NOTES AND COMMENTS

Montreal Show: Apart from an insufficiency of light, a dusty floor and an approach that is not all it should be, the Coliseum—the old Crystal Rink—made an ideal show room. There is ample floor space, enough, indeed, to beach double the three hundred and five dogs present. It is fairly central and street cars may be had from all directions. That "the people" thought it so was evident, as the gate was such as to delight the hearts of the promoters of the show, Messrs. Innes and Thomas.

The ring service was poor and no award boards were in use. These are details that will receive attention at future shows. In the centre of the rings were flat boards, not the usual high platform that so many dogs are afraid of. The flat board has many advantages, but the amount of sawdust carried on to it means that "the man behind the broom" should be kept continually in action while the judging is on.

The benching, Spratt's, is quite metropolitan in appearance and lent to the show an appearance of lightness and airyness. We understand it is owned by the Montreal Kennel Club Company, consisting of Messrs Innes & Thomas, who assumed the entire responsibility in connection with the show. As it turned out there should be a profit in it, but then it might have been the other way. We hope this show is but the precursor of bigger and better things for Montreal canine interests. That the citizens are ready to support such an exhibition is evident.

The show was a pleasant one in many ways and formed a place of reunion for many of the "old time" dog lovers of Montreal as well as those who have more recently adopted the cult. The exhibit was, of course, largely local. Ribbons fail to draw the outsiders now. Still there were many good dogs from outside, and "Andy" Armstrong had quite a string from the Capital. In most classes there was some quality and lots of poor ones. This, too, is to be expected, but the poor ones get weeded out in a series of shows as we hope that of 1911 will result in.

Major Nelles is an acquisition to our all too small judges' list and we were glad to see him once again in a show. When we knew him first, over twenty vears ago, "Charlie" Nelles was a leading light in the Cocker fancy, and his Ch. Red Jacket was really the first decent red Cocker we had. His cool decisions in the Bulldog ring shows that he knows a breed that has rapidly come to the front in Canada the past few years. About forty Bulldogs must be considered an extraordinary number in a show of three hundred. He had, however, more quantity than quality, the winning dog being easily the best, a light weight brindle, showing a good deal of type. Too many were beefy and poor in face and head. The runner-up should mature into a fair Bulldog if he does not put on too much beef behind. The winning bitch. too, is a very fair one.

Mr. Stuart had a nice entry of Corkers and judged them well. We are glad to see him in the ring. There was a good team down from Ottawa that won well and deservedly so, and other good ones, too. Mr. Stuart tells us what he thought of them.

Mr. Jos. Reid had not a heavy task. This must be an off year in Collies in the East and those that were shown mostly lacked that useful appendage that so frequently hides minor defects. The addition of an Irish blackthorn to Mr. Reid's costume, in addition to his usual Tam was, we suppose, a compliment to his fellow conspirator, Mr. Jno. Campbell, who specializes in the Donnybrook appendix. A team of very decent Bobtails was an unusual sight here.

Mr. Campbell had a beautiful lot of Irish Setters to judge, and what a handsome chap the good red Irishman is! Pointers in Eastern Canada must be following the Mastifi, and he had not much in English Setters to trouble him. Mr. Campbell judged also a number of the smaller breeds, and judged them well. But then he cut his eye teeth a few years back. There are not very many breeds that he has not a talking acquaintance with.

Mr. Blair did not have a big entry in Bostons. We were looking for at least thirty after the Montreal B. T. Club show. A pretty ring fight was that that put Revilo Yankee to the front, a sound, very typical Boston.

Mr. Moore had a number of classes and found his quality in the St. Bernards and Airedales. There was a big entry in Bull Terriers, but outside of old Haymarket Blazer, looking better than we saw him two years ago, they were a common lot. Bad skulls and weak forefaces were the rule. A puppy with uncut ears we made the second best. In Airedales, Mr. Laurin had a big lot of "Colnes" to the front and there was quality elsewhere too. Mr. Laurin is getting over another dog, a flyer, particulars of which we have not yet had.

Mr. Lindsay had some sorting to do with a big lot of wire hair Fox Terriers, and results showed the Doningtons well to the front. Mr. Red-

mond remarked to us that there was some very fair stuff in the wire ring. Mr. The best of the smooths was Mutchmor's new dog, Warren Vehement, a clean cut Terrier with beautiful neck and shoulders, his head is a beautiful one, and foreface of the best. A nice straight front and good hind parts go to make up a Terrier that will win in most company. If-there always is an if-he were just a bit smaller in eye and he had just a bit less leather in his lugs! But all in all he is a grand smooth. Clapton Blue Blood, an old friend, came next, but the dog was not at his best and appeared to be ill. Aldon Mystery holds well and again won for Mr. Mewburn. There wasn't much in the Irish. understand Mr. Moore's dog finds a new owner across the line. Mrs. Laurin had a typical little Scottie in Colne Sandy McGregor. We are glad the dog is not as long as his name. A nice headed little beastie that has Scottie type. Mrs. Ross showed in better shape the Toronto purchase, Avondale Adder, quite nice in head and front, might be a bit shorter in body. We were not enamoured of the West Highlands.

Mrs. Steggall (nee Miss Williams) has had a very intimate connection with Pomeranians in England and has now quite an extensive kennel of her own in Montreal, so that the nice little lot this lady had to judge came as an easy task to her. Mrs. Pitt's beautiful little orange sable, Beautiful Mite of the Sables, could not be denied, and despite his seasonable lack of coat, his typical head, short back and general get-up put him to the front. Mrs. Pitt also showed a nice chocolate, also short of coat in Prince Charming. Mrs. Gydes Sweet Katie was made best of opposite sex, a very sweet little Pom, Mrs. John Mitchell's chocolate, Ruby, getting the reserve.

There was a nice little lot of Toy Spaniels, including Mrs. Carruthers, Toronto, MacGregor, that was given reserve winners to McLean Duke. There were a few other Toys, including a more typical French Bulldog than we usually see. The little Miss should win again.

Mr. Redmond: Mr. Francis Redmond was an interested spectator in Mr. Jas. Lindsay's ring in Montreal, and followed the judging of the wires with a good deal of interest. We were glad to have the opportunity of a lengthy chat with Mr. Redmond, and, bye-the-bye while we think of it we have a hand-shake coming to Mr. W. P. Fraser when we see him. Mr. Redmond was present at the Ontario Jockey Club luncheon when His Excellency Earl Grey, spoke in such eulogistic terms of Mr. Fraser's years of work in the Club

Mr. Redmond had been across the continent to Vancouver, and was amazed at the great progress the West was making, and the immensity of Canada's great possessions west of the great lakes. His program was Boston, then New York, where he hoped to meet Mr. Vredenburgh, Mr. Mortimer and one or two other old friends. Then across the briny and home. Good luck go with him! We want more of his kind.

Toy Dog Club: During the recent Montreal Show several ladies including Mrs. Pitt, Mrs. Steggall, and others, spoke ardently in favor of a Toy Dog Club. There was some difference of opinion as to which would be better, a Toy Dog Club or a Ladies Kennel Association, but this is a matter of detail. If some half dozen enthusiasts will get together and lay out a workable plan we feel sure such a club can be made a success. The only way to do anything is to do it. The matter has been talked of quite long enough, we suggest that now is the time to begin.

Bostons: The annual meeting of the Boston Terrier Club of Canada will be held in Toronto on the 27th of this month. The date for the fourth annual show has been fixed for January 1st. 1912, when C. K. C. rules will govern. Boston breeders are asked to keep this date clear.

Bon voyage: Mr. Colin F. Jackson, President of the Vancouver Kennel Club was in Toronto this month on his way east. Mr. Jackson sails for England where he hopes to spend some time.

Strayed or stolen: A regrettable incident of the Montreal Show was the

loss of Mr. J. G. Reed's tri-color Collie bitch, Fidget, by Balmoral Rex. She either slipped her collar and managed to get away, or was deliberately stolen.

Mr. Laurin's new Airedale: We understand that the new Airedale being brought over by Mr. Jos: A. Laurin, of the Colne Kennels, Montreal, is a son of Crompton Oorang, no less than the great Ch. Rockley Oorang, a winner of very many prizes in England and a sire of winners as well. The arrival of this dog in Canada will undoubtedly give rise to a good deal of excitement in Airedale circles, and we look forward with much pleasurable anticipation to seeing him throw down the gauntlet to the best in America.

A good Fox Terrier dead : Mr. Wm. Morris, Toronto, has our sympathy in the loss of his celebrated smooth Fox Terrier, Eton Blue, who, a few days ago, was so badly injured by an automobile that he had to be destroyed. Eton Blue's most famous son was Dark Blue, a great winner not alone in Canada and United States but also in England. He was an imported dog. bred by Mr. A. C. Tinne, and was by "Blue" Vibo, out of Hester Sorrel. blood is potent, and a great deal of this potentiality descended through Eton Blue.

Clapton Kennels: We are glad see that Mr. Geo. W. Bailey, of the Clapton Kennels, Ottawa, is again taking an active part in Fox Terrier circles. Some time ago Clapton Kennels was a name to be conjured with and it looks as if their owner would be into the game heavier than ever. Reference to stud advertisement of the kennel in this issue will show that Clapton St. Leger by Ch. Warren Distinct, out of the noted bitch, Clapton Blue Bloom, the shortest of short backed ones, is being offered to breeders. He owns a long head for a small dog, tan marked like his sire, and carries a small, well placed eye. In addition he excels in body, bone and hind quarters. Other dogs offered are Clapton Blue Blood by the famous Clapton Blue Blade, Clapton Recover by Ch. Sabine Resist, Clapton Rolley by the same sire, and Clapton Recoup by Ch. Clapton Blue Blade. Then there

is Clapton Sentinel by Aldon Captain, one of Mr. Macdonald's breeding. These are all typical specimens. There is a variety of blood, suitable for almost any mating, and the fee in all cases is extremely reasonable. A reasonably good photo of Clapton St. Leger appears on the front page of this issue. Though the photo hardly does justice to the dog still it will show his type and the kind of trappy Terrier that the dog is. Another

photo of Clapton St. Leger, showing the dog in a different position, appears in the advertisement. We wish the kennel an abundant measure of success and commend the dogs they offer to the consideration of interested breeders.

Clapton Flame Up to Sabine Ruler: Mr. Geo. W. Bailey, Clapton Kennels, Ottawa, has shipped the smooth bitch Clapton Flame Up, by Aldon Captain, out of the smooth bitch, Clapton Little Dutch, by Ch. Dukedom, to the Sabine Kennels to be bred to that famous stud dog, Sabine Ruler, sire of Sabine Rarebit and Fernie. This mating should produce something of merit, as Flame Up is a double cross of the famous St. Leger and Redmond blood. Mr. Bailey is showing his old time good judgment in using the best sires regardless of long journey and expense.

WHIPPET

The races conducted on September 6th, 7th and 8th at the Canadian National Exhibition were the first to be held under the Canadian Kennel Club rules, and were a splendid illustration of how events of this nature should be conducted. Chiefly noticeable was the almost entire absence of the wrangling which has hitherto seemed almost inseparable from Whippet meets.

The officials seemed to have a thorough grasp of their respective duties, and infractions of the rules by either dogs or owners were promptly and effectually dealt with. The result was a complete viadication of the theory consistently adhered to by the true friends of this sport, that Whippet racing can, by proper and efficient supervision, be made as clean and gentlemanly as any other sport in the world.

The entry list was probably the largest ever seen in Canada, and practically all the entries started. An international flavor was given the events by the presence of Mr. Keyes and Mr. West, of Massachusetts, who brought over Hillcrest Falmouth and Gamecock White Rose respectively. Both of these gentlemen made themselves solid with their Canadian opponents, and will be heartily welcomed if they decide to try conclusions again with the speedy canine Canucks. Winnipeg also was represented by the dog Village Smith, which, however, could not do better than third in the handicap for dogs.

On Wednesday, September 6th the open handicap for dogs was run, and was won by the black Yankee Flyer, Hillcrest Falmouth. Mr. McFarland's fleet little Oakley Flyaway made a gallant struggle, but the heavy track militated against him. The Winnipeg dog, Village Smith, was third.

Thursday was devoted to the open handicap for bitches, and some splendid sport was furnished before the winner turned up in Thomas Bawson's game little fawn and white bitch Vanity Fair. In the first heat Trixie's Pride and Oakley Gay Dora were disqualified because their runners-up were not over the mark when the race finished. The final was a splendid struggle between Gamecock White Rose, the United States representative, and Vanity Fair. These two outclassed their field, and the latter finished about two yards in front of Rose.

Friday was the big day. All the flyers which had competed on the two-previous days were entered in the big event, the Canadian National open handicap. Eighteen racers "toed themark," necessitating three preliminary heats, two semi-finals and the final.

The preliminaries were run off on the back of the track, and the semi-finals and final in front of the grand stand, an excellent arrangement and one which enabled the race to be decided in about two hours.

In the first heat Vanity Fair and Hillcrest Falmouth looked to have the quality, and they finished in that order with the Winnipeg dog, VJinge Smith, third. The first attempt to run this heat proved abortive, since practically every slipper except Mr.

Keyes beat the pistol. Falmouth was clearly entitled to be declared the winner, but Mr. Keyes showed his sportsmanship by consenting to have the heat run again.

The second and third heats were both close, Lanky Bob and Trixie's Pride being the winners. In the fourth heat the American bitch, Gamecock White Rose met and defeated Mr. Mc-Farland's Oakley Flyaway, the ultimate winner. Jean was also drawn in this heat but did not start.

The first semi-final eliminated Lanky Bob and Nipper, and the second saw the last of Steady Girl and Trixie's Pride, leaving Vanity Fair, Falmouth, White Rose and Flyaway in the final. It was a case of Canada versus the United States, each country having two representatives, and excitement ran high. The four flyers got away to a perfect start, and, with every one of them running straight and true, came down the stretch at a twelve second pace amid a perfect pandemonium of yells. Flyaway on the pole, and with the largest handicap, ran like a little fiend, and although Vamity Fair, the other Canadian representative, made a gallant effort to catch the little fellow, she could not quite get up to him. The two American dogs were third and fourth, but the proverbial blanket would have covered all four dogs at the finish.

A GOOD ONE GONE.

I regret to have to inform you that my old Collie, Ballyarnet Student, is dead. I imported him from England in 1907, where he had distinguished himself both at Bristol and Liverpool by being placed Reserve Champion. Since coming to the Pacific Coast he has had a very successful career, although unluck. in this respect that he was four times reserve winners when one win would have made him a champion, and in each of the four instances he was beaten by dogs over whom he either had been placed or whom he had beaten subsequently. He was a rare specimen of the old type, perfect in ear, eye and head formation, with a magnificent coat of rich, deep golden sable seldom seen latterly. Added to his many other virtues he was a splendid shower and a perfect companion and home dog. He has been very successful at stud and leaves behind him children and grandchildren which will yet make his name famous. daughter, Lonsdale Jean, won winners prize at Vancouver in 1910 and has since reared some promising pups which will be heard of in the show ring.

MONTREAL DOG SHOW.

Judges' Reports.

No. of dogs benched, 305; winner's value, 2 points.

POINTERS AND SETTERS AT MONTREAL.

Pointers brought out Paul Labadie's Jack, a heavy weight, who appeared to have been just from the field. Has a fair head, good front, bone and feet, a good body, with a nice classy movement but would not take a place in a company of high-class specimens. He was the only pointer exhibited, an unusual thing for Montreal. He got the blue ribbon.

English Setters, puppies, W. E. Cuttle's Kildare Aileen, a beautifully marked bitch, looked a promising voungster. She acted badly in the ring, but we considered her good enough for her ribbon. She was the only entry. Novice dogs had J. E. Laguerre's Nero, only one entry. A fine big lemon Belton, with some class, good sound dog, good mover, good head, body and feet. We thought him worthy of a blue ribbon. Limit and open, repeat, with winners. Novice bitches brought out only one entry, Thomas Cowper's Lady Glenariff, 4 years old, by Rumney Reality and Patty of Kiloteran, very small but trappy with nice movement. She went through her three classes and winners, also local classes.

Irish Setters had lots of quality. 21 dogs and bitches and all Montreal entries at that, the largest exhibit of this breed that has been seen in Montreal during the past thirty years to my knowledge, thanks to Mrs. J. C. Hanna, the owner of the Montrose Kennels, who exhibited twelve of this number. The quality was excellent, far above the average and would do credit to any of the leading shows of this Continent. Montrose Shamus O'Brien captured limit, open and winners, with Ch. Montrose Marcus a very close runner up who got reserve. There was very little difference between these two dogs, Shamus beat him out in color; they also won for the best brace and were handled in a masterly style by our famous "Bob" Ross, who had all his Setters in the very pink of condition. They also captured the special for the best brace and team in the show with Montrose Rhiola Andy and Montrose Pride of Erin added, A handsomer or classier team has not been seen together in a show ring in Montreal for many a year. Shamus O'Brien got the special for best sporting dog and also for best of any breed in the show, with numerous other specials.

The awards are as follows: Irish Setters, puppy dogs, had 2 entries. S. C. Jackson's Tyler of Montrose, a promising youngster of good color won first. J. C. Hanna's Montrose Clancarty Rhu, brother to above. had to content himself with second. Novice dogs, 2 dogs, W. J. O'Leary's Peck and Montrose Dermott Rhu. Peck has lots of style and shows it to advantage, but on closer examination, we found him faulty in skull and a trifle out at elbows. He has turned his third year, while Dermott Rhu is only seven months. However, Rhu may change cards with him when he has developed more. Peck got the blue. Limit dogs, 2 entries. Peck and Montrose Rheola Andy. Peck met his Waterloo here as Andy is a very dark rich mahogany red, the darkest we have seen for many years, just imported, is the English type, somewhat smaller to what our Irishmen are here, with a beautiful head, eye, ear carriage, good front, short back and good firm quarters, and moves like the perfect thoroughbred that he is. Andy took this blue ribbon. Peck is a grand dog and can give a good account of himself almost anywhere. Open dogs had 3 en-Montrose Shamus O'Brien, tries. Montrose Ch. Marcus, and Mr. O'-Leary's Peck, the two former are well known dogs that have been described several times this season. The awards went in order named. Shanus O'Brien got winners with Ch. Marcus res.

Puppies and bitches: 2 entries in this class. Amedee Trudeau's Gamine, a promising youngster, who will be heard from again, and W. Redmond's Jetta, a very ordinary sort. Gamine got the blue. Novice bitches, 3 entries. Montrose Norah was absent, leaving Thomas Walsh's Nellie, a nice sort, to fight it out with Jetta. Nellie won easily and will be heard from again is very promising.

Limit bitches, 4 entries. J. C. Hanna's Montrose Pride of Erin, by Shaun Rhu and St. Lambert's Kathleen, just such another as her mother, with a beautiful sweet expression, her carriage while moving is beautiful, is possessed of a grand head, eye, ears, neck, shoulders and loins, all excellent with good bone and legs, and above all, her color is the right sort. Would that we had more of her stamp. She rightly carried away the blue in this class from Nellie, a good sort who won second with Mr. Trudeau's Venus II., a close third who will be heard from again.

Open bitches had 6 entries. Miss Bowman's Irish Molly. She has been described many times and needs no comments here, more than to say that she was shown 8 or 10 fbs. too fat and with all her beautiful qualities she had to make room for Montrose Pride of Erin, who distanced all her rivals, with Irish Molly second, which must be a lesson to Miss Bowman to never exhibit her beautiful Molly in such condition. Third prize went to Mr. Walsh's Nellie.

In reply to your note, asking me to send a few notes re Montreal Show held here last week, I regret to say, I did not take any, the judging books having no room on them, but I can say a word or two from memory. The show was held in a large building, the Coliseum, not quite so central as the

old Victoria Rink, in rear of the Windsor Hotel.

In Fox Terriers I had a big class, some 70 or more, the winning smooths a couple of dogs and bitch from the Warren Kennels. Mr. Moore's brace and team the winners in wires. A couple of pups owned by Mr. C. S. Campbell won well in local classes. I placed D. Farmer as the best Fox Terrier.

Sorry to say Irishmen were all off in regards to entries and quality. One dog owned by Mr. Moore not half bad, good size and color, off a bit in feet. I see many judges wanting an Irish Terrier down in size, but I was taught to like them a fairly good size, say 28 to 30 lbs., ones that can keep up all day on a tramp and ever ready. Last, but not least, the hard, natural coat requires little or no preparing.

Scotties, only a few. Mrs. Laurin showed a fairly good pup in McGregor something, R. B. Ross had a young bitch, when matured will likely do him good.

In West Highlands a rather nice one in Dugald, bred by Miss Eadie; his dam was also in show, a profitable brood bitch, a breed that ought to take well here in Montreal, as they appear to me of a sunny disposition, and not so dour or matter of fact as their cousins the Scottish Terriers, but I think they will have to go some yet to approach the Scots as an all-round Terrier.

Cockers were a big entry for Montreal, the novice classes for dogs did not produce anything of merit. limit dogs, black, Rockfield Riot good average quality, had an easy win but was easily beaten in the open by Ottawa Don, a real good Cocker all over, scoring in body, bone and action, nice head and shoulders. This dog afterwards gave Mr. Moore's Terrier, Donington Farmer, a hard run for the special for best sporting dog in show under 25 lbs. In this country where cockers are so strong and the Cocker one of the best of the breed, it seemed to the writer that the Terrier, good one as he is, was fairly beaten, but my partners who judged this special with me (Mr. Lindsay and Mr. Campbell), could not be converted. In lim-

it parti colors, Cascade Ottawan, a nice stylish one, had things pretty much his own way, though he is not quite the type desired. Open, any other color, Mr. Armstrong showed a well balanced one in Ottawa Romeo, in grand shape, with a nice outlook, good coat; he lacks a trifle in finish of muzzle, but is one of the best parti colors on the bench to-day. He took winners by a good margin, Cascade Ottawan being the runner up. Ottawa Stella, the bitch puppy entry, did not turn up. I should have liked going over this youngster, as I had already seen her on the bench at the Toronto Novice, any other color, brought forward a very fair headed red in Suzanne. She fails after that, excepting in bone, where she excels, but is rather on the small side. Cascade Daisy nice skull and body, went through in any other color; a pale red lacking in fore face and slightly over-In limit bitches, black, Mr. Cook showed a grand headed little bitch in Rockfield Signet, which won from Mr. Armstrong's Ottawa Sovia. The latter is rather plain in head and she has more bone than a Cocker really requires, and is heavy all over. Open blacks was a much stiffer proposition. I finally gave the decision to Rockfield Signet, whose beautiful head is her mainstay. She has enough bone for her weight; is well coupled and on the day was a better mover than Ottawa Iona, another grand bitch, wonderful hind quarters and body, but she limped slightly and fails to the winner a little in head and shoulder. In winners, black, there was nothing near these two.

Newfoundland: one bitch only with a small puppy, wretched condition, not worth a first prize, and gave her a second.

Great Danes: the winner on the small side but good in head, bone and color. The second a much larger and heavier dog, light in bone and leggy.

Russian Wolfhounds: the winner a good all round dog, in poor condition, bad feet.

Greyhounds: one of good quality, but rather light in build.

Dachshunde: a medium lot.

Bull Terriers: outside Ch. Haymarket Blazer, in good condition with too much flesh on, the whole classes were a very poor lot.

St. Bernards: these I thought the best in the show. Stuart's Agawa Duke, a large, heavy boned dog, very straight on all four legs and as active as a Terrier, good coat, color and condition. Lord Chatsworth, the second prize, belonging to the same kennel, a better head than Duke, extra good bone, fails behind. Lady Wolfram, owned by Mr. Stuart, rather smaller than some judges like, still, she has a very grand head, in fact, I don't think she has her equal on the continent. The American judges that I have met, considered her small, but she is as large as the best bitches winning in England. As I recently attended the principal Exhibition over there, and saw nothing better, either at Cruft, Birmingham or Manchester, and have no doubt she could have held her own with any of them. She has extra good bone, color and quality all through, straight in her limbs and very active. Montphosa, a very good bitch, good head and bone, but not in good condition, belongs to the same kennel. Moss Bess, owned by Mr. H. Barlow, a very good, typical bitch, good head and bone, not in good condition, fails in hind quarters. balance only fair ones.

It looked pretty raw to the people standing around the ring and quite a few remarks were passed about their gall.

LONDON, ONT., DOG SHOW.

For two reasons this report of the London dog show will have to be brief, the first being that I did not know that the Canadian Kennel Gazette would ask for any report, and the next is that I left my marked catalogue with my memos in it on a desk in the Tecumseh House writing room, and when I went to the hotel desk for stamps some person walked off with the catalogue. I have therefore to trust to my memory alone.

The one Bloodhound lacks size, substance and needs more character to rank very high. The St. Bernard, Viola of Parkdale, is quite a bitch, having size and very good head properties. The Danes you had at Toronto show. Czar II. is far too small to rate high as a Russian Wolfhound, and I withheld winners. Grevhounds, far too fat, except Tweedy, the winning bitch. English Foxhounds were rather ordinary, and were by no means up to the usual size of good hounds. There were two of the old black and tan Americans, the color I think that should be recognized for this variety, as it was the color of the old hounds originally imported by the plantation owners of Maryland.

The winning Pointer dog, Lee Blake, beats Wing in back and is a well made small sized dog with good character and Pointer action. Mrs. Waters had no opposition in bitches. I put Belle over Lady Gay by reason of showing a little more quality. Mrs. Waters told me that is the way she thought they should go, but they were usually placed the other way. Her Ch. Jingo's Della beat them both in open and took winners and also the breed special.

The Setters were not anything up to what I had looked for at London. Not one of the dogs was what I should call anything more than fair, and the bitch, while very nice as to shape and action, has a very curly coat. She was far the best of both sexes. The Gordon Setter was not good in color.

Field Spaniels poor, one being a large Cocker.

Cockers were of course one of the best represented breeds of the show. Martello is in my opinion one of the best at the present time. He might be beaten for substance by those who like a heavier dog, but for quality it would be hard to find one better. The set on of his ears is exquisite, and everything about the little dog fits in to make a most harmonious whole, I gave him the special for the best sporting dog and finally my own special for the best in the show. parti-color, Speculator, is better backed than the other black and white dog. I hardly dare trust myself to give names, as I cannot remember the others in parti dogs, nor in the black bitches. The winner in other than black was a red, longer in the back than I like, but good in head, neck and front. A cream colored bitch was put back because she was far too fat and short in neck. I think it was Brookdale Clara. I liked Golden Buttercup very well, but she too was in high flesh.

Pleader B. was by far the best Beagle, an exceedingly smart little hound, and a splendid shower all the time. I liked him very much. Perhaps the owner can explain why his date of birth and his breeder's name should differ in the Toronto and London catalogues. The winning Dachshund you had at Toronto. Ruby S., who got second, is a very nice one, rather smaller than I care for, but exceedingly pretty. I was disappointed in the Collies. Colonel McEwen's only entry was so devoid of coat that I withheld first in novice. There were others as bad, among them being Coila Linty, as close coated as a Fox Terrier. told her handler that it was not doing justice to either the dog or the judge to show a good Collie in such condition. I had to put Lee View Lora over her, and she is all wrong in

head. Weston Queen of Quality took winners in a walk, and beat Ormskirk Oberon for the special. I cannot fancy this dog very much. He has a very objectionable smutty face, and it is not shaped exactly right. His coat was plentiful but untidy, as if prepared in a hurry for the show. King Edward Prunella did not arrive till late on the day I judged Collies. There was one very nice Poodle, named Peggy, undoubtedly a well bred one, though of unknown pedigree.

Dalmatians bad as to spotting. Bulldogs good. Tom Sawyer is a dog of excellent type, short body, attractive color and very good in head, very much the best Bulldog I have ever judged in Canada. The reserve for the non-sporting special lay between him and Mrs. O'Rourke's Pom, the latter won solcly by reason of condition of coat, which is one thing I always like to recognize at country shows. Caerphilly Marvel was much the best Airedale, he was at Toronto. Wentworth Brockton was the best Bull Terrier dog by odds, but he was far from right as to condition. I put the young bitch Wentworth Nell over him as much on that account as anything, though she is a very nice type of bitch, particularly in body and tail carriage.

Bostons were a surprise to me both as to numbers and quality. I have never seen their equal in Canada taken as a whole. Golden Boy is a small dog with excellent expression, a very good front and body, a nice length. Crackers is very much like him, even as to color, but larger. Then came Lord Roberts II., who is long backed and he has not the face nor the expression the other two show. There was a mistake in marking up the open class, due to the peculiar way the dogs were numbered. Tom Boy was the new dog in this class and Golden and Lord Roberts had been out before. Naturally Tom Boy would have been the high number of the three, but he was 112, while the others that had been out before were 116 and 118. Hence Tom Boy got the ribbons in this class and the winners, while 118 was the dog credited till the error was detected. Tom Boy is a very good dog, darker in color than Golden Boy. may or may not have surprised the local talent by placing Bellrose Girlie

as high as I did, and in giving her the non-sporting special, but I do like a large Boston when I can get them showing quality as Girlie does. She is a very classy bitch, good expression, well filled out muzzle, good legs and feet, and a nice evenly turned body. Her width of front is an objection, but she should have been shown lighter and that would have improved her there. Dolly Logan and Bellrock Sweetheart are bitches well above the average, indeed it took a lot of time to get them to my satisfaction.

Oxford Rake is a very classy Fox Terrier, and I gave him reserve for the sporting special. I fancy the Terriers must be pretty well known to your readers. I did not think them hard to place as I did. Donington Jack looked to me to have more character than

Master Mechanic and is better in feet. Two exceedingly good Scottish Terrier puppies were shown and got to winners. Aberdeen Duster is good in color and the right stamp of Highlander. Prince is off in color for a black and tan, otherwise a nice dog. Bedlingtons poor and not in good condition. The Yorkshires were sadly off in coat and color. Then came Mrs. O'Rourke's Poms, of which Hesslyn John was in far the best shape.

I had a most enjoyable time at London, and my old friends, Dr. Niven and Mr. McEwen made a couple of ring stewards hard to beat anywhere, the ring being served admirably. I was through by one o'clock on Wednesday, although I did not commence till three o'clock Tuesday.

Canadian National Exhibition Dog Show.

BALANCE OF REPORT.

Cockers, as usual, held up their own and greatly pleased Mr. Payne. Mr. Joe Hill's black dog, Farlo, the winners, is of the useful size and substance we like to see, though a shade long coat. He is sound and good in head qualities. He was followed by Sir Benedict, Mr. Lewis's dog, another good, substantial, nice headed one, hardly as clean in shoulder. Same owner's black bitch, Calmo Climo, is now a familiar figure on the bench. A Billy Obo bitch, she has that lovely head, eve and expression; she is also well put together and cobby. She won fairly easily over Rockfield Signet, good in body but outclassed in head qualities. A.O.C. saw Mr. Armstrong's Ottawa Romeo winners in dogs, with Ping Pong, a very promising red puppy, shown by Miss Morris, reserve. This puppy and two of his kennel mates afterwards were purchased by the judge. Brookdale Silver and Red Lady went up in bitches. Mr. Armstrong showed a very promising one in Ottawa Stella, a bitch with all the earmarks of a cracker, but held back for lack of coat.

Collies were fairly well represented, the good ones being easily discernible. Doctor Ford's Otterburn Dial, a very promising, sound youngster, won handily in the puppy class. Braemar Perfection, Ormskirk Obernon and Corona Captivator were placed in order named in open. The first two are high-class Collies all over and shown in good coat. Captivator is good in body but beaten in head points. The winning bitch, Weston Queen O' Quality, is of exceptional merit, sound and of good substance, beautifully fashioned, long head, excellent expression and symmetrical. King Edward Prunella was next up, good bone and head but losing in front and shoulder.

Bull Terriers also nicely filled the class. In puppy dogs, Charlwood Blazer, St. Bass and Inferno Surprise were placed in order named; all nice in head and eye but the latter two falling down some in feet. In open class, nothing could hold down Ch. Inferno, shown in splendid form. He was followed by Billy Gray, a sound, good bodied dog, inclined to be strong in head. Charlwood Blazer was reserve to Inferno in winners. Mr. Carter's Dufferin Venus had a fairly easy time in bitches, beating among other good ones Ch. Virginalles. Carter also showed a very promising puppy bitch in Dufferin Victoria. Mr. Ryan had quite a class of Bostons to judge and stuck pretty well to type. For winners dogs, he put up Ted Shongo a "terrier" Boston, who apart from being a bit pinched in muzzle, is a real good one. Picktime Ammo, reserve winners, is good in head but a shade long coat. Ch. Lord Bell Rock had to drop down to third place. In bitches, Revilo Beauty was hard pressed by Mr. Gordon's Victoria II. in open light weight class, both excellent bitches. Mr. Hind's 22 lb. bitch, Ashland Pride, stylish, nice and well marked, stepped into reserve winners.

Some twenty Scotties awaited Mr. Hopton, the best of them hailing from the U. S. Clonmel Brown Laddie, a dog of good even quality and shown fit, outclassed his competitors. The winning bitch, Leed's Dorothy, apart from being a bit oversized, also created a favorable impression.

Mrs. Crowther showed three good Skyes in Donald Scott, Flora Scott and Wattie Scott. West Highland Terriers were few and fair Mr. Kenyon had everything his own way in Bedlingtons, winning out with Haslingden True Game. Black and Tans came out in good numbers, the eream of the class consisting of Mr. F. C. McLelan's "Willowdale" Entry. Leader, the winning dog is a bit on the large size but a grand Terrier. Kaiser is his equal and a nicer size but loses a bit in feet. Bell and Beauty, the winning bitches, are both of good uniform quality.

Beagles composed a very fair class, though there was no marked change over other years. Messrs. Smith's grand bitch, Welcome, of whom we have commented favorably often before, led her sex, followed by their Sterling. They also owned the reserve winners dog, Bramble, who was beaten by Mr. Barnard's Devonshire Hawk.

FIELD AND FANCY ON BULLDOGS.
POMS. AND TOYS AT TORONTO.

English Bulldogs.—The entry of ninety, comprising the best in the Dominion, and several of the best from America, made up about the best collection ever brought together in Canada. A decided compliment for Mr. Hopton, whose awards were well received. The winner in dog puppies, Cheltham Squire, is a massive white, with brindle patches, very promising in head, and has lots of bone. At present his

ears are carried awkwardly and he is long in body. Novice dogs had all types. The placing of Cheltham Squire first over Bud Garden was quite consistent. Both are brindles. The winner is plenty long enough in body, but is much the better in length of skull, finish of face and expression, and has the sounder front. In limit, heavyweights, Mr. E. P. Hinds introduced a real good-headed dog in Sociable Ben, a fallow and white, with a wide, sound front and cobby body. He is a shade high on leg, and for a big one needs more bone. Hillsborough Baron, placed second, a dark brindle, is also good in head, possibly not so short in face, but loses in shoulders, loin and hindquarters. The winner in novice was placed third. Open was a repeat. In the under forty-five pounds there was no denying the Chicago dog, Crumpsall Chief. While far from being fit, his real good head and cobby body placed him over Red Diamond, a very taking red brindle, with plenty of substance. He has a good long skull, which needs more furrow, short and square in muzzle and good turn up. He needs more rib, and is not pleasing in hocks. Golden Star, third, is much the better in body, but is round in skull and rather small in muzzle. Sherwood Regal Baron, reserve, is quite a typical brindle, with a big, flat skull and sound, massive front, but is plain in face. A near thing, however, for third money. Winners found Crumpsall Chief first and Sociable Ben reserve. Mr. A. Stewart won in juniors with Oak Casket, not a jolly name by any means, but quite a typical red brindle. low and wide, with a massive skull; wants more cushion. Hazelmere Orry was second and Bud Garvin third. Bitch puppies were only fair. winner, Bessie Brown, is quite a fair specimen. The others might have been discarded. Novice, bitches, found Ashland Queen Mary easily at the head of the class. This is a grand little one, about thirty-five, a rich dark brindle which will have to be reckoned with among the lightweights, is good all over, long and flat in skull, small, well-placed ears, short up face and broad muzzle, quite all right in front, lots of bone and the true "Bulldog" body and tail. She won easily from Merry Widow Stone and Rydal Stone Queen, a useful pair, showing type. Ashland Queen Mary also won in both

limit and open (under forty pounds), beating Oak Casket and Duchess Ivel, who might have gone up a peg higher had she a little more finish of face. Silver Rosa, a recent importation from Mr. Rollings, was reserve; outclassed here. The venerable Kitty Royal, never looking better, and as active as a vearling, won easily in the heavyweights from Mersey Sally, a very useful stamp, with Toll Bar Lil, beaten in head and ribs, third. Winners' rightly went to Kitty, with the typical Ashland Queen Mary a good whipper - in. The brace prize went to the Stewart pair, Chief and Kitty Royal.

French Bulldogs, apart from the winners, were poor. Lansdowne Mirza, a low brindle, with white blaze, won from Monte, an extremely massive brindle, quite the best in head and ears, but much too high on legs. Crescentwood Crete, a golden brindle, on type, might have been second, but loses in ears and shortness of face.

Pomeranians had quite some quality. Cairndhu Diamond, the winner in puppies and novice, is a very stylish black, with a good head, small ears, short body, and shows well. Cairndhu Merrymaker, although out of coat, his size, color and perfect style rightly placed him over Cairndhu Mischief, the grandcoated cream, a shade coarse in bone perhaps, but all a Pom. Ruff Topping, third, while not so good in skull and ears, had a good body, plenty of coat and lots of style. Berwyn Pearl, a good-coated and smart little black. won in bitches from Cairndhu Duchess and Trixie, which are especially small, but out of coat.

English Toy Spaniels were a real, good lot, and, taken as a whole, well judged. In Rubies, however, we cannot endorse the placing of Macgregor over Rosemary Red Rival. Both were in grand coat, the former having the advantage, a trifle in coat and color, and possibly in movement, but in all head points and body Red Rival is infinitely the better and should have won the cup for best Toy. Puppies was an easy win for Rosemary Dandy, a goodheaded son of Bambino; well broken in color, and has the right texture of coat. Novice, dogs and bitches, was a good class of ten, the Celamo Kennels winning with a good-headed Prince Charlie, Dix Girl, a shade long in body, but scoring in bone and loin over the good-headed Rosemary Prince,

an improvement in color. Holmedale Kind, a good-headed Blenheim, in poor coat, was third. The best in King Charles bitches was Rosemary Lady Calvert, a grand-headed, well-marked daughter of Calvert's. Second was Yip-I-Addy-I-A, much on the same type, losing in coat. Holmedale Pebble and Bubble, a good-headed pair, won in dogs. They were out of coat. Prince Charles dogs had Cliveden Tory, just beating out Celamo Bertone, while in bitches Rosemary Princess II., especially good in head, won from Lalla Blenheims found Seacombe Hero, the winner in dogs, and in bitches Farntail of St. Anthony, a good one all through, easily beating Flora in head and coat.

FOXTERRIERS AT TORONTO.

The Foxterrier classes at Toronto show were well filled and I was glad to find a good entry in almost every class. In the first class to enter the ring I found a good puppy in Warren Renovator. There was no difficulty in giving him primary honors, and he won rather easily from Avondale Appraiser, who is a nice size and has good quality bone, but is too short and strong in head. The winner is one of the best in legs and feet in the show, has a good head and neck and is a compact bodied puppy, but he is not perfect in set on of legs, and it is a question whether he will last, otherwise with maturity he should let down and improve. He won also in limit class, but was beaten by a better dog when he met Warren Distinct in the open, who was put down much too fat and heavy. The next best in point of merit were Varnisher, Warren Ransom, Warren Delegate and Niola Leader.

Possibly the best bitch was old Warren Remedy, proudly carrying her years wonderfully as only real good ones do, but she was handicapped by condition and was pounds too heavy to compete successfully with her daughter, Warren Redress, who is a well-balanced youngster, the correct size, with good head and ears, neat terrier bones of the right quality, good legs and feet and to-day was in good form. If her legs, feet and front last she should do a lot of winning for her kennel, being good all-round, but I think it quite possible her kennel companion, Warren Repeat, may some day beat her, as she

promises to be better on legs, feet and front, and with maturity should let down and improve on her form of today. This is a particularly good puppy. The best in puppies were Lynnfield Salex, Endeliffe Corncob and Endcliffe Live Tip, Donington Rangle, Donington Farmer and Master Mechanic, while Southern Rose and Lynnfield Nancy Jane, with Afan Girl were the best in bitches. Lynnfield Salex has a hard, harsh, natural coat, but requires but little trimming to put him down in form, although I prefer the coat of a wire with a break or wave in it rather than absolutely straight. He beat Corn Cob in coat, but both are good and typical Terriers. latter excels in legs, feet, front and very good head. bone, and has a Speaking of the exhibits generally, I repeat the Foxterriers on this side of the Atlantic do not show the improvement I expected to meet. There is an absence of good legs and feet one looks for. in fact, the majority were very deficient in these showy and primary points of the breed. Soft profuse coats and soft gummy bone, with either thin bare feet, or coarse open feet, were far too much in evidence.

The situation was somewhat relieved by the exhibits from the Allamuchy Kennels, and it was a pleasure to find an old breeder in Mr. Winthrop Rutherford, still breeding Terriers to the standard laid down and observed by the Foxterrier Club over thirty years ago, which helped to make the Fox-Terrier the popular dog he has been for the past quarter of a century and what he will continue to be if the standard of size, bone, legs, feet and coat are observed and bred for. Where certain points in a breed are deficient it is not infrequently found other points or characteristics have been accentuated or improved, but I failed to find that head, eyes, neck and shoulders were any better or would bear even favorable comparison with exhibits in England or certain parts of the Continent of Europe, where legs, feet and bone are to some extent preserved and bred for. The Terriers from the Allamuchy Kennels stood out, and I would name Warren Remedy, Warren Distinct, Warren Redress, Warren Repeat as examples of the type and quality of bone, legs and feet to breed to. Redress was about the best Terrier, as regards size and balance in the show and had the hardest and neatest bone. Repeat has much the same quality of bone, legs and feet as Redress, but will be better in front, legs and feet as she matures. Butte Remedy and Distinct were shown too big and heavy but they have the right quality of bone and type, with the clean-cut head one likes to see. Donation has very good feet (his showy point), but his bone is not so neat as his coat on the day, so short and hard as one or two of his kennel companions carry. I cannot

close these remarks without taking the opportunity afforded to thank my steward, Mr. Atkinson, for the help and attention he gave in getting my classes into the ring, which made my pleasant two days' judging the more easy.—Francis Redmond (Judge), in Dogs in America.


