Mr. Bailey states they are all healthy, sturdy whelps, and all apparently thrivers. Little Dutch has kept in such good condition that the owner intends letting her raise the litter of five. We trust the future may give us something good from this litter. This young fancier is to be congratulated on getting such good breeding.

Sully Punch Puppies: The Boston Goebel's Tess whelped five puppies to Sully Punch; also Mr. E. P. Hine's, New York, bitch whelped five puppies to Sully Punch. Mr. Ireland's Stratford bitch whelped seven puppies, and all are well satisfied.

Squire of Tytton Puppies: The Collie bitch King Edward Beauty, lately sold by Mrs. Gordon to Mr. J. A. Piper, River Park, Ind., had a nice litter of four by Squire of Tytton, but unfortunately smothered them all. Rather hard lock for Beauty's new owner.

Hamilton Show: We can heartily endorse all that Dr. C. Y. Ford says regarding the very neat and attractive

lecal show of the Hamilton Kennel Club. The number of dogs was surprising, the quality in many breeds excellent, and the benching and management all that could be desired. The little show was reatness in itself.

Our visit being of necessity a flying one, we saw little of the judging. Dr. Ford was billed to take all but the Toys, and was promptly on hand. Mrs. W. Wylie, whose Poms are so frequently in evidence, had the Toys under her judicial care.

As usual, the big dogs were little in evidence, and nothing of great moment was shown, the Russian Wolfhound St. Nicholas II, being the best. At the other extreme, Toys, there were several good Poms, a typical Italian Greyhound of a peculiar color, and no less than twentyfour entries in Yorkshire Terriers. This class had several good ones, especially one that, though light in color, was small, good in coat and all a Terrier. Zclo and Frenchie represented the French Bulldogs, Mr. Carley's entries being observed. being absent. These two are, we think, the first of the breed "bred in Canada," and came from Mr. Carley's kennel. Sporting dogs, outside Spaniels, were not heavy, nor very good. One or two very fair Pointers in Daisy and Porter. One or two Cockers and Collies were largely entered, the former having one hundred and twenty-four entries and the latter sixtytwo. A fine-bodied neat black won in the puppy class (Cockers). There were several other good all-round dogs that we did not see judged. The rest of the entry was scattered, with quite a nice lot of Bostons and a few very decent Fox Terriers predominating. We could see no good reason why this show was not held under C. K. C. rules, and so have the wins count towards championships. But it is, we believe, the purpose of the H. K. C. to hold future shows under these rules.

#### ONTARIO KENNEL CLUB SHOW

NUMBER OF DOGS PRESENT, 414; NUMBER OF POINTS TOWARDS CHAMPIONSHIP, 3.

A liberal amount of publicity, a body of men and women who work, and a list of judges that ran largely along specialist lines, gave the Ontario Aennel Club a greatly increased entry and a winner's value of three points.

The building in which the show was held is fairly central, and while it is rather on the small side, the most was made of the space available, the benches being erected with a view to the economy of space. Mr. Dunbar made an admirable superintendent, and at all times was the show clean and smart. "Teddy" Carlyle, as runner-up, made a good second. He hasn't the size and doesn't grow the coat of Dunbar. Mr. Metcalf's work was well done, and he was backed by a hard-working committee, that kept the judging going in very fair shape. the judging going in very fair shape. The weather was not propitious, but this did not keep the people away, the at-tendance being very good. The air in the building on Saturday was rather damp, and this, accompanied with the must have made it rather trying for the many ladies who exhibited and for the tiny Toy specimens of the canine race

We doubt, always, the advisability of special prizes for "best in show." Such prizes, while attractive to the public, lead to a good deal of friction and consequent heart burning. And this was case here, where a reversal of the first award was made in the second spe-It is always unfortunate that such should happen, as apart altogether from quality, a judge, even an all-rounder, can hardly help being partial to a breed that he favors, and this, too, without his being aware of it. It almost seems unfair to place a judge in such an awkward position. But we fear we are treading on dangerous ground, as we understand that Mrs. Gordon has laid a protest in the case before the O. K. C., and she certainly was quite within her right in doing so.

Most of the judges have favored us with official and detailed reports, for which exhibitors and others interested owe them a big obligation. We, too, are grateful for the opportunity given us of publishing the opinions given for the placings of the dogs. The judge's written opinion should be, and is, one of the most valuable assets of a dog show.

Mr. Lees' report on Bulldogs will appear in next Gazette, elsewhere in this even, if it reaches us in time to get in. Mr. Lees wanted soundness, looked for it, and was consistent in his awards along this line. An unsound specimen found this line. An unsound specimen found little favor in his eyes. Mr. Laurin came specially from Montreal to judge the Airedales, and has promised to put his opinions of those of the breed present in writing for us.

We could not follow Mr. O'Rourke's decision in placing the dam of the great Inferno over her illustrious son. bitch has lasted wonderfully in head and muzzle—a great thing in a Bull Terrier, but she has not the body or style of the dog, was not shown in such grand condition, and we thought her well beaten. Norman Battler is good in foreface and has a nice dark eye that is well placed. The novice winner is good in body and tail, but a bit cheeky. Bill Fox, shown in perfect coat and skin condition, is

also nice in body, but has the same fault, nice eye. He won in the next class, followed by Stockwood Battle, full enough in eye. Victoria II. must have enough in eye. Victoria 11, must have had some difficulty in passing the doctor, her skin was in bad shape. A Terrier-like lightweight. Haymarket Doctor, won in next class, a grand type of Bull Terrier, with the typical body that we appear to be losing; in poor fit, grand eye and foreface, just a bit skully; this dog is a Terrier. Open, dogs, brought Inferno to the front, with Haymarket Doctor following. Wedgewood Belle is well filled in front of eye. Polly Perkins is a bit long in body and tail, good head and eye. Epsom Countess is well known; she lasts wonderfully well.

Burns is good in foreface and eye, quite dark enough in markings, where the winning bitch is better, but is a bit weak in face. The B. and T.'s just a fair lot.

There were no Pointers for Mr. Stone

pass upon, and in English Setters Spot Melrose, shown by Mr. Kenyon, again won, followed by his good son, Major Melrose. But two bitches, where Luella fairly beat Red Cloud. There was a grand collection of Irish Setters, the winning dog a wonderful-headed one that must have given Mr. Thorp some uneasy moments when judging for "best in show." More attention to coat and condition would have helped him.

WHAT MR. WATSON SAYS OF HIS CLASSES.

In Foxhounds the classes were very small, there being only seven dogs in the show. Outside of Turk, the winning dog, who is an American and an extra good one—he is a nice stamp of Foxhound, and one of the best we have seen for some time—and the winning bitch, who shows her age but yet won easily, the rest are not out of the ordinary, being too much Harrier; indeed, some of them should have been shown in a Harrier class.

In Beagles there was quite a nice little show of eleven dogs. The novice class brought out two nice ones in Jas. Miller's who came second, he won Paddie, first in the limit class over 13 inches; and Mr. Habart's Spinning Jenny, who ought to be heard from later. These, with Mr. Habart's Roy and one more, Wee Melody, were the only ones worth mentioning, the others being just ordinary

There were only three Dalmatians present; they were all nice, well set up, and among the best we have seen. The winner was an especially nice one, excelling in ear carriage and nicely marked.

Irish Water Spaniels-there was only one, but he was a cracker, good in coat, and he looked quite equal to the work for which he was intended.

#### COLLIES AND OLD ENGLISH SHEEP DOGS.

In puppy dogs, Mr. Jno. O'Donnell's Pride of Strathmore won easily, he excels in expression and head and is a nice, upstanding dog. Second, Mrs. Metcalfe's Walden Deputy, is not as taking a dog as first, but yet a nice one. Third, Diamond Prince, another fair one, not out of ordinary. In novice, Pride of Strathmore again took the blue, with Mr. Dan. Thody's Westminster Duke second; he is little on large size and is not as fine

boned as first. Mr. McEwen's Holyrood Professor came first in limit; he is a grand one, but might be a little harder in coat. King Edward Kennels' Southport Star took the red; he fails to winner in size only, being a little small, his coat is of grand texture. Edgbaston Dandy got third; he was not in show condition and is beginning to show age. Open, dogs, an exact repetition. In puppy bitches Gregory's Dixie won easily over Walden Daisy in coat and gen-eral condition; latter has not the ears of first. Novice bitches introduced the best Collie in the show, the famous King Edward Water Witch; she has a grand head, good coat, and above all, is an A1 shower; the only fault that could be found with her is in her feet. Second, Mrs. Metcalfe's Walden Primrose, is only fair, she is bit off in ears and was not put down in show condition. Third, Mrs. Bell's Standard Baroness, nice but heavy and bit aged. Third, Lu Lu, only fair. In open class, Water Witch won easily, with R. C. Binning's Ochill Surprise second; the latter is a nice one, but has not the Collie head of Witch; she has a good body. Walden Violet got third; she is a good Collie, but not out of the ordinary. In the other than sable and white classes there were two nice dogs in King Edward Pilgrim and Walden Black Watch. The former won easily; he has a nice expression, but was out of coat. In the bitches it was just a repetition; we have referred to the winners before. In the green class, Rosedale Rabb secured first over Rob Roy, on his showing only; he was a nice shower and in good condition. Rob Roy excelled in head and general conformation, but he is not a pleasing color, would not show himself, and was not in best of condition.

The Old English Sheep Dogs were a good class; there was not a poor one among the seven dogs present. Bell, owned by Mr. Cavan, won in puppy

and novice classes, and is certainly a nice one, grand coat. In limit, Mr. Cavan won first, second and third with Shenstone Ben, a good dog, with size, nice coat; Shenstone Bell, and Shenstone Bettie, in the order named. These are three nice dogs, and are a good addition to the Canadian fancy. Open was a repetition.

Second, Louise, has a fair body, not so good in head, legs or feet. Novice class had five entries. Josie, first, is a good all round bitch, but showing age; Flirt, second; Louise, third. The rest of the class were only very ordinary specimens. In limit class, Queenie, one of the best Greyhounds in Canada to-day, was easily first. She was shown in very poor condition, which would have spoiled her chances considerably had there been the usual competition in this breed. John Ruskin, second, is coarse and was too fat. Open class was a repetition of limit.

Whippets-Whisper II., first in puppy, shows nice outline but poor feet and head. He won also in novice, with Rex, rather poor specimen, but the only other entry present, second. In open class that good little bitch, Jean Marie, scored easily; her general make up is hard to beat. San Toy is a very nice type, well put together, and easily scored second in the class. Whisper II. was placed third.

Third, Ashland John Brophy, shown out of condition, but has excellent bone, good body, and shall needs more wrinkle. and skull needs more wrinkle.

Novice-In this class Rodney Blackmask and Blaskstone Ivel again scored first and second, third to Norman Duke I.; this dog has good bone, front, and very fair head, needs more substance. Limit, dogs—First to Rolling Stone

that has a good head and expression, immense skull, excellent bone, grand front, with more age will be a very hard dog to beat. Second to Rodney Blackmask. Third Blackstone Ivel. Open same as limit.

Puppy, bitches numbered four, of which Lady Quality Stone was easily first. She is a little cart horse, very active, lots of bone and good head for a puppy. Second Sherwood Stepping Stone, a nice puppy, but not developed like the winner. Third a good sort, but not in condition, both second and third were much behind the winner in condi-

Novice, bitches-Lady Chesney Stone headed this division, she is good in body, low to ground, good bone, very fair head. Second to Lady Quality Stone. Third Sherwood Stepping Stone.

Limit, bitches-Dundee Countess first, a nice red bitch, has flat skull, perfect pear shaped body, short coupled, good bone, absolutely sound and very active. Second, Ivanhoe Kitty, a grand bitch, has lots of substance, preferred by some ringsiders to the winners; she loses to the winner in eye expression and action. Third, Peggy Stone, a real good sort, was unfortunate in being lame in a front and a hind leg, and while the lameness is only temporary it was too much of a handicap for her to carry. A. A. Lees.

#### BOSTON TERRIERS.

Although the largest entry in the show the quality was on the whole only fair. The puppy dog Sir Preston Wil-liam was far the best in his class

and will improve with age. Revilo Wiland will improve with age. Revilo William was a good second in the novice and limit 12-17, but had to give way to Merry Boy in the open. Wahnetah's Peter Pan, well shown and in perfect condition, was easily the best dog in limit and open. Highlana Glorious entered in puppy class looked fully eighteen monthts old and was disqualified. teen monthts old and was disqualified for being entered under a wrong name. Happy Day, a small specimen with a poor muzzle, did not show well and was shown with his ear up in splints. Auburn Flash, reserve in limit and open, was shown by a novice and acted very badly or he might have done better, as he is a tidy Terrier and in the pink of condition.

In novice and limit bitches, 22-28, Parkview Jess was an easy winner and was only beaten for reserve winners by a hair's breadth. Lady Careless in limit, open and winners was easily the best and had she been in better condition would probably have given Peter Pan a tighter run for best Boston in

In puppy bitches Jessie was a very fair specimen, with the exception of being a little domey in skull.

In Toy bitches the three were very evenly matched, Miss Peggy winning, Rialto Dot second, and Miss Wise shown heavy in whelp, a good third.

Green dogs and bitches-Molly a very good bodied bitch, but poor in muzzle and fore legs won, with Princess Dena

#### MR. WRIGHTSON THORP'S CLASSES.

Scottish Terriers, a small entry, three only. Mr. P. Doyle's Smug came first. She was put down fit, and showed weil. F. S. Haines' Yarrow Piebroch I liked much. He owns a really good head, short back, good spring of rib, and good tail. He is straight and well-boned. His rough condition and refusal to show placed him behind the winner. B. F. Gregory's May Yohe requires time. Skye Terriers had only two worth not-

ing. Wattie Scott, the winner, is a highclass one, excelling in shortness of back, coat, head and ears, one of the best I have seen for some time. Mr. Robert Hodge put him down in good shape. Second went to Hugh Cameron's Queen Alexandra. She fails to winner in shortness of back, and her ears are not so good; still, she is a good specimen.

Bedlington Terriers, novice dogs and bitches. Mrs. Theo. Coleman won with Jock o' Dundurn, a nice bodied one, good legs and feet; fails a bit in head; he was put down in good trim. John H. Kenyon's Haslingden Beauty came second; a good puppy wanting time. Limit dogs and puppies, first went to Haslingden True Game; a typical dog; bit long in back; he is better in head than Jock o' Dundurn, who came second. Haslingden Nettle was also beaten in head. She does not stand quite true.

Open dogs repeats, excepting Crowney, who was placed third. He has substance, but is lacking in outline and quality.

Fox Terriers were the poorest lot I have ever been called upon to judge, and outside Beppo, a useful puppy with long head, Oxford Rake, Oxford Dow and Oxford Don, the latter excelling in body and length of head, none are worth noting in dogs. In bitches, Oxford Brilliant got away from Aldon Trifle, who is a bit on the big side. She should be valuable in the breeding kennel. Wire hairs call for no comment, and it was with much reluctance that I handed out the ribbons, for to give companionable dogs prizes is no way to improve the breeding of dogs.

Pugs had only two, a black and a fawn, who won. The latter has a larger head, better ears; "spectacles," too, are set wider apart. He is also more cobby than the black, who, however, scores in straightness of front and tightness of curl in tail.

Pomeranians were fairly well filled classes. Cairndhu Romeo, the winner, requires time. He is lacking, too, coat, which causes him to appear a little on the leg. Liale Betsey and Flossie Flounce won't do. It is a pity Kensington Queen is a cripple behind. limit dogs and bitches there was no de-nying Mrs. Wylie's Cairndhu Tot. She has a good stand-off coat and plenty of it, and is sound in color. She is shapely, and shows lots of quality. Little Belle would probably have been higher had she shown better and been in condition. The majority of exhibitors do not pay enough attention to this part of the game, with the result that a judge who knows his business is reluctantly obliged to peg many a good dog down. The owners have no one but themselves to blame, for no judge worth his salt would put up a dog who will not show himself or who is not in show condition. In King Charles Spaniels there is much room for improvement. Blenheim Spaniels brought out James Scott's recent importation, Lala. She is type all through, and when she recovers from her long voyage and regains her coat will trouble any that are likely to be at New York. Those who breed Toy Spaniels (English) will do well to carry her type in their eye and breed to it.

Yorkshire Terriers were disappointing. There was not a good show specimen entered and shown. The principal thing, color and coat, is altogether neglected. Dandy, who got special for the best in the show, was a long way from filling my eye, Mrs. Jackson's Lady can only be classed as a good colored and quality brood bitch. Mrs. Crowther's imp. Peg is good in color, but has a roached long back. I have bought scores of her kind in Yorkshire to send to Paris at from \$10 to \$15 each. Toy black-and-tans—J. E. Dickert's Dude won in limit. The markings are not quite clean; otherwise she is good, and the same may be said of Bussy Hussy. English Terriers produced three, Flossie, a fairly good specimen, the other two were bad Whippets on the small side.

#### GREAT DANES.

We have not been blessed in Toronto with an over-supply of good Great Danes, the majority being too much of the Uncle Tom's Cabin Bloodhound type. If only some of our wealthy citizens with large grounds or parks, would try some of these magnificent creatures, their ornamental appearance, their dignified and graceful ose, entirely free from coarseness, combined with their perfect temper, would soon make them universal favorites. The best specimen by a very large margin was Odin, a very large brindle puppy of beautifully fine, graceful lines, entirely free from all coarseness; he has a wonderfully long muzzle, squarely cut, a well-balanced skull, free from cheekiness, surmounted by ears perfectly cropped and carried; body generally good, though shown too thin, sound hind legs. His faults were want of stop, which age will

remedy, a tail slightly curled, and a left front leg not too sound at pastern. Next was a nice blue, Imperator, fine in muzzle, tail too long, and losing to first every-where a little bit. Third, Tige, a brindle very strong everywhere, almost inclined to coarseness, but with grand skull, with good stop, head, chest, excellent front, but too full in loins and beefy behind. With ears cropped and shown thinner he would be a hard nut to crack for the best of them. All above were good, sound Danes, and well above the average we are blessed with here. The fifth, Major, a large black, was the kind a Dane should not be. His head was coarse, wide between ears, bumpy over eyes, and cheeky, his body a yard long and beefy, his hind legs cow-hocked to the extreme, with a shuffling gait. The fourth, Lady Bess, was a peculiar colored harlequin, nice and fine, but had lost her teeth, long in body, but a pretty fair one except for her very bad color.

#### DACHSHUNDE.

The most sprightly, brightest, most in-telligent and most wilful and winsome of the whole dog family. Why they don't go ahead and become popular it is hard They have always had a few isolated enthusiasts, but never enough to make it interesting, and the genus dog fancier is a gregarious animal. Here again one dog stood out alone, imp. King Reginald, a really good red, and one just about as good as there is, barring the color of his eyes and nose, which are light and should be black. He is absolutely sound, good in body, and a superlative head, wonderfully long, flat and well shaped, free from stop. He is a grand one to breed black and tan bitches to, and could improve the stock here a lot Second, Windycroft Poacher, just as good in body and soundness, with good color in eyes and nose, but a woefully weak head, round in skull, a bad stop, wanting under the eyes; in fact, head almost a Beagle, the same fault also being even more pronounced in the red bitch Windy-croft Trixie. The dapple Lord Spotty was too wide between the ears and slim in body. The little lightweight, Lady Nick, had a pleasing head and nice ears, might have been sounder in legs, but good for so small a one.

Number restricted to the County of Wentworth, the handsome total of over two hundred actual dogs, and as many more entries, mustered in the Armory Rink and filled that structure to its ut most capacity. Under C. K. C. rules there is little doubt but that five hundred dogs could have been procured, as, be it known, Hamilton has always been a leader in matters canine, and many a New York winner has emanated from its boundaries. The present body of fanciers have absorbed the old Gore Kennel Club, and new blood is liberally infused. The old guard were, of course, on hand, and many faces who were seen at the shows here in the early nineties were again seen at the ringside. Of the recent element many a good fancier led a dog into the ring for the first time, and general interest ran high during the

hours of judging.

The showing of dogs, like the racing of a horse, is often open to surprises and disappointments. As a whole, the writer has nothing but good to say of both winners and losers alike. Of the latter, there was a little feeling exhibited, but then that must be expected in those new at the game who have not as yet learned to take their medicine with equanimity. Did all judges think alike. showing would soon be limited to a chosen few. To be a good loser, and to be the first to grasp the hand of the more fortunate winner, whether you think otherwise or not, is the insignia that stamps the true lover of sport. The show held in Hamilton was generally dominated by this spirit.

The management was in most capable hands. The judging ring was under the stewardship of Mr. W. M. Clendenning, formerly secretary of the Hamilton Jockey Club, who proved an expert at getting the dogs promptly into the ring -an impossible matter at most shows, Another efficient officer was the genial Mr. E. H. Barnfield, who was always about to furnish assistance, Mr. Robert Colvin, who has been playing havoc with Bulldog prizes lately, was secretary treasurer, and had everything in running order. Mr. W. J. Jackson and Mr. A. A. Lees, as president and vice-president respectively, are, to use the modera vernacular, "too well and favorably known for further description." Mr. Geo. H. Carley, who has guided so many Hamilton shows to a successful issue, is at present too busy a man to devote the necessary time to managing a dog show. However, he was in evidence in a quier way, being too good a fancier to forsake his old love, A hard-working committee, consisting of A. G. Bain, A. Benzie, E. Mosgrove, F. Small, H. J. and Martin O'Neill, and the aforementioned officials, brought the show up to a successful issue. A detailed account of some of the winners will appear in the May Gazette. C. Y. Ford.

## A CHATTY LETTER FROM THE COAST.

To-day I was at the depot shipping a youngster to a gentleman up-country, and one would have thought that a canine special was running. There was a whole bunch of crates for Mr. Colin I<sup>o</sup>. Jackson, containing two ripping Collies, a fine Airedale, and a Dandie Dinmont, the latter being the first of its kind that I ever admired. He looked a real Terrier as he tried to get at a Chow-Chow staring saucily into his box.

By the look of the crates they came from England, where they don't consider express charges. Isn't a Bachus type of crate strong enough for this journey? If Mr. Jackson has this bunch long on his hands, however much he may wish to keep them, I shall be much mistaken. The heads of those Collies will take some beating, and in bone and coat they should not lose points; and that Airedale's coat would make good brushes for a dynamo.

With the advent of the shows enquiries for stock are coming in. I was serry to have to sell Daddy's Double, a good son of Dartmouth and grandson of Dukedom. He more than fitted the fifty I asked for him, but the others! have are worth more to me. They are remarkable for a lot of dog in a small compass. My first litter for the year came last week, and counted eight, mostly males.

Advertising in the Gazette seems to be all right, for this year I have had enquiries from Montreal, St. Joe, Miss., and Calgary, quite a range to get in touch with.

I think quite a large contingent will leave here for Victoria, B.C., the 1st of April, and it is the opportunity for competition more than premium awards which will take the crowd over, as only the real fanciers will ever show outside this city, and the true fancier does not care for "pots" after once getting a few. Cup premiums are all right to advertise a show, and to interest those people who care a lot for their dog as a pet, and would like to show a silver cup which it had won.

Personally, I would cut out all cups from the breeders' classes; for example, the open class in the popular breeds, except challenge cups and cash awards, but the latter would have to be substantial enough to be interesting. At present most of my own cups are in the trunk-room, but I must admit that a certain photo of some of them has sold more than one dog. A list of winnings would have done as well, of course, and when one has a win in the open class, I think that's good enough, unless, as occasionally happens, a youngster cuts one out in winners.

The Vancouver Kennel Club starts out

this year on a new departure locally, viz., cash prizes in addition to the usual awards. This was not carried without a good deal of discussion, chiefly on the score of finances, but eventually it was allowed to go through on the chance of its being an extra drawing eard, which would pay for itself. In any case the club will not be much out, especially if the example of one true-spirited member, who offered to make up in part any shortage, be generally followed.

We heard that Mr. F. Welsh, of Sunshine Kennels fame, was glued to the Fox Terrier ring in New York when last seen. [We saw him safely west.—Ed.] We also hear that he considers the Coast dogs better than most of that lot.

Mr. Colin F. Jackson, who has been visiting some of the best English shows, also says that we have a much better class of dogs here than we usually credit ourselves with. But this is only natural, after all. None of our popular breeds are indigenous to British Columbia, and those imported were of the best. In Irish Water Spaniels and English Setters a line of breeding has been established here as delights the eye of such experts as Major Taylor, used as they are to seeing the cream.

It is said that the first Vancouver horse show held this week has 30 more entries than Montreal had last year. Let the East look to it that the West does not lead them in dog shows, too, before very long.

The show was held in the Drill Hall, right in the heart of the city. The building is large and airy, with great high ceilings, the perfect ventilation preventing all disagreeable odors, The judging ring was large and well lighted, the kennels big with ample bedding, Mr. Jack Wallis looking after the blackboard giving results, and did it well, the awards being up immediately they were made. Mr. Geo. F. Dunn made a most efficient and obliging secretary, his official duties, and they were heavy, ing run in up-to-date style. Mr. Frank Turner was superintendent, and the judges had no waiting, each class being ready to follow that preceding it. We must say a good word for the committeemen, too. At least two, and generally three or four, were in the building at all times, and each man knew what his business was and did it. The classes were judged in catalogue order.

In puppy dogs, Arbutus Spot, showing great quality and excelling in eye and front, won from a high class pup in Royal Ranger, not so good in front. Rodfield Sport, not so deep in chest, nor showing so much character, came third. Novice dogs-Togo of Japan, with well-formed head, deep chest, strong back and good shoulders, but ears carried rather high, won in a large class. Arbutus Dash, stronger in head, but beaten in body and eye, came second. Mallwyd Doc, third, shows quality, but fails in hind quarters astern. Limit dogs—The new face here, Royal Fritz, came third. He moves wide behind and is not quite correct in his front. Otherwise he has a good head, and is full of character. Miss Davie's Rockline Young Boy won in a strong class. He has a wonderful head, neck and shoulders. For the cup, he was beaten by Champion Mallwyd Bob, who competed for specials only, in back and feather, although he is much better sprung in rib. Second and third have already been noticed. Rox, a large dog with good head, pressed Malwyd Doc close for third place. Puppy bitches-Fernwood Rose, a very exceptional little bitch, and well feathered, won well, ties, but is not so pleasing in front. Royal Bell has very good head proper-Queen, third, not so strong on leg, is well furnished, and has a particularly good head and eye. Novice bitches-Bell's Beauty, with good back and head, but flat-sided, won. Rebe Montez, with good head, is shelly in body and not so strong before the eyes. Third, Mallwyd Doris is a good-bodied bitch. Limit bitches—First, Rockline Flirt, with grand back, well ribbed and deep-chest-Flirt, with ed, is not quite correct in pasterns, but a grand bitch all over. She also won in the open, and beat Mallwyd Bob for the special. Bell's Beauty, not so good in chest and ribs, came second. Arlentus Pearl, with fair head, but not quite pleasing in back, came third. Open pleasing in back, came third. Open bitches—Rockline Ladybird, rather wide in front, divided first and second in the last class.

Irish Setters-In puppy dogs, Duke of Wellington had an easy win, beating Trix in size, head and color. Novice dogs -Bobs is a very big dog, well feathered, though a little stiff behind. Duke of Wellington came second. Tim O'Hara, third, is too small. Limit-Mickey Green, light in eye, but a very good dog otherwise, was alone. He was beaten in the open by Mr. Ella's Prince; better, but not quite correct, in eye; he excels in color, head properties and general conformation. Novice bitches-Victoria Kathleen, a fair bitch, beat Juno in eye and substance. Open bitches--Nellie, quite the best in head, color and body, beat the rest and took the winner's prize. Jess, second, is wanting in foreface.

Gordon Setters-This was a rattling good class, better than ever before seen at local shows. Puppy dogs-D. W. Hanbury's Mack, with a grand head, dark eye, and well-placed ear, beat another good one in Prince D., who is wider in front. Giant was off the bench when these notices were taken, so could not be criticized. Novice dogs-This class brought out a great dog in C. S. Restorer, perfectly proportioned in body, legs and stern, with lively coat, feather and action; he is light in head proper-ties for a Gordon. Second came Jack, rather wide in skull and not so "classy," but a rattling good dog. Julius Caesar, third, wants character in head. Limit dogs-C. S. Restorer beat Pomper Beaver everywhere except in head; the latter owning the fine Gordon head and eye, but not good in hind ac-

tion. Third went to Jack, mentioned Open dogs-With Restorer not above. entered, Pomper Beaver scored a win. The new face, Mr. Hall's Jack, was placed third. He fails in his underplaced third. He fails in his under-standings. Bitches—Nellie, good in head but light in eye, beat Norah, who is rather coarse in head for a bitch. Countess Belle, alone in the open, beat Nellie for winner's prize, being stronger in head and owning a grand body, with well sprung ribs and sound Taking the Setters all through, the Gordons have made most progress. The English Setters are not in the quality of the best dogs, what they were two years ago. A remarkable feature in the results was the fact that out of 24 class prizes 17 were won by dogs owning Mr. Hickford's Mallwyd Bob as their sire. He has proved wonderfully successful in reproducing his own type. In Hickford's Arbutus kennel was one of the sights of the show, the dogs winning a large proportion of the prizes and being put down in tip-top condition.

Pointers—Puppy dogs—Shot, very good in body, but a little wide in skull, beat Bruce, a good headed one, who came second, well ahead of Mr. McQuade's Spot. Limit dogs—Victoria Boy, in great form, was a long way ahead of the rest. It would be hard to find a fault in this dog. Richard McBride was third in open. He was in wretched form, and refused absolutely to show himself. Puppy bitches—Wilson's Spot, excellent all round, beat a high quality bitch in Oregon Vixen, Victoria Point coming third. Wilson's Spot won limit, open and winners.

Irish Water Spaniels—Dogs and bitches were classed together. Only three were shown, justifying the meagre classification. Mr. Taylor's Burrard Biddy was away ahead of the same owner's Pat She is typical in expression and body lines, rather loose in coat. Burrard Pat is not very pleasing in hindquarters and coat, but well ahead of Girl, who fails in eye and general character.

Field Spaniels—These were judged as a working class rather than on the sectional points usually associated with the name, the winners prize being by common consent not awarded for this reason. C. F. Jackson's Chum carried off premier honors in puppy and open. This dog is the best result so far obtained from the efforts of local sportsmen to

ceme second and third. Novice dogs-Rogue, irresistible as usual in spite of his soft coat, won right through his classes, including winners. He has splendid neck, loin and quarters, and great Terrier character. Hazelton Jimmy is too light and small, being weak behind, but has a well-shaped head. Limit dogs-Charlton Bristles, wide in front, was second to Rogue. Open dogs-Rogue was placed over Sunshine Bristles, which is large and full of Terrier character. Charlton not very pleasing in coat, although Bristles followed. In this class an undeniable and unaccountable error was made, one of only two in the whole of the show. Leading Chance, an excel-lent Terrier with correct coat, the best head in the class, well-placed ear and the very best of fronts, a really good all-round dog, was passed over, apparently through an oversight. This dog was unquestionably better than second, and would by many judges have been placed first in the class. Bitches—Sunshine Mattie, first open and winners, is heavy in ear; otherwise a good bitch. Lewanta Weaselle, second, has quite good ears, head and coat.

Scottish Terriers-Mrs. Bradley-Dyne showed two very neat, thick-set, sound in limb and hard in coat. Both lack foreface and ear carriage is low.

Irish Terriers-These showed a great improvement over previous shows on the Coast, no really inferior specimens being benched. Puppy dogs—Western Administration is typical, good in coat, ex-cellent eye and front, but a bit faulty in one ear. Second went to Count Rufus, lighter in eye and likely to grow too big. Sport, third, was outclassed. No-vice dogs—Mick, who later beat the open dog in winners, has the fine coat and is built on the right lines. His car carriage is a trifle wide. Nip, winner in open dogs, is not so good in front and back as Mick, but was several lengths ahead of Carney Delaney. Puppy bitches -Western Speculation, rather light in eye, but otherwise very correct, with good head, won from Clodagh, not right in expression. Open bitches-Western Mona has a good head, but fails in ear carriage. She is not so good in shoulder as the pup whom she beat in winners. Saanich Sweetheart is not so good in skull and coat.

Airedale Terriers—Quite a good en-try turned out, including some locally bred youngsters of high quality. Puppy dogs-Mr. Webster's Dauntless won, more typical than Riot. He has a fine head, but not enough of it, a dark eye, but too round and is at present soft in coat. Good in ribs and quarters fair,

but long coupled. Novice dogs-Rex, locally bred and a dog of considerable merit, won. He is light throughout, but has a well-shaped head, good feet and the making of a good coat when in better form. Ebinge Royal has great length of head and good muzzle, but not so good as Rex in shoulder and chest formation. Billy was beaten in eye and conformation, Open dogs-Matlock Bob won well in body and leg properties. He is a well-developed imported pup, with perfect shoulders, great depth of chest, powerful short coupled loin, good hind-quarters, legs and feet, and the correct coat. He is wider in cheek than the second, and his eye though well shaped, is light. Clonwell Flockmaster, third, with lovely head, is on the small side, and was badly handicapped by an accident to his hind leg.
