NOTES AND COMMENTS

Winnipeg Show: The very neat schedule of the Winnipeg Show, captained by Dr. A. W. Bell, is now doubtless in the hands of most exhibitors. The dates, as announced several times, are July 19, 20, 21 and 22. The dog show Committee consists of the following gentlemen: Chairman, Mr. H. G. Spurgeon; Mr. Geo. F. Galt, Mr. F. W. Scott, Ald. W. R. Milton, Mr. C. W. Graham, Mr. F. T. Miller, Mr. J. H. Holman; Treasurer, W. H. Evanson; Manager and Secretary, A. W. Bell; Veterinary Surgeons, Dr. M. Rombough and Dr. H. D. Smith. Mr. James Mortimer, Hempstead, L.I., will judge all classes. Entries close on Thursday, July 7th, the entry fee being one dollar for each entry. The special prizes are numerous and valuable, including cups, medals, etc., and the classification is quite liberal for such a low entry fee, \$5 for 1st, \$3 for 2nd, and a V.H.C. card for 3rd. A record entry is looked for. The rabies embargo does not trouble Winnipeg. The management is congenial and up to date, and the show deserves support. Previous shows have been pleasant, well run, and metropolitan in character. We hope that Winnipeg may beat its own record.

Mr. Ross not going: By the way, Mr. Robt. Ross, who last year took out a large consignment of dogs from Ontario and Quebec is not this year in a position to repeat the trip, as the following letter will show. We hope someone else will be able to take Mr. Ross' place:

I have received letters from members of the fancy saying they hear I'm going to make the Winnipeg trip again this year and intimating I may have their dogs to show and handle. I

wish you would do me the favor to announce through the columns of your valuable paper that much as I would like to make the trip, circumstances won't permit. Fact is, I can't afford to throw up my situation, and I am afraid I would have to do so in order to get away for so long a time. I have not promised anyone to go, so cannot understand how this rumor got around. I must, however, in closing, thank all my good friends for the confidence they seem to place in me. Monthly meetings at Calgary: Mr. H. P. D. Walker, of Calgary, tells us that they manage to keep things doggy moving along pretty well up in Alberta. They have monthly meetings and at these meetings are offered cups to be competed for by the members owning novice dogs. At each meeting one breed is taken up. For instance Cocker Spaniels were on the agenda for April 20th. At this meeting, by the way, Mr. Walker was requested to make the awards. Regina, Sask., has also formed a kennel club, and Mr. E. D. Adams and Mr. Walker have sent them all Canadian Kennel Club literature at their disposal, and have done all in their power to have them affiliate with the Canadian Kennel Club. This office has also been in correspondence with the Secretary, and we hope that Mr. Walker with our combined efforts may be successful.

Dr. T. Wesley Mills leaving Canada: On the eve of his departure for England the noted scientist and professor at McGill University, Montreal, Dr. T. Wesley Mills, wrote us that he was sailing on June 9th on the Virginian, to take up his residence in England (London). After twenty-five years connection with the noted McGill University, it must have been a severe wrench to Dr. Wesley Mills to have severed the connection, bound round as it was with so many ties of friendship and good will. But there are some things that he hopes to be able to accomplish that he feels satisfied can best be managed in the old land. The part that pains us most is contained in the following:—"I am a Canadian born

and remain a Canadian in heart, notwithstanding change of residence. I must resign from the Canadian Kennel Club after a long connection (how long?) with that organization. I think I can honestly say that in all my relations with the Club I have been guided only by what I conceived to be for its interests and without thought of what could best serve my own. I think the present position of the Club is a vindication of the policy of independence I always advocated." Dr. Wesley Mills steered the Club through most troublous times. Distinctly Canadian in sentiment he was one of those who laid the solid foundation of an organization that covers the Dominion, is independent, unbiased, that is affiliated with the Kennel Club, England, and that while entirely friendly with the American Kennel Club, is and has been for many years entirely independent of that big institution. Feeling as we do that the Canadian Kennel Club owes in great part its present exalted position to the forethought and wisdom of Dr. Wesley Mills, we feel that the Club through its Executive could fittingly recognize in some small measure Dr. Wesley Mills' invaluable help in the past by electing him to a life honorary position on its council. At the recent convocation at McGill on the eve of his departure for England Prof. Wesley Mills was presented with a testimonial and substantial acknowledgment of his work by his confreres at the University.

Rabies in Ontario: In an address by Dr. J. A. Amyot, Director of the Laboratory of the Provincial Board of Health, before the Canadian Medical Association, the seriousness still existing was not minimized by the lecturer.

"At present," he said, "it is confined to the western part of the Province. The district extends from Hamilton to Essex Centre, right through London, and the whole section between. It is to be found from London to Goderich, and there is some at Owen Sound. There has been one human death as the result of rabies, that of the boy who died at Dundas. I performed the post-mortem examination in this case, and there is not the slightest doubt that the boy died of hydrophobia. There were five deaths in Canada, previous to this outbreak."

The necessity of adhering closely to

the regulation of not allowing dogs to be transported from one part of Ontario to another, and taken out of the Province, especially into summer holiday districts like Muskoka, arises from the danger of infecting wild animals like foxes and wolves, which, in their natural habits, are timid and fearful of man. If they become infected with rabies they become bold and run into settlements. In that way there would be a constant source of supply for perhaps years to come.

The instance in Colorado of where rabies got among the skunks is a very enlightening one, because these usually timid animals invaded houses and towns and bit people.

During the past eight months Manitoba and Saskatchewan have been infected from dogs transported from Ontario, dogs that showed no symptoms at the time they left here, but developed it later.

Since the fourth of March one hundred and thirty-seven animal brains have been examined in the laboratory of the Board of Health. Of these some sixty-five or seventy have proven positive cases of rabies. The especial value of this has been that individuals bitten by these animals were able with certainty of its necessity to take the prescribed treatment. Sixty-one cases have so far been given the Pasteur vaccination treatment. This is not the treatment for the developed disease, but preventive vaccination. So far no ill effects of any kind have been noticed in any of the patients treated.

Professor J. J. Mackenzie, in commenting on Dr. Amyot's address, mentioned that he had found the same bodies mentioned by Negri while studying a former outbreak in Ontario, which occurred in 1895. He had looked upon them as degeneration products, and so termed them in an address in Great Britain in 1897.

Western news: We received the following letter of interest from a Western correspondent. Things are evidently much alive out in the prairie country.

Just a line to let you know we are still living in the Wild and Woolly West. I am expecting Lindum Molly, the winning Bull bitch to arrive any day, having just purchased her from

Mr. J. Kenworthy. I understand she is leaving in the pink of condition, and with over 100 prizes won in good competition, already to her credit. She should give a good account of herself on the show bench here. Since importing the winning Bulldog, "Trafford Gangway," C. K. C. 11330, last December, he has been kept very

at stud, his services being very eagerly sought after, one enthusiast from Saskatchewan sending a bitch nearly 900 miles to reach him, and there is every indication that the fancy will soon have a big army of zealots. The coming show at the Winnipeg Industrial Exhibition is being looked forward to with a considerable amount of interest, and everything points to some great competition, several magnificent specimens of various breeds having been recently imported, including some fine Collies, Whippets, a wonderful Dane bitch and also some grand specimens in the Bulldog line. However, the lucky exhibitor who lands the blue ribbon will certainly have to go some as I believe this year will see the biggest and best show ever held in the west.

She has been bred to Mr. Stuart's (Vancouver) Swansea Result, and he is looking for great things to happen.

License law: A recent inquiry was as follows: I would be pleased to find out from you something regarding dog tax. At this place, Medicine Hat, the tax per year on bitches is \$10.00, and dogs \$3.00. Could you suggest any way for me to bring the tax down on registered stock. Medicine Hat.

Our reply was as follows:

Toronto, May 30th, 1910.

We presume that Medicine Hat has power to set the dog tax at any sum that it thinks well. We have an Ontario or Provincial law whereby kennels of thoroughbred dogs are registered and licensed at ten dollars per annum, irrespective of number. We have also a city enactment whereby registered bitches are licensed at largely reduced fees, two dollars each instead of five dollars.

If you dog men would get together and see what influence you could bring to bear on your city council and in the Province we think you could probably have some similar law put into force. It might be necessary to get a lawyer to look after this for you, but there must be enough men in your town who would be willing to subscribe a dollar or two to this fund so that the expense would not fall heavily on any one or more individual.

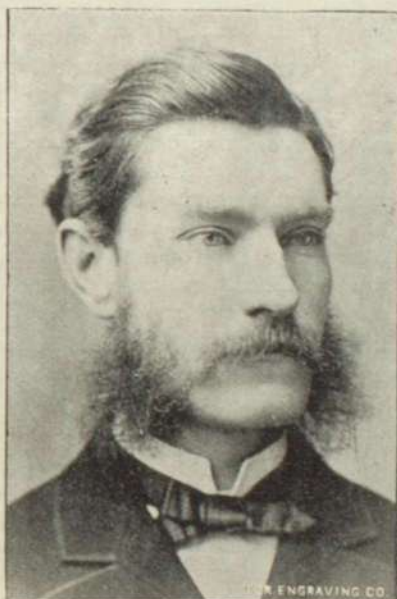

Canine legislation: A month or two back we printed some most valuable information given us by Mr. G. F. McFarland, Hon. Solicitor to the Canadian Kennel Club. Mr. McFarland supplements this in the following letter. Dog men should preserve this and the previous information given for future reference.

Mr. McFarland writes:—

Some weeks ago I wrote you regarding the amendment made at the recent session of the Legislature to the "Act for the Protection of Sheep and to Impose a Tax on Dogs." In that letter I stated that when the text of the amendment had been published I would write you further.

I have just received a copy of the new Act and I find that the changes are as follows:—

(1) The tax under the Act is now according to the following schedule: For the first dog, \$1.00; for each additional dog, \$2.00; for the first bitch, \$3.00; for each additional bitch, \$5.00.

(2) The provision in the former Act, whereby the Municipal Council had power, on petition of twenty-five ratepayers, to decline to oppose the tax, is now cancelled.

(3) The owner, possessor or keeper of any dog is required to deliver to

the Assessor a written statement of the number of dogs owned or kept by him.

(4) Every Municipal Council is given power to appoint one or more competent persons to be known as "Sheep Valuers" whose duty it shall be to inspect the injury done to sheep by dogs in cases where the owner or keeper of the dog committing the injury cannot be found, and the person demands compensation from the Municipal Council, and the report of the "Sheep Valuers" shall be acted upon by the Council in adjusting the claim.

TORONTO KENNEL CLUB SHOW.

We would like to call the particular attention of our readers to two paragraphs in the Toronto Kennel Club's premium list for their show, July 1 and 2, namely:

"All dogs can be shipped to and from this show anywhere in Ontario, west of County of Ontario (not included). Should your express agent not understand this, notify the secretary, H. A. Wilson, 206 Queen Street West, and instructions will be forwarded at once."

"As the date of closing of entries is left to the last legal date under rules of the Canadian Kennel Club, exhibitors need not expect any latitude."

WINNIPEG EXHIBITION DOG SHOW. JULY 19-22.

Prize lists for the Winnipeg Dog Show have been distributed for some time and judging by the splendid list of specials offered, should prove a most attractive card. The cover design gives a very excellent reproduction in action of "Manitoba Rap," America's champion field trial Pointer, owned by that great friend of the sporting dog, T. Johnston, Winnipeg.

We regret that there is no hope of the removal of the quarantine on portions of Ontario, so much that dogs from Toronto could be sent to this show, which is growing so rapidly in public favor.

The Association in providing kennel room sufficient for four hundred dogs and guaranteeing a five point show, should be a splendid card for those who can make the show, especially with James Mortimer as judge.

DOGS IN INDIA.

BY GEO. CECIL, LONDON, ENGLAND.

All sorts and condition: the ubiquitous fox terrier; long-haired dogs; the Irish terrier; the bull dog; grey-hounds; Maltese poodles; fox-hounds; sporting dogs; the toy terrier; the Thibetan sheep-dog; the imported article; the dog-boy; disease.

India, above all other countries, is one in which dogs are to be met with everywhere. There scarcely is a single white man who does not own one or two, while tea and indigo planters, jute merchants, managers of cotton ginning concerns, "Forest officers," "Public Works" engineers, and other Europeans who lead lonely lives in isolated "jungly" places, usually possess a pack apiece. The soldier also is an ardent dog-fancier, and in addition to keeping a tyke for the companionship it affords, he often does a brisk trade in pups—particularly if he has the luck to be "stationed" in a place where the officers of the different regiments vie with each other in possessing well-bred dogs. Equally keen on acquiring animals of perfect pedigree are the exiled ladies, and the make and shape of their dogs leaves nothing to be desired.

THE RAJAH'S PURCHASE.

Although the ubiquitous fox-terrier is first favorite, almost every variety of dog is to be met with in India. At Simla and other "stations" in the Himalayas, one sometimes comes across spaniels, Skye-terriers, Pomeranians, and other long haired animals whose health does not permit them to face the horrors of the torrid "plains," while shaggy wall-eyed Thibetan sheep dogs are to be met with in the neighborhood of "the snows"—as the snow-capped mountains are termed. During the "hot weather" months (from April till October) Irish terriers and Airedale and Scotch terriers also disport themselves in "the hills," having been "sent up" in order that they may escape the appalling spring, summer and autumn heat, and it is not an uncommon thing to find a huge St. Bernard, the property of a "Rajah," being led by a self-conscious native kennel servant. In this connection, the potentate, without actually taking an interest in dogs, sometimes acquires prize-winners in order that he may bulk large in the eyes of his English acquaintances as a patron of the kennel. Indeed, he occasionally despatches

an envoy to England with instructions to ransack every fancier's and dealer's establishment in the Kingdom, and to buy any dog which is likely to create a sensation in India. As the Eastern Prince will pay almost any sum rather than forego the opportunity of cutting out a rival, the question of price never enters into his calculations; he charges his representative to purchase the smallest toy-terrier or the largest Great Dane, and if an exorbitant sum is shown in the account, he cares not a jot. But should the emissary return with a specimen which fails to beat existing records, then there is likely to be trouble, for the "Rajah," believing that he has been victimized, sends for the minion—and gives him an uncommonly bad quarter of an hour prior to dismissing him.

SPORTING DOGS.

There is comparatively little demand for sporting dogs. That is to say, there are only about five packs of hounds in India, while the scratch packs which are got together by indigo planters and other Europeans who live in "up-country stations" seldom include a single fox-hound—though amongst the dogs contributed by the neighbors are to be found almost every known and unknown variety. Fortunately for the little dogs, they seldom are out-paced by the long-legged members of the pack, for the hunted jackal makes so many twists and turns that almost every dog, from the lanky Rampur hound, a species of broken-haired deer hound—to the effeminate Maltese poodle, has some sort of look in. The run, however, seldom is brought to a close without one half of the pack trying to annihilate the other half. Whether it is that the big dogs look down upon the little dogs, or that (according to good Doctor Watts) they fight because "it is their nature to," this deponent knoweth not; the only thing certain is that the morning's sport not infrequently is marred by altercations which result in one of the belligerents biting the dust.

DIFFERENT "STATIONS," DIFFERENT BREEDS.

In certain "stations" one finds a breed which scarcely is to be met with anywhere else in India. For instance, in one place Maltese poodles, or, rather, alleged Maltese poodles, may be seen disporting themselves upon either side of the shady "Mall," chasing the pretty little grey squirrels and making wild dashes at the gorgeous tropical butterflies. In another place bull-terriers are prominent, while in a third, nameless hybrids are to be found. As can well be imagined, much cross-breeding gives the oddest results, animals bearing the head of a Maltese poodle, the forefeet of a fox-terrier, the tail of a greyhound, and the body of a dachshund, are not quite as uncommon as might be thought. Such freaks are much in request with the native servants, who, having little sense of the fitness of things, cherish the possession of these unsightly creatures, bestowing upon their treasures all the affection of which they are capable.

THE EURASIAN'S FANCY.

As Kipling has told a wondering world in "Soldiers Three," the Eurasians—especially the women—are ever ready to invest in dogs; and, according to the Anglo-Indian poet laureate, well-marked fox-terriers are in demand. As a rule, however, these quaint people cannot afford to give the price which good markings bring, while they scarcely are educated up to prize form. Another peculiarity about their taste is that it inclines to quantity rather than quality. The half caste who is offered his choice of one good dog or half a dozen bad ones has no hesitation in accepting the pack; and such is his want of discrimination that he bestows the bulk of his affection upon the greatest mongrel of the lot. It may be added that no matter how monstrous a freak the animal may be, he loses no opportunity of decking it out with a bow almost as large as itself!

IMPORTED DOGS.

Every year a number of dogs are imported from England, for, in addition to the well-to-do natives, many officers and "civilians" indent on various "Home" dealers, and the Bombay Hunt and various other hunts bring out fresh hounds. Speculative sub-alterns and planters also import dogs—mostly fox terriers, bull terriers, and bull-dogs—for breeding purposes, and if good fortune attends the venture, they may turn over many rupees by the end of the twelve months.

DISEASE.

Disease, alas! is rife: suffering dogdom falls a victim to pretty well all the ills to which the flesh is heir. "Poorness"—a form of wasting away brought on by the appalling hot weather—heat of the plains—attacks, the imported prize-winner and the "pariah" alike; horrible skin diseases are contracted in the insanitary "bazaar," and during the rains "bursati," a complaint which results in loss of hair, is exceedingly common. At the same time, it is

THE DOG BOY.

Although the average Asyan goes in fear and trembling of the "Sahib's" dog, the colored "dog-boy," whose business it is to wash, brush, and comb the dogs, soon gets over his timidity. He takes them out for their morning and evening walk; and if the kennel of which he is in charge is the best in the "station," it is quite on the cards that he will give himself airs. It also is one of his duties to keep a sharp look-out for illness and disease—and for fleas! The last named are the curse of Anglo-Indian dogdom; swarming in their myriads everywhere, they seem to thrive upon unlimited flea-powder and gallons of disinfectant. It is practically impossible to keep a dog free from them.

wonderful how healthy the Anglo-Indian dogs keep when one takes into account the dangers which beset it.

CANADIAN NATIONAL BENCH SHOW NOTES.

Owing to the embargo still being in

force, entries for dogs east of Toronto, will not be accepted for the Bench Show at the Canadian National Exhibition this year.

In consequence of the embargo and to induce a large entry from the district available, the entry fee has been reduced to one dollar straight, for each entry.

All judges selected have not yet been heard from, but so far the following well-known gentlemen have consented to act: James Mortimer, Jos. Laurin (Airedales); V. E. Haywood (Boston Terriers); "Hank" Watson (Setters).

Whippet races will again be a feature of the programme.

There will be the usual large list of special prizes for the dog show, and indications are that it will be the usual success despite the handicap under which it is travelling. All entries close August 15th.

BOSTONS AT THE O.K.C. SHOW.

A lot of controversy has taken place in these columns over the judging and reporting of the Boston Terriers at the recent O.K.C. show. Below we give a report, written by the judge, Mr. Wm. Austin. This report was received too late for the issue containing the report of the show, but we give it now, with the hope that it will help to settle the matter:

There was a grand display of this popular breed, and I wish to thank the exhibitors for their hearty support in the large entry they gave me. Following is a list of the winners with criticisms:

Puppy dogs.—5 entries. 1, Jack, a very nice pup, evenly marked, will be better next time out. 2, Capt. Macklin, a splashed pup; clean cut, but weak in muzzle. 3, Lord Roberts, a very young pup, strong in head, nicely marked, but too long in body.

Novice dogs.—12 lbs. and under 17 lbs. 4 entries. 1, Revilo Kid, a splashed dog, of the right type; a bit pinched in muzzle and poor ear carriage, but will improve with age. 2, Jack. 3, Sir Ladar, a white dog, that would have been higher had he acted well.

Novice dogs.—17 lbs. and under 22 lbs. 6 entries. 1, Crackers, mahogany

brindle, even white markings and clean cut all over. 2, Happy Boy, snipy in muzzle and carried tail too gay. 3, Willis' Derby Boy, too coarse all over.

Novice dogs.—22 lbs. and under 28 lbs. 2 entries. 1, Viking II., a seal brindle, strong in head. Hylo, absent.

Limit dogs.—12 lbs. and under 17 lbs. 4 entries. 1, Tom Boy, a well known little dog, looking better than ever, a little better filled up in the eyes, and he would be in the first flight. 2, Ted Shongo, a better marked dog than the winner, very good in head but shown too thin. 3, Revilo Kid.

Limit dogs.—17 lbs. and under 22 lbs. 4 entries. 1, Crackers. 2, Willis, Derby Boy. 3, Yankee, too bulky.

Limit dogs.—22 lbs. and under 28 lbs. 3 entries. 1, Conewango, a mahogany brindle, with even markings, grand body, feet and tail, one of the best seen here in a long time. This dog finally went to winners, also special, for best Boston in show, beating the renowned Ch. Peter Pan for the Hiram Walker cup. The only place Peter Pan had anything on Conewango, was in the cheek. 2, Gordon Delhi, steel brindle, even marked, too low to ground and long in body. 3, Viking.

Open dogs.—12 lbs. and under 17 lbs.

5 entries. 1, Lord Bell Rock, good color, could do with more markings, but one of the best at his weight. 2, Tom Boy. 3, Ted Shongo.

Open dogs.—17 lbs. and under 22 lbs. 5 entries. 1, Sir Preston William, a good bodied dog, but could be cleaner in head. 2, Crackers. 3, Willis' Derby Boy.

Open dogs.—22 lbs. and under 28 lbs. 4 entries. 1, Conewango. 2, Gordon Delhi. 3, Viking II. Open Toys.—1, Miss Peggy, just fair. Open dogs—over 28 lbs. 1, Banquo. Winners dogs.—Conewango. Res. Lord Bell Rock.

Puppy bitches.—1, Abbey Belle, seal brindle, weak in muzzle and could be shorter in body. 2, Miss Happy Day, a fair little bitch in poor condition.

Novice bitches.—22 lbs. and under 28 lbs. 2 entries. 1, Pauline, dark seal brindle, strong in muzzle, but needs trimming. 2, Miss Velma, good head color and markings, but poor in body and feet.

Limit bitches.—12 lbs. and under 17 lbs. 4 entries. 1, Leading Lady. 2, Victoria II., nice color and markings, too short in muzzle and moved poorly. 3, Preston Peggy.

Limit Bitches.—17 lbs. and under 22 lbs. 2 entries. 1, Lady Bell Rock III., a clean cut terrier all over, but poor expression. 2, Bell Rock Dazzle. 3, Betz.

Limit bitches.—22 lbs. and under 28 lbs. 7 entries. 1, Katy Didn't, seal Brindle evenly marked, good head but weak behind. 2, Lady Helpless, good color and markings, and should be trimmed as she is a nice even thing all over. 3, Molly, grand body, legs and feet but coarse in muzzle.

Beaumont erred, when he said that Conewango defeated Peter Pan every time they met. I also want to say that the reporter of the O. K. C. is also wrong, when he says that Conewango never defeated Peter Pan.

These dogs have met four times, Peter Pan winning twice in Buffalo, the only American city he was ever shown in, and Conewango defeated him twice in Toronto.

Now, as you will see by the clipping, Mr. O. K. C. reporter goes so far as to say that the knowing ones say Conewango was never in Peter Pan's class.

Now, I would like him to give me the names of just two of these would-be knowing ones, and I will prove to all concerned that they know nothing about a Boston Terrier.

Now, Mr. O. K. C. reporter, let me have their names. I am a member of the Boston Terrier Club of Canada, and I don't care if they are; all I want to do is to prove that you or they do not know what they are talking about.

Mr. O. K. C. reporter goes on to say that Peter Pan has trimmed every dog that has won over Conewango. I would like to tell this gentleman that is so terribly mixed, that Conewango has defeated Captain Careless, also the white dog, Delhi's Punch, and Ch. Hanley's Baby Boy.
