaniels, Yorkshire Terriers, Schipperkes, Griffon Bruxellois, and such varieties of foreign dogs as the committee may from time to time determine.

2. Dogs of the following breeds may have their coats clipped: Poodles.

3. Dewclaws may be removed in any breed.

4. Dogs with ears cropped prior to 9th April, 1893.

Bailey, the smooth Fox Terrier dog, Clapton Left O., a brother of Clapton Right O., recently shipped to A. P. Mutchmor, Winnipeg. This is the second Terrier to go West from the Clapton Kennels within the last month. Clapton

Kennels will send some real flyers to compete at the coming Ontario Kennel Club show, to be held next month. The pick of the kennel, The Duchess of Cliffside, will be entered in all classes to meet the best Terriers in Canada.

Collies in Texas: Mr. A. Branshaw's, Dallas, Texas, Collie bitch Coila Innocence, bred by Mr. W. Ormiston Roy, Montreal, has a fine litter of seven sable and whites to Ch. Squire of Tytton. NOTES ON THE NEW YORK SHOW.

Despite the recent financial panic and subsequent depression, the entry mustered in Madison Square Gardens, was greater than ever before—being 2,000 actual exhibits—and the attendance likewise. As usual the millionaire buyers were out in force with dogs "specially imported to win at New York." Though this does not savor of the true breeder's spirit, it certainly serves as an object lesson and demonstration for those whose endeavor is to breed a winner—certainly the zenith of the true fancier's ambition. It was gratifying to find that the winners in many classes were home bred and well able to compare with high-price importations. These dogs were, in a majority of cases, bred by small owners of meagre means—a decidedly encouraging feature. That Canada was the birthplace or home of many a blue ribbon winner, goes without saying. We have the best blood in the world at our disposal, which, if judiciously used, must produce the sort that bring not only honor but high prices—for there is always a long price awaiting the breeder of a dog that can win at New York.

The only innovation this year was an

exhibition given by the new Police Dogs, who are being trained to hunt down criminals and do patrol work. Great sagacity was shown, and almost human intelligence demonstrated. Nine judging rings were kept in constant operation and were always surrounded by a dense throng of onlookers, among whom were to be seen many well-known Canadians. As usual Canada was to the fore in many breeds, it being an especial pleasure to note many new names appearing in the prize list. As below stated, it's an expensive business exhibiting at New York, and therefore many of our good Canadian dogs have to remain at home. The most interesting feature, from a spectator's standpoint, was the parade during the awarding of the general specials. For this purpose six rings were thrown into one, which gave a space large enough to accommodate a hundred horses. In this enclosure all the judges assembled, and before them came the various contestants for "best brace in show," "best dog in show," "best kennel," and so on. After a great deal of sorting out, the coveted ribbon went to Mrs. Tyler Morse's wonderful brace of

Old English Sheepdogs, Ch. Handsome Boy and Dame Doris—ably shown by their fair owner. The next prize for best of all breeds, again fell to the wonderful smooth Fox Terrier Champion Warren Remedy—it will be remembered that she won this prize last year—an unprecedented feat. The largest exhibit went to the Middlesex Hunt's pack of English Foxhounds, followed by Mr. Bloodgood's wonderful team of Cocker. Many thought the latter might have won, but Mr. Walter S. Glynn, the stolid English judge, would have none of them, declaring them the wrong type. Whew!

The management of the show was, as usual, in the hands of Mr. James Mortimer, who is a veritable Czar in this capacity. The exquisite cleanliness of the show and the freedom from obnoxious odors, might be followed by some shows we have in mind. Indeed were anything else the case "the dog show" would cease to be a society event in New York. The judges were drawn

from far and near. From Germany came Herr Fritz Kirschbaum. As this gentleman spoke no English, he was obliged to soothe disappointed exhibitors in true pantomime style. Great Danes and Dachshunds were assigned to him. In the former breed our German friend was original, if nothing else, as in awarding special prizes, he took good care that they were evenly distributed, regardless of what the dogs had done in the regular classes. Mr. Walter S. Glynn, of London, England, will be remembered as judging a few years ago at Toronto. His quiet manner created a favorable impression, and he took solid comfort in his long briar pipe while judging the Terrier classes. To New Yorkers, this was indeed an innovation. Canada supplied Mr. Lance Farewell, who judged Cockers in his usual careful manner, and Charles Lyndon, who took on a medley of breeds. Thirteen other judges—home talent—made up the slate. The enormous magnitude of the show prevents more than a passing comment on the dogs.

On passing along the aisles, the first to attract one's attention are the big breeds. For the first time in many years, not a single Mastiff was on view.

St. Bernards were not numerous, and there were few good ones on view—how have the mighty fallen as compared with a few years ago. Great Danes were a grand lot, the fine exhibit of Harlequins being an especial feature. Bloodhounds, though not in great numbers, were of the highest quality. Miss Amy L. Bonham has a wonderful hound in Imperial Panther II. His head is a study and he excels elsewhere. So good was he that he was voted the second best specimen in all the show, of all breeds. Russian Wolfhounds. As Mr. Joseph B. Thomas, Jr., the master of Valley Farm, was judging, outside exhibitors had a chance to win a prize or two. However, as most of the winners were bred at Valley Farm, it was a family affair. The turnout was a grand one.

Pointers and Setters were immense classes. As B. F. Lewis, the well-known handler, has made several trips across the Atlantic to purchase sporting dogs, and is given carte blanche by his wealthy clients, the best procurable were on exhibition. Mrs. Charles Waters, of St. Thomas, was an exhibitor in the Pointer classes, and was well up with the winners.

Sporting Spaniels. Clumbers, thanks to the efforts of Mr. Murray Bohler, of the Norwood Kennels, were a good lot, though few in number. Fields, as usual, were few in number. The same exhibitors, Messrs. Greer, Keasby, and Viti, had it all their own way. Irish Water. The Rev. T. Moore-Smith, who recently had to choose between his pulpit and his dogs (and chose the latter, of course), had a fine team on exhibition. Cockers. Not as many as usual. In the juvenile division there was not a single specimen likely to be heard from again. To pass on to the older dogs, we find the best in the show, for some queer reason, left on his bench. We refer to Mr. James S. Clarke's grand dog Kildare. Though entered for competition, he was found to be suffering from a small abscess on his neck—a blemish of minor significance—and conveniently left on his bench. Mepal's Norman, voted the best black dog, is a nice cobby specimen, though rather strong in skull. George Douglas came next with Hindoo King, a dog with a grand head and eye, but rather light bone, and not in good condition. Red and parti-colored dogs were not up to New York form. Bitches—Here quality abounded, for we met a new face that was worth a day's journey to see. Mr. Bloodgood, with the wonderful blood he has at his disposal, may be depended upon to breed at least one good one a year. This year he introduced the best he has ever shown in Mepal's Iole, by Mepal's Victor II., ex-Mepal's Dagmar. This is a black bitch of the highest quality, grand head and eye, rare bone, legs and feet, short, compact body, and a gay mover. At present she lacks maturity. She had to give way on this account to Rosa Lee,

With the advent of the new Cocker Club, which was formed at this show, and begins with a membership of about seventy-five, we may look for better things to come.

Collies. These were enormous classes and the highest quality we remember seeing at New York. As about all the best Collies in England and Scotland are now owned in America this is no small wonder. Dr. Henry Jarrett, as usual, gave entire satisfaction in making the awards. A grand lot of puppies came forward, and it may be noted especially, that this year the winners were American bred. The winning dog puppy is a grand big self sable, Ravenswood Reward, owned by Mrs. Gardener, of Chicago. In the class—an immense one—for bitch puppies, the blue ribbon went to another lady, Mrs. Gordon, of Toronto. Her King Edward Water Witch is a slashing big youngster with a grand coat of right texture. She is a taking sable and white with a head of good

This is a big black, tan and white, with a grand coat, body, outline, legs and feet. His head is of good length, and his ears and expression all one could wish. He won all before him till he met that good Collie

Ch. Southport Sculptor, and even then might have won. Unfortunately he is lost to Canada, for the judge, Dr. Jarrett, lost no time in securing him for the Chestnut Hill Kennels, at a price reputed to be a thousand dollars. Third came the much heralded Southport Student, handled by his former owner, W. E. Mason, of England. This is an immense sized sable dog with a long head and likewise a long body. He carries a profuse coat and is decidedly of the catchy order. On close examination he is found to have very large, though well carried, ears, and hind-quarters that suggest unsoundness. He has seen his best days and his astute owner may be congratulated on selling him for a big price. He goes on to California and will have as kennel mates Champion Anfield Model, Wishaw Leader and many another expatriated celebrities. The bitches were like the dogs, a wonderful lot. Here Ch. Ballyarnett Faultless was more fortunate than her kennel mate Student, for she rightly won all before her. This is a big, racy sable and white bitch with a lovely head, ears and expression. At present she is not in full coat. Many good Collies, with champion before their names, had to put up with a V.H.C. card, so strong was the competition. In the tri-color class, Mr. Roy again won with Ch. Balmoral Baron, looking wonderfully well. Champion Squire of Tytton, in grand form, was for exhibition only. It may be remarked that Alex Smith, of Auchairnie fame, had the Greystone Kennel's dogs in excellent condition.

recent years. This may be termed a compliment to Mr. Glynn, who is known as a high authority at home and abroad. For the past few years the prizes have been monopolized by two or three powerful kennels, with their "hundred brood bitches and galaxy of stud dogs." Though these kennels still struggle for supremacy, a few unknown owners have crept into the prize list, which must encourage the small breeder for, after all, they are the ones who ought to breed the winners. The best blood in the world is to be found at our very doors, and if we don't take advantage of it, we have no one to blame but ourselves. For instance, the sire of the best Fox Terrier dog at New York is owned in Toronto. The sire of the best bitch, who also won the special for best of all breeds, is available to Canadian breeders within easy distance of Toronto. Many more equally well bred sires may be had close at hand. The dog puppy class was a big one, and a hard one to separate. Eventually the competition narrowed down to two youngsters of widely different types. The winner, Mr. Keyes' Hillcrest Fiat, by Ch. Sabine Resist, is a charming little Terrier, moulded on old-fashioned lines as to size, but with the finish that goes to make up the Terrier of the present. This little gentleman has substance and quality and few faults, but for a dog, we would call him two sizes too small. Sabine Retainer, by Ch. Sabine Result, is quite a different sort. He has the dense black markings of his sire, together with size,

substance and quality—emphatically a modern type. A bit lower down was found the Oxford Kennels' Oxford Rake by Oxford Blue. This is a puppy of beautiful quality, rare long head, neat ears and good bone and front. He should be heard from later on. The novice class went to Miss De Cappett's Windermere Rival, a well balanced Terrier, with few faults. Coming to the open and winners classes we find last year's Toronto winner, Warren Blue Blood, carrying all before him—a grand dog, beautiful in head, ears, neck, front, body and coat. Barring being a trifle heavy in shoulders, he is hard to find fault with. Mr. Wm. Morris, Toronto, may feel proud in owning the sire of this good Terrier, for Norfolk Dark Blue claims this honor. The bitches were a lovely lot. Again we find unknown exhibitors being rewarded. The first and second puppies, Mr. Herzberg's Lindewald Alma and Mr. Shields' Niadanac Netta—both good ones—whipped in ahead of entries from the Sabine and Rutherford Kennels.

The open class contained two exquisite specimens in Mr. Rutherford's peerless Warren Remedy and her daughter Warren Rarity. The former seems to improve with age, and to find fault

with her seems a futile effort. The English experts, Messrs. George Raper and J. J. Holgate, declared her to be the best Fox Terrier living. Rarity just lacks the class of her illustrious dam.

Wire haired Fox Terriers. Not as numerous as the smooths, but a good lot. Puppies contained nothing of especial merit. The best dog, Endcliffe Prevent, a tan marked one, has a long head and good ears. His bone, front and coat are all good. The best bitch, Gradmira, is a grand specimen, but in poor condition.

Irish Terriers. Mr. Glynn did not seem to be happy in this breed, for a difference of opinion seemed universal.

Bedlington Terriers. Mr. John Kenyon came on from Toronto with a representative brace, and won deservedly.

Airedale Terriers. In these classes Canada came to the fore. The dog puppy class introduced Mr. Laurin's latest importation, Colne President, a puppy of beautiful quality. From lack of development, he was just beaten. Mr. Wrightson Thorp showed a charming bitch puppy in Clipstone Sunbeam and won well with her. Mr. Jas. W. Bain, of Toronto, must have been overjoyed at the sweeping successes of his grand bitch Culmington Nettle. Though her

Bull Terriers. A large entry, but not as many from Canada as usual. What the exhibit lacked in numbers was well discounted by the emphatic victory of Mr. J. Miles' wonderful heavyweight Inferno. He was shown in grand form,

and when you say he is a bit heavy in shoulders, there is little left to criticize.

Bulldogs. The usual big entry, but no five thousand dollar wonder was on view

Mr. E. M. Oldham judged all the toys in a masterly fashion. The entry of Pomeranians was a record one, and, as usual, Canada was creditably represented.

Pacific Advisory Board—What It Is—Its Powers, Etc.

The Pacific Advisory Board is at present very active and no doubt but that the increased interest being taken in dogs on the Pacific coast will give this energetic body plenty to do.

The Secretary to the Board, Mr. E. C. Powell, Vancouver, has sent out a circular letter to those interested in charge of shows. The reprint of it here will serve to familiarize Eastern breeders with the powers, objects and aims of the Board, and will refresh the memories of those who so readily gave the Pacific coast breeders what is practically home government.

This circular letter, which is called No. 1, is, we understand, to be followed by others.

Vancouver, B.C., 27th Jan., 1908.

Dear Sir,—The Pacific Advisory Board to the C.K.C. is composed of one delegate from each club holding an annual show on the coast, with the Vice-President of British Columbia for chairman. Mr. C. M. Rolston, Vancouver, is chairman, and Mr. E. C. Powell, Vancouver, is secretary.

The Board have full discretionary power to deal with protests, disqualifications, suspensions, etc.; to receive and

approve of premium lists and catalogues of the Clubs on the coast giving shows under C.K.C. rules; and they have the practical management of kennel matters on the coast, subject to the Canadian Kennel Club Rules.

I would, therefore, draw your attention to the fact that application for dates of shows, deposit for same, protests, premium lists, marked catalogues and listing fees should be made to the Secretary of the Pacific Advisory Board to the C.K.C. I would also point out that only the "Dog Show Rules" printed on pages 13 to 23 of enclosed pamphlet should be published, and that they must be printed in the premium list and catalogue. On January 10th these rules were revised. These changes appear in the Canadian Kennel Gazette, January number, page 9. In the changes referred to, "The color for winners prize should be yellow," should read "white," instead of "yellow." Your attention is drawn to the "Regulations," on page 23 and following pages, but more particularly to Nos. 1, 2 Sec. 1, 3 Sec. 3, 5, 9, 10, 11, 12 and 13.

As soon as premium list is published two copies (one for Secretary of C.K.C.

and one for Secretary of Pacific Advisory Board) should be sent to Secretary of P. A. B. for approval.

Within ten days of close of show two marked catalogues, with listing fees, must be sent to Secretary of P. A. B.; at end of catalogue please state number of dogs actually benched and sign with your name.

Your particular attention is drawn to paragraph 1, re certificate, page 20. This certificate should be sent to Toronto direct.

I would also ask you to send a marked catalogue to Mr. J. P. Norman, Secretary Pacific Advisory Committee, P. O. Box 283, Berkeley, Cal. This last is not compulsory, but is a courtesy extended between the two Advisory Boards for their convenience and information.

The Cocker Spaniel Club has adopted the same Standard as that in use by the American Spaniel Club.

We are actuated solely by the desire to create such keen competition among our members at all shows that the interests of the breed we represent will be promoted, with its attending advantages to show associations.

We require no classification for any variety of sporting Spaniels except Cockers. And in this regard we ask that we be given such a liberal classification as will permit us to offer our largest allotment of specials. Our more valuable prizes will be reserved for those which have become known as "six to one" shows—that is, where the prize money in each of the limit and open classes for Cockers shall aggregate six times the entrance fee.

Irrespective of this, however, it will be our endeavor to offer, to be won outright, a number of less expensive cups, following substantially the plan, i.e., at all new and one-point shows one cup, at shows which attained two points the preceding year two cups, and three cups to the shows that have gained three points. Some of our gift trophies may be offered at the smaller shows, depending, of course, upon the wishes of the donors.

Some English Terrier Retrospect for 1908

From the English Kennel Gazette.

FOX TERRIERS (WIRE).

By J. B. Gilliat.

To those interested in this breed a retrospect of the past year is on the whole encouraging. This steady increase in its popularity is most marked, as shown by the entries at all leading shows, while the recent improvement in general quality has been well maintained. No one can doubt this for a moment who saw some of the classes it was my privilege to judge at the Kennel Club Show, where many of the carded ones would earlier probably have carried all before them.

The most notable and welcome improvement has been in size. Now, there is a critic that everyone interested in show Fox Terriers has had to suffer under, with a patience that wears continually thinner. He is to be found, as a rule, among hunting friends, and when I meet him after showing or judging, I know exactly what he will say, and out it comes. "He has no use for the modern show Terrier, much too big and leggy, never get to ground; give him the old-fashioned working Terrier," etc., etc. By this I presume he means something with a back like a caterpillar, legs like a Dachshund, and a chest broad enough to stop him following half the dogs on the bench in a small earth. If a Fox Terrier is designed to run with hounds and go to ground, which (notwithstanding the fact that increased pace and a thrusting crowd has relegated this in practice to rough countries), I take it is the standard we should all breed and judge for, then it seems to me we are not far off in the type now to the fore.

I wish such a critic had been at the Palace, and seen the big classes with practically all the bitches of the right size, and the beau ideal of a huntsman's

Terrier in, say, Last of Remus, or Clio of Notts, and others not far from it; while, among the dogs, the big ones were in a minority, and always the seniors. So much for size, and with it I think bone and substance have been generally maintained; shelly and long-coupled ones being rare. When getting one of the "sausage bodied" ones in profile, one has only to think what it would be like after a hard day's running with hounds.

As regards fronts, there is no doubt that a very high standard has now been reached compared to a few years ago, and the old position with the smooths has, I think, been reversed, certainly in the matter of feet. I know that the report will be that this is largely a question of artistic trousering, but in spite of that I claim a balance to the good. Hindquarters may be classed as fair generally, and hind action less satisfactory. It is disappointing to find how many good dogs cannot move their hocks and stifles truly and this is terribly hereditary.

And now for the weak point which is certainly coats. There can be no question about that; at the two big shows at which I judged, I doubt if the really typical coated ones would run into double figures. The most objectionable coated Terriers seem now unfortunately much in evidence, that is to say, the silky muzzled variety. Often their body coat is dense and moderately hard on the day, but every judge knows its hardness is due to perpetual care and to very likely legitimate art. The other day when speaking of this, I was met by the rejoinder, "Oh, but I have seen you give prizes to dogs with coats of that sort." Of course I have had to do so, even in my short experience of judging, and I make no apology. It is a mournful

necessity which may happen to any one approaching his duties to the best of his ability in a judicial spirit, and not that of a faddist. But it does not follow that they have not been debited with the full handicap, or that I do not devoutly trust that their place in the award list may not cause them to be chosen to perpetuate their species. Crinkly coats are also very prevalent, and often lack undercoat, but I do not think them nearly so objectionable. I suppose we have got to pay a price for going to smooth blood for fronts and quality, but it will take some time to breed out.

Coat deterioration seems, perhaps, to have been more apparent the last year or two, but one often hears it assumed that the celebrities of old days were all "sound coated," and this I deny. It is exactly twenty years since I first showed a Wire Fox Terrier and among the champions of that period I knew some and owned one who in private life resembled a sheep. Mr. Field's two fliers of that time, however, Briggs and Miss Miggs, were, I think, both natural coated, and are also the only two who, in my opinion, would be looked at nowadays. The others of that year, as far as I can remember them, would be hopelessly outclassed. But those who contend for ancient superiority have already been frequently answered.

To sum up, I should say that the past year should be noted for the general high quality that has marked its new comers, rather than for any Terriers of very exceptional excellence. Though, perhaps, one or two may be said to have only just missed it, owing to a disappointing "if" here or there, which makes one say, What a pity. The following new faces of note which have appeared during the year must be taken to be a very incomplete list, and I was absent from several leading shows, and also to have been written down in any order.

Among dogs: Gladiator, Newmarket Hard Nut, Duthorne Sportsman, Dusky Rex, Grove Catch, Airport Commodore, Morden Brigand, Morden Bailiff and two I saw at Birmingham, Corn Cob and Wycombe Result.
