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NOTES AND COMMENTS

Caesar: Our acknowledgments are due to that enterprising firm, Messrs. Spratts Patent, Limited, for a batch of really artistic photos of the late King Edward VII.'s dog and chum, Caesar. One picture shows the rough Terrier, as he is, alone and in recumbent position, but with that alert expression one looks for in a Terrier. The other picture shows him on lead with his Scottish attendant. Both photos are very natural and lifelike. We dare say Messrs. Victoria Fall Show: It is hoped to hold a show in Victoria this fall in connection with the exhibition of the B. C. Agricultural Society. Terriers will be given a good classification and a Terrier judge will be appointed.

Duncan's Show: At Duncan's Show, V. I., members of the Victoria Terrier Club fairly monopolized the prize list in Airedales, Mr. McConnell taking several firsts and special for best Irish, Airedale or Scottish Terrier, also Mr. Theed Pearse with a new importation Camosun Virginia, won two firsts. In Irish, Mr. C. B. Thompson took all the prizes, his Champion Red Cress taking special for best of that breed. In Bostons, Mr. Muriset had his nice bitch, Narkeesa, in good form and easily won. Then in Scotties and West Highlanders, Mr. MacLaren took most of the prizes. Fox Terriers were divided up among, in smooths, Messrs. Welch, Pearse and Hamilton, and in wires, Mr. Hanson brought out a nice puppy and Mr. Dorrell won in dogs, Mr. Large in bitches.

Mr. Lacy to Vancouver: Mr. H. W. Lacy again travels to the coast, where he judges the Vancouver Show, all breeds. This is not the annual show of the Vancouver Kennel Club, but the first show we hope of many of the Vancouver Fair. One thousand dollars in cash is being offered and C. K. C. rules will govern. The dates are August 18th, 19th and 20th, and the management will be in the hands of the Vancouver Kennel Club, of which Mr. E. C. Powell is the capable and experienced secretary.

The Buffalo Incident: The June issue of the American Kennel Gazette prints the finding of the New York Trial Board in the allegations made by Dr. Alfred Boulton against Dr. J. E. De Mund and Mr. A. Albright, Jr. In the report it is stated that the secretary of the A.K.C. had on June 9th written Dr. Boulton for his statement in the case, but that up to June 22nd no reply had been received. We do not, of course, for a moment doubt this, but we do hesitate to believe that Dr. Boulton ever received the communication. We have good reason for this doubt as Dr. Boulton personally assured the editor of the Canadian Kennel Gazette that he would be only too ready to place a statement of the case with the A.K.C. and to even support it with sworn affidavits if necessary. We had no object in view but that justice should prevail, and as a matter of fact, owing to absence from Toronto Mr. Donovan did not see the report in question until after it had been printed and distributed. If we have unwittingly done these gentlemen an injustice we freely apologize. The report reads as follows:

MEETING OF THE NEW YORK TRIAL BOARD, HELD JUNE 7, 1910.

In regard to the investigation demanded by Dr. J. E. De Mund and Mr. A. Albright, Jr., concerning the charges made by one Dr. Alfred Boulton, of Canada, as appeared in the "Canadian Kennel Gazette" and copied in the "Field and Fancy." Dr. De Mund appeared before the Board and with testimony of himself and three witnesses, together with the deposition of Mr. Albright, who was unable to be present on account of sickness in his family, convinced the members of the Board that the charges were not only absolutely without foundation, but were malicious and false. There being no one present to represent the person who made the accusation, the secretary of the American Kennel Club was instructed to write to Mr. Boulton for a statement. Such letter was written on June 9th and up to date, June 22nd, no reply has been received.

The Board therefore finds Dr. De Mund and Mr. Albright entirely innocent of the accusation against them, and would request that the American Kennel Club try to find some means of punishing any person who shall make a charge against another without making some honest effort to substantiate such charge.

Trial Board.

U. S. Imports: In the same issue of A.K.C. Gazette is a letter relating to the importation of dogs into the United States. It is to the closing paragraph of this letter that we desire to draw attention. Recognition of our stud book, even in this degree, is something that the C.K.C. has for years been aiming at. We print the

letter in full, as it doubtless will be of value to exporters from Canada as well as those breeders south of the line.

Important Notice to Importers
of Dogs.

June 17, 1910.

Dear Sir,—I believe it important that you should call the attention of the breeders and importers of dogs, through the columns of the Kennel Gazette or in any other way that may seem advisable, to the regulations of the Department of Agriculture covering the importation of dogs. The regulations of the Department of Agriculture require that the American Kennel Club, being a certified association, shall issue Custom House Certificates to such dogs only as have first been registered in the stud books of foreign associations affiliated with the American Kennel Club and also registered in the American Kennel Club stud book. The stud books of the foreign associations at present affiliated with the American Kennel Club are as follows:

Kennel Club Stud Book, England.
The Stud Book of the Masters of Foxhounds' Association, England.
Greyhound Stud Book, England.
Stud Book of the Association of Masters of Harriers and Beagles, England.
Schweizerisches Hunde - Stannbuch, Switzerland.

Application has already been made to the Department to recognize the Canadian Kennel Club as an association affiliated with the American Kennel Club; and other associations whose rules conform to the requirements of the Department of Agriculture will be recognized on application to the Department.

Dr. Ford in England: We learn that Dr. C. Y. Ford is again in England, where he is visiting his mother.

A divided territory: We have had little to say as to the trouble existing in the management of canine affairs in the United States. As we said be-

fore, the C. K. C. has none but the most friendly feeling towards the A. K. C. The correspondence — never very great — conducted between the two offices has invariably been of the most courteous nature. Hence we have no bias one way or the other. As far as we are concerned the past is a sealed book. The action taken by the C. K. C. in its independence of management south of the border has since proved to be in the best interests of the dog and the dog's owner in Canada, and it is in Canada that the C. K. C. is interested in.

That the A. K. C. is in danger of losing power on the Pacific Coast, possibly also in the mid west States, cannot be denied. The birth of the National Dog Breeders' Association is but one of the many fingers that point this way. We view its advent with more or less regret. For we know of old the trouble that existed for years before the P. C. L. went out of existence. On the other hand, America is a big country, too big, possibly, and with too many divergent interests to be governed from one little spot, be that New York, Chicago or San Francisco.

Mr. Lacy, in the American Stock-Keeper, has given a good deal of space to the whole affair. The issue of the A.S.-K. of July 2nd contains a pronouncement that shows about where the average dog owner in the U. S. must stand. Mr. Lacy is avowedly a supporter of the A. K. C., so that he may be depended on to take a fair view of that body's present attitude. He writes:

The N.D.B.A. Incorporates.

The following is from the "San Francisco Call," of June 17:

"The controversy which for months past has embroiled local dog fanciers in litigation and brought about the formation of bitterly antagonistic factions came to an issue yesterday in the filing of articles of incorporation of the National Dog Breeders' Association.

This body will have no connection with the California Branch of the American Kennel Club, which has heretofore practically ruled in matters canine.

The full list of directors of the National Dog Breeders' Association follows: J. H. Jones, William Ellery, L. W. Spriggs, D. P. Cresswell, C. W. Riffe, William Blackwell, George W.

Ellery, W. E. Clute, P. M. Wand, W. V. N. Bay, V. A. Kushn, J. L. Park, W. G. McMahon, J. A. Wiborn and E. P. Butler, of San Francisco; J. W. Matthews and G. B. M. Gray, of Oakland; S. St. L. Cavill, of Kentfield; Henry Berran and V. J. Ruh of San Jose and H. C. Lister of San Francisco.

The purposes for which the Association has been incorporated include the breeding, improvement and welfare of dogs, the holding of exhibitions, the encouraging and licensing of bench shows and field trials, the certifying of pedigrees and the maintenance of an official stud book."

We have it stated to us that the registrations for the new stud book number over 100, already. In the starting of a stud book it would seem an admirable time to put into force some regulation that would make of the registration something more to be depended upon than a mere declaration of names with no proof that the breeding is as stated. This has always been the weakness of the A. K. C. system and now that the volume has become so unwieldy, it would seem a good reason for them to make a change, and this should be to restrict the registrations after a certain date, to dogs whose parents are registered. Then would there be some more definite line of action to follow in identifying the candidate for registration. There is no infallible method to safeguard the genuineness of a registration, but this would seem the simplest and most effective. Affidavits and so on, are all very well, but if a fellow wants to prevaricate, he will find a way to do so, at the least risk to himself. If the new association intend to start right they should look to this very important side of the question. Probably the news of this fresh move on the part of the malcontents may waken the A. K. C. to further realization of the kind of fool's paradise they have been snoozing in of late to the gentle purrings of their advisers on the Coast, who assure them that they can handle any uprising with neatness and dispatch. But anyone who knows the feeling out there, and this feeling has been accentuated the past few weeks, knows that the average exhibitor doesn't care a hurrah in Johnson's camp who gives them their point ratings at shows, for their system of rating even now, under the A. K. C. rules, is different from ours and not

entirely satisfactory to the more progressive ones. About the only man who would care to go the expense of showing dogs in the East, and so come in contact with the real A. K. C. advantages, whatever they might be, is Mr. W. Ellery, and the A. K. C. having put him out, there is no one else but would be content to sail and win under the flag of any Association that would give them the same advantages, the right to call their dogs champions, and protect their interests from frauds and so on, and there is no obstacle in the way of the new body doing all that the old one has been paid to do and the money carried to New York, instead of being held in their own country, as it will be now. There is a whole lot in this and the A. K. C. should have thought of it all and not indulged in so many sickly half measures.

The Die is Cast.

Whatever the ultimate result, the American Kennel Club is in for a bitter fight on the Coast. The struggle may extend to the Middle States if the opponents of the A. K. C. are to be believed, but the claim that the new Association will be able to count on the support of any Eastern clubs is nothing more than ill founded surmise — bluff it is sometimes termed. Leaving out of consideration these problematical considerations or issues, the stern fact remains that the situation on the Coast is exactly as we pointed out repeatedly in these columns it would become, while the initial agitation was in tentative mood, unless the whole trouble was considered in broader light and such definite action taken as would ameliorate the strained conditions.

The A. K. C. made a fatal mistake when the De Mund resolutions were offered to the Ellery faction — they lowered the dignity of the A. K. C. and not only failed of the object but gave the malcontents already in suspicious mood, cause to think that if the A. K. C. could establish such a precedent in this instance, they could have in others, and for the nonce—in view of the local prejudice and feeling—have brought the whole Ellery case (before it became too big to handle) to the headquarters of the A. K. C. and considered the then easily to be adjusted issues fairly and squarely. In

offering these resolutions from headquarters, the A.K.C. went behind its representative on the coast, the P.A.C. Then these malcontents argue it could have done the same in the matter of the Ellery troubles, when the latter desired them to. That there was an unmistakable desire on the part of a large number of Coast fanciers to have a representative Advisory Committee was plain to those who followed the trouble with clear vision unhampered by the tattle of this or that faction.

This plea for club representation was a healthy one from an American point of view, and could just as easily have been granted at the May meeting of the A. K. C. officers and directors as was the unsatisfactory Stettheimer resolution, which at best was but a prolongation of the agony complained of. By this Stettheimer route, the existing Advisory Committee is to be changed in its personnel (even if the clubs had their say in the matter, and under the geographical and other conditions this is impossible or impracticable, for the representatives of all the clubs must be present in San Francisco to elect a new member of the committee) by one new member annually, thus requiring five years or so to alter the existing membership and conditions, with no guarantee that the personnel of the committee would be much different to what it is at present. It was a smart move.

The National Breeders' Association was not at the time thoroughly organized — it was in tentative mood waiting for the A.K.C. to give the Coast club representation, the same as enjoyed by the members in the East. Directly news came that the Stettheimer resolution had been adopted by the A.K.C. meeting, the new organization knew there was no further hope of relief and at once reorganized and by adopting a constitution and by-laws as a national body, inviting clubs to join, hold shows under their rules and jurisdiction and in other ways assume the powers of a national governing body in opposition to the American Kennel Club, the die was cast.

As a staunch friend and supporter of the A. K. C., Stock-Keeper pointed out that the movement in progress was not in any way to be compared with the old Pacific Kennel League of glorious memory. The forces behind the new movement are not composed of

men without business and financial standing, nor are they composed of men who do not know exactly what they do want, like those who through their varied selfish personal interests and grouches lacked the cohesion necessary for a movement calculated to upset the established kennel government. It is very different now. The board of directors chosen out of the new Association's membership consists of far more men than the entire membership of the old Pacific Kennel League, and they are moreover some of the principal exhibitors in the California section, men who may be depended on for four to eight entries at a show. They are the breeders. Their absence was keenly felt at the late San Francisco show, and for this reason it was not a representative one of the Coast fancy. Is it not reasonable to suppose that the action taken by these men will influence others to join the new movement?

This is what the Coast people cannot understand. It has gradually been hammered into somebody in A.K.C. authority that Secretary Norman's power on the Committee was prejudicial to the best interests of the A.K.C. on the Coast (this is suspension language, but it emphasizes the situation) therefore at the last A.K.C. meeting Sec'y Norman was shorn of his power to vote and relegated to the position of a hired clerk at a nominal salary. This was a radical move in a great many ways, and it has two effects upon the questioning fancy out there. If the A.K.C. could alter the complexion of the Advisory Committee at one stroke in this way, they ask why could not headquarters have tried Ellery's case. If they can make one such radical change for their own policy why could they not make others. The system of the election of Mr. Norman J. Stewart to Mr. Norman's place on the voting committee — the method of his election, is in contravention of that elective representation prayed for by several of the clubs who now presumably will join the new Association. The A.K.C. could not have made a more popular choice of a new man than Mr. Stewart, who is universally respected by the fancy out there. This may be politics but not the point.

The method of his election it turns out was characteristic of the sort of politics that have been played of late in the A. K. C. camp out there. The

new order invited the president, secretary or other representative of clubs, members of the A.K.C., to attend a meeting for the purpose in San Francisco. No proxies or expressions of postal opinion would be entertained. The consequence was nobody came from the long distances outside and the committee chose its own as heretofore. The Coast fancy is not large enough to support a factional fight, such as indicated by the situation now developed through the claiming by a new club under the new Association and situat-

ed near San Francisco (The Marin County Kennel Club), the same date for a show as that of the Santa Cruz show under the A.K.C. banner. There is nothing but loss in sight for both promoters and the interests of the dog will suffer in consequence.

This is the main reason for our remarks on this subject together with the desire that directors and delegates and officers of the A. K. C. may familiarize themselves with a situation into which we are convinced a majority of them have gone with lack of interest

through lack of knowledge in the premises. As an organ of the American fancy we have sought to point out the difficulties that brought about the unpleasantness, but now that the fight is on we wish it distinctly understood that while Stock-Keeper may give the news on both sides the interests of the American Kennel Club as our national governing body demand that it be accorded our staunch support, whatever may be its errors of policy, reserving the right to criticize or endorse as occasion demands.

2. Pacific Coast Advisory Board, minutes and correspondence. The following are the minutes of the meeting held Feb. 23, 1910. The correspondence is lengthy and is here for your perusal.

PACIFIC ADVISORY BOARD TO C. K. C. — MINUTES OF MEETING, FEB. 23, 1910.

A meeting of the Pacific Advisory Board to the C. K. C. was held in Mr. H. S. Rolston's office, February 23rd, 1910, at 4.30 p.m.

Present—C. M. Rolston, chairman, in the chair; H. S. Rolston (Vancouver); J. W. Creighton (Victoria); and E. C. Powell (Cowichan), Secretary.

The Secretary read the rules governing the Board, also certificates from the various clubs re delegates.

The Secretary read the minutes of the previous meeting.

Moved by Mr. Creighton that the minutes be adopted as read. Carried.

C. T. White, Vancouver, entered and won first with English Setter, Vancouver Duke, in the puppy class at the Vancouver Spring Show, 1909. Complaint that dog was over age.

Correspondence read showed clearly that Mr. White acted in good faith and honestly believed that the dog was within the age limit.

Moved by Mr. Rolston, that the win of Vancouver Duke at the Vancouver Spring Show, 1909, be cancelled, and that the puppy receiving second prize be awarded first. Carried.

John McIntosh, Victoria, entered and won first in novice class, with Collie, Willows Prince, at the Vancouver Fall Show, 1909.

Complaint that the dog was ineligible, having won first at Victoria, 1909.

Correspondence read showed that Mr. McIntosh had asked a second party to make the entry and was unaware that dog was entered in said class.

Moved by Mr. Creighton, that the win of Collie, Willows Prince, at the Vancouver Fall Show, 1909, in the novice class, be cancelled, and that the dog which got second be awarded first. Carried.

Jno. A. McLeod, Vancouver, complained that he had not received any prizes or diplomas from New Westminster Show, 1907.

Correspondence read showed that Mr. McLeod did not win any prizes, and the secretary was instructed to inform Mr. McLeod of such fact, also that the New Westminster Club was now defunct, but had been severely fined for not issuing diplomas, and furthermore, that any wins made by him would be recognized.

Correspondence received from Mr. T. M. McAuliffe, Vancouver, re the qualifications of judges.

Moved by Mr. Rolston, that as this is a matter affecting the rules of the C. K. C., it be referred to the Executive of the Canadian Kennel Club.

H. E. Davies, Vancouver, claimed championship for his St. Bernard, Victoria Chief, with the following wins: Victoria, 1903, P.K.L.; Victoria, 1906, C.K.C.; Vancouver, 1907, C.K.C.; New Westminster, 1907, C.K.C.; Victoria, 1908, C.K.C.; Seattle, 1908, A.K.C.

The Victoria, 1903, show, P.K.L., could not be allowed, as wins in this

country under a foreign body are not recognized.

Vancouver, 1907, and Victoria, 1908, O.K.

The judges' books for Victoria, 1906, and New Westminster, 1907, showed that the dog had been given first in open class, but no award for winners. At the Victoria, 1906, show, a diploma for winners was made out and the secretary declared that such was the intention of the judge.

Moved by Mr. Rolston, that the win in winners class of St. Bernards, Victoria Chief, at Victoria, 1906, and New Westminster, 1907, be granted, and that they be recognized as such. Carried.

Fred C. Hill, Vancouver, wrote, asking that his win in winners class at Victoria, 1909, be recognized.

Correspondence was supported by an affidavit from a Director of the Victoria City Kennel Club, and his handler to the effect that he had received the winners ribbon from the judge in the ring.

Moved by Mr. Rolston, that the win in winners class of St. Bernard, Knight Errant of Arslan, 10601, at Victoria, 1909, be granted and recognized. Carried.

P. A. B. re following entry:—Victoria, April 6 to 9, 1909, Elliott & Robb, Mallwyd Bob, 7838; Vancouver, April 14 to 17, 1909, J. S. Hickford, Ch. Mallwyd Bob, 7838; Tacoma, April 28 to May 1, 1909, Elliott & Robb, Ch. Mallwyd Bob, 87628; Portland, May 5 to 8, 1909, Elliott Robb, Ch. Mallwyd Bob, 87628.

Correspondence read, supported by bill of sale, etc.

Moved by Mr. Rolston, that on investigation we find that Mr. Hickford sold Ch. Mallwyd Bob previous to the Victoria Show, 1909, on certain conditions: That five minutes after the judging of the Victoria Show and before the entries for the Vancouver Show closed, he re-possessed Ch. Mallwyd Bob under a lien, and after the entries for the Vancouver Show closed, he re-sold the dog to Elliott and Robb. Carried.

Moved by Messrs. Rolston and Creighton that a hearty vote of thanks be tendered the secretary for his services during the past year. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Rolston, that we now create the position of secretary of this Board, the same to be without a vote. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Creighton, that Mr. E. C. Powell act as secretary for the balance of the year, or until such time as a successor is appointed. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Creighton, that this meeting do now adjourn. Carried.

RULES.

1. The name of the Club shall be the Victoria Terrier Club.

2. The objects of the club shall be to promote the breeding of all varieties of Terriers, to define precisely and publish a definition of the different breeds, and by giving prizes, supporting shows, and taking other steps, to do all in its power to protect and advance the interests of the different breeds of Terriers.

3. The management of the Club shall be vested in a Committee of the officers of the club who shall consist of a President, two Vice-Presidents, Secretary Treasurer and eight other members.

4. The officers shall be elected at the annual meeting of the club which shall be held during the Victoria Dog Show or as the retiring Committee shall determine. Any vacancies among the officers occurring during the current year shall be filled up by the Committee.

5. A financial statement showing the position and disposition of the funds of the club shall be presented by the Committee at each annual meeting. The financial year of the club shall end on the first of March.

6. The funds of the club shall be deposited in a specified bank, withdrawing by cheque signed by the President and Secretary-Treasurer.

7. The membership of the club shall be unlimited and unrestricted as to residence. The entrance fee shall be \$1.00 and the annual subscription \$1.00. No member in arrear with his subscription shall be entitled to any of the benefits of the club. All dues shall be payable at the commencement of the fiscal year.

8. Every candidate for membership shall be proposed and seconded by two

members of the club and shall be balloted for at the next meeting of the Committee after receipt of the nomination by the Secretary. To elect a candidate at least five votes must be cast and one black ball shall exclude. In the event of no regular meeting of the Committee being held within one month of the receipt of the nomination a mail vote of the Committee shall be taken. Every prospective member shall with his nomination pay his entrance fee and within thirty days after election, his annual subscription, failing this the election shall be void.

9. The Committee shall have the power, by a two-thirds vote, to forfeit the membership of any member for con-

duct on his part likely, in the opinion of the Committee, to endanger the welfare or character of the club.

10. A special meeting of the club shall be called by the President upon the written request of ten members of the club.

11. These rules can be amended only by a two-thirds vote of the members present at the annual or any special meeting of the club.

12. Six members of the Committee shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business and nine members a quorum at any meeting of the club.

These rules were adopted at the meeting of the club held 10th May, 1910.

He himself won 1st at Victoria, B.C., and special, 1st and special at Seattle, Washington; was 2nd open and reserve winners to his own son at Vancouver. At six shows in England, Ingatestone Rustem won six firsts and three specials under England's best Fox Terrier judges.

TORONTO KENNEL CLUB SHOW.

NUMBER OF DOGS, 200; NUMBER OF POINTS, 1.

Piles of hard work in hot weather was the price paid by the enthusiasts responsible for the show on July 1 and 2. With the mercury hovering between 80 and 90, the muzzling by-law and the embargo, we would not have been surprised to see the Toronto Kennel Club Show abandoned for 1910; but they did it, and more power to them. Two hundred dogs and a goodly number of fanciers bore testimony that the Devil himself can't kill the fancy in the Queen City. Tribute to whom tribute is due, we pay our respects to the Secretary, Dr. Boulton, Dr. Campbell, Fred Jacobi and the other pluggers who plugged—plugged for specials, plugged for entries, and—legitimately—plugged the City Council for a grant. Only one thing—next year cut out the second day business: it was a poor move. One hot day is heaps for man and beast. This last piece of advice we consider unnecessary. Everyone we met saw the error of the two-day innovation.

We also pay our respects to the ladies and gentlemen who officiated so efficiently as judges.

St Bernards were rather more numerous than would be looked for at a local show in hot weather. The only puppy was a plain headed one, light in eye; 1st novice dog, Ben, has size, bone and coat, but is very straight in stifle. Mr. Kehoe's Stormer of Parkdale beat him in limit, the latter having decided advantage in skull, wrinkle and muzzle, but handicapped with a bad set of legs and feet. Viola of Parkdale went winners — a little out of coat but easily the best, while Lochinvar went next to her in open class. Newfoundlands, 2, Rover, not unknown on the bench, but more worthy of praise for his life-saving characteristics, the winner. Danes, also two, the winner a large one, fair. 3 Russian Wolfhounds, the best of them Prince Tbarra. The only Greyhound was Mrs. MacGregor's Hero. English Foxhounds were only three in number, the best pair belonging to the Toronto Hunt pack. American Hounds were also few, and quality mediocre. Only one Pointer put in an appearance, and not a solitary English Setter. Irishmen were out in better numbers, however, and were of good quality, particularly Moroney & Johnston's winning bitch, Brown Betty and Kerry Hill, which showed more substance than Mr. Woodhouse's team. Larry McCoy is a good wholesome stamp of Setter, but inclined to be coarse. July is a mean time to show Collies and we were not surprised when we came to look them over that the good ones had vanished from the bench. Mrs. Gordon's Seedley Style is unknown to us and also Mr. Harlow's McPherson, but as they beat such dogs as King Edward Model and Skyboo Perfection, they must be pretty fair specimens. In bitches, another of Mrs. Gordon's Strangers, Seedley Splendor, captured winners, beating Mr. Bowsfield's Bellevue Lass. What we saw on the bench were mostly of the very ordinary variety. English Bulldogs turned out in pretty good numbers to greet Mr. Goodwin,

but the good ones, as usual, were not numerous. In dogs, Mrs. Meadows' Argo made a clean-up, winning from junior class to winners. He is a very nice type of Bull but just a little shy of bone. Dr. Boulton's Keystone of Sherwood was placed reserve to him in winners, and Mr. Wilson's Red Diamond 2nd to him in open dogs under 45 lbs. The latter is also a good stamp of dog but unsound behind. Milo Peggy and Sherwood Success, both well known, took winners and reserve respectively in bitches, and Mr. Kynock showed a very nice little bitch in Silver Queen, winning in limit and open classes under 40 lbs. with her. She is heavy in ear and could be improved in face, but has a good sound body. Fox Terriers, both smooths and wires, were only a fair lot, outside of one or two of the winners. Winners dogs went to Oxford Rake, a little dog that we always liked and were glad to see make a win for his new master. He beat Broadway Donar, also pretty well known. Donar was shown altogether too fat, which made him look "pudgy" and thick in shoulders. There were some very pretty puppy bitches, notably Mr. Sands' Broadway Donation (reserve winners), and Mr. Mewburn's Danby Blue Belle and Blue Bud, but these had to give way before Broadway Donna, a matronly looking bitch and bit round in eye, but very sound. In Wires, Donington Commodore, a dog of the same stamp as his sire, Donington Siren, headed the list. Rolleston Star, reserve, has better foreface and expression than the winner, but unfortunately is quite noticeably defective behind on his right side. This little dog would be in the front rank only for this. Winners bitches went to a very fair puppy, Riverdale Pearl, the reserve bitch, Oxspring Pansy being sadly out of condition. Bull Terriers were few but of excellent quality. Inferno again won glory for his master and his almost namesake, Inferno King, a good clean-cut Noross Patrician puppy, went reserve. The winning bitch, Willowvale Bloom, won at the Canadian National, 1909, with the exception of being a little round, though dark in eye, she is a very good, well balanced bitch and a laster. Reserve bitch was Dufferin Venus. Bostons were down both in quantity and quality. We were promised a special report on them by

the judge, but it has not yet come to hand. Irish Terriers seem to be picking up a bit around Toronto. They were out in pretty fair numbers and there were some new faces amongst them. The winning puppy, Quarrywood Tim, is a clean-cut Terrier — wants time. Quarrywood Commander, the winners dog, is a good substantial fellow, but a bit heavy in ear. Quarrywood Rory went reserve to him. This dog is inclined to be coarse in skull and is light in eye. The winning bitch, Quarrywood Shamrock, is a good headed one but out of coat. The reserve bitch, Peggy Abu, is darker in eye, but loses in head and texture of coat to winners. Scotties, small class — the best of the lot Hughie McGraw, a very decent specimen with much better front than the others. Skyes, Bedlingtons and Welsh also small classes. We arrived too late to see the Airedales judged, and when we went to view them found that most of them had been released from the bench. Graystone Growler and Auckland Lucky Stone were placed winners and reserve, both pretty well. Mr. Perkins' promising puppy bitch, Mistress Ida, headed her classes right through. Beagles made quite a class, though we noticed the color of the eye in a number of them was very light. The winners dog, Yodeler, stood well out. He has grand substance and a nice dark eye, but is just a wee bit thick in skull. He was followed by Clifton Ranger, also a very nice hound, but outclassed. In bitches we were glad to see Mr. Smith's Welcome come out on top, she is a high class bitch and pretty well known by now. Only one Dachshund put in an appearance, a red, but blind in one eye and a stubbed tail. He was not a bad one in shape of head and body. Whippets and Toy dogs and Spaniels were also out in fair numbers and general quality was good. Dr. Niven's Aberdeen Duster was the only White West Highland Terrier.

The Whippet races on Saturday afternoon drew quite an enthusiastic crowd. In the final heat the awards were: 1, W. Anderson's Prince Albert; 2, S. Tovey's Steady Girl; 3, Dr. Campbell's Oakley Gay Dora. There is no possible doubt that the last bitch was the fastest on the track but she would persist in interfering with her competitors, and so lost the race. This bitch is also a typical

bench-show Whippet — generally the case with the fast ones.

We thank Mr. Swann and Mr. Tomlinson for reports on their classes.

MR. SWANN'S CLASSES.

Poodles were represented by Mrs. F. R. Williams' Ouida San Toy. This dog has improved beyond all recognition, and in his present form can make his mark in strong competition.

Toy Spaniels were a very nice collection. The novice class contained five, the fight for premier honors being between Mrs. J. Scott's Parkview Premier and Mrs. E. V. Babcock's Braeside Fairy, which after a close scrutiny were placed as written. The winner, a promising young Ruby, whilst he could be improved before the eyes, is a real good all round specimen. Braeside Fairy, a tri-color, is just now in the "leg and wing stage," in anything but show form. She has good skull and face for her sex, whilst her under-jaw is excellent. Age should work wonders for her. The foregoing are certainly a pair of fine Canadian breds and show a great improvement in our breeding operations. There was not much between the remaining three, neither being up to average stamp.

Open dogs and bitches, Ruby and Prince Charles, 1st a repeat; 2nd Parkview Floss, an attractive tri-color, on the large side and more promising as a breeder than as an aspirant for bench honors.

Open dogs and bitches, Blenheims, Mrs. J. Scott's brace, The Planet and Miss Comet were alone. Ch. Merry Lees Rip competed for specials only, and whilst he easily annexed that for best Ruby I had no hesitation in putting The Planet over him for that of any color. The former is well known to all show goers as one of the best that ever crossed "the pond," and in his variety is about on top. The Planet scores over the old warrior in dome, fore-face and flatness of coat, and whilst he could be improved in forelegs he pulled a lot in movement on the day, and is undoubtedly a phenomenal Blenheim. Miss Comet, Mrs. J. Scott's, a fine quality bitch with the spot, she could carry more flesh with advantage, but easily annexed the special for best of her sex.

Pomeranians were not by any means strong, the competition being confined to four exhibits all owned by Dr. G. B. Foster. King William, a fair head-

ed and eared black, with good plume, appeared somewhat long in body, whilst Dragon Fly II. certainly does not do credit to his high lineage. Orange Sabie is the essence of Pom. quality, and right well she looked.

Schipperkes, J. & D. Cochran's Ch. Seestu Lass looking in fine form, though somewhat heavy, had a walk-over.

Children's class: This most popular English event has not yet "caught on," and, like many of our exhibits, only wants time to make one of the attractions of our show. Master Howarth Sinclair on this particular occasion enjoyed a walkover with a good Yorkshire Terrier in Church Hill Pansy. Bert Swann, Judge.

MR. TOMLINSON'S CLASSES.

Cockers: Only a fair number, owing to the laws of dogs at present. Mr. Harold Dymont, of Barrie, was present as usual with his string of fine Cockers, and was awarded most of the prizes. Brookdale Silver won through in her class and won the gold medal for best puppy of any breed. She is a high class Cocker and ought to be heard from in the future. Puppy dogs were few in entry. Mr. E. D'Orsay's Empire Billiken winning first. He is a nice little Cocker, low, with good bone, good head and ears well placed, a little out in front, but that will improve with age. He is the type of a grand stud dog. Oliver Flett's Brooklyn Hero is a clean cut little Cocker, but is a little long in the legs and will also improve with age. Open dogs, black, Joe Hill won first, also special for best black Cocker in the show. He is in better shape than ever and is holding along well with the younger Cockers. This dog is well known among fanciers. Puppy bitches, Brookdale Silver 1st, Brookdale Jewel winning 2nd, is a nice bitch, with good front and body and nice head. Flora McDonald, 3rd, good cobby bitch, good legs, good head but a little fine in the muzzle, might have a smoother coat, but will be heard from again. Junior bitches, Brookdale Silver 1st, Brookdale Jewel 2nd, Lady Felto 3rd, has good bone, a little tall to be a classical Cocker. Novice bitches, black, Brookdale Blossom 1st, was shown in good condition, is a shade fine, but a pretty good all round Cocker. Lady Felto 2nd; Hazelwood Beauty 3rd. Limit bitches, black, Minnie Brooks

1st, a nice headed bitch, a trifle wide in front and not too good a mover. Brookdale Blossom 2nd, Lady Felto 3rd. Open bitches, black, Minnie Brooks 1st, Brookdale Blossom 2nd, Lady Felto 3rd. Novice dogs, other than black, 1st, Empire Billiken, 2nd Bell-Boy. Limit dogs, any solid color other than black, 1st Brookdale Bonfire, a little fine in muzzle, otherwise a nice Cocker; 2nd, Brookdale Toby, a little long in body, otherwise nice dog; 3, Sandstone, a nice Cocker, but eyes are a little too prominent. Open dogs, any other solid color than black, 1st, Brookdale Bonfire; 2nd, Sandstone; 3rd, Brooklyn Hero. Novice bitches, other than black, 1st, Brooklyn Trixie; 2nd, Minoru. Limit bitches, other than black, 1st, Brookdale Silver; 2nd, Brookdale Dolly; 3rd, Red Nellie. The last one has good body legs and head, but shown in poor condition. Other three classes were repeats.

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CALGARY DOG SHOW.

NUMBER OF POINTS, 3.

The Calgary Dog Show, so far the only one in Alberta that at all sizes up with other places, has again come and gone. The dogs, as a whole, could be improved in general quality, but we see good stuff in spots, filled out in numbers by too much moderate material. The St. Bernards were about the same as of yore only fair. In Russian Wolfhounds there was a decided advance, some of those not in the money being shown very fit. The one class of open dogs and bitches numbered 12. The winning dog is more on the English type, but the second resembles more the type that came in in America with Bistri and Sorva, etc. There was Valley Farm blood in several, but nothing of startling merit. Deerhounds were useful, but on the small side. Only one neat Greyhound appeared. Some years we have had a dozen.

English Setters have fallen off in numbers. There is not much to remark here except that Mr. Winter brought out the best dog he has yet bred, viz., Winter's Sport, that went over all the rest and is quite a nice one. The only other one of any class was Saskatchewan Peter, but he was shown too fat and out of trim. In Irish Setters, Dash H. was away ahead of the only bitch, Belmont Nell, light in eye and rather plain in head. Gordons, only one, a very moderate one. Pointers were more numerous. A likely puppy is Shot, a black and white one. He is lathy and long at present, but will improve. In open dogs the puppy won again with a promising puppy, also black and white,

too much cut out before the eye, second. Old Dina won in bitches, with two or three nice ones behind her. As a whole the bitches were more symmetrical than the dogs. Chesapeakes were fairly well represented, but in this breed we need more quality all through. Irish Water Spaniels were rather a nice lot, the winner, Nora O'Brien, that hails from Winnipeg, is quite a nice one.

Cockers were one of the most numerous divisions of the show, and some previous decisions were upset, and several of the best made had to retire for being over weight. The winning dog, a black, Crystal S., is a very neat little dog that will last. The judge preferred the small ones but he passed one into the money that was very poor in front. In bitches, a neat red, Cherry, won out and took special for best Cocker. She was second last year to Tinker, left out in the cold this year, and her brother, last year's winner in dogs, has grown too heavy.

Collies are usually numerous. In puppies a very moderate dog, Glenogle Chieftain, pulled in ahead; light in eye and poor in expression. The second, Mugsey, might have won, we thought, rather easily, but his owner did not ride to win and let him lag. The novice dogs were not startling. The winner leans too much to the Borzoi, though fine in body and coat, and the second is the opposite and on the strong side, but a Collie, Holyrood Professor, looking well, had an easy win in open. Quite a smart bitch puppy, a home bred one, pulled in first with a good bodied one in

Imera Lass, light in eye, second. Braemar Daisy won again in novice, followed by Western Suffragette, too fine and weak in head, but neat in body, and with lots of bone. In open bitches, Braemar Violette, a big bitch in good order by Ormskirk Foxhall, won easily. She, however, could be stronger in eye color, but has a nice head, size, coat, ears, and is a good shower. Braemar Daisy was second and a good sort, full of Piccolo blood, reserve, beaten by Weston Suffragette, in our opinion not nearly as useful a sort to go on with. One neat bearded, the right sort and color, though lacking in foreface, was alone.

Bulldogs have improved vastly in numbers and appearance. The dog puppies are bulldogs, the winner, nice in body and bone and sound, fails rather in lay back. In open dogs last year's winner, Hester's Billie won. He is not a big dog but with a phenomenally large skull, short body and good bone. He lacks wrinkle, but is better in front of the eye than the second. Nuthurst Surprise, that was fancied by many. He is a lovely color and a taking dog, but is not as massive in head and is much wider in skull in proportion to his foreface and not as nice behind. The bitches, though not perhaps containing a \$5,000 specimen, were a most creditable lot for this far out, and some of those not in the money were more than useful. Crescentwood Nora, the winner in novices, fails mostly in feet and might have been displaced by Butternut, a very smooth fawn. Avonmuir Lady won well in open with previous winners in the same order. Bull Terriers, though fairly numerous, were not remarkable.

Boston Terriers, far better than one would expect. The judge, we believe

recently from England, might possibly have turned these over to his partner, Mr. Rolston, who is a breeder of them. In open dogs the winner is good in body but round in skull and quite the poorest choice of the three for first. The others are of different type. Caspar, second, is a trappy light weight of Terrier type that might have won, though the third, Dandy Hooker, is most typical in skull for motion and a neat one. The winning bitch, Substitute, is typical but bossy in shoulder and rather fat. We liked Parkhurst Nan for first place and the others might have changed around.

Smooth Fox Terriers: A very neat white dog puppy in The Great McEwan won out. He is by Sabine Regent. Second, Whinstone Whirlwind, younger and by the same dog, that will do better later. In open dogs, Sabine Regent, though showing age, had it over the others and should have been followed home by The Great McEwan, his son, but he was third to a very moderate dog, Togo III., weak in skull, light in eye, stilty and failing in coat. Novice bitches, not too strong, the same may be said of open bitches.

Wires were not so numerous, but contained one nice one in Wee McGregor, hard in coat, in fact a grand coat, good flat head, dark eye and Terrier character. How this dog was beaten for the special by the bitch, Learmont Venom, we do not understand except that it was dark, too dark, when these were judged for the judge to see them well. Irish Terriers just useful. Scotties, only two, but pretty good.

Pomeranians, better than last year. The first is quite a nice white of large eye, and the second a diminutive brown out of coat. The first beat the other large white in character, smaller, better color of eye and smallness and set of ear, etc.

There was only one Airedale worth remarking on, viz., Lakeside Monarch, by Briar Test, a big husky, flat skulled dog that showed considerable character.

Three King Charles, the winner, Peggy, coming in first rather easily.

In Miscellaneous there was nothing remarkable.

Irish Wolfhounds were nine. These are fine dogs when good, but the class can be improved and probably will be. The winner, Tim, was the sound-

est, but would have had to give way to Moira Emmett or Mitre Emmett had they been better behind. Moira Emmett is the finest specimen benched but does not travel right behind. The Coyote hounds were a case of "you pays your money and you takes your choice."

Taken all in all dogs are coming along, but are not advancing at the speed, i.e., as to general quality, that is evident in other lines of live stock in Alberta, but as dogs are somewhat of a luxury. They may arrive later when we have more superfluous cash to throw about. Some breeds are doing better than others.

One thing we may congratulate ourselves upon is that some of the best shown were bred by their owners and won well, and this was the case in English Setters, Fox Terriers, Bulldogs, Collies, Pointers and Cocker. Some of these breeders are later going to shine with a stronger light for the dog fancy is in its infancy in Alberta. E. N. B.
