NOTES AND COMMENTS.

Bull bits: Mr. T. A. Barr's Bull bitch, Lady Chamberland, whelped on August 20th, a fine litter of ten to Moston Brant. There are nine brindles and one brindle pied. The litter is the largest the bitch has ever had, and is the first litter sired by Moston Brant since he came to Canada.

Billy Obo's sons: Mr. Dunn, of Longford Mills, Ont., has a litter of Cockers by Mr. Lance Farewell's Billy Obo, on which he is banking for future honors. Two of the dogs especially have great bone and coat and the best of heads. "A credit to a good sire," says Mr. Dunn.

Eastern Cockers: Miss A. L. Morris, of the Beaumont Kennels, Sherbrooke, P. Q., has two good litters from her Montreal winning bitches. One, Beaumont Milly, by Knoydart Robin Hood, has eight, all dark red, of which six are dogs. They are sired by Mr. T. A. Armstrong's Senator. The other, Beaumont White Paws, a daughter of Idahurst Rye, whelped to Mr. Armstrong's Ottawa Red Light, six puppies, four of which are dogs.

Bostons: That bright monthly, the Boston Terrier Record, is now published by Mr. W. B. Atherton, at 30 Broad St., Boston. Mr. Atherton is manager and editor of the feather section of the American Stock-Keeper, the weekly whose dog end Mr. H. W. Lacey keeps so bright and interesting. The Record should do well in such experienced hands.

Victoria Wires: Our office is embellished with a photo from Mr. Reginald Hanson, of Victoria, B.C., of the wire Fox Terrier, Trewanta Weaselle, and also one of a group consisting of Weaselle, Trewanta After Me, and Trewanta Pengelly. Leoks as though

there were going to be a few Fox Terriers in British Columbia after a while.

New Brunswick Show: Several fairly successful shows have been held in Saint John, N.B., and now that the rough edge, so to speak, has been taken off, we hope the show scheduled for Sept. 28, 29 and 30 may be held under C. K. C. rules. We know there is a strong feeling in that direction. The management will be in the experienced hands of a large committee, including those of the prime mover, Mr. T. McCullough.

Regrets: Dr. C. Y. Ford expresses his regret at not being able to attend the Canadian Kennel Club annual meeting this year. This is a duty that Dr. Ford has rarely missed since he showed his first Collie in 1889, which entry, by the way, was awarded the high honor of a one-letter card. Dr. Ford is still in Europe, but hopes to arrive in Canada about the end of the present month.

Dr. Ford has been able to make good use of his time abroad, and in addition to his professional work has been able to visit such prominent kennels as those of Mr. F. Redmond, Mr. Vickery, Mr. Reeks and many others. It is Dr. Ford's opinion that in Fox Terrier classes we are getting close up to the best.

From Mr. Robert Tait, Wishaw, Scotland, he bought the sable and white Collie, Wishaw Diamond, that has now been aptly renamed Otterburn Diamond. He is royally bred and was a first prize winner both at the Crystal Palace and at Kennel Club show. He is said to possess a phenomenal head.

Accompanying the dog came Wishaw Hilda (now Otterburn Marguerite), a young Wishaw Dazzler bitch in whelp to Wishaw Crack. She also is the popular sable and white in color and is just a year old.

Diamond was shown at Toronto just a few days off the boat, and had but just recovered from distemper, so that the dog did not do himself justice. When in proper condition he will be placed at stud.

"Redcroft": Mrs. A. A. Macdonald and her Poms were missed at Toronto this year. Mrs. Macdonald and her daughter, Miss Dorothy, are in Europe and we understand that a little later on it is not unlikely that some new Poms will grace this lady's now well known prefix Redcroft.

New C. K. C. Board: As there is little change in C. K. C. officers, resulting from the mail ballot just taken, it is fair to suppose that the members of the club are largely in favor of the old Board, and of continuous management, as long as that management is fair and just.

The new members of the executive are the well known Collie breeder, Col. Robert McEwen, and Dr. Alfred Boultbee. No one rejoices more at Col. McEwen's election than does the editor of the Gazette. That he is now able unreservedly to support a Canadian national club such as the Canadian Kennel Club is ample proof that the C. K. C. is doing the work assigned it honestly and intelligently, and doing it in a way that sufficiently covers the canine need for a governing body in the Dominion of Canada. That it is perfect no one from the energetic president down will claim. Perfection is not found on this mundane sphere. That the Canadian Kennel Club has any other object than the good of the dog and his owner, the betterment of

both, can not be controverted. C. K. C. has come through some troublous times, it has taken years of hard work on the part of its officers to enable it to reach the present high standing that it has now attained. Hard work, too, that has largely been unrequited except by that most satisfactory recompense of all-a knowledge of tasks well done.

That the work of the C. K. C. is not without world-wide recognition is proven by the very hearty greeting expressed at the annual meeting of the C. K. C. by the Kennel Club, through its official mouthpiece, Mr. Desmond O'Connell, a man whom we in Canada delight to honor. It is such "touches of nature" that "make the whole world kin," that cause to beat in stronger unison hearts that are separated by thousands of miles. They show us that we are blood brothers. even though separated by an ocean. They prove that we are yet part of one great brotherhood, even though for some of us the loved old sod may be the "ould sod" or the bracken covered hills of Auld Scotia. In no small part do they help bind together the immensities of a world-wide empire.

But to return. Dr. Boultbee is not new to executive work and he returns to it with the maturity of thought that added experience always gives.

in losing Mr. Frank Britton's services, the C. K. C. has parted with one whose time and services were always at the command of the Club. An invariable attendant at executive meetings, his presence and advice will be missed. And, indeed, the same may be said of Mr. Walter Sands, the other member of the old board, who for the nonce has been placed on the retired list. We hope to see them both back again another year.

Our visitors: Canadians must like and respect Mr. Desmond O'Connell and Mr. Arthur Maxwell, the two distinguished English judges, else they would not honor them with a return request for their judicial services. We can say without fear of contradiction that men of the standing of Messrs. O'Connell and Maxwell lend an air of dignity to and give tone to any organization with which they may be connected. Quiet, unassuming, kindly, dignified, they give a distinction to the show that perhaps we sometimes lack. It does us good all round to come in

contact with such men, even though it be but infrequently. We need a steadying and their visits give it. We say this entirely apart from any opioion of their judging of the dogs brought before them. Here there must always be an honest difference of opinion.

Mr. Maxwell's task was a heavy one, but his careful examination of the dogs right to the end drew forth admiration, even though with some of his decisions we must "agree to differ." His methodical judging was a good lesson. On first examination the dogs he did not want quickly got the gate, thereby in the larger classes giving the necessary room to those dogs that were really competitors. From a false sensitiveness here is where many judges fail. They keep the ring full of perambulating animals, good, bad and indifferent, when they know at first glance that a certain proportion is better sent out at once, so giving those who have any chance of honor an opportunity of showing all that is in them. We believe implicitly in giving every dog his due, but the due of many is a speedy end to his owner's anxiety. Give the poorest the gate.

Mr. O'Connell's judging of Fox Terriers should set us right in some ways. We regret greatly that the good dogs in the west were not here also to meet his judicial eye. At the annual meeting of the C. K. C. the few remarks he made were said in such a quiet, even, distinct tone, and in such beautiful diction that it was a delight to listen to him. In sharp contrast was the more vigorous, if sometimes perhaps, peculiar, Anglo Saxon of some of the other speakers. We need them both, the quietness and dignity of the old land and the rugged vigor of our beloved Canada.

A champion gone: Mrs. Wylie has suffered a very severe loss in the death of the champion Pomeranian, Cairndhu Tot. Like the good sportswoman she is, however, she takes the loss with equanimity that nothing but the experience of years brings. They must all go some time. Still, the loss is doubly heavy in this case, as Tot had never been beaten since Mrs. Wylie brought the little thing to Canada.

Death occurred as the result of a hemorrhage. She was shown at the Niagara Falls show, where she won right through her classes, being awarded also specials for best of any breed

from Canada, and for best Toy, any breed. She died on the following Tuesday despite all that medical advice and care could do.

Saskatchewan Kennel Club: It is a pleasure to us to be able to announce still another kennel organization for the West. The Saskatchewan Kennel Club has been incorporated with a list of officers whose prominence and standing ensure success. In the meantime the by-laws of the Alberta Kennel Club have been adopted and a show is projected for next July, in connec-tion with the Provincial Exhibition, Regina. It is hoped also that Field Trials may be held some time during the present autumn.

CANADIAN NATIONAL SHOW, TORONTO.

No of Dogs 615. Winner's Value 4 points.

Although the number of dogs at Toronto this year was almost 100 below last year, the show could not be called anything but a huge success. The chief falling off seemed to be in Collies, Irish and Boston Terriers and the Toy dogs, but the better quality in most classes more than compensated for any decrease in entries. * "A winner at Toronto" is still a pretty good recommendation for any dog.

We have never seen a show where the decisions of the judges gave more general satisfaction. Each judge was an authority on the classes that came before him, and "kickers" were conspicuous by their absence. The judging went along merrily during Monday afternoon and Tuesday without confusion or fuss. Mr. Kent and Mr. Jacobi were at it early and late making the rough places smooth, and had competent backing in "Teddy" Carlisle and his coterie to keep the judges going. The dogs also received the best of attention.

Mr. Arthur Maxwell, Staines, England—Greyhounds, Bulldogs, French Bulldogs, Airedale, Irish, Scottish, Skye, Bedlington and Black and Tan Terriers, Whippets, Pomeranians, English Toy Spaniels, Japanese Spaniels, Yorkshire Terriers and Schipperkes.

Mr. Desmond O'Connell, Sarratt Herts, England—English Fox Hounds, smooth and wire haired Fox Terriers, Welsh Terriers.

Mr. H. A. Belcher, Waltham, Mass. — Setters.

Mr. W. T. Payne, Kingston, Pa. -Sporting Spaniels.

Mr. W. O. Roy, Montreal, Que. -Collies and Old English Sheep Dogs.

Mr. J. E. Carroll, Buffalo, N.Y. -

Mr. Jas. Mortimer, Hempstead, L.I., N.Y. — Mastiffs, St. Bernards, Great Danes, Newfoundlands, Bloodhounds, Russian Wolfhounds, American Foxhounds, Pointers, Bull Terriers, Poodles, Dalmatians, Beagles, Dachshunde, Pugs. Italian Greyhounds, Toy Terriers, Miscellaneous and General Specials.

No matter how large the show, how good the quality, how competent the management and judging, we sincerely hope that we have seen the last show held in the old dog show building. A modern structure with plenty of rings, conveniences for exhibitors and sufficient floor space to bench everything on the ground floor, has become a necessity if the high standard of the show is to be maintained. A petition to the management of the exhibition, expressing the urgency of such a building, was signed by almost every exhibitor.

We are indebted to Mr. Desmond O'-Connell for the report on Fox Terriers and to Dr. Alfred Boultbee for report on Bulldogs.

Only one Mastiff, a sound dog, that could do without his cheek bumps and with a little wrinkle. St. Bernards, as we see them, might be called a good class. Agawa Duke again went to winners in the roughs. He is well known now as one of the best, but did not look himself, as he was very thin and not in best of coat. The next dog, Amity, has particularly good skull, muzzle and color, but a bad front, and only fair hind quarters. Lochinvar also is well known. He lacks size but was shown in fine condition. In bitches, Alta Iola is easily the best, an exceedingly symmetrical and substantial bitch, grand bone and a good head, with the exception of skull being a little domed. Viola of Parkdale, 2nd open bitches, is a good fronted one with fair stern; a little more blaze and wrinkle would improve her expression. Messrs. Stuart's Marvel of Beauty has a good body, but is houndy in head. In smooths, Dr. Lucas, not in very good condition, again went to the fore, followed by Alta Salome, a lovely type of bitch of good quality, which wants time to develop. Bloodhounds a rather pleasant surprise in Messrs. Hall & Sons quartette. Silton's Beau, the winners dog, is a rich black and tan with lots of muzzle and bone and a dark eye. He could stand a little more wrinkle. Silton's Rover, the other dog, hasn't the same substance as the first and is light in eye. Dartmoor Benefice II., the winning bitch, is a nice one, but would like to see more bone and muzzle. Dartmoor Venus, well up, but like 2nd dog, light in eye. Four Newfoundlands: winning dog has good

skull, bone and body, but is out of condition and is beaten by the reserve in eye and coat, though the latter lacks substance. We were somewhat disappointed in the Danes. We did not see the winner as he had been taken off the bench, but the reserve, like most of the others, looked to us to be on the coarse side, and is cheeky, though, of course, of a very substantial type. In Russian Wolfhounds, the Czar of Dromore easily headed the class, a large, long headed dog, with good roach, and in good condition. In Greyhounds Mr. Ben Lewis Jr.'s pair - beautiful specimens shown in great form - went up. The judge evidently liked the big ones, as Mr. Coulter's well known bitch, Queenie. was not placed in the open class, being beaten by the same owner's Chummie.

There was a fair turnout of English Foxhounds, the London Hunt Club, Mr. Jacques and Mr. Bannister contributing most of the entries. Mr. Bannister's Watchman is not a new face by any means. He added another winners to his already somewhat lengthy list, fairly beating the reserve dog, Mr. Jacques' Rowdy, in conformation. He is clearer in shoulder, deeper in chest and has a better barrel, though Mr. Jacques' dog is a very nice sort of a Hound. The winners bitch, Mr. Bannister's importation, Thrush, has wonderfully good bone, body, front, legs and feet, but is a little common in head, where she fails to the reserve, Glenmore Tulip. We hardly know along what lines Mr. Mortimer judged the American Hounds, but surmise that he placed them according to soundness. The winners dog is more after the English type-a compact, substantial dog, besides resembling the English in head, and the reserve dog was after the same style. The winning bitches were of a different stamp altogether, being lighter in muzzle and

There were hardly as many Pointers as might have been expected, entries in dogs being particularly light. Ch. Marks' Rush was on hand for exhibition only, in great condition, looking like a two-year-old. Mr. Bleistein won 1, 2, 3, in bitches, the first one, Mallwyd Glory, a particularly nice

bitch all round with exception of feet being a little spread. She handily beat Lansdowne Milksham, another good bitch, lacking a little in depth of muzzle. Mr. Armstrong also showed a pretty decent bitch in Ottawa Bess, winning first novice with her. She was shown on the thin side, but outside of being a little light in eye, she is a rather good bitch all through. The entry of English Setters was also light, but the quality of the winning quartette-Mr. Lewis' charges -was good. It is interesting to note in passing that one of the winning bitches was a purchase of Mr. Lewis in Winnipeg. Irish Setters, very well represented in numbers and quality, the most even congregation of the breed we have seen for some time. While we do not like a small snipey Setter, especially in the red ones, we fear that the tendency is to getting them too big. Chief Rockwood, the winners dog, needs no comment. He has a wonderful head and was shown in good hard condition. He was a credit to the show. The next dog up, St. Patrick of Elsinore, although a nice one, was well beaten. The winners bitch is a good headed one, rich in color and in fine condition, in fact, a good bitch all over except for being little light in eye. The reserve is still more at fault in this respect, but is another one of quality. roney showed a pair of very promising puppies in Brown Betty and Larry McCoy. They were very evenly matched and should, in our opinion, have received the special for brace.

Airedales could hardly help being a large class in the face of the long string of specials. Mr. Ussher's pair of puppies, Grayston Grumps Grayston Growler went through to winners in order named, beating Grayston Ginger, Auckland Lucky Stone and Columbus. Colne Estelle Drummond, a very clean cut bitch with good skull and particularly good foreface has not enough bone or coat and is a little light in eye. She led the bitches, being followed by Auckland Spruceness, a nice type of bitch, good in coat and color, but a little shy of foreface. Clonmel Topaz won 3rd open. She is still a good bitch but beginning to show age, a little skully and thick in the shoulder.

Irish Water Spaniels, three, were easily headed by Mr. Carson's Nora McShane. Cocker Spaniels, the ban-

ner class of the show for entries, contained more dreams and fewer nightmares than ever before. In puppy | Sutherland and McMahon showed Belle dogs, Mr. Dyment's Brookdale Garry nice head but on big side, won over Mr. Jackson's well known parti, Bobby Kerr. Garry won again in novice black dogs, in which class Mr. Smith's Hottentot, a very fair one with exception of being a little thick in skull and light in eye, won 2nd. Limit black dogs brought out Martello, which went right through from there to winners. We like this little dog more every time we see him, and he seems to be improving with age. He has a grand front, beautiful, long low set ears, good skull and eye, and well proportioned body and with a trifle deeper muzzle and a little more bone he should about hold his own anywhere and everywhere. Mr. Montgomery's dog, Little Joker, followed him through. He is one that we have frequently spoken very highly of, particularly good in ear and placement of ear, and shown in beautiful feather. 3rd went to Darkie II., a rather nice headed one but losing in body. Open a repeat. In black bitches was found the best quality we have seen. Douglas's Marion swept everything before her in her classes. In head points it is very hard to find fault with her. Grand clean skull, deep muzzle, lovely dark eye, best of ears and real Cocker expression. She is well ribbed out, cobby and has a good coat, but fails a little to the reserve bitch in front. We thought we noticed her a little lame in the ring. Mr. Dunn's Dunbrae Sis, the bitch we liked so much at the summer show in Toronto, ran her a close second, not being shown in so good condition. Princess Virginia was placed 3 in the open: she is a nice headed one, but has a bad front and was out of condition. We hardly think she should have been given the preference over Dunbrae Belle, the litter sister to the reserve bitch, and resembling her very much. Mr. Collison showed a pair of black bitches which won 2 and 3 in novice (black). both were very trim, with good eyes, but lacked the bone and depth of muzzle of the winners. Coming around to the parti-colors, we have Tomlinson's well known Speculator winning where shown and beating all the reds as well as partis for winners dogs. Mr. Armstrong's Ottawa Oarsman and Bobby Kerr were placed next

to him in open and limit parti-color classes. In parti-color bitches Messrs. Adair, a very cobby little one with good head, which won open particolor bitches. Messrs. Stuart's Black Stocking, a rather nice bitch, in head especially, but a little leggy, was placed next to her. We need hardly comment on Ottawa Red Light, the reserve winners dog. He is well known as one of the best reds. He won over Mr. Dyment's recent importation. Brookdale Bonfire. This dog should be a very valuable acquisition to the Barrie Kennels, for he has a nice head, ear and eye, is a good color, and while we would like to see a little heavier bone, he is not lacking a great deal in this respect. We would not overlook Mr. Douglas' Plaudmore, a dog shown in good condition, but with wrinkle over the eye which gives him a sour expression. Mr. Davis's Chauncey D. won 4 in limit and open. In bitches, any other solid color than black, Mr. Dyment again swept the boards with his sweet little buff bitch, Brookdale Violet. She took winners bitches for him. Lansdowne Lady Santoi, Floss II., good but showing age, and Amber, a very fair one, but light in eye, were placed in order named after Brookdale Violet. In novice bitches, red, Mr. Dyment's Nellie O'-Neil, a good old bitch, but showing age, won.

Collies, a disappointment in numbers and, outside of the winners and reserve dogs, also in quality. We fully realize what a bad time of the year it is to show this breed, but do not believe that the season was altogether responsible for the light entry. have noticed a falling off in this class at nearly all the shows during the past year. The winners dog, Ormskirk Chancellor, is a tri-color of finest quality, has an immense long head, good substance, and was shown in great condition. It was in the last named point that he beat Dr. Ford's imported sable, Otterburn Diamond, a very stylish Collie, showing grand quality all over and excelling in head, eye and ear. These two dogs had the rest of the class far outclassed. The winning bitch is a very fair one with pretty good head, eye and ear, but is light boned, lacking substance. Old English Sheepdogs, a good hardy lot of workmen, Mr. Cavan's Shenstone Mike the best in the class.

Dalmatians, outside of the winner, which was off the bench and whom we therefore did not see, only a mediocre lot.

There was the hottest competition in Bull Terriers that we have seen for years. Nearly every dog benched was worthy of special mention, but we shall have to confine our remarks to a few of the winners. Winners dogs went to the heavyweight Noross Patrician. He is a grand Terrier all over, good head and perfectly sound, and was placed over Inferno, not looking in any too good shape. We also liked the winning puppy and novice dog, Pimlico, a very promising one. The winners bitch, Mr. Robertson's Willow Bloom, is a lightweight and very nice all over with exception of shape of eye. She beat the American bitch, Williamette Iris, another good bitch but lippy.

Boston Terriers nothing very much new and not so many as last year. The winners and reserve dogs are well known — Peter Pan and Lord Bell Rock. Another very clean cut little dog was the winning puppy, Mr. Little's Ted Shongo; he is very promising. The winners bitch is a sweet little one but not robust — much too fine all through, while the reserve is another very nice one, more of her and a better shower.

Poodles made up a very pretty little class, all whites, winners and reserve going to Barlow and Collins' John Boy and Nancy Girl.

Irish Terriers were away down in numbers. They were away up in the gallery, and when we looked them up, the only one of the four winners on the bench was the reserve bitch, Mr. Macdonald's Dolinda. She is a good headed bitch, nice small dark eye, fair front, feet, coat and body.

Scotties mustered eleven strong. Winners dog, Clonmel Dirk, a good one, well known, not as strong in shoulders and front as might be desired. He was placed over Mr. Fraser's Stair Bonnie, a grand bodied little dog excelling in head, front and coat, a decision we cannot at all agree with. Mrs. Laurin's Colne Invasion won out in bitches, a taking little bitch somewhat lacking in substance and foreface. Bedlingtons also made up a very fair little class, Mrs. Coleman and Mr. Kenyon getting a winners apiece with Joek O'Dundurn and Nellie. Black and Tans pretty well

represented, most of the good ones coming from Ottawa. Mr. McLean's Willowdale Kaiser, the winners dog, has a grand head, ear, eye and color, and is a Terrier all over. The reserve dog, Willowdale Golden Rod, is another very catchy Terrier, losing to the winner in head and ear. Winners bitch was Mr. Lyndon's Perl Point, particularly nice color and front, but losing to Willowdale Beauty, third open, in head and eye, besides being a little long-cast. The reserve bitch, Messrs, Day & Phillips' Studhope Lady Vanity, is rather light of bone but a rather good bitch apart from that.

The popularity of the Beagle is not on the wane, judging from the entry. Winners dog, Devonshire Hawk, we could wish a trifle heavier in bone, with more substance, but he is a real Beagle in head points. Mr. Luxton's Gamey, the reserve dog, is of a heavier build, but a trifle long-cast, is well beaten in head. The two winning bitches were off the bench every time we went to see them, but as they were placed over such good ones as Messrs. Smith's Smithfield Glory and Welcome, they must have been high class ones. Dachshunde seem to be picking up again, for both quality and quantity showed vast improvement. The winners and reserves were all red, though there were a few very nice black and tans (our preference) shown. The Doctor, from Guelph, is close to the ground, muscular, with good head and eye. He beats King Reginald in eye and shoulder. The winners bitch is a very nice one, built on very fine lines, while the reserve loses to her in head. French Bulldogs, a small class, the winners, Mr. Moran's Bell Rock of Patricia easily the best in the class. Whippets and Italian Greyhounds well up to the mark. Pugs also a very nice lot while Poms were hardly up to last year. Dr. Foster's Berwyn Mite and Funny Fanny took winners in latter class. Toy Terriers, Poodles, Toy Spaniels and Schipperkes, about the average, while quite a string of Yorkshires greeted the judge, Mr. Crowther's Teddy Tip winning out in dogs and Miss Gee's Dalmore Wee Girlie in bitches.

Special Report on Bulldogs at the Canadian National.

The judging of any exhibit of dogs is only the opinion of an expert chosen by experienced breeders to place their dogs, and as such should always be accepted in the best of spirit both by the "ups" as well as the "downs." In any large show if half a dozen different judges were employed, unquestionably, outside of the "mutts," every dog would have its advocate and seldom would any two judges agree. The following notes are not made either to cast doubt on the correctness of Mr. Arthur Maxwell's placing, or, to the slightest extent, to weigh with his opinion. Mr. Maxwell was more than painstaking in the performance of his duties, and in the main was undoubtedly correct. He was a stickler for soundness, and showed his courage in throwing out such bitches as Sweet Alice and Sherwood Success for very visible defects.

In puppy dogs his eye was caught by Crusader, a dark brindle nicish dog, but with a woeful short, bumpy skull and none too good front, though short in foreface. The judge inquired the exact age of every dog or bitch he judged, and if allowance was made for

age in this puppy a mistake was made. Heads do not lengthen, but broaden, after the age of this puppy, almost a year old. The little white, Oakville Lord Chummy, I think, was second. He is a miniature, but, barring his size, he beats the first at every point. Third, Limeston: Biff, is a really good headed puppy, good foreface and has some substance. Either he or Chummy would have looked better first and second. Novice were repeats except Crusader was absent and Sir Robert Stone, a nice quality little dog wanting in substance, was reserve.

In adult dogs, light weight, Lee Bank Squire had nothing to beat worthy of mention. In heavyweights appeared Moston Leader, shown fit to the minute, and in such condition he is easily in a class by himself, swamping with ease all his competitors. Generally speaking, he is a classy Bulldog all through, excelling in skull, face, shoulders and roach. His weak point is that he is bent too much at hocks, but even at this point he is perfectly sound, and the most active Bulldog in the show. Second was Rolling Demon, enormously improved, being more upfaced and better sprung in rib than when last shown. He is going the right way.

In Juniors the puppy Crusader was again placed first, the bitch, Milo Peggy, was fourth. They might easily have changed places.

Moston Leader took winners in a walk, but how Crusader got reserve is a conundrum; if he is the correct type, so is his sire, Lee Bank Squire, and he swamps the younger dog at every point. Putting the dogs in line, Crusader would have been lucky to stand seventh. His position was the serious error in the Bulldog judging.

The bitches were a distinct falling off in quality. Vinemount Cameo went through all her classes, including winners. She is a splendid bodied bitch with nice shoulders, but in front of the neck, nothing. On the same line of reasoning Lee Bank Squire and Merry Boy should have stood higher. Reserve winners went to the fawn, Lennox Benita, a nice sort but tight in skin and a bit plain in face. Put down to third place in heavyweights was Milo Peggy, just out of puppyhood. She is fair in rib and bone, but with the sweetest Bulldog head imaginable. Splendid wrinkle, good flat skull and tiny ears perfectly carried, wide and full in foreface, wide in underjaw, good lay back, perfect expression, surely in competition present she had walkover. She is a bitch somewhat on same type as Moston Leader and should have taken winners with the greatest ease, and with time will be among the first few.

Nothing discourages a fancier more than the above, and the evil will never be remedied unless we get men that thoroughly understand their business, (and they are to be found, although few and far between out here). The Committee have done all in their power in selecting a competent judge, and they have every faith in Mr. Bailey's abilities.

Mrs. Denham, of Victoria, who is an enthusiastic fancier, and who is at present residing in Vancouver, has secured a very good French Bull bitch,

which, since arriving, has had a grand litter of six puppies by Mr. E. R. Rickett's well known Bon Soir. From what I hear, their owner has already received numerous offers for them, and this lady informs me that she could sell fifty of them easily according to enquiries. We are pleased to note that this rare breed is making headway in our city, and we hope that ere long they will keep up the status of Vancouver, as in the Fox Terrier world.

Kent-such a good fellow-though Vice President of the Exhibition, still finds time for the duties of Chairman of Bench Show Committee and Mr. Fred Jacobi, Superintendent of the Show, and to each and all members of the Committee.

Smooth Fox Terriers: The dog puppies were a small class and not up to standard. Niola Boy, the winner, is a dog of character with good head, front and bone. He wants time, but his feet will always handicap him. Novice dogs: The winning dog puppy came second to Levenside Lucifer, a dog I much liked, eventually going through his classes winning the dog championship. He is all white, strangely resembling both Hunton Bridegroom and Rowton Knight, both of whom are in his pedigree. His head is well shaped

with plenty of strength in foreface, good top, body and hindquarters, his elbows are placed right but at times he points his toes out, this and a somewhat lack of fire and go, just keep him out of the first flight. Third, Kenilworth Rebel, a nicely balanced and taking dog. Limit dogs: Lucifer headed this. Second, Sabine Reckoner, a dog of very high quality, were his shoulders finer and his front absolute, he would take a lot of stopping in any company. Third, Broadway Donor, has best of legs and feet, good body and quarters, his head is plain. Open dogs: This introduced Sabine Rational. He has the true type of a Terrier, as have all I saw from this kennel. Make him more masculine and a bit stronger everywhere and you have a flier. Broadway Donor, third. Clapton Blue Blade appealed to me very much, as from his rib forward he is the equal of any dog in the show, but I could not forgive weak hindquarters and faulty action. Put to bitches with the best of quarters and hind action, this dog should sire good stock. Breeders class, dogs and bitches: Oxford Frivolty beat both Lucifer and Sabine Rational and I made her out the second best Terrier in the

show. She was badly put down and is a poor shower but has very few faults. Puppy bitches: Poor in number and quality. Novice bitches: Sabine Fagot first has the characteristies of her kennel but is light throughout and must improve behind. Blue Mary has many points to recommend her; she did not by any means do herself justice in the ring. Limit her; her; she did not by herself justice in the ring. Limit bitches: Sabine Fanciful is a very nice type of Terrier, good head which would be improved with a smaller ear, the best of feet and legs, good shoulders and body properties, has just missed being a topper owing to her faulty hindquarters which must always handicap her in the very best com-pany. Second: Eton Blue Gown, a very sound Terrier all through, very good legs and feet, lacking, however, in quality. Open bitches: Sabine Fernie, first. It was a case of "Eclipse first, the rest nowhere." I know cows at a distance have long horns and that horses galloping past trees go fast, but I have no hesitation in saythat I know no Fox Terrier, dog bitch, of the present day that would place in front of her. told by men whose judgment I respect and who have seen both bitches, that Warren Remedy is the better of the two; if this be so all I can say is that the glowing accounts of latter that we have heard in England must be justified and that those who claimed that Mr. Rutherford's bitch is the best Fox Terrier of any time cannot be far astray. Unfortunately, none of Mr. Rutherford's Terriers came before me owing to a death in his fam-

To English Fox Terrier men I would describe Sabine Fernie by asking them picture to themselves Vadis (a bitch Mr. Vicary had some years ago) the best of legs and feet but with well ribbed up, short in back with grand hind-quarters and beautiful ac-tion. Exception, I heard, had been taken to the lack of bone and want of strength in foreface in Sabine Fernie. As to head, it is abundantly ample and were it stronger anywhere it would lose its feminine charm and expression. Touching on the alleged lack of bone, it is true she does not carry a lot of soft spongy material, incorrectly described as bone; her's is round and hard and can be compared to the bone of a high class thorough-bred horse as against that of the Clydesdale.

In the absence of two prominent smooth Fox Terrier kennels, viz., the viz., the Norfolk Kennels (which when I was last at Toronto were at their zenith) and Mr. Rutherford's Terriers, I may fairly say improvement has really been made generally, certainly there were fewer oversized Terriers shown. With your permission I would here state that I by no means decry the value to be placed upon a Terrier, a show dog handicapped only by size. On the contrary I look upon such as an absolute necessity, but his place is at home as a stud dog.

Wires: With the one exception of Mr. George Thomas' Endcliffe Brittle, there was not a single wire dog even up to second class form, and the same may be said of the bitches, save, perhaps, Mr. Thomas Moore's Donnington Siren. Canadian breeders have made no headway as far as I could see in this variety and seem to require fresh blood badly. I regret to find these classes not so good as on my former visit. In saying this I am quite aware of the great disadvantages under which Canadian breeders suffer, with so very few shows and those usually at long distances from home, a very limited selection of sires and practically no market for their surplus stock, they are very heavily handitheir surplus capped. However, such good sports-men are they, and so keen under difficulties that would make many throw up the sponge, that I feel sure "the grit of the race" will eventually manage to overcome all such obstacles.

In conclusion, let me say how greatly I enjoyed renewing my acquaint-ance with the beautiful city of Toronto and to its truly remarkable annual Exhibition. I am told there is nothing to be compared to the latter anywhere, which I can easily believe, combining as it does every species of live stock as well as a marvellous collection of every product and manufacture of the great Dominion of Canada. It will give readers in England some idea of its vastness, covering as it does some 270 acres, and popularity, when I tell them that one hundred and fifty thousand people paid for admission on Monday, September 6th (Labor Day).

The detail in connection with this huge undertaking is so thorough that everything works with machine like precision, due to the zealous and unselfish interest shown by the Committee of the Canadian National Exhibition, so ably presided over by Mr. George H. Gooderham, and to the untring efforts, tact and business capacity of its Manager, Doctor J. O. Orr. Desmond O'Connell.
