

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## NOTES AND COMMENTS

Montreal: Running up and down, or is it down and up, between Montreal and Toronto, once a week the past month, we have seen incidentally more than a few of the dog owners of the big eastern city.

Early in April we had the pleasure of an introduction to Mrs. J. A. Laurin, who was accompanying her Airedale husband east, after a visit to her home west of Toronto. Mrs. Laurin is a keen fancier, and hopes to be able to show the mere male side of the house how to produce an Airedale good enough to go to the front. In fact, Mrs. Laurin's ambition is to beat Mr. Laurin at his own game in the Airedale fancy.

Mr. and Mrs. Laurin told us a whole shipload of Airedales were on the way from England and as mascots two good Scottish Terriers.

A chat with that sound Terrier judge, Mr. James Lindsay, showed us that his views on the Fox Terrier had not changed. He still wants coats of pin wire, not silk floss, and a sturdy Terrier with bone and punishing power.

Boston Terrier Show: We are glad to know from Mr. Phelan that the recent specialty show of the Boston Terrier Club of Montreal was a success in every way. Both numbers and quality were good, and the winners added three points towards championship honors.

Mr. Dondero's judging gave universal satisfaction, and the public appreciated the show so highly that the hall was crowded all day and evening. While in Montreal we heard nothing but good of the management. We would suggest that more time be given the preliminaries of next show as we feel sure over one hundred Bostons could be secured.

Are you going to Montreal? While in Montreal last month we saw Mr. J. R. Innis, the energetic Secretary of the Montreal Canine Association, who told us that no effort on his part would be spared to keep the M. K. A. show in the front. We hope his committee are giving him loyal support. Don't leave all the hard work to two or three. The dates for the show, as already announced, are June 1st to 4th, and it will be held under C.K.C. rules.

The judges appointed are Mr. C. H. Mower, who will take the Bostons; Mr. James Lindsay the Irish Terriers—and he kens them; Mr. W. A. Williams, Bulldogs, Mr. Thos. Moore, the big chaps, St. Bernards, Danes and hounds. This completes the specialists, while Mr. C. H. Lyndon will be the all-rounder, and take all the remaining breeds.

The Dog Show Committee is composed of well known dog men, i.e., Mr. Harold Morgan, Mr. H. E. Thomas, Mr. C. E. Gudewill, Mr. J. A. Laurin, Mr. W. C. Tinley, Mr. A. H. Hersy, Mr. Thos. Moore, and Mr. J. R. Innis.

As entries close on May 22nd, there is little time to lose. Mr. Innis will be glad to send schedules to all who write for them.

"Mount Royal": A little while back we referred to the illness of that well known Canadian scientist and author, Prof. T. Wesley Mills, of Montreal. We were then unaware of the nature of the trouble, but have since had a dictated letter from "Mount Royal" that explains the difficulty. Dr. Mills wrote us from London, England, whence he had gone to have an operation performed. For some nine or ten months Dr. Mills had suffered more or less from

an abdominal tumor, that, while not dangerous in itself, was painful and troublesome, especially so to one of such an active temperament. Though the services of one of the best surgical experts in London were secured, the operation caused so much shock that before the patient had sufficiently recovered, the winter season had been entered upon. We are glad to know that with the advent of fine weather a rapid recovery is looked for and soon a complete convalescence. We feel sure that Dr. Wesley Mills' friends in Canada and the United States—and they are legion—will rejoice with us in this, and trust that we may in the near future have him in our midst again sound and well as ever.

Mrs. Gordon regretted greatly letting go a dam that had proved a producer of winners, but then the on-coming puppies—and they are many—had to be accommodated.

Mr. Percy Brown, of Tenn., has bought the O. K. C. winner King Edward Pinafore, and will show her all through the south. As she is good enough to win with the best she should do well for Mr. Brown.

King Edward Rightaway, a nice dog pup, went to Mr. N. Robinson, of Toronto, and Glenholme Model to E. J. Dunn, of Chicago, Ill.

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Brings business: In sending in a change of copy for the stud announcement of his Bulldog, Mr. A. A. Lees adds: "I have received a very liberal patronage for my stud dogs and have always found the Canadian Kennel Gazette a good medium to help to do business." This must be satisfactory to all concerned.

Winnipeg show: Dr. Bell is actually and positively guaranteeing a five point show in Winnipeg in July next, and what the Doctor says the Doctor does. The management is bringing in an outsider this year to judge all classes, and no less a one than the redoubtable Ben Lewis. He is looked upon as a chief attraction, but the prize list will be a cash one, so that wins will not mean barren honor alone. We hope easterners as well as Gazette readers in the west will bear this in mind.

Donneybrooks: The Donneybrook Kennels, Brockville, Irish lass, Donnybrook Nell C. 10,514, presented the owners on February 28th with four fine puppies, by Donnybrook Bill C. 10,513. At this writing they look good.

The same kennels smooth Fox Terrier by Dauntless II. (Ch. Dreadnought — Ch. Donna Fortuna), ex. Norfolk Tiney, by Ch. Norfolk Veracity, is in whelp to Experiment, and if breeding counts, something good enough to win should result.

Dr. Ford in Europe: Dr. Carl Y. Ford was to sail for Europe on May 15th, and we hope got safely away. Dr. Ford expects to be absent for several months in connection with neurological work, his special study. He will not, however, overlook "our friend the dog" and has promised us a letter as occasion permits.

During his absence, as at present, his dogs will be in charge of Mr. Jno. Webster, Hamilton, Ont., whose care is efficient.

Clapton items: The Clapton Kennels report the arrival of several litters of smooth Fox Terriers by Clapton Blue Blade, from the following well known bitches: Little Dutch, by Champion Dukedom; Clapton Miss Fay, by Ch. Sabine Resist; Clapton Lady Margaret, by Ch. Sabine Resist. There should be a flyer out of the lot, judging from early appearances.

Mr. W. Cook, Blue Bonnets, Quebec, has bred a smooth bitch to Clapton Blue Blade.

Mr. E. A. Delcorde, Ottawa, has bred two smooth bitches to Clapton Persist.

T. K. C. show: We have it quite unofficially that the Toronto Kennel Club show will be held on the Exhibition grounds, and that possibly it may

extend over two days, from June 30th to July 1st.

Calgary show: The Calgary Dog Show will be held on the 7th, 8th and 9th of July next during the holding of the Provincial Fair in Calgary.

Montreal Collie Judge: To the list of specialist judges at Montreal, given in another paragraph, should be added the name of Mr. Joseph Reid, who will take his old time favorites, the Collies.

"Colne" importations: The Airedales imported by Mr. Laurin consist of twenty-one, nearly all winners at big shows in Britain. The consignment consists principally of matrons who have been bred to such noted sires as Watland's Marvel, Elrige Monarch, Midland Royal, Crompton Monarch and Brownhill Marquis. Two Scottish Terrier bitches complete the lot. They came in charge of an experienced man, who is to act as assistant kennel man in the Colne Kennels.

"Colne" shipments: Mr. Laurin evidently catches the Airedale interest both coming and going. In one day recently he sent four bitches to North Bend, Ore., a puppy to Mexico city, a puppy to Duluth, Minn., and one to Willoughby, Ohio.

Hamilton judges: Mr. Jno. G. Kent, Toronto; Mr. Jos. Kennedy, Hamilton, and Mr. W. R. Goodwin, East Aurora, N.Y., are the judges chosen for Hamilton show, which opens on May 24th. Give them a bumper.

Another B. C. show: Duncan, B.C., a town of one thousand people, will hold a dog show under C.K.C. rules. The dates are June 24th and 25th, and the show will be in connection with the annual fair. Duncan is about forty miles north of Victoria, on Vancouver Island, and, we hope, may get liberal support and help from the large places.

If a town of this size in British Col-

umbia can hold a dog show, why not a hundred such in Ontario and Quebec?

Cocker Club: The Cocker Spaniel Club of Canada has grown apace, and we publish a list of members to date elsewhere in this issue. Every Cocker man in Canada should see that his name is on the membership roll. The Club wants members and is advertising to get them, as will be seen by notice in this issue. The annual fee is only \$2.00, the privileges many. Then why not come in?

A sad end: Just as we close this issue of Gazette, we learn that the King Edward Collie, Pinafore, that went south this month did not reach Tennessee alive. The supposition is that the poor beastie was smothered en route. Apart from the cruelty of the case, that makes one shrink, the financial loss is heavy. We hope that those responsible for the death may be made pay for it.

## HOW TO DIAGNOSE CANINE DISEASES

A paper read by Mr. Jno. P. Bond, V.S., before the Toronto Kennel Club.

Mr. Chairman and Gentlemen :

Holding as I do the office of Honorary Veterinarian to the Toronto Kennel Club, it is considered by the Executive Committee to be a part of my duty to occasionally read a paper on some subject which would be of interest to our members, most of whom are breeders and owners of dogs. And as such will at some time in their career find it necessary to care for an occasional case of sickness in their kennels, I thought I could not do better than to explain to you the manner in which to make an examination of your case, so that you could determine the nature of the disease from which the patient was suffering. In doing so I will try to be as plain and simple as possible, and not use more professional technicalities than I can help in making my subject clear to you.

There are two modes of examining a sick dog, which may be termed general and special.

A general examination refers to the symptoms which involve the whole organism, whilst the special examination involves single organs of the body and their secretions or excretions. We proceed either by beginning at the head and moving gradually backward, or if our attention is called by some specially striking symptom, we may examine at once a certain part or organ or group of organs, as, for example, where an animal has been injured, in which case we examine first the injured region, and afterward direct our attention to other parts or organs which may be sympathetically affected. In doing which the following points must be observed :

1st.—The physical condition.

2nd.—The constitution and nutritive condition.

3rd.—The visible mucous membrane and the skin.

4th.—The temperature of the body and extremities and the pulse.

The physical condition presents more marked and rapid changes in the dog than in any other animal, for even in slight disturbances of the stomach or digestive organs he will be downcast, irritable and nervous to a marked extent,

may show a disinclination to move, or may constantly change his position from one place to another.

Nervousness, a staring appearance of the eyes, great restlessness, constant barking or yelping, point to some affection of the brain, whether of congestion itself or a sympathetic condition caused by parasites in the intestines, or from Rabies. A tendency to biting or destroying may lead to a suspicion of Rabies, a hoarse howling bark, a craving for indigestible objects, such as bits of wood, coal, etc., a wild, hunted look, and the uncontrollable disposition to keep on the move will further arouse that suspicion, and it would be well to place that dog under restraint for the safety of the neighborhood.

Brain symptoms also are present from shock or injuries to the skull and in some serious cases of distemper or blood poisoning.

Very sick animals will not rise when called by a stranger, or even by the owner, when a stranger is present, and the position in which the dog lies will to a certain extent show the examiner where the trouble lies. For instance, when affected by one-sided diseases of the chest, as in pleurisy or pneumonia, they prefer to lie on the affected side, but in cases where there is difficulty or labored respiration, as in double pneumonia, they assume a sitting posture, or lie on the breast bone with legs under the body.

The general condition may depend to a large extent upon the age of the dog, manner of feeding, amount of exercise, etc., but as a rule if a dog is fairly well fed and continues in poor condition, it is due to some form of disease being present.

The skin, also, is to a certain extent a guide in our examinations, as if the dog is healthy it will be loose, and may be easily pulled from the different parts of the body, but in disease it is tight, and loses its soft texture and smooth feel to the fingers. The eyes, also, which in health are bright and animated in expression, become dull and listless in sickness, and are depressed or sunken in their sockets. It is a good idea to weigh your dog at intervals to determine whether he is holding or losing in weight under existing conditions. A dog will lose weight

very fast in diseases of the digestive organs, and in all cases where a high temperature is present.

The visible mucous membranes of the eyes, nostrils and mouth and throat should be noted, and if found to be red and highly congested it shows a correspondingly high fever. If it is very pale it shows an opposite condition, denoting defective heart action, and need of stimulation. If the membranes show a yellow tinge it denotes a disordered liver or some of its ducts. The volume and consistency of any discharge from eyes or nose must be noted. That from a common cold or catarrh will be thin, light colored and free from smell, and readily disappears with simple treatment; but if not, and it becomes acute and then chronic, the nature of the discharge changes to a darker color, is more viscid, and glues the eyelids together, and accumulates in the nostrils, often sufficient to cause a difficulty in breathing, and much discomfort. In distemper this discharge becomes more purulent, yellowish or somewhat greenish in color, which collects between and under the eyelids, and flows down the cheeks, to which it adheres, drying in yellowish crusts, which cause soreness and inflammation of the surrounding tissues. At this stage there often appears ulceration of the cornea from the dog rubbing and scratching at his eyes on account of the intolerable itching which is almost invariably present. The discharge from the nostrils is very similar, only that frequently it is quite brownish in color, and may be tinged with blood.

The skin itself presents some very evident symptoms of disease, independent of a number of local diseases which need not be considered here. The skin color changes may be seen on parts of the body devoid of or slightly covered with hair, namely, the belly and inner surface of thighs, a reddened or slightly yellow color being there found when same exists in mucous membranes of eyes, mouth and throat, so if it is very red it denotes fever, and if yellow, a disturbance of the liver.

In some cases of distemper we find a pustulous rash on belly and inner thighs, which is a prominent symptom of that disease, and which gradually

disappears as the patient progresses towards recovery. The skin of a very sick dog is dry and hard, being very hot in cases of intense fever, and cold where there is much debility or after internal hemorrhage or in collapse from shock. In fat dogs the skin has a very unpleasant, greasy feel to the touch. Profuse perspiration is rarely seen in dogs, except in cases of excessive fright.

The hair is also a useful guide to determining physical condition, as in sick, badly fed or neglected dogs, or if they are infested with parasites it loses its natural gloss, becomes dry and brittle, breaking easily, and in many cases falls out entirely, as is frequently seen in dogs which have undergone a severe illness. In some diseases, notably distemper, the odor given off by the skin becomes very offensive.

The natural temperature of the body in dogs is very uniform, averaging about 101 2-5, but under ordinary conditions a temperature of 102 degrees or nearly so need not cause any concern. Younger animals have a slightly higher temperature than older ones.

The temperature is taken by introducing an ordinary clinical thermometer into the rectum as far as possible, taking care, of course, that the mercury in the instrument is shaken down below the normal point. It should be allowed to remain three or four minutes, according to the sensitiveness of the instrument. When an increase in temperature is detected, which is not due to explainable causes, we know that fever is present, and this may vary from time to time according to the nature of the disease or ailment from which the dog is suffering. In the early stages of distemper we find a very rapid rise in temperature, whilst in other common diseases, such as catarrhal diseases, pleurisy, pneumonia, etc., and diseases of the digestive organs, the fever will advance to a certain point, and will vary very slightly until improvement sets in, when it will as steadily become reduced.

A temperature below normal must be looked upon as a serious condition, and measures must be promptly taken to remedy it. In cases of septicemia or blood poisoning, which is not an uncommon disease in the dog, a sudden lowering of the temperature below nor-

mal denotes collapse and a fatal termination.

All fevers as a rule begin with a chill, or several of them. This is shown by a shivering or quivering of the muscles and skin, and finally of the whole body, and which are seen at intervals. Then follows an increase in the number of beats and volume of the pulse, and in the respirations. Digestion is impaired, and the excretions from bowels and the urine are changed in quantity and composition. The nervous system is also affected, and there will be a partial or entire loss of appetite, constipation and often extreme thirst. In the nursing bitch the milk is quite lessened in quantity, and if the temperature continues to be high the animal becomes very weak and loses flesh very rapidly. In cases where improvement ensues the temperature gradually goes down and the pulse lessens in frequency and improves in tone, respirations become even and regular, appetite returns and the patient shows interest in its surroundings. In cases terminating unfavorably or in collapse there will be a rapid fall in temperature, the heart's action becomes weak and fluttering, and soon imperceptible, the mucous membranes become pale, and death shortly ensues.

The condition of the pulse is another important matter in connection with our examination of a sick dog, and may be felt by putting the hand directly over the heart, which lies on the left side in the lower portion of the chest, close to the breast bone, or it may be felt in the femoral artery which runs down inside of the thigh, or again inside of the forearm. I myself prefer the heart. The normal pulse varies greatly according to breed, age, size, etc., and is rapidly increased by physical efforts, fear, fright, etc., and will run from about 70 to 120—large animals being less, and small animals having a correspondingly frequent rate, the rhythm and volume must also be considered, which comes only to one who has had the practice to enable him to distinguish them. To a novice, therefore, I think the condition as shown by the thermometer is the best to go by.

I trust that those few remarks and suggestions may contain something which may prove of use to some of the club's members, in helping to detect a disease in the primary stages,

and in enabling them to have attention given before it progresses too far. If the Club should so desire I will be glad on some future occasion to take up some of the common diseases of the dog, and suggest what should be done in the way of treatment.

#### RAILROADS AND DOGS.

At a recent meeting of the Boston Terrier Club I was appointed on a committee of two to communicate with the various kennel clubs of the country and ascertain what action, if any, should be taken with a view to protesting the recent regulation passed by the railroads, classifying dogs as excess baggage.

We feel that this regulation is much in the nature of an imposition on the dog-owners of the country, and that a co-operate protest of the latter might accomplish much in this matter so plainly transgressing their rights.

Therefore, we would be very glad if we might learn the sentiment of your club regarding this, with a view to acting in unity should the concensus of opinion seem to warrant such a course. Cordially yours,

## VICTORIA, B. C., SHOW

Held at the A. O. U. W. Hall, Victoria, B.C., by the Victoria Kennel Club, April 6, 7 and 8, 1909. Number of classes, 111; number of entries, 287; number of dogs, 201; championship points, 3. Ribbon show, Mr. George F. Dunn, Victoria, B. C., secretary. Mr. Robert Large, Victoria, B.C., superintendent. Judge, Major J. M. Taylor, Rutherford, N.J.—all breeds.

The Victoria Kennel Club this spring maintained its past reputation for holding a good starting show in the round of shows listed for the Coast for the current season, a three-pointer under Canadian Kennel Club rules and held April 6, 7 and 8. The three-day innovation was most acceptable to both patrons and dogs. Entries in the various classes this year were not well balanced, as out of twenty-four breeds exhibited, in fifteen of them there was a very small showing, with little or no competition, and four in which there was but one entry. Pointers, for the first time in the club's history, took the lead away from the English Setters and demonstrated that this breed is getting very popular among fanciers and sportsmen in this locality. There were thirty-four Pointers benched, and in the English Setters thirty-one. Gordons and Irish had a baker's dozen each. Collies were slim, with but seven. Cockers did better, with sixteen. In Terriers, Fox Terriers led, with twenty-three. Irish were strong, with fifteen. Scotties, Bulldogs and Bull Terriers, but five, respectively. Bostons got a showing with one. The Yankee breed is evidently not popular here yet.

The sensation of the show was the placement of Ch. Mallwyd Bob over the newly imported English Setter, Mallwyd Major (a Crystal Palace winner), when the special was up for the best English Setter in the show. Major J. M. Taylor did the judging. The new dog is a representative of the strictly English type, on the heavy order, grand in head and showing much breeding. The 1908 Collie winner, Ballyarnet Student, found nothing to press him here. Some new faces came up in Irish Terriers, and good ones, too. Airedales are getting stronger locally each year here, the entire entry of a dozen being Vancouver Island owned dogs. Lady Teazle, the pick of the

lot, won out easily and has much class.

The show was essentially a British Columbia exhibit, barely a half dozen entries from the other side, likely due to American fanciers having only lukewarm interest in Canadian Kennel Club wins, and also the expense and distance involved in showing dogs from California and Oregon.

According to the catalogue, no winners classes were provided in the following breeds: St. Bernards, Scottish Deerhounds, Irish Water Spaniels, Field Spaniels, Clumber Spaniels, Irish Setters, Pointers, Collies, Fox Terriers (smooth and wire), Scottish Terriers, Irish Terriers, Boston Terriers, Black and tan Terriers, Dandy Dinmons, Maltese Terriers, Bull Terriers and Toy Spaniels.—Field and Fancy.

### NOTES ON BUFFALO SHOW.

Canadians look upon a Buffalo show in the spring with a pleasure like to that of the great Toronto fixture in the autumn. This year a multiplicity of adverse circumstances prevented the show from being, numerically, up to gatherings of former years. However, the Buffalo Kennel Club is made up of the sort of men whose ardor is not dampened by adversity or an off-year. Unfortunately, a clashing of dates with the near-by Youngstown, Ohio Show, split the entry. Then few Canadian exhibitors received their premium lists in time to enter. Nevertheless, there was a representative gathering of Canadians in attendance to enjoy the unstinted hospitality of the Buffalo Kennel Club.

In Fox Terriers, that extraordinarily successful brace of smooths, Sabine Rarebit and Sabine Fernie, both of whom have lowered the colors of the invincible Warren Remedy, were on hand and were the centre of attraction in the Terrier quarter. That ever keen sportsman, Mr. W. P. Fraser, just back from England, ran over from Toronto especially to see the Sabine brace and compare them with what he had just seen on the other side of the Atlantic. His opinion must be valuable, and he declared there were few, if any, to eclipse this wonderful pair. Mr. Fraser thought, possibly, that Champion Oxonian and his successful son, Champion Avon Oxondafe, might

gain a decision over Rarebit, but it was an open question. For those who were not present we may state that both these Terriers are of a type far removed from the rather big sort, with substance, that have been winning of late years. Both are small sized, short backed, clean cut specimens, full of fire and character and hard to get away from as they are shown by that wonderful ring-general, George Thomas. On close examination they are found to have beautiful shoulders, fronts and feet and clean round bone. Their backs are so short that on parade they are stilted behind. Rarebit has a rather light, round eye and a jaw that might be stronger. Fernie beats him in these points. Both have coats of good texture. They are from the same litter—Sabine Ruler—the sire, Ch. Sabine Fad—the dam—grand breeding and no mistake! All said and done, we failed to find where they were superior to Warren Remedy.

The wins were New York over again with St. Ann's Primrose added—the bitch that Mr. George Raper repeatedly scored with in England. She is wonderful in head, eye, ear and expression—perfect neck, shoulders and front and a true pin-wire coat. However, she is very big and made the others look like dwarfs. Under the name of Ridgeway Prim she dropped to third place.

Dr. Henry Jarrett judged the Cockers and seemed to give satisfaction in most instances. Mr. Tomlinson, of Woodstock, was deservedly successful. His black dog, Martello, who did well last autumn, has developed into a sturdy Cocker. His quality and substance will always entitle him to a high place in any company. His kennel mate, Speculator, the taking particolor, has also improved, and few of his color can beat him. He was unfortunate in having to give way to Mr. W. T. Payne's red dog, Bloodstone, whom he beats in head and eye. Mr. Payne made a good entry and met with his usual success. Last year's winning black bitch, Inis, repeated her victories. The centre of attraction was the much heralded particolor, Lady Drassac, who is under the guidance of the alert and skilful Ben Lewis. This bitch has the distinction of having beaten Mr. Bloodgood's beautiful brace, Mepal's Iris and Hilma. She is a good one in many respects, but we failed to find sufficient

merit to warrant her achievements. Her rather strong skull, undershot mouth and long body must always keep her out of the very first flight. She is a good sporting size and moves well and has good bone.

Toys: These were better classes than usual. Pomeranians were much above the average. The feature of the collection was Miss Sturges' exquisite little sable, Offley Sunny Atom—just over from England. Though he is a tiny little chap of about 3 lbs. weight, he is as sound and as active as a Terrier. His back is so short that his tail and head are in close proximity. It is worth going a long way to see such a gem. Mrs. Wylie had our old favorite, Cairndhu Tot in good form, and won through to winners.

Mrs. O'Rourke, like her husband, is always to be reckoned with as the breeder of a good one, rather than a mere buyer. Her charming little black, Sir Dandy, kept up the reputation of the family. Dr. Foster was again unfortunate by being too late for the judging.

#### VANCOUVER NOTES.

I was sadly disappointed at the way the Fox Terriers, in particular, were judged after witnessing the competent judges so much in the old country. It seems the old complaint is still to be tolerated, and that is that no notice is taken of a dog's coat, which to my mind is most essential in the making up of a wire Fox Terrier. Several really first class coated dogs were passed over when they should have been in the running. Another very important matter which escaped the judge's eye was a dog's teeth. I may safely say that there weren't more than three Fox Terriers had this important point examined. I am perfectly aware that a judge's task is an arduous one, but at the same time let us have the dogs examined all round, and not only general appearance as a criterion.

Mr. Bostock has purchased a promising bitch puppy by Ingatestone Rustem ex. Mistress of the Robes, from Mr. Forshaw.

Mr. Coates has a promising litter by Red Leander, ex. Lady Van.

Mr. J. Chalmers, of Cloverdale, who bred "Brooser Leander" (a dog we should have liked to have seen at our

late show), has two good litters by Ingatestone Rustem.

Mr. T. McAuliffe has bred his bitch, "Regaine," a litter sister to "Dukedom," to Ingatestone Rustem.

Mr. Bostock's Reminiscence has been served by Red Leander, also Mr. Cotttingham's bitch Rats.

Mr. W. D. Bruce, who is always on the lookout, has purchased from Mr. W. Coates a rare bitch pup by Leander Club. This is the best pup I have seen here yet for her age, four and a half months, and she only has to keep on going as she started to take all before her. Her owner has great expectations of her on the bench. The same gentleman has disposed of his grand stud dog, Leander Club, to Mr. Melville Hamilton, of Royal Oak. This dog ought to do his new owner a world of good, as he has proved a wonderful sire, and is known throughout the country as such. Among some of his progeny are Mr. Chalmers' Brooser Leander, W. D. Bruce's Red Leander (likely to follow his sire's footsteps), Mr. Coates' Leander Maid, Mr. Price's Lady Leander and Leander's Son, Black Leander, and that much admired puppy at our last show of Mr. T. B. Chappell's, Duke.

Mr. Price, of Royal Oak, has a good litter by Swansea Result.

Mr. McConnell had very bad luck with his litter by Swansea Result, all dying before a day old.

P. Alberto's winning wire bitch, Queen of Italy, has been served by Swansea Result.

The Orme Kennels were not represented at our last show, Mr. W. D. Bruce declining to exhibit, also Mr. Chalmers.

I have just received from England that grand little wire Fox Terrier, Ormonde Bristles, which has won 100 firsts, specials, cups, etc. He is acknowledged by experts to be the most compact little dog ever seen here. He is bred on his sire's side the same as Ch. Southboro Salex, while he is all Redmond bred on his dam's. This dog should prove a valuable acquisition to all fanciers wishing to improve their stock, as he is without a doubt the best wire on the Pacific Coast. I imported him for Mr. W. D. Bruce, but have since induced him to sell to me as I was so infatuated with him. I have placed him at stud at the very low

fee of 15 dollars, and he has started off by serving W. D. Bruce's grand bitch, Maid of Millgate (by Royston Ring-leader), which Mr. Geo. Thomas wanted to purchase last spring. Ormonde Bristles will be known as Swansea Ormonde Bristles in the future. He has won under thirty different judges, including 2nd Crystal Palace, 1st Shrewsbury, 2nd Newcastle, 2nd Edinboro', 1st Darlington, 1st Sunderland, 1st Galashiels, 1st Haswell, 2nd Carlisle, 1st Kelso, 1st Bellingham, 1st Bishop Auckland, 1st Consett, 1st Abergavenny, 1st Narbeth, 1st Carmarthen, 1st Swansea, 1st Blyth, 1st Haydon Bridge, and was awarded best in show on several occasions. He weighs 17 lbs., and has the substance with it, which his progeny will prove in the near future.

## NOTES.

The Vancouver Kennel Club held their fourth annual dinner on Friday night, April 16th, at the Badminton Hotel, where about one hundred and fifty ladies and gentlemen were present paying their tribute to our friend the dog. After justice had been done to the many tempting delicacies, the worthy President, F. W. Welsh, proposed the toast to The King, which was heartily drank, accompanied by the singing, "For he's a jolly good fellow." Our Judges was the next toast, which was replied to by Major Taylor, who stated he was the oldest judge in the States, having judged his first show thirty-three years ago and congratulated the Kennel Club upon the rapid strides made in the culture of the dog in Vancouver.

Judge Bradshaw, who was the judge of the present show, stated he met the best fanciers here he ever met. All he could do was the best in his judgment and places the dogs as he thinks fit. He also made the sweeping statement that he is willing to back his opinion on his decisions with the next dog for any amount the owner of the losing dog wishes, under any recognized judge he wishes to mention.

Col. Dudley spoke at length on the St. Bernard and handed around various photographs for inspection. He wished to congratulate the Kennel Club upon its position, and was extremely glad to see so many ladies present. He also emphasized the fact that it cost no more to keep a good dog than a bad one. He advocated the K. C. taking up the matter of

poisoned dogs which had occurred in this city and help to bring the offenders to justice. He also stated he had the worst Fox Terrier in the city, called The Devil. (Laughter).

Judge Large, responding to the toast of Cats, said: "Cats draw the ladies, and you cannot do anything without the ladies," and strongly spoke of the future of having cat shows.

Mr. R. G. Gamwell proposed the K. C. in a very neat speech, which was responded to by the President, F. W. Welsh, who was given a hearty cheer and "He's a jolly good fellow," said this occasion was the first time ladies had been invited to the K. C. dinners, and nothing gave him greater pleasure than seeing them present. He dwelt upon the interest taken in the canine pets by the ladies, and did not see any reason why they should not participate in the interests of the show. We owe much to the ladies, and admitted that were it not for his wife he would not figure as he did. The speaker continued that he for one will give them credit as the lot generally falls to the ladies to look after the puppies, etc. If the ladies choose to come we will be glad to have them and sincerely hoped that this occasion would be the first of many occasions where the ladies would be present. Year by year the K. C. had been growing more successful and there had been a marked increase in the class of dogs. He noted that our friends from the States were anxious to win on the Canadian side, and hoped we shall see more of them in the future. In responding, he said he felt his position as an honorary character and felt he was giving them their due. He was glad to say there hasn't been a president who received more loyal support than he had on this occasion.

The credit falls to the lot of the K. C. as a whole, and tendered his hearty thanks to the visitors who had patronized them. The objects of the K. C. was to look after the interests of the dog and improve the breeds. He was indebted to the various dog clubs for their support, particularly the Cocker Spaniel Club, and hoped that in the near future all breeds would have their specialty clubs. He thanked all present for their loyal support and hearty manner in which they drank the toast. (Renewed cheers).

At this stage a presentation was

made by F. W. Welsh to the show manager, W. M. Coates, in the form of a gold watch from the lady competitors.

Mr. Coates, in responding, said he was agreeably surprised that his services were appreciated to such an extent, and assured all present that it was a pleasure for him to do anything he could for the ladies (laughter), and endorsed every word the president had said about them.

Mr. G. Dyke, in proposing the toast of Our Dogs, although suffering from acute sea sickness —having crossed the ferry—(laughter), said he was highly honored in proposing the toast and was always willing to do his utmost regarding dog shows, he being an old-time Secretary himself. He eulogized Major Taylor and the K. C. for his presence. He always hoped to remain a staunch supporter of the K. C., and believed the Vancouver Horse show emanated from the plans of the dog show. The prime movers in the horse show are K. C. men, Rolston Bros. in particular. He stated facts not throw bouquets. "Gentlemen, Our Dogs, the first to welcome and first to defend."

In replying, Mr. Israel gave a very witty speech, and stated that after doing away with his "Spratts," he looked on the list and found he wasn't entered, so was taken by surprise. He spoke of the love he had for our dogs, especially the Bull Terrier, and in finishing up, saying, "The more I see of dogs, the less I think of men."

Mr. Rolston, on rising, was given a hearty welcome, and after his friend's speech he said it was up to him to speak of the Setter and Pointer. Mr. Rolston said he had graduated to the Field Trials, and spoke strongly in favor of them. He would like to extend a hearty invitation to the bench show to witness a field trial. It was a pleasure to him to find a larger gathering to speak to every year, which shows that the popularity of the dog is increasing. We have the largest field trials in America, and B. C. dogs held their own with all comers. He corroborated Maj. Taylor's statement, and found according to statistics that day that the Major had judged thirty-three years ago.

Mr. Bostock spoke principally on Terriers, and pointed out that the Terriers which we have here to-day lack the Terrier character. You cannot tell unless you work them. Every Terrier

ought to be a worker besides being a bench dog. He also pointed out the mistake fanciers make in not properly housing their dogs, and emphasized the fact that they would be better off in the end if they spent more on their kennels and less on their dogs. This gentleman caused much merriment by stating that he believed in parading the sidewalks between 10 and 11 at night (with dogs).

Mr. Forshaw, who judged here last fall, said he came here twelve years ago and the first day visited a show of about a dozen dogs and cats and a few chickens. They afterwards organized a K. C. and had been gaining ground ever since. He had been an enthusiast in the Toronto K. C. and thinks that Vancouver has a better class of dogs than any town in America and get more exhibits than any other city with the exception of New York. He hoped they would stick together and maintain their reputation. In concluding, he said that the Vancouver fanciers are the best class of fanciers it had ever been his lot to be associated with.

Mr. Secretary Powell, in a brief speech, said that Thursday had been the largest gate in the history of the Club and Friday second. Said that the credit was not due to him but his wife as she attended to the dog show while he looked after the horse show.

Mr. Archer, in giving the toast of The Ladies, said he was good on the dog and bad on the lady. If we hadn't ladies we wouldn't have dogs or dog shows. The dog is essentially a ladies companion, and he told the ladies that a lover of dogs always makes a good husband. This gentleman made several witty remarks.

During the proceedings, Mr. Con. Jones sang "Sparkling Eyes"; Mr. Arthur Davies, "The Veteran," and "Village Blacksmith," and Mr. J. Evans, "The Bugler," accompanied by "yours truly," which were enthusiastically applauded. "God Save the King" wound up an excellent evening, which tended to give impetus to fanciers for the future.

## VANCOUVER, B. C., SHOW

NO. OF DOGS, 279; NO. OF POINTS 4.

The seventh annual show of the Vancouver Kennel Club was held on the 14th to 17th of April. The show was not quite so strong as last year numerically, but was, on the whole, probably better in quality. There was certainly a larger percentage of good dogs than at any previous show. Great strides are evident in the education of the local fanciers, and the reduction in the number of entries is probably due to the fact that those who own dogs unfit for competition have come to realize the fact, and now know the difference between a dog with some pretence to show qualities and a bad specimen.

The judging was in the hands of Mr. Jno. Bradshaw.

The show was held in the Drill Hall, as heretofore, Mr. W. Coates discharging the duties of Superintendent most efficiently, the Secretarial duties being in the hands of Mr. E. C. Powell, whose capacity for work seems to grow each year. To have two big shows on one's hands—as Secretary of a dog show and a horse show—within a week of each other, would tax most men's capabilities. Mr. Powell, however, has so far proved equal to the strain, and no one at the dog show could point to any indication of inefficiency, as a result of the heavy duties which he is discharging.

Criticism of the winners follows:

Cocker Spaniels, black, puppy dogs and bitches, 1st went to Jesmond Crystal. He is a pup of high quality with extra good square muzzle, sound legs and feet and good quarters. His ears are set on rather high, but he has real Cocker expression; 2nd, Dash, is much larger, higher on leg, has a faulty mouth and does not show nearly as much quality as the winner; 3rd, Dooley, is large and rangy, little high on leg, has a well proportioned head and good ear. Novice dogs and bitches, 1st, Jesmond Promise II., is small and cobby in build, but has a sour expression and dips at shoulder; 2nd, Bingo, has extra good muzzle, good coat and ear, sound legs, stands a trifle high, and at present lacks feather. Limit and open dogs produced nothing new. In limit bitches, Fairview Belle, a big bitch, was alone. She has a good type of head and well

placed ear. Open bitches, 1st, Jesmond Cricket, is short in neck and not particularly good behind. She beat Fairview Belle for 1st place and for winners.

In Reds, puppy dogs and bitches, 1st, Pacific Red fren, has a good front but is not A1 in head, as she wants more muzzle. She was suffering from sore eyes and will doubtless look better another time; 2nd, Rebra, is a pup of good quality, better in expression, but long in body and faulty in mouth. Novice dogs and bitches, 1st, Maxwell, who was awarded winners over dogs showing more quality, has a fair head, is a very sound dog, active and extra good neck and shoulders, but clumsy in feet and light in color; 2nd, Pacific Red Jacket, shows much more quality, has an extra good head and beautiful color. Limit dogs, 1st, Jesmond Frolic, a well known, strong-headed fawn dog; 2nd has been noticed; 3rd is a promising pup rather loose in shoulder, and needs to tighten up all round. Open dogs were a repeat. Red Sammie, reserve, is a dog of high quality, but showing signs of age, which handicap him. Limit bitches, 1st, Northern Light, has good head and expression, rich color, good back and hind quarters, but stands wide; 2nd, Jesmond Violet, fails to her in ear placement. Lady Red, as 3rd, has sweet head and expression, but is long cast.

Parti-colored, novice dogs and bitches, 1st, Kulshan Langa is a good specimen, thick set with lots of substance and broader in muzzle than the 2nd; 2nd, Jesmond Hazel, has a good skull, but is long in body and rather pinched in foreface; 3rd, Fairview Vic, good one all round, but snipy. Limit dogs, Kulshan Langa, beat his kennel companion, Kulshan Cardigan, being better in muzzle and heavier in substance, but not so characteristic in expression. Open dogs, 1st Portland Kid, shown for specials only, easily outstripped the younger dogs, beating them at every point. In open bitches, Jesmond Venetia, small in muzzle and rather wide in skull, won from Fairview Vic. Mr. Gamwell won the prize for the best kennel.

Springer Spaniels: This breed is improving in popularity as their useful-

ness becomes known. This year's show was an improvement in quantity and quality on its predecessors, although the decisions of the judge could not be altogether followed by those who are conversant with the breed. Puppy dogs and bitches, Gyp was alone, a beautiful, typical little bitch. She should take a high place when she matures. She is sound, has good head, jaw and coat, somewhat spoiled by a light eye. Novice dogs and bitches, 1st, Fan is a very moderate specimen, much too long and light in body and hardly fit for the prize list; 2nd, Nell, is only fair; 3rd, Gyp, was really an easy winner. Open dogs, 1st, Jim, has good head and the best jaw. His ear is well set on, but he is rather too leggy, and wide in front; 2nd, Rex, badly out at shoulder, has a lovely head and compact, well proportioned body, 3rd, Kim, has good head and expression, but lacks jaw and is too small. Open bitches, 1st, Empress, is well made, compact bitch, but lacking Spaniel expression; 2nd is a repeat; 3rd, Ruru, is too light, but has nice head.

Field Spaniels, 1st, Inch Keith Bess, has good strong head and is long and low to ground with fair feather; 2nd, Inch Keith Billy, is well feathered, but coarse. Both are Field Spaniels of the right type, and show lots of quality.

Clumber Spaniels: Bruce is a very big, sound, heavy dog with good head, ear and expression, but a bad mouth. Beech Grove Tassel wants more weight all through, but is an exceptionally good bitch, and repeated her many wins.

Irish Water Spaniels: pups, dogs and bitches, 1st, Bolster, has good expression and fair bone, but is short of coat at present; 2nd, Barney is only moderate, but has a well curled coat. Young Patsy, who was passed over, has the strongest muzzle and best bone in the class, but is unfurnished, and as yet loosely put together. Novice were repeats. Open dogs, 1st Burrard Rock Driver improving every year, excellent in bone, expression, color of eye, foreface and character. His coat is too loose; 2nd, Rags, is a big powerful dog, but not so characteristic in head nor so good in eye as the winner; 3rd, Lunesdale O'Hara, has

the best coat of the bunch, and better expression than the 2nd, but is not so heavy in bone.

English Retrievers: 1st went to a wavy coat, Prince Lulu Nero, with a fair head, good ear and moderate coat. He had no trouble in beating the curly coated Nigger, who has a good coat, but is very coarse in head. The only bitch benched, Belle, is quite moderate.

Esquimaux: Cards, 1st, is a fine heavy boned, strong dog, with good character and expression; 2nd, Jack, is a lighter, well-proportioned dog, with excellent coat. Red is not so well formed as the other two, and lacks their foreface, but carried a good jacket.

Pointers, puppy dogs, 1st, Sport, has a strong head, well placed eye, good bone, and well sprung rib, good stern and quarters, a clinking good pup who won easily; 2nd, Sydney, well developed, but plain in head and not very good in eye; 3rd, Victoria Doctor, has a good head, but is light and long in body. Novice dogs, 1st, Victoria Ned has a fair head, excellent shoulders and front, a good sound, well shaped dog all over; 2nd, Prince Rupert, lighter built, with eye rather large, has a better muzzle than the winner, and is altogether a well proportioned dog; 3rd is a repeat. Limit dogs, 1st, Richard McBride, who would not show himself. After much trouble and a tedious delay he was persuaded to rise from the ground for a few moments and was awarded first. He is strongly built, has good bone and a nice head, but was lucky to beat some of his competitors who showed decidedly more quality; 2nd and 3rd were repeats, reserve, Bruce was the winning dog at Victoria last week. He is a very taking dog with good action and was, we thought, unlucky not to get higher here. Open dogs were a repeat, Ch. Mason's King, the strongest dog in the class, but not straight enough in back, might have had a look-in. Puppy bitches, 1st, Flip, shows quality but is small and light in eye, 2nd, Fly, has a fair head, good eye, but is plain in back; 3rd, Beauty, is a very big, heavy boned pup with good head, but may make up somewhat coarse. Novice bitches, 1st, Point, has A1 back, stern and quarters, and characteristic head and expression. She is a rattling good bitch offering little opportunity for criticism;

2nd and 3rd were repeats. Limit bitches, 1st, Wilson's Spot, beat Point with little to spare. She is not so good in muzzle, but even better in quarters, ribs and set on of stern. She has A1 eye and expression. In the Field Trial class Mr. McDonell's Sport Rip Rap well-known in the open, was alone and well worth his win.

English Setters, puppy dogs, 1st, Vancouver Duke, flat sided and very poor behind the ribs, has good shoulders and neck, and at present has a fair head; 2nd, Rego's Rex, very good head, better in back, rib and quarters, should have won; 3rd, Bay Montez, was in his right place. Novice dogs, 3rd, Bugle, a very big dog, standing high behind, with fair head and quality for his size. Limit dogs, 1st, Peerless Count, good head and neck, plain back and not extra good in quarters, but a dog showing quality; 2nd and 3rd were repeats. In this class a very decided error was made in passing over that good dog, Fleet's Count. He is not so fine in head as the 1st dog, but stands on very good legs and feet, and is especially well ribbed. He ran the 1st dog very close, and is a very much better dog than either 2nd or 3rd. The judge appeared to overlook him altogether. Open dogs, 1st, Mallwyd Major, has a grand head and well ribbed and stands on good legs and feet. He has a good coat and his principal fault is that he is short in the neck, which rather spoils his outline. Mallwyd Bob was entered for specials only, and won the premier position. He was in better form than at Victoria and beats Major in neck and shoulder. Puppy bitches, Arbutus Swallow repeated her Victoria performance, winning right through her classes to winners. She is a lovely model and it would be hard to find a fault in her. Novice bitches, 1st, Handsome Belle is another rattling good bitch by Mallwyd Bob. She won with plenty in hand; 2nd, Burrard Flirt dips at shoulders, but is otherwise a fairly good bitch, not quite correct before the eyes; 3rd, Logan Lady is only useful. Limit bitches, 1st, Arbutus Swallow met and beat, after close scrutiny, her half sister, Handsome Belle. She stands better at the shoulders, is shorter in back, moves better behind, and is rather finer in head; 2nd, Arbutus Pearl was off the bench. Open bitches, Arbutus Swallow beat that good old bitch, Rockline

Ladybird, who is giving out at the elbows.

Irish Setters, Ch. Prince, well known, and in grand form, easily beat Frank, a moderate dog. Gordon Setters, pups were a moderate lot, Satan, very darkly marked and rangey, won without trouble. Novice dogs and bitches, 1st, Heather Bruce, flat in skull and lacking weight in body, won from the pups. Limit bitches, 1st Heather Capt. has a fair head spoiled by the high placement of the ear and carried good feather; 2nd and 3rd repeats. Open dogs, the new face here, Pomper Beaver, placed 3rd, has a well shaped head, but is not so heavy as the other two. Open bitches, Countess Belle, 1st is much the best. She has a good head and more weight than the other two.

Old English Sheep Dogs, Sir Charles, has fair face, but wants more coat. Beagles, Dell has Beagle character, but is too old for the bench. Greyhounds, Queenie has a better head than Togo, but neither are up to the standard of our exhibition two years ago. Borzois, Tybo alone, and a fair specimen was awarded 1st and winners. St. Bernards brought out a really good pup in Knight Errant of Arstan. He has magnificent bone, is sound on his legs, with good head, eye, muzzle and stop. His ears are too large and not placed low enough. Victoria Chief in good form, had to give way to the superior bone and head properties of the pup. Pax II. is a very large bitch, but not very good in foreface.

Fox Terriers, puppy dogs, smooth, 1st, Sunshine Budget, F. W. Welsh, a good boned pup, with first class front, nice shoulder, legs and feet, and small ears, a trifle plain in head, good body and eye; 2nd, the Duke, T. B. Chapel, a wonderful smart puppy which is on the big side, but, apart from this fault, was away ahead of anything, to my mind, in the show. He possesses the Redmond legs and feet all over, with magnificent bone and perfect symmetry, and is a Terrier all round; 3rd, Nipper, Norman Almas, a pleasing all white youngster, good front and expression, but a little plain in head; res., M. C. Hamilton's Henley, a fair sort, rather long flanks. V. H. C., T. Thornber's Billy; H.C., T. Thornber's Ben, a very stylish terrier which, apart from his white nose and size, would be

amongst the leaders. Novice dogs, 1st, Sunshine Budget; 2nd, the Duke; 3rd, Nipper; res., G. Tupper's Essex Mephisto, a good bodied dog with a very bad carriage of ears; V.H.C., Mr. Fraser's Twiggs; H.C., Sunshine Bully; H.C., Sunshine Bugler. Limit dogs, 1st, Sunshine Beau Brummel, F. W. Welsh, looking better than ever, and ears just like a puppy. He possesses a long, lean head, and varminy expression, well placed ears, good clean shoulders, and nicely tucked up loin; 2nd, Leander Club, Melville Hamilton, a sound Terrier with excellent legs and feet, and plenty of timber, but is getting a little plain in head, otherwise he is with the best of them; 3rd, Duke, T. B. Chappel; res., Mr. Fraser's Twiggs, a good type, with sound legs and feet, expression, and quite big enough, also a little thick in skull. Open dogs, 1st, 2nd and 3rd, repeats; winners, Sunshine Beau Brummel; puppy bitches, 1st, Sunshine Becky Sharp, F. W. Welsh, a nice headed one, and a good front, but a little shelly in body; 2nd, Duchess, T. B. Chappel, a useful bitch which made such a successful debut in the last fall show. She did not look her best to-day, which rather handicapped her; 3rd, Lady Rusten, W. M. Coates, a coky one, but has a bad carriage of ears; V. H. C., G. Power's Georgia Belle, a good fronted one, with sound legs and feet but faulty ears; H.C., P. Alberto's Trixie, a very moderate one. Novice bitches, 1st, Lady Rusten; 2nd, Georgia Belle. Limit bitches, 1st Sunshine Blue Girl, F. W. Welsh, a bitch with rattling good bone throughout, and strong hindquarters, short body; 2nd, Sunshine Blue Bell, F. W. Welsh, very stylish but fails to the winner in body, equal or perhaps a little better in other respects; 3rd, Duchess, res., Georgia Belle. Open bitches, Mrs. J. Bostock's Reminiscence led the way, looking very fit. She is a wonderful laster and a bitch of quality, with a head and front of a youngster; 2nd, Sunshine Blue Girl; 3rd, Wandee Ruffles, T. McAuliffe, a very good bitch with fine head and ears, but a little wide in front and shown too fat; res., Sunshine Blue Bell; V.H.C., Duchess. Ladies class, 1st, Sunshine Bugler, Mrs. B. Olmstead, a showy Terrier with any amount of timber, but far too big.

Wire haired, puppy dogs, 1st, Bunch Miss Dempster, a good headed one, and

keen expression, good legs and feet, and fair coat; 2nd, Ridon Chance, H. Burnes, another good headed youngster, with good front and bone, a trifle heavy in ears, dark eye and good jacket; 3rd, Slat, T. McAuliffe; res., Soft Chance, H. Burnes, good headed one, and very good expression, straight narrow front, good ears, but coat not of the best; H.C., Galtee Norfolk, W. Gordon, a good pup with splendid front, bone, head and hindquarters, with a good hard coat. Should have done much better. Novice dogs, 1st, Skipper, Mrs. Shalcross, a cobby little dog, grand expression, but coat not of the best; 2nd, Ridon Chance; 3rd, First Chance, H. Burnes, a good headed dog, with fine neck and shoulders and ears, good front, but too long in body, good coat. Limit dogs, 1st, First Chance; 2nd, Stowaway Jack, Mrs. Bradley-Dyne, a nice all-round Terrier with excellent ears and expression, good body, poor coat; 3rd, Swansea Result, N. McConnell, who was not at his best, but in my mind was badly served in this class. Good hard coat, neat head and eye, grand body; res., Galtee Norfolk; V. H. C., Endcliffe Postmark. Open dogs, 1st, Leading Chance, H. Burnes, looking as well as ever, and shown well. He has grand bone, good hard coat, and is good all round, bar his size; 2nd, Swansea Result, 3rd, Galtee Norfolk; winners, Leading Chance. Puppy bitches, 1st, Queen of Italy, P. Alberto, a very stylish one with good body, head and eye, with well carried ears, not a very good coat; 2nd, Mwansa Chance, H. Burnes, a pleasing headed one with good bone and legs, keen eye, ears carried a bit erratic; 3rd, Lively Chance, Mrs. V. H. Crosfield, a fair sort, rather long in body, pleasing head and ears. Novice bitches, 1st, Mwansa Chance. Limit bitches, 1st, Queen of Italy; 2nd, Mwansa Chance; 3rd, Trewanta Weaselle, R. Hanson, a fair sort, shown very ragged. Open bitches, 1st, Queen of Italy; 2nd, Mwansa Chance; 3rd, Trewanta Weaselle; res., Daisy, W. Gordon, a good coated bitch, which should have been 3rd: winners, Queen of Italy. Ladies' Class, 1st, Skipper, Mrs. Shalcross. Team, Kennel, wire or smooth, 1st, Sunshine Kennels, F. W. Welsh. Produce Stakes, 1st, F. W. Welsh.

Irish Terriers, puppy dogs or bitches, 1st, Fonthill Unow, J. Goddard, a good coated dog, rather coarse in ear;

2nd, Fonthill Pat, McIntosh & Goddard, a smart Terrier, a shade on the big side, good ear carriage and expression; 3rd, Irish Lad, G. Jeatt, too thick in skull, good strong muzzle, but too big all over; res., Larry O'Hara, Bennet Thompson, a good head expression and coat, but carries one ear erratic—should have done better. Novice dogs and bitches, 1st, Boyne Checkmate, W. Ollard, good dense coat, straight front, pleasing head and eye, with well placed ears, 2nd, Clodagh, R. Bevan, a good brood bitch with sound bone, but a shade long in body; 3rd, Irish Lad, J. Jeatt; res., Larry O'Hara. Open dogs, 1st, Ch. Endcliffe Curate, G. Heiliwell, a good all round dog, with good body, deep in brisket, and well tucked up loin, punishing jaw and well carried ears. Feet not very good and a fault undershot; 2nd, Boy, W. Ollard, a useful sort with grand feet and well placed shoulders and narrow head, good eye; 3rd, Western Demonstrator, J. Wallace, a splendid head, ears and strong foreface, and small dark eye, could be made to look better; res., Fonthill Pat. Open bitches, 1st, Saanich Sweetheart, Mrs. Bradley Dyne, good body, legs, neck and head, not quite safe in ear carriage, could have been put down infinitely better; 2nd, Patsy, J. Lowther, good hard jacket and legs and feet, well placed small ears and good eye, with a varminy expression; 3rd, Killarney Molly, McIntosh & Goddard, heavy in ears, good coat, might have been shown better; res., Clodagh, P. Bevans, winners, Ch. Endcliffe Curate, dogs; winners, Saanich Sweetheart, bitches.

Open bitches, 1st, Edgwood Biddy, G. Israel, a well balanced bitch with strong bone all over, good neck and body; winners, Edgwood Biddy.

Pit Bull Terriers: puppy dogs and bitches, 1st, Babe, Bert Chapman, good coat and eye, fair body, make a useful brood bitch; 2nd, Patsey, Frank Stein,

a six months old one, looks like developing into a useful one; 3rd, Jennie, Dr. Storrs, good outline, but too fine throughout. Novice, 1st, Babe; 2nd, Nellie H., F. Sein, similar to winner, but a shade thicker in skull; 3rd, Fitz Simmons, A. Oshorne, good body and bone, could do with more foreface. Limit dogs, 1st, Tray, J. Pride, possessing grand bone and body with sound feet; 2nd, Pat, W. Snees, a bit on the small side and not strong enough in head. Limit bitches, 1st, Jennie, Dr. Storrs. Open bitch, 1st, Lady Betsy, J. Smith, good head and jaw and expression. Open dogs, 1st, Tray.

Yorkshire Terriers, open dogs and bitches, 1st, Pioneer Queen, T. B. Chapel, a very compact Terrier with a rich color, hair of good texture, small ears, round feet, sparkling intelligent eye and a level back; 2nd, Tommy, Mrs. Alley, not quite the class of the winner, but still a good one. Winners, Pioneer Queen. Toy Poodles, 1st Jumbo, Mrs. Quain, good short body and condition, good movement, neck and shoulders. Japanese Spaniels, 1st, Keeto, Mrs. Jas. Smith, of good symmetry, fair stop, good muzzle, coat and feathering.

Bailey, a good sort, sound bone and body, a little houndy in ear and shown too fat; res., C. Beevon's Lady Tiargle. Open bitches, 1st, Majestic; 2nd, Betsy Royal; 3rd, Bellows Bloom; res., Lady Tiargle; winners bitch, Majestic; winners dog, Clonmel Flockmaster.

Wurmel, good square head and well tucked up loin and roach back, with well sprung ribs; 3rd, Eli, Geo. Watson, excels in his front and shoulders, good turn up, teeth too prominent. Open dogs, 1st, Prince Royal, Miss D. Spray, a dark brindle, heavyweight, scoring in head and body, good turn up underjaw and stop with well sprung ribs and roach back, also good wrinkle and cushion; 2nd, Sonny; 3rd, Eli; winners, Prince Royal. Open bitches, 1st, Lady Beatrice; winners bitch, Lady Beatrice.

Collies, puppy dogs, 1st, Spokane, W. J. Kerr, long head, good feet and frill, nice narrow front, not quite safe on ear carriage; 2nd, Hollywood, C. Davidson, a similar one to winner, but heavier in ears, which are too Terrier like; 3rd, Leo, W. Hutchinson, a good all round sort. Novice dogs, 1st, Glen Tana Summit, J. Jackson, a well made Collie with good bone and frill and

feet, just a trifle thick in skull; 2nd, Eversholt Weldon, E. R. Ricketts, a good long, lean head, legs, feet, coat and brush, would not show himself to best advantage; ears a little erratic; 3rd, Otterburn Option, F. Abey, keen expression, good front, legs and feet, a shade thick in skull; res., Captain Cook, R. McLaren, useful sort; V. H. C., Eversholt Poyntz, E. R. Ricketts, another good sort. Limit dogs, 1st, Glen Tana Mountaineer Minstrel, T. Griffith, has a typical Collie head and afterwards won winners. He has a coat of good texture, but is small, light in bone, and weak in hindquarters, and not very good in feet. Possibly he may look his part better when in good form; 2nd, Ballyarnet Student, Mrs. Colin Jackson, a pleasing head, good bone and body and nice eye and feet, a good dense coat; 3rd, Coila Clinker, J. McFarland, a good headed tri-color, with nice eye and neck, small ears; res., Eversholt Weldon; V.H.C., Eversholt Poyntz. Open dogs, 1st, Ballyarnet Student, Mrs. Colin Jackson, a grand specimen all over, with the exception of being a bit undershot. I consider he ought to have won the winners; 2nd, Glen Tana Squire, T. Griffith, another fine sort, fails to winner in feet, but is a good sound Collie and better than Minstrel, who beat both for winners; 3rd, Coila Clinker; res., Eversholt Weldon; V. H. C., Eversholt Poyntz. Puppy bitches, 1st, Glen Tana Little Vera, T. Griffith, a smart, typical bitch, failing in size; 2nd, Glen Tana Floss, Griffith & Jackson, nice bodied bitch, with good head, mane and frill; 3rd, Glen Tana Jessica, Griffith & Jackson, good bone, neck and eye, with bad carriage of ears; res., Glen Tana Lou. Novice bitches, 1st, Glen Tana Little Vera. Open bitches, 1st, Ormskirk Hollyhock, Colin F. Jackson, a very classy bitch with good head, ears, expression, brush and frill. She is now a full champion; 2nd, Glen Tana Sybil, T. Griffith, a neat head and ear, good coat; 3rd, Eversholt Gertrude, E. R. Ricketts, closely pressed the 2nd, a splendid type, dense coat, well placed ears, and very evenly balanced all round. Green Class, 1st, Spokane, J. Kerr; 2nd, Otterburn Option; 3rd, Captain Cook. Kennel Class Team, 1st, T. Griffith; res., E. R. Ricketts.

French Bulldogs, 1st, Bon Soir, E. R. Ricketts, very cobby and muscular and strong in bone, large square head,

good stop, very neat bat ears and dark eye with small compact feet; winners, Bon Soir. Japanese Spaniels, 1st, Keeto, Mrs. J. Smith, good short muzzle and well cushioned, good large eye and set well apart; winners, Keeto.
