NOTES AND COMMENTS

Rabies in Ontario: In several instances we have advised a judicial coolness under the present unliked embargo. That the end is in sight is plain. We need hardly go into the rights and wrongs of the case here. The powers that be said "embargo," "muzzling," and the wisest course and the one leading to the earliest removal was a universal compliance with official orders. We can look back now and see this plainly.

A special despatch from Ottawa to the *Toronto Globe*, a paper that all through has been more or less one-sided, states the present status of the rabies embargo in very fair light, coming as it does from the recognized official organ of the Government.

It was as follows:

Ottawa, Aug. 7. — Sirius, the Dog Star, is now the morning star in the Eastern heavens. These are the dog days, and, according to popular opinion, the season of the year when heat-pestered canines go mad. But the statistics of the Health of Animals Branch of the Department of Agriculture shows that this is a popular fallacy.

Epidemic Almost Over.

The epidemic of rabies, which assumed serious proportions in Ontario last January, raged throughout the winter and necessitated the passing of the order in Council compelling the muzzling of dogs from Toronto west, is now almost a thing of the past, thanks to the drastic but effective measures adopted by the authorities. In February last there were no fewer than seventy-four premises and twelve counties of western Ontario under quarantine for rabies. To-day, in dog-days season, there are only five premises under quarantine, with only three coun-

ties, Perth, Middlesex and Welland, affected. As soon as the period of incubation for the disease, which varies from twenty days to three months, is passed, and provided that no further cases are reported, the authorities will feel free to rescind the present regulations requiring the muzzling of all dogs in the proscribed district.

Only One Death.

Since the first case of the disease was reported in May, 1907, there have been no fewer than 481 cases reported, with consequent quarantine of the premises. The area of infection has included twenty-two counties, covering practically the whole of western Ontario. Over one hundred persons have been obliged to take the Pasteur treatment, but, luckily, only one death from hydrophobia — that at Hamilton last winter — resulted. As a consequence, however, of the public scare, several thousand dogs have summarily disappeared.

A Blessing in Disguise.

It is stated at the Veterinary-General's Department that in Toronto alone there are now nearly three thousand fewer dogs than there were six months ago. Only the good have survived. From this standpoint, therefore, the mad dog scare has been a blessing in disguise. The mortality amongst farm animals through being infected by the bites of mad dogs has been 147, including four horses, 84 cattle, 26 sheep, and 33 swine.

The serious proportions which the outbreak rapidly assumed last winter may be gauged from the following figures: — In January, 41 premises in seven counties were quarantined; in February, 74 premises in twelve counties were quarantined; in March, after the muzzling regulations came into

force, 63 premises in thirteen counties were quarantined.

To Be on the Safe Side.

The remedial effects of the department's action requiring the muzzling of all dogs are shown by the following figures: — In April, 31 premises were quarantined in ten counties; in May, 30 premises in seven counties; in June, 31 premises in eight counties, and last month only five premises in three counties.

As has been stated above, to be on the safe side the authorities intend to keep the muzzling regulations in force for some time yet. One infected dog unmuzzled escaping from the infected district might easily undo a large part of the good that has been accomplished during the past three months by the enforcement of the regulations.

One Dog's Work.

It may be noted that the whole of the present outbreak was due to a dog that crossed the Suspension Bridge at Queenston from the State of New York in May of 1907, and before returning inoculated several Canadian dogs in the vicinity. That year there were eighteen cases reported in Welland and Lincoln counties. In 1908 there were forty-two reported in the seven adjacent counties, and in 1909 there were 146 cases reported through different parts of western Ontario. The period of inoculation is usually from three to five weeks, but the records of the department show that it may be as long as three or four months. One case was reported recently from Minnedosa, Manitoba, and investigation showed that the dog had come from one of the infected Ontario districts over three months before.

C. N. A. show: It will hit the Toronto Show hard. For this year the big Canadian National Show must rank as a "local," no outside dogs

being permitted entry. Superintendent Jacobi tells us that on July 25th he received a letter from Ottawa which will prevent them taking entries from east of Toronto or from the U. S. As a matter of fact, the authorities at Ottawa are greatly against the holding of a dog show at all, even a local one. Little things like this, however, only tend to enthuse Queen City fanciers, and special attractions are being offered to bring out every dog of quality that can be legally entered.

* * *

Poor Toby!: The recent muzzling order has increased to a great degree the death rate among dogs in Toronto if the figures of the license office can be used in support of this theory. From January 1 until July 27, 1909, the number of dog licenses issued was 8,027. For the same time this year it is only 5,377.

* * *

Circus dogs cause trouble: While on this subject we may as well clean it up. As showing how far reaching the embargo is, one Ernest Haag, proprietor of the Haag show, was fined \$100 and costs at the Peterboro police court on July 23rd. He was found guilty of an offense against the animals contagious disease act. He violated the laws when he brought five performing dogs from Orillia to Peterboro. The former town is under quarantine and Peterboro is not an infected district.

* * *

The other side: A correspondent whose opinion we greatly value pooh-poohs the whole thing and suggests that Ontario dog owners haven't as much fight as their canine charges. He says he has been looking for some word of condemnation of the "mad dog farce," and hasn't found it.

Then he hits poor puss and asks pointedly, what about cats? "Stamp it out by quarantine of dogs while cats roam undisturbed? What rot!"

There is, of course, injustice in the whole affair. But then is it better to bear it calmly and so get relief from it promptly, or to put up a futile half-hearted fight and be beaten in the end? We opine to the former.

If there is such a disease as rabies, and allowing that there is, and that it can be scientifically identified, then rabies existed in certain parts of the Province of Ontario. Of this there can be no question.

Dogs as property: In June C. K. Gazette we published the report of a case where a dog had been maliciously destroyed and where fairly commensurate damages had been awarded. We stated at the time that we thought this legal decision had made a precedent in Ontario. On referring the matter later to Mr. McFarland, Hon. Solicitor to the C. K. C., he confirmed this opinion.

In another part of Canada another case somewhat, though not altogether similar, is pending. It is reported as follows:

Halifax, N.S., July 26.—The rights of dogs on the public highways of Nova Scotia will be tested by an action just brought by Judge Meagher, of the Supreme Court. The judge had a favorite dog which was run over and killed by an automobile driver near this city, and he is suing for \$100 damages. The accident happened on the Bedford Road, and the action is brought against Bishop brothers, of Canning, the owners of the car.

Immediately the case was reported to us we placed the evidence in the case reported in our June issue in Judge Meagher's hands and hope to hear from him that he has been able to fight to a successful issue the one now recorded.

Weaselle: Our front page picture this month depicts the wire Fox Terrier bitch Trewanta Weaselle, owned by Mr. Reginald Hanson, Victoria, B.C. The picture shows her with her every day clothes on, a bit in the rough, as one might expect from such a famous vermin killer — rats, for choice — of which she is an inveterate hater and hunter. The photo shows the bitch's good head and excellent straight front.

She is essentially a Terrier, a worker, and has consistently been shown in practically natural condition, neither shaved nor clipped. Her winnings include the following: 1st puppy, 1st limit, 1st open winners, Vancouver, 1907; 1st puppy, 1st novice, 1st open and winners, Victoria, 1907; 3rd limit, 3rd open, Vancouver, 1908; 2nd limit, 2nd open, res. winners, Victoria, 1908; 2nd limit, 2nd open, res. winners, New Westminster, 1907; 2nd limit and open, res. winners, B.C. Fox Terrier Club, 1907; 3rd limit, 3rd open, Vancouver, 1909; 3rd limit, 3rd open, Vancouver, 1910; 2nd limit, 2nd open, res. win-

ners, Victoria, 1910; 2nd open, Duncan, 1909.

Weaselle, though a rough looking beauty, is of the bluest blood, her sire being Tori, by the famous Ch. Briar Cackler; her dam, Peggy, by the no less famous Dusky Admiral.

Mr. Hanson is an ardent admirer of the wire hair, but wants dogs that work as well as win, as most westerners do. In addition to membership in the Canadian Kennel Club he is also a member of the British Columbia Fox Terrier Club, the Victoria Terrier Club and the Victoria City Kennel Club.

Mrs. Gordon imports: It was hardly to be expected that such an enthusiastic Collie fancier as Mrs. Gordon, of the King Edward Kennels, Toronto, would return to Canada from an extended visit to Britain and not have somewhere in her train a "Coolie" or two.

Seedley Style, the new dog of the pair brought over is a big sable and white by Parbold Prior, by Anfield Model. His dam is Tynewold Gloria, by Southport Student, out of a Squire of Tyttton bitch. He is just two years old and right in his prime. His breeder is Mr. Hugo Ainscough. He won at Stratford, when only a puppy, going right through his classes and taking the cup for best puppy, any breed, in the show. At the recent T. K. C. show he went through to winners, taking also the special for best dog in the show. And this when dead out of coat. His companion on the journey is Seedley Splendour, of Mr. R. A. Lord's breeding. She is by Seedley Superior that goes back to Squire of Tyttton. Her dam is Seedley Specie by Parbold Peacock, ex. Sweet Mary, by Parbold Pierott.

Also a sable and white, she has been shown extensively, taking high honors at the Collie Club Show, Bayswater, Manchester, Preston, L. K. A., and other noted fixtures. She equalled Style's win at Toronto, going right through and taking special for best bitch in show.

We congratulate Mrs. Gordon on the purchase of such a grand brace and hope to see them in full bloom at some of our later shows.

In addition to these Mrs. Gordon while in England, became enamoured with the quaint little Pekingese and had to have one as a house pet. This is the little sable bitch Princess Pops

by Pekin Chang ex. Pops O' Pekin. Mrs. S. Slack, of London, is the breeder, and the mite is just six months old.

Brantford Bostons: Mr. T. A. Barr, Brantford, reports a large litter, eight, from his Boston Lady Brant. They are a healthy, strong lot and a credit to their sire, Carrs Tags.

RE "BULLDOGS AT BUFFALO."

C. on July 11, so allowing just eleven days, without further notification to me, they cleared the whole matter off their slate on June 22. Would this not constitute a record? Comment is hardly necessary, it is too transparent. As for my neglect, besides my own affairs, you are aware that I had on my shoulders at this exact time the whole work practically unaided, of the Toronto Kennel Club Annual Bench Show held July 1st, including the entire make up of premium list, catalogue, printing, etc.,

taking all my spare time day and night. As I wished to give this letter from A. K. C. a proper and well considered answer, I put it off until after the show, and in the first week of July I sent an answer giving details of railway expenses, etc., for myself and informant at meeting of trial board in New York. DISMISSED CHARGES AGAINST DR. DeMUND AND MR. A.

ALBRIGHT, JR.

In the decision of the trial board appointed to investigate the charges made by one Dr. Alfred Boulton, of Canada, against Dr. J. E. DeMund and Mr. A. Albright, Jr., finding them entirely innocent of the accusations against them, it was mentioned that a letter was written by the secretary of the American Kennel Club on June 9 to Dr. Boulton, requesting a statement, and that up to June 22 no reply had been received. On July 7 the following letter was received, and on July 8 the answer given below was returned:

Toronto, July 7, 1910.

A. P. Vredenburg, Esq., Secretary
American Kennel Club, New York.

Dear Sir,—In answer to a letter from Mr. B. S. Smith, chairman of the trial board, dated June 9, re my article, "Bulldogs in Buffalo," let me first take exception to two words used, namely, "malicious" and "charges." I have never made any charges against anyone concerned in the matter. As to "malicious," I have never had any

dealings, communication or conversation, directly or indirectly, with Mr. Albright or Dr. DeMund. I am interested in neither of them nor am I in any way interested in this investigation or in the result of it, except broadly with the hope that the kennel world may be benefited.

However, both myself and the gentleman who is my informant, are willing to aid the American Kennel Club in any investigation. We are willing to attend any meeting you decide to take the matter up at. We only ask that meeting be held on either Monday or Tuesday, that we get three weeks' notice, and that our expenses are paid. To avoid any misunderstanding of expense item, our railway fare would be \$22.35 each, sleeper or Pullman, \$5 each, or \$27.35 each. To cover all other expenses, such as hotel and meals en route, we would fix the definite sum of \$10 each per day, or part of day we are away from Toronto. Should you, however, arrange your meeting so that we could leave here on the evening train, and leave New York again next evening, we would make our expense account for hotel, etc., \$25 each. So that if the American Kennel Club sees fit to send up a charge for \$52.35 each we will attend.

Under no circumstances will we submit our evidence in the form of affidavits. Sincerely yours,

In July issue in the report of Calgary Show the number of dogs benched was omitted. There were 201. This counts 3 points towards a championship.

WINNIPEG DOG SHOW.

NO. OF DOGS 347, NO. OF POINTS 5. THE BANNER SHOW OF THE WEST. AN INCREASE OF 20 DOGS BENCHED OVER LAST YEAR.

Winnipeg, 1909, show was considered by all who attended it a huge success for the West, but it was far surpassed by the 1910 show held in July. There was an increase of 20 dogs benched over last year despite the fact that the embargo in Ontario prevented many an eastern dog from taking the trip and that 16 dogs entered from North Dakota, for some unknown reason, did not put in an appearance.

The show was moved to a better location than last year. The building was a suitable one for such a purpose as a dog show, there was plenty of room and the ventilation was good. Behind the building was a big, open air exercising ring, which was an invaluable asset before the show was over, for only those that have been there know how hot July in Winnipeg can get. The dogs were well looked after. Supt. Elmes and his assistants, Messrs. Milner and Fletcher, taking good care of the feeding, watering and welfare of the dogs. Mr. H. G. Spurgeon, chairman of the dog show committee, was always on hand, and his welcome was much appreciated by the visiting exhibitors.

Mr. Jas. Mortimer, of Hempstead, L. I., placed all the awards with satisfaction to exhibitors, and we were indebted to him for the following report of the exhibits themselves.

St. Bernards, 11 entries: Rough coats and smooths competed together. F. and A. Stuart's Iron Duke, a month over the puppy age, was a good winner. He has a good head, correct smooth coat, and is handsomely marked. When fully matured he cannot help making history, as he is full of type and quite sound. Trusty, second, is a well made dog, on the small side, would be improved by head markings and shadings. In limit bitches a promising smooth puppy, by Champion Alta Guide, Princess Victoria, did not discredit her good breeding.

Great Danes, 4 entries, did not contain much after the winners, still Glenrock Hylas and Minerva Post, both harlequins, are almost a show in themselves, and it would be difficult to

find a better matched pair of their breed and color.

Newfoundlands, 1 entry, Nig, an excellent specimen, having size, coat, conformation and character. His worst fault is his age, eight years.

Russian Wolfhounds, 33 entries. Here we had a wonderful display of quality and substance, and at least seven could be selected that would puzzle any owner in the east to match. Oden of Roseau, first in winners dogs, is a grandly proportioned hound, with the best of shoulders, legs and feet, deep chest and wonderful loin and hind-quarters. The reserve dog, Genest of Roseau, is a shade cleaner in head than the winner, but loses a little in substance, depth of chest and hind-quarters. The winning bitch, Bazar, is full of quality, a bit on the small side and light in eye, but beautifully shaped all over. Thelma, reserve, was badly out of coat, to which she owed her defeat as she is a size larger than the winner and quite as good in conformation.

Irish Wolfhounds, three entries, the only one to put in an appearance that showed anything like type was Denny Hogan, but he lacks size, and third was as much as, or more than, he deserved.

Deerhounds, 16 entries, were a big lot in both senses, several of them more on the Irish Wolfhound order than we are accustomed to associate with Deerhound formation. However, it was easy to select several of the proper type, and in Benjamin, Wolf and Fly, placed as written, we found three very good exponents of their breed.

Bloodhounds and American Foxhounds were not up to their show form, and awards in these breeds were withheld.

Greyhounds, 2 entries, were useful. The winner, Snider, is a white and black dog, nice neck, shoulder and front, a lengthy, well-turned loin and good hindquarters.

Pointers, 45 entries, were a classy lot, most of them in hard flesh and muscle and evidently kept for work. Prince Cash and King Cash, father

and son, first and reserve in winners, resemble each other very much, the latter being the cleaner in shoulders and front, but losing to his sire in depth of chest and spring of rib. Both are high strung, gamey looking dogs with that sensible expression that always denotes high breeding and intelligence. Rodonda Prairie Queen, back of her head, is a model in conformation, but her head is too masculine for one of her sex. Sue Pearlstone is a very handsome bitch, losing slightly in substance and a bit light in eye. Most of the Pointers are descendants of that celebrated field trial winner, Hard Cash, whose wonderful record is a matter of history. While on the subject of pointers we cannot miss the opportunity of recording our gratitude to Mr. Thomas Johnson of Winnipeg for a sight of his wonderful little Champion Manitoba Rapp, winner of first in the Eastern Field Trial Club All Aged stake, and the National championship in 1909. Manitoba Frank, Manitoba Drake, and others, all of which are quite up to the highest bench show form. An oil painting of Champion Manitoba Rap, by that well known artist, G. Muss-Arnolt, was on exhibition in the show window of one of Winnipeg's leading establishments, which is quite one of the best and most life-like productions that he has ever accomplished.

English Setters, 57 entries: While there was nothing in the large number present that would be considered really high class from a bench show point of view, there was a very good average of clean necks and shoulders, good bodies and excellent legs and feet, and very fair heads. The winning puppy, Winter Sport, is by Cole's Black Prince, and will make more than a useful dog. In novice dogs the order was Fairplay first, Manitoba Jim second, Lanark Tony third, and Prince Whitestone's Heir reserve. The first and second dogs were by Count Whitestone and Champion Whitestone respectively; the third by Lanark Lad, and the reserve by Prince Whitestone, so it will be readily seen that the field trial strain was well represented.

The winner in the limit, open and winners dog class was Gleam's Count Whitestone, also by Count Whitestone. This is a very beautiful setter, standing clear away from most of his rivals, a white and lemon-ticked dog with a charmingly dark eye and lovely expression, clean neck and shoulders, the best of legs and feet, deep chest, good loin and hind quarters and nicely carried short stern. He moves with life and energy when in action, and when standing makes such a beautiful pose that one would imagine a Ben Lewis had been his handler. I do not say he can beat all our best show dogs, but I do say if field trial men can put such dogs in our shows the silly talk about bench show type and field trial type would soon be unheard. However, Gleam's Count Whitestone was first in winners; Fairplay reserve. Bitches were headed by Lady Whaler and Winoga has reserve. Unfortunately the weaker sex were at a disadvantage when compared with the dogs.

Irish Setters, 6 entries: These were very moderate, the winner, Ginger, is a well put up dog, a bit heavy in skull, but with a nice lookout, a sound dog on the coarse side, shown poorly.

Gordon Setters, 1 entry, awards withheld.

Dalmatians, 3 entries, the best of which was the Montreal dog, Perfect Bond, but his condition of skin and coat was bad and he had to give way to the undersized but nicely marked Lady Beauty.

Irish Water Spaniels, 8 entries, the best of which was Ross, a dog of good size and substance, nice coat and top-knot, although a bit faded in color.

Retrievers, 1 entry, awards withheld.

Cocker Spaniels, 71 entries, a large entry, fairly representative. Most of the winners from the east. In puppies, dogs and bitches, first to the black dog Rockfield Riot, second to Brookdale Silver, a nice little buff colored bitch, quite out of coat and feather. In the novice class, black, both sexes, first to Ottawa Iona, a very nice one, second to the puppy winner, and third to Pellimderf Rowena, exhibited by my old friend, Fred T. Miller, who is prospering in Winnipeg. In the corresponding limit class, first to the Ottawa bitch, second to Brookdale Blossom, shown by H. M. Dymont, third to R. Riot and reserve to Mr. Miller's

bitch that was third in the preceding class. The winner of second is a very nice bitch, but suffering from the heat she would not show. Rockfield Riot continued her winning career in open dogs, black, with Little Joker second, and Duke third. These were not high class but useful. Brookdale Blossom won for Mr. Dymont in open bitches, and in winners dogs, black, Rockfield Riot was first, while in bitches Ottawa Iona got away with the honors, with Brookdale Blossom reserve. Novice dogs and bitches, parti-color, Ottawa Romeo was first, Pellimderf Ruth second, and Pellimderf Rosie third. The winner is a good Cocker, fair head, good front, ribs and hindquarters; second is a pretty bitch, but too weak in face, and third I took to be a dog until the limit class came in when I discovered my mistake and had to rectify it. In this class Ottawa Romeo was again first and Pellimderf Rosie second; Cascade Ottawan a good little dog with great substance, was third. Black Stocking reserve, and Pellimderf Ruth dropped to very highly commended. These awards stood in the two open classes, also a winners other than black.

Collies, 73 entries, well-filled classes and fair quality all through. In puppy dogs, Coila Canny Chiel, all the way from Montreal, had an easy win. He has a beautiful type of head, nicely carried small ears and a good coat, but he wants making up in body and strengthening in hindquarters and hocks. There was nothing to give him trouble until he met Champion Holyrood Professor in the open class, and here his lack of development was his undoing. The winner is a big sound dog, with grand body, proper coat and a head very much above the average, nice ears and good expression. Weston King of Quality third, has much to recommend him, but was beaten in most essential points by those placed over him. He has a rather full eye and large ears, although the latter are very well carried, a good coat and much character. Braemar Daisy is a very pretty bitch puppy, but will always be too small. Novice bitches were headed by Weston Suffragette, a bitch of good size but dead out of coat and a bit light in front of the eye. Braemar Violetta won in limit bitches, a big sound bitch with a long flat skull and good ears, but a

trifle pig-jawed. This fault placed her below Coila Spaewife in the open and winners classes.

Old English Sheepdogs, 17 entries, the best of these were C. Hatfield's Joe Chamberlain, now C. Castle's Rayleigh Dealer, E. Davidson's Sir Bruin and C. Hatfield's Nell Gwynne in the order written. Neither of them were put down in what we consider show form, but each of them is a good hob-tail with plenty of size and proper type.

Poodles, 6 entries, do not call for any special mention.

Bulldogs, 48 entries, were much larger classes than one would have expected, and some very useful specimens were shown. I have always insisted on soundness, and the lack of this essential was the cause of the defeat of Mr. Moxam's Parkhurst Demon, whose very faulty hindquarters and hocks were a great handicap to an otherwise good Bulldog. The winning dog, Prince, is higher on the leg and longer in the back than I like, but he has a wonderful skull, deep stop, good eye, very small, neat ears, and a big nose, while his shoulders and front are much above the average. Lucky Bargee is a sound dog, with good layback and nice sweep of underjaw, but his whole headpiece is a trifle narrow. In lightweight dogs first prize went to Nut-hurst Surprise, who begins to show age, but has very good formation of face, big shoulders, well turned forearms, big ribs and good bone more than made up for his rather gay stern carriage. Hester's Billie was second, a big-skulled dog with good shoulder formation and nice bone but a bit plain in front of the eyes. Trafford Gangway, a good bodied, nice shouldered dog, was third, and but for his pinched nose might have done better. Bitches were headed by Parkhurst Empress, a good brindle, a trifle long in body, which we can forgive in one of her sex, lots of bone and substance, and the beau ideal of a brood bitch.

French Bulldogs, 5 entries, nothing extraordinary in this group.

Beagles, 1 entry, not a beagle.

Fox Terriers, 61 entries, a good lot and better in quality than is usually seen at any but our very best shows. Clapton Blue Rival, first in puppies, is a nice short backed dog with bone and substance, nice head, good shoulders and front, but might be improved in

pasterns and feet. The Great McEwan is a nice fronted puppy, wants a little more jaw power and a shorter back. The limit class brought out a good Terrier in Ingatstone Rustem, keen expression, nice outline, ribs and hind-quarters, with a hard-bitten "varminty" look that took my fancy immensely. He went through successfully to winners where his closest rival was Clapton Blue Blade, a good Terrier, a bit short in neck and going thick in shoulders; a couple of pounds off would greatly improve him. Novice bitches had Logan's Blossom in the lead, but her face will never be her fortune. In limit bitches Vesta Sutton was first, Harmony second and Oxford Frivolity third. The winner is a very sweet little bitch and a very nice size. Harmony was not looking her best, although a grand fronted bitch of nice character. The third bitch is good in front, nice short back a trifle short in face and large in ear. Others in this and the open class owe their lowly positions to an over-abundance of flesh. A Terrier should be shown hard in flesh and muscle. The wire division were few but good generally speaking. Donington Jack is a very promising puppy with a long punishing jaw, nice front and bone and good texture of coat. He went through to winners and will be heard of again although he had practically nothing to beat here of his own sex. The winning bitch Donington Courtty is a little gone in skull, but her nice size, good coat and intense character pulled her through, although she was rather uncomfortably pushed by the puppy Donington Dainty, a lovely bodied, good fronted young lady whose coat is not at its best.

Boston Terriers, 14 entries. The great American dog is omnipresent and his popularity is universal. Dandy Hooker, the winning dog is good in head, eye, color and markings, but he is faulty in front and light in his middle-piece. Parkhurst Nan was the best of the bunch, good head, nice body and stern and very evenly marked, shown a little too high in flesh but in beautiful coat and bloom. Judy, second, is a bit on the leg but a good sort. Lady Teazle, third, has a good body and front, but is a bit pinched in face; she has plenty of style and moves well. Parkhurst Girlie is a nice sort of bitch, but her body color is against her.

Irish Terriers, 22 entries, not a very high class lot in this group, although one or two can be pronounced fair. Red Bank Mixer, winner in the novice class is a bit coarse in skull and a size too large. His coat is good, color same, but there is a lack of quality about him. Colleen Bawn is inclined to be cheeky and full in eye, but she has quite some character to her, nice ears and very hard coat. Honey Boy, second in limit class, is a nice size and neat in make and shape but is too much on Fox Terrier lines. Earlstone Badger, first in open dogs and winners, wants a little more face and keener expression, still he is Irish and deserved his win.

Airedales, 15 entries, were very disappointing. Either too small or too big. The best of the lot was the bitch, Colne Lisna Remember, a July puppy that will improve.

Bull Terriers, 30 entries. Dogs were headed by Champion Haymarket Blazer, looking wonderfully well preserved for his age, a slight shrinking of his hind quarters being about the only noticeable change in him. Reserve to him was Bo'swain of Wonder, a good headed dog with a nicely-placed eye and lots of bone, but a bit long in back and loin. Rockcliffe Belle won in bitches with Red Bank Janet reserve, a nice bitch puppy born July, 1909, has a beautiful head but her bone is light and she is shelly in body, but it would be an oversight not to mention her.

A class of Pit Bull Terriers, 19 entries, were also on hand but I cannot work up any enthusiasm over such a class. Why not make a class of Bull Terriers other than white, then they could be judged on Bull Terrier lines.

Scottish Terriers, 25 entries. The best in the class was Colne Invasion, but she was in such bad coat that third was the position assigned her. Schelm, first, was put down in good condition and is a nice size. MacTavish, second, is a corky little dog, short in face and soft in coat. Mac, reserve, has lots of character but is much too large.

Dachshunde, 3 entries, the best of them unnamed, a real good little one with a good head, and perfectly sound.

Yorkshire Terriers, 4 entries, awards all withheld.

Black and Tan Terriers, 8 entries, a very nice lot indeed. The winning

dog, Willowdale Leader, has a beautiful front, body, stern and color, markings not quite distinct, and might be better in front of the eyes. Faultless Lady Quality is one of the nicest little bitches we have seen for some time, just beating West End Maiden in color of tan.

Skye Terriers, 1 entry, a very good specimen.

Welsh Terriers, 2 entries, Budge, better in head and front than Bess. Both are pretty well known in the east.

Whippets, 4 entries, quite good.

Pugs, 1 entry, a little plain in face, nice body and twist.

Pomeranians, 17 entries, made up of a lot of big and little ones, one or two nice specimens in the smaller sized ones, the best being Mr. Greenwood's Bess, a good little black, nice coat and sound color.

Toy Poodles, 4 entries, pretty little white Toys, the best of which was in bad coat, owing to maternal duties.

Toy Spaniels, 5 entries, contained but one decent specimen, H. H. Hester's Peggy.

Selling class, 8 entries, first to Donington Duke, a wire-haired Fox Terrier, too big, second to a Collie and third to another wire, nice size, but very faulty in shoulders and front. As this critique is written solely from memory, I trust I have done no injustice to any of the dogs mentioned.

that demands the exercise of a great deal of patience and observation, combined with firmness and natural resource. The symptoms in animals are of an objective nature, consequently, to become a good nurse of such it is necessary to be a keen observer, as the interpretation of one's observations are of great assistance in the elucidation of many of the maladies to which canine flesh is liable. The greater the experience the less positive one is likely to become, there being an individuality entering into canine pathology, which renders diagnosis less reliable than in the human subject. The temperament of the animal and the conditions under which it exists, always demand close consideration; they are, in fact, of prime importance. If a nurse is called to a kennel where distemper is prevalent, it is her duty to make notes concerning the number of dogs affected, ages, duration of illness, etc., and to adopt measures to curtail the spread of the malady — "Prevention being always better than cure."

The number of healthy dogs must also be noted, especially those puppies which have not already had distemper; in fact, the nurse should visit the healthy dogs before going to the diseased. She should take the temperature of all the dogs in the kennels, no matter whether exposed to infection or otherwise, and if any are found to have deviation from the normal temperature (101 to 102 F.), it will be advantageous to isolate all suspected cases. All puppies that have been in direct or indirect contact with the infected animals should have their temperatures taken for eight or ten consecutive days.

Being an infectious disease—and the channels of infection so varied—it is

TRAINED NURSES.

The trained nurse is one of the latest developments in connection with canine surgery, and will, without doubt, prove of particular value for nursing a valuable sick dog of some special favorite. In the event of an outbreak of distemper in a kennel of prize dogs, a trained nurse should constitute an almost indispensable auxiliary, and the fee for such services will generally be found to be most economical in the long run—it being impossible for the kennel attendant to wait upon sick and healthy dogs simultan-

ously; in fact, the adoption of this injudicious system was one of, if not the principal cause of the severe losses experienced in so many kennels. In London, and probably in many other cities, homes have been established for training young women as nurses in the science and art of canine surgery, analogous to the ordinary hospital nurse.

THE DUTIES OF A TRAINED NURSE.

The nursing of sick dogs is, even under the most favorable circumstances, a somewhat tedious business, and one

almost impossible for a nurse to be too particular in enforcing and adopting such measures as will practically annihilate the chances of its transference to other members of the same, or, it may be, other kennels. Visitors have, unwittingly, been known to transfer distemper from one kennel to another.

Isolation, disinfection and thorough cleanliness are contributory towards the eradication of this terrible scourge and allied diseases, such as parasite mange, etc.

The nurse must also administer the medicine prescribed by the veterinary surgeon, and rigidly adhere to all other instructions given by him. The preparation of food for a sick dog constitutes an important part of a nurse's duties, as also does the regular administration of such at regular intervals. She must see that the animal is combed and brushed and that it is kept on a clean bed of straw, and the temperature of the room suitable and equable. In addition to the foregoing, the nurse must, in cases of distemper, keep the eyes, nose and mouth in a cleanly condition, which can be done by sponging with a weak solution of permanganate of potash, or some other suitable antiseptic.

The excretory organs may also demand attention, so that if needful, it is the duty of the nurse to pass the catheter, give an enema, introduce a suppository, pessary, etc.

In pneumonia complications the nurse will probably be called upon to apply counter irritation, either in the form of hot water, mustard paste, linseed poultices, or some stimulating embrocation.

In parturition cases the nurse will be expected to render any help necessary under the guidance of professional skill, in addition to attending to the general comforts of the animal. In cases of accidents the nurse will be expected to dress the injury, in accordance with instructions from the professional adviser.

Where the life of a really valuable animal is concerned, the nurse should receive adequate recompense; a guinea and a half or two guineas with board, etc., will be a reasonable emolument.

THE KENNEL.

The introduction of portable kennels has done much towards increasing the comfort of dogs that are housed outdoors.

The span roof kennel is a particularly useful structure and exceedingly moderate in price. The lean-to is equally useful. If one keeps a yard-dog it is one's duty to see that the animal is comfortably housed, especially during the colder, wet seasons of the year. In my opinion it is exceedingly cruel to allow a dog to sleep outdoors without adequate accommodation and shelter. There should be reciprocity as regards protection between master and sentinel.

If permanent structures are desired, and the amount of ground to build such at one's disposal, then I consider that concrete is the best of all materials for the floor, walls, roof and runs. It is warm in winter and cool in summer, recommendations that are not possessed by nearly all other materials used for kennel building.

Surface drainage can be formed in the flooring when the concrete is laid.

Brick and stone are the next best materials for the walls, with either slate or tiles for the roof.

Bricks or asphalt cannot be recommended, the former being too porous and the latter too cold and too slippery in winter and too hot in summer.

There is an idea prevalent that the cheaper kennels are the most economical. This is quite fallacious, as many have, to their bitter disappointment, proved.

Successful dog raising depends—with few exceptions—upon the dryness, warmth and comfort of the kennel arrangements.

Cold or damp kennels will never prove to be a success; in fact, if suitable kennels cannot be provided, it is better to leave dog breeding to those that can do so. I do not refer to keeping two or three small dogs within a domestic circle, because these usually thrive all right under these circumstances.

A damp kennel predisposes the occupants to kennel lameness, and the assumption of a severe form of distemper if that malady happens to make its appearance. In placing the site for the kennels, endeavor to have the sunniest aspect, with the doors and windows facing south or south-west. Plenty of cubic air space, warmth, sunlight, dry bedding and benches, along with suitable and regular feeding, will go a long way towards successful dog rearing.

The size of the kennel and the run will depend upon the ground at one's disposal and the variety and number of dogs to be housed. The run should not be less than 6 feet long and 4 feet wide.

The sleeping apartment may be made five feet square, six feet high at the eaves, and 9 feet at the ridge, thus providing plenty of air space for such dogs as Retrievers, Collies, Borzois, etc.

Personally, I am in favor of the purchase of portable kennels, so that they are easily shifted when required, and equally capable of being set up with a minimum of trouble.

If Toy dogs are kept indoors, it is advisable to let them sleep on a straw bed in preference to cushions, etc., as that bedding keeps the coat in a much healthier state than rugs and cushions, though I am sorry to say that many ladies do not like their favorites living in a rational manner.

DISINFECTION.

At all seasons of the year, likewise during and subsequent to the appearance of such scourges as distemper, it is expedient to disinfect the kennel at regular intervals, and, at the same time, to lime-whiten the sleeping place if needful, though most portable kennels are painted inside the last named.

Disinfectants and deodorants are slightly different in their action. The

first named agents are capable of destroying the specific poisons of the various maladies, and in this manner prevent the spreading of such.

Deodorants destroy or neutralize obnoxious odors, though they do not necessarily prove destructive to micro-organisms. Antiseptics, on the other hand, are substances that arrest or prevent putrefactive processes.

Disinfectants must be brought into contact with the virus of disease in order to become effectual. A common method of disinfection of a kennel is by burning a sulphur candle, after removing the dogs and then shutting up the kennel.

Sulphurous acid gas is formed and this acts as an oxidising agent.

Flowers of sulphur can be used instead. All that one has to do is to throw a handful of sulphur on some hot coals contained on a shovel.

Formalin vapor is a very good disinfectant, so is Chlorine gas. Fluid disinfectants are the best for washing down floors and walls. There are numerous ones on the market. Permanganate of potash (about 1s. per pound) is a most useful deodorant, when a teaspoonful is added to a pailful of water.

A cheap deodorant is Copperas, and the solution for this purpose is made

by dissolving a handful in a pailful of hot water.

Oil of Eucalyptus and Carbolic Acid, also Corrosive Sublimate, Chinosal, etc., are very valuable for disinfection, only Carbolic and Corrosive Sublimate are both very poisonous, requiring careful usage.

An antiseptic oil for dressing wounds, etc., is as follows:—

Oil of Eucalyptus, 2 drachms; olive oil, 8 ounces. Mix. Apply with cotton wool and a bandage, if applicable.

For spraying kennels, dog hampers, boxes, collars, chains, etc., the following fluid will be found invaluable:

Oil of Eucalyptus, 1 ounce; Carbolic Acid, 1 ounce; Methylated Spirit, 1 pint. Mix, and spray with a spraying apparatus.

Boiling water is one of the best mediums that can be used for disinfection, and destroys nearly all germs and their spores. Steam acts in much the same manner.
