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## NOTES AND COMMENTS

Fox Terriers in England: Apropos to Mr. W. P. Fraser's letter in this issue on Terriers at New York, the following from *The Field* of Feb'y 11th, on Cruft's show, is of quite unusual interest:

"Terrier men of all tastes were pleased to find their favorites benched together in the Gilbey Hall, where there is both light and room, and no groups were favored with better rings or more space between the benches. Fox Terriers, with an aggregate of nearly four hundred, an actual entry of one hundred and fifty-three, made a show in themselves, and hunting men who took the trouble to go round the benches, the Reverend Cecil Legard being among the number, noted that few of the lathy, narrow-chested brigade found favor with the judges, while Terriers weak in loin and listless when in the ring, are disappearing altogether."

The Rev. Cecil Legard is one of the very foremost judges of a Fox Hound in England.

"Mount Royal": It is with unusual pleasure that we welcome the very interesting report of Cruft's Show, by Mount Royal. Dr. T. Wesley Mills (Mount Royal) is a past President of the C. K. C., an Honorary President, and one who did heroic work in helping to bring the C. K. C. through the troublous times of a few years ago. For these, and many other, good reasons, we hope now that Mount Royal has found time and inclination to again write for Canadians that we may hear from him with frequency.

Perhaps we might add that within the past few years the complexion of Canadian dog shows has greatly changed. It is too true, alas! that

we see no more the grand Mastiffs shown at Toronto ten to fifteen years ago. But we are recompensed with the big entries of Bulldogs seen here and elsewhere. Fifty or sixty is no unusual number at our largest shows. And Toys have come to their own too, especially Poms. Six to ten classes of good size are now frequently seen. Black and Tan Terriers have lost their old standing in Canada as elsewhere, but the Airedale is tremendously popular and the ever present Fox Terrier is again meeting popular favor.

Proposed Toy Club for Canada: Mrs. Wylie's letter in this issue is an endorsement of what we say above regarding the increasing popularity of the Toy breeds of various kinds. Poms, Black and Tans, Yorkshires and the fragile looking Italian Greyhounds, Poodles, and so on, all have their votaries, and the number is increasing. We heartily second Mrs. Wylie's motion and will personally be glad to assist in any way that we can.

We suggest that a preliminary meeting be held during the forthcoming O. K. C. show. At this meeting details of various kinds might be discussed, and final arrangements made at the big Canadian National Show in the autumn.

In the meantime, if it be decided to make Toronto the centre, Montreal, London, Victoria, Vancouver and other cities should be remembered. Make the club entirely national and not so in name only.

An unfortunate loss: We can sympathize with Mr. Chas. D. Balchin in the loss of his Collie from Winnipeg Show. It appears his dog, the sable

and white Belhelvie Prince, slipped his collar and escaped some time during the first night of the show. The show officials have been unable to help him so far, and of course they are protected, as far as rules go, by additional rule 2, which relieves them of responsibility for losses such as this. The case was referred to us, but all we could do was to give advice and to ask the committee to lend their assistance. If any Western fancier should hear of such a Collie he would favor all concerned by communicating with Mr. Jno. Moxam, Secretary Western Canada Kennel Club, Winnipeg, Man.

A solid color: We are frequently asked what definitely constitutes a solid colored dog. Here is a case in point with our reply. Were we right or wrong? We refrain from giving name, but this question too evidently arose from an incident which took place at Winnipeg.

"Kindly inform me whether a small white spot on the breast of a French Poodle will debar the dog from being entitled to a first prize at a dog show, if otherwise qualified, and oblige."

Our reply said: "The question you ask is largely a matter for the judge to decide. As a rule a small white spot on a solid colored Poodle, or in fact any other breed, will not debar the dog from competition, though in a close contest it may tell against him."

New Airedales: Mr. Harry Lawder, London Junction, Ont., has just imported a brace of Airedales from that famous breeder, Mr. Holland Buckley.



The dog is a youngster, ten months old, Clonmel Cracker, by Bolton Cracker, ex. Whitechurch Kitty. The bitch is Clonmel Lady Milly, a black and tan nearly two years old, and came over in whelp to one of the best sires in England, and is due about April 15th. Her sire is Ch. Midland Royal, her dam the Ch. Master Briar bitch Clonmel Cissie.

The dog is to make his debut at the O. K. C. show next month.

**Airedale puppies:** The handsome young Airedale bitch, Briar Lass, has presented her owner, Mr. J. Rook, with a litter of ten puppies (six dogs). These are by Fontmel Chief, whose picture we give this month, the imported winning son of Champion Crompton Oorang. Briar Lass was purchased by Mr. Rook after her success at the Canadian National Exhibition last year. With the breeding and show success of each of the sire and dam, it may confidently be expected that these puppies will be heard from later on.

**Pacific Coast Shows:** It is probable that the following shows will be held in British Columbia during the year:—Victoria City Kennel Club, last week in March; Vancouver Kennel Club, first week in April; Cowichan Agricultural Association, at Duncan, middle of June; Vancouver Exhibition Association, end of August. There is also a possibility of the B. C. Fox Terrier Club holding a specialty show on Thanksgiving day. It will be seen from this list that "man's best friend" is not suffering from lack of attention on the Coast, and in fact all of above have now become annual fixtures. These shows will all be held under Canadian Kennel Club rules.

Mr. Chas. Lyndon, of Toronto, will judge the Vancouver Show the first week in April.

**Boston Terrier Club of Canada:** As there were 48 dogs present at the Boston Terrier Club of Canada show held on Jan. 2nd, the winners' value is one point.

**Seattle Show:** We are informed that the Seattle Kennel Club will hold their annual dog show in Seattle on April 12, 13, 14, 15th. Mr. George S. Thomas, of Hamilton, Mass., will be asked

to judge all classes. Mr. R. M. Palmer is the Secretary of the Seattle Kennel Club.

**Another Airedale:** Mr. P. Bawden, of Ridgetown, Ont., is giving Western Ontario breeders the opportunity of breeding to the good Airedale Caerphilly Marvel, a winner of 250 prizes, cups and medals, and the sire of almost innumerable winners. Marvel is a litter brother to Prince of York the winner at Madison Square last month and is the sire of Caerphilly Admiral and Fyrnant Blantu, winners at the Crystal Palace. He has beaten Prince of York, Ch. Illuminator, Tintern Royalist and many other top-notchers, which should be another proof that he is one of the best we have ever had in Canada. We hope Mr. Bawden's enterprise may be amply rewarded.

**Ontario Kennel Club Show:** This show is to be held under Canadian Kennel Club rules and is aptly named by the O. K. C. "The Coronation Dog Show." The dates are April 13, 14, 15th, entries closing on April 5th. This is the sixth annual show given by the Club and 313 classes will be provided including Coronation Trio classes and the Coronation Grand Challenge puppy class. The location of the show will be the Repository, corner Simcoe and Nelson Sts., where many successful shows have been held in the past. Specials are offered in every breed in addition to cash prizes. The show secretary is Mr. Bert Swann, 709 Queen Street West, Toronto, who will be glad to forward premium list and give any additional information requested.

We note with pleasure that Mr. Chas. H. Mason, Long Island, New York, will judge all classes. Mr. Mason has not lost his position in the affection and respect of Canadian dog breeders and exhibitors and we will be pleased to view his judgment at such an important fixture as that of the O. K. C.

**Toronto Kennel Club:** A very large and enthusiastic meeting of the Toronto Kennel Club was held in the club rooms on February 14th. After the regular business of the meeting had been dealt with, Mr. H. S. Tibbs, former Secretary-Treasurer of the Club, was presented with a Rawlinson easy

chair, bearing the inscription "For His Dog Gone Goodness." Dr. Alfred Boulthée read the address and made the presentation. Mr. Tibbs, who was really moved, in his reply stated that he had received many tokens from other clubs, but nothing that gave him as much pleasure, as this would remind him of many pleasant evenings spent with the T. K. C. The president, Mr. Arthur Atkinson, and the Vice-President, Mr. E. T. Campbell, also spoke of the valued services of Mr. Tibbs.

The evening was one of the most enjoyable in the history of the Club, and will long remain in the memories of the large number present.

### SOME DECISIONS THAT DON'T SUIT.

The Western Canada Kennel Club Show is now a matter of history, and what would otherwise have been a tremendous success, I am sorry to say, has been somewhat marred by the unfavorable decisions handed out by the judge. Entries came up to expectations, while the quality of the exhibits was equal, if not superior to, any show previously held here. You will see by a careful perusal of the awards where unplaced dogs in one class managed to get in the ribbons in the next class, beating dogs who won over them in the preceding class. The judge certainly upset a lot of our ideas on the standard type of several breeds, and we are now wondering just where we get off at. About fifty per cent. of the awards were complete reversals of Mr. James Mortimer's decisions, and in one or two cases dogs that received winners ribbons under Mr. Mortimer were given the gate entirely. I could recount sufficient instances to fill the Gazette from cover to cover, but I would only pave the way for a lot of discussion from unfortunate exhibitors, and would be of no material benefit to anyone. The judging from start to finish was very erratic, and could not be followed at all from the ringside. Had it not been for the fact that a strong committee have been working hard for the past three months to ensure the success of this show, and that we were handing out some pretty good looking trophies, the decisions would have been accepted for what they were worth and no further notice taken.

However, I have this to say of the judge, his decisions were handed out conscientiously and impartially. He was severely handicapped by artificial light, and the judging ring was only one-third the size we would like to have seen it. But whether his decisions were, well founded is another story altogether, of which "the least said the better." Those who were fortunate enough to get winners ribbons will have to be satisfied, and in some cases consider themselves very lucky.

To give a description of some of the winners would simply mean pulling the dogs to pieces, and as I have no desire to call anyone's dog down I shall not attempt to do so. Yours very truly,

# WESTMINSTER KENNEL CLUB SHOW, NEW YORK.

This, the 35th annual show, was the greatest ever held in the history of the W. K. C. The number of dogs entered was larger than ever before, and there were several innovations in the way of new breeds.

Mr. James Mortimer was at the helm. This meant now, as always, that the old ship ploughed through the troublous waters of a big dog show with a steadiness and speed not seen elsewhere than at Madison Square Gardens.

Many new dogs were specially imported for this show. Some went to the top; others fell by the wayside.

Mr. Fraser tells us something about the Terriers. The battle royal was in Airedales, where thousands of dollars had been spent in purchase of claimants for the coveted blue. That lusty infant, Dogs in America, that seems, to use an almost obsolete expression, to be "getting there with both feet"—and both hands too for that matter, publishes a judge's report on this breed. This we draw on as we do others from the same source.

The Canadian judges were Col. Robert McEwen, who officiated on Collies, and Mr. Lance Farewell, who took Sporting Spaniels. Both are specialists on the breeds assigned to them and know how to place them to suit themselves.

There were many Canadian exhibitors—we printed the full list in last issue—and they met with varying success. On the whole Canada made an excellent showing. We give attached to this a report of Canadian winnings.

## BULLDOGS AT THE GARDEN.

Only a fair entry in numbers, but quality quite high, particularly in light and heavyweight dogs and bitches. Puppies were nothing like so good as in former years, barring the puppy bitch winner, Thornbury Silent Duchess. Unfortunately the winning bitch (and finally winner of special for best of either sex), Florence Blunder, was until a few weeks ago the property of the judge, and her winning gave the "kind friends" a chance to whisper the dear old "I told you so, etc." but the enormity of the crime was rather lessened when in the unclassified specials on Thursday the same bitch was placed by the all round judges reserve for best dog or bitch any breed in the show.

It might be stated here that the winning bitch carried "top-weight," owing to the above noted condition, but her undeniable Bulldog character, wonderful soundness and general excellence brought her through, handicap and all. In puppy, novice, junior and American bred dog classes nothing sensational

appeared, but a very nice useful lot were shown. It was clearly demonstrated that here in America very rarely is produced a Bulldog of the class as bred abroad.

With England's best constantly being imported (both dogs and bitches) the unsatisfactory results attained by our breeders must bring the Bulldog men an apparently unsolvable condition. In limit dogs under 45 lbs. a very nice little dog, Mackworth Bertie, won, followed closely by a hot lot indeed; certainly one of the strongest classes of lightweight dogs ever seen here. Open lightweight practically a repeat. Many extra good ones of other days went down due to their inability to move properly.

Limit heavyweights brought out old favorites in excellent condition. There was little to choose between the first, second or third. Open heavyweights saw two great ones fighting it out, followed by some real good ones, all shown in grand condition, and a treat to inspect. For winter dogs the heavyweight open dogs were selected, for the judge believes the real English Bulldog to be a massive, cloddy dog, able to take care of himself in any company and more to be desired than dogs equally good in points but of a size and weight more associated with breeds of the Toy variety.

An extra nice lot of bitches were shown in light and heavy limit and open classes. The open lightweight winner, "Sensation On the Path," rather stood out, but in open heavyweights competition was keen. First and second are as good as any seen in the last few years. Florence Blunder was placed over Lord Chancellor for the best of the breed as being nearer the ideal. Her wonderful bone, short body, grand neck, "King Orry" type of head, and real Bulldog gait, make her a model type to be emulated.

I wish to announce my regret at my inability to attend the annual dinner of the Bulldog Club of America, due to the sudden illness of a member of my family. The dinner is a happy reunion, and my regret is keener now that I know how kindly the gentleman who took the president's place as master of ceremonies, spoke of my entry and efforts.

## AIREDALE TERRIERS.

The Airedale entry at Madison Square Garden numbered 136 and the quality was better on an average than that of any exhibit of the breed that I have ever seen. In dog puppies there were 16 entries of more than average quality. The first prize dog in this class, Killearn Oorang, is a large one, very long in head, good

foreface, dark eye, good in front, bone, legs and feet; he is grizzle in body color and was not in the best of coat. The second prize went to Rough and Tumble, the puppy winner and best American-bred dog at the last Wissahickon show. He has a long head, good muzzle, front legs and feet, and was in good coat. He loses to Killearn Oorang in eye, but has rather the better of it in ears. The third prize dog, Unexpected, is another good one; he has a good head, eye and expression, is the right color, but was rather full in coat on the day, and looked light in bone compared with the winners of first and second. Clipstone Hotspur, reserve, is a very nice one, good everywhere, but rather on the small side. Hedgeley Crack and Larchmere Style deserve mention and could be counted on to get in the money in any ordinary puppy class.

In the Junior class the quality was not as high. Dazzler, claiming Pilgrim Yellow Jacket as his sire, was first. He is a well-shaped dog, standing on good legs and feet. He was rather open in coat and might have a longer head. Fighting Bob came second. He has a long, clean head, good color and texture of coat. He was too short in coat. He is a good type, but has hardly the quality of Dazzler. Halner Turnpike won third. He won first in the puppy class at New York last year and has made up into a fine strong dog. He has a harsh coat, is good in legs and feet and well muscled up at the hind quarters. He has a very long flat head, but his head is too broad between the ears. Colne Master Royalist also deserves mention in this class.

The Novice class was a repeat, Larchmere Style getting reserve. He is a very nice seven-months-old puppy by Lance Corporal Smyth. His skull is not flat and he was too open in coat, otherwise good.

In the limit class King Oorang had an easy win. This is a fine dog, grand length of head, good muzzle, immense bone and stands well on excellent legs and feet. He is just the right color, has a coat of good texture, good front, good body and well sprung ribs. He is broad enough between the ears, but is very high class. Then the second prize went to Killearn Oorang, the puppy winner. Clonmel Isonomy came third and is a very good one. He has a long flat head, good muzzle and dark eye; his legs and feet are good, he is a good color and he has a good front and shoulder placement. He was rather short in coat, which gave him a smooth-coated appearance. The texture of his coat was good, and it was straight and close lying. He was shown thin. He is only about a year



old, and the late sea voyage and our sudden changes in climate no doubt told on him. When he is fit I hope to see him do much better. It seemed to me like sending a boy on a man's errand to ask him, in his present shape, to pull down King Oorang and Prince of York. Reserve in this class went to Clonmel Whirlwind. He is very big and has great quality for so large a dog. He has a long, flat head, magnificent front and good body. He was all out of coat and put down in poor shape. His eyes were too large and staring. There were fourteen entries in this class and the American bred dogs were far out-classed.

In the class for American bred dogs the order was Dazzler, Halner Turnpike and Larchmere Style.

The open class contained thirteen entries. Ch. Harry Jones, I never saw looking better. This dog is a wonderful laster. He has a long, clean head like a puppy, a harsh coat, good legs and feet and body. He has more bone and substance than Clonmel Isonomy and is a more workmanlike type. I liked him better on the day. Killarn Oorang won third prize in this class from Harry Jones, scoring in length of head, eye and neck. The real fight in the class was between King Oorang and Prince of York. This last dog looked 100 per cent better than when I saw him at the Wissahickon show. He is a dog of wonderful quality and was put down in excellent condition. He is good in head and body and front and quarters, and legs and feet, and coat and color, and ear and eye, and neck and muzzle. He is a beautiful mover, and is about the right size. King Oorang has a longer head, and perhaps a better muzzle than Prince of York. King Oorang is also better in set-on and carriage of stern, and has perhaps the better of it at the pasterns. Prince of York was cleaner in skull, with plenty of bone and substance, and yet no suggestion of coarseness, and in my opinion was a higher quality specimen of the breed on that day.

The bitch puppies were not as numerous nor as high in quality as the dog puppies, taking them as a class. Clonmel Command had rather an easy first. She has a very long, flat head, a short, symmetrical body and good legs and feet, but was shown thin and needs more bone. Her coat and color are right and she has good ears and eyes. Eden Hill Tyrannie was second, she has a long, flat head and is a well put together puppy. Her coat is of good texture but was too inclined to curl. Malvern Golightly was third and is a well shaped one, not quite flat in skull. Hedgeley Flower Girl has a good head but is too long in body and refused to show.

In the junior class Larchmere Mistress Magnet was well ahead. She is a very typical bitch of good color and coat, very good front, good, long head and good foreface. She has very big hind quarters and stands well on her legs and feet. Second prize went

to Chorus Girl. She is not so long in head as Mistress Magnet, and is broad enough in skull. Her coat was not in as good condition as when I saw her last at Wissahickon show. Third prize went to Betty W., losing in foreface to Chorus Girl.

In the novice bitches Nancy Lee scored over Chorus Girl being cleaner in skull and better in coat on the day. She was also stronger at the loin, as Chorus Girl looked rather tucked up.

The limit bitches were a good class. The first prize went to Kenmare Sorceress, the Wissahickon winner. She is a very symmetrical, well-shaped bitch all over. She has a good head, nice ear-carriage, good neck, front, shoulders, legs and feet, well sprung ribs and large hind quarters. She is rather in the small side and somewhat dark in her markings. She was well put down and in much better condition than when seen at Wissahickon show. Her coat should be harder. Second prize went to Soudan Diamond. She has a good head, neck and body and is a very high-class bitch. Her front and shoulders did not look right. I cannot say anything as to her coat as she had no coat at all, but was plucked right down to the undercoat. It was a pity to show a fine bitch so, as she would go high if well put down. Third prize went to Clonmel Command. She looked small and light with the older bitches, but is a high quality puppy, and I could not find one that I liked better for third prize. To quote from the book written by her former owner, she has not "that barrel jaw, without which no Airedale can be great." Baughfell Mistress and Baughfell Harmony were very close behind Clonmel Command. They had better forefaces and were better in bone and substance but were shorter in head and broader between the ears, and I thought the puppy had more quality.

In the class for American bred bitches Hedgeley Flirt won first. Her color is not pleasing and she is broader in skull than I like. She has good bone and substance and is a higher class one than Nancy Lee, who won second, with Chorus Girl third, and Malvern Golightly reserve.

The Open class brought together a fine lot. Kenmare Sorceress was first. Ch. Mistress Magnet second and Baughfell Heather third. This last bitch is a fine one. She has a good coat and color, her coat was perhaps too short on the day, a good, long, flat head, strong loin and big hind quarters. She has a longer and fatter head than Mistress Magnet, but has not so good a finish of foreface, and I thought Mistress Magnet had the better of it in front and shoulder placement. Soudan Diamond was reserve and I was sorry for her position, as she is a high-class bitch, but if a judge will pass them without enough coat why should exhibitors work for a couple of months to get their dogs fit? It was a good class of bitches where Larchmere, Bitter Sweet and

Tiger Signet could not score. Ch. Mistress Magnet won reserve winners from Hedgeley Flirt, whose color is all gone, and who is thicker in skull and not so good at the loin as Mistress Magnet.

In the special prize competition, Prince of York had rather an easy win for the special for best of either sex. Rough and Tumble beat Ch. Harry Jones and Ch. Sitting Bull for the best American bred dog; Mistress Magnet was the best American bred bitch, and Nancy Lee the best novice dog or bitch. Mr. Albright won the team class and Mr. Batson the brace class.

As a whole the exhibit of Airedales was better than last year, thanks to the late importations, and I hope that when another year has rolled around we shall see the American bred specimens more prominently to the front in the prize lists of the Westminster Kennel Club Show.

There was quite a large entry in Clumbers. Mr. Geo. Preston had the strongest, winning with his dog Oak of Ormande, a very fine specimen.

Field Spaniels were also numerous. Mr. Ke-y showed some very fine ones and took a great many of the blue ribbons. Also Geo. Greer, fine team.

Next comes that fascinating breed, the merry little Cocker. The entry was very large. Had Mepal Kennels shown it would have been the largest entry of Cockers ever shown at the Gardens. On account of Mrs. Bloodgood's death he did not show.

In the puppy dogs Black Baronet was 1st, a nice dog, a little high, but his other qualities are so good. He also won 1st in novices; 2nd, Wee Wah Woton, is a fair one, too coarse in head. Limit, Black Kemah 1st, a grand dog, stands on the best of legs and feet, beautiful head. Midkiff Elms 2nd, a beautiful type, a grand head, had he been in condition would have beaten the winner. Open dogs, Black Kemah 1st, Mission Chief 2nd.

Puppy bitches, Midkiff Joan 1st, a fine little bitch, will improve as she grows older, the right type. Calmo Oviedo, a nice one, gave the winner a close run, excellent condition. Honey Girl, reserve, a fine bitch, badly under-shot. Limit bitches, black, Mepals Varva 1st, a high quality bitch. Now or Never 2nd, was shown in very bad condition, if put down in good shape I think and know is the best bitch I have ever seen, and I have seen a great many. We'll hear from her again. Open parti-color dogs, 1st, Dana Da. He is a well built, solid dog, excellent bone, beautiful head, well set ears, excellent feet. He is a great dog but in very bad coat. Mr. Douglas brought a white bitch, received 3rd, quite a nice brood bitch. May throw some fine puppies. L. Farewell.



## COLLIES AT NEW YORK.

(Special report by the judge.)

That the Westminster Kennel Club Show in Madison Square Garden is losing nothing of its attractiveness is proven by its latest venue. Exhibitors turned out in such record breaking numbers that the capacity of even this great building was fully taxed and the aisles between the benching had to be narrowed down to a width that the crowds of visitors on the first day found elbow room scarce indeed. Not many of your readers would be interested in a detailed criticism of the one hundred and ninety-three entries of Collies and the many classes throughout which they were competing, and even if they were, in the absence of any notes I could not so long after the event supply it.

The blue merles are becoming popular and turned out in greater numbers than the tri-colors. In the past two years they have improved vastly but at this show it was unfortunate that many good ones were not just in that bloom which makes a Collie of that color so attractive. Taking them as a whole the Collies were a good lot and showed marked improvement in expression and eyes, carriage of ears and conformation of body. Slovenly ears, light eyes, long backs and weak loins are not now seen at the head of the classes. A number of high class dogs, owing to the eagerness of owners to obtain a rating at this show, were brought in the ring out of bloom and condition and had to be pegged down for it.

Dog puppies did not turn out in such numbers as we were accustomed to seeing here. The winner, Earncliffe Ensign II., an attractive sable and white, with good head, ears and coat, and for his age a good size, will appear to better advantage after he has been out in company a few times. Next to him was placed a son of that noted bitch, Ping Pong, a puppy in good form, but deficient in carriage of ears. In junior, novice and American bred dogs, Greyston Patriot won. He has good head, ears and expression, and was put down in fine shape, but is short in neck and low on legs. He was followed by Alstead Aristocrat, a racier built dog, not quite as good in head and coat. The hottest competition was in limit dogs, where undoubtedly we met the best Collie in the show in the choicely bred tri-color, Imna Special, by Seedley Statesman, out of Seedley Sapphire. He is an up-standing dog of size with quality and in conformation of body outclassed anything shown. He has good eye and expression, nice ears well carried, and a good head of fair length. Added to this he has that most desirable brightness of character which makes him show himself without coaxing. Next to him was placed Southport Shoreman, looking the very best an expert could make him, in pretty good coat, a dog I would like better with a little more substance throughout and

a better mouth. Third went to Southport Safety, a well known and attractive dog without any pronounced fault.

The bitch puppy, imported Imna Seldom, by that high class show dog, Ch. Bayard of Tytton, notwithstanding her deficiency of coat, through bright disposition, nice carriage of ears and correct shape of head, went through to winners. In novices, Southport Success, good in head, ears, body and coat, got the blue and reserve winners. Amongst the many good bitches shown and especially worthy of note were Lady Tyttonian, Congress Betty, Greystone Gleam and Eastland Sculptor Prim.

## MR. FRASER'S IMPRESSIONS OF SOME OF THE TERRIERS AT NEW YORK.

I had missed the New York Show for the past three years, having been away from home at this time, and was therefore struck with the tremendous improvement in the Terrier classes, particularly Airedales, Irish and Welsh Terriers. My time was limited at the show and Monday a lost day, for the reason that Mr. Vicary was unable to judge on that day as he was not sufficiently recovered from an attack of influenza to take his place in the ring. He commenced work on the Foxhound classes on Tuesday morning, reaching the smooth Fox Terriers at mid-day, and I cannot recall anything which has given me more pleasure than to watch him judge these classes.

The entry in smooth Fox Terriers, I fancy, far exceeded that of the last three or four years. The Sabine Kennels were very strongly represented, as was also that great stay of the breed in America, Mr. Winthrop Rutherford, Messrs. Ingwersen and Nelson also entered teams. The Honorable Mrs. Barclay, a sister of Lord Decies, led a winning puppy in Scarlet Poppy, a sister to her Pinkie which has done so well in England. San Francisco sent Champion Tallac Dasher. Canada, I grieve to say it, had only one entry, my own. The individual entry all round was larger than has been the case for some time.

The Westminster Kennel Club must be heartily congratulated on having persuaded Mr. Vicary to make the journey, and his visit to New York as a judge of Fox Terriers will prove invaluable to the breed and will act as a steadier in the matter of size and substance. From the outset it was very evident the stamp of Terrier the judge wanted for first honors, he looked for a workman possessing all the fine points of the modern show Terrier, and one ready and able to do his duty if called upon. He insisted on a Terrier "with ends" (head and quarters) standing on the best of legs and feet with a good middle piece, nothing cloddy either, for good shoulders were required for an animal called upon to gallop. Mr. Vicary's awards through-

out his classes consistently emphasized his views. The winning dog, Sabine Rifle, possesses a long, powerful jaw, with the best of legs and feet and tremendous bone, the latter quality Mr. Vicary thought lacking in many of the entries brought before him. The winning bitch, Baughfell Water Lily, was good in these points and better behind than the winning dog Sabine Rifle, the latter being awarded the cup for best Fox Terrier. Sabine Rifle has the advantage of the bitch in neck and shoulders.

The wires, I was not successful in seeing judged, nor did I see as much of the Airedales, Irish and Welshmen as I hoped to do. Mr. D. E. Lynn showed a very nice sort of puppy in Lynnfield Salex, by Southboro Salex, not yet matured, though he did some winning and will do more later on, also a nice little bitch which won in puppies bred by Mr. Thomas Moore of Montreal. The sire of this bitch, Donington Rebel, is now owned by that enthusiast, Mr. Arthur Atkinson, of Toronto. Messrs. George S. Thomas and C. W. Keyes, Mesdames Higginson and Frothingham all had some excellent Terriers benched.

Scottish Terriers were a large class of many types and Tickle 'Em Jock was awarded the prize for the best dog of all breeds in the show. I consider him a much improved dog from the Terrier I saw last year in Buffalo, as he is better in body and closer to the ground. Age has not improved his expression, nor his action, as he goes away from you. Ornsay Prince is a recent importation I believe, a Scot of good character and all a Terrier, his front is faulty, as is his carriage of tail. Walescott Invader, a very sound Terrier deficient in foreface. Ems Chevalier, a very grand Scot, if he is a size large, was lacking in coat, and therefore not at his best, but oh! what character he has. A little dog I also liked was Beecher's Brook, he will beat more than will beat him.

There were some good bitches to the fore in Newcastle Flashlight, Baughfell Flirt, Ornsay Nora, Baughfell Jill and Ingafield Jean. I think I prefer Nora to any. Ingafield Jean I purchased and brought back with me, having bred her to Ems Chevalier during her visit at the show. Yours truly,

## CRUFT'S DOG SHOW, LONDON, ENGLAND.

\*BY A "PHILOKUNONISTIC" PHILOSOPHER ABROAD.

Editor Canadian Kennel Gazette.

Dear Sir,—It occurred to me that it might be interesting to your readers to know my impressions of the greatest dog show in England, after that of the Kennel Club. As it is ten years since I attended a Kennel Club show at the Crystal Palace, it may be well understood that I would have an eye for any very marked changes that may have occurred in any direction in the interval; for after all there is little difference in essentials between Cruft's Show and that of the Kennel Club.

This show is the twenty-sixth held under the management of Mr. Chas. Cruft—the Napoleon of the English dog show world. I hoped that Mr. Cruft would have sent me a press ticket, for which I applied, and at the same time have shown his respect and friendly feeling for the Canadian Kennel Club through its former President and present Honorary President; but he did not even answer my letter of application, and I paid my five shillings entrance fee the same as any ordinary visitor. Nevertheless, I shall try to do the "great Charles" justice to the best of my ability quite the same as if I had been treated differently or even invited to the lunch given by him to the press and to exhibitors.

The show is an annual fixture and was held this year on Feb. 8th, 9th and 10th in the "Agricultural Hall," under the management directly of Mr. Cruft himself, assisted by his wife, who looked after the lady exhibitors especially.

The entries numbered nearly 4,000, representing about 1900 dogs, and were benched and fed by Spratts, while the show was disinfected by the Sanitos Company.

The main building was given over to breeds other than Terriers and Toys, while an annex hall was assigned to the latter breeds. The buildings are constructed to admit light from the roof as well as the sides, a very important matter in dark and often foggy London. Both buildings are of

immense size and the latter was heated. If a Canadian wishes to know how to be thoroughly uncomfortable he should visit London in winter time. Some of the public halls are not heated at all. Last night I sat in one listening to the glorious music of Beethoven. Not only was the hall unheated but by a special arrangement torrents of fresh air are poured down on one at intervals, for the English are fiends for "tubbing" and ventilation. Many survive to adult life and many die—hence we find them a very sturdy race on the whole. Imagine my surprise, therefore, when I learned that even dogs were provided with a heated building.

A large part of the building in each case was occupied by the judging rings. In the larger building they occupied the entire central portion with an additional one placed in each corner at the upper end. In spite of some fog on the day of the show the light was good except in the corner rings. The day was "fine," i.e., there was not a dense fog and it was not wet.

The attendance was only fair during the first part of the day, i.e., while a good deal of the judging was being done. This was likely due to the charge for admission being so high. Only those will pay five shillings to see a dog show who are either very much interested in dogs, in the judging, or in certain exhibitors. This prohibitive charge prevailed till 2 p.m. when the rate fell to two shillings and six pence, while in the evening of that day and on other days throughout, the admission fee was one shilling. A catalogue giving all necessary information was obtainable for one shilling.

I go into these and other details because as you, Mr. Editor, and many old members of the Canadian Kennel Club and exhibitors will remember I have always laid stress on the relations of the public to dog shows. After all is said and done there is only one Master and one King in this world, and that King is the public. What it approves succeeds and what it con-

demns must sooner or later fail. It follows that the very first consideration in regard to every dog show is, How will it appeal to the public, and what causes it to please the public and what not? People go to dog shows for a great variety of reasons. Many things influence them by getting into their minds by side channels. The majority do not attend from a pure love of dogs. They are wooed and won in no small measure by a great many considerations, and if these things are well observed by the promoters of shows much is done to make a show a success. In all that succeeds these days the element of the cleanly, the orderly and the beautiful must be taken into account. It follows that the methods of benching, of feeding of getting dogs into and out of the rings, of giving information about the dogs by catalogue, by exhibitors numbers, by blackboard in the ring for marking up the winners numbers, etc., must be observed. Another matter of great importance in the eye of the visitor is the condition of the dogs. When these things are all well planned and executed the visitor feels that peculiar delight and satisfaction that leads him to talk of the show to his friends and to pay a second visit often taking others with him. In the end all this is in the interest of the dog, and of the breeder and exhibitor, though I'm afraid very few see it as clearly as could be desired. I have only praise, speaking generally, for the arrangement of this old fixture.

I think it would astonish many from our side of the water to notice how smoothly all the machinery of a great English show like this one moves. While one class is being judged another is being got ready, so that not a moment is lost. This is due to the admirable way the ring stewards manage things. Here, stewards, when they accept a position really attend to the duties as long as their services may be required.

Exhibitors usually show their own dogs, and in most of the rings one

may see a fair proportion of ladies, who are more fully initiated than with us in most cases.

The attendants at Cruft's show were very polite as well as efficient, and, attired as Jack Tars, appeared to the eye in a pleasing way.

The condition of the dogs exceeded anything I ever saw in America. So rare is poor condition that one Pointer in bad form as to coat and skin looms up before me in memory as the one "plague spot of evil" of the whole show.

It was very pleasant for me to see among the judges a goodly number of men known by name and reputation to myself and several others of our club for the last twenty years or more.

About the competency of English judges as a class there can be no question. But their methods are inscrutable. They teach nothing. The judge's decision is arrived at no one knows how, and his work is almost entirely lost as an object lesson. I take it that in this one particular our judges in America by their sorting into groups, by their comparisons made under the eye of the public and the exhibitor, do a great deal to educate both those who exhibit and those who are visitors and may themselves soon join the great body of dog owners and exhibitors. The one thing aimed at here is speed and accuracy.

The judging was under way at 11 a.m. of the first day, and a large part of the work apart from specials (a vast list) was finished by 2 p.m., and yet but little fault could be found with the awards except in a few classes.

When one notes the gray hairs of a large proportion of the judges, one realizes how fully in this as in other matters Great Britain, especially England, believes in the tried man.

What were my strongest impressions, looking at things through Canadian or more broadly American eyes?

(1). The perfect order, the smoothness, the absence of all fuss, the celestial tranquility of the whole — the absence of obvious nervous tension on the part of exhibitors, the quiet and unobtrusive methods of the judges, the cleanliness of the show, the fine condition of the dogs, etc., from all of which we in the newer world can learn lessons.

(2). I was again made to feel that the whole complexion of a great English dog show is different from that to which we are accustomed in America.

Perhaps the chief reason of this is the presence of many breeds, often in large numbers, that are either not represented at all on our side or by very few entries indeed.

We know little of Otterhounds, Bassethounds, Irish Wolfhounds, Chow Chows, Retrievers, Old English Sheep Dogs, Griffons, Welsh Terriers, Sussex Spaniels, Welsh Springers, etc.

Toy dogs here constituted an enormous collection, among which Pomer-

anians of several color varieties are the present day favorites. And with judging going on simultaneously in nineteen rings one has an ample and puzzling choice as to what breed he will feast his eyes upon.

Those who know the writer's past history are aware that he has always been a universalist rather than a specialist. This was owing to his being primarily a nature man — a dog lover — rather than a lover of a breed and most of all because his tendencies as a kind of doggy philosopher were given to making comparisons.

Whatever disadvantages this state of mind may bring with it (largely affecting the pocket), it does fit one the better to see with the universal eye who would write with impartiality if in some cases with rather less accuracy.

The thing I noticed on entering the show building — apart from the plant decorations of the corridor leading to the main space — were some fine Airedales that had been taken off the benches in order to be ready to enter the judging rings. Next I saw wonderfully fine Bulldogs in the ring; then on my left a long row of flat-coated Retrievers on the benches, with faces so expressive of intelligence and good nature that I could not help saying to myself, "How could any human being fail to admire such animals?" I would fain have put my arms around their necks! (If any unfeeling wretch says "Gush!" take him by the throat till he cries "Hold, enough!") Yes, "Once a fancier always a fancier." I don't know whether anyone ever said that before, but it's true. The explanation is simple. The real fancier is always more or less of an artist. He is attracted by the beautiful in the things he beholds even when he ignores it practically in his own outer man. It may lead him to special admiration of one kind of animal or another, but at bottom it is the same thing. The late "Honest John" Davidson once said to me, "I saw you judging poultry over there. Now I think I could judge a hen." I have no doubt he was right. A man who has the sense of beauty for color, for form, as exhibited in one animal must possess it in no small degree for another. The artist longs for the expression of these feelings, and the fancier (born) does also. He always wishes to breed — to see his ideas embodied in new forms.

But to come from these more general and as I think more important considerations to the dogs of this day and this show, it will be realized that it is quite impossible to do more than make some general observations which show the tendencies in the English doggy world.

So few were the entries in the curly coated Retrievers and in Mastiffs that I believe the classes were cancelled. Just think that within the last few years we have seen with our own eyes the practical extinction of so ancient a breed as the Mastiff.

To offset this there has lately sprung into existence the West Highland Terriers which were exhibited at this show in vast numbers; also his near relative the Cairn Terrier, both of which remind one strongly of the sturdy Scottish Terrier. If I mistake not that veteran Canadian breeder the ever youthful Dr. Niven, is now encouraging the West Highland Terrier in Canada by keeping good specimens in his own kennels. A still newer breed of Terrier is the Sealyham that is used to hunt the Otter, etc.

Apart from these more radical changes, the extinction of certain breeds and the introduction of new ones the kennel world here with all its stability shows oscillations that mark the changes in public taste, both as regards the popularity of certain breeds and alterations in type.

Among those that are on the down grade of popularity to a greater or less extent are Skyes, Scotties, Collies, Borzois and Dachshunde; while Great Danes, St. Bernards, Cocker, Pomeranians, West Highland Terriers, etc., are gaining. Notable is the fact that Airedales now exceed in popularity all other Terriers, Fox alone excepted. Cocker are now in public esteem far in advance of all other Spaniels put together, though good Sussex and Clumbers, breeds now as good as unknown in America, can still make a fair muster on this side.

Pomeranians, that with us may number one or two in the "any other variety class," at this show made a large and good showing. Of course, while all the above named breeds are declining some, in several instances the change is very slight. Collies still make a grand showing, yet not equal to that of ten years ago; nor were the winners the peers of those of a by-gone time.

It is notable that while St. Bernards have so declined on our side of the water here they are still on the crest of the wave in popularity. Never have I seen a more imposing array of these dogs with heads worthy of any painter or sculptor as at this show. But when they were led out of the ring I noted the same defects of body and of limb as in the days of yore, though perhaps not quite so marked; and still the smooths are better balanced dogs than the roughs.

Pointers have sadly declined both in numbers and quality, nor are Setters either holding their own I fear. The winning Setters are dogs that charm the eye. The Irish show a dark coat and darker eye that makes them appeal strongly to the public, while the exquisitely modelled heads of the English meet every demand of fine proportion combined with the useful qualities of the dog specialist.

As the Dachshunde is not, I think, in England, as a rule, a working dog, it cannot be expected that he will advance much in popularity.

I was not greatly impressed by the quality of the dogs I saw, but one

## CRUFT'S DOG SHOW.

thing did come home to me. The judge was a very tall man who was determined to see how the dogs moved and the quality of their limbs, so that his bending low reminded me of the days when I had an aching back from the same hard work at Canadian shows.

Great Danes seem to be very popular in England. They, like all other breeds here, have been shown with uncropped ears for many a year; and I noted that the judge devoted attention not only to the carriage of ears but to the texture, for he felt the ears in most cases. I cannot say that I am convinced that the type of dog prevalent is just what one would wish, yet Great Danes are, in breeding, a very uncertain quantity. One's high hopes may all be shattered in the course of a few weeks in the case of the most promising puppies.

In no breed was I so impressed with the advance in type and popularity as shown in the large numbers of entries, as in the case of the Airedale Terrier. The ideal has almost been reached in a fair proportion of the entries, and in these days coarse dogs, once so common, are scarcely to be seen at such a show as this. The Airedale now certainly deserves to be the young man's canine companion as was once held, though in truth he appeals to all who can see in a breed the realization of a sound ideal. Irish are holding their own well.

Fox Terriers — but what can be said of this the most popular of all Terriers on both sides of the Atlantic, as perhaps also throughout Europe. Nevertheless, the breed is not, in my opinion, in all respects the realization of the best ideal. The ideal it is that is wrong. I still hold, as I have always done, that "bone" is in many cases carried to excess. We have no warrant for this in nature. Every ounce of any tissue more than an animal needs, is a hindrance and is a departure from nature's teachings. Fanciers should consider the fox himself. Look at his legs and be wise. The great trouble with fanciers is just this: They want, and often get, too much of a good thing.

Cocker breeders here approached much nearer to sense and nature than they were twenty years ago. The long and low dog was not to be seen at all at this show. Most of the specimens were active, well made animals, capable of free and rapid movements. Even the term "cobby" no longer applies in the old sense — all of which must delight these who are naturalists first and fanciers second; in other words, those who will have the sound dog first and a special form as a matter of secondary though essential importance.

If, Mr. Editor, the perusal of this report gives your readers a tithe of

## THE O. K. C. SHOW.

The Ontario Kennel Club have closed their special prize list, with the handsome total of 220, and apart from individual contribution have received the support of the Canadian National Exhibition, the Canadian Kennel Club, the Cocker Spaniel Club, and the Airedale Terrier Club of Canada.

The final arrangements for the working of the show are near completion. Spratts will have charge of the feeding whilst the disagreeable odor so often associated with exhibitions of live stock will be entirely routed by a germicide company who have charge of the disinfecting.

Additions to the already substantial premium list have been taking place in the form of Coronation trio classes. Nine of these events were scheduled, and with \$3 first prize in each, and the entry fee being only \$1 per each trio, these competitions will doubtless be one of the leading features. The premium list has already gone to press, and will be in the hands of the public in the course of a few days.

## T. K. C. MONTHLY SHOW.

The Toronto Kennel Club held another of their monthly dog shows at Occident Hall. Whippets, Fox Terriers and Irish Terriers were the breeds scheduled. Mr. Chas. Harrow judged the first named, while Mr. J. Perkins handled the Terriers. One or two debutantes made a very favorable impression, and bid fair to keep to the front for some time to come.

Mr. D. E. Britnell's 7-months-old Whippet, Silver Dollar, is very promising. This is one of the litter bred by Dr. J. A. Campbell from one of the several importations he procured last season. Silver Dollar is a red fawn, with beautiful front and shoulders, lots of heart room, and good, strong loin and quarters. As a show whippet his ears could be improved, and his neck requires to lengthen. Here he won in his classes, defeating amongst others, E. Moran's Comet, who is decidedly lacking in front, Dr. J. A. Campbell's Oakley Flyaway shines more on the track than as a show specimen.

Wire haired Fox Terriers were a class of five. Mr. Hewlett's Riverdale Pearl, well known, winning from a debutante in Mr. E. Sharp's puppy, whose name was missed. The latter is a black and tan headed dog with somewhat heavy body markings. On the night he would not try, and in the hands of a stranger failed to attract attention. But his day will surely come, excelling as he does in fineness of skull, well filled fore-face, small ears and a short back.

Irish Terriers were three, F. Britton's Crowgill Redeemer, first; John Bye's Gatfield Lass, 2nd; F. Britton's Crowgill Princess, 3rd. The winner is a sound, good bodied dog of the cloddy order, but for Irish character and type with a lean skull, small ears and good fore-face commend us to Garfield Lass. This bitch we like immensely and shall watch her future with interest. C. Princess, a dark-eyed bitch with strong fore-face, is too strong in skull and could be reduced in weight with advantage.

Mr. Ford's Joe was the only smooth Fox Terrier entered and in him we have a dog of great possibilities.

March 28th will witness another of the Toronto Kennel Club's monthly shows, Toy dogs being specially catered for.

## BOSTON SHOW FOR MONTREAL.

The Boston Terrier Club of Montreal, it will be remembered, were compelled to abandon the show proposed for last year, owing to the rabies embargo then existing. This embargo, happily, has been removed and the club has claimed dates with the C. K. C. for a one-day show to be held on Saturday, May 20th, next.

The show will be held in the large hall of the Victoria Rifles Armories.

Any surplus accruing from the show will be devoted to a laudable object, the Children's Memorial Hospital, so that a double inducement for effort is before the show committee.

## TOY DOG SOCIETY FOR CANADA SUGGESTED.

It must be gratifying to all Canadian fanciers to see the high position the exhibitors from this side of the line placed themselves on the prize list of the Westminster Kennel Club Show, New York. Especially are the Toy dog breeders due hearty congratulations. We find the names of prominent Canadian toy dog breeders ranking high in such popular varieties as Toy Spaniels, Pugs, Italian Grey Hounds, Yorkshire Terriers, Pomeranians and Toy Black and Tans.

The success which has attended these fanciers suggests that the time is ripe for a "gathering of the clans" of these and other toy breeds under the form of an organization devoted to the interests of the toy dog in general.

To those who have been accustomed to work under the helpful co-operation of a toy dog society the want is a long felt one. Each breeder is, to use the phrase of a well known statesman, "ploughing his lonely furrow," receiving but little help from show committees, whose special interest is as a rule centred on the larger breeds, and the toy dog breeders themselves, giving but scant aid in the way of specials and advice as to what would be a popular, and at the same time, a paying classification.



We have, Mr. Editor, sufficient numbers, and I believe we have the necessary enthusiasm and ability in that number to carry out successfully the aims and objects which such an association lends itself to. And it lies with the Toronto toy dog fanciers to rally themselves under a constitution with these laudable objects in view.

Personally, I should do all in my power to help, and I know there are many fanciers willing to help in the carrying on of a "Toy Dog Society of Canada." Probably a meeting might be convened at one of our forthcoming shows in Toronto, where an expression of opinion might be voiced by those interested, and something done in reality helpful to the breeds which come within the scope of the rules and interests of such a society.

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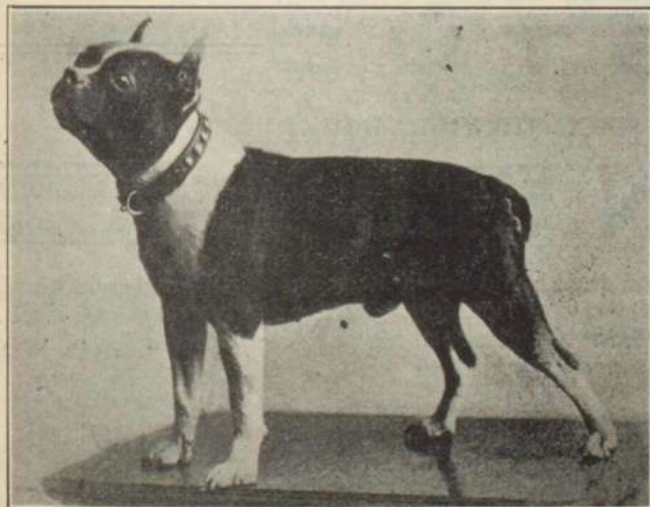
