Our own experience in the mating of animals of several kinds, including dogs, is that the best colored blacks come from a bright sound black on one side and a pure clean white, a brown or chocolate on the other. The mating of two blacks of pure, sound color, color with a lustre, frequently results in progeny of a rusty or dull shade.

There was a fighting strain in Geo. Bell. If he had been born an Irishman he would have naturally been "agin the government." While we could not always endorse his methods and did not do so, at no time can we remember anything but kindness at his hands, personally, and we are glad to be able to say this. He had an all-round knowledge of dogs, from Toys to St. Bernards, that was unexcelled in any one individual we know, and while he was best known as being identified with Fox Terriers and Cockers we have personal knowledge that high quality winning Pugs, St. Bernards and other breeds passed were bred by him. The following has been handed us:

Geo. Bell died suddenly of heart failure at his home, 60 Beech Avenue, Saturday night. He was 61 years of age, and was born in Wigan, Lancashire, England. He leaves a widow, two sons and two daughters. Mr. Bell was a well known dog fancier, and a Cocker Spaniel judge in both Canada and the United States, having owned some of the best bred Cocker Spaniels in America, also some very good Fox Terriers, among them being the famous champion Dusky Trap, of Crystal Palace, London, Eng. Another well known dog owned by Mr. Bell was champion Fascination, a black Cocker Spaniel. Mr. Bell's reputation as a good all-round judge was well known by every dog fancier from the Atlantic to the Pacific coast.

Victoria show: Mr. Geo. Tinto, of Seattle, Wash., is one of the judges appointed to officiate at the Victoria B.C. show. Mr. Tinto is independent, and will please himself.

Mr. Jack Wallis has sold the winning Irish Terrier Western Arbitrator, C. 10912, to Mr. C. Bennett-Thompson, of Victoria, in whose name the dog will in future be shown.

Boston Terrier Show: Another specialty show is that of the Boston Terrier Club of Montreal that will be held in Stanley Hall, Montreal, on April 22nd and 23rd.

The show will be under C. K. C. rules, and Mr. Chas. M. Mower, of Burlington, Vt., will officiate as judge. Mr. F. R. Phelan, Hon. Sec'y-Treas., Montreal, will be glad to look after the needs of intending exhibitors.

A Collie for Saskatchewan: Mr. Geo. Robertson, Ottawa, has sent a good Collie "out west" that we hope will do his new owner good. Mr. Robertson writes:

I shipped that good young Collie Hazelbrae Francie, to Mr. A. G. Dunnett, of Stoughton, Sask. Francie was sired by Champion Balmoral Baron and out of the well known bitch Hazelbrae Morna. He is improving steadily, and if Mr. Dunnett cares to show him will be heard of on the bench. Mr. Dunnett got him for stud purposes and he certainly made no mistake. I only mated him twice, once to his grand-aunt, Hazelbrae Girlie, who had eleven puppies, and once to his mother, Hazelbrae Morna, who had twelve puppies (ten dogs). Both litters were fine strong puppies, even in size, very promising, and if all goes well will be heard of at Toronto next fall. I had a rather peculiar experience in shipping Francie. I shipped him in a strong crate. He had a collar with leash attached, which was fastened to top of box. He was over six weeks en route. It was claimed by the express company that he had chewed his way out of the box and escaped, but when he arrived at his destination there was not a tooth mark on the crate, and he arrived minus his collar and leash.

An appreciation of Dr. Campbell's, V.S., article: The expert who conducts the dog column in the Toronto Telegram evidently appreciates the exhaustive article that appeared in February Canadian Kennel Gazette by Dr. Campbell, the well known veterinarian. He writes:

The Canadian Kennel Gazette has in its February issue an admirable article on the subject (Rabies), written by J. A. Campbell, V.S., of Toronto. The question is dealt with in a scientific and at the same time very lucid way, and is more illuminating than all the combined literature on the subject that has appeared in the daily press.

This article proves conclusively that the diagnosis of true rabies is very difficult, and that there are a number of ailments to which dogs are subject that may produce all the symptoms of rabies, but yet constitute what Dr. Campbell calls merely "text-book rabies." It is highly probable that some epidemic has been prevalent of late in Western Ontario, producing symptoms of rabies, but that very few cases have been other than the "text-book" variety.

Cocker notes: Mr. Chas. H. Mason and Mr. W. T. Payne were in Toronto for a couple of days after the Buffalo show in quest of Cockers and Cocker men.

Mr. Bleistein's kennel disbanding: It is rumored that Mr. Geo. Bleistein, who has gathered together the finest lot of Pointers and Setters in the world, will shortly give up his kennel. Mr. Bleistein finds that relying purely on what he buys rather than on what he breeds is not to his fancy.

Alberta Show: The Alberta Kennel Club have claimed dates for their next show to be held in Calgary, July 4th, 5th and 6th. C. K. C. rules will, of course, govern.

Rabies in Ontario: Elsewhere in this issue we report on anti-muzzling meeting held in Toronto. The Board of Control has since agreed to send a recommendation on to the City Council, but without comment or approval. The

petition asks for the removal of the muzzling order in so far as the city of Toronto is concerned. The city may or may not send forward the appeal to Ottawa, that body has no power in itself to recall the order.

Everyone now scratched by a dog seems ready to take the Pasteur treatment. As a precautionary method it may be right, but there is a good deal of nonsense and hysteria about the whole matter.

That there has been one death in Hamilton from rabies under most deplorable and distressing circumstances cannot be denied. Even "Kit," (Mrs. Coleman), good dog lover as she is, in her department of the Mail and Empire takes a cautious and conservative stand. We commend other women to "Kit's" opinion, which is as follows:

"Even in view of the deplorable death of the Dundas boy, John Taylor, presumably of hydrophobia, we should not permit panic or unreasonable fear to take hold of us while this mad dog scare lasts. It is regrettable that certain harrowing details of this boy's death were sensationally reported in the press, since one has every reason to believe such details were neither given out nor authorized by the Hamilton City Hospital authorities. The story as related in exaggerated form in some newspapers serves but to terrify timid women, and render the very sight of a dog detestable in the eyes of some people.

"We are all obeying the law and muzzling our dogs. Would anyone who prized the comradeship of a good dog leave him liable to capture and death? We are so excited over this question of rabies—of which so little is known—that there is not much clear judgment on the matter. That the poor small boy died so grievously is deplorable, but the autopsy proved nothing, and we can very well afford to muzzle our judgment until the verdict is delivered by the provincial analyst. Meantime, it is criminal in any one of us to let our dogs go unmuzzled. Human life must be protected, but human folly, apparently, has free fling."

We understand that the case quoted has since been definitely confirmed as one of rabies.

We advise patience and coolness. The scare will die a natural death if only

given time, and in the meantime rabies in its present stage of incubation will be entirely stamped out.

MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL MEETING OF THE SCOTTISH TERRIER CLUB OF AMERICA.

Held at the Hotel Albermarle, New York City, Feb. 13th, 1910.

The meeting was called to order by Miss Fanny Brooks, President. The following members were present: Miss Fanny Brooks, Miss Margaret Brigham, Mrs. Whitem and Mrs. Posfay, Messrs. Lloyd, Price, Sedgwick, Humphreys, Lauder and Fleitmann.

The Secretary's report showed a gratifying increase in membership, and that the Club Specials were offered at forty-nine shows during the year, the annual trophies being awarded as follows:—

The 1909 Open Trophy to the Walescott Kennels, "Walescott Invader."

The 1909 American or Canadian Bred Trophy to Miss Baylis' Strathspey Sawnie.

Miss Brook's Trophy to Miss Brigham's Grafton Kennels with six wins.

The Treasurer's report showed a balance of about \$650.00, being more than a hundred dollars increase over last year. A detailed report of the club finances was read.

Mrs. Whitem and Mr. Price were thereupon appointed tellers of election and upon canvass of the votes, reported as result of such election that the following were elected officers for the ensuing year:—President, Mr. Francis G. Lloyd; Vice-President, Mr. James L. Little; Secretary, Mr. Henry T. Fleitmann; Treasurer, Mr. R. D. Humphreys; Delegate to A. K. C., Mr. Robert Sedgwick.

It was further voted, upon motion duly seconded, that the offices of Secretary and Treasurer be combined, and the office of Governor-at-Large created, and further that wherever either the words Secretary or Treasurer appear in the by-laws, the words Secretary and Treasurer are to be substituted.

Mr. Humphreys thereupon resigned the position of Treasurer, and Mr. Fleitmann was authorized to accept both offices of Secretary and Treasurer by the Board of Governors. Miss Fanny Brooks was unanimously elect-

ed Governor-at-Large, and a vote of thanks was passed thanking her for her great interest in the club during her term of presidency.

It was then decided that the club was to offer the following trophies, to be open to members of the club only, awarded only where two or more members compete, to be competed for at every show during 1910 and continued yearly:

The 1910 Open Trophy, with medal to commemorate each win.

The 1910 American or Canadian bred Trophy.

A trophy value of \$25.00 for the best coated American or Canadian bred dog or bitch, according to standard to be decided upon later.

A trophy value of \$25.00 for the best dog or bitch bred by the exhibitor.

The following trophies to be competed for under the regular S. T. C. rules were accepted by the club with thanks.

The President's Cup, presented by Mr. F. G. Lloyd for the best American or Canadian bred brace, to be competed for at every show from Buffalo, 1910, up to and including the Westminster Kennel Club Show, 1911. To go to the exhibitor scoring the most wins.

The Tighnabruaich Trophy, presented by Mr. George Lauder, jr., for the best dog under 18 months old, bred by the exhibitor, to be competed for at every show from Buffalo, 1910, up to and including the Westminster Kennel Club Show, 1911. To go to the exhibitor scoring the most wins.

The Stony Grove Trophy, presented by Mr. Henry T. Fleitmann, for the best bitch under the same conditions as the Tighnabruaich Trophy.

The Tickle 'Em Jock Trophy, presented by Mr. Andrew Albright, jr., for the best dog or bitch to be competed for at Buffalo K. C., 1910, Duquesne K. C., 1910, Ladies' Kennel Club of America, 1910, Westminster Kennel Club, 1911, and New England Kennel Club, 1911. To go to the exhibitor scoring the most wins.

Mr. Henry T. Fleitmann offers a statuette of Champion Revival for the best bitch not over the standard weight of 18 pounds, to be competed for at every show from Buffalo, 1910, up to and including the Westminster Kennel Club show, 1911. To go to

the exhibitor scoring the most wins. Donor not to compete.

Under new business, the project of holding a Specialty Club Show at North Grafton, Mass., together with some of the other Terrier clubs, was discussed. As there was some difference of opinion in regard to the advisability of the location and date suggested, the following committees

were appointed by the President to look into the matter and report to him:

To represent Boston: Miss Brooks and Miss Brigham; Philadelphia, Mr. Price; and New York, Mr. Sedgwick and Mr. Fleitmann.

PUBLIC MEETING IN TORONTO.

Free Discussion of Muzzling By-Law by the Citizens.

In response to Mayor Geary's proclamation calling a public meeting of the citizens of Toronto to discuss the dog muzzling mandate issued by the Dominion Government, and made a city by-law, St. Andrew's Hall saw one of the best attended and stormiest meetings in its history. It is hardly fair to say that the meeting represented public opinion on the question, for it was practically altogether composed of dog fanciers diametrically opposed to the recent legislation. The "pro-muzzlers" were certainly in the minority, and the only speaker who upheld the action of the Government—Dr. Mole—was hooted and hissed so much that the chairman threatened to leave the chair unless order was at once restored.

Controller Church, who opened the meeting, in the Mayor's absence, was of the opinion that the interference of the Dominion Government in this case, as in a great many other instances, was quite uncalled for. Although he was very much in favor of restrictive legislation, he considered the city quite competent to cope with the matter. Moreover, the muzzling by-law had not been generally enforced throughout the country. As the Controller had to leave early, the meeting was then placed in the hands of Mr. Frank Slattery, whose proposal to elect Rev. Mr. Harris chairman met with unanimous approval. Mr. Harris remarked that the object of the meeting was not to discuss the much mooted question of rabies, whether it did or did not exist, and asked the speakers to confine their remarks to the muzzling by-law. He referred to the dogs as "man's best friend," and so far as he was concerned, considered the by-law quite unnecessary.

Mr. Slattery then moved his resolution asking the city to rescind the by-law compelling the muzzling of all dogs, and suggesting that the wagon now used in the summer months be kept out all the year round, and that present regulations respecting the keeping of dogs under control be more rigidly observed. "We are assembled here to protect the dog that protects us," said Mr. Slattery, in his strong plea against muzzling from a humane standpoint. He considered that the rabies scare had been greatly magnified, and had been given far too much prominence in the press.

The motion found a ready seconder in Mr. John Miles, who contended that there would be three times as many burglaries if the muzzling by-law was enforced. Mr. Sabine ostracized the by-law as "a superfluity of stupidity." The muzzle not only spoils the physiognomy of the dog, but makes him vicious. Mr. Vennell spoke from seventy years' experience. Muzzling was not only cruel, but also robbed the dog of his natural instinct and ability to protect property, in his opinion. Dr. McPherson would protect the good dogs by doing away with curs and enforcing present restrictions. Mr. Wilkinson saw no necessity for indiscriminate muzzling. From press reports he noticed that a great many people had been bitten by muzzled dogs. His idea was to encourage the breeding of good dogs by making every dog wear a collar bearing his registration number.

Dr. Mole was the only speaker in favor of muzzling. He had seen rabies in all its stages, and as it is a fatal disease and increases so rapidly, he thought drastic measures absolutely necessary to stamp it out. Muzzling

had proved most effective in England. Dr. Campbell did not think the muzzling by-law justifiable. Such legislation might be required in the country, but in the city it was quite unnecessary. Nearly all the cases of so-called rabies which had come under his treatment were ordinary dog affections, mostly caused by teething or bones in the throat.

The resolution was almost unanimously carried, but the deputation which presented it to the Mayor and Council a few days later were unsuccessful in their efforts to have the by-law rescinded.
