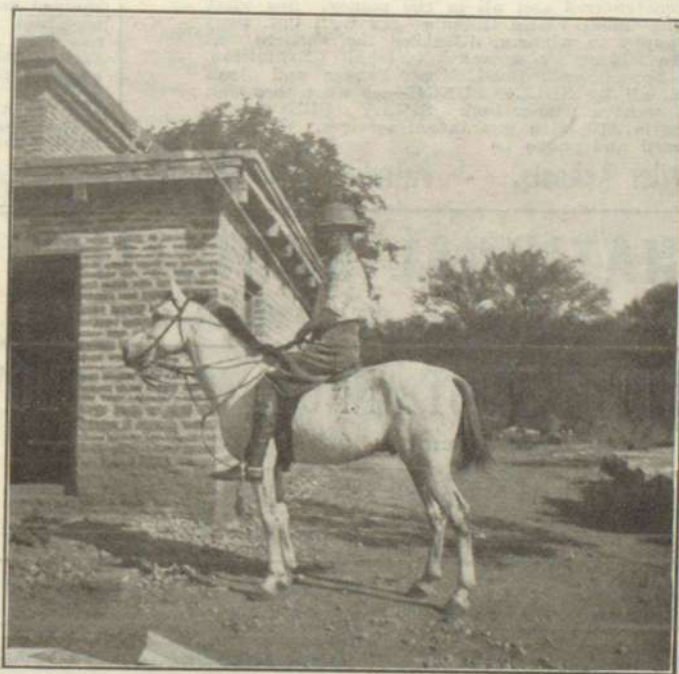

By the way Mrs. Mayhew is rapidly recuperating after a serious operation, on which state of affairs this lady's friends are congratulating her. Mrs. Mayhew has been able to leave the hospital and is now at her home in Staten Island, where she has a splendid lot of Poms., including many promising puppies.

Now a champion: Congratulations to the owner of another good dog that at Winnipeg attained the much coveted championship honors. We refer to Mr. Geo. A. Hull's, Calgary, champion Collie, Holyrood Professor.

Canadian National Show: Doubtless before now most intending exhibitors have had the opportunity of perusing from cover to cover the good things contained in the extremely neat looking prize list of the big Toronto Dog Show, and we hope too that they have made good use of their opportunity before this. If not, there is still a last chance, as entries close on the 14th August. We gave so many details a month or so back that little is left for us now. The judges' slate as finally decided upon is as follows:

Mr. Desmond O'Connell, Sarratt Herts, England: English Fox Hounds, smooth and wire-haired Fox Terriers, Welsh Terriers.

Mr. H. A. Belcher, Waltham, Mass.: Setters.

Mr. W. D. Payne, Kingston, Pa.: Sporting Spaniels.

Mr. W. Ormiston Roy, Montreal, Que.: Collies and Old English Sheep Dogs.

Mr. J. E. Carroll, Buffalo, N. Y.: Boston Terriers.

Mr. Jas. Mortimer, Hempstead, L.I., N.Y.: Mastiffs, Newfoundland, Bloodhounds, Russian Wolfhounds, American Foxhounds, Pointers, Bull Terriers, Poodles, Beagles, Dachshunde, Pugs, Italian Greyhounds, Toy Terriers, Miscellaneous and general specials.

From this list it will be seen that England, the United States and Canada have all been drawn upon. It is the policy of the management to secure the best judging talent irrespective of distance and expense. All that counts is honesty and ability.

The list of specials is long and valuable and the regular classes contain much cash for little outlay in the way of entry fee. The graded fee is again prominent and in this way exhibitors are not asked to pay on something they do not get in the way of benching, attendance and feed. The first entry of a dog is supposed to, and does, cover this.

Don't forget this is the last opportunity to enter, if you have not a list, send entries to Canadian National Exhibition Dog Show, Toronto, and ask the secretary to fill out regular form.

Whippets: We are glad to learn that a Whippet Club in Toronto is on the way and that already a few races have taken place. Whippet racing is one of the popular sports in England, in fact, every place with a population of eight or ten thousand people will have its Whippet Club and its regular meets. It may some day become as popular as "marathoning" in this country! Who can tell?

Cocker Medals: We have just seen the latest creation of the Cocker Club—a bronze medal and as neat a one as ever came over. The Cocker entries at every show now are second to none—a sure indication of what a specialty club will do.

An Irishman up: We have pleasure in congratulating The Drumclaph Kennels on the attainment of their splendid little dog Drumclaph Fairchance to the championship roll. Winners at Winnipeg, we understand, put on the finishing touches. In passing, we feel that we must pay tribute to the true sportsmanship of the proprietor of Drumclaph, Mr. W. C. Finley, who has been patronizing almost every show between Montreal and Winnipeg by a good substantial entry.

Niagara Falls Show: As prophesied in last Gazette a one-day show will be held at Niagara Falls, N.Y., on September 4th, the Saturday preceding Toronto Show. Canada will be well represented in the list of judges and we hope that a substantial entry from this side of the line may follow. What pleasanter than a lake trip on a summer holiday! Toronto exhibitors could leave on the early boat and return the same evening. Probably too a "try out" before Toronto would be interesting. Mr. James Watson, of

Hackensack, N.J., will manage the show for the Niagara Falls Kennel Club and premium lists, which are now ready, may be had on application to him. The entry fee is but \$1.00, the classification full. Judging will begin at 11 a.m., and the show close at 5 p.m.

Bull Terrier sale: Mr. William Fox, Toronto, has sold to Mr. W. R. Goodwin, East Aurora, N.Y., his well-known brace of winning Bull Terriers, Indomitable and Wedgewood Belle. He has replaced Indomitable by a dog that has made good as a sire and will do so again.

Ottawa Show: Mr. Payne tells us that Mr. H. W. Lacy will judge all breeds with the exception of Bulldogs at their forthcoming show. Mr. Lacy will also award all specials except those on Bulldogs. A specialist is to officiate in this now popular breed.

Holyroods: It is significant that both the winners dogs at Winnipeg, Holyrood Professor, and the reserve to him, Holyrood Clinker, were sold to their present owners by that successful Collie breeder, Col. Robert McEwen. Col. McEwen has stuck to Collies through good and through evil repute, and numberless winners have either been bred by him or have passed through his experienced hands.

OUR "BOBBERY" PACK OF HOUNDS

BY GEORGE CECIL, LONDON, ENGLAND.

The "Assistant District Superintendent of Police" had returned to the little "station" in India, where half a dozen exiled white men supported existence. He informed us that during the ten days "casual leave" which he had spent with a cousin in a native cavalry regiment, "hounds met every morning, and that he didn't see why this dead-alive hole shouldn't run to a bobbery pack." He further pointed out that as each of the six officials who formed the society of the place possessed three or four dogs apiece, the pack already was formed. The "Sessions Judge" suggested that as the local petty "Rajah"—a rotund sportsman who rode about twenty-stone—never left his palace (of dried mud) without being accompanied by at least twenty dogs, which ranged from imported prize Mastiffs to disreputable pariahs, he might be inclined to contribute to the proposed pack. The "Nimuk-Wallah," a person of dusky hue and native tendencies, in the innocence of his heart offered to lend his wife's Maltese Terrier and the "Civil Surgeon" promised the loan of a Ramper hound, a broken-haired beast with an undeniable turn of speed. Everyone was agreed that the hordes of jackals with which the "district" was infested were a suitable substitute for foxes, and the Assistant Magistrate undertook to issue orders to the effect that any native land-owner who obstructed the members of the hunt would be incarcerated in the local jail. Having arranged these preliminary details, the question of appointing a Master arose. At first everyone aspired to filling the position—even the man who had suggested lending his wife's Maltese Terrier fiercely advanced his claims. After many heated arguments, which resulted in half the "station" cutting the other half for a week, it eventually was decided that as the youngster in "the Police" had mooted this idea, it would only be fair to let him carry the horn. So, amidst much heart-burning, he was appointed.

Little time was lost in getting to work. The morning which followed the formation of the pack saw the six members of the hunt assembled at a large patch of sugar cane near the

outskirts of the "station"; and shortly after six o'clock (the time appointed for the meet) the fat "Rajah"—appropriately mounted on an elephant—made his appearance, bringing with him a couple of gigantic Mastiffs, a toy Pomeranian, three Bloodhounds, four pariahs, an old blind Retriever, five Fox Terriers, an unpleasant looking Bulldog, a St. Bernard, and a Thibet Sheep Dog. As our several contributions also included four Irish Terriers, a King Charles Spaniel, three Bull Terriers, two Skye Terriers, five rough-haired Indian Greyhounds and ten Scotch Terriers, our pack—if a trifle mixed—at least lacked nothing in quantity. Nor were the Hounds wanting in fighting qualities. For the first twenty minutes the Mastiffs and the Bloodhounds mauled each other; the toy Pomeranians, taking exception to the King Charles Spaniel, made its life a misery, and when the pack was not engaged in settling private disputes, it hurled itself upon the unhappy pariahs—one of whom, alas! perished in the fray. Eventually, peace was restored, and the master cajoled each

"... mongrel, puppy, whelp and hound,
And cur of low degree,"

into entering the aforesaid patch of sugar-cane. More trouble, however, was to follow. Scarcely had the pugnacious animals disappeared in the covert, than hostilities were renewed, so that upon a jackal stealing away he was unaccompanied by any of the alleged Hounds. Fortunately, fighting could not last forever, and eventually, peace having reigned once more, we moved off to another covert—a piece of ground strewn with rocks. "You is finding devil of a lot of jackal there," observed the "Rajah" (who rather prided himself on his English) to the Master. He was right. Scarcely had the yelping pack reached the place than a couple of "jacks," breaking cover, made off in opposite directions, each being followed by a dozen dogs. Fortunately for the short legged members of the pack, they had as good a chance as the Deerhound, Greyhounds, and other long-legged tykes; for, when pressed, the jackal "jinked" to the right or left, thus enabling his smaller pursuers to come up with him. And

upon this occasion one of the "jacks," after giving the field a run of two miles, almost turned in his tracks, and actually was pulled down by a game Fox Terrier. In the meantime, the other jackal at first had made for a mango-grove which was faintly distant on the horizon, but, changing his mind, he selected as his haven a certain stretch of jungle which afforded shelter. And what a gallop he gave us! The first half mile was over light plough, followed by two miles of undulating grass-land, with a three foot mud wall here and there which our horses took in their stride. But the "jack's" intentions were too good to last. After the first quarter of an hour, he changed his direction half a dozen times in as many minutes. He would run a hundred yards to the right, then bearing to the left, until he had reduced the Hounds to the verge of fury. At last, however, he was pumped. In making a despairing effort to avoid the fangs of the "Rajah's" Bloodhounds, he fell panting in to the jaws of the potentate's St. Bernard. Although the "opium wallah" (who was mounted on a 13.2 pony), was first in at the death, it was considered good policy to present the brush to the "Rajah"; who, seated in the elephant's "howdah," had followed the run—at a distance. The sport, by the way, had not been without mishaps other than those already mentioned. The "Assistant Magistrate," by disregarding the "Civil Surgeon's" advice, "look before you leap," broke his horse's fore-leg on landing in a field of black cotton soil as hard as iron, and the "Sessions Judge" (whose loose seat was one of the most remarkable things in India!) had suffered two falls, one of which resulted in a sprained ankle. Nor had the Master got off scot free, for his tired Arab, in trying to clear a wide ditch, had landed short, giving his rider an imperial crown, and the next moment the animal shied at an unprepossessing native woman and deposited the ill-starred "Police wallah" in a pond of thick, green slime.

By degrees the Master got the pack into shape, and at subsequent meets the quarrelsome dogs and the dogs which gave offence were—by general

consent — left behind. A little later, several couples of "pukka" (real) Foxhounds were purchased, and in course of time a native whipper-in was appointed. Eventually, the Monkeybad

Hounds gained considerable local fame; and sportsmen would come from a distance for the purpose of spending the week end hunting with our "bobbery" pack.

WINNIPEG SHOW

NO. OF DOGS, 327; WINNERS VALUE, 5 POINTS. BALANCE OF REPORT AND AWARDS.

St. Bernards—as they go, a good class, Mr. Stuart's Agawa Duke going to the front again in addition to which he won the special for best dog, any breed, in the show. There was also another good one, a new face to us—Mrs. Warren's Trusty, good head but hardly as massive or substantial as Duke, though shorter in body. Great Danes a welcome surprise: winners, a harlequin dog, Mr. Mann's Glenrock Hylas, good head, bone and size, a little stilty behind and might have been better cropped. Next up, Mr. Corde's Roxie, a fawn, good all through, but also poorly cropped; 3rd, a harlequin bitch called Ceasarrenna, owned by Mr. Cundell, nice one, but on the small side. Mr. Stratton's Tigao II. also worthy of mention, a good big one, heavy in head and poorly handled. Newfoundlands: only two, better than we are used to seeing. Russian Wolfhounds, good even quality, though not put down in best of show shape. The winning dog, Mr. Wallace's Texas, is a good headed one, large and well roached. Winners bitch, Mrs. O'Brien's Bazar, medium sized, light in eye. Reserve dog, Mrs. O'Brien's Prenor, not so clean in head as winners and reserve bitch. Mrs. O'Brien's Varvar goes a little thick in skull, besides being out of show condition.

Irish Wolfhounds, a good even lot of workers. Mrs. O'Brien's Denny Hogan best in coat. Greyhounds also good quality. The winners, Mr. Evans' Snider, is a good Hound all round, shown in excellent condition, but is just a trifle on the small side. Reserve, a bitch, Mr. Langstone's Nell Grace, has been a good one but is now a little gone in skull. Deerhounds, few but good. American Foxhounds same, Mrs. Ross' Merry Bud being put over Mr. Wallace's Victor, a grand bodied dog but failing to former a little in style, legs and head. Dalmatians, a couple of old faces, Mr. Constantineau's Frank Taylor to winners with Perfect Bond reserve.

Irish Water Spaniels, a good hardy looking lot of workmen. Cocker Span-

iels a good turnout and some well known faces. In blacks, Mr. Cooke's Rockfield Dusky Gem swept everything before her. She was in splendid condition and well handled, and though in whelp made an easy win. Next up was Mr. Jeffrey's Beauty, a pretty good head, but on the large side and off in coat. The best dog was Mr. Jeffrey's Tory, a dog that conditioning and proper handling could materially improve, while he was followed by Mr. Hay's Pearl M., a good coated one, but not cut away enough under eyes. In A. O. C., Mr. Armstrong's Ottawa Red Light again swept the boards, followed by Mr. Dymont's buff dog, Uncle Toby. Messrs. Stuart's parti-color Black Stocking, a very fair one and sound, though a little high up, was reserve in bitches, being handily beaten by Mr. Dymont's sweet little buff bitch, Brookdale Violet. Mr. Cooke's Rockfield Hawthorne was 3rd in open, a good old bitch, but out of shape, while Mr. Kerr's Ch. Island Prince, a very classy Spaniel at one time, was also shown very fat and in miserable condition and so held back therefor. Mr. Dymont's Brookdale Dolly won in the A. O. C. limit bitches. Perhaps a word here respecting conditioning and handling would not be amiss. In no breed do these two things count for more than in the Cocker, and while some of the more experienced exhibitors had their dogs in good shape and handled them properly, some of the less experienced showed specimens with long coats full of dead hair, and with ears up like Terriers, so that of course their dogs had to be held back out of the money.

Collies were out in numbers but it was not hard to pick the good ones. The well known Holyrood Professor, the property of Mr. Geo. A. Hull, easily eclipsed anything in his classes. He was shown in remarkably fine coat for this time of the year. He was followed by Mr. Rodden's Holyrood Clinker, a good sort, sable and white with especially heavy coat. In bitches the well known sable, Lucy Glitters, in

fine condition, beat Mr. Reid's famous tri-color, Janet of Rosemount, out of coat. We also liked the first A. O. C. bitch, Mr. Anderson's Strathcona Floss, a very sweet tri-color with lots of quality but small. Old English Sheep Dogs were fairly well represented, Mr. Hatfield's Joe Chamberlain having the advantage over the reserve, Mr. Davidson's Sir Bruin, in coat.

Bulldogs were out in full force and contained one or two surprises for us. The winners dog, Mr. Moxam's Nathurst Surprise, had everything else easily outclassed. Good in front, bone, body and conformation, especially good in skull and wrinkle with a broad forehead and the right kind of ears we sum him up a good sound, sensible Bull, fit for pretty warm company. Next dog up, Mr. Lock's Bully, is a dog with good bone and shoulders but lacks in poor face. We were also rather taken with a dog that wasn't placed in the money—Mr. Hester's Hester's Billy—bone to spare, fair head, good body, but lacks wrinkle and shown out of shape. In bitches, the winners, Mr. Harmer's Miss Shoetown Pride, has a good body, but common head, while the reserve, Mr. Dingle's Lady Peggy, may be classed a fair one.

Smooth Fox Terriers were a good class and gave us opportunity of seeing some dogs that are pretty well known in the West. Clapton Blue Blade goes to winners, which we think, gives him his championship spurs. He was followed by his son, Clapton Broker, a puppy very like his sire, and full of promise. This dog was sold to a local fancier. Then came Mr. Sand's little dog, Broadway Daner, another very promising Terrier with especially good ears and lots of character, he was placed over Mr. Walker's Sabine Regent, a nice headed Terrier with good ears, excelling in bone, front and stern, but just a shade thick in shoulders for our liking with a little too much eye which is inclined to be round. He is all a Terrier though, and a grand mover. Mr. Picard's Togo III, also shows quality, but was shown out of condition and acted in a don't care sort of way. In bitches, Mr. Hammal's Grove Midget, a nice all-round little Terrier with a very taking manner went winners with Mr. Allman's Peggy, a nice headed bitch but in whelp, reserve. Wires contained some old faces. Mr. Stanford's Pay-

master is just a puppy but mighty promising, especially good in head points and front and full of go. Mr. Moore's Donington Rebel is well known. When he chooses he can be a good shower, but on this occasion he did not show up till the judging was nearly finished. Mr. Stuart's Matchmaker Tim won in the limit class and Mr. Currie's Wee McGregor, the 3rd open dog, is worthy of special mention for his grand coat and ears. In bitches, Mr. Moore's Donington Siren made an easy win.

Bostons do not seem to be as popular as in the East. Dr. Richardson's Wahnetah's Peter Pan had a walkover, which makes him a champion. Mr. Coghlin's Kweenie Spunk was next up, a topnotcher except for wrinkle on skull. The bitches were only second raters. Irish Terriers went pretty much all to Drumclaph Kennels with their well known trio, Fairchance, Peggy O'Neil and Red Cress. First mentioned is now a champion and the best Canadian Irishman we know. Mr. Elmes pair, Port Brandy and Nancy show quality, but want conditioning. We think that the reserve dog, Mr. Dewar's Gowanhill Mike, could be made a really good one if he were taken in hand and put into shape. He is a very taking Terrier with splendid head and eye, but was shown in very poor form. The best in Airedales went to Messrs. Bain & Greenwood's well known pair, Columbus and Culmington Nettle. The other dog, Mr. Gatjen's Colne Rattling Hot, is a bit coarse right through, while the reserve bitch, Mr. Poyntz's Wanda is a fair one. Bull Terrier prizes were nearly monopolized by Mr. Miles, Inferno, winners dogs, looking better than we have seen him in a long time; General Miles, a good Terrier with spot over one eye, reserve. In bitches, Epsom Countess Grey winners and Mr. Wright's Silver Gem reserve. We also liked Mr. Martin's Bonny Boy, a good bodied one with nice eye. Scotties were easily led by Mr. Wallace's Clonmel Dirk. In Dachs a nice pair of reds were shown by Mr. Chadwick, the dog being better at elbows and more filled out than the bitch. A nice pair of Skyes also, shown by Mr. Kobold. Poodles, French Bulls, Black and Tans, Field Spaniels, Retrievers, Yorkshires, Poms, Japanese Spaniels and Toys fairly well represented, while in Pugs Mr. Meadows' Bartlett Queen, and in Italian Grey-

hounds Mr. Edward's Prince Ivanovitch, both dogs of first quality, took winners.

THE CALGARY DOG SHOW

NO. OF DOGS, 150; WINNERS' VALUE 2 POINTS.

Dogs are fast improving in the West, and shows becoming permanent fixtures. The Calgary show will soon be up with some of the other shows, and in certain breeds will hold its own later with some of the Eastern shows. St. Bernards are not remarkable out here, though some are representative. We always have a few good Deerhounds and Greyhounds, and if Deerhounds all over the Province were rounded up in

one class it would be a hot one. There were two good ones shown at Calgary by a Mounted Policeman, who uses them on Coyotes.

English Setters have always been fairly plentiful in Alberta. This time we had two dogs above the average, and two bitches, one a very promising puppy, viz., Winter's Peach. The Irish Setter class contained three good dogs and a couple of bitches. The first in

dogs, Dash II., is the one Mr. Lyndon wanted to take east, and the second and third are young dogs, I believe, brought out from Ireland. They are both strong dogs of good type, with nice heads, good legs and feet and very muscular back and loins. They evidently get lots of running.

Pointers are a useful lot, the winning dog, Col. Walker's black and white, Shot, is well known, a dog with a sweet head and lovely shoulders and lots of style but coarse in tail. Another neat black and white was second. The good old bitch, Dina, was well ahead in bitches. A neat Labrador won in Retrievers. Chesapeakes are usually good here and the most useful duck dog we have. Cockers are improving fast and Mr. J. Thompson went right through with two Alberta breds, Nigger and Tinker Bell. They had capital fronts, coats and movement and are about the right size.

Collies were numerous. The best dog was Holyrood Professor, in good shape, is a handsome dog but I don't quite like his ears. The second, Holyrood Clinker, is another, quite an addition to our ranks, but he loses somewhat in ears and frame to the other. The bitches, on the whole, had more of the old-fashioned ear carriage than the dogs and should breed some useful puppies. The third dog in open dogs, Glen Tana Squire, I don't like, though they tell me he is a big winner. He reminds one somewhat of Brookside Blucher, but is not as good a dog. His face is heavily shaded, neck short, ears fair and he now gets his tail over his back, whatever he may have done in the past.

Bulldogs were quite a little lot for so far out. There was one neat Dalmatian, nice in color, a bit strong in head, but good in body.

Boston Terriers are appearing, two nice dogs coming out and several bitches. The winning dog is better in shoulder, though not quite as good in skull. They are both small and the second is cheeky, so I passed the blue to the one of most pronounced Terrier type, which is, if I remember rightly, what they do in Boston, and we have spent many hours at night in Mechanic's Hall watching the experts.

Fox Terriers are improving. Sabine Regent, a dog of a sort needed here, had no trouble in beating his lot. A capital wire dog with a good head and a marvellous coat was an easy winner

in his division. Irish Terriers contained just one that might get into the money east.

Two nice Scotties would make a good bid for honors anywhere. They belong to the Seafeld family, which is sufficient.

Pomeranians were five, all whites, and on the large side, the winner quite a nice one with a great coat. I think these dogs will do well here as the summers are not very hot and the climate is great for coats.

A nice King Charles was alone in small miscellaneous. There was also a neat Pug and a good Kerry Beagle that had recently arrived from the old sod and made one think of hares, heather and peat bogs.

Last, but not least, we come to the bat-eared French Bulls, that were typical but could be more broken up in face, and required more turn up and lay back, or other Bulldog frills.

I forgot to mention that two good Airedales were shown, one, Colne Rattling Hot, getting best in show for he was a great shower and I could not find much fault with him except that his eyes could be blacker. He had a grand coat which had not been touched. The other, Kirkstall Tim, is a good one, but not quite as good in front or coat.

THE EDMONTON DOG SHOW

The Edmonton Dog Show was an advance on previous years and will be better later. Collies turned up pretty well, but not nearly in the strength they might, for there are lots of useful dogs running about. One, however, Vanguard Conqueror, needs special mention; he is, I think, by Brookmere Hope, and is an inbred Wishaw Clinker—Wellesbourne Conqueror dog. He has a lovely head, good ears, good coat. He might be bigger and his eyes rather darker, but still quite a Collie. Whether he can beat Holyrood Professor I would not say unless I saw them together, and Conqueror is not a very good shower. He is, however, the best dog I have seen bred here, and it would take a crack to beat him anywhere, I think. There was one nice Deerhound to the fore and a good old black Greyhound bitch. One nice liver and white Pointer, and three more than useful English Setters, the first quite a good dog that won again at Calgary.

In Bulldogs, a capital brindle, 14 months old, bred here, won well, followed by a fawn, the father of the other, that is not broken up enough in face but great in body and type. Fox Terriers had nothing remarkable except a sweet wire dog puppy about 7 months old that, if he finishes right, should be a good one. He looks like Meersbrook Bristles material. One typical old Irish Terrier, gone in front, but with a good head and eye, and a real Mick, was first, followed by a smart youngster that may finish into a good one, as he beats the old man in front. The winning Bull Terrier

dog is a good one, a son of the dog that won at Vancouver two years ago and then went east and cleared up the crowd. I believe his name was Edgecote Peer.

Airedales are running strong in Alberta and are most popular. Here we had quite a class that took some sorting, and as they were shown untrimmed, heads were at times deceiving. They had also not been learned to stand. There is not much in it between the winning dogs, and there was some good stuff behind these. I see some good youngsters about the streets that have not yet made their debuts.

There were two very nice curly retrievers, the winner recently from the old country direct; good coat, sweet head and wonderful body.

In the miscellaneous class we were introduced to a Great Dane, a splendid specimen in body, legs, feet and movement, with a nice head, and beautifully broken. He is for sale at \$150. and is a pick up.
