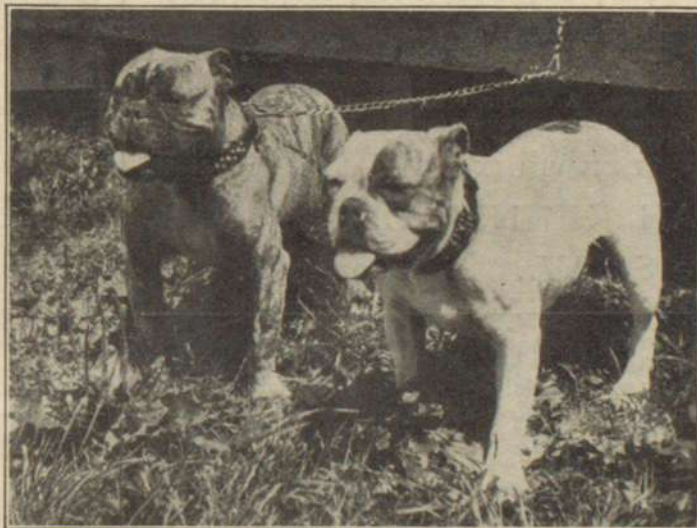

## NOTES AND COMMENTS

Squires: Mr. F. S. Young reports a litter of five Bulldogs from his Ruby Stone, the sire being Mr. Lee's well known Lee Bank Squire. As this is Mr. Young's first attempt at breeding, he is more than usually interested in the result.

Scotties in B.C.: We are glad to know from Mrs. Bradley-Dyne that her new Scottie Lindsay Laverock is stamping his get with his own high quality. His last year's youngsters are most promising. It is a matter for regret that the dog has not more opportunity than is afforded in his owner's small kennel. Sandown Brownie's litter of three Mrs. Bradley-Dyne kept in her own kennel and each one shows great possibilities. It is rather a curious fact that the bitches whelped by Brownie have always been on the small side, while no complaint of this kind is made of the dogs.

Whippeting: This sport seems to be gaining in Canada. The races recently reported in Gazette has given an impetus to the breed.

Mr. J. Hastings, of Toronto, has imported a brace of the right stuff.

The Winnipeg management, ever alive to novelty, has written Dr. Campbell to ascertain if a series of whippet races could be arranged for the proposed spring show.

H. G. Charlesworth dead: Another of the old time Spaniel breeders has gone from us in Horatio George Charlesworth, of Toronto. As a breeder of Cocker Spaniels we remember him as far back as twenty-five years ago. He from time to time was the owner of several good Cockers, including a black dog that he showed, but

not successfully, many years ago at Toronto. The winner in this case was an Obo dog, whose name we have forgotten at the moment, shown by Mr. P. G. Keyes, of the Rideau Kennels, Ottawa. We can close our eyes and see the two dogs now, both shown by experts, Mr. Charlesworth's dog a bit heavier than one wants them now, but with grand bone, substance and expression. Mr. Keyes' dog the better in body, with a beautiful dark eye, a bit long cast for present fancy, beautiful front and a substantial all round Cocker, built to go and stay. In those days the "Obo" blood was entirely fashionable. Seems to us as we recall things that more good men were breeders for the sport there was in it than now.

A local paper says: Mr. Charlesworth was taken ill at the New Year with an abdominal trouble, and was operated upon. He was apparently progressing toward recovery when a change for the worse occurred, the heart developing symptoms of weakness, which became more pronounced, until death intervened. Mr. Charlesworth was born in Port Hope in 1847. On reaching maturity he took up the occupation of a traveller for boots and shoes for John Garrett & Co., Hamilton, covering western Ontario. After engaging in manufacturing in a small way at Windsor, Mr. Charlesworth came to Toronto to become manager for John Holmes & Co., operating a system of retail shoe stores in western Ontario. The business, after passing through various hands, came under Mr. Charlesworth's control, the firm being known as Charlesworth & Co. In 1889 Mr. Charlesworth retired from manufacturing, and took up the breeding of fine roadster horses. He had all

his life taken a deep interest in fine live stock, being the first man to exhibit Jersey cattle at the Industrial Exhibition, and at the time of his death he was the owner of a stock farm at Port Hope, where he bred Jerseys.

Nugget was another good one he owned and also a buff that was a frequent winner. As the writer of these notes is away from home we are unable to enumerate others that we remember but whose names for the moment have escaped us.

Colne Kennels: Mr. and Mrs. Laurin were not long in replacing the Scottish Terrier Colne Aberlyde that unfortunately died soon after his arrival in Canada. He is being replaced by his full brother, Colne Aberalister, said to be a better Terrier than the one that died and described in show reports as a perfectly balanced, all-quality dog with a really wonderful head of great length, very small ears, beautifully placed, exceptionally dark eye, giving the keen Terrier expression so essential to a Scottie. Deep body, covered with a dense double coat, short tail, good front and nice bone. Weight 18 lbs., color, black brindle. He has won at most of the important shows in England, and is already sire of some good ones. If he is in shape he will be shown at Boston.

More Scotties: Mr. Wm. Morris, Toronto, well known for his adherence to the Fox Terrier cult, tells us that he too has got the Scottie craze, and has in his kennel a good brace bred by the Maulden Kennels, England. They are Maulden Model and Maulden Carrie, and we wish him luck with them.

Glen Rock Hylas: On the front cover of Gazette last month was depicted a Great Dane that from his photo looks like one of the right sort. Clean limbed and necked with an absence of coarseness that we see too little of in Canada. He stands on good pins and has an attractive, alert look all over. As a kennel mate for Glen Rock Hylas, the dog noted above, a bitch has been imported from Germany. Following are details:

I take pleasure in announcing the safe arrival in Glen Rock, Pa., at the kennels of Dr. J. Fletcher Lutz of a most beautiful harlequin Great Dane bitch, which Mr. W. E. Mann and myself have imported from Berlin, Ger-

many, for breeding and showing purposes in Winnipeg and the Northwest, as we intend to start a good kennel of these beautiful dogs in the West. With Glen Rock Hylas and the beautiful harlequin bitch just imported we will have the very best blood obtainable, and therefore hope to soon produce some fliers. We are having the bitch held at Glen Rock until the New York show comes off, as we have entered her there in the open classes under the name of Minerva Rost, and expect to carry off the honors in her class.

The stud dog Glen Rock Hylas, whose photo you used, has as yet never been beaten. We expect to advertise him at stud in your columns in the near future, as he is truly a wonderfully fine specimen, and we feel that breeders of this strain should have a chance to use him.

## Executive Meeting Cocker Spaniel Club of Canada.

The Executive meeting of the Cocker Spaniel Club of Canada was held at Queen's Hotel, Toronto, 7.30 p.m., January 24th, 1910.

Present:—Messrs. Tomlinson (in chair), Tibbs, Dymont, Herd and Lewis.

Minutes of last meeting read and adopted.

Financial: Secretary exhibited books and vouchers, which were audited and found correct. Balance sheet included in Secretary-Treasurer's report.

Unpaid members.—Moved by Mr. Dymont, seconded by Mr. Tibbs, that all members whose fees for 1909 had not been paid, be scored off the books. Carried.

Specials.—Secretary reported that the John G. Kent cup and medal for the best A. O. C. Cocker bitch, had been awarded by the Canadian National Exhibition to Messrs. Sutherland & McMahon on the assumption that they were members of the club, but as neither of these gentlemen were members, on motion of Messrs. Tibbs and Dymont, the win on the cup was declared void and the Secretary was instructed to write the Exhibition Association to reclaim the medal.

New members.—Secretary cast one ballot for the following new members: Messrs. B. Bird, J. W. Stockdale, T. Geddes and A. S. Anderson.

### ANNUAL MEETING.

Minutes.—Moved by Mr. Tibbs, seconded by Mr. Lewis, that minutes of last annual meeting be taken as read. Carried.

Secretary-Treasurer's report.—Secretary-Treasurer read following report, which was adopted on motion of Messrs. Tibbs and Herd.

### COCKER SPANIEL CLUB OF CANADA.

Secretary-Treasurer's report at annual meeting, January 24th, 1910.

I am very pleased to report that the inaugural year of the Club has been very successful and encouraging. To the end of our fiscal year, that is, to December 31st, 1909, we have received 46 paid members, since which few additional names have been added for 1910.

The Executive Committee have met four times, each meeting being well attended. The minutes of these meetings have been published from time to time in the Canadian Kennel Gazette, and are on record in the Secretary's book. The chief duties of this committee have been in purchasing, soliciting and allocating cups, medals and other special prizes, and their efforts along these lines, I think, have met with general satisfaction.

At present there are on competition at the Canadian National Exhibition six silver cups and in addition to these we have, since the last show, received another cup from Dr. Ford. We also donated one dozen bronze medals this year, four to Ottawa, four to London, and four to the Canadian National Exhibition. The Club now own a die for the reverse side of this medal and can have medals made up in the Old Country at a minimum cost and on very short notice. Mr. G. W. Dunn has offered a shield for competition, and we have also been promised a cup by Mr. J. J. Ward, of Toronto.

During the year Mr. F. R. Elliott, Provincial Vice-President for Manitoba, asked to be relieved of office, and the Executive substituted in his place Mr. H. R. Moore, of Hartley, Man., who has always displayed a keen interest in the affairs of the Club.

Several other Specialty Clubs have held "one-day shows" which have proved successful, and with proper organization this Club should be able to follow their example. This matter is worthy of your discussion at this meeting.

## RABIES IN ONTARIO.

There seems to be no doubt of the existence in parts of the province of this dread terror, but there is no need to be alarmed. The outbreak, as is usual in such cases, has no doubt been greatly magnified. Every unfortunate dog that shows temper or suffers physically is now said to have rabies, and the Pasteur Institute, New York, is kept busy looking after Canadian patients said to have been bitten by rabid dogs. The Dominion Government has taken the matter in hand, and from this date, Feb. 15th, the most drastic measures will be enforced. Metal muzzles must be worn on the dogs kept tied in safe places. Opposition will not avail, and in our opinion greatly as we dislike the ruling, dog owners will be wise in helping the Government in either stamping out rabies, if it does exist, or in proving in time that it never did prevail.

In connection with a somewhat similar but milder outbreak some years ago, we asked that well known physician and dog owner, Dr. J. S. Niven, of London, for a candid opinion. At that time he simply laughed at the idea, and the results proved him to be correct. He is now on the other side, and we think justly so. We have asked well known veterinarians for their opinions as to the outbreak, and if we get them in time they also will appear in this issue.

### DR. J. S. NIVEN'S OPINION ON RABIES IN ONTARIO.

Dr. Niven's letter is as follows:—

In reply to your letter re rabies, I am very much afraid we are in for a great deal of trouble, as it is so widespread, not confined to any one locality. It is not just a "mad dog scare" as in nearly every instance the dogs and animals that have been killed have been sent (the heads at least) to the Pathological Laboratory at Ottawa, and found to react.

In the forty years I have been in Canada this is the worst outbreak of rabies, and to stamp it out I think the Government must take the only stand they can, enforce the muzzling order of all dogs at large on streets or farms, all other dogs to be kept in confinement. How long this order is to be enforced is rather a puzzle, but

I think at the very least six months, as it is established that the infection may be from four or five months before its incubating stage is over. I know of a case where the disease did not declare itself for two years. In England the muzzling order was kept up for five or six years, if not more, before it was taken off, and even now dogs from foreign countries are kept in quarantine for three months. This will be a very serious thing for exhibitors going and coming from the United States, as I have no doubt that the department at Washington will take it up and quarantine all dogs exported from Canada.

I should advise you to advocate the muzzle order. It is the only thing that will stamp it out and give the people confidence. You might also advise that all stray dogs be destroyed by the police or other recognized authority. As to the muzzle it is very important that it should be both effective and humane, the ordinary leather one to be of use is too severe, and if not severe, it is useless. Some of the wire muzzles are good, but are apt to abrade the skin unless lined with leather. If you could get a really trustworthy line of muzzles I think you would render a great service to dog owners.

You should get a line from Dr. Rutherford at Ottawa. He will have charge of the rabies question.

### NUMBER OF CASES FROM ONTARIO.

The number of cases of rabies from Ontario sent to the Pasteur Institute in 1906 was one; in 1907, none; in 1908, six; in 1909, twenty-two; since the beginning of the year, fifteen. The cases taking treatment are, three from Tilbury, two from Strathroy, two from Atwood, and one from Grimsby. All cases have been cured, and those there now are on the way to recovery.

Dr. George G. Rambaud, director of the Institute, says regarding ordering all dogs muzzled that it is the safest, easiest and cheapest plan to eradicate an outbreak of rabies. A dog bitten by one with rabies should be quaran-

tined for at least five months, as 99 per cent. will develop rabies in three months, and one per cent. in five or six months.

### TORONTO CHIEF OF POLICE.

"I think it is the very way to make them mad," said Chief of Police Grasett, when asked what he thought of the order that dogs should be muzzled.

"We have received no word to see that the dogs are muzzled so far, and I hope that we don't. If people who have dogs can't look after them and keep them under control, and on their own premises, then they should not be allowed to have them.

"I haven't read anything about it, nor have we received any orders."

Since this was written orders have been received from Ottawa.

### MUST MUZZLE THE DOGS.

The joint campaign of the Federal and Provincial Governments with a view to stamping out the dread epidemic of rabies with which the western part of Ontario is overrun officially opened yesterday. Copies of the Dominion and Ontario orders-in-Council, which are precisely similar in text, are being distributed and made public. These orders cover twenty-three counties, and direct that all dogs must be chained up or muzzled until the orders are countermanded. The penalty for dog owners who fail to obey is a fine not exceeding \$200 under the Dominion Act, and \$20 under the Provincial statute. The destruction of the dog is also involved.

### THE OPINION OF TORONTO'S MEDICAL HEALTH OFFICER.

"In all my experience I have never known a human being to suffer from a case of hydrophobia, nor have I heard of one," said Dr. Sheard, the city medical health officer, in discussing the Order-in-Council of the Dominion Government ordering the muzzling of all dogs in Western Ontario.

"Of course hydrophobia in a human being is a very serious disease," continued Dr. Sheard. "It is invariably fatal, and it causes a peculiarly agonizing death, but cases of veritable hydrophobia are very, very rare, so rare, in fact, that, as I have said, I have never known of one.



## Effect of Fear.

"In most cases of suffering from dog bites the patient is excited by the fear of rabies, and goes to New York for the Pasteur treatment. In fact the majority of cases where dogs are thought to be mad are simply the result of excitement on the dog's part. There are few cases of real hydrophobia even amongst animals."

"Would you go so far as to say that it is impossible for a human being to contract hydrophobia?"

"Certainly not. I would not do that, because there have been cases known, although I have never known of one myself."

"Of course, I think," added Dr. Sheard, "that there are altogether too many dogs allowed to run at large without any control, especially in cities. We have too many in Toronto."

## Hard to Enforce.

"It is going to be very difficult to enforce the new order. It does not affect us in the Provincial Health Department. I suppose the Provincial Secretary's Department will aid the Dominion officials in enforcing it, but it is going to be very difficult to inspect all the dogs in Western Ontario and see that they are muzzled. And it is going to be very hard on the farmers, whose dogs are useful; consequently it is going to be very difficult to enforce the order."

## DR. CAMPBELL'S OPINION.

We called on Dr. J. A. Campbell, V. S., Veterinary Surgeon for the Ontario Kennel Club, and asked for his opinion on the question of rabies. Below the Doctor kindly gives us a most complete treatise of the disease, and much valuable information can be obtained from his article, more so as it is the opinion of an expert who is himself a dog fancier:

"This being the first occasion that the question for the prevention of rabies has been brought so prominently to the public notice, and owing to the extreme agitation in the public mind concerning this subject I consider this a most opportune moment for bringing the question of rabies before the this society for discussion."

"I shall endeavor to epitomize a few of the widely scattered facts concerning the disease."

"Rabies, coming from the Latin 'rabere,' to rave, is all that the name

indicates. It is a disease of the dog and his species, communicable to man and domesticated animals, the infection transmitted by inoculation only and under no circumstances does it develop spontaneously. The virus, whatever it may be, is located in saliva and the nerve centres of the body. It is found that in man the period of development extends from three weeks to three months, but it is impossible to lay down any hard and fast rule because the period may be shorter or prolonged over one year. This point is most mysterious to the layman's mind, but it is simply due to the fact that the portal of entry may be located at variable distances from the nervous centres from which it may be carried in very infinitesimal portions. It has been observed by scientists that bites in the region of the head, and those with marked lacerations, usually produce a rapid development of the disease. It is known that the disease takes two forms, dumb rabies and furious rabies. Dumb rabies is that in which paralysis is the early symptom, whilst the furious type is a form in which a very pronounced excitement prevails.

"From the outset the symptoms of the disease are shyness, sullenness and an inclination to seek dark and secluded places, the eyes present a wild vacant staring expression, as the disease progresses the restlessness in the eyes becomes marked. Imaginary objects are pursued, snapped at and worried, and at times, as if recognizing his hallucination, the animal slinks in a quiet corner. The animal may wander about aimlessly with staggering gait, with marked inclination to bite, snapping the jaws with such force as at times to break the teeth, and the voice changing to a dismal barking howl. Following these symptoms as the intensity of the disease progresses, the third or last stage, in which paralysis sets in, is seen, the lower jaw paralyzed and dropping, the tongue protruding and cyanosed, the eyes oscillating and hind quarters dragging, great emaciation and exhaustion very apparent. At this stage the animal usually sinks into a coma or is carried off in a violent convulsion."

"The existence of the disease rabies is scoffed at by many, and is looked upon as a myth and superstition, but I

may truthfully and emphatically state that rabies is a recognized disease process and is just as truly a specific disease as is smallpox or scarlet fever, or any disease process that is set up by virus. It is true that the virus or organism that is the causative factor in rabies has never been isolated, and also that it as yet has been impossible to cultivate on any known laboratory media, and it is just possible that it is an ultra micropic, micro-organism, just as is the case in foot and mouth disease."

"That rabies is an infectious and transmissible disease has been scientifically proven beyond a doubt by inoculating rabbits subdurally with an emulsion of the brain of an infected animal, and further by inoculating a second series of rabbits with emulsions prepared from the brain of the rabbit first inoculated."

"In making a diagnosis of rabies in a dog, it is preferable to preserve the animal in order that the development of the disease may be observed, but in case the dog has been killed it is possible to make a diagnosis, if the brain has not decomposed, by the inoculating process, or by means of the Negri-bodies. These are small round or oval structures found in the nerve cells, located chiefly in the cells of Hippocampus Major, and can be demonstrated by proper staining methods. This procedure is universally adopted by state authorities."

"Now the question arises when and when not is a dog suffering from a true case of rabies. No doubt everyone has seen a dog suffer from hysterical convulsions which appears to the average layman to be raving mad."

"It has been my experience to attend a number of dogs which have presented typical text book cases of rabies. I might cite two cases in point, one a Fox Terrier that I was called to see. On arriving at the house I was informed that the dog had been acting in a peculiar manner for two days, and suddenly seemed to lose all control of itself. I found the animal in the cellar in a highly excited state, oscillating eyes, frothy muzzle, snapping and biting and giving vent to a characteristic howl-like bark. Here was apparently a typical text-book case of rabies. The dog rushed aimlessly about, colliding finally with the clothes horse,



of which it seized the leg. I took the opportunity to grasp the animal by the neck and carry it to the laundry tub, allowing the cold water to run over its head. During this period the animal was furious, snapping the tap and sides of the tub. I was almost convinced that it was a case of true rabies and decided to take the dog to my hospital, so that I could watch the development of the disease. On arriving at my office I administered a dose of chloral hydrate, and placed the animal in an isolated cage. It was very much exhausted and crawled into a corner and collapsed, remaining in the same position up till ten p.m. No new symptom appearing I left for home. On the following morning I found the dog apparently normal except for a slight condition of exhaustion. On being offered food the animal ate greedily, and from then on steadily improved. I had the case under my observation for a week, and sent it home in a normal condition. Here was a case in which the condition was brought about by teething.

The second case I might mention is that of a Bulldog which was suffering from what appeared to be a case of dumb rabies, the lower jaw paralyzed and drooped, the tongue protruding and cyanosed, eyes staring and oscillating, marked paralysis in the hind quarters and great emaciation. On careful examination the case proved to be one of Gangrenous Stomatitis.

These cases simply go to show that one must not be too hasty in rushing blindly to a diagnosis, but must view such cases from a sane and scientific standpoint, and I may truly state that many of the above conditions require the keenest observation. Now we must admit the actual existence of the disease rabies, but it is not common, and in a large percentage of cases said to be rabies it has been found that the diagnosis is at fault, the condition is simply one of cerebral or spinal irritation, brought about by gastric disturbances, example, due to poison, teething, intestinal absorption of toxic products or retained faeces, or extreme irritation brought about by intestinal worms.

The condition may also be brought about by a rapid rise of blood pressure, producing hysteria. It is noted that dogs that are kept in confinement and are suddenly given their freedom, are especially liable to hysterical fits,

due to the exhilaration of fresh air and sunshine bringing about a corresponding rise of blood pressure. This condition of hysteria is often seen between the ages of five months and one year, and also in certain breeds of dogs, and I repeat that it is exceedingly difficult to differentiate between furious rabies and hysteria or dumb rabies, and Gangrenous Stomatitis, the surest method is to secure the animal so that developments may be observed.

I may further state that one cannot be too careful in making examination of any case in which the examiner has the slightest reason to suspect the presence of rabies, as exposure to being bitten or in any way inoculated is highly fraught with danger.

Regarding muzzling and quarantine as a means of stamping out an epidemic, England has set an example by the enactment of stringent muzzling and quarantine regulations that have been rigidly in force for given periods until the disease has become practically unknown. This example has been, and still is being followed by most countries where rabies has been or is prevalent with equal success.

#### NOTES FOR NOVICES.

By "Medicus," in Our Dogs.

The giving of nauseous medicines to dogs often results in more harm than good, if the patient is of a nervous temperament and has to be put under restraint, or perhaps has to be forced to take the medicine after a more or less Titanic struggle between himself and his owner. Now, above all things, we should avoid a struggle with a dog that needs a dose of physic; and as there are ways in which the most nauseous medicines can now be given in a form that is practically tasteless, a little manoeuvring will generally result in the end being attained without any trouble and without the dog being made worse as a result of struggling. I need not dwell upon the well known "capsule" method; that is applicable to most medicines now. But suppose, as is sometimes the case, a liquid drench needs to be given, the best way is to use an ordinary glass syringe, with a piece

of ordinary feeding-bottle tubing attached to the nozzle. The tubing can be slipped well over the back of the tongue, and then the dog will not taste the physic.

Never attempt to give medicine to a dog by forcing his jaws open and then pouring it down: struggling and choking will result to a certainty. On the contrary, close the jaws, and by pulling back the lower lip, form a pouch or funnel; into this the medicine can be poured, and the dog must inevitably swallow it. Of course it is better to avoid liquid medicines altogether if possible; and it rarely happens that this form cannot be dispensed with. As an example of how easy it is (not to say advantageous from every standpoint, including the medical) to avoid the necessity of giving liquids, I might instance the case of a purging draught. If I want to give one of my dogs a dose of Epsom salts, what I do is this: I pop two or three capsules of the dried salts down his throat before he breakfasts (in the morning), and a few minutes later he has some warm broth. The effect is marvellous! He knows nothing of the medicine—for dogs will swallow capsules without any trouble; and then the warm broth forms a drench and acts at once. How infinitely better that is than dissolving the salts in water and trying to pour it down!

It is the same with powders. The way to give a powder to a dog is to sew it up in a piece of meat—preferably tripe. First throw a piece or two of the "genuine article" to the dog, and he will bolt these. Then follow with the piece containing the powder, and down that will go in the same way. I have only known of one case in which a catastrophe happened on these lines. The "package" caught one of the dog's fangs and was torn open, the powder being discharged full into his open mouth! I do not think that he ever forgot it! It was a black Retriever, of great intelligence; and I shall always remember the look he gave me. Sometimes dogs become addicted to the habit of vomiting medicine soon after they have taken it. The only way to get over this nuisance is to tie the animal's head up for an hour or so, so that he cannot give way to his feelings. Some medicines, such as santonine, male-fern oil, and podophyllin, make dogs feel bilious.

Warts on the lips are a troublesome disfigurement, and their removal can often only properly be effected by a veterinary surgeon. It has been said that the application of sodium bicarbonate will do good, but it would surely need weeks and weeks of such treatment to make any impression. There are really only two satisfactory methods of treatment; one is to have them cut out surgically, and the other to dress them daily with nitric acid. The latter treatment must be carried out carefully; a camel's hair pencil should be dipped in the acid, and the warts should then be slightly painted

with this, the dog's mouth being kept tightly closed in order to prevent the tongue from licking the places until the acid has dried in. There is no pain whatever connected with this treatment, as anybody who has a wart on his own finger can prove for himself. The dressing should be repeated at intervals of about two days for three or four times, and then the wart will be found to have "rotted," and can be carefully picked away, care being taken not to do it roughly so as to leave a sore place.

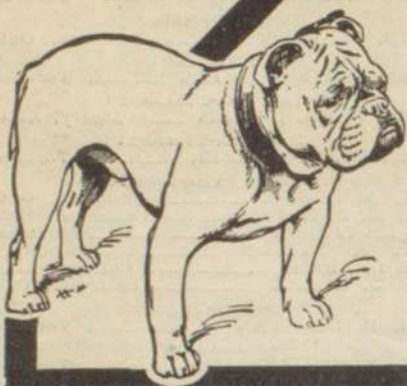
