Mr. W. D. Bruce of the Orme Kennels, B.C. is permitting breeders the privilege of using the various high quality stud dogs in his kennel. These include Leander Club (of Orme), by Ch. Leander, ex. the Dark Blue bitch, Pretty Polly. This is a short back dog with beautiful legs and feet and perfect ears. He was the best pup of his year 1905, and in 1906 at the Crystal Palace took reserve, all breeds competing for Our Dogs Challenge Cup. Ingatestone Ruskin (of Orme) is also a 1906 dog, and a beautifully bred one. He has a lovely head and is a short back dog of good quality and beautiful ears. While in England he was a frequent winner and has upheld his record on this side. Leander Club, in four chances, sired more puppy winners at the recent Fox Terrier show in Vancouver than all other Pacific Coast wire and smooth dogs. Mr. Bruce has a number of young stock for sale, both wire and smooth, that will be disposed of at moderate prices, considering quality.

Dr. Ford's imported Collie, Otterburn Ornament, still remains at stud to Canadian breeders at a fee of \$10.00. This dog is a producer of first prize winners at the Canadian National Exhibition, both dog and bitch puppy winners owning him as sire. He remains in charge of Mr. John Webster, Hamilton, Ont.

Mr. Wm. Webber, Ottawa, Ont., has Welsh Terriers for sale in both puppies and grown dogs, all from prize winning stock and full pedigreed.

Mr. W. A. Twigg, Kingston, Ont., has placed at stud the Cocker Spaniel Twigg's Red King. He is a beautifully bred one, having the famous Black Duke strain on both sides. For stud card and full particulars, including detailed pedigree, apply to Mr. Twigg.

Tremail Truestone, and at London last September proved that he was able to go right to the top. His wins there included 1st novice, 1st open under 45 pounds, and the coveted winners. Gripstone is a short-bodied dog of splendid type, and, as his picture shows, is exceptionally good in front. Carries plenty of bone, and in bulldog properties has everything that could be desired. As the fee is a moderate one we feel sure his services will be largely in demand.

It should be noted Mr. Geo. Scott's address is now 466 Grace Street, Toronto. Mr. Scott has Mr. A. A. Macdonald's Fox Terrier Aldon Orion at stud, and by the way, the fee of this dog, it should be noticed, has been reduced from \$15 to \$10. At the latter sum he should be freely bred to, as this does not at all represent his value.

Amongst bargain ads. are the following: Mr. J. H. Irving, Uxbridge, Ont., who has been changed from Madoc to Uxbridge, for want of accommodation is obliged to offer for sale all the dogs he retained for his own use. These include several Collies and Bulldogs, amongst the latter Crumpsall Pyramid, Jr., a winner at the last Canadian National. H. S. Young has a number of Bulldog puppies by Lee Bank Squire, out of Ivel Queen, for sale. P. E. Dunn offers two Airedale bitch puppies, 7 months old, by Columbus, that will be sold right. A. C.

Hardy has Collie puppies by Ch. Balmoral Rex, out of a Hazelbrae Worlock bitch for sale. They are well marked and are of the best obtainable breeding on both sides.

The Amalgamated Kennels of Hamilton, Ont., are offering a number of Airedale and Scottish Terriers at stud to approved bitches. The former is a cup winner in England, as well as a consistent winner of firsts at the big shows there. He is distinctly of the cart horse type, with a long, narrow head. Fee, the first six bitches, \$15.00. Robert is the one for big coarse bitches. A good headed dog with very small, well carried ears. The above quartette are guaranteed sound and healthy, and bitches sent to this kennel will have the best of care. The dogs can be seen by appointment only. 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NOTES AND COMMENTS

Debarred: New York, we fear, will be without its usual quota of Canadian dogs this year, the quarantine regulations preventing the return to the Dominion of dogs shown at Madison Square. This is hard on such consistent breeders as Col. Robert McEwen, who has a young Holyrood Professor dog that he had hoped to startle the Collie circle with. And there are doubtless many others in the same predicament.

Squire a stock getter: Lee Bank Squire continues to father large litters, a matter on which Mr. Lees is congratulating himself and also those who have used this typical Bulldog. Mr. H. S. Young's, Sudbury, Ont., Ivel Queen, has no less than eight "Squires," all healthy, heavy-boned puppies with big heads.

An immigrant: Mr. W. P. Fraser has sold back to Mr. Farwell the smooth Fox Terrier, Fra Diavolo. Mr. Farwell lost the dam of Fra Diavolo and was glad to be able to get him back, as he felt he could not replace him. We are sorry to see the dog leave Canada, as apart from being such a typical specimen of the Fox Terrier, he was free from the blood of Dark Blue or Dreadnaught, yet withal most classically bred.

Berwick Bostons: Mr. R. N. Clark, Berwick, N.S., has had the misfortune to lose the stud Boston Acadian Pluto, from some internal trouble. A three-months' old replica of Pluto is some compensation, and one that is rapidly growing into a smart show dog.

B. C. Specialty Club: A Pointer and Setter Club has been formed in British

Columbia with Victoria as its headquarters. Mr. T. P. McConnell, who has done so much in the interests of sporting dogs on the Pacific Coast, is the Secretary.

By the way, quite a complicated question arises here, and one that the C. K. C. Executive will be asked to decide at its next meeting. It is this. Can a specialty Club devoted to two distinct breeds hold a specialty show under specialty show regulations?

Voltaire, the dog that is now in the United States. The dam of this litter is the dark red bitch, Nellie O'Neil by Ch. The Squire. If breeding counts for anything, there should be some good ones in this bunch.

Brookdale Dolly, by Willard, ex. Deer Park Flossie, is safely in whelp to Billie Obo, and here, again, should be some wonders if all goes well. One of the Kildare litter, that we reported, is so good that he stays indefinitely in Barrie. Red Sammie was "wanted" in Bellingham, Wash., but Mr. Dymont thinks so much of the dog that he has decided he cannot part with him.

From Mr. Dymont's letter, given elsewhere in this issue, it will be seen that he is ready to take off his coat and work for a revival of the Canadian Sporting Spaniel Club. Now let us hear from those he has named.

Woodcotes: Dr. Boulton has been his own Santa Claus in opening his purse strings to Mr. W. G. Pegg's benefit. Boston Terriers are very popular, but it was not the popularity of the breed that brought 63 dogs and a host of fanciers out to the show in Wolseley Hall on New Year's Day. It was the Boston Terrier Club of Canada and the long list of some 50 specials which they offered. More power to them! To them belongs the honor of massing the best collection of this cobby little Terrier seen in Toronto in many a long day.

The show was not held under the C. K. C. rules, and additional classes were added to swell the entry. Puppy classes under 6 months is an innovation, in addition to which was added a green class and the limit and open classes for dogs and bitches were graded according to weight. To Mr. A. E. Quaife, of Palmyra, N. Y., fell the honor of placing the awards, which he did with general satisfaction. The interest in the judging was kept up all day, as the specials were not awarded till the evening.

Puppy dogs brought out a nice one in Mr. Carson's Rex Boy. He is a medium weight dog and untrimmed, but has good bone and looks promising. In novice dogs, Mr. Austin's Viking II., a heavy weight dog, came to the front, a good sound one with right head and muzzle that should be

valuable for stud purposes. Limit and open dogs, 12 to 17 lbs., went to Mr. Smith's Tom Boy and Mr. Sander's Buster Boy, a pair of good brindles which own Bad Boy as their sire. Tom Boy, which went to reserve winners, is a little smaller and a little flatter in skull, but they are both clean cut, cobby Terriers with good skulls, muzzles and tails and real Boston action. Rex Boy, before mentioned, won in the limit and open medium weight dogs, defeating Mr. Willis's Clansman and Mr. Robertson's Combustion. Dr. Richardson's well known Wahneta's Peter Pan added another to his already long list of awards in winning 1st open in the heavyweight dogs and winners, being placed above Viking II. and Dr. King's Othello, another well known dog, and Mrs. Fraser's Car's Tags in the heavyweight class. Mrs. Wink's Comstock won in novice bitches, and was only defeated in the limit, open and winners classes by Dr. King's Miss Fritz, a dark brindle with white collar, excelling in skull and muzzle. Comstock is a small one, very trim and of good quality. Medium weight bitches went to Mr. Smith's Agawan Julianne and Mr. Beaumont's Miss Beanie, and heavyweight to Mrs. Aisthopes's Mollie and Dr. King's Goebel's Tess.

ing Mr. Coates' puppy, Leander Maid, first place. This was rather hard on Mr. Abbot (in a sense) because this gentleman is a novice in the game, and rather discouraged him, but nevertheless he has the satisfaction of knowing that his puppy was the best in the judge's eye.

The greatest amount of interest in the show was centred in the meeting of Sunshine Beau Brummel and Leander Club. Mr. Forshaw was quite twenty minutes making up his mind. Although he couldn't have made much of a mistake, whichever he awarded the blue to. They were both put down in excellent condition and can hold their own in the best of society in the country.

Mr. T. B. Chappel had quite a field day with his youngster, Duchess, a smooth Fox Terrier bitch, which made such a sensational debut, winning puppy, novice, limit (not entered open), winners, puppy sweepstakes, special puppy and breeders, besides several specials. Surely this is a rather startling record for a six months' old puppy. Let us hope she will continue in the path of success, as there is ample room for some good Fox Terrier bitches here. Mr. Chappel informs me that he has another more promising puppy by Leander Club, which will make its appearance at the Vancouver Spring Show.

It is a pleasing feature to see so many ladies take such a keen interest both inside and outside the ring. If the same interest is maintained we may before long be able to claim some lady judges. The ladies class was about the largest class in the show.

Mr. H. Burns wore a very surprised look when his well known wire Fox Terrier, Leading Chance, was awarded the cup for the best in the show, of smooth or wire. Needless to say, Mr. F. Welsh also wore one.

The entries were one hundred and forty-three, an increase of twenty-one over the last Fox Terrier show. At

the same time, there were seven dogs less. This number of entries is the largest in the history of Vancouver.

It would be a good idea if a class was included in the next schedule for fanciers who have never won a prize, so as to give them a little encouragement, because it's only right to argue that novices cannot stand much of a chance against some of the strong kennels which are at present established in and around Vancouver. It would also be the means of augmenting the entry list.

I hear that Mr. Bostock, of Vancouver, is again going in for the breed of smooth Fox Terriers. This will be welcomed by all fanciers, as this gentleman is one of the pillars of dog breeders and has always kept the right class of goods. He is anticipating something extra good shortly from his beautiful bitch Reminiscence and Leander Club.

An important point that needs comment was the condition in which the majority of exhibitors put their exhibits on the bench. This applies to the wire Fox Terriers in particular. The fanciers sadly lack in this respect, as a few of the dogs looked more like pet lambs than the robust, fiery, clean Terrier. In one or two instances dogs missed the ribbons through the negligence of their owners.

At the conclusion of the show, Mrs. W. D. Bruce, the worthy President's wife, presented the prizes to the various winners in a very pleasing manner, which wound up a most enjoyable day.

VANCOUVER REMAINS WITH COAST CIRCUIT.

Local Kennel Club decides to hold its show as last year and will probably have a cat show in conjunction.

Vancouver will again be a member of the Pacific Coast Bench Show Circuit, comprising Los Angeles, San

Francisco, Oakland, Portland, Seattle and Tacoma, in 1908.

At the annual meeting of the Vancouver Kennel Club, which was held at the Board of Trade rooms, Nov. 4th, a request was presented from the Victoria Kennel Club to hold the local show at a time that would conveniently work out with the Victoria Club, irrespective of the Pacific Coast circuit, but the members of the Vancouver Club could not see things that way. The show last spring, held in conjunction with the circuit, proved the most successful in the history of the club, and the members felt that the circuit contributed much to this end. A motion was thereupon passed that the Club at once take steps towards the organization of the Pacific Coast circuit again, beginning as last year in the south and winding up with Vancouver. Victoria will be notified of this.

If the recommendation of the retiring bench show committee to the new executive is adopted, the club will have a big cat show in conjunction with the dog show next spring. There have been numerous requests for a cat show and this department will be a feature most likely of the next annual exhibition.

The club decided to ask the Canadian Kennel Club to recognize pit bulls and springers as a breed. At present these classes are not listed at all, and though several efforts have been made to have them recognized, all these have failed so far. Another attempt will now be made, and in the meantime the classes will be listed for the next annual show of the Vancouver club.

Election of Officers.

President H. S. Rolston occupied the chair and there was a fair attendance of members notwithstanding the inclement weather. The election of officers provoked several contests. The new officers are:

An honorarium of \$100 was voted Secretary Powell in recognition of his splendid work during the past year. This is his third unanimous re-election as secretary.

The club decided to purchase an additional one hundred benches for the coming show.

Secretary's Report.

To the President, Officers and Members of the Vancouver Kennel Club:

Ladies and Gentlemen,—I beg to present this, the annual report of the Vancouver Kennel Club for the year 1907-1908.

The year just closed has been the most successful in the history of the club. Last spring your sixth annual show was not only the largest and best on the Pacific coast, but obtained the full percentage of five points. That a young city, barely out of its teens, should hold a show placing it in the first ranks is something for congratulation, and shows that the fanciers of Vancouver, although geographically placed at a disadvantage owing to being so far removed from centres of civilization, are imbued with that spirit and determination that knows no defeat and will overcome every obstacle to accomplish their desired end. All credit is due to your bench show committee, who worked untiringly during the show, and who, before the show, perfected details and showed their wisdom in carrying out these strong points which did so much to make your show such a success. Cutting and pruning in other places, they were able to put aside a much larger amount for judging, cash prizes and advertising. The result was, at a very much increased cost, we were able to secure one of the best recognized judges in the world, give a large amount of money in cash prizes, while our advertising reached as far as Toronto in the east, and San Francisco in the south. That this had its effect is shown in the fact that we had an increased percentage of dogs over last year from outside points of 44 per cent., of which the increased percentage of dogs from the United States was 23. The percentage of dogs registered was 20. This is an increase of three over last year, but not nearly enough considering the low cost and advantages to be derived.

Last year you put aside a sum of money for the purchase of some wire

benching. Some seventy-four were secured, which added very much to the appearance of the building. I would suggest getting a few every year. If there are not sufficient funds in the club a private subscription might be taken up for same. Your Club has fifteen challenge cups valued at \$800. During the year seven dogs were reported as being lost or stolen, all of which were recovered.

Cup for Sixth Regiment.

We wish to thank the colonel and officers of the Sixth D. C. O. Rifles for the use of the drillhall at our last annual show. In appreciation of such your bench show committee presented the Sixth D. C. O. Rifles with a handsome cup for shooting. This cup is for the highest aggregate during the season of 1908 for tyros. It is shot for every Saturday, the tyro making the largest number of points taking the cup. I have been assured by the officers that much interest is taken in this competition, and all are looking forward to winning the same.

A few changes have been made in the Canadian Kennel Club rules, the principal being the reducing of the number of winning classes in each breed to two (one in each sex) except cockers, which will have four—two for blacks and two for any other color.

In accordance with your request, I took up the matter of having all W. K. L. and P. K. L. wins recognized by the C. K. C. After going into the matter carefully they replied that they could not change the original agreement with regard to the formation of the Pacific Advisory Board. I understand their chief objection is recognizing any wins made under a foreign body in this country.

I wish to draw your attention to the fact that your club has not any colors, crest, monogram or emblem.

The cutting down of committees to about five members worked most satisfactorily and was a great improvement over the large unwieldy body of a year ago.

During the year the B. C. Cocker Spaniel Club was formed with headquarters at Vancouver. Mr. M. Hendry Leggatt is president and Mr. Geo. L. Dyke, secretary. The Vancouver Kennel Club extends to her new sister the very best wishes for a long and prosperous life.

During the past year fifteen new members joined, two resigned and two deceased. The club has now a membership of seventy-one ladies and gentlemen in good standing.

Propose Cat Show.

At the winding up meeting of the bench show committee the following resolutions were passed, same to be read at the annual meeting of the club:

"That this committee recommend to the bench show committee for 1909 the advisability of having a cat show in connection with the annual bench show; and

"That this committee recommend in

the strongest possible terms that the club, at its annual meeting, give a most substantial honorarium to the secretary for his very efficient services and the work he did on behalf of the show."

Before concluding, I wish to thank the president and members for the many kindnesses and courtesies extended to me during my term of office, but more particularly our president, Mr. H. S. Rolston, who, no matter when or where, or how busy he was, could always find time to go into the smallest details which would work toward the welfare of the club, or the dog in general; and also Mr. W. M. Coates for the use of his office for committee meetings.

The financial report, as here appended, shows that the loss on the bench show was only \$30.65, which, considering our exceptionally heavy expenses, is most assuring. In the whole, the report shows a cash surplus of \$101.75, while the assets are valued at \$1242.65 with no liabilities.

PACIFIC COAST KENNEL CLUB BENCH SHOW CIRCUIT.

DEC. 15, 1908.

The Pacific Coast Kennel Club bench show circuit for 1909 organized at Seattle with five clubs included in the programme of shows. The cities which will be represented in the circuit are Vancouver, Victoria, Seattle, Tacoma and Portland.

This year the circuit included clubs all the way from Los Angeles to Vancouver, but the northern clubs have decided to make their schedule for the coming shows to suit themselves without any reference to the clubs in Los Angeles, San Francisco and Oakland. These cities will hold their shows early in March of next year, however, and as the northern circuit will not commence till April they will not conflict. Victoria was not in the circuit last year, and neither was Tacoma, which was not organized then.

The circuit will open at Victoria on April 7 and close at Portland on May 7, lasting exactly one month. A new departure will be made next year, in that the shows will be of only three days' duration instead of four, as in

After the adoption of the minutes of the last meeting and the meeting of the Executive, Mr. Slattery rose to say that immediate and concerted action should be taken by the dog fanciers of Toronto to try to dissuade the Board of Police Commissioners from carrying out some of the drastic measures they were contemplating to discourage the keeping of dogs in the city. The pre-

sent by-law was ambiguous, giving rise to a great number of troublesome technical points, and in revising the by-law the commissioners were seriously considering raising the license fees from \$1 to \$2 for dogs and to \$5 straight for bitches, whether registered or not. The meeting expressed its thanks to Mr. Slattery for all the trouble and pains he had gone to in interviewing the authorities and studying the proposed by-law, and were unanimous in requesting him, together with Mr. Foster, to represent the Club in conjunction with the other kennel clubs at a meeting of the Police Commissioners to be held on the 19th inst.

After the disposition of a few other minor items of business, it was decided to leave the appointment of judges for the show to be held the following Monday night in the hands of the committee looking after the arrangements. Meeting adjourned at a very respectable hour to give time for a friendly chat to those who felt so inclined.

Some Methods of Mating.

BY C. J. DAVIES, IN "OUR DOGS."

As we have already endeavored to point out, parental influence is a thing apart from pedigree influence, and it is only when the two are conjoined and specimens with both pedigree and points mated together that satisfactory results are certain.

The question now before us is the difficult one of the degree of influence exercised by ancestors. There is no doubt that grandparents influence the progeny. The point is, Need we look further back?

If two animals differing in, say, color, are crossed, such as a self-cream guinea pig with a self blue, the progeny will be mixed blue and cream—will, in fact, combine the colors of both parents. On breeding together the bi-colored half-bred individuals, segregation occurs, and approximately definite proportions of the self-colored and bi-colored individuals will be obtained. These facts, interpreted, go to show that the color-units in the germ cells remain pure, and that no amount of crossing can alter them. They also seem incidentally to demonstrate that one need look no further back than to grandparents for any direct influence. The rules that apply to color inheritance must apply to the inheritance of all other characters, though only in color are they easy of elucidation. It is very difficult, for instance, to study the exact inheritance of head points, and this probably, because "head" is

not one point, but a number, and a certain class of head depends upon the inheritance of several definite units, the absence of any one of which gives a head faulty in some particular.

As far as we know, it has never before been suggested that ancestral influence is of small or no account in practical breeding, and no doubt much further experiment is needed to prove the point. The writer's experiments, still in progress, certainly suggest that in breeding exhibition stock the breeder need look no further back than to the grandparents for influence when a process of in-breeding is being carried on. Possibly the key to the matter lies in the amount of inbreeding practised.

It is a very old saying that "crossing leads to reversion," and we now know that sometimes the combination of some of the new units introduced by

a cross with some of the pre-existing
ones may give rise to an individual of
another type—i.e., with ancestral
traits. The character, the ancestral
(wild) color, for instance, is, in fact,
re-created when certain units combine;
it is not inherited intact.

Cross breeding may cause change in
more than one way; however, the
change does not always take the form
of what we call reversion. Crossing
may cause a complex character to
break up into its elements, as in the
case of a brindle coat, some of the ele-
mentary characters of which may by
this means become latent, or may pass
bodily out of the germ cell. Again,
crossing may bring latent characters
into activity; and it may also cause
variability in the intensity of charac-
ters quite apart from resolution or
recombination.

Although inbreeding conveys to our
mind the mating together of nearly re-
lated individuals, yet it would prob-
ably be more correct to regard it as
the mating of like to like. A true out-
cross is very seldom possible among
fancy animals, except by actual cross-
breeding; animals of the same breed
and color are almost invariably more
or less closely related. As we have al-

ready endeavored to show, in cross-
breeding on certain lines no influence is
apparent further back than two
generations, and we have certainly
found in practice with inbred stock
that the same peculiarity holds good.
When mating like to like, very little va-
riation and no reversion seems ever to
occur—at least, if reversion does occur
it must be in less than one per cent
of cases. The variations, on the other
hand, fluctuate around the type of the
stock one has been using for the last
two generations, if our meaning can be
understood. In point of color, for in-
stance, one gets selfs of varying shades
in a pure-bred litter if the parents and
grandparents themselves varied in
shade. As selection proceeds, and one
is able to get both parents, as well as
some of the grandparents, near about
the same shade of color, a large pro-
portion of young are born of this
color. All the evidence seems to sug-
gest that if one can only mate so as
to get both parents and all four
grandparents of almost the exact shade
of color one desires, then all the young
will be of that color with but very
slight variation.

Another thing is absolutely certain,
and that is that in color breeding se-
lection is the only road to complete
success. If one wishes to make a new
color, or to completely break down and
alter an old one with a view to start-
ing afresh and building it up again,
then a judicious cross will be neces-
sary; but with suitable material to
start with, selection (irrespective of re-
lationship) and patience are the only
factors necessary to create improve-
ment in ordinary animals.

The conclusions so far arrived at
show, then—(1) That pedigree is use-
ful as a guide if one is aware of the
characteristics of the individuals whose
names it gives, but that without that
knowledge it is of comparatively little
help to a breeder whose desire it is to
breed perfectly formed and high-class
stock, as apart from merely "pedi-
gree" stock. (2) That the qualities of
the grand-parents are of the greatest
importance in mating, and that to get
the best results one must think of them
and weigh up their points quite as
much as those of the individuals we
are dealing with. In mating two ani-
mals, one is bringing together the
mind the mating together of individu-
qualities transmitted to them by their
parents, which qualities may or may
not be borne by them. In other
words, an animal bears certain quali-
ties visible to the eye, others invisible
(recessive) but latent in the germ cells
and ready, probably to make their
presence felt in the next mating. One
can see when one looks at an animal
what visible qualities it has; one can
only make a guess by looking at its
parents as to what latent possibilities
it may also carry. (3) That ances-
tral influence, if it exists, does not,
broadly speaking, seem to be of great
importance in practical breeding.
