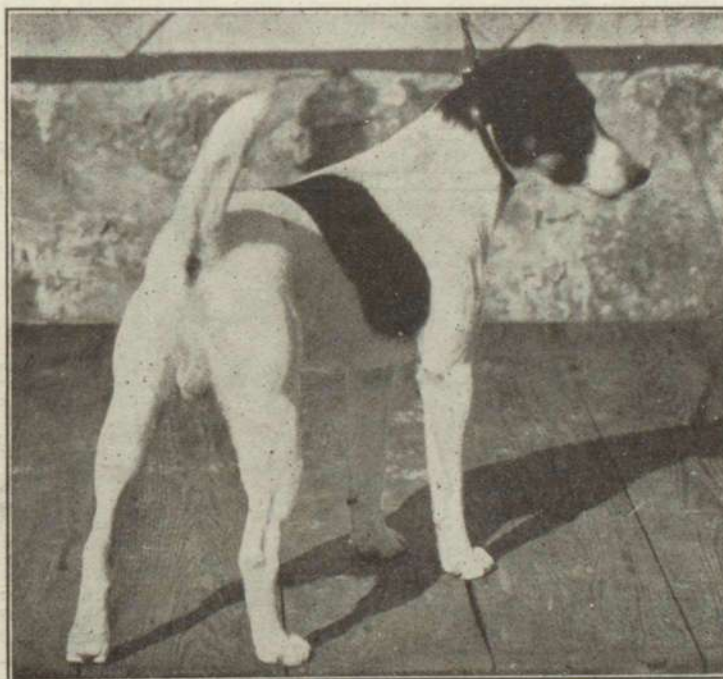

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NOTES AND COMMENTS

T.K.C. Show: The Toronto Kennel Club announces its tenth annual show dates for May 23rd, 24th and 25th, the most pleasant dog show season of the year. We are then over the wet and chill we so frequently get earlier in the season, and the extreme heat of the dog days is absent.

The show will be held in the large Dog Show Building on the Exhibition Grounds, the Canadian National management having generously consented to this arrangement.

This is the best location in Canada for a show, and everything, benching, rings and all, ready to hand.

The classification will be full, and in addition will be offered many cups, medals, trophies and other specials.

Mr. Arthur Atkinson, of fox terrier fame, is acting as show secretary, and this means that the work will be well and carefully done.

Entries will close with him on May 17th, his address being 1129 College street, Toronto.

Mr. Atkinson is one of the men—and they are too few—who are ready to give the same care and attention to matters of this nature that they do to their own business. He is ably endorsed by a large and experienced committee.

O.K.C. Show: The Ontario Kennel Club show gained a point this year over the show of 1910, the 293 dogs actually present giving the show a winner's value of two points. Mr. Chas. H. Mason was kept hard at it until after 7 p.m. on Saturday, the arrangements of the show and the innumerable list of specials not lending themselves to a speedy finish. Method and preparation are sadly needed in most of our shows, and this was no exception.

Mr. Mason was, as usual with him, careful in his decisions, and every dog was given ample examination. Of course, there were here, as at other shows, cases in which in verity a first look was all that was necessary to arrive at a decision. This was particularly the case in some of the specials, where the competing dogs had appeared before in the regular classes.

Mr. Swann kept his temper under some times very trying conditions. It is a matter of history that some of the other officials did not. Mr. John Miles, the President of the O.K.C., gave up his business to devote his whole time to the overlooking of the show, and he was helped by other members of the committee. There was rather an unusual number of lady exhibitors, and we really think that special accommodation for them should be provided. The red dust from the floor was ever present, and we hear that in more than one case "hubby" will be compelled to part with some of his spare dollars to renew Easter wear that felt the effects of the powdered tanbark. Probably the milliners won't object.

There were many outside exhibitors, and the show as a whole was a great success.

How badly we need a proper show building in Toronto!

Mr. Swann was unfortunate enough to get rather a bad bite on two fingers, which on the Sunday following the show were greatly swollen and very painful. This somewhat hindered him in his clerical work.

Mr. Mason spent the Sunday in Toronto under Mr. W. P. Fraser's pilotage. Mr. Mason is an old visitor to the "Queen City." We showed a Skye or two under him here many years ago—must be dangerously near thirty—and he has ever since kept up the connection.

We leave the dogs to our regular report, but mention here a few happenings that may otherwise be overlooked.

The St. Bernard classes were a surprise, Swann & Kehoe's grand trio of youngsters making a splendid win. We have rarely seen three better heads, and the whole lot are sturdy and well-grown. This firm's "trio" win was very popular. Their entrants had an all-round appearance of "evenness" that none of the others had.

The Cockers made a show in themselves. The Cocker men evidently had confidence in Mr. Mason's knowledge of this merry and handsome little Spaniel. Mr. Dyment, from Barrie, and Mr. Tomlinson, from Woodstock, were both present, and were keen competitors. There were enough others to make it interesting for both.

Col. Robert McEwen generally has one of his own careful breeding that is good enough to get to the top in Collies. This show was no exception, the beautiful, clean-headed Hollywood Tytton going through from novice to winners. He is by King Edward Tytton ex Hollywood Trig, and was just too old for the puppy class, being whelped on March 28th, 1910.

Mrs. F. Bell's Beauty made an excellent win, too, and there were several other good specimens.

Bulldogs made a big entry, and there was some good stuff.

In Bull Terriers, Mr. Robertson's beautiful light-weight Willowvale Bloom was put down in splendid condition and she made a clean win over the famous Inferno. The latter has had a good deal of the hog fat run off him since we saw him last, but the bitch beat him decidedly, grand dog as he is, in cleanness of skull, front and feet.

The Boston classes were not keenly contested, though a few good ones appeared. Probably some owners are waiting to try out at the specialty show to be held in Montreal on May 20th. We hope every Boston man—and woman—will be there.

There were several good Bostons, Lord Bell Rock and Lady Bell Rock having the honor of taking the award for best brace in show, any breed.

A strong class of Airedales, with more than one type. Mr. Ussher's grand dog Graystone Growler, held his own well, though perhaps he has gone a bit broad between the ears since Mr. Fraser "found" him. A sturdy type and terrier all the time. The winning bitch, Briar Lass, a daughter of Fontmel Chief, one of the finer kind, a beautiful Airedale that deserved her win.

Fox Terriers came on a bit for this show. They are on the look up.

There were many good Toys, and here the ladies shine. The white Pom Font-hill Admiral is a wonderful coated dog; in fact, he carries so much that he looks bigger than he really is. His outer coat is harsh and heavy, and he has under coat in abundance. An exceedingly handsome dog.

Dr. Foster has some good ones here, and Mrs. Wylie's little chocolate mite was begging for the blue on all occasions. The Toy Spaniel entry was big, Mrs. Williams, Mrs. Hurst, Mrs. Scott, Mrs. Carruthers, Mrs. Babcock and Miss Burnaby accounting for most of them. Mr. Kenyon had the best of the York-shires, his new one being the best we have seen here in some time. A brave little Terrier, with ample coat, albeit a trifle light in color. We were glad to see Mrs. Edwards out again with her dainty Italian Greyhounds. Mrs. Aisthorpe was an exhibitor here, too. Poodles and the French Bulldog, Galopin, completed the Toys.

Airedales for Sale: Last month we gave particulars of the winning Airedale, Fontmel Chief, and on our front page appeared a photo of him. We notice at the Ontario Kennel Club show, held on Good Friday, that Briar Lass, by him, won first place in novice, limit and open, and going to winners, as well as winning the first place in the show for Canadian-bred bitches. In our regular sales column will be noticed a few puppies by Chief are now offered for sale.

Some Home Truths: "Our Dogs" of March 24th in the column donated to "Fox Terrier Facts," gives us on this side some "guid advice" that it will pay us to heed. The Fox Terrier is again on the up grade in popular favor and he will continue to gain prestige if we can unitedly agree on the proper type, the sensible, standard Terrier type. Let us remember that no faddish following of any one particular point makes the dog. We want the complete whole.

But to "Our Dogs" here is what is written:

"From the 'Dogs in Dollarland'" notes which appeared in last week's issue of Our Dogs it seems that Mr. Robert Vicary's awards at the recent New York show have given rise to all sorts of argument "about it and about." Let us hope that the argument will prove profitable, and that our Yankee friends will not "come out by that same door as in they went." We have read Mr. Vicary's critique, and we have read also the comments of various American papers upon his awards. Some of the winning Fox Terriers we have seen; of others we have seen photographs. The knowledge of what really happened, as obtained by us through the above means, is supplemented by an experience of Mr. Vicary's judging extending over a period longer than we care to think about, for the thought relentlessly reminds us that we too are growing old! Thus justifying our position to express an opinion, we do not hesitate to say that at the New York Show Fox Terriers were judged as Fox Terriers always have been judged by Mr. Vicary; and as Fox Terriers always should be judged by a loyal member of the Fox Terrier Club—that is, according to the standard of the Fox Terrier Club. We have the judge's personal assurance that there were no big (out-sized) Terriers paraded before him; so we are enabled

to start unhampered by the "size" bogey. On bone, substance, and constitution we have a word to say, for here were the Terriers that the Americans took a pride in found wanting. In the standard recommended by the Fox Terrier Club we are told bone and strength in a small compass are essentials. A Terrier lacking these lacks essentials, and all the meretricious glamor of so-called "quality" won't make such a specimen a good Fox Terrier. Quality, a term of vague import, can only be an available asset in conjunction with essentials. A Fox Terrier, like a house, must have a firm and solid foundation. The pretty tiles and the ornamental weather-vane won't save the house when the wind and rain beat upon it, any more than all the quality ever put into a Terrier will help his weary legs across a stiff plough, or save his puny underjaw when the fox is not so obliging as to move on, but more inclined to make the Terrier move out. The fox, especially the old Dartmoor gentleman to whom Mr. Vicary alludes in a letter written to an American contemporary, does not always respond to the invitation to move on. Sometimes he requires very considerable pressing, and very often he does a bit of pressing himself. We remember a case of a Fox Terrier having his underjaw taken clean off behind the "holders" in one of these persuasive endeavors; and only last week a particularly nasty old fox who had killed about a score of lambs during the past month, absolutely declined to budge, and fought to the bitter end with the Terrier sent in to dislodge him.

It was in view of such contingencies as these that those responsible for the drawing up of the Fox Terrier Club's Standard decided that bone and strength in a small compass should be essentials. Now about the "small compass." This is also explained and defined. Not leggy nor too short in the leg, and a limit of 20 lbs. in weight suggested. Note well—suggested. Then—back, short, straight, and strong; quarters, strong and muscular; loin, powerful; legs, strong in bone. The idea of strength runs right through the standard, and in the paragraph headed "Symmetry, Size, and Character" is a word picture. Here is a classic. Here we find what Mr. Vicary, an original member of the Fox Terrier Club, crossed the Atlantic, in the autumn of his life, to look for amongst

the American Terriers, and found wanting, except in a very few cases. The true blending of bone, substance and strength with the indefinable quality. It is this blend that makes the Fox Terrier. It is this blend and all it means which make the Fox Terrier the most popular sporting dog in England. To keep him in his glorious position of pre-eminence we require men who will be loyal to the standard of the club to which he owes it. And let it be realized that never in his history did the Fox Terrier need more careful handling than at the present time. The snare which has trapped our American friends has not been spread in vain here. The quality craze has been evident for a long time. The word has been labored and dinned into our ears until we have come to regard it with positive aversion. Two words—quality and size—we have learned almost to detest: have learned how rightly to express the sense conveyed by their perverted use in one word—degenerate. For degenerate we regard the Fox Terrier who possesses not the essentials—bone and strength in a small compass. But let no one say we want our Terrier "cloggy or in any way coarse." We don't; and the Fox Terrier Club Standard most strongly deprecates any idea of coarseness. Our contention is that the Fox Terrier Club's Standard presents a word-picture of the perfect Fox Terrier, and we urge upon breeders, judges, and exhibitors the necessity for keeping that standard ever before them. "Familiarity breeds contempt." 'Tis true enough; and perhaps it is the very familiarity of breeders with the Club's Standard, as set forth in print, which renders it necessary for its beauty and soundness to be pointed out. The Standard speaks of strength, activity, speed, endurance; and of quality. Yes, let us have quality, although the word does not appear in the Standard. One reads between the lines for the quality. Yes, always the quality; but the quality of a real live, gay active workman. Test 'em, prove 'em! Try your £100 prize-winner down under, as we say in these parts—two fathoms or so down and a dozen fathoms in; and then you'll know how essential bone and strength in a small compass are. Then when you've dug down and in, and find him there, then you'll know what reading won't teach you, and what going to shows won't learn you—just what those old folks knew who drew up the stand-

ard of points of the Fox Terrier. Then walk your bonny Terrier home across country, and watch him take hedge or wall; watch him, when the low rail of the gate is too near the ground for him to creep under, put himself like an acrobat between third and fourth! See him posing in the middle of the field! Observe the "quality"! See how he stands—"like a cleverly made hunter"! Take him home and be kind to him. You may well be proud of him. You have a good example of the modern Fox Terrier built according to the Standard of the Fox Terrier Club."

A Gentleman Gote: We do not think that we before noted the death of that incomparable wire Fox Terrier, Messrs. Fraser & Lindsay's Champion Matchmaker. Last November the good old chap was painlessly disposed of. While lively as a youngster he had reached far beyond the average years allotted to the dog and began to feel the approaching cold weather, so it was decided by Mr. Fraser that he was better away.

A winner of over two hundred first prizes in England he repeated his record in Canada as far as opportunity offered. Amongst his wins here are winners at Ottawa and Toronto 1902, Toronto 1904, Montreal 1906. He was conspicuously a laster. At his death, as we say, he was an old dog having been whelped on May 14, 1897. Mr. Charles, of Leicester, was his breeder.

Never was a Fox Terrier bred that had more of the most valuable blood lines of the old or new regime. His sire was the famous All Bristles by Meersbrook Bristles ex Miss Bristles. Back of this breeding we have Knave-mire Jest and Meersbrook Crissy. The sire of Miss Bristles was Meersbrook Bristles, so that this dog was both the grand sire and great grand sire of Matchmaker.

On the female side we have as his dam the Valuator bitch Oronsay Value, her dam being Belgrave Dusty. As all Fox Terrier men know Valuator was by the great Venio out of Valuation. Belgrave Dusty was the dam of Oronsay Value, Dusty being a D'Orsay bitch. What breeding!

Dogs in Alberta: We are glad to see "Sunny Alberta" waking up to its possibilities in dogdom. The Edmonton Kennel Club is a live institution that is looking after canine interests in Edmonton and district. A mem-

bers show is to be held on May 20. The president of the club, Mr. Chas. May, has donated a silver cup to be known as the "President's Cup" to be put up annually for competition. A silver medal will be given for each win made on this cup. Vice-President James Frost will judge all breeds and it is expected that about 150 dogs will be benched.

An open show under C. K. C. rules will be held in connection with the Edmonton Fair in August. Mr. V. E. Green is the secretary-treasurer.

Winnipeg Show: We are advised by Canada's Cruft, Dr. A. W. Bell, that no less a personage than Mr. Theo. Marples is to judge all classes at the big Winnipeg show to be held in July. Mr. Marples is the talented editor of that great paper "Our Dogs," and is a well known judge and one whose engagements are limited only by his time. We hope Mr. Marples will greatly enjoy his ocean and half a continent trip to Winnipeg and he may rest assured of a real western welcome. The show, of course, will be held under C.K.C. rules.

Every point counts.

The Sabines Extending: Negotiations which have been pending through English agents have resulted in the sale of Sabine Reliable to a fancier in Fordsburg, South Africa, for a good, round sum.

Sabine Reliable was whelped March 11, 1909, by Sabine Regular (Recruit ex Fiancee) ex Sabine Flint (by Ch. Sabine Reynard) No. 145380. He won second novice, New York; first novice, reserve winners, Erie, Pa. He is a young dog that should have been shown long ago, but has been held back to make up. He is now in his prime, and went on the Brooklyn, SS. "Kansas," via Delagoa Bay, and to be forwarded from there to destination.

This is the third Fox Terrier this kennel has exported. The other two have "made good" in England, viz., Sabine Roller and Sabine Repartee, known in England as Raby Ruler, the former particularly shining by his daughters, who have been presenting splendid youngsters.

Reliable goes into the "hot bed" of South Africa Fox Terrierdom, and we shall be interested in his safe arrival and on his future record.

Sympathy: Mr. C. A. Stone has the sympathy of those who know him personally and by repute in the death of his son, Herbert A. Stone. It seems but a short time ago that "Herb" Stone assisted his father in the management of the Toronto Industrial dog show, but several years have passed since that time. We met him several times during the past two years on our weekly trips to and from Montreal and to know him better was to like him better. He had developed into a man of affairs, a keen business man, with a pleasant personality. He died at his father's home after a month's illness, at the age of 35. He was secretary-treasurer of the W. J. McGuire Co., Montreal, which position he resigned on account of illness a month ago. He was the first past Chief Rang-

er of Court Sherwood Forest I.O.F., this city, having been a Forester for 15 years. The late Mr. Stone was well known in athletic circles and had a wide range of friends in many prominent walks of life. He was an eldest son.

G. Hopton, Dr. Henry Jarritt, Mr. Freeland Kendrick, and Mr. Geo. B. Sweetnam. Mr. Francis Redmond has already signified his acceptance and will leave England in ample time to keep his engagement.

Whippet racing will again be a feature and it is expected that in addition to the Canadian dogs, several fast ones from the United States will run. Messrs. G. G. Mitchell and G. F. McFarland have been appointed a committee to look after this part of the great Canadian National.

By the Judge, Mr. Robert Vicary, in "Our Dogs."

Fox Terrier Puppies — Nothing of much merit in this class. The winner, a smart Terrier bred in Germany by Mr. J. P. Fritzeche, by Farmer-Flirt; Farmer, I fancy, a son of Re-Echo, was an easy first, and later on secured second in limit dogs; he has good bone and coat, with good shape, likely to improve with age. Junior Class — Bonnimoor Hope first, by Ch. Sabine Resist, own brother to Oxonian. Bonnimoor Hannah is a charming Terrier, very heavily marked, nice head, ears big enough, with the very best of legs, feet and neat body, a small dog, and one of the very best made ones of his size I have come

across; he was also first in limit, and second to Sabine Rifle in the class for American bred dogs. Sabine Resistor, second to B. Hope, a smart, neat dog, a trifle shelly and light all through; as was Sabine Reliable, third.

Tallac Dasher, first in open dogs, a typical Terrier, very good in head, ears, shoulders, legs and feet, somewhat plain in stiles, and not in best form; a journey of 3,000 miles to the show no doubt took off some of the polish, by True Blue Knight—True Blue Nellie; he won at this show under Mr. Mayhew a couple of years ago. Sabine Rarebit, second, by Sabine Ruler—Sabine Fad; a nice quality little dog, but decidedly lacking in bone, foreface and substance—in fact, so light in bone as not to be a desirable sire; in my experience, in either Terriers or Hounds, it is imperative sires should have sufficient bone, or else the kennel will soon degenerate into whip-pets or toys. Warren Distinct, by Sabine Resist, came third, a good Terrier, with ears a size large.

In American bred dogs, I found to my mind the best of the dogs in Sabine Rifle, by Sabine Reynard—Ridgetop Fretful; he has the necessary bone and power, rare legs and feet, bone well carried down; very different from his more famous kennel mate, Rarebit, whom I consider he can very comfortably beat; his head is good, ears put on a trifle low, good neck, shoulders, back and loins; looks all over like doing a day's work, and is a nice size; he took all the specials he was available for and beat the bitch, Baughfell Water Lily, for the Grand Challenge Cup; it gave me much pleasure to come across a dog that would illustrate my ideas as regards the Fox Terrier from a sportsman's point of view. In bitch puppies, Scarlet Poppy, from this side, got first in a very light boned lot, but in subsequent classes fell back to V. H. C., she is just a useful Terrier.

Warren Ransom, first in novice class, all a Terrier, that should make up into a good show bitch. Warren Replica, first junior and second limit, a tan marked bitch of very excitable nature, and good with her teeth; has very good bone, legs, feet and good Terrier head. Sabine Florin, first in American bred bitches, I made the best of this large kennel. These Sabine bitches are full of quality, and

with a suitable outcross should do much to keep the kennel in the front.

Warren Remedy, shown for competition only in brace and team won in brace, whilst the team went to the Sabine Kennels; is a grand bitch, age has deprived her of some bone, no doubt, a great type of Terrier; by Sabine Resist, brother to Oxonian, who at eight years of age found his way to reserve in the open dog class; his head, ears, legs and feet are well nigh perfect; such a Terrier head and expression, age has, of course, taken heavy toll off his make, shape and symmetry. still he remains a grand Terrier, and worthy to be on the same plane as his brother Oxonian.

Wire Hairs—Lynnfield Salex, first in puppies, first novice, first American bred and second limit, is a very good young dog all round; when he has matured and let down will be hard to beat. Endcliffe Live Rail, first in limit and first winners, a first class dog, in great form. Endcliffe Corn Cobb, first in open dog, another very good one, but had to give place to Live Rail in the winners class.

Donington Dot, first in puppy bitches, wonderful short back, very good head, ears and bone, could do with a little more liberty. Her kennel companion, Mary Jane, is another nice puppy; in fact, Mr. Daniel E. Lynn has a very strong hand in youngsters.

Middlesex Pride, by Endcliffe Live Wire—Royston Roseleaf, first in open and winners class; I made quite the best of her sex, a charming Terrier all round.

COCKER SPANIEL CLUB EXECUTIVE.

At a meeting of the Executive Committee of the Cocker Spaniel Club of Canada, held at the Ontario Kennel Club Show, April 13th, it was decided to award the following specials, to be competed for at the Winnipeg Show, as follows:

1. Silver cup for the best black Cocker to be won twice by the same exhibitor before becoming his property. Won in 1910 by T. A. Armstrong, Ottawa.

2. G. W. Dunn shield for best Cocker, any other color than black, to be won twice by the same exhibitor before becoming his property. Won in 1910 by T. A. Armstrong.

3. The W. T. Payne trophy for the best Cocker in show, to be competed for at the Ontario Kennel Club Show, Winnipeg Show and the Canadian National Exhibition, and if won by different exhibitors the Executive Committee of the Cocker Spaniel Club of Canada to decide how to be awarded.

*4. Bronze medal for best puppy dog.

The Toronto Kennel Club's evening show held on March 28th, and embracing all top breeds was the banner event of the season. The room was crowded with fanciers and their friends, many ladies gracing the proceedings with their presence. The entries exceeded all expectations, Poms being particularly strong. Mr. Bert Swann, who judged all classes, certainly pleased himself, though, at least, one of his decision did not meet with the universal approval of the "rail birds."

Italian greyhounds were first on the boards. Mr. T. W. Edwards, being represented by Yettamy and Czarina, which were placed as written. The winner scored decisively in heart room and movement. He fails in skull somewhat and is a shy shower. Czarina is a new face, with good head and face and a nice body but time will improve her a lot.

Blenheim Spaniels were a quality class of three. Mrs. Scott's The Planet stood out a decisive winner. His grand skull, well defined stop and unequalled fore-face were never seen to better advantage, whilst his body has improved. His front is not perfect, and his ring attitude could be improved, but judged as a toy spaniel and not as a sporting dog, he will take an awful lot of beating.

Miss Burnaby's Kenn Be Be 2nd is a beautiful bitch, excelling in size, color and general type. Her skull and fore-face are well above the average, and her eyes, for a Blenheim, are excellent. Owing to a recent indisposition she did not move quite perfect; her sire, Kenn Cleve also owned by Miss Burnaby, came 3rd. This dog, for a 9-year-old looks well. He fails in fore-face to the winners and appeared too full in flesh. Poodles were represented by Miss Ewart's Fluffy, a good dog in fine curl and condition. His cheek lumps are rather too well developed, and he appeared just long enough in back.

English Spaniels (Ruby) — Mrs. Scott's Parkview Premier, was alone. This dog has improved his marvellous condition, being a credit to his keeper. John Cochran walked over in Schipperkes with Seestu Wonder, a good specimen with the correct foxy head, erect ears, short back and hard bristly coat.

Yorkshire Terriers—Mr. John Kenyon here introduced his new purchase, Churchill Star. This dog won on coat and condition. We would like to see him darker in tan and lighter on back. A beautiful dog without a doubt, but fortunate in catching his kennel mate, Churchill Pansy, in poor form.

Pugs — Mrs. J. D. Meadows introduced her new purchase, Ch. Dundee Prince. A black dog of quality, good in twist, body and skull alike, but it is in face properties, wrinkle and expression that he appeared as being all Pug with a big P. The New King, a fawn from the same kennel, is certainly coming along apace. In skull, loose skin and wrinkle he counts heavily whilst losing nothing in body and tail; maturity, or rather the lack of it tells the tale in fore-face however, and there only did he give way.

Poms.—Open Dogs, Mrs. W. Wylie won with Cairndu Mischief. A cream with immense coat and plume, sweet face, short back and perfect ring manners; he won well.

Mrs. Howard's Fonthill Admiral 2nd, a heavyweight white with lots of character and in fine form. It was unfortunate he had to compete with toys. Undoubtedly a dog hard to beat in his own class. Mr. Pendlebury's Billy Possum 3rd. This dog with the majority would have gone up a peg. He is a beautiful chocolate sable puppy, without a serious fault, and in fine form. The judge took exception to the fact that his coat was somewhat soft to the touch, and not sufficiently stand-offish, and his view is quite correct, inasmuch as Billy Possum won easily in puppies. Time will doubtless remedy his failings and he will easily in future competitions take the blue from at least one of his present victors.

Bitches—Mrs. Herd's Mary had a walkover.

Puppy Dogs — Billy Possum stood out easily. Mr. Thompson's Flying Fox made a good second. A sound chocolate in fine form. 3rd, Mr. Ry-

der's Sailor Prince, another chocolate in his right place.

Puppy Bitches — Mrs. Herd's Mary won on sufferance. Good bitch as she is, Mr. Ford's Tiny was the choice. Unfortunately her uneven mouth told heavily, being badly undershot. Mr. Wallace's Flossie was third.

Heavyweight Bitches — Mrs. Fra's Flash was alone, a white of tender age and too young to criticize.

Cairndu Mischief was made eligible for Ward Cup competitions. Fonthill Admiral was reserved.

WINNIPEG WINS.

Some months ago we reported in detail a law case in which the Winnipeg Industrial officials had become involved. The dogs of an exhibitor at the show of 1909 had, it was claimed, died from distemper carried from the show. A suit for some thousands of dollars was entered. We are now in receipt of a wire from Dr. A. W. Bell, the Exhibition Manager, which reads: "Won our dog case. Will send judge's finding later." We congratulate the management for this as far as we can tell makes another precedent in dog law in Canada. The exhibitor, in this case, as in others, of course, has our sympathy but in showing dogs, where reasonable care is taken by show officials, the risk must needs be borne by the seeker after the blue, red and yellow.

COLLIE DOG'S LONG TRAMP TO OLD HOME.

Animal Finds Its Way From Edmonton to Bolton Centre, Quebec.

"Edmonton, April 12.—A thoroughbred Collie belonging to Mr. A. Brill of Edmonton disappeared sixteen months ago, one month after it had been brought here by express from the East. Mr. Brill received word to-day from his father, Rev. D. Brill, of Bolton Centre, near Sherbrooke, Quebec, that the dog had turned up there, apparently having found its way back to its old home, two-thirds of the way across the continent. It will travel to Edmonton once more by express."

(classes 24-26); a silver medal for the best bitch, 22-28 lbs. (classes 27-29); a bronze medal for the second best dog, 12-17 lbs. (classes 5-7); a bronze medal for the second best dog, 17-22 lbs. (classes 8-10); a bronze medal for the second best dog, 22-28 lbs. (classes 11-13); a bronze medal for the second best bitch, 12-17 lbs. (classes 21-23); a bronze medal for the second best bitch, 17-22 lbs. (classes 24-26); a bronze medal for the second best bitch, 22-28 lbs. (classes 27-29). And there are literally dozens of others.

There are one or two points on which the list is not quite clear. For instance, three prizes will be given in each class, 1st, 2nd and 3rd, the usual blue, red and yellow ribbons, denoting the award.

Then, under the head of entry fees, the meaning is not clearly specified. The intention is that the first time a dog is entered the fee is 75c., for each subsequent entry of the same dog the fee is but 25c.

Mr. Charles H. Mower, of Burlington, Vt., who gave such universal satisfaction at Buffalo, will judge all classes.

All classes are divided by weight, 12-17 lbs., 17-22 lbs., 22-28 lbs. To be clear, the classes, we think, should read, not under 12 lbs. and not over 17 lbs., and so on.

The definition of classes is as follows:

Puppy Class—For dogs over six months old and under twelve months old on May 20th, 1911.

Green Class—For dogs never having won a prize at any recognized show.

Novice Class—For dogs never having won a first prize at any recognized show, wins in the Puppy Classes excepted.

Limit Class—For dogs never having won four first prizes at any recognized show, wins in the Puppy and Novice Classes excepted; but no dog having acquired the title of Champion shall be eligible to this class.

Open Class—For all dogs of any age over six months. No prize-winner is debarred from competing.

Local Classes—For dogs residing within a radius of thirty miles of Montreal.

Brace Class—For brace of two dogs belonging to same exhibitor, both of which must be entered in at least one class for which it is eligible; the entry fee is 50 cents for each brace.

Team Class—For team of four dogs belonging to same exhibitor, all of which must be entered in at least one class for which it is eligible; entry fee for each team is one dollar.

Veteran Class.—For all dogs five years old or over on May 20th, 1911.

The date of the show is May 20th, entries closing on May 10th.

BULLDOG JUDGE.

Mine has been "a short life—and a merry one." That is to say, up till recently it was merry enough; and, as the veterinary surgeon has declared himself incapable of mending my broken bones, I scarcely am anxious to have it prolonged. I may add that half an hour ago I was run over by a hansom cab. Result, two broken legs and several smashed ribs. The idiot—most cab-drivers are idiots—kept a filthy pipe between his teeth as he drove, and, blinded by a cloud of reeking smoke, allowed the most uncomfortable and dangerous vehicle ever evolved in what foolish man calls a mind to run over me as I was taking the air in Piccadilly Circus. Having done the mischief, the despicable brute whipped up his horse and disappeared up a purlieu of Regent street. So I am denied the satisfaction of knowing that he will be brought to book—the swine.

HAPPY PUPPYHOOD.

Just seven happy years ago I was one of a litter of five born to my proud prize parents in a little house in a dip of the Sussex Downs. Here, in the most delicious air in the whole wide world, I spent a year. Incident crowded upon incident; my tail was deprived of its unnecessary inches; I took ill of distemper, making a speedy recovery; I slew my first rat—a grey-whiskered whopper nearly as large as myself—in the purling brook which babbled past the lichen-covered flint church; I learned to

"Come when you're called,
Do as you're bid,"

and, one proud November day, in the company of a grizzled Irish terrier, I assisted in digging out a fox, when I covered myself with distinction and gore. But these delightful days, alas! could not be expected to last forever. I was admired by a subaltern, a young sprig of nobility, who, while quartered at the neighboring barracks, used to ride about the neighborhood.

The discriminating warrior, falling a victim to my perfect black and tan marking, the set of my well-bred ears, and my sturdy chest, offered a fiver for me. "Five quid isn't half enough," returned the squireen, whose periodical visits to London did not tend to improve his lan-

guage; "make it ten thick 'uns, and he's yours." "Can't—I'm not a Lipton," was the laconic reply. My grasping owner, however, had an eye to the main chance, and, recognizing that the patronage of the subaltern's brother officers also might be secured, agreed to split the

difference. "seven pun' ten" being asked. A pale pink cheque changed hands, and, escorted by Willy 'um, a shock-headed youth with a beetroot complexion and a grin which nearly met at the back of his bull-neck, I left the farm behind me. Received by my new master and a dozen of his critical comrades in arms, I immediately was voted an acquisition, and a day later two of my little brothers were installed in the barracks. We speedily made ourselves popular, and when, after a pleasant stay of two months, the regiment was ordered to India, I indeed jumped for joy to think

that I should see the world in their agreeable company. My cherished hopes, however, were doomed to disappointment, for rather than face the unpleasantness of life in the East, my youngest brother's owner sent in his papers, while little Lloyd-George, so called because of his marked resemblance to the statesman of the same name, succumbed to a surfeit of dog-biscuit on the eve of embarkation. Happily, the excitement and the novelty of the journey provided a panacea; my childish grief spent itself long before the rolling troop ship had reached Gibraltar—where I was immediately taken for a run ashore. While in this unattractive place I amused myself chasing the monkeys and snapping at the heels of the swarthy "Rock Spaniards." At Malta, our next stopping place, I found no monkeys; but the little Maltese raggamuffins, who infested every twist and turn, afforded fair sport.

Port Said—an uncivilized hole—also was wanting in monkeys; a fair substitute, however, was afforded by the spindle-shanks of the Arab loafers.

A YEAR IN INDIA.

We successfully weathered the appalling heat of the Red Sea (which, by the way, happens to be the color of any other sea), and a typhoon which overtook us in the Indian Ocean; and, in due course, the crazy old ship cast anchor off Madras. After spending a day in the dusty and most unattractive southern capital, my subaltern and I found ourselves in a typical Indian train which crawled through the dreary country, en route for Bangalore. Although I was uncommonly glad to find myself at my journey's end, I cannot truthfully say that I was enamoured of my surroundings; the horrid glare of the sun, the hateful red dust, the uninteresting and stupid Anglo-Indians, and the absolute uneventfulness of life, had an irritating and depressing effect upon me. Noticing this, my thoughtful master decided to visit the sights of India, and together we spent a few days at Bombay, Agra, Lucknow, Delhi, Benares and Calcutta. In this way I made the acquaintance of the caves of Elephanta; Malabar Hill, where the towers of silence are situated; the Taj, which I saw by

sunrise and by moonlight; the Residency, and the Cashmir gate. At Benares I bathed in the holy river—much to the annoyance of a lousy "fakir," and as I passed a sweetmeat seller's stall I sampled his indescribably filthy wares. Finally, Calcutta, a smelly place where the lower orders among the white people play at being aristocrats, was reached. My subaltern and I put up at a dreadful hotel, from which we were rescued by the Vicergy, who, on hearing of our arrival, sent an A.D.C. to invite us to Government House. I may add that it was a relief to put one's teeth to decently cooked food once again, and to be surrounded by the comforts of life, for Indian hotels, almost without exception, are quite the most pestilential places imaginable. I may add that Government House was the only civilized spot in Calcutta, and that I found the blacks to be a pack of impudent, seditious rascals. Judging from recent happenings, things have not improved.

MY FIRST GRIEF.

On the return journey a sad mishap befell me. Half-way between the alleged "City of Palaces" and Bangalore, lured by the artful wiles of a EurAsian station-master, I strolled into the ticket-office. Scarcely had I entered the frousty cell, than the rascal engaged my attention by feeding me with a plate of dainties procured from the refreshment room, and by the time I had finished the repast, hey presto! the train was a mile away. Bitterly did I grieve—refusing food, deaf to the blighter's blandishments, unable to take the slightest interest in life, I drooped like any thirsty flower. After vainly trying to gain my young affections, the thieving rascal sold me to a missionary, who, in turn, bestowed me upon a proselytising native preacher. Eventually, unable to put up with my appalling surroundings any longer, wending my way to the station, I boarded a train bound for Bombay and made friends with a plump Parsee passenger, who had the good sense to take me under his wing. Upon our arrival at "Urbs primis in Indis," as the fatuous inhabitants of Bombay entitle the dreary city, I was installed in a great rambling white-washed bungalow, filled with impossible furniture, and covered with a tangled mass of tropical creepers. Being persons of some discrimination, the household waited on me hand and foot; the ladies of the establishment vied with each other in ministering to my slightest whim, and did a little Parsee boy dare object to my playfully hanging onto the slack of his trousers, the parents promptly clouted the colored urchin. I did not, however, remain long with my host. A month after I had twined myself around the hearts of my new acquaintances, the majority of the family were laid low by the plague, and I was left to my own devices. At this juncture, happily for me, I was annexed by a Commisariat Sergeant, and sold by him to the captain of a homeward-bound passenger steamer. In due course, after weathering equinoctial and other gales, we made the port of London, and the seafaring man bore

me off in triumph to a place named Poplar, of which, I confess, I had never ever heard, but where he lived in the bosom of his family.

ALLEGED ARTISTIC SURROUNDINGS.

Shortly after taking up my quarters in Poplar I again was stolen, being conveyed by the expert thief to South Kensington, where I was sold to a reputed artist, an unclean, ill-kept fellow with long, matted locks, the tallow-like complexion which comes of taking no exercise, and a repulsive taste in neckties. He surrounded himself with minor poets, unplayed dramatists, unread authors, and a theatrical crew of soulful males and corsetless females, the like of whom I had never seen before; and once a week the impossible crowd, foregathering at his rooms, would spout poetry, talk in their silly professional jargon, and generally make themselves idiotic. A fortnight of this sort of thing was as much as I could stand; so, one fine day, I made my way to the nearest dealer's shop, and, jumping on to the counter, tried to make the beery proprietor understand that I was well worth his attention. As luck would have it, at that very moment, an intelligent footman, looking in, casually mentioned that I might suit his mistress, a lady of means, who dwelt in Grosvenor Square. Before many hours had passed, I, too, lived in this delectable place of residence, where I soon was made much of. I cannot, however, say that the persons I met there gained my entire approval. Possibly I am old-fashioned, but I confess it afforded me no pleasure to find the lower orders rubbing shoulders with their betters. The good creature who had bought me, though an alleged gentlewoman, was a modern Mrs. Leo Hunter, and spared no effort to fill her rooms with notabilities, some of whom were more noted than presentable, while others had positively nothing to recommend them. Like Don Giovanni, she was not particular as to who partook of her hospitality—provided the house was filled with people—needy company-promoting peers, absurd tradesmen-baronets, younger sons on the lookout for American heiresses, actors of the "curled darling" type, bishops filled to the brim with pious platitudes, tub-thumping non-conf rmist clergies, brazen divorcees, intense youths who spouted their own doggerel, uncivilized missionaries, incompetent, ungrammatical authoresses—all were effusively welcomed. I must, however, admit that during my stay I heard some of the finest singers of the day. Melba and Plancon, when at the height of their fame, sang in the huge white and gold drawing-room; Caruso warbled Tosti's "Idelle" as he alone can sing the pretty ditty, using a singularly alluring mezzo voce and investing his gorgeous upper notes with resonance in which power and restraint were happily allied, and one never-to-be-forgotten evening Renaud sang Martini's lovely "Plaisir d'Amour" with such fine art that his rendering must have been the despair of several stupid, pride-puffed British baritones who were present.
