

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NOTES AND COMMENTS

The C.K.C. meetings: The abnormally heavy ballots cast for the annual election to the Canadian Kennel Club would appear to indicate that the members are taking an increased interest in the affairs of our national kennel organization. This is as it should be and must be satisfactory to the committee into whose hands the members have placed the management of their affairs.

As a matter of fact the make up of the Committee has changed but little. Mr. W. M. Coats is a new man on the list. Mr. F. T. Miller, the vice-president for Manitoba, is an old friend. Mr. Ussher is the new man on the executive. We hope that Montreal, with a vice-president and a member of the executive, may take a more active interest in the Club's welfare.

The Maritime provinces are not represented, but the fault, if any, is but that of the members residing in the far east. It is one, too, that the Executive Committee have power to correct by supplying the vacancy on request.

The new additions to the puppy class rule will give owners the privilege of removing their entries at the close of the day of judging. There are certain exceptions to this in the case of first, second and third prize winners in limit and open classes.

The change in the regulation of listing fees is in accordance with the rules of the American Kennel Club, which body has been through the same trouble as was the C.K.C. in this matter, but in an aggravated degree. By the adoption of the new ruling a listing fee of twenty-five cents must be paid for each unregistered dog for each show where he is exhibited. It is hop-

ed that this will naturally lead to an increased use of the C.K.C. Stud Book and thereby greatly and permanently benefit not alone the owners of dogs registered but all those interested in breeding and showing of dogs.

That active operations should 'be put in motion to bring about a reasonable and uniform system of license law in the different provinces needs no comment. We hope that the Hon. Sol-

icitor of the C.K.C., who has this matter in charge, may soon be able to report favorable progress. That some municipalities are going wild was evidenced by the statement of Mr. W. B. Wells and given to the meeting by the Secretary, that the City of Chatham, Ont., was about to impose the outrageous fee of fifteen dollars each for bitches.

Dr. Babcock dead: The sudden death of Dr. Almon A. Babcock, Brantford, Ont., removes a once prominent exhibitor of Irish Setters and promoter of shows in his home city. A strong C.K.C. advocate, he for many years was president of the Brantford Kennel Club, when that club was at its zenith. Alas! it is but a memory and the sad death of its one-time president brings it to mind once more.

One of a few: We hear that the good heavy weight Pointer, Devonshire Maxim, died a few days ago. He was successful as a show dog while in Canada and we could illy lose to the States one of the few good Pointers we had.

Western Bulldogs: Mr. A. G. Persse, of Winnipeg, Man., reports that his Bull bitch Crescentwood Crete whelped the unusually large litter of ten on August 25th. The bitch killed one the first day and Mr. Persse since disposed of another, but the remaining eight, four of either sex, and all brindles look like thriving and doing well. The sire of the puppies is Mersey Bryn Admiral.

Montreal Show: Premium lists for the Montreal K. C. show on Oct. 5th, 6th and 7th have been mailed to all who have applied for them. Additional copies may be had from the Secretary, Mr. J. R. Canadian Kennel Club rules govern so that all regular wins will count.

The additional rules show that entries close on September 28th, the fee in each class being one dollar. Judging will begin on Thursday, October 5th, at 11 a.m. The other rules are of the regular order.

A big entry is confidently looked for and the bigger the entry, the greater the value so that "points" are solely in the hands of exhibitors themselves.

An old timer gone: We were sorry to see announcement of the death of poor Fred Habart, lately of Toronto, but for a year or so a resident of Pittsburg, Pa. Mr. Habart was a dog lover and a sportsman, whose fancy ran to Greyhounds, Foxhounds and Beagles, and he used them, too, in their legitimate work. And, by the way, what grand strings of Beagles we used to see in Toronto in Habart's time. Joe Lewis was a big exhibitor then and positively dozens of others. Importations of good stuff were many and frequent.

Greyhounds, too, were a feature. Mr. Kent's Terra Cotta Kennels always being in at or near the front. The same with his Russian Wolfhounds, or Borzois. Where have they all gone to or their descendants?

The C. N. E.: A multiplicity of duties, not the least of which is the preparation of a detailed report of the year's doings for the C. K. C. meeting, prevented us from spending as much time in the dog show at Toronto as we would have desired. We were, however, able to spend the best part of an afternoon watching Mr. Francis Redmond judge some of his classes. We would not have missed the opportunity for very much more of effort than it cost us. Mr. Redmond settled some points for us on which we had a reasonable doubt. One, that a Fox Terrier cannot win simply because of size, within reasonable limitations. little one, no matter how much character, must have more; sufficient bone and substance, chest, feet and body. The larger dog is not too heavily penalized for his size alone if he has those qualities that make up the winner as a whole. If Mr. Redmond had been inclined to "the good little ones," so called, his decisions might have been different in the wires of both sexes, for at least one "good little one" peared in either sex.

Then Mr. Redmond judged the dogs. He got out all that was in them and did not depend on the handler to do so. In more than one instance he not alone took the dog away from his handler but actually compelled the handler to stand entirely aside, that the dog's attention might not be disturbed. Mr. Redmond plainly believes-and acts on his belief-that it is due each entry that the best of him or her be shown, and that it is the duty of the judge to get this even if it becomes necessary to take the lead himself. This strengthens the ground we took in Gazette some months ago and perhaps Mr. H. W. "Stock-Keeper" would stick a pin here too.

A well groomed, well set up, dapper little man, the years have touched Francis Redmond lightly. His judging is an object lesson, careful, from the pat on the back to the examination of mouths and feet. And there is no byeplay, everything quietly methodical and in order. He insists on getting what he wants to see, and jockeying for place and effect loses all its force here. His winners even are placed in their proper order. In the ring, quietly persistent, he brooks no interference with the object he aims at. He seems

to know exactly what he wants, and gets that, no more, and certainly no less. We could have watched him with profit for a week, had time permitted. We hope Mr. Redmond took as much pleasure in judging as we and others did in seeing him judge. If he did he will be well repaid for his long trip to "Our Lady of the Sunshine."

What a wretched old barn the dog show building is! And it looks worse than ever, now that so many handsome, up-to-date buildings have been erected on the big show grounds. Even the feathered folk are housed in a new thirty thousand dollar brick and stone building, and no "gate" is exacted from visitors either. We hope the C. K. C. Committee may be able to effect a much needed change before the show of 1912 rolls around.

We missed many old faces: some have passed on, many are not now interested in dogs. But the younger generation keeps the game alive, perhaps in a bit different spirit. fashions, too, have changed. Gone are the long rows of Pointers, English and Irish Setters, Black and Tan Terriers. The Mastiff seems to be as nearly extinct as the Dodo. And so with other breeds. But as a recompense we have Bulldogs, Bostons, Airedales, etc. Such is life. As a fellow countryman of the writer's once said in the British House, "We're gone to-day and here tomorrow."

All Terrier Club: We are gratified to know such a club was organized at the Toronto show. A club embracing so many popular breeds, and which must to some extent at least, foster the less popular classes of Terriers if it is to be at all consistent with its name, will surely "take holt" in Canada and work wonders. Sounds about as sane an organization as has been inaugurated in Canada for some time. Imagine its scope for a specialty show! Help it along and don't forget there are other kinds of Terriers besides your own particular brand.

The annual meeting, which was very largely attended, immediately followed the executive meeting. Mr. Kent in chair.

Secretary's report, as follows, was distributed:

SECRETARY-TREASURER'S RE-PORT.

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen-

I beg to lay before you my annual report for the year ending August 31st, 1911. I am glad to be able to say that a vigorous collection campaign has increased our revenue from membership fees, the total received

from this source being \$1,122.00, as against \$695.00 for the previous year. Our membership is still altogether too small and the 1,000 mark that we aimed at some years ago appears to be still a long way in the future. The number of exhibitions held under our rules shows a gratifying increase, especially in the Western Provinces. I am also pleased to report that Montreal held a specialty show during the past year and has announced a general Show for October under our rules. Ottawa, too, is back in the fold and isholding a Show next week. St John, N.B., likewise. I very sincerely trust that our members, by their entries and, if possible, by their presence, may help those shows that particularly need help.

Number of dogs registered during the year, 572. This again shows a reduction and a very serious one. 712 dogs were registered in 1910, and 814 in 1909. I am fairly confident that this reduction in registration is largely due to the slip shod substitute called listing. Another feature is that the \$5 tax on bitches, in several places, has worked against registration. During May and June of 1910, the period when dog taxes are generally paid, there were 173 dogs registered, while during the same period this year but 91. I feel and write very strongly on this point and hope that the difficulty may be overcome before registration season comes around again and that the old rule in favor of reduction in fee to registered bitches may be put into force.

It is the duty of this meeting to elect an Hon. Solicitor, two auditors and two delegates to the Canadian National Exhibition, Toronto.

Notice of Motion-At the Executive Meeting held Sept. 7th, 1910, the following notice of motion, for action at this meeting, was put in by Mr. F. C. Hill, Vancouver, B.C.: "The puppy class shall be for American bred dogs over six months, and not exceeding twelve months of age, and no entry can be made of one under six months, or whose date of birth, breeder, sire, or dam, is unknown. An American bred dog is one born on the Continent of North America."

Addition: "Puppies may be permanently removed from a show after their classes have been judged, but ourly after the close of the show in any evening.

Puppy classes to be judged not later than the second day of the Show."

Notice of Motion-by Mr. John Miles, that puppies entered in the limit or open classes and winning 1st, 2nd or 3rd prize must remain until the close of the show.

Notice of Motion-by H. M. Dyment, that listing fee be twenty-five cents for each dog for each show.

Notice of Motion-by Dr. Boultbee, that the C. K. C. provide for an official board of veterinary surgeons, board to consist of three members.

Recommended by the Pacific Advisory Board that copy of Gazette and membership application form be forwarded to all exhibitors. This was before the Executive at their meeting held on August 4th, when it was moved by Mr. Miles, seconded by Mr. Tibbs, and carried that the matter be referred to the annual meeting.

Minutes of last meeting as published in Gazette, taken as read.

Financial report on motion of Messrs. Tibbs and Fraser was accepted subject to usual audit.

Mr. McFarland was re-elected Hon. Solicitor, and Messrs G. B. Sweetnam, and F. Jacobi, auditors.

On motion of Messrs. Atkinson and Tibbs, Mr. Jno. G. Kent and Mr. W. P. Fraser were appointed delegates to the Canadian National Exhibition, Toronto.

Mr. Hill's notice of motion was seconded by H. B. Donovan. Moved in amendment by W. P. Fraser, seconded by A. Armstrong, that first paragraph of addition to rule be added. That is that part beginning with the word "puppies," and ending with the word "evening." After discussion, in which Mr. Creighton, of Victoria, B.C., supported the motion, a vote was taken when the amendment was carried and the motion lost.

Mr. Miles' notice of motion was sec onded by Mr. Atkinson and carried

Mr. Dyment's notice of motion was seconded by Mr. Tibbs and very fully discussed. Mr. Dyment strongly supported his motion, giving instance of two cases where non-registration worked against the interest of the better dog. Mr. Armstrong, Ottawa, was opposed to it. Mr. Miles moved, seconded by Mr. Coulter, that the annual listing fee be 50c. This amendment met with no favor and on being put was lost. The original motion was then put and carried,

Dr. Boultbee's notice of motion was seconded by Mr. Best. Moved in amendment by Mr. Fraser, seconded by Mr. Tibbs that an Hon. Veterinarian be appointed by the Executive Committee. Amendment carried.

The suggestion from the Pacific Advisory Board that a copy of Gazette and a membership application be sent to all names in dog show catalogues was unanimously carried.

On motion of Messrs. Donovan and Atkinson, all above changes in rules do not become operative until Jan. 1st. 1912.

Messrs. W. P. Fraser, F. Jacobi and H. Tibbs were appointed a Rules Committee to make all necessary changes governed by above and other prior motions, if any, and to report in full to next Executive Committee meet-

Dog License Fees: This matter was discussed at great length and many cases of hardship were quoted. It was thought the only relief would by through provincial enactments, and the Hon. Solicitor of the C.K.C.'s work will be along this line.

Dog Show Building: This old grievance at Toronto was brought to the front again on motion of Messrs. Atkinson and Perkins proposing that a strong Committee be appointed to press for a new building for the dog show on the Canadian National grounds. The motion was unanimously carried, when the chair appointed the following Committee: Messrs. Fraser, Atkinson, Perkins, Dyment and Dr. Boultbee.

The scrutineers reported on the election as follows. The ballots cast were fifty per cent. greater in number than ever before.

CANADIAN NATIONAL EXHIBITION DOG SHOW.

Nineteen eleven may not have been the largest show that Toronto has seen but it undoubtedly was the best in quality for some years. It would almost seem as if the embargo and other restrictions of the past eighteen months had given great impetus to the fancy. Anyway there was a great leap ahead which we trust is but the beginning of a new epoch in the dogdom of Old Ontario. Of course, such shows don't merely happen. Liberal prize money, good specials, the best qualified judges, publicity, good and concerted management were essential factors in the success of this year's show, but behind these the keen observer could not help but note the deepening interest displayed by both young and old fanciers and the good sportsmanship manifest on every hand. There is only one cloud in the clear sky of the future, that is the old building. It was made the most of this year; limewash and bunting worked wonders in its appearance and sweetness but its day is past. We appeal to you, Mr. President of the C. K. C., and Vice-President of the C. N. E. You're our heavyweight on the Board, our bright and shining light. The chicken men are crowing over their new abode. The women smile with pleasure as they dis-

play their handiwork in a handsome, modern structure. The railroads, manufacturer, dairymaid, horticulturist, farmer, artist, all these have received favorable consideration, while we, and we alone, are left to jockey with an old recluse on an unfrequented path that almost turns over on its side every time a train passes. Yes sir, we know your tenacity and powers of persuasion. Get for us a new building and your good works shall be numbered as the stars in the heavens (on a dark night) and your name shall pass down into posterity revered by proud youth and grey hairs alike. The added responsibility and care will in no wise upset the complacency of Supt. Jacobi. He's big enough for any job in the "dawg show" line, We venture also that the benefits would not be all one sided. An increased gate would almost surely result and though the 628 dogs this year comprised no mean show, improved accommodation ought to bring out another hundred anyway.

We would be somewhat slighting our opportunity if we passed without remark the select gentlemen appointed to place the awards. We shall deal more or less with their work as we review their classes. Their decisions were taken with general good grace as

coming from men expert in the breeds which they handled. Some of them are familiar figures in our shows. Others, Mr. Francis Redmond in particular, are known to us by reputation only. We trust that their visit was enjoyable. It certainly was from our standpoint and profitable also. We are always glad to use judges' reports, whether we see fit to comment on their classes or not. Their remarks, especially on popular breeds which are shown in large numbers, are of the greatest value to the dogs' owners as well as being items of news to the fancy in general, Any trouble a judge goes to in this respect, will not return unto him void (How-Ed.) St. Bernards came out to the number of ten and new life seems to have come into this grand breed, so adaptable to "Our Lady of the Snows." There was nothing that Mr. Lacy could see his way clear to put over the handsome old Agawa Duke. He was put down in grand form, playful as a kitten, notwithstanding his grand bone. He was very closely followed by his kennel mate, Lady Wolfram, Messrs. Stuarts' latest importation. She is a remarkably good stamp of bitch, apart from being a little on the small side. She excels in depth of muzzle, wrinkle and expression and if a little stronger in skull, would be almost perfect in head qualities. The reserve winners dog, Lord Charlworth, is a nice dog but has not the massive bone of Duke nor his size and is none too good behind. Swann & Kehoe also came through with a pretty decent pair. Prince of Parkdale is a good headed one but bad in front, while Silver King of Parkdale is a bit shallow for present company. The reserve winners bitch was another of Swann & Kehoe's Mistress Marmion, small but owning a great skull and sound and compact.

Bloodhounds and Newfoundlands don't seem to go ahead much, but it

was a pleasure to see some of Johnson & Reid's string of Danes after some of the "butchers' dogs" frequently shown at some of our local shows. Rex Gloria is typical and has the advantage over Queen Bess in head and eye. The only entry in the puppy class was Niagara Bell, an uncropped youngster but with too much jowl. The best of the Russian Wolfhounds came from Rosseau Kennels, dogs of high quality, particularly the large one, Odin of Rosseau, long and clean in head, good bone and splendid reach. Greyhounds don't seem to go ahead very much. Ben Lewis's old dog, Lansdowne Coldstream, went up once more but he's mighty near the end of his tether. Mr. Coulter's Queenie, also a grandparent several times over, was

American Foxhounds were so much superior to last year's exhibit that comparison is useless. Mr. Walker's winning dog, Jim Walker, is a big clean hound, with good legs and feet, a shade long cast but excelling in length of neck. Woods & Ritchie's Jack is heavier, not so clean in neck and shoulders, lacking some to the winner in general quality. In bitches Mr. Lewis won with Lansdowne Ontario, a real good one and Lansdowne Niagara reserve. Mr. Gibson also showed a good pair of bitches in Gibson Girl and Typsy Walker, the latter, especially, is well put together Hound of rare quality. The pair are smaller than Mr. Lewis' team. For the first time in years, English Foxhounds had to take 2nd place to the Americans. Mr. Bannister's team have done quite a bit of winning and didn't have much trouble here.

What happened to Pointers? Only four dogs including Mallwyd Glory in poor condition and showing age. English Setters were also down a bit in numbers. Mr. Lewis' Lansdowne Noble is a classy one, nicely domed skull and lots of dip and entirely out-classed his only male competitor, which is altogether too heavy in skull, besides having poorly placed ears. He was also beyond anything in the bitches, also a fair pair with not much choice between the winning two. Irish Setters somewhat more up for the lack of Pointers and English Setters and the quality, generally speaking, was good. Mr. Hanna's Shamees O'Brien was put

through to winners in dogs and in our opinion got all that was coming to him. He has bad feet. Next to him was Mr. Johnson's Doc Law, a very nice type of Setter. 2nd in open was Mr. Woodhouse's Shanasagh, nice head and front but fat and lacking feather. What we considered the best of the dogs only got 4th place in the open class. This was Mr. Johnson's St. Cloud's Kenmore, a lovely colored dog, cleaner in head than his kennel mate and better in coat. We are also of the opinion that Ch. Mickey Finn got harshly treated. In bitches, the judge saw nothing fit to put over good old Ch. Nora Shannon, still showing her quality and in wonderful condition for her age. We were very much taken with the best of Mr. Woodhouse's string, Riddle Rip Rap, reserve winners. She excels in symmetry and is a good quality bitch right through. Moroney & Johnson's Brown Betty could be vastly improved by conditioning. She is thick in skull and has poor feet but shows merit. Mr. Rushbrook's Pride of Erin has the appearance of being long in body and a rather good head is somewhat discounted by a light eye. Gordons turned out to the extent of three, the best, Mr. Payne's Sir Gordon.

We are passing somewhat hurriedly over Mr. Redmond's classes, in the hope of a report from his own pen. It was a pleasure to note the quiet, careful manner in which he went over what was placed before him and to see the extremes to which he would go to get the best out of a dog. If a handler could not get the desired results, Mr. Redmond would himself frequently take the lead and work with the dog. He has the reputation for being a sticker on legs and feet which we fancy will be maintained by those who showed under him in this country. Some 34 Airedales lined up before him, including a number of American dogs. We were delighted to see Mr. Ussher's Gravstone Growler plough through his classes to the head of the list. From the head back he had everything else eclipsed. He is a very compact dog, excelling in bone and front and is characteristic of his breed. There were several better heads eves in the show, however. smooth Fox Terriers we wish that there had been some "Sabine" dogs to

show up alongside Mr. Rutherford's string; then there would have been some "sure 'nough" fun. As it was Mr. Rutherford had things pretty much his own way, winning in dogs with Ch. Warren Distinct and in bitches with Warren Redress. The latter is a very fascinating little bitch, showing lots of quality without any serious faults and was put over the famous Remedy. Wires brought out such celebrities as Mr. Keyes' Endcliff Corncob, who had to give way to Lynnfield Salax. There was an improvement in Irishmen also this year, we are glad to welcome Mr. Finley's dogs back again. We also hope to publish a treport of Mr. Hopton's classes, written by himself. In passing may we just remark, relative to Bulldogs, the different values the different judges place on soundness. With Mr. Stewart's winning bitch, Kitty Royal, we have to relate but praise. She simply walked away from the rest. But his winning dog, however good in other respects, is certainly defective behind and we think got a little more than his deserts in a decision over a good, sound, sensible Bull like The Little Nipper.

Getting back with Mr. Lacy again, we found Dachshunde out in fairly good numbers. Von Kettler was head and shoulders over everything else in both sexes. He is a red, and is long, low and sound, with an exceptionally ling, well-balanced head. Next came Pr. West End Earl, a dog with a better tail but losing in color of eye and length of head. Mr. Saunder's The Doctor from Guelph, was shown a bit fat and is also loose in shoulders and poorer in front. The winning bitch, Beauty S., is a bit high on leg, otherwise very fair. Mr. Saunders' other two bitches ran her very close.

Whippets were about the usual and placed correctly as far as we could see with the exception of winners bitch. This one was only an unmatured puppy, hardly looking like a whippet compared with Mr. Richard's pair of well-trained runners, both a bit gone in feet. The winning Pugs were splendid, especially the winning dog, one of Mrs. Mendows' own breeding, which beat her well-known Ch. Dundee Prince. Italian Greyhounds were also good winners going to Mrs. Aisthorpe's Blue Bell with Mrs. Tomlinson's Princess Louise reserve.

EDMONTON DOG SHOW.

At Edmonton, this year, we had the pleasure of going over the dogs in a new building, erected especially for the purpose, and one of the best in the West, if not in North America. Such is the progress of this new country. There are a few things, such as special numbering and catalogues we have not reached at this fixture, but they will arrive shortly.

It is always a reporter's privilege, but to be handled with care, of differing with the judge, and on this occasion we shall have to do a little of it though not in a spirit of malice or from interested motives.

Our dogs are improving, and will improve faster as we make more money and have more time to look after them. At present we are very busy with very many other things.

In Cockers, winners dogs went to Ch. Crystal (W. Saunders), the black so well spoken of recently, by Mr. Coats who judged him at Calgary.

Kriss, 1st in novice, 2nd in open, is a son of Crystal, and good all over, though he could stand a little

strengthening in foreface. Orkis Freckles, the winning bitch, is a lemon or red and white, of the Welsh type; has quality and though only a puppy, won well. She should have quite a future. Brookdale Bonfire, a good sort of red, is showing age and his mouth will keep him off the top rungs of the ladder. A very promising seven months puppy in Jessie ran into the money and will be heard of again.

The Fox Terriers call for some comment, as showing the advance being made in home bred ones. The 1st in winners dogs, Escort, was lucky, as he is probably at his best now. He is catching at first sight but too weak in foreface with a gay carriage of ear; is too straight in shoulder, which will be likely to throw his elbows out and his back is long enough. The second Whinstone Rustem, I make out to be the best smooth yet bred here and a good Terrier anywhere, shorter in back, better eve, head and carriage of ear, better shoulders, more bone and better feet than the winner. The best of the smooth bitches is a very neat one in

Whinstone Darling. A very useful Terrier was shown by J. A. Robertson, and a nice bitch by Mr. McLean. Most of the others were not show dogs. There was one nice wire bitch in Whinstone Duchess, good in body, size and character and coat, but ctuld be strengthened in head and jaw power.

Retrievers were a nice lot. A nice flat coated black dog won in his class and a good Labrador, Dusk, should have found a place in the money, for, though a bit heavy in head, he was very typical in body coat, tail and general character and very fit. The bitch winner in curlies has won before and is a hard one to down anywhere, but is now being shown too fat. The second (E. D. Adams), is another good sort, but has not the reach of the first nor is she quite as good in head. Mr. Adams' well-known black smooth bitch was first in bitches of that order.

Airedales were but three, all moderate, and Edmonton can do a good deal better in this breed if she tries.

Collies not numerous but interesting. Winners dogs went to Mr. Hull's new dog, Braemar Perfection. No doubt the sort of dog that wins now with exaggeratedly long and narrow head, foreign eve and expression. He has good ear carriage, body and coat, but to an old collie lover, who is, no doubt, behind the times, not the sort he has been used to and shows to what extremes the Borzoi blood has carried the show Collie. Second came Holyrood Professor, always a handsome dog he suits us better in type, though perhaps not so modern. Still, he has more room in his head for his brains to work in, though he loses to first in ear carriage. He is also in good coat and condition. The bitches were fair. There should have been a stronger turnout all round and Calgary dogs were more in evidence all through than the Edmonton dogs. The owners of the latter should show more spirit at their own show.

Bull dogs.—Quite a nice little turn out. The winning dog, Chancellor, is all a bull dog, except condition. He has a massive head and great lay back, good foreface and neat body; was bred in this region and is a credit to Alberta. Avonmuir Lady was the best of the bitches and has been a good winner on previous occasions, a nice bitch anywhere. Mrs. Hester's Butternut is a great bitch from her

ears back has a nice skull but loses before the eye. Mr. Robertson, of Calgary, showed a useful dog and there were others though not of remarkable merit.

The Bull Terrier winner in dogs was absent when I went round, and of the rest the only one that will be heard of again was a dog puppy that will come along later. Irish Terriers were moderate all through and not as good as four years ago.

English Setters.-The dog picked for first in open and winners, called Lucky, is a nice one, but he certainly was lucky to beat the second, Winter's Sport, who is good all over and has more than fulfilled previous predictions. Had there been a special for best dog in show, and had "yours truly" been judging, that special would most probably have landed here. Sport is a great dog, though bred in the province, a typical Setter with good head, exceptionally good foreface, fine body, legs and feet, long clean neck and good shoulders is a typical English Setter, yet looks as if he had speed and energy. His conqueror is nice in body, coat and general make up but falls off in muzzle and is bitchy in head and a little off in expression. Another nice dog was shown that did some good winning last year, but shown on this occasion as fat as a prize pig. And there were others.

The Irish Setters were not numerous, but typical and well shown.

Chesapeakes a goodly class. No doubt good at work but strong in head for show purposes. This is a popular and numerous breed in these regions for duck shooting purposes. Irish Water Spaniels were fair.

There were four capital Bostons on view. Squantum Barney, a dog, and a fine puppy, Criterion Peter, good in head and if he lets down in body will make a good one. Another local dog is more than useful and so is a bitch shown from Calgary. One useful black Greyhound was on view and two Deerhounds, but the winner is plain and not nearly as typical as the bitch that he beat, though she is rather on the small side. One Great Dane is rather weak in foreface but back of that nice all over. There were three Scotties and a useful Bobtail, two nice Dalmatians, a somewhat large though very typical Jap Spaniel and a Prince Charles, and we are coming very near

the end. One breed missed out is the Pointers, a falling off from last year. The winning dogs this time are good looking but too big and houndy.

Dog shows are coming along and we only need a little time to develop, for our fairs are rapidly coming up to a pitch of excellence seldom attained even in the East; and as far as accommodations go in buildings and general set out of grounds I do not know where one would go to beat Edmonton. Visitors, exhibitors and judges get the very best of treatment from the management who seem to vie with each other to see which can do the most for those under their care for the time being. Some of our dog exhibitors have much to learn, and there are some details of dog show management that need brushing up, but these will soon arrive as the intentions of the management are of the best. We cannot attain all at once the metropolitan conditions. It is a marvel that things are coming as fast and doing as well as they are. If we are not quite "au fait" in all our details, there is no suspicion of ulterior motives and good sportsmanship prevails even if we do not yet do just as we should all at once. There should be a good market for good dogs out here pretty soon.

WINNIPEG SHOW.

There were 436 dogs benched at the recent Winnipeg Show, making a winner's value of 5 points.

OTTAWA DOG SHOW.

From a local standpoint Ottawa put up a fairly good show this year. The new building is certainly an improvement on the old quarters and is such that it can be extended quite easily. It was tastily decorated and kept clean and sweet. The benching was ahead of anything we have seen in Canada, and is undoubtedly a valuable acquisition to the show. As usual, the number of entries was a little disappoint-We looked for more than 170 dogs in Canada's capitol city. A little less rush toward the end, fewer strings on the specials, and more personal work should place this show in the two or three point class next year.

Mr. Ben Lewis handed out the ribbons without fear or favor. He went very carefully over all classes, taking plenty of time to avoid mistakes. He had his string of dogs from Toronto on exhibition only, which was an added attraction to the regular show.

In St. Bernards, Messrs. Stuart's team easily topped the class. Mr. Dolan's Guardsman is a raw-boned, plain faced dog. We were agreeably surprised with a few of the Danes, almost all of whom we badly discounted by poor cropping. King is a rather typical, sound dog, nice in head, but poorly cropped. Martha is of much the same type and though showing a bit more wrinkle on skull, was an easy second. This pair out-classed the others, all of whom were thick in skull. We were also glad to notice a very decent pair of Bloodhounds. English Foxhounds were about the usual, Mr. Bannister's Thrush and Watchman having an easy time. American hounds, as at Toronto, were good, the bulk of the ribbons going to Mr. Baldwin's kennel. Only one Pointer, thick in skull and a fair pair of English Setters. Irish Setters were somewhat better.

Cockers were strong in numbers. Some very good and some very poor. The best one was undoubtedly Mr. Armstrong's red bitch, Ottawa Stella. She is a sweet-headed little miss, with excellent bone and front, cobby and sound and when furnished will be fit for any company. Ottawa Blondy is larger and apart from being undershape, a nice stamp of Cocker. Novice solid color dogs brought out a useful,

rather nice headed dog called Grip, shown in splendid condition. First in limit, solid color, was taken by Rockfield Riot, a very fair one, early in coat, while second was Ottawa Pecho, bigger and well up. Winners dogs, solid color was Mr. Armstrong's Don, splendid in coat and condition, good bone and action. Novice solid colored bitches was taken handily by a nice short backed Red, good in head and feet, shown by Mr. Montgomery. Mr. Cook's pair came next. They are a trifle long in body but show quality. In limit and open bitches, solid color, Mr. McMinn's Cascade Sunset goe the blue, a big red not in the best of shape. There were a few nice particolors; amongst others Mr. Armstrong's Romeo and Mrs. Gammon's bitch, Miss Busy Body. Mr. McMinn's Cascade Sovia, afterwards purchased by Mr. Armstrong, is also worthy of mention. She has good substance, particularly good hind quarters, lots of lip, and a lovely Cocker eye. should make an excellent brood bitch and will very materially strenghten her new owner's kennel.

Collies were a useful lot, but there was a general absence of class. Bobs is sound, good in bone and coat, but thick in head. Moose is a big dog, also good in coat. Old English Sheep Dogs and Dalmatians, what there were of them, were only fair. Bulldogs, only two, medium quality. Bull Terriers turned out in good numbers and contained several dogs of merit. winning puppy, Epsom Pioneer, though uncropped, is a well balanced, sound youngster. Inferno Surprise is too light in bone and fails in feet. The winners dog was old Haymarket Blazer, shown in wonderful shape. He afterwards was put over Mr. Water's winning bitch, Epsom Lady of the Snows for special; the latter is a nice typical bitch of lovely color but her ears were worked and she lost to the old dog in shoulders and general terrier character.

Airedales were quite ordinary. Bostons, outside the winning dog and bitch, were likewise. The former, Cliffside Dipper, is a nice headed light weight but shown a bit thin. The bitch, Cliffside Miss Happy is also a

nice one. Beagles were all too big. Dachs few and only fair, Smooth Fox Terriers a bit common after Toronto, Clapton Blue Blood and Clapton St. Ledger, being placed in order mentioned. In Wires, there was nothing much outside of Mr. Moore's string. Donington Farmer, a very nice little Terrier, easily topped the class. Terriers showed marked signs of improvement. Winners dogs was taken by Mr. Moore's Donington Mike, a nice stamp of Irishman, good in coat and color. Next to him came Drumclamph Fairchance, full of character and looking fit but gone a bit in mouth and Peggy O'Neil won in bitches skull. with Mr. Knight's Molly Bawn reserve. Mr. Tyrell showed a couple of nice bitches and we were also taken with a pair of puppies shown by Mr. Godfrey, both of them promising but a bit light in bone. One Scottie only, more of a brood than a show bitch. Black and Tans were good. Mr. McLean's Willowdale Standard the best of the lot, a very nice one, though a trifle on the small side. The Poms. were all far too big, while Toys were few and about the usual in quality.

The dogs awarded winners were as follows:

Great Danes—Demon, a likely harlequin, takes winners dogs, whilst Veda, a useful fawn brood-bitch comes in for winners bitches,

Russian Wolfhounds—A brace of well known Hounds in Ch. Odin of Roseau and Genest of Roseau. Oden beats Genest in general quality throughout, although there is little to choose taken on points; Genest being the much better grown Hound.

Deerhounds — Ted, a Hound with good outline and nice quality.

Coyote Hounds—Ted beats Rex, a useful puppy that will be heard of again.

Gordon Setters-Jim, only a moderate bench dog.

English Setters—Saskatchewan Peter, a nice dog, but on the large side, good head and eye, nice body and plenty of feather.

Pointers—Sir Mark put down in great shape, good head and body with the best of legs and feet. Starlight Peggy, a nice all-round bitch, took winners bitches.

Irish Water Spaniels—Pearl went through from puppy to winners, good head and body, legs and feet, but open in coat may improve with age.

Cocker Spaniels-By far the largest entry, Rellimderi Rosie and Blazer the winning dog and bitch were of more than ordinary merit.

Airedale—Bob owns a nice head with good length of foreface, good legs and feet, capital front, but shown slack in condition and out of coat.

Wire Fox Terriers—Cluran Stella, a bitch with long head, good feet and straight Terrier front, nice texture of coat, rather long cast and on the big side.

Fox Terriers, Smooth—Ottawa Marquis, a dog with good head and dark eye, straight front, a nice coupled dog. Garry May Bloom, a puppy, went through to winners, a nice stamp and with ordinary luck will make a name for herself.

Irish Terriers—Bloomfield Sensation, I have seen looking in better form, a nice, all-round dog, with bad ear carriage. Knockrae Moira, a long-headed bitch with a good coat and expression.

Bulldogs—Mersey Bryn Admiral, a nice compact brindle, good head, short in back and low, a much improved dog since last seen out. Trafford Bullacity, the red fawn bitch, still upheld her record. A very good all-round bitch with little to find fault with, with the exception of color. Afterwards won for best dog or bitch in the show.

Bull Terriers—Gordon of Belmont, a neat little dog with well-filled in foreface, was put down in great shape. Lady Slick of Belmont, another from the same kennel, one of the neatest bitches out.

Pit Bull Terriers.—Bud, a hard sort with plenty of muscle and good jaw power.

Boston Terriers—Dandy Hooker, the mahogany brindle, a nice stamp, but out of condition.

Collies—A very good sable and white puppy, Corona Magnet, nice head, ears, expression and size, out of coat, but went through to winners. Corona Lily, a sweet bitch, out of condition, won with plenty to spare.

Fox Hounds-Merry Bud won, a nice sort on English lines.

Poodles—Jumbo, a neat little Toy, won from the black Frenchman, Peter the Great, both put down in form.

Pomeranians—Little Nipper, the chocolate Toy, showed to advantage and won easily. The best I have seen in this country.

Scottish Terriers—McTavish won, a compact dog of the correct size, good head and foreface, short back, low to ground, good coat and mee carriage of tail.

Whippets—Morley Sweep, a good black dog, very shapely and nicely put down.

CANINES IN CANADA.

BY THEO. MARPLES IN 'OUR DOGS.'

My long-looked-forward-to and muchenjoyed trip to judge at the Dog Show held in connection with the Canadian Industrial Exhibition at Winnipeg, which ranks second in importance in Canada (Toronto being first), gave an opportunity not only of seeing the major portion of the Dominion, but of gauging the strength and prospects of kennel matters in this very important and very loyal British Colony.

While touching upon the subject of dogs and sport in Canada, it may not be out of place, and I hope will not be regarded as an unwarranted digression, to intersperse my notice with my impressions of Canada and Canadians as I saw them. My visit, which covered a journey of over 10,000 miles from England, extended from Quebec in the East as far as Hartney in the West, which is some 170 miles beyond Winnipeg. Here a brother of mine is engaged in farming, whom I had not seen for 32 years, when he emigrated for Canada, a young man full of hope. His place comprises some 2,000 acres of the finest land in Canada, on which he raises grain and stock comprising a fine herd of exhibition Hereford cattle, Shetland ponies, Orpington fowls, and his daughter prize Pomeranians. homestead, with its complete outfit of modern machinery, electric power and plant, is considered the most complete and up-to-date in the Dominion. His eight daughters are all born farmers, three of them being married and on farms of their own. It was naturally an interesting meeting, not less so from having met a sister, who also resides at Hartney, and whom I had not seen for 40 years.

I left Liverpool on July 7 by the Allan s.s. Victorian, calling at Rimouski (where Crippen was captured) and Quebec. A few hours at this city, which is the oldest in Canada, being the first French settlement, enabled me to view its fine monuments to English and French Generals who fell in the war; its quaint, old-time streets, and the expanse of country and the great river St. Lawrence, from its heights. The sail along this river, which is 30

miles wide at the Gulf, and over 400 miles in length up to Montreal, was one of the finest I ever experienced. Montreal is a large and more modern city, with great possibilities. It is the Liverpool of Canada.

Taking the Canadian-Pacific Railroad at Montreal, I had a two days and two nights' ride on the train, my journey being timed to get me to Winnipeg the night before the show only. With the exception of a stretch of beautiful country before reaching Winnipeg, which skirts the great Lake Superior and a family of smaller lakes, the country was uninteresting through the heart of Ontario, which is all woods and rocks, showing, however, great mineral wealth. A great forest fire-which, alas! are a recurring visitation in Canada, and create great devastation-had occurred a few days before in the Porcupine district, through which we passed, and by which many lives were lost. The smoke from it settled on the St. Lawrence River, like a thick fog, delaying shiping considerably.

Winnipeg, like most Canadian "cities," is a town of "mushroom growth," now having a population of about 200,000. It is really the gate city to the "wild and woolly West," being a junction centre for several great railroads, the principal of which are the Canadian-Pacific, Grand Trunk and Canadian Northern. The first named connects the Atlantic and Pacific Oceans, as the two others propose doing, and Hudson's Bay. The fine, long streets, laid and in course of laying, one of which is seven miles in length, fine buildings and parks, indicate the development of a great city in the immediate future. As an example of the enterprise and aptitude of the citizens, I may here state that six days before the opening of the exhibition, whose grounds cover some 300 acres, the grand stand was burnt to the ground, but re-erected before the "Fair" opened. When it is stated that it seats 10,000 people, some idea of the work may be formed.

These exhibitions and fairs are an institution in Canada. They are held

periodically (some annually) in great centres as a means of bringing together the latest implements, machinery, industrial work, products in grain, live stock, etc., as a means of education for Canadian farmers and those interested in machinery, etc. The "Fair" is a diversion by way of amusement, and a replica of the old English fair, with sports, flying, horse, foot and Whippet racing, performing, music, etc., added. Over half a million people paid for admission to the Winnipeg Exhibition. It is run by a directorate of prominent citizens, being backed by the Corporation. Dr. A. W. Bell is the manager, and is, like Lord Kitchener, a great organizer, cool under fire, and courteous withal. He was previously assistant manager of the Toronto Exhibition, Sub-committees are appointed to carry out each section, that for dogs including Mr. H. G. Spurgeon (chairman) and Mr. J. H. Holman (chairman of Western Canada Kennel Club), both sporting men, and interested in Pointers and Irish Water Spaniels, etc. Winnipeg has the distinction of being the headquarters of the Manitoba Field Trial Club, which also enjoys the distinction of being the oldest sporting club on the American continent, having been established over a quarter of a century.

The Dog Show was a record in both entries and quality, a well-known Englishman, late of Glossop, in Mr. Bert Swann, bringing a team of 36 dogs from Toronto, belonging to himself and various other owners. The distance is 3,000 miles there and back, and the trip occupied four days and nights going and five returning. Let English exhibitors just contemplate the difference between attending shows in the United Kingdom and Canada-36 dogs and their handler nine days and nights in the train! They were taken in a specially engaged freight car. reward was 30 first, 19 seconds. 11 thirds and 9 special prizes-a useful haul and a profitable journey for the handler and a satisfactory one to the exhibitors.

There was still another Toronto exhibitor not included in that conting-

ent, in Dr. G. B. Foster, who affects Toy Poms., and who practically swept the boards in those classes, wmning the specials for best brace of non-Sporting Dogs and best Toys. The specials for best Sporting Dog and Sporting Team went to a great Ottawa Cocker Spaniel breeder and exhibitor, in Mr. T. A. Armstrong, a working-man, who has a lovely collection of black and colored Cockers, which could hold their own in England, although the breed is, in America, some three or four pounds lighter in weight than the English dog. The Sporting Brace prize was captured by the Roseau Kennels' Borzois, owned by Dr. O'Brien, whom I have to thank for his professional services to me in the matter of a little indisposition at the show.

Dr. O'Brien hunts the wolf with his Borzoi, as do other dog owners at the show, the breeds employed being Irish Wolfhounds and Deerhounds chiefly. I may state, en passant, that wolves abound as near as five miles to Winnipeg, and my brother has them on his estate. The two latter breeds were terribly mixed up in the classes for them at the show, many being entered contrariwise to their breed, which I endeavored to adjust as well as I could.

There were two breeds of dogs on which I adjudicated, singularly for the first time. These were Boston Terriers and Chesapeake dogs, both of which are unknown in England. The former, a sort of brindle-and-white French Bulldog, a little longer in face and more Terrier-like in build, are very popular and numerous in America. The latter are very similar to our golden flat-coated Retriever, but more fur-like in coat. Legend has it that a dog and bitch were found alone on a wreck in Chesapeake Bay, many years ago, from which all that exist in America have sprung, and which is all that is known of the breed's origin. Another novel (to me) and interesting feature of the Winnipeg show was the seven classes allotted to colored Bull-Terriers, sometimes described as "Pit" Bull Terriers. There were 37 entries, which is in striking contrast to the ill-starred class of two at the Kennel Club's show last year. They are of the Staffordshire or Sheffield fighting type, being fawn-and-brindled in color and from 50 lbs. to 70 lbs. weight probab-

On the last day of the show the president and directors entertained the judge and exhibitors to lunch, which was presided over by Mr. Spurgeon, and well-attended. He called upon me to give them a few "pointers" about the dogs, to which I responded, and in the course of my observations gave my impressions of the dogs shown, and a few hints upon the breeding to type and putting them down in the ring properly. These remarks were much appreciated, and called forth a generous vote of thanks by Mr. Miller, seconded in too complimentary terms by Dr. Foster, of Toronto.

I was somewhat impressed by the number of Englishmen, some acclimatized, others barely so, whom I met at Winnipeg. One was my old and esteemed friend, Capt. Sidney Woodiwiss, J.P., who spoke to me from the ring side, and with whom I afterwards direct at his home in Winnipeg. He is a

partner in a real estate business in the city, and was looking well. A nephew is also farming in Western Canada. Another was Mr. Josh. F. Smith, jun., late of Sheffield, and well known in Bulldog circles. Still another was Mr. Arthur Smith, brother-in-law of Mr. J. Herbert Hall, secretary of the Altrincham Agricultural Society, who is

Others were Mr. John Pearson, late of Pendleton, Manchester; Mr. Ayre, late of Yarm-on-Tees; Mr. Manley, of Heaton Chapel; Mr. Oxley, an English Pom. fancier, and one or two others whose names I omitted to make a note of.

At the show I received a letter from Mr. Mumford, secretary of the Toronto Kennel Club, expressing the desire of his club to entertain me if I should be returning to England via Toronto. This I was doing, and so I accepted the club's kind hospitality. Returning by the Lakes route of the C.P.R., whose steamers take passengers from Port Arthur and Fort William across the great Lakes Superior and Huron, a distance of 500 miles, to Owen Sound, where they entrain for Toronto and other parts of South Ontario, etc., I arrived at Canada's beautiful southern capital on Sunday moon. Here I was met by Mr. Arthur Atkinson (president), Mr. Bert Swann, and many other members of the club, including the secretary, Mr. Mumford, Mr. John Miles (president, Ontario K.C., and a great Bull-terrier enthusiast from Devonshire), Mr. W. E. Bowsfield (sec., O. K.C), Mr. W. E. Best (first vice-pres., T.K.C.), Mr. Jos. Scott, (first vice -pres. O.K.C.), Mr. H. Wilson (treas, T.K. C.), and Messrs. Fred Bramball (a Bull dog fancier, from Woodley), H. Ryder, Metcalfe, Geo. Kynock, E. Sharpe, T. Harlowe, T. W. Edwards, and O. Flett,

A motor-brake was in readiness, with a versatile guide in attendance, and the party at once toured the beautiful city, in the most delightful weather, from the shores of Lake Ontario, upon which it stands, to the outskirts, viewing its street of 40 miles in length, which stands in the o'd Indian track connecting Lake Ontario with Georgian Bay. In proposing my health, he said how pleased they all were to have the privilege of meeting me while in Canada, and he expressed the wish of the society that I had enjoyed my trip and that I should have a pleasant journey to Old England. Miles and Mr. Swann both spoke in a similiar strain of genuine good fellowship and kindliness, to which I replied in terms of sincere appreciation, saying how glad I was of the privilege of meeting them, of enjoying their kind hospitality, and exchanging greetings. I stated that it was not my first visit to Toronto, for I paid the city a passing visit on my way to judge at Chicago, 11 years ago, and have the pleasantest recollections of Mr. Gooderham's hospitality on that occasion. I referred to their

coming exhibition, and complimented them on the choice of their English Terrier judge, in my esteemed friend, Mr. F. Redmond, who, I said, was one of our oldest and most capable judges, and a thorough sportsman.

I returned via the great Niagara Falls, which I visited on that occasion when they and the river were, for the most part, a frozen mass. Now they poured forth their sparkling waters, unrestrained in all their might and majesty, the wonder of the world.

Spending a few hours with another sister and brother-in-law at Buffalo, I sped to New York, being unable, owing to the exigencies of time, to accept still another invitation telegraphed to me at Winnipeg from my old friend, Mr. Harry Lacy, our "Dogs in Dollarland" able contributor, and a few doggy friends. His wire ran as follows:—

have a splendid time. Would like to know if you intend coming round by Boston on your return, for some of us here would like to prove our New England hospitality.

I much regretted being unable to take in Boston on my itinerary, and was at the last moment unable even to accept the hospitality of the Editor of "Dogs in America," so kindly offered some time ago by Mr. Frank T. Carlton, which deprived me of the pleasure of meeting two old friends in Mr. Vandergrift and Mr. Jack Davidson, president and manager respectively of that goahead new American doggy journal. I cherish very pleasant memories of the kindness shown to me by the two latter gentlemen on both my previous visits to judge in America. The mighty Mauretania's bell in New York's fine harbor, however, sounded the knell for "all aboard," and I was thus torn away from many dear friends on the other side of the Atlantic whom I had looked forward to meeting, to resume my duties in dear old England.

In conclusion, I may say that my impression of Canada is that it is much more than a land of "lakes and lumber." I did not, of course, see beautiful Vancouver, at the exhibition of which city in a month's time I was invited, but had to decline, to judge. I heard the most interesting accounts of British Columbia, its English-like climate and great growth; also Alberta. I was informed, on the authority of a Winnipeg alderman, as showing the rapid growth of Western Canada at the present time, that one school is being built every day, one church every two days, and a town fit to incorporate as a city is developing every three days.

Such records speak volumes for the future of the Dominion, with its fertile soil, great mineral wealth, and natural resources, which is one of England's richest jewels. All that Canada wants is more population of the right sort and more capital to exploit those resources, which are almost limitless. I thought Canadians a bigger race on the whole than their ancestors, as they are without doubt a hardy, industrious and temperate race, and well dressed, even down to the colored porters of the railway companies, in their bright grey uniforms.

The kennel interest in Canada is not great at present, but it is growing,

and will increase with the progress and growth of the country. Sporting Dogs are most in favor, and the country offers a great field of sport in the pursuit of big game, wild fowl, etc. The native Indians have been driven back to their mountain fastnesses by the march of the white races bringing civilization in its train, but are now a peaceful and harmless community, settled on reserve territory granted by Government. The buffalo, which had become almost extinct, has been replenished by Government, and the moose, elk, wolf and fox still abound.

I have only one fault to find with Canada and the United States, and that is that in travelling about dollars disappear as dexterously as "bobs" do in the old country, and give little greater value!
