NOTES AND COMMENTS

St. Bernard sale: Mr. Bert Swann of St. Bernard fame advises us that among other sales he has sold his good St. Bernard bitch, Viola of Parkdale, to Mr. Harkness, the owner of Ch. Lochinvar. This bitch is now three years old and has a rather glowing record on the Canadian bench. She has taken winners the last four times shown, including the Canadian National this year, and now only lacks two points to complete her championship. Mr. Swann has some very promising puppies coming along in fine style.

C. K. C. Stud Book: An effort is being made by the C. K. C. Secretary with the authorities at Washington to have our Stud Book recognized for customs purposes. This is the case with the Stud Book of the Kennel Club, England, whose requirements for registration are not as exacting as those of the C. K. C. It is also the case with several continental clubs.

While in New York recently Mr. Donovan discussed this and other matters in detail with Mr. A. P. Vredenburg, the very efficient Secretary-Treasurer, and other officials of the A. K. C. The American Kennel Club is quite as desirous as we are to bring about the end in view, and we invite the help of our friends in the United States who know Washington, as well as those in Canada who have influence in Ottawa. The matter is an international one and must of necessity go through the usual procedure.

While on this subject we want to express our appreciation of the kindness of Mr. Vredenburg and his assistants in giving us the freedom of the A. K. C. office. The whole staff went to considerable trouble in showing us the various fying and record

systems in use, and we have seen none so complete and so simple. The present system has evolved as a work of time, necessity brought labor-saving devices into use, and the whole registration and winnings records are on a self-indexing card system that is unique. We hope to be able to adopt the greater part of it in the C. K. C. office where, owing to increasing work, some radical change has become a necessity.

Boston Bits: Moston Brant's services are growing in demand. Since Toronto Exhibition he has served three very good bitches and has a fourth one now in the kennel. He was sire of the winning puppy at the Canadian National Exhibition this year, and from the look of some of the stock he is getting he will no doubt have a number of winners in the course of another year.

Bull Terriers: A subscriber in Alberta writes:

1. Would you kindly state in some issue of Gazette, in what respect the Bull Terrier proper differs from the Pit Bull Terrier; 2, and if the latter is a dog bred especially for fighting; 3, also the respective weights at maturity of both, and oblige.

1. Briefly, the show Terrier is an all white dog built on substantial though handsome lines. Long, clean head and foreface are asked for. The pit dog may be any color, brindles and brindles-and-white are very common. He is not a show dog and does not look the gentleman that his show cousin does. His jaws and muscle may show more development than is allowable in the show dog. 2. Yes. 3. Practically all weights allowable. Classes divided

generally into light and heavy weights, with an occasional further division of medium weight.

Collie chat: Miss Florence Farwell, Toronto, who recently spent some little time in Chicago and neighborhood, kindly gives us a chatty account of her visit and her opinion on some of the Collies she saw. Miss Farewell writes:

I have just returned from a trip to Chicago, where I saw several of the Collie kennels round there, and was at the specialty show held on Oct. 1st, at Mountaineer Kennels. Among the dogs I saw was Mountaineer Magnet, and while he is a fine dog, if he and Seedley Style were to be judged together I fancy nine out of every ten would put him (Mountaineer Magnet) 2nd. I also went out to Washington, Dr. O. P. Bennett's (Parbold Prior's owner) kennel. He has some nice female puppies coming on and had a dog pup about ten months old which was a beautiful specimen and the pride of the Dr.'s heart. He asked me about Seedley Style and I told him his Rover was as near like him as one dog could be like another, and it would have been a fine sight to have seen the two dogs against each other, but that will never be, as Rover died on Saturday of gastritis.

All Collie lovers will sympathize with Dr. Bennett in his loss I am sure.

At Hectyville Kennels we saw some more good dogs and bitches. His Hectyville High is a very large dog, weighing some 70 lbs. when in coat. His Ch. Markton Marvellous is a beautiful lady, and there are a few puppies there which will do their owner credit.

It is well worth a trip out there to see the coat that Hectyville Hero carries in hot weather.

Show day was very pleasant. The judge, Mr. J. J. Behring, of Milwaukee,

saw only the dogs—not the owners, the exhibitors taking his decisions pleasantly, the losers trying to look pleasant and the winners wearing a broad smile. Some of them said they would come over to our National and show us some good dogs. I told them we would give them a hearty welcome and perhaps lead the procession of good dogs. They all expressed regret over the rabies trouble.

The dogs' value: We have again to record an acknowledgment that "our friend the dog" has value as a chattel, that he cannot be destroyed with impunity and that in case of wrongful destruction the dog's owner is entitled to recompense. Matters have changed in the last few years, when "a dog case" would simply be laughed out of court.

The killing occurred in Montreal, as recounted in the following, the Board of Control, on the advice of the city attorney, agreeing — and quite justly of course — to pay the owner's claim for loss.

"Among the claims ordered settled yesterday by the Board of Control was one for \$50 for the death of a valuable St. Bernard dog, falsely accused of having bitten an Italian boy named Giovanni Bellerosa. The boy was playing in the street, when a small dog gripped him on the hip. He went to the nearest police station with his complaint, and declares that he gave the name of the address as being 23 St. Antoine Street, but in some unaccountable way the address was entered in the police records as 23 Latour Street as the place where a vicious dog was kept. A notice was accordingly sent out ordering the dog's owner either to remove his dog from the city or destroy him. Domenico di Carlo protested to the police that his dog was not vicious, but the answer was that a complaint was entered against him and that he would have to comply with the law. The Italian, still having faith in his dog, which he had raised from a puppy, but having also the law against him, poisoned it. Later, when the mistake had been discovered, di Carlo entered a claim for \$200 against the city. After a thorough investigation, the city attorneys recommended the case be settled, and the Board of Control resolved to pay \$50 for the St. Bernard."

While this, of course, is not a case at law, it has a legal bearing in that it is an acknowledgment that the dog has a monetary value, in short, that he is property, and that his owner was entitled to payment for the loss of the dog.



ENDORSES MR. MILES.

Not being a member of the C. K. C., but a subscriber of the Gazette, and an exhibitor at shows held under the C. K. C. rules, I heartily endorse Mr. Jno. Miles' motion. Any person who has a puppy matured enough to enter in the limit or open classes ought to leave these dogs on the bench all through the show. There is nothing more disgusting to visitors coming to visit the shows than to see a lot of empty benches. A great many people that are not dog fanciers will come the last day of the show, and it is disappointing to see so many dogs taken home, and again it is very seldom the puppy dogs that come from a distance that are gone, it is mostly dogs owned in towns where the shows are held that are taken home. I think it would be a good idea to make it a rule that all dogs should be on the bench from noon to the close of the show on the last day of the show.

I am enclosing a snapshot of J. J. Jackson's bitch puppy Flossie, which went from puppy to winners at the last Vancouver Show. Flossie was then just 7 months old and was on the bench all through the show without any bad results. This snap shot was taken one month after the show. I have shown puppies at three and four shows in succession without any bad effects, others again I have taken to just one show and they have taken distemper after, but there are so many good remedies on the market that if a little care is taken can be easily cured. I had seven puppies under my charge at the last Vancouver show, and have not heard of one of them being sick after getting home. Respectfully yours,

VANCOUVER NOTES.

Classy dogs still keep making their appearance in Vancouver, the latest addition being a very fine Bulldog, Kroo Boy, imported by Marjorie St. Cleri from E. Treefall, England. Kroo Boy was only once exhibited in the old

country, being V. H. C. in a strong class at the Crystal Palace, where all the good ones meet. He is by the well known Mersey Pilot, and made a successful debut in this country by winning a few prizes at our last show. Miss St. Cleri has also purchased an excellent Bull bitch, which has not yet left England, but will be bred to one of the "Stone" dogs before being shipped to Vancouver. It is to be hoped that the puppies will be successfully reared as there is ample room here for this class.

Mr. N. McConnell has just received a good Airedale from Mr. Holland Buckley, of England, which has been named Vancouver Regent. He is only 12 months old and will be heard of later. This Terrier is by the famous sire Elruge Monarch, well known all over. Mr. McConnell is getting a strong kennel of Airedales together and can probably hold his own with any in the west. This ardent fancier informs me that he has another good one on the way from Montreal.

Mr. W. D. Bruce, who has been visiting all the principal shows in England, has purchased three very fine Terriers, one a bitch, which has been served by one of the English cracks, has whelped four puppies since arrival and bids to make things warm soon. There is also a wire Terrier, Marlo Muddler, which won 1st puppy at Sheffield last month with Geo. Raper and Chris. Houliker behind, so we can form a good idea what to expect before we see it. The other is a wire bitch, particulars not to hand yet. Mr. Bruce looks like leading the Terrier men a fine race. We shall probably see them all at the B. C. Fox Terrier Show shortly.

Swansea Ormonde Bristles has changed hands, and is now in the possession of Mr. J. Adams, the Waverley Hotel, of this city. Mr. Adams promptly despatched this Terrier to the country, where he intends to get this little dog fit for the forthcoming shows. So competition promises to be keen. Mr. Adams is practically a new fancier in the Terrier line, but intends having a strong kennel together and keeping only the best. We shall hear more anon.

Mr. Fred Dyke has purchased a most promising smooth puppy from me by Ormonde Bristles, which certainly will be heard of if he progresses the way he is going. Mr. Chalmers in-

forms me that he has some good stock which he is going to exhibit at our first show in the Terrier line.

The Vancouver fanciers are determined to out-do one another, and it seems the feeling that exists is tending to improve the stock all round. As things are going we shall be seeing a Southboro Saalex or something of that ilk next. Let us hope so anyhow.

NOTES FROM BRITISH COLUMBIA.

Just a few lines to let you know the dog game is still alive in British Columbia, though we have had the misfortune to lose some of our good ones of late. The most serious loss, perhaps, has fallen to the Pacific Cocker kennels, owned by Chas. Aetzel, of Vancouver. Since the show at the Exhibition he has lost twenty-two Cockers, among them Pacific Red Jacket, a very promising Cocker and perhaps one of the best reds of the present day. He had done a lot of winning, and was improving every day. Mr. Aetzel expected to send him over the road to all the spring shows. He feels the loss of Red Jacket very keenly, for he was the pride of the kennel. He lost some very promising puppies and has his new black bitch, which he bought from an Eastern breeder now down with little hopes of recovery.

Such old time breeders and judges as J. W. Creighton, of Victoria, B.C.; Roland G. Gamwell, of Bellingham, Wash.; Geo. Tinto., of Seattle, Wash., and Chas. Goodwin, of Victoria, B.C., pronounced Pacific Red Jacket a good one. Mr. Aetzel says they are not all dead yet, for he had over forty in his kennel when the distemper struck it, and that he will be on deck at the spring show with some more blue ribbon winners.

Mr. Melville C. Hamilton has also had the misfortune to lose two Fox Terriers. Some time ago he lost that grand Fox Terrier Leander Club, a Crystal Palace winner. Leander Club has done a lot to improve the Fox Terrier stock in British Columbia, for every Fox Terrier fancier who knew a Terrier at all used Leander Club, so the old dog has left some grand stock. Leander Club was imported from England by Mr. W. D. Bruce, whom Mr. Hamilton bought him from.

His other loss was the winning puppy bitch at our last show, Hasty. She

was not lost by death, but was picked up by some one who knew a good one.

Geo. Florance, of Victoria, lost some time ago Ch. Reverly, who was also a great sire and has done a lot in improving the Fox Terriers in this part of the country.

Then comes the news of H. P. D. Walker's loss, his good Fox Terrier, Sabine Regent, and The Great McEwen. This is pretty tough on Mr. Walker to lose the sire and also such a promising son. Sabine Regent was doing a lot to improve the Fox Terriers around Calgary. With all these good dogs gone it keeps us going to keep up the high standard of good Fox Terriers for which the West is noted. All these gentlemen who have lost their dogs are good sports and keen fanciers, so they will be buying or breeding just as good or better than the ones they lost.

Mr. W. D. Bruce, who is in England at present, cleaned up show after show with his new wire dog, sent out that grand prize winning smooth bitch, Camp Wee Woman, a perfect little gem. She was bred to the best smooth dog in England, and whelped on Sept. 18th four fine puppies, two dogs and two bitches. Mr. Bruce is also bringing out a wire dog, wire bitch, and a high class smooth dog.

Mr. Norman McConnell had Mr. Bruce buy for him and import that grand young Airedale Terrier, Killarney Sport, a dog of rare quality.

Mr. T. P. McConnell, of Victoria, has imported a fine brace of Pointers, the dog in particular is a very high class one, and no doubt will do a lot of winning.

J. S. Hickford has been making some very important sales of his English Setters. Mr. Harry W. Lacey, of Boston, got so attached to one of Mr. Hickford's young English Setters that he could not go east without it.

Another loss in the Fox Terrier line was Mr. Robert Large's good wire bitch, which had done a lot of winning for him. Mr. Large, who is making his home in Victoria at present, says he is on the hunt for another good one. You can't keep Robert down, he always has a cup or two to show after every show.

Mr. C. T. Hilton has imported a very fine smooth dog, Guterno, from England. He is an Oxonian bred one, only shown once in England in a class

of eighteen, and was 3rd, so he must have some class to do that. He will be shown at all the spring shows.

Mr. F. W. Welch imported from England a nice wire dog, Sunshine Badger, which went through to winners at our last show. So you see with all the new dogs we will have some very interesting shows this coming spring when the old winners, new dogs and the young stock coming on all meet there will be more doggie talk than ever.

Mr. T. M. McCauliffe has imported four very fine Pomeranians, which will hold their own in hot company.

Mrs. D. P. Gouge, of Nanaimo, had the misfortune to have lost or stolen a very fine white Pomeranian bitch at the Exhibition show here, for which she is offering a fifty dollar reward.

Mrs. Ellen Rousseau, of English Setter fame, has a very fine litter from her Setter bitch, Teddis, by Peerless Count, all sure prize winners.

Mr. Jack Adams has purchased Swansea Ormonde Bristles. All the Terrier fanciers will be pleased to know this grand little Terrier has fallen into the hands of such a good sport as Mr. Adams, who will show him to advantage at all the coming shows.

KENNEL GUIDE.

BY SPRATTS, LIMITED, LONDON, ENGLAND.

FOODS AND FEEDING.

(Continued from last issue.)

It is a most important matter for the public to know that sound flesh only is fit for the manufacture of dog biscuits, as there are certain diseases (e.g. Anthrax) that might be perpetuated, even though the flesh is baked, if meat had been derived from an infected carcass. The moral is, never purchase cheap dog biscuits on the score of economy, as such are detrimental for feeding purposes.

Biscuits have an advantage over many other foods as they can be given either dry or soaked, whole or crushed. Dry biscuits are recommended, as the dry food accelerates the salivary secretion and this in turn aids the conversion of the starchy constituents into diastase.

For many years the author has been a keen advocate for feeding dogs liberally on flesh, more particularly such dogs as are inclined to become eczematous.

In many Foxhound kennels it is customary to feed the hounds on horse flesh, oatmeal, and a small percentage of bran, but neither of the last named are, in my opinion, to be commended as staple foods, and have the additional disadvantage of requiring to be well cooked.

Instead of the oatmeal and the bran, I advocate the use of biscuit meal,

moistened, and mixed with minced raw flesh, direct from freshly killed "used up" horses.

Hounds can be fed just as cheaply on "Rodnim" as they can on oatmeal, and certainly more economically as regards Spratts Biscuit Meal, or else their Hound Meal, answers admirably for this purpose. It is estimated that it costs from 2s. 9d. to 3s. per week to keep each couple of Foxhounds, and this estimate is a tolerably accurate one.

Many dog owners feed their animals on boiled paunches and soaked stale bread, but if paunches are used, they should be cut up, and for preference mixed with "Rodnim" soaked in a little water, or water and milk, sheeps head broth, etc.

"Midget" Biscuits and "Ovals" are the latest developments of Spratts Patent, and their biscuits have arrived at such a stage of perfection as almost to be fit for a hungry man to eat.

The "Ovals" are baked to a turn — neither too hard nor too soft, so that any breed of dog can masticate this portable food.

I prefer to feed dogs on the "Ovals" in the dry state, and I have never known a healthy dog to refuse to eat them.

These little biscuits are about 1½ inches in length and an inch wide,

oval in shape, and convex on either side, breaking with the greatest of ease when pressed between the fingers.

Puppies find no difficulty in masticating them, and as a "snack" they are unsurpassable, in the kennel, home or field.

No matter what variety of dog, these "Ovals" or their Meat Fibrine Dog Cakes may be given for a morning feed, and Spratts Biscuit in the evening in quantities according to the size, age and condition of the dog.

It is impossible to lay down any fixed rule as to the quantity to be given to each dog per diem, so much depending upon the circumstances previously mentioned, together with the work (if any) the animal has to perform.

In the feeding of dogs it is important to bear in mind one fact and that is, that these animals like an occasional change of food, which is beneficial.

Fibo, Weetmeet, Rodnim, Fish Biscuits, boiled rice, can all be marshalled into the kennel menu so as to provide against satiety of any individual dog, whilst Spratts Midgets are invaluable for the smaller breeds of dogs.

These Midget biscuits are made in several varieties such as Fruit, Malt and Cod Liver Oil, Malt Milk and Charcoal, also as Midget Fibrine Dog Biscuits. The fruit biscuits are much relished by toy dogs and puppies, and for the last named the Midgets form a connecting link between the Malt Milk and the larger biscuits, or the Weetmeet, etc. For puppies that are not thriving properly the Malt, or the Malt and Cod Liver Oil Midgets I find helps them forward as quickly as any food, especially after the pups have had a dose or two of worm medicine. Regarding the use of charcoal in dog biscuits, a great deal might be said in its favor, and very little in its disfavor.

Charcoal is a deodorant and a powerful absorbent, arresting putrefactive and fermentative processes, so that these digestive disturbances which are accompanied by flatulence, sickness, diarrhoea, etc., the Charcoal Midgets should fulfil all that is claimed for them. In many kennels, liver, lungs (lights) and the entrails of rabbits, etc., are frequently fed to dogs, often in a fresh state, which is a most perilous practice, and one that is very liable to lead to the perpetuation of

certain species of worms. Sheep's head broth makes a valuable addition to Spratts Biscuits, Hound Meal, etc., more especially for brood bitches, before and after whelping.

Maize Meal, Wheat Flour (boiled), Barley Meal and Greaves (beef or mutton) are amongst other foods used in certain kennels, but all require cooking, which entails a good deal of trouble, and, when all is said and done, such foods are not equal to raw flesh and Biscuit Meal, alternated with Spratts Meat Fibrine or other biscuits manufactured by them.

THE BATH.

All dogs require an occasional bath, hot in winter and tepid in summer, particularly white dogs kept in town. The object of washing is to cleanse the coat and skin, the destruction of fleas, and to render the animal smarter in appearance.

If dogs are regularly groomed and kept in a clean bed of straw, they will not require washing oftener than three or four times a year.

Washing removes the yolk or natural lubricant from the coat, and it takes several days for this to rise again properly, so that it is desirable to show the animal with a lustrous coat, it ought to be washed several days before the exhibition. In suitable weather puppies may be washed, only they must be thoroughly dried afterwards, otherwise they may contract a cold, and this in its turn predisposes to distemper. Only half the body and limbs should be washed and the soap rinsed off then followed by washing the remainder.

The choice of a dog soap must be left to the reader, there being so many makers of such. A soap that will kill the fleas ought to be used, but puppies must never be washed with strong carbolic soap and hot water, as the writer has known death to occur from this cause — the cutaneous absorption of the carbolic in the soap.

In addition to plain baths there are also medicated ones, used for special purposes, referred to elsewhere. Many breeders and exhibitors use ordinary soft soap, others Lux, and so forth, to create a lather and cleanse the skin.

The long haired varieties require more washing than the short coated dogs, the under-coat of the former being difficult to cleanse properly. After the dog comes out of the bath allow it to shake off the superfluous water and

then rub thoroughly with some stout pack-sheeting, or an old blanket or two. Don't neglect to wash the limbs properly, inside the thighs, under the fore-arms, along the belly, at the back of the hind limbs, beneath the tail and behind the ears, as well as inside the last named, all of which parts are frequently ignored by the careless dog washer, though they harbor fleas and dirt more than any other parts of the body.

GROOMING.

Not only must dogs intended for exhibition be regularly brushed, combed and dressed, but any dog for companionship or pleasure ought to be treated in a similar manner, though perhaps not so assiduously groomed.

Any one valuing the appearance of their dog will both groom and feed it regularly, so that the animal becomes a source of real pleasure, instead as so frequently happens, a misery to itself and an eyesore to its owner.

Wire haired Terriers must have their coats gone over daily with the stripping comb and dandy brush. For Yorkshire Terriers and other long-coated varieties the whalebone brush is a most useful appliance. Old English Sheep Dogs, Collies, St. Bernards, Skye Terriers, etc., etc., unless thoroughly combed and brushed soon get into a sorry state of coat. The under coat gets entangled and huge masses of felted hair clothe the body. These must be cut out with the scissors; teasing of the tangled masses of hair being out of the question.

The result of this is that the coat looks and feels thin, consequently the dog is handicapped in the show ring. All wire haired Terriers will develop a softer fluffier coat if the woolly under-coat is not kept in check, and it is this soft hair that causes these Terriers to look so dirty. A hard coat only holds the dirt temporarily, hence the reason why the stripping comb should be used with regularity.

The kennel club's regulations regarding the 'faking' and trimming of dogs are clearly defined and no appliance must be used on the coat that has a rasping or cutting effect. The clipping of Poodles is not, of course, taken into account as it does not constitute any portion of the fakers' art. Hound gloves and dandy brushes are both most useful kennel appliances and used greatly by exhibitors, especially the first named, which gives lustre to

the coat. The free use of chamois leather is invaluable for the same purpose.

If the coat is dry and harsh, a few drops of olive oil on the chamois will do the coat good and help to put on a lustre.

The so-called "stand off" coats, e.g., Chow-chows and Pomeranians, should be brushed the 'wrong' way, which is the right way.

Dry cleaning is a good deal used by exhibitors but there is a good deal of faddism regarding this.

Substances that harden or whiten the coat must not be present in the hairs at the time of exhibition, otherwise the animal is liable to disqualification, and the owner to suffer the consequences of the nefarious practice.

Although no 'faddist,' I strongly believe in the fumigation of transit boxes, etc., as soon as they arrive from a show. Many kennels are constantly troubled with distemper amongst the young stock, and never exercise the slightest precaution to prevent infection of the show hampers, in fact the latter are frequently kept in a place where a puppy has distemper.

Hampers, boxes, collars and clothing, are, in addition to numerous other media, in my opinion, accountable in some cases for the transference of distemper.

These agencies act as indirect media of infection.

Show benches have been regarded as the carriers of the contagion but now that a very thorough system of disinfection is carried out, there is not much to fear in this direction.

Exhibitors know well enough that it is customary for the show officials to store all the travelling boxes together, indeed it would be difficult to do otherwise when the space is limited. Remove the soiled straw out of the hamper, then expose all day and night to the air, and afterwards fumigate with Creoline and Eucalyptus (an ounce of each) contained in a saucer, and gently heated by a spirit lamp beneath so as to get a good volume of vapour into the closed box which for the time being holds the fumigating apparatus.

Hampers can be treated in precisely the same manner if a piece of sheeting is thrown over them to exclude waste of vapor in the air.

Clothing, collars and chains can, if needful, be treated at the same time.

Hampers and boxes should have either the initials of the owner on them, or else the full name and address, so as to be capable of being easily identified, and if necessary, the nearest station may be added—thus: J. Williams, Tonbridge House, Kent, in the centre of the front handle, and the station—Sittingbourne—on the left corner of the latter.

The manufacturers of the travelling boxes will do this for a slightly additional cost, and it amply repays one to have it done. It is better to buy boxes or hampers a little too big than too small as reasonable air space and room to turn around are indispensable, particularly during long journeys, which dogs unfortunately have, so often to suffer. I have known dogs despatched to a show in good time, but on arrival at the show have been left in the box all night through carelessness, and not removed from it until after the judging of that particular breed has been done. Such negligence is hardly conceivable though it has happened at a Crystal Palace K. C. show.

TRANSIT OF DOGS BY LAND AND SEA.

Considering that the dog constitutes such an important item in commercial transactions throughout the business, it is essential to have a knowledge as to the best methods of its transportation from point to point, no matter whether it be in Great Britain or any other country. When sending a dog by rail it is customary to either put the animal in a suitable travelling box, or else fix on a collar, chain and muzzle, with address of consignor and consignee attached to an ordinary tie-on label.

This method of despatch is not a commendable one and quite impossible in the case of nervous dogs or those that have practically not been handled. Large packing cases can be bought to send the larger breeds by train if suitable ventilation is provided, 1½-inch circles cut out around the sides and lid will be all that is needful, some straw, and the lid well screwed down. It is a good plan to fix on a collar and chain, with the address of consignee attached to the collar in case of mishap.

Book by express train, if possible from the main line station and wire

consignee the time the train arrives at station so that he will know when to expect the dog. I now refer to dogs sold or sent on approval.

If a dog is sent on sale or return, it is customary for the sender to pay carriage and if returned the party returning the animal must pay it back. Three clear days is the time usually allowed but there is no specific time unless such is arranged at the time of negotiation. A week's trial is quite reasonable.

I have received dogs by train in boxes not half large enough to accommodate the animal, and have wondered that the occupant arrived alive under the circumstances. Delay in transit is an additional evil one has to contend with, and of frequent occurrence.

When a puppy is sent by passenger train in a box or hamper it can, if booked at parcel rate, be labelled "live puppy," which materially reduces the railway charge.

When sending dogs by boat abroad it is much better to send by a sailing ship or cargo steamer, as members of the crew will look after the dog much better than by passenger steamer, having so much more leisure time, and generally like the companionship of a dog, which gets plenty of exercise under these circumstances.

Either sawdust, straw, or peat moss litter may be used for the bedding, and care should be taken to see that the animal is made warm enough by suitable clothing in accordance with the changes of climatic conditions.

GLOSSARY OF TECHNICAL KENNEL NAMES.

Arm.—The area lying between the shoulder blade joint and the elbow joint.

Angular.—Sometimes applied to dogs in poor condition expressed by angularity of conformation.

Brisket.—The front portion of the breast.

Brush.—Applied to the stern, as the brush of Fox, Collie, etc.

Buttock.—The fleshy portion at the back of thighs.

Button-Ear.—A button ear is one that folds over about the middle of the flap so that the passage of the ear is quite hidden. The possession of this kind of ears by a Bulldog seriously handicaps it in the show ring.

Breeched.—A term applied to tan colored hair when present on the back

of the thighs of Black and Tan Terriers, constituting a serious defect.

Broken up Face.—The face is said to be "broken up" when its contour is exaggerated, as in the Bulldog, Toy Spaniels and Pugs, and the better defined the more esteemed.

The nose, nostrils are, as it were, pushed back towards the skull, so that the nose is almost obliterated.

Cloddy.—Thick set. Commonly applied to Bulldogs.

Cobby.—Compact in conformation.

Cat-Feet.—A boxy or upright foot, though the term is explanatory.

Cow Hocks.—The points of the hocks approach each other and the limbs are turned outward from here to the toes. It is a common fault in many of the larger breeds, such as St. Bernards, Mastiffs, Newfoundlands, Pugs, etc., etc.

Chop.—That portion of the face that hangs down over the under jaw on each side, but not in front. Applied to Bulldogs.

Crank-Tail.—A straight tail with a kink or two in it as in the Bulldog, but not an ideal tail, the straight tail, thick at its set and tapering to a fine point is the orthodox tail for these dogs.

Culotte.—A term applied to the superabundant hair on the back of the thighs seen in typical Pomeranians and Schipperkes.

Dew-Claws.—Supplementary claws frequently present on the inner side of the Metatarsus or Metacarpus regions commonly, though erroneously spoken of as the pasterns, which do not exist in dogs. Dew claws ought to be removed soon after birth as they are very liable to be injured, especially in a dog required for work.

Dew-Lap.—The loose skin between the posterior angle of the lower jaw and the breast, so prominent in the Bloodhound.

Dish-Faced.—The face is hollowed out in front of the eyes, and is a type of conformation commonly observed in English Setters.

Down-Face.—A term used by Bulldog men to express that the nose is not sufficiently set back, there being too much area between the inner angles of the eyes and the angle of the nose.

Domed-Skull.—A skull high and round in its brain box.

Dudley Nose.—Flesh colored nostrils, that at one time was very common

amongst Bulldogs, Bull Terriers, and certain other breeds. It is fatal, so far as the show bench is concerned to these and certain other varieties. Both Dudley-nosed dogs and bitches will produce offspring with black noses, though to breed from such a stock is not a commendable practice. Pigmentation of the nostrils begins soon after birth.

Frog-Face.—Applied to a Bulldog that has a frog-like facial expression, brought about by deficiency of under-jaw and goggling like eyes.

Frill.—The superabundant hair on the breast of a Collie dog, etc.

Flaws.—That portion of the lips that hangs below the level of the mouth.

Flag.—The stern when it bears a line of heavy feathering as in the Setters.

Feather.—The long hair proceeding from the backs of the limbs, e.g., Spaniels, etc.

Flat-Sided.—Small in girth of chest—lateral compressions.

Gaskin.—The lower end of the second thigh.

Grizzle.—A dog is said to be grizzly when the coat has a greyish blue appearance as in Airedale Terriers and some Bobtails.

Grion.—The upper and inner side of the thighs.

Harlequin.—Commonly used in connection with Great Danes, Boarhounds and Dalmatians as when the body is white with black or other markings, either clearly defined or patchy in character.

Haw.—The red mucous membrane or conjunctiva seen inside the lower eyelid, so conspicuous in Bloodhounds and certain other breeds.

Hare-Feet.—The conformation of feet that are long and tapering in the toes.

Lay-Back.—A term applied to Bulldogs in connection with the backward depression of the nostrils and nose.

Mane.—The superabundant hair on the upper border of the neck corresponding to the mane of the horse.

Molar.—The grinding teeth.

Mask.—The black portion of the face seen in the Pug, Mastiff, etc. The blacker the better.

Merle.—This term is applied to bob-tails and smooth coated sheep dogs, etc., having a greyish-blue coat with darker markings thereon.

Occiput.—The top of the skull — its highest point.

Out at Elbow.—Points of elbows looking outwards, which is a common defect in many dogs.

Overshot.—The upper jaw is longer than the under, therefore, projects.

Pencilling.—The black markings or lines of black hair running along the toes of black and Tan Terriers.

Plume.—The feathery stern or tail of a Pom, etc.

Prick-Ears.—Erect ear carriage observed in many Skye and Scottish Terriers. The cartilage of the ear is quite erect as opposed to the semi-erect and drop ear.

Roach-Back.—This is a term commonly in use by Bulldog fanciers, expressive of a characteristic feature of the Bulldog, i.e., the back has a decided rise upwards from the shoulders to the loins, also known as wheel-back.

Rose-Ears.—These are small, thin ears set on the skull very high up, and is the correct type of ears for a Bulldog.

Ring-Tail.—A tail in the form of a ring or curl.

Stop.—The depressed portion of the skull at its junction with the nose, absent in some varieties, slightly marked in some, and well marked in other breeds.

Snipy.—Narrow in the muzzle.

Sickle-Hocks.—Hocks that are too much bent, therefore too far under the body.

Sickle-Tail.—Tail carried like that of a Fox Hound.

Sternum.—The breast.

Stern.—The tail.

Short-Coupled.—Too short in the regions of back and loins.

Stumpy.—Short in either body or extremities.

Set Low.—Short in the legs.

Top-Knot.—A tuft of hair commonly seen on certain dogs such as the Bedlington Terrier, Irish Water Spaniel, Dandie Dinmonts and Water Spaniels, though in certain varieties of Spaniels it is a defect.

Trace.—The marking along the spine observes in fawn pugs. It should be clearly defined, though is less so now than formerly owing to the frequent use of black pugs as sires or dams.

Tucked up.—A common term used to indicate a slender loin as in the Whippet, Borzois, Greyhound, Deerhound, etc., and exists as a defect in other dogs such as Spaniels, etc.

Tulip Ears.—The ears are erect and the openings directed forwards, commonly seen in Toy Bulldogs, which must have either this type or the rose ears, the latter, in my opinion, for preference.

Thumb Mark.—A black mark above the foot in black and tan Terriers.

Undershot.—The converse of overshot. In my opinion a defect in any breed, though permitted in some.

Wrinkle.—The loose skin covering the skull of the Bloodhound, Dachshund, etc.

BUYING AND SELLING.

Buying and selling are the concomitants of each other, as obviously, if there were no buyers, there would be no need for sellers, the interchange being for the mutual good of both.

Regarded in the light of commercial transactions, the dog occupies but an infinitesimal position, chiefly because it exists more for the companionship of man than as an animal of real service to mankind in general. I have no desire to impute that a dog may not fulfil many useful conditions of service to the stock owner, sportsman, etc., but what I do say is that it has not the utilitarian value of the horse, ox, sheep, pig, etc., consequently as a marketable commodity its value is ruled by the capriciousness of the fancier.

It is surprising what extraordinary prices have been recorded as paid, for dogs, though many have been greatly exaggerated, usually for a purpose. Cheques of three figures are frequently exchanged for the tip top specimens of certain varieties, but over four figures have been placed on record as the price paid for a dog.

Such figures as fifty or sixty guineas are of every day occurrence in doggy transactions, whilst the sales at the various exhibitions throughout Great Britain and the Colonies disclose much higher figures than those last named.

Many promising young dogs are claimed at the shows, and very often there are several claimants for a particular dog, especially if the catalogue price is a very enticing one, and the entry exceptionally meritorious.

There is no better method of purchase than that of writing to a breeder of repute, stating wants, such as age, sex, price, and whether required for work, show, or merely companionship. As a rule dogs are preferred to bitches for companionship and general-

ly command higher prices, but in the case of certain breeds, e.g., Pekinese, etc., it is much more difficult to purchase a bitch than a dog, breeders being unwilling to part with the goose that lays the golden eggs. When convenient I should recommend a visit to the breeder's kennels in preference to purchase by correspondence.

Never buy a dog without seeing it first, and always make an arrangement with the vendor to pay carriage "out," and if the dog does not meet with approval that you will pay the return carriage. If a man knows that his dog is not likely to bear out his description he will not be willing to pay carriage "out" on speculation.

The animals should be returned, if unsuitable, within three or four days, though there is no compulsory time, provided that there has been no unnecessary delay in returning the dog.

A reasonable trial is the rule, and be careful to note whether the animal is free from deafness, canker of the ears; that his eyesight is right, and that it has no skin disease, or infirmities of any kind, past or present, no matter what excuses are offered. Accept no risks.

I do not, as a rule, recommend intending buyers to purchase puppies, or even a young dog that has not had distemper, though many dealers will swear that the animal has had the last named, whereas it never has.

Never buy a dog from a dog-shop, market or allied establishment, as such premises usually harbor a lot of curs of the worst description, and distemper is nearly always alive on the premises.

Sale by private treaty is the one in general use, though it is customary to advertise surplus stock. The author strongly advocates the establishment of annual or biennial sales of dogs by breeders, so that intending buyers will know when to attend and inspect the stud for sale.

REARING PUPPIES.

The rearing of puppies may be classified under two headings, viz.:

(a) Natural.

(b) Artificial.

This only applies to a period embraced within the date of birth up to say the 5th or 6th weeks, or thereabouts.

Natural rearing implies sucking at the breast, and artificial rearing, when

the natural milk is supplanted by a substitute.

It may be asked whether it is an easy matter to rear puppies without the aid of the dam, or a foster dam, from birth upwards. At one time a great deal of trouble was experienced in preparing the sucklings' food, as they require it perfectly fresh about 5 or 6 times per day, in fact really every two hours to give them full justice. The preceding question will be answered as we proceed.

Rearing by foster mother comes under the heading of the natural method.

Strictly speaking every bitch ought to be capable of rearing her own offspring, though unfortunately they are not, as every breeder of experience is aware. The great demand for foster-mothers is, in a measure, some proof of this statement. Some breeders make it a rule to take the puppies away from the dam, not because she is incapable of rearing them, but in the belief that a foster parent will bring the puppies up stronger, and that the bitches shapeliness will not be destroyed, or else that the animal is required for the show-bench.

To either of the objections named, I don't think that there is anything to warrant the adoption of such a course. It is a custom that has become established in some kennels, therefore, followed without a great deal of consideration over the matter. If a bitch is perfectly healthy, and has a good milk supply, and the possession of a reasonably sweet temper, she ought to carry on the maternal duties better than any foster-mother. Bitches gain experience with the first litter, and I never recommend owners to pay a high stud fee for the first litter, as failures so often result. That there are many exceptions I freely admit, having owned bitches which were ideal mothers with their first litter.

Let us now discuss a few of the causes that are likely to be contributory towards a bitch's failure in rearing her puppies. (1) The mother may die, though the percentage of deaths in bitches during or subsequent to labor is comparatively small, especially amongst show-dogs. When a small bitch becomes pregnant to a dog many times her size, then trouble begins as a rule during parturition, and such bitches frequently succumb.

(2) She may have a poor milk supply, totally inadequate to rear the number of puppies born. The milk may not only be deficient in quantity, but lack quality. In either case, the defect seriously handicaps the offspring, the growth of which is slow and uncertain.

(3) Temperament may prove a bar to allowing the dam to have charge. Some bitches are so jealous and so vicious other ways, that they prove totally unfit to have charge of their progeny. In many cases this viciousness arises through interference with the bitch. If the mother is at all inclined to be jealous it is only right to leave her to look after her pups to the best of her abilities, and it is surprising the extreme care that such usually manifest towards the puppies.

(4) At the time of parturition many mothers become very excited, and this goes on until the whole of the puppies are born, the period of which varies. Meanwhile, one or more of the litter may die from exposure and weakness. In cases of this kind I advise that the puppies be removed to a basket of flannel near artificial warmth until the

last puppy has been born. The litter can then be returned to the mother. This misfortune not uncommonly happens with the first litter chiefly through inexperience in maternity.

(5) The milk supply may fail through the onset of some disease, which may, or may not be connected with parturition.

(6) From the advent of other causes over which the owner has not been able to exercise control. Such, then, are the principal reasons why the dam may be unable to nourish her offspring, and why it becomes expedient to resort to artificial aid, if the owner is desirous of rearing the youngsters successfully.

Before entering into this subject, it is advisable to say a few words concerning the mother, if she fails through shortness of milk.
