NOTES AND COMMENTS

H. Parker Thomas dead: It seems difficult for us to realize that the stalwart, six feet, ruddy Henry Parker Thomas has passed over to that bourne that awaits us all and from which none return. Parker Thomas was a man in a thousand, honest in character as he was upright in figure. Unbiased in opinion of man or dog, he looked for the best in both and found it. Simple in character, an efficient, faithful judge that asked no man's opinion but put on no side. Parker Thomas was the kind of judge that we need to cultivate, the man who knew and was absolutely honest and unbiased. He did not look for appointments and accepted but few. Time and time we have personally requested him to accept engagements far and near. He almost invariably declined.

Parker Thomas had a good all round knowledge of dogs. In sporting Spaniels he was entirely at home. He judged the breed as often as he could be got out, all too infrequently to suit those who love a sensible sporting type, not toys or weeds. At the Canadian National Exhibition, Toronto, his name was a talisman that drew record entries. He was as ready to give reasons for his judgment as he was loath to accept judging appointments. A firm friend of the Canadian Kennel Club he was for years on its executive board, and at a time, too, when the C. K. C. needed level heads and wise management.

Mr. Thomas was really the originator of the defunct Canadian Sporting Spaniel Club, and it is an open secret that more than one of this unfortunate club's debts were paid from his private purse.

For very many years the writer counted Parker Thomas amongst his

warmest personal friends, and we can say without any fear of contradiction that we never knew of any deviation from the right way that would tend to make us regret that friendship or to value it less. He was a gentleman, a clean sportsman and a MAN.

Mr. Thomas was city assessor for the city of Belleville, Ont., the city of his birth and training. He was universally respected there as a man of high ability and noble purpose. Aged about 45, he was in full vigor, and the dire result of an attack of neuralgia of the heart was entirely unexpected. His widow and three children will have the sympathy of all who knew and loved him.

Parker Thomas was a lawyer by profession and practiced until about two years ago. He was a graduate of Queen's University and of the University of Toronto. His father, J. Parker Thomas, is also a lawyer.

At one time he was famous as an athlete and runner, and at the time of his death was Secretary of the Belleville Curling Club. In respect to his memory flags on all civic buildings were flying at half mast.

The Canadian Kennel Club sent a wreath in memory of an old comrade, and it is our duty to put on record the following acknowledgment:

West Highland Terriers: We are glad to know that there are more West Highland Terriers in Canada than we

X knew of. This means that application at the proper time should bring out classes at Toronto at least, possibly at other shows also.

For three years the breed has steadily been gaining in favor in Montreal. Miss Eadie imported a bitch two years ago, and now has five nice puppies sired by a dog imported by Mr. Cameron of Toronto.

Victoria losses: We are advised of the death of Mr. J. Wallis's good Irish Terrier Western Financier, registered in the C. K. C. Also of that great sire and winner, the smooth Fox Terrier Ch. Coversea Revelry, C. 7521. This great winner was originally imported by Mr. George Raper for the Windy Kennels of San Francisco, and later was purchased by Mr. Geo. Florence.

This good sire leaves many champions behind him and was himself a most frequent winner. He was in fact a champion under two clubs, as he attained championship honors under Pacific Coast League Rules also.

Winners Rules: Mr. E. C. Powell, Secretary of the C. K. C. Pacific Coast Advisory Board, suggests a change in the paragraphing of the C. K. C. Rules governing winners. We commend the change and hope that Mr. Powell will lay the matter officially before the C. K. C. in the form of a notice of motion. Mr. Powell's suggestion would change none of the present wording of the rule, simply tending to a more intelligent reading. Rule XV. is the one under discussion. Part of the 5th section would, if changed, read as follows:

5th. The winners class at any show shall be open only to winners of first prizes in any class recognized at that show.

Before awarding reserve in this class the dog, or dogs, having been placed second to the winner in any of the recognized classes, must also be brought before the judge for competition. No class winner may be withdrawn or withheld from competition in the winners class. No entry fee shall be charged for competition in this class.

Winners classes shall not be allowed where two or more breeds are combined.

The winners class shall be divided by sex, provided at least the open class is also divided by sex.

But two winners classes may be offered in any one breed (except Cocker Spaniels), one for dogs and one for bitches. In Cocker Spaniels four winners classes may be offered, i.e., black dogs, black bitches, any other color dogs, any other color bitches.

Ten points, which must be won under at least two different judges, shall constitute a championship.

South Essex Show: The second annual bench show of the South Essex Canine Association will be held in the Town of Kingsville on Tuesday and Wednesday, December 28 and 29, 1908. Mr. W. J. Elliott is the President, and Mr. Fred Crawford, Sec'y-Treas.

The following rules will govern the show:

1. Each exhibitor must be a member of the South Essex Canine Association. Membership fee 50c.

2. An entry fee of 50c. will be charged for each and every entry.

3. No separate entry is required for specials.

4. All animals on exhibition must be the bona-fide property of the exhibitor. The penalty for any violation of this rule shall be the forfeiture of all prizes won at this show.

5. All animals must be furnished with suitable collar and chain and must be in place by 12 o'clock noon on Tuesday, Dec. 28, and must not be removed from the exhibition room before 4 p.m. Wed. 29, without special permission from the Supt.

6. Each exhibitor must make necessary provision for feeding his own dog. Dogs shipped in from a distance will be cared for by Association and shipped to owner at close of show.

7. The Association will not be re-

sponsible for any loss or injury to dogs while at the show or in transit.

8. The term dog shall include all males, one year old and over; the term bitch shall include all females one year old and over; the term puppy shall include all males and females under one year old.

9. There will be a selling class in which will be listed dogs that will be put up for auction at 4 p.m. last day of exhibition. A special entry fee of 25c. will be charged for this class.

10. Prizes will be awarded as follows: First prize, \$1.50; second prize, 75c. for dogs, bitches and puppies in each of the following classes: Pointers, Setters, (any variety) Collies, (rough or smooth) Fox Terriers, (smooth or wire haired) Bull Terriers, Cocker Spaniels, (any variety) Water Spaniels, Toy Terriers, (10 lbs. or under); any variety not mentioned under 20 lbs.; any variety not mentioned over 20 lbs. N.B.—In any class where there are fewer than three entries the first prize shall be \$1.00, and the second 50c.

11. All entries, accompanied by the necessary fees must be in the hands of the Sec'y-Treas. not later than Saturday, Dec. 25.

Then there is a list of specials that will be increased before the entries close. It includes the following:

Best specimen in the show, silver cup, donated by the Association. (To be won three times by an exhibitor before it becomes his property.)

Best Red Cocker Spaniel, \$1.00 cash.

Best Setter (any variety), \$2.00 cash.

Best Irish Setter, \$1.50 cash.

Best Setter puppy (any variety), \$1 cash.

Best English Setter, pair black Minors.

Best Fox Terrier dog, \$1 cash.

Best Fox Terrier, \$1.50 umbrella.

Best Fox Terrier bitch, box Long Tom cigars.

Best Fox Terrier puppy, 75c. cash.

Best Pointer, \$2.50 hat.

Best Pointer dog (1) \$1.00 cash; (2) 50c. cash.

Best English Bull Terrier, \$1 cash.

Best Water Spaniel, \$1 pipe.

Best Collie dog, \$1 cash.

Best Collie dog or bitch, \$1, merchandise.

Best Collie puppy, \$1 cash.

Best Beagle, \$1 cash.

Best Fox Hound (1) box cigars, (2) 50c. cash.

Best Skye Terrier, 50c. cash.

Best Toy dog or bitch under 10 lbs., \$4.00, reed rocker.

Best dog or bitch, any variety not mentioned, under 20 lbs., \$2.50, glass set.

Best dog or bitch, any variety not mentioned, over 20 lbs., \$1.

Best farm dog or bitch (1) \$1.50 cash; (2) \$1.25, set of shoes and shoeing.

This is not a pretentious classification, nor will the show have one thousand entries. It is, however, worthy of encouragement, and we hope that breeders in the vicinity will support it. It is not being held under C. K. C. rules.

Spratt's Calendar: Spratts Patent, Limited, again remind us with their unique calendar that 1909 will soon be past. The calendar for 1910 fits Canadians aptly, as the first picture is one of our recent guest, Lord Charles Beresford. Lord Beresford is "handling" four of Mr. Walter Jeffries' celebrated Bulldogs, Royal Stone, Dick Stone, Captain Stone and Flag Stone. Then there is a reproduction of Landseer's picture, *Suspense*, one of a good brace of Basset Hounds, a trio of Toy Poms, a blue roan Cocker, a poodle, the Afghan Hound Zardin and many feathered subjects also. If you want a copy write Spratts, but do it early to save disappointment. It is worth having.

Ontario show: The dates, March 24, 25 and 26, have been claimed by the Ontario Kennel Club for their next show.

Carr's Tags: Our front page illustration this month is that of Mr. Barr's Boston Terrier, Carr's Tags. He is a big winner, having the following list of winnings to his credit: 1907, 1st limit, 1st open and reserve winners, Batavia; 1st limit and winners at Binghamton, and 1st limit, Jersey City. In 1908, he won, 1st limit and winners, Cleveland, 1st open at Columbus, Pittsburg and Youngstown; 1st open and winners at Binghamton.

What the Judge Thinks of the Terriers Exhibited at Vancouver, Oct. 25, 1909.

The one day show given by the Vancouver Kennel Club, Thanksgiving Day, October 25, 1909, considering the innovation of a one-day show and non-professional judges, was a most successful and enjoyable affair. The show was held in the Horse Show Building, large, commodious, well ventilated and thoroughly suited for horse and dog shows. As usual with the officials of the Vancouver Club everything was shipshape at the start and went with a swing all day. The writer, W. B. Bailey, from over the line, officiated as judge of all Terriers.

In the last issue of the Canadian Kennel Gazette, a review of Fox Terriers appeared, also a rather ill chosen article from the pen of Stanley Dorrell, who from the awards, appears as one of the losers. A few novice fanciers, after showing a dog once or twice, usually have one or two opinions of the judge, especially when they lose. If there is no question of the integrity of the judge, then he does not know them; if he is conceded to know them, then he is crooked. As to his remarks of my awards I will pass it with a few remarks. His utterances pertaining to the officials showing dogs with their badges on, is evidently directed at Mr. Welsh, and are utterly uncalled for. Mr. Welsh wants to win only when he has the best dog. He is one of the keenest and most successful fanciers in Vancouver, and does not get stung with has-beens, but rather prefers breeding them himself. He usually owns a good bitch or two and uses the best stud dog procurable. Some years ago when he was interested in wires he used Barkby Ben, and I understand he now has a litter by Sabine Resist. Other fanciers might copy from him.

If Mr. Dorrell ever hopes to beat Leading Chance, especially in the shape the dogs were before me, he will have to have the man that sold him Ormonde Bristles make the awards. The dog Bristles reminds one of another imported dog shown considerably at Vancouver, Leander Club. Both dogs, according to their owners, won many prizes in England, which fact their owners proclaim from the house-tops, but in this country they signally

fail to catch the judge's eye. We sometimes wonder why such good dogs leave England at the prices the purchaser could afford to pay.

Now for the dogs. The Terriers opened with Maltese Terriers. Princess Oki had a curly coat and a barber pole like a Poodle. Pat first, though not a good one, was a Maltese Terrier.

Scottish Terriers were hardly up to the standard. Mrs. Bradley Dyne, of Saturna, set for the Scotties. Dandie Dinmonts produced two fair ones.

Boston Terriers were a good entry for Vancouver, the winning bitch Agawan Julianne, a very good one, would be in the going in any company. The dog Honey Boy a fair one, handicapped with a possible blind eye.

Fox Terriers were the event of the show. Especially of interest was the fact that a pair from the Clapton Kennels were to compete. Right here I wish to commend the owners for their spirit in sending their dogs on such a long journey, for a one day show, and for the "Roland for an Oliver" spirit shown in their letter of thanks in the last issue. They must be good fellows, to say nothing of gentlemen. I am sorry R. I. P. could not see their beautiful bitch as I saw her. In smooths the entry was a large one. I will not try to review them all as reviews such as R. I. P. gives are misleading, the dogs hardly had the class he intimates. Nothing startling appeared in dogs save Clapton Blue Blade and Beau Brummel. Both these dogs are a treat for sore eyes. I went over the dogs very carefully. I could not have made much of a mistake had I given winners to either dog; Blue Blade excels in bone and coupling, Beau Brummel a little the best in head, being especially good before the eye. He also excels in coat, having a little harder and denser coat, and is a bit the cleaner dog all over. Taking the two dogs as they appeared before me I could find but one fault with either, Blue Blade has the characteristic bad hocks of the blues. The bitches as a whole were better than the dogs. I was possibly a little severe in one case, as I did not take notes. I am not at this time just sure which

one it was. It was in the puppy or novice class. Clapton Blue Bloom was an easy first in limit class. In open bitches she met a good one in Reminiscence. I saw her, I think, about seven years ago, when Wesley Mills went into raptures over her, she was then just such a bitch as Bloom is now, a little light all over, and in Bloom's case having a little too much on the leg, but hard to fault. Reminiscence, despite her age, which she keeps remarkably well, is still a good one. She was down in good shape and handled as only Mrs. Bostock can handle her. Still Bloom won rightly. Wandee Ruffles, who for the benefit of R. I. P., is a litter sister of the sire of Clapton Blue Blade, and Sunshine Blue Bell are both good bitches. Ruffles a little long bodied, neither in the class of the first two.

The wires were, as is generally the case in the hands of beginners, a ragged lot. Several of the get of the much discussed Coate's Rogue appearing. These dogs show that Rogue should go to the lethel chamber instead of being used as a sire for wire haired Fox Terriers, all showing the silky hair of Skye Terriers instead of wire haired Fox Terriers. One word here for the benefit of R. I. P. The high priced judge that he speaks about turning down a high class dog was George Thomas, and the dog Coate's Rogue. I handled Rogue two weeks previous under Thomas at Portland. Rogue being the only wire in the show, won. Thomas at this show hesitated at giving Rogue winners. I then knew what would happen to Rogue at Vancouver. As I said previously, the wires were down mostly in bad shape. Leading Chance, despite what Bristles may have done in England, standing out alone. Leading Chance is a nice coated dog, having the much desired pin wire coat. He is rather long in body, nice bone, front, legs and feet, fair in head, good muzzle, but a shade on the strong side all over. Bitches were a fair lot and as R. I. P. does not rip me up much in these classes I will let them go as he says.

Airedales were also a large entry. The dogs were mostly fair ones, as Airedales go in these parts, nice, big, strong dogs. Simon Fraser, the reserve winner, is a very fair dog all over, but not much class to him; in

fact all the dogs lacked class, except Flockmaster, the winner, who has much class, but nothing else. He is too small and has a wretched coat. But one entry appeared in bitches, Majestic. This one beat a good one of mine at the spring show. I was not present so was anxious to see her. She is a good one and the win under Mr. John Bradshaw was justified. This bitch would have got best Airedale were this honor contended for.

The least said of the Bull Terriers the better, not even a fair one appearing.

Irish Terriers produced two good ones, both owned by Mr. Jack Wallis, of Victoria. The imported dog, with rather smudgy coat, bad eyes and feet, losing to the local dog, a nice one, coat of good color and texture, nice size and a possible comer.

THE SCHIPPERKE.

To have seen a Dutch canalboat is to remember two conspicuous things about it, namely, the skipper's wife and the skipper's "leetle" dog. And about these two again you will probably recall that the first sported no shoes, and the second no tail; but as because the skipper's wife does not always wear her shoes (thrifty soul) you do not necessarily conclude that she has not a pair to her name, so with respect to the skipper's dog it would be equally erroneous to assume that he of necessity came into the world without a tail. He might have done so, of course (dogs of this kind very often do), but there is no obligation on his part to so please his admirers. Sometimes he does, and again sometimes he does not. He is not even so consistent on this point as the Manx Cat, which would die of shame the moment its eyes were open if it saw the remotest suggestion of a tail.

In the skipper's dog, if you have not seen him during your travels in the Netherlands, or in the stately homes of England, where he is popular enough to have three clubs formed to look after his special interests, you are introduced to the Schipperke—which means "Little Skipper," and is pronounced "Skipperkey." When in a hurry, or when you would appear to be on friendly terms with the dog, you will refer to him as a "Skip"—and skip's a good name for this bit of canine mercury, for he does not know what it is to stay in one place longer than you could say "Puff"; and if he sleeps at all it is in half-second dozes. He has a bark like a sharp rap on metal, and repeated as he bounces over the ground at the rate of drumsticks on a taut drum-head. In a word, the skipper's dog is the antithesis of the accepted version of what he is himself: Mynheer is all stolidity, the Schipperke is all electricity.

Can you imagine anything Dutch without deep foundations laid long ago? Of course not. Well, apply this to the history of his favorite dog, for in that particular it is Dutch of the Dutch. Almost as long as Holland has had a canalboat worth living on—at all events for well over a hundred years—so long has there been a

Schipperke aboard to police its decks and runways. And he is a little thoroughbred, which is proved by his breeding so true to type.

Schipperkes are watch-dogs par excellence. They are more prone to keep guard over their master's property than to be born without tails. The quality is the fruit of generations of inheritance. These vivacious little dogs may be seen circulating everywhere at once over the barges and boats of their owners, challenging every threatening object near and far, every minute of the twenty-four hours. With the boatman and his family, too, the Schipperke is a companionable little fellow, his expressive, rather almond-shaped eyes, as he takes an occasional stand by the tiller, showing that he is proud and fully sensible of his position in the firm. His air of officiousness is but a mask, really, to an essentially jovial disposition. You have only to be presented to him with due regard for the conventions when he puts you on his visiting list, never to be effaced. He is no curmudgeon, either, where other dogs are concerned, being quite chummy so long as there is no "monkeying" with his dignity, or what he conceives to be his rights. In the latter case he may be depended upon to give as good an account of himself as any mettlesome active twelve-pounder with a strong level business-like set of teeth might be expected to do. Old Von Tromp himself was never a better general in a fight; he succumbs only to superior force.

The Schipperke is wonderfully intelligent and has no doubt had this quality developed to the full to prevent his own dying of ennui on the dull routine of canal life. To amuse and occupy one's self in such an existence, one has to think; and the Schipperke does all this. In the flat serene stretches of the country, where there is no danger of strangers, particularly the street gamins, intruding on the boat, the Skip takes a constitutional extending into miles along the banks of the waterway on the lookout for sport or diversion. Heaven help the rat or rabbit that crosses his path. His punishing fox-like jaw, aided by his light

nimble legs, are ever ready to sign their death-warrant. Nothing escapes him. He sees and hears everything; and if he thinks he is missing any "goings on," he is the most unhappy canine alive; as his many fair admirers say "he's just got to be knowing." Yes, the Skip is "nosey" almost to one's distraction, but he is a lovable little chap.

It was in the early eighties that the Schipperke began to seriously attract the notice of the English-speaking world—in other words, the real doggy world, for it seems ever to have remained with them to "make" a dog. The first importations into England were from Belgium, apparently the home country of the best specimens in those days. There are clubs now for the breed in Brussels, and in England. In the latter country it has long been a vogue, and it is rather remarkable remembering this, that the Schipperke has not, ere this, secured a more assured place in the affections of the American fancier. True, the dog is not unknown here, or without practical advocacy, but the road for advance in this respect is wide open.

The following is the standard of points, and their relative value, as laid down by the Schipperke Club of England: Head, foxy in type, skull should not be round, but broad and with little stop; the muzzle should be moderate in length, fine but not weak, should be well filled out under the eyes. Nose, black and small. Eyes, dark brown, small, more oval than round, and not full; bright and full of expression. Ears of moderate length, not too broad at the base, tapering to a point, carried stiffly erect, and when in that position the inside edge to form as near as possible a right angle with the skull and strong enough not to be bent otherwise than lengthwise. Teeth, strong and level. Neck, strong and full, rather short, set broad on the shoulders and slightly arched. Shoulders muscular and sloping. Chest, broad and deep in brisket. Back, short, straight and strong. Loins powerful, well drawn-up from the brisket. Fore-legs perfectly straight, well under the body, with bone in proportion to the body. Hind-legs strong, muscular, hocks well let-down. Feet small, cat-like, and standing well on the toes. Nails black. Hindquarters fine com-

pared to the foreparts, muscular and well developed thighs, tailless, rump well rounded. Coat, black, abundant, dense and harsh, smooth on the head, ears and legs, lying close on the back and sides, a mane and frill, and well-feathered on back, but erect and thick round the neck, forming of thighs. Weight about twelve pounds. General appearance a small cobby animal with sharp expression, intensely lively, presenting the appearance of being always on the alert. Disqualifying points, drop or semi-erect ears. Faults, white hairs are objected to, but are not disqualifying. Value of points, head, nose, eyes, teeth, 20; ears, 10; neck, shoulders, chest, 10; back, loins, 5; forelegs, 5; hind-legs, 5; feet, 5; hindquarters, 10; coat and color, 20; general appearance, 10. Total, 100.

Respecting the tail the following addition was made: "Tail, if not naturally absent, may be docked, and a stump of two inches is not objected to, but 'carving, or gouging out' is not permissible, and shall disqualify."

At more recent shows in England colors other than black have made their appearance, and have been admired, such as fawn and red, but the prevailing color is black.

Among other things about the breed, the authority, Mr. G. R. Krehl, has written: "A lethargic air is detrimental, as the restless temperament of the Schipperke contributes greatly to the breed's 'character.' When in full coat the dog should be black entirely, but when it is changing the coat will sometimes present a rusty appearance. This brown tinge, which under the circumstances is natural, must not be confounded with the brindle color sometimes to be found on badly-bred specimens. When the self-colored black Schipperke is "off-color" there is a woolly look about the coat. The mane, and the thick breeching (culotte) are of the greatest importance; the first mentioned imparting a leonine aspect to the little Schipperkes. This mane is composed of long harsh hairs growing through an undercoat so abundant and dense as to support them from the thick neck—this gives the mane a full appearance. As the Belgian standard states, 'the mane should commence behind the ears,' and should finish a little below the shoulder points. The coat on the back and sides is often not so coarse in texture

as the mane, but it generally becomes a little harsher just over the hips and on the 'breeches' it is necessary to avoid the long coat all over the body of the Pomeranian and the wiry coat of the Welsh Terrier. An undershot jaw is an intolerable blemish. The back of the Schipperke is described as straight, but it should round off at the rump, which should be rotund and full, guinea-pig like. The continued straight line of a Terrier's back, is not desirable. The bone of a Terrier is only met with in coarse Schipperkes. Finally, he is not a prick-eared, black wire-haired Terrier."

As a pet and house-dog, the natty and vigilant Schipperke comes to you with gilt-edged recommendations. He wins his way to the affections of his owner at once. He is devoted without being "mushy" or deeming it necessary to be under your feet all the time. Also, he is as hardy as nails. And as a thing of beauty, you have but to see him to be satisfied on this point. — Field and Fancy.

TORONTO KENNEL CLUB.

The nomination meeting for officers for 1910, of the Toronto Kennel Club was held on Tuesday evening, Dec. 14, at headquarters, Wolseley Hall.

There being only one nomination for each one of the following offices, the nomination was equivalent to an election by acclamation: For president, Arthur Atkinson (re-elected); for first vice-president, T. H. Bonser, for second vice-president, E. T. Campbell; for secretary-treasurer, H. S. Tibbs (re-elected); for veterinary surgeon, Dr. J. A. Campbell.

For the executive the following seven were nominated: H. J. Hills, H. A. Wilson, J. Perkins, Fred Smith, W. E. Best, E. Sharpe and J. Forbes, six of whom are to be elected at the annual meeting, Dec. 28.

This meeting was held after the monthly show, which was the third competition for the Prince George Cup.

The first breed to be considered was smooth Fox Terriers. Mr. J. Perkins awarded the ribbons.

Mr. Walter Sands' Broadway Donor was announced as cup contender, having beaten Mr. Macdonald's Aldon Mystery in the adults, and the same gentleman's Aldon Magic, the winner of the puppies.

Mr. Macdonald made the awards in the wire hairs, placing Riverdale Leader, owned by Mr. Sharpe, over Ox-spring Squib, shown by Miss Maude Atkinson, in the puppies, and Mr. Swann's Star in the adult dogs.

The match in smooth puppies, the outcome of Mr. Perkins' challenge, issued last month, was that Sylph beat Starover, owned by Mr. John Kelley.

In Irish Terriers, there were only two entries, Quarrywood Major, owned by kennels of the same name, beating S. T. Sulton's Kellowen Peggy. Mr. Walter Sands officiating as judge.

Mr. Steve Gordon made a few interesting remarks on the points of a Manchester Terrier, which were much appreciated by the meeting. The only representative of the breed present was Dandy, owned by Mr. W. J. Weatherhead. This gentleman, not being a member of the club, his dog is not eligible to compete for the cup.

In Scottish Terriers, Mr. Sands placed J. Forbes' Lonach Haggis over L. Laddie, same owner, and in West Highlands, Mr. Forbes' Bobbs was the only representative. This, however, gives him two dogs in the cup competition. Dr. Boulton looked over the two winning bulldog puppies at the October meeting, and awarded the palm to Red Diamond, owned by H. A. Wilson, over George Kynock's Silver Queen, the latter being a Dudley.

The Airedale Terrier Club are holding one class at each of the Toronto Kennel Club's monthly shows. This being the first of the series, it was the open bitch class, Dr. J. A. Campbell officiating as judge. There were five entries. H. Clayton's Bonny Briar got first, winning Mr. Perkins' medal and the blue ribbon. Spruceness, owned by A. Orman, was second, and A. Greenwood's Bradford Nell third.
