

NOTES AND COMMENTS

London Show: Just a preliminary note to give London dates. They are as follows: From noon on Sept. 14th to noon on Sept. 17th. C. K. C. rules will, of course, govern, and a better show than that of last year is ensured.

B. T. C. of M. Show: The Boston Terrier Club of Montreal, are holding a one-day specialty show in Montreal on April 24th. Mr. F. Dondero has been asked to judge. The show will be held under C. K. C. rules so that all wins may count. Mr. F. R. Phelan is the Hon.-Sec-Treas.

Winnipeg Show: Here is that indefatigable worker, Dr. A. W. Bell, writing us at least once a week with the positive assurance that Winnipeg will be a five-point show this year without any doubt whatever. And what Dr. Bell says, he sticks to. The dates are July 13th to 16th, and of course C. K. C. rules will govern. Dr. Bell expects the Cocker Spaniel Club of Canada will support the show in some way, either with medals or cups or both. A well known all-rounder has been asked to judge, and his name we hope to be in a position to make public in next issue of Gazette.

Hamilton show: As we stated in a previous announcement, the Hamilton Kennel Club purpose giving a three days' show in connection with the opening of the Maple Leaf Amusement Park in that city. May 24th, 25th and 26th are the dates chosen, and the show will be under C. K. C. rules. Entries close May 6th, with the Secretary, Mr. R. Colvin, and premium lists and other information may be had from him. Full classification will be given, many valuable

specials offered, and experts will judge all classes.

Bull Terriers: Mr. Frothingham thinks so highly of the light weight Bull Terrier he had from Mr. Walters' kennel that he has been again to Ottawa and has purchased a puppy by this dog at a long figure. Defender is now a champion in the United States, and has five points toward his Canadian championship.

Mr. Walters himself has received a bitch puppy from England, bred from the best stock extant, that he hopes to use as a mild cross on the blood now in his kennels and that has been so successful in producing winners.

Pom. points: Mrs. F. L. Hutchinson of Montreal is being congratulated on three wonderfully nice sable puppies that she owns and that are by Mrs. Morris Mandig's Opal of Downshire. As he is by Ch. Sable Mite, can't hardly help being good ones.

Mrs. Hutchinson has imported

a very nice orange shaded sable bitch of three and a half pounds weight, that is at whelp to a tiny atom of a dog under three pounds. Being toy bred on both sides, the puppies should not be monsters.

Crumpsall Pyramid Jr.: Mr. George Lydiatt, Wallaceburg, Ont., has made a good Bulldog purchase in Crumpsall Pyramid Jr., that he bought from Mr. Irving a few weeks ago. A quality dog that has won well, he should do well for his new owner, who, we notice, continues to offer his services to breeders.

Bull Terrier arrivals: Mr. Thody's Stockwood Polly Perkins, a full sister to Champion Inferno, has whelped a litter of ten by Ch. Edgewood Duval. All are white, and eight are of the sterner sex.

A. K. C. suspension: The Pacific Advisory Board of the C. K. C. recently applied to the headquarters of the Club for a ruling on a rather delicate question. It was as follows: Can entries be received from Mr. C. V. Holmes, who was suspended by the A. K. C. on a technicality. The C. K. C. replied as follows: "As the A. K. C. does not recognize our suspensions and the C. K. C. does not recognize those of the A. K. C., then there is no reason whatever why Mr. Holmes should not exhibit his dogs under C. K. C. rules. This may not be right ethically, but is simply a statement of facts." No matter what the cause of suspension, we presume the C. K. C. could not legally take any other course. Mr. Holmes was suspended for not paying a series of fines imposed by the A. K. C. for an error not of his making.

Vanguard Kennels: Mr. A. D. Wilson, after a brief interval, has moved back to the farm again, and is now

located at Namao, Alta., where he is again entering strongly into the Collie arena. He had the misfortune to lose two of his best bitches, Tib and Grace, last winter, with distemper, and also a few very young puppies. He used C. S. R. freely and thinks he got off very easily. He is looking for a good brood bitch in whelp and also for a first class young dog to be used at stud.

Canadian National Show: The Committee of Toronto's big fall show have already been at work on preliminaries and we are able to tell of some of the changes that will appear in the premium list, and to give the names of some of the gentlemen invited to judge. And let us say here that the judge's slate has never been excelled at any show in America, and we doubt if it has been equalled.

Two prominent Englishmen are expected to officiate. Mr. Desmond O'Connell, who will judge Smooth Fox Terriers and, it is expected, English Foxhounds and Welsh Terriers. Mr. Arthur Maxwell is slated to judge wire Fox Terriers and several other breeds with which he is familiar, but which have not yet been absolutely decided on. Both these gentlemen have judged at the C. N. E. before, and so need no further introduction at this stage other than to say that absolute reliability is ensured in anything they undertake to do. Mr. W. Ormiston Roy, Montreal, has been asked to judge Collies, and Mr. W. T. Payne, of Kingston, Pa., will take the Sporting Spaniels, thus well disposing of some of the largest classes. Mr. J. E. Carroll, of Buffalo, will do the Bostons. He is an expert at the breed. Mr. Claire Foster, always a favorite at Toronto, has once more been invited to take Bull Terriers, and Mr. W. C. Codman, Bulldogs. Perhaps we might add that Mr. Maxwell will probably be asked to judge Bloodhounds, all rough Terriers except Welsh, and all Toys.

Coming to the classification, the stud dog and brood bitch classes that have proved of no value will, in all cases, be deleted. Mastiffs will have one class only, i.e., open dogs and bitches. In Russian Wolfhounds, owing to lack of support, dogs and bitches will compete in the open class. In Cockers, a class for novice dogs, red, has been added, also one for bitches of like color. A class for Harriers will be given, open dogs and bitches and a

like class for blue merle Collies also. Bulldogs will be favored with a class on Canadian bred dogs and bitches, a proof of the breeds gaining popularity. Fox Terriers, both wire and smooth, will have divided classes for Canadian breeds, and the Canadian bred Bull Terrier class will also be divided. The 20-lb. Bull Terrier class was cut out. In the Beagle section a Canadian class

was added, dogs and bitches competing. There are many white Poms. in Toronto, and a special class given for this color should fill well. More anon.

ONTARIO KENNEL CLUB SHOW.

NO. OF POINTS, TWO.

There was a drop of some eighty in the number of dogs at the show held on April 8, 9 and 10 this year, due, no doubt, to the fact that this year's was a ribbon show, and the long list of specials was not sufficient to draw out the entry of last year. It was a good clean show, however, and the quality of the dogs all through was good. The officers and committee worked hard. Messrs. Dunbar, Slattery, Metcalfe and Anderson always were pluggers, and they, backed up by Mr. Donald Wheeler, as superintendent, and the old reliable Teddy Carlyle as chief runner-up, did everything in their power to make things a success. They were up against a tough proposition. In the first place the weather during the whole of the show was cold and raw, and as there was no system of heating in the building, canines and humans alike suffered from the cold and damp. In the second place the building, the Granite Rink on Church Street, is not centrally located, and the gate receipts were consequently poor. We were glad to see a number of outside dogs and exhibitors, and to hear most of them—the exhibitors—tell us that they would be along to the Toronto Kennel Club's show in July. Following is a list of the judges:—Mr. John G. Kent, Toronto—Greyhounds, Whippets, Deerhounds, Italian Greyhounds, Wolfhounds; Mr. Harry Taylor, Toronto—Foxhounds, Harriers, Beagles; Mr. W. W. Jeffers, Toronto—English Setters; Mr. Bert Swan, Toronto—St. Bernards, Mastiffs. Newfoundlands, Bloodhounds, Bedlingtons; Mr. Jas. Watson, Hackensack, N.J.—All other breeds and general specials.

St. Bernards, outside of Mr. Jeffrey's Lochinvar, a well known dog with a light eye, but good bone and coat, and Mr. Stephen's Dr. Lucas, a smooth dog, large, with great bone and substance, a massive head, deep

muzzle, good small eye and expression, but shown in only fair condition, only a mediocre lot. The winning puppy bitch, Agawa Flora, is worthy of mention for great bone, but she has only fair head. Newfoundlands and Danes very few and fair quality. The Greyhounds were also few in numbers, but quality much better, Mr. Bealey's Prince Rupert winning right through. English and American Foxhounds were shown together and classes were light, Mr. Bannister's Watchman going to winners. We were somewhat disappointed at the turnout of Pointers and English Setters. In the former only three bitches put in an appearance, Mrs. Waters' Jingo Della leading the van, while in the latter there were only the same number present. Irish Setters came up stronger, however, with eight dogs. The winning dog, Mr. Scholes' Bobbs II. has a good head and front, is a better color than the reserve winners. Mr. Moroney's Kerry Sport, another one with good head and front, but dark in color. Winners bitches went to Mr. Scholes' Grouse II., reserve to Mr. Wright's Tyrone's Golden. The only Dalmatian was Mr. Constantineau's Perfect Bond, a dog now well known on the Canadian bench.

Irish Water Spaniels, only one, Mr. Spanner's Brewster, and one Harrier also Mr. Habart's Jipsey Girl. Cockers, though classes fairly heavy, were an assorted lot, with a good one here and there. Mr. Tomlinson's black dog Martello, more than held his own in the limit and open, and added another winners to his career. He is well known now as a stud dog, being built on fine lines with particularly good legs, skull and muzzle. Mr. Bartlett's Darkie II., was next up, a nice stationed little dog, rather thick set. Mr. Bowser's Resnob Lillian went reserve in winners, followed by Mr. Lewis's Calmo Baby, a nice cobby bitch. Mr.

Tomlinson's well known parti-color dog Speculator justly went to winners in A. O. C. dogs, and won much admiration from other exhibitors and visitors for his grand Cocker qualities. He was followed by Mr. Jackson's puppy, Bobby Kerr, a smart shower with good head and ears but a high tail. Mr. Dyment's Brookdale Violet, a silver buff puppy bitch, and a very promising one, too, went through to winners, followed by Messrs. Turner & McMinn's Cascade Sunset, a red bitch showing lots of Spaniel character.

A great array of Collies greeted the eye, and here we take off our hat to Mrs. Gordon, to whom three out of the four winners went. Her string were shown in excellent condition, and this counts a whole lot in the Collie. King Edward Cavalier did honor to his mistress by winning right through from novice to winners. He is a very classy puppy with lots of style, a good one. He was followed through by Mr. Bowsfield's King Edward Model, which won first in the puppy class. This is another good dog with plenty of coat and good head and bone and excellent ears. Mr. Wheeler's Edgbaston Dandy went 3rd to this pair in the open. Puppy and novice bitches brought out Mrs. Gordon's King Edward Pinafore, a little ring shy at first but with lots of coat and bone and good head and ears. Mr. Wretham's Albany Empress, a neat faced bitch, was an easy second. In limit, Mrs. Metcalfe's Walden Violet went second to Pinafore, a long faced bitch but off in coat. Open bitches, sable and white, produced the winners in Mrs. Gordon's King Edward Water Witch, well known, with Mr. Reeves' Donvale Gypsy 2nd and Mr. Bell's Standard Baroness 1st in A. O. C., Pinafore was reserve winners.

Old English Sheep Dogs were not strong in numbers. Mr. Cavan's Shensone Ben headed the list. Bulldogs brought out three good dogs. Mr. Lees' Lee Bank Squire and Woodcote Merry Boy, the winners and reserve respectively, are well known as good ones but Mr. Hill's recent importation, Monston Leader, was a new one on and a pleasant surprise. He has a wonderfully massive head, good bone, front and body, and when brought into condition, will take some beating. Bitches as a class were not up to the dogs, Dr. Boultbee's Sherwood Success leading Mr. Kynock's Outline for winners.

Bull Terriers were strong in quality and numbers. Inferno not only again headed the polls for Mr. Miles, but came reserve on a special against a number of other breeds. He is a good one all right no matter what reverses he may have met recently, and made a clean win. Mr. Foster's Bulley, a good type of Terrier, with substance and bone, was placed next to him, 3rd open going to Mr. Fox's Indomitable Major, Mr. Brodrick's puppy, won 1st puppy. He is a good headed youngster, but little light in bone. Mr. Fox's Pretty Polly, the winners bitch, has a good head, but is a little long in body. She was seconded by Mr. Pennoch's Charlwood Lady Gay, which won 1st puppy and novice.

Bostons made a grand display, but were not judged till Friday night, and when we went to look them over the next day, several of them were gone; the ones still on the bench did not show to advantage on account of the cold. Most of the winners are well

be picking up again for we noticed a couple of very fair ones on the bench. All colors were shown together, but there were separate classes for over 18 lbs. and under 18 lbs. Mr. McKinlay's Kaiser was winners dogs, and Mr. Mermberger's Little Cricket winners bitches. Airedales, as might be expected, were a strong class right through. Mr. Perkin's Rockley Ranger, though only a puppy, is not by any means unknown, and handily won 1st puppy dogs. He is a good youngster, especially round the head, but rather green. Mr. Ormsley's Colonel is also a good headed puppy, but was ring shy. Novice dogs went to Mr. Massey's Nebbie, a good large dog, while limit went to Messrs. Bain & Greenwood's Count Michael, a dog with lots of quality, an especially good head, but with bad feet. There was only one dog for the open class, Messrs. Bain & Greenwood's famous Columbus, looking fit, and giving them all a tip on true Airedale expression. He, of course, went to winners, followed by Nebbie. A Columbus bitch puppy, called Birchcliffe Nancy, owned by the Rev. L. Skey, was first in puppy and novice, while Messrs. Bain and Greenwood's Lucky Friend won 1st limit. Same owner's Culmington Nettle, well known all over and grand bitch, went 1st open, followed by another of their bitches, Royal Virgin, entered in the brood bitch class, in winners.

Irish Terriers were not as good as we hoped to see. The best one on the bench was Mr. Miller's Ch. Fiscal Fancy, a good well known bitch with plenty of substance and fit to hold her own in any company. Mr. Campbell's Killarney Belle followed her in winners. Can't say we were taken with the winners dogs, and hardly think he merited his place. He was Mr. Roger's Tatters, a dog of excellent color and coat, but with a large, light eye, skull not flat, and only fair bone. Dr. Parker's Blantyre Paddy ran second to him. Paddy is a larger Terrier, on the coarse side, but with a much stronger head. We cannot pass over this breed without remarking on Mr. Britton's Knight of St. Patrick. He is a thick skulled dog, but has a pair of the smallest dark eyes we have ever seen in an Irishman, and without which there can be no true Irish expression. Mr. Campbell's Killarney Belle was reserve bitches. Scotties, Skyes and Welsh Terriers were very few, but Bed-

known, however. Dr. Richardson's Peter Pan ran up to winners with Mr. Moran's puppy, Lord Bell Rock, reserve. This puppy is a very small one and with plenty of merit. We heard that the owner refused some very tempting offers for him. He was a big cut of the cheese around the Boston bench. Winners bitches went to Mr. Beaumont's Topsy B., a light weight bitch with lots of quality, and reserve to Mr. Anderson's Boylston Lill, a well known bench winner.

Beagles were not plentiful. Mr. Smith had his grand bitch Welcome about whom we wrote so much about in the fall, and she went winners, seconded by Habart's Flirt. Winners dogs was won by Mr. Habart's Roy, and reserve by Mr. Best's Roy. Dachshunde seem to

lings showed up a little better, with Mr. Sinclair's Lancashire Pride going to winners in the dogs, followed by Mr. Kenyon's Crown, while Mr. Kenyon's Nellie had it all her own way in bitches.

Smooth Fox Terriers, though not a heavy entry, contained a few good ones. Puppy dogs brought out as first Mr. Kelly's Toby, a smart Terrier with a good front. Mr. Harding's Teddy ran next to him, good length of jaw but body little slack. Junior dogs went to Oxford Kennels' Oxford Woodcock, another smart Terrier, a shade large. Novice and limit were taken by Mr. Macdonald's Aldon Orion, a good coated, well conditioned Terrier, whose front is little too much Bull Terrier style to suit us, but whom the judge thought enough of to merit reserve winners. He was placed over Oxford Rake, not looking too well, but nevertheless a grand fronted stylish fellow that we have always liked. Mr. Bailey's Clapton Blue Blade went next, a well known one, a little short in neck and straight at shoulder. The prize packet in this breed, however, was the winners dogs, and a new face for Canada. He is Oxford Kennels' Oxford Rector, a Sabine dog out of Sabine Fancy by Sabine Muler. He is a substantial Terrier with lots of go, hard as nails, a good mover, excellent head points with beautiful small dark eye and the best of front and feet. There is more to him than Rake, and he is particularly strong where Rake is a bit weak, namely, in foreface. There are plenty of other Terrier men besides Mr. Hillsdon who think the new dog is just the caper. We were very disappointed that Mr. Macdonald's Aldon Mystery was not on the bench. We should have liked to have seen her alongside of Rector. Her absence left only one bitch, Oxford Frivolity, a puppy that went home early, so that we did not have the chance of seeing her. What hit the wires? Only three of them, headed by Sharpe Bros. Rolleston Star, of which we wrote a month or so ago; only one little bitch, Mr. Rumley's Vic. Black and tans were also light, winning dog being Mr. Robertson's Lord Kelvin.

The Pugs—seven—were good, while a long string of Poms won much admiration from the ladies. Mrs. Mark O'Rourke's black dog, Sir Dandy, went to winners, followed by Mr. Herd's Kelvinside Prince, while in bitches, Mr.

Foster's Kensington Princess won with Mrs. Lambe's Scarboro Fluff reserve. Toy poodles, King Charles, Ruby and Blenheim Spaniels, Yorkshire and Toy Black and Tan Terriers, Whippets and Italian Greyhounds were also fairly well represented, as was also the variety class. French Bulldogs were not heavy, winners dogs going to Miss Laing's Highland Rip, and bitches to Mr. Sexton's D'Arcy Monette.

Excuse me while I recall that "Tremail Rex Stone," winner of everything at London, beating winner of winners class here, is a full brother of Ted Stone (though older), and bred by ourselves.

To illustrate the old adage, re "mote in your neighbor's eye," I would call your attention to Bulldog, "Keystone of Sherwood," owner, one Alfred Boultbee, entered in class 151, catalogue number 311, said entry not being in accordance with rule re stud dog and get. Of course it were a pity to deprive owner of the medal, which is perhaps of more value than the dog to which same was awarded.

Might I just recall that, in controversy of recent years, A. K. C. vs. C. K. C., I upheld the C. K. C. end fearlessly in best journals of U. S.

Seriously, gentlemen, do you not think the Club is being made the medium of venting a little petty jealousy?

Re the Hull entries, the facts are as follows: When we started to pick out the dogs to go to Winnipeg in the car, we made up a list of the owners that had agreed to send their dogs and among them Mr. Geo. Hull said he would send two and we simply booked him for two. This was a few days before our show, and as we had time after our judging was over to get our entries in to Winnipeg, we decided to wait till after the first day of our own show and then pick out what we wanted to send. Mr. Smith, of Winnipeg, was here, and said he would except the entries up till that night (July the 6th). We were late in getting things cleaned up after the judging, and about nine o'clock Mr. Adams and myself started to fix up the entries for Winnipeg. When we came to Hull's lot, Mr. Hull was not present, had gone home, and had not left any word which dogs he wanted to send. So Mr. Adams and myself decided to send the two that had won here, namely Alberta Connie and Alberta Lassie, and we made the entries from the Calgary entries. The next morning Mr. Hull came to me and said that he would not think of sending Lassie, but would send Lady, so I told him to make a new entry and

give it to Mr. Smith. I then saw Mr. Smith and told him what Hull wished to do, and Mr. Smith said that it would be no trouble to make the change, and later both Hull and Smith said it was all fixed up and the entry changed, so I did not think any more about it. I never dreamt of any mix-up, as Lassie is a tri-color and Lady a sable, and the classes separate. Also Lassie was a puppy and Lady an open dog that was only eligible for limit and open classes, and I am at a loss to understand why the Secretary at Winnipeg allowed Lady to be shown in classes of sable dogs, if, as they say, she was entered as a tri-color. And if the entry was not changed (as it seems it must not have been), it was up to him to simply have withheld the bitch as wrongly entered. This would have saved all the trouble as far as Winnipeg was concerned, and was simply what the Rules called for.

The pedigree of Alberta Lady is as follows: Holyrood Conquest, ex. Scotch Queen, whelped Dec. 26, 1905. Winnings, Calgary, '06, 2nd novice. Calgary, '07, 1st novice, 1st open and winners. Alberta Lassie is out of Netherhall Laddie, ex. Alberta Queen. Whelped Nov. 11, '07, and is a tri-color. Dear Sir,—Your letter of the 23rd received, also copy of Sec'y-Treasurer's report, containing correspondence re mix-up at Winnipeg, which I have read through with interest, and have noted each statement carefully. In reply, I think I can quite easily explain the cause and foundation of the whole trouble. It is simply this: My entries were incorrectly made to Dr. Smith (in my absence), who came to Calgary with all sorts of letters of introduction and authority to look after any and all business and exhibitors' interests in connection with Winnipeg dog show. When I returned to the grounds, and being told of the entries made for me, viz., "Alberta Lassie," and "Alberta Connie," I at once asked for Dr. Smith, who was called and introduced by another member of our Club. I at once informed him of the changes I wished to be made in my entries, viz., "Alberta Lady" in place of "Alberta Lassie" for all classes except puppy. Dr. Smith marked it down and agreed to change my entry. This gentleman, according to corres-

pondence in Sec'y-Treasurer's report admits my correction, but denies my telling him Lady was not eligible for puppy class. I can give sufficient proof of this, by parties who witnessed and heard our conversation re same. However, this change in entry was not made, which is quite evident now and has started the trouble.

As stated before, in reply to a wire for results of winnings, which I sent the day after judging at Winnipeg, the reply stated, "Alberta Connie" two firsts, "Alberta Lassie" one third. Another report read: "Alberta Lassie," three firsts; "Alberta Connie," one third, and the report as given in Kennel Gazette, was still different to either. It looks yet that the Winnipeg Dog Show Committee are as much at a loss to know which bitch ("Alberta Lady" or "Alberta Connie") won, as I am at a loss to know. I would consider it a favor, as well as a convenience, to know correct wins of my Collies at Winnipeg, if such be possible.

The advertisement in Free Press is as near right as anyone could figure out from the several different reports as to prizes won. If the Winnipeg committee or Dr. Smith wished to call "Alberta Lady" "Alberta Lassie" it was not my fault, I am certain. I consider I did my duty by notifying Dr. Smith, as I have proof I did.

In reply to yours of the 23rd, re entry form showing the dam of "Alberta Lady," as "Prairie Queen," unfortunately this is an error on my part, though very easily explained. When applying for registration of Alberta Lady's dam, the name applied for was "Prairie Queen," but in reply you stated there had already been a bitch registered by that name, so it was then changed to "Scottish Queen," and registered. If you turn to your correspondence and Stud Book re same you will find this correct. However, mistakes will happen, though on my part were entirely unintentional.

It is unfortunate that such a muddle could have occurred, as it is not my policy to misrepresent any dog, nor can I see any benefit by so doing. If my Collies did not win fairly and squarely, which they should have done, I will gladly return any or all prizes. Trusting this will be plain and satisfactory, I am, yours truly,

Moved by Mr. H. S. Rolston, Whereas Springer Spaniels and Pit Bull Terriers are well recognized breeds on the Pacific Coast and are extensively kept and bred to a high type of excellence, and whereas the Springer Spaniel is a recognized breed in England, and an exceedingly useful dog for hunting purposes: and the Pit Bull Terrier is an exceptionally proper breed throughout the west, and is partially recognized by the C. K. C., so far as accepting registrations is concerned, it is resolved, that the Pacific Advisory Board to the C. K. C. are unanimous in asking that Springer Spaniels and Pit Bull Terriers be placed on the recognized list of the Canadian Kennel Club, and be entitled to the full benefits to be derived therefrom: and further, that we feel so confident that the C. K. C. will recognize these breeds that we grant conditional privileges to the shows under our jurisdiction as follows: That pending the decision of the Canadian Kennel Club, relative to these breeds, they are allowed to make classes for them and that if the decision is favorable that the wins will probably have full recognition. Carried.

In support of same I would point out that Springer Spaniels are recognized by the English Kennel Club, the land where they originated. They are a use-

ful dog in every way, and particularly adapted to hunting in this country. Heretofore, while under the impression that this breed was a recognized one, all the coast shows have had a large entry.

Pit Bull Terriers are a large class throughout this Western country, both here and on the prairie, and while there is no standard set for them, the same may be said of Boston Terriers a few years ago, while to-day it is one of the greatest favorites on the American bench. Since making application for this class last year I note that in Vol. X., C.K.C. Stud Book, Nos. 8408 and 8617, and in Vol. XI., No. 8985 are registered as Pit Bull Terriers. We feel that if a dog is worthy of registration, he is also worthy of recognition.

We were glad of the opportunity of viewing the Sabine Kennels' famous pair of smooth Fox Terriers, Sabine Rarebit and Sabine Fernie, both of which went to winners. Both are Terriers built on very fine lines, the dog, especially, which we mistook for a bitch at first sight. Mr. Macdonald's grand bitch, Aldon Mystery, has much heavier bone and more substance than either of them, and also a darker and smaller eye. If one is looking for small, finely built Terriers, then the Sabine pair fill the bill. If a fairly good sized Terrier with bone and substance is wanted, why Mr. Macdonald's bitch will go to the front. One thing certain, they are distinct types of Terriers and Mr. Lacey favored the small ones. We were also glad to be able to see Mr. Quintard's famous pair of wires—Endcliffe Corn Cob and Ridgeway Ruth. Irish Terriers, outside of a few of the winners, held nothing special. Bostons, the banner class of the show, were exceedingly good. In Airedales we were glad to see Messrs. Bain & Greenwood justly win reserve winners dog with Columbus, and winners bitches with Culmington Nettle. There were quite a number of Bull Terriers from Canada, but none in the winners money. In Cockers we were also glad to see Mr. Tomlinson's pair, Martello (black) and Speculator (parti-color) win winners and reserve winners respectively. Mr. McCarroll's Foxhound, Merry Bud, won res. winners.

Ours was only a one-day stay, and hardly any of the judging had been done when we had to leave. We have to thank Mrs. Waters for the notes on Setters and Pointers, and Mr. Perkins for notes on Bulldogs. We look to Dr. Ford for a sort of a general round-up and thank him in advance. (Dr. Ford's manuscript came a little late, so will be published in next month's issue.—Ed.)

English Setters, puppy dogs: 1st, Toss Berwyn, too young to say what it might be; 2nd, Dick Whittington, Dick best in head, though not so good front leg or elbows; 3rd, Shell Kirk Sam, fair head and front, bad quarters. Novice dogs: Deodora Duke 1st, Fairland Scout 2nd. Limit dogs: Governor Frank, too well known to say anything about; 2nd, Brash Berwyn, this dog has nice quality and was in good shape. Very attractive; 3rd, Deodora Duke. Open dogs: 1st, Ch. Bloomfield Rap, is a dog that has a lot of quality, best in stiles we have seen this winter and shown in excellent condition. He has a long, clean head, well put together, and won out for winners, res.; Rock; 2nd, Mall-

wyd Rock, is better than Rap in back. Between the two it is a matter of opinion. It may go the other way the next time they meet. 3rd, Deodora Duke. Puppy bitches: Deodora Daffodil, 1st; High Speed, 2nd; Blue Mouse, 3rd, and the decision about right. Novice: 1st, Deodora Duchess, a good bodied one, just a little thick in head; 2nd, Whitlock Gypsy Pride, 3rd, Shell Kirk Kennels. Limit bitches: 1st, Mallwyd Yankee Anna, a sound, useful and good moving setter; 2nd, Deodora Duchess; 3rd, Lady Westover, she losing in head to Duchess. Open bitches: 1st, Deodora Vic, went to the front. She is without doubt the best English Setter bitch on the bench to-day, and we all tried to see if we could find fault with her, but she beat us all. Mallwyd Catherine, 2nd, and Mallwyd Yankee Girl 3rd. Gordon Setters had but two, neither of them flyers.

Pointers were judged by Major J. M. Taylor; Setters by Dr. Henry Jarrett. Pointers, first class to come forth, puppy dogs: 1st, Yumas Lem; 2nd, The Rector; 3rd, Yumas Dan. Nothing in the three to speak of. Elkwood Kennels entered five, but were absent. Novice dogs were better, and one of the best seen for some time won. I. J. Brundage, Beppo B., a dog of high quality, well balanced from head to stern, and in action one of the best in the class. He has the right type of head that we look for to-day in a Pointer, and was sold for a high price to the Brookdale Kennels. He will be heard of again. This dog got reserve winners, beating the new imported Landowne Sanford Phantom, and it looks as if we can stay at home for our pointers now. 2nd, Brookdales Honey Boy, and as his name indicates, he is a sweet one. He might be a little stronger in muzzle; good in shoulder, that makes up for a lot. 3rd, Wilks Trick, is no flyer. Limit dogs: 1st, Beppo B., repeats of novice; 2nd, Cannobie Lee, not the best in front feet, fair otherwise. We liked Jim Baxter, he was V. H. C.; could have been 2nd, as he is a good all round dog. Open (under 55 lbs.): 1st, Beppo B.; 2nd, Tuscon, first glance one would like him, but as you look him over he shows very open feet, long in pasterns, high-set ear. Brookdale's Dram, a nice one on the same lines as Beppo B., beautiful bodied dog. Open (55 lbs. and over): 1st, Brannes Imp, a well balanced dog; 2nd, the new one Ben Lewis brought over. He is showing age; he is good back of his shoulders, but is too straight in front, his head is the old blocky type, he is throaty also cheeky. Winners went to Brannes Imp, and res. to that good Beppo B. Harry Kirkover won 1st and 2nd with his own breeding Yuma's Stella 1st, and Yuma's Rusty 2nd, in puppy bitches, 3rd to Baxter's Vixen; three fair ones. Novice bitches: Yuma's Stella repeats 2nd, Senga at present unfinished but promising; 3rd, Baxter's Vixen, that scores in rib, back, loin and quality, very attrac-

tive bitch. Limit brought out another one, Ben Lewis got in the old country, and she is the best Pointer bitch seen in this country. There is no getting away from her. She is hard to find fault with, so let her have it her way, 2nd, Yuma, just fair; 3rd, Wägee Nellie. Open (under 50 lbs.): 1st, Yuma; 2nd, Lansdowne Wedding Bells, might give way to Maxim's Sunbeam. Winners went to that grand Lansdowne Melksham First Choice. Res., Yuma.

Bulldogs, puppy dogs: Master Sherwood 1st, nice type, will improve with age; 2nd, Wrestler, shown too fat, fair sort; 3rd, Don Ricardo, long in face and leg. Novice class brought out a surprise in Webster's Bruiser, the best light weight seen for years, in the opinion of many should have gone through to winners. The remainder were so poor that no other prizes were given in this class. In limit, again, Webster's Bruiser to the front, beating the imported Vinemount Clear and Vinemount Traddles, 2nd, Traddles sounder than third; 3rd, Vinemount clear, good sort, unsound. Limit dogs bred in U. S. A. and Canada: Here Brutus Royal was awarded 1st, a good sound dog, grand head, beats Webster's Bruiser in neck, rib and general appearance, a good sound brindle in color; 2nd, Webster's Bruiser; 3rd, Traddles. Open dogs (45 lbs. and over): Vinemount Clear, 1st; 2nd, Puddin' Head Wilson, only fair. No third award. Open dogs (under 45 lbs.): Brutus Royal 1st; Vinemount Battle Axe 2nd, closely followed the winner, better in shoulder, the winner has it in eye and tail; 3rd, Traddles. Others moderate. Brutus Royal got winners dogs; Battle Axe, reserve. Open dogs and bitches under 30 lbs. brought out only two, Webster's Bruiser easily winners over Highland Atom, owned by E. H. Dietzer, Highland Kennels, Buffalo. In junior dogs and bitches, Vinemount Battle Axe had a walk-over. One entry. Puppy bitches: Here Dr. Boulbee scored with Maid of Sherwood, a good daughter of Rolling Stone; 2nd, Beauty, fails in head, eye and ears to the winner; 3rd, only moderate, all white, light all over. Limit bitches: Vinemount Patience won, a grand bitch, should like her with larger nostrils. She got winners bitches; 2nd, Vinemount Darkie, a good colored dark brindle, failed to the winner in substance; 3rd, Vinemount Magnet, loses in ear and light of body, a bad mover, better bone than 2nd; res., Duchess of Sherwood; V.H.C., Austin's Lady Fortune, good shoulder and flat skull. Organization Meeting of the Cocker Spaniel Club of Canada

Held in King Edward Hotel, Toronto, April 9th, 1909, at 9.30 a.m.

Meeting was called to order by Mr. H. B. Donovan, Secretary pro tem, who explained that the purpose of meeting was to organize a Cocker Spaniel Club for Canada. Mr. Lance Farewell was then unanimously asked to take the chair, and copies of the Secretary's report were distributed.

Mr. Chairman and Gentlemen :—

In order to facilitate the work of organization, I have prepared the following report. The support the proposed Club has received warrants immediate action. I have here the signed application blanks returned to me asking for membership in the Club.

I beg to make the following suggestions :

1. That a Club be forthwith formed, the name to be "The Cocker Spaniel Club of Canada."

2. That the officers be : a President, a First Vice-President, a Second Vice-President, an Executive Committee, consisting of the above and five other names, and a Secretary-Treasurer. One or more Honorary Presidents might be added.

3. That the annual fee be \$2.00, payable in advance. That the first fee be now payable. That the next be payable before Dec. 31st, 1909, and that such subsequent annual fee be payable on or before the 31st Dec., of each year. That the fiscal year begin Jan. 1st, and end Dec. 31st.

4. That a committee of three be appointed by the chair to draft constitution and by-laws and to report at next meeting.

5. That a committee of three be appointed by the chair to draft a Standard to report at next meeting.

Note : To facilitate above, I applied to the American Spaniel Club and to the Cocker Spaniel Club for copies of their Standards and rules. In response, those of the latter Club are here for your use, but the Secretary of the former Club writes regretting that the last issue of the Club's book is entirely exhausted. Perhaps one of those present can supply it.

6. I think that as soon as the constitution, by-laws and Standard have been adopted by the Club that they should be printed in neat form, small enough to enclose in an ordinary envelope, and a supply be sent to each member for distribution.

7. Your appointed Secretary should be given authority to procure a necessary supply of office stationery and should be instructed to keep carbon or press copies of all correspondence sent out.

8. It may be thought well to elect Club judges. I don't advise it, as my experience has been that it is not in the interests of the breed to do so.

9. I would suggest that prizes be procured for the cutting of a suitable die, and that club medals be offered at all shows rather than a few more expensive cups, or other trophies. The use of medals will give the smaller

breeder an opportunity of winning something for his money.

XI.

ENTRANCE FEE.

An entrance fee of \$2.00 shall be payable upon election to membership, but this Article shall not become operative until January 1, 1910.

XII.

DUES.

The annual dues shall be \$2.00, payable upon election to membership, and upon the first day of January in each year. But all persons elected to membership in the months of November and December shall be exempt from payment of dues for that fiscal year (the period beginning January 1st and ending December 31st). No member in arrears for dues shall enjoy any of the privileges of the Club until his dues are paid; and if in arrears for twelve months he may be dropped.

XIII.

DISCIPLINE.

The Executive Committee shall have the power, by a majority vote of the members present, to suspend any person from membership in the Club who, in their opinion, has been guilty of a fraudulent or dishonorable act in connection with bench shows or field trials. No person shall, however, be suspended unless ten days' notice of the charge against him, as well as of a time and place where he may appear in his own defence, shall be served upon him. XIV.

PRIZES.

All Club prizes offered for competition shall be open for members only and subject to the rules, weights and Standard of the Club. No Club prize shall be offered for any breed other than Cocker Spaniels, nor unless the officiating judge shall agree to base his awards upon the rules, weights and Standard of the Club. At each annual meeting the Executive Committee shall invite expressions of opinion from the members as to the character of prizes to be purchased with Club funds, and as to the most equitable method of placing the same in competition.

XV.

STANDARD.

The following Standard of Perfection for Cocker Spaniels is hereby established:

SKULL. Not so heavy as in other Sporting Spaniels, with smooth forehead and clearly defined eyebrows and stop, the medium line distinctly marked and gradually disappearing until lost rather more than halfway up a well developed, rounded and comparatively wide skull, showing no prominence in the cheeks, which, like the sides of the muzzle, should present a smooth clean-cut appearance.

MUZZLE—Proportionately shorter and lighter than in the Field Spaniel, showing no fullness under the eyes; jaws even and approaching squareness. Teeth sound and regular, the front ones meeting. Lips cut off square prevent-

The Cocker Spaniel Club of Canada.

CONSTITUTION.

I.

TITLE.

This organization shall be known as "The Cocker Spaniel Club" of Canada, with headquarters in Toronto.

II.

OBJECT.

The object of the Club shall be the encouragement of breeding, exhibiting and training of Cocker Spaniels.

III.

MEMBERSHIP.

Any individual of good character shall be eligible for membership in the Club. The power of election to membership is vested in the Executive Committee, and three negative votes shall reject.

IV.

OFFICERS.

The officers of the Club shall be a President, a 1st and a 2nd Vice-President, a Secretary-Treasurer, and an Executive Committee consisting of five other names and the above. They shall be elected by ballot at the annual meeting of the Club, and shall hold office until the next annual meeting or until their successors shall be elected. No member may hold more than one office at the same time.

V.

MANAGEMENT.

The management of the Club shall be entrusted to its Executive Committee. Five members of the Executive Committee shall constitute a quorum at all of its meetings. The powers of the Executive Committee may be limited by action taken at any meeting of the Club.

VI.

PRESIDENT.

The President shall preside at all meetings of the Club and Executive Committee. He shall audit and approve all bills. He shall order special meetings of the Club and Executive Committee to be held whenever in his judgment the same may be necessary.

VII.

VICE-PRESIDENT.

In the absence of the President, or in the event of his inability to act, the 1st Vice-President, and in his absence the 2nd Vice-President, shall exercise all of his powers and duties.

VIII.

SECRETARY-TREASURER.

The Secretary-Treasurer shall keep the minutes of all meetings of the Club and Executive Committee; notify members of their election; notify members of all meetings of the Club; con-

IX.

VACANCIES.

In case any office shall become vacant, it shall be the duty of the Secretary-Treasurer under the supervision of the Executive Committee to cause a ballot to be taken by mail to fill such vacancy. The votes shall be canvassed by the Executive Committee, and all ballots so taken shall remain on file for one year and may be freely inspected by any member of the Club at all reasonable times.

X.

MEETINGS.

Nine members, present in person, shall constitute a quorum at all meetings of the Club. The annual meeting shall be held in January, the time and place to be fixed by the Executive Committee. If the President or Vice-Presidents, as the case may be, shall neglect or refuse to call a special meeting when requested so to do, a special meeting may be called by a notice in writing signed by at least ten per cent. of the members of the Club, which notice shall specify the object of the meeting, and a copy of which shall be mailed to each member of the Club at

ing any appearance of snipiness. Nose well developed in all directions and black in color excepting in the Reds, Liver, Parti-colors of these shades, and in the Roans of the lighter hues, when it may be brown or black.

EYES. Comparatively large, round, rather full yet never goggled nor weak as in the Toy Spaniel kinds. They should be dark in the Blacks, Black and Tans, the darker shades of Parti-colors and Roans. In the Reds and Liver, and in the Parti-colors and Roans of these colors, they should be brown, but of a shade not lighter than hazel.

EARS. Lobular, set low, leather fine and not extending beyond the nose; well clothed with long, silky hair which should be straight or wavy.

NECK AND SHOULDERS. Neck sufficiently long to allow the nose to reach the ground easily; muscular, free from throatiness and running into clean cut, sloping shoulders, which should not be wide at the points.

BODY. Comparatively short, compact and firmly knit together, giving the impression of a concentration of power and untiring activity. Chest deep rather than wide, not narrow fronted nor yet so wide as to interfere with free action of the forelegs. Ribs well sprung, deep and carried far back; short in the coupling and flank, free from any tucked appearance. Back and loin immensely strong and compact in proportion to the size of the dog, the former level and the latter slightly arched. Hips wide with quarters considerably rounded and very muscular.

LEGS AND FEET. Forelegs short and straight, though proportionately longer than in any of the other breeds of short-legged Spaniels; strongly boned and muscled, with elbows well let down and straight, short, strong pasterns. Hind legs proportionately short. Stifles well bent; second thighs clearly defined. Hocks clean, strong, well let down, bent and turning neither in nor out; the hind quarters from a back view presenting an impressive combination of propelling power. Feet neither small nor large, round, firm, not spreading and with deep, strong, horny pads and plenty of hair between the toes. They should turn neither in nor out.

STERN. Should be set on and carried level with the back, and when at work its action should be incessant in this, the brightest and merriest of the whole Spaniel family.

COAT. Flat or slightly waved, silky and very dense, with ample Setter-like feather.

COLOR AND MARKINGS. Blacks should be jet black, and Reds, Liver, etc., should never be faded or "washy" shades, but of good sound colors. White on the chest of self-colors, while objectionable, should not disqualify.

WEIGHT. Not under 18 nor exceeding 24 pounds.

GENERAL DESCRIPTION. Embodying the foregoing, i. e., a neat headed, wide awake, serviceable looking little dog with an expression of great intelligence, short in body when viewed from above, yet standing over considerable ground for one of his in-

ches upon strong, straight front legs, with wide, muscular quarters, suggestive of immense power, especially when viewed from behind. A downward tendency in front he ought not to possess, but should stand well up at the shoulders, like the clever little sporting dog that he is. Massive in appearance by reason of his sturdy body, powerful quarters and strong, well-boned limbs, he should nevertheless impress one as being a dog capable of considerable speed combined with great powers of endurance and in all his movements he should be quick and merry, with an air of alertness and a carriage of head and stern suggestive of an inclination to work.
