The corners are protected by galvanized steel from top to bottom, making the crate rigid and extremely strong. The use of these crates saves express charges, as they are extremely light in construction, but nevertheless are stronger than the ordinary wooden crate. In price they are quite moderate, running from \$3.00 to \$12.00 each. The engraving shown in the advertisement of this concern will give details of construction better than we can describe them. We can heartily recommend their use.

I thought I would have been renewing my ad. again before this, but had poor luck with some of the puppies this spring. Lost Imperial Sunshine Violetta's whole litter. She had ten, all sable and white, and all were evenly marked with full white collars, tips of tails, blaizes, legs, feet, etc.; eight were dogs and were a real nice lot, but all sickened and died first day after being whelped. Was sorry to lose this lot as there ought to have

been some good ones in this bunch. They were by Brookmere Hopeful, who is keeping up his reputation as a sire, as you will see by the winning bitch puppy at Vancouver, B.C., Kirkdale Queenie by name, who won first in puppy, second in novice, and the silver cup for best collie bitch puppy in the show in competition with the Glen Tana Collies, beating Glen Tana Cleo—a very fine quality bitch who won 2nd, but got 2nd to Glen Tana Catherine, a fully matured bitch of very fine quality, also in novice class. Pity the Vancouver people were late in entering their dogs for the Calgary fair, as I would have liked very much to have seen Kirkdale Queenie at the Calgary show and am quite sure she would have made the best of them go some to beat her, as her owner tells me she has improved wonderfully since the Vancouver show. Kirkdale Queenie is by Brookmere Hopeful and out of Vanguard Idyll, first bitch I bred to Brookmere Hopeful after I got him. I sold her in whelp to a Mr. Abey, of Cambourne, B.C., who after raising Kirkdale Queenie sold her to Mr. John J. Jackson, of Sapperton, B.C., who tells me he didn't get the best one of that litter of nine either, and had the Vancouver people's dogs got down there would likely have been a few more of Brookmere Hopeful's puppies heard from.

An Irish lady: Mr. Geo. Mayall, of Essex, England, recently sent over to that unswerving admirer of the breed, Mr. James Lindsay, Montreal, a good Irish Terrier in Chignon. London Show: London premium list is a big improvement over that of last year in more ways than one. Mr. W. P. Fraser will judge all Terriers, Mr. C. A. Stone, an old "Forest City" boy takes the Setters and Pointers, and Dr. C. Y. Ford returns to take all other breeds. This is a healthy slate for a show like that given in London, and shows the liberal spirit in which the management desires to deal with their patrons.

Entries close on Sept. 8th, with the Sec'y, Mr. A. M. Hunt, the entry fee being but one dollar. Judging is to begin promptly on the Tuesday afternoon at 2 p.m.

The list of specials is a liberal one, beginning with a cash prize of twenty dollars for the handler or exhibitor who wins most points in the show. Ten dollars goes to the next highest. A first prize counts ten points, a second eight points, and a third six points. All breeds are provided for, several of the specialty clubs donating medals and trophies. The regular cash prizes are distributed amongst the novice and open classes. Mr. Hunt will gladly send premium lists to those who ask for them.

Sale of Ch. Mallwyd Bob: Mr. J. S. Hickford has sold the Champion English Setter, Mallwyd Bob, that has done so much winning on the coast, to Mr. J. W. Elliott, of Sidney, B.C. Mr. Elliott continues the stud advertisement of Bob, and no doubt this will be appreciated by coast breeders.

Crowgill Michael: Last issue of Gazette, in reporting the Dominion Day Show at Toronto, did this sterling Irishman an injustice. Despite his lack of teeth he was awarded second in the open class, Mr. Fraser recog-

nizing the true Irish Terrier characteristics of the old dog.

New Collies: Otterburn Constance, the imported bitch owned by Dr. C. Y. Ford, is nursing a grand looking litter of eight by Mr. Hungerford's Champion Sir Roger Trelawney. We shall look forward with interest to the results of this mating.

Plattsburg show: Mr. H. L. Thomas, the well known Bulldog breeder, of Montreal, will judge his favorite breed here, and we hope to see him favored with a liberal entry. The other judges are Mr. J. C. We may add that this was a free and easy function that we hope to see amplified. The dogs were shown in the open and were tied to pegs driven into the ground. The quality was as good as one would expect at an initial show of this kind, Beagles being particularly strong. But then Guelph was always a Beagle town. A rare good old stamp of wire Terrier came out in the winning Fox Terrier, a bitch with dense wire coat, no exaggerations anywhere and with neat ears and good dark eye. The best of the Cockers was the winning red bitch. In fact she was the only one with much pretention to show form.

SECRETARY'S REPORT.

The Secretary's Report, as follows, was distributed.

Mr. Chairman and Gentlemen, I beg to submit the following:

1. Irish Water Spaniel winners at Canadian National, 1907:

Following is correspondence: The Parsonage, Scotch Plains, New Jersey, 25th Feb., 1908.

Dear Sir,—In Sept., 1907, I sent one dog—Irish Water Spaniel, Champion Erin's Doctor Terry—to the Dog Show at the National Exhibition, Toronto. C. H. Armstrong was agent, and Dr. C. Y. Ford, Judge. My dog

got first and first winners, Nora McShane second, and a dog called Barney was sent out of the ring without a card. I instructed Armstrong to collect prize money and when he applied at the office for same he found that Barney was credited with first, and my dog was cardless. He got the clerk in charge to make a note of it in the Judges Book and to write the judge about it. Armstrong also wrote about the matter to the show people, but they have not replied. Then I wrote to Dr. Ford, and by return mail got his reply regretting the mistake, assuring me that my dog won first and first winners, and said he had written the show people and he was sure they would set the matter right. Still I could get no reply. I then wrote Mr. John G. Kent once and Dr. J. O. Orr twice with the same result—letters not even acknowledged. I think I have not been treated very well in this matter and I cannot let it rest. I thought you might possibly use your influence and see that this matter is put right and the prize money sent me before I take the case any further. If you will I shall be very grateful. My dog's name you will find on page 44, number 155, of the official catalogue.

WINNIPEG SHOW.

NUMBER OF DOGS, 272. WINNERS VALUE, 4 POINTS.

The Winnipeg Dog Show Building was crowded this year, in fact benches had to be erected on two sides of the judging ring. If more room had been available, Dr. Bell is confident he could have made the show a five pointer and this will be done next year. The trouble between Calgary and the Pacific Coast exhibit prevented the addition of some hundred entries that it would have taxed the management to accommodate. The following report has been provided us:

To those who in past years have

visited the various bench shows held by the Western Canada Kennel Club and the Winnipeg Industrial Exhibition, the present show must have been a revelation. In going over the grounds no branch of the exhibition has shown such improvement as the dog department. The directors are to be congratulated on their efforts to put the Winnipeg show on a par with those of Chicago and other great western cities. It has been a great source of satisfaction to the bench show committee to see that their efforts to improve the conditions surrounding the show were so appreciated by the public that their entries this year reached the great total of just on three hundred. When one remembers the crude and rough shows of years past, Dr. Bell and the dog show

committee deserve the greatest praise for the vast improvements made in this respect. In place of the unsightly rough boards that last and previous years separated the dogs from one another, this year the benching consisted of a neat platform about two feet from the ground, and each dog was separated from his companion by a neat wire screen. The old building has been enlarged by nearly one-third, the ventilation is perfect, and, as a result, the building is one of the coolest on the grounds. The judging ring is of large size, giving the spectators an ample view of the judging. The whole building looks clean, neat and inviting, and was a revelation to those attending the show.

Another great improvement is the exercising yard. This is adjacent to the building and runs the full length of the building, enclosed by a high fence which prevents dogs being taken from the show by their owners after the judging, as in past years, when oftentimes the dog that wasn't placed in the prize list was taken home for good by his owner. Many of the stalls were decorated, thus adding to the effect. A prize was given for the best decorated stall. The dogs of various breeds were benched together, thus giving visitors a chance of comparing the various dogs.

The judging was done by Mr. Jas. Cole, of Kansas City. Mr. Cole has judged at many of the chief shows in the States, thus having had considerable experience.

The first to come before the judge were the St. Bernards. This was a fair class on the whole, but like all long-haired dogs they do not show in their best condition at this time of the year. The winner, H. G. Warren's Trusty, was a fine large animal of a fairly good type of the breed; second, Mrs. V. K. Evans' Jumbo; third, P. G. Wilderhold's entry. In the open dogs and bitches Mr. Warren's Trusty again won first, with Jumbo second and C. F. Herbert's Lion in third place. In winners class, Trusty was first.

Great Danes.—This was a small class, but the winning dog in it was of excellent class, Mr. N. G. Mann's Glen Rock Hyla being a dog that might be shown in any of the large shows with a great chance of winning out. Prince Leo and Osiris were only ordinary.

Newfoundlands.—Again, as in the previous class, there was one of the best specimens of this class of dog, Mr. Fisher's Nigger being one of the best of this type ever seen in Winnipeg, the judge expressing the opinion that no dogs in the east would have a right to beat him.

Russian Wolfhounds.—This was a

great entry, seventeen dogs being shown. The Rosseau Kennels, owned by Dr. O'Brien, of Dominion City, made a great showing, nearly every dog shown being either bred or shown by the doctor. We could not agree with the judge in all his awards in this class. Thor was better in head and conformation than Mowgli, to whom first was given. All this class were a thorough workmanlike class and where bench show qualities were lacking, ability to kill wolves was apparent, as all these dogs are well known wolf killers in their respective districts.

Irish Wolfhounds.—Fairly good dogs of this class were shown, Dr. O'Brien's Vandal III. being a good sample of his kind.

Bloodhounds.—Only one was shown, being a fairly good sample, rather small in size.

Greyhounds.—This was a poor class, and we certainly should have reversed the judge's award. Chummy, placed second, showed Greyhound character throughout, the first dog, Lulu, being, in our opinion, a cross bred.

Deerhounds.—Some good workmanlike dogs in this class, Benjamin, W. S. Lister's dog, being a good sample of this class. He easily defeated the other dogs shown. Dr. O'Brien's Jeff was the next best, a well put up dog.

Pointers.—This class was one of the largest in the show, and some excellent types for work in the field were shown. There is always keen interest in these classes, as shown by the large entries. The decisions were not well received on the whole. There are a very large number of Manitobans who are interested and Setter and Pointer breeding, and many of our good bred Pointers and Setters have won throughout Canada and the States,

both in the bench and field trials. In yesterday's decisions we see a type of dog set before us, as an ideal, who, by no possible manner of means, can become a field or bird dog, and we are apt to doubt the advantages of bench shows. In the novice dogs we entirely agree with the award to Mr. Wall's King, but in giving the limit, open and winners to Gleeboy Mitre we do not see on what grounds it was given. Except in having a well formed head he was beaten in all respects by two or three other dogs; he lacked Pointer character, tail long and coarse, forelegs too straightly set under him, muscles of hind legs not carried down enough; in fact, he would be one of the last dogs of the bunch shown to be chosen as typical of a Pointer in this part of the world. Minto's win over his old-time rival, Rodondo, was unexpected after Major Taylor and John Davidson had both decided this question the other way. In the bitches class the type on the whole was only ordinary, Mr. Ritchie's Grouse, the winner, being a fairly good type, but snipy in the head.

English Setters.—Again, as in the Pointer class, the decisions were not agreeable to the fanciers of this class. The dogs were of a very average bench type, and Mrs. Mermagen's Saskatchewan Peter was the best of his class. In the bitches we could not agree with the judge. Jessie Whalen, the winner, is a bitch of high Setter type, but for a bench dog is badly off in the head; she is snipy, and has no stop to speak of. Lady Whalen has a beautiful head and as a bench dog should have been placed higher.

Irish Setters.—This was a very ordinary class, the winner, F. H. Phippen's Pat, being of a fair average quality only.

The explanation of my former letter to you regarding what we on this coast regard as a "boycott" would have soon become very plain had you published my letter.

Briefly, the Calgary Bench Show Committee extended their entry date a few days to enable our Secretary, Mr. E. C. Powell, to get together a number of dogs for their show and for Winnipeg. He succeeded in doing so, getting altogether forty-six dogs, the pick of Vancouver and Victoria, and also secured a special car for their transportation.

Most of us gave our entries to Mr. Powell before the advertised closing date, and it appears that he got them all in within the promised extension of time, in spite of which his entries were all refused.

The Committee held a meeting to consider the matter. They knew that the owners of the dogs were not to blame, a fact which a collection of sportsmen would immediately have taken into consideration in any case, but there was some talk, as it appears, about the dogs having been so selected that they would have made a clean sweep, and they were refused.

Of course they would have made a clean sweep; the two that went did that, and according to Mr. Geo. S. Thomas' judging, they were well behind the rest that would have gone. This action deprived Winnipeg of forty-six dogs from here and killed a chance for competition, which is the life of the fancy.

The Vancouver and Victoria Kennel Clubs have brought their shows to a high state of quality by having to grind for the entries. We get no big grant from the Government or anybody else, so we have to make our shows attractive in the first place and grab every entry that comes along. That sort of thing arouses interest, and although we don't seem to get fat on gate receipts like Portland, Ore., our "ham and egg" specials or whatever it is, draws the big entry, and the high quality dogs.

Let our Calgary friends give us a chance next year to turn down forty-six good ones, please! Would we do

it? Not if we saw the entry fees! We're not afraid of losing our "tea and coffee" specials or the "tinware," and we've got big strings on all the silver.

That reminds me of friend Watkin's letter.

No one who has ever visited the Portland Dog Show could ever say that it was unattractive. The "City of Roses" in the month of May tells one why they call it "God's Country," and with all the rush and bustle of a new-world city, is a patent air of old-world refinement, which speaks of wealth acquired by an earlier generation. The shows are always conducted quietly and in good order, and although an entry fee of 50 cents is charged, a large crowd of handsomely gowned women and well-dressed men throngs the building every evening. No wonder they give such fine trophies, but I venture to gamble that not one of Vancouver's fanciers found it out from their premium list. This is what I called unattractive.

With all our paltry offerings we had the big show of the Coast, friend Watkins. We were sorry you were not with us, ours was the greater loss. But ask our mutual friend, W. B. Fechheimer, which show paid him best this year. If he had only been a member of the Canadian Kennel Club he would have got five points, and at the Terrier Show in the fall another five (?) That's what counts, after all, in every way, the size of the en-

try. Calgary people will learn that after a while, but Portland should get out a better premium list if they want a good entry from outside points. Some of us might go after the win, but the majority will see about the cups.

We, on our side, will endeavor to keep the "ham and eggs" out of the Bull Terrier section.

At a meeting of the British Columbia Fox Terrier Club held last week, it was decided to ask Mr. R. P. Forshaw to judge the fall specialty show.

This show should bring out some good youngsters, although most of this year's litters are still very young. There are a lot of youngsters coming on this summer, and of course, every breeder has a little marvel, which the others think is a regular "mutt." It generally runs like this: "Oh, say, have you seen that litter of J—'s yet? Well, aren't they the worst looking bunch you ever saw? If my pups don't have better bone than that at six weeks, I'll drown 'em!"
