NOTES AND COMMENTS

Dr. Mills bereaved: Dr. T. Wesley Mills will have the sympathy of Gazette readers, especially his old friends of the C. K. C., in the death of his only daughter, Edna. We distinctly remember the young lady some years ago in Montreal, as a tall, slight slip of a girl, in appearance very like her esteemed father.

Rockley Oorang: The portrait of this splendid Airedale, which appears on the front page of the Canadian Kennel Gazette this month, is a reproduction of the portrait that appeared in Our Dogs for Oct. 27th. That paper, in the same issue, writes of him as follows:

THE FAMOUS AIREDALE,
CH. ROCKLEY OORANG
(K.C.S.B. 452N).

Wherever Airedale Terrier praises are sung, there the name of Ch. Rockley Oorang is accepted as synonymous with all that is ideal in this most popular of Terrier varieties.

He was born in May, 1907, and is a son of Ch. Crompton Oorang ex. Rockley Vista, by Ch. Midland Royal.

In his comparatively short span of life, Ch. Rockley Oorang has won no less than three hundred and sixty first prizes, specials and championships; and what is more remarkable, he has sired four full-fledged champions and two other challenge certificate winners, in addition to many first prize winners; indeed, the majority of the best puppies of to-day claim Ch. Rockley Oorang as their sire.

With all the beautiful fire and Terrier character so pronounced in his maternal grandsire — Midland Royal — and the wonderful bone and substance

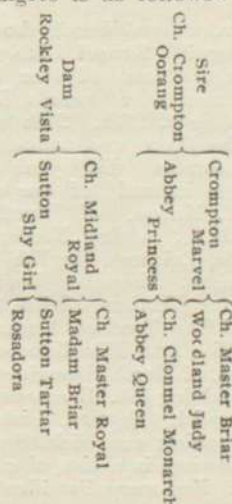
of his renowned sire—Ch. Crompton Oorang—this remarkable dog transmits all these properties to his progeny. Probably no dog of any breed since the earliest days of dog shows can claim a more brilliant career on the bench or such a marvellous record at the stud.

There have, of course, been many brilliant dogs in the show ring, as there have been brilliant sires; but none has combined these two qualities to such a pre-eminent degree as the subject of our article.

Ch. Rockley Oorang appears to have many years before him, for he is remarkably strong and vigorous, and at the present time there appears no strong rival likely to dethrone him from the lofty position which he so worthily holds.

Mr. Geo. Raper has had many tempting offers, both on this and the other side of the Atlantic, but as yet none have come up to the Master of Gomersal's estimation of this famous dog's value.

His pedigree is as follows:—



Since this appeared, of course, as we announced in last issue, the dog has passed into Mr. Jos. A. Laurin's possession, as an addition to his famous kennel of Airedales, and is offered at stud. Our Dogs, in the same issue, under the heading of Airedale Amenities, also has the following:

"Rumor has it that Mr. Geo. Raper has sold his sterling Airedale Terrier Ch. Rockley Oorang, illustrated on our front page this week, to the great Canadian expert, Mr. J. A. Laurin, for the largest sum ever paid for a dog of this breed."

We can only congratulate Mr. Laurin on his plucky purchase and wish him all sorts of good luck.

Boston Terrier Show: Mr. W. A. Little, Secretary of the Boston Terrier Club of Canada, tells us that the Club is now making arrangements to hold its fourth annual show on the date that we announced some time ago, Jan. 1st, 1912. The finances of the Club are in a healthy condition. The officers have a substantial balance in the bank and the Club is likewise possessed of other assets. The above date has been claimed with the Canadian Kennel Club under whose rules and regulations the show will be held.

A Good Toy Gone: Mrs. James Scott is mourning the loss of her champion English Toy Spaniel, the Ruby Ch. Merry Lees Rip, who was run over by an automobile on Oct. 30th, when out exercising with his mistress. Mrs. Scott tells us that it was clearly an accident, as the poor little chap just ran off the sidewalk in play and did not notice the motor car was so close. Mrs. Scott adds:

"The driver was very nice, and had not the slightest chance to stop till it

was too late, the wheel had passed over him. The poor fellow only lived a few minutes and I do miss him, as he was always ready for his run. Champion Merry Lees Rip was a Ruby Toy Spaniel, and started his show career in England in Oct., 1904, which was a wave of success, winning twenty-eight prizes, specials and challenge cups, also twice championship. Was imported to Toronto in the spring of 1908, and continued his career, winning ten winners prizes without defeat, also special for best dog of any breed from Canada exhibited at Buffalo Show in March, 1910. Since that time he has been retired from the show bench. Though he is gone he has left behind him a son in Ch. Parkview Premier, who is following in his father's footsteps on the show bench."

A New Irishman: Dr. E. A. Mooney, Vankleek Hill, Ont., a well known Irish Terrier enthusiast, has imported from Mr. J. L. Thorndike, Brookline, Mass., the young dog, Thorncroft Dictator. We had hoped to have a look at him as he passed through Montreal, but he was held at the customs and we did not see him. He is a good type of Terrier, not too small, good color and coat, nice front, with excellent head and appendages. Dictator, who has already done some winning, was whelped on Feb. 11th, 1911, and is by Thorncroft Sportsman, that goes back to the champion of champions, Ch. Mile End Muddler, and Ch. Breda Muddler. His dam is Thorncroft Tartress, that combines the blood of Ch. Crow Gill Michael, Bolton Woods Bandit, the famous Ch. Bolton Woods Mixer, and others of the same kind. Dr. Mooney has got one that he likes this time, and we hope that his winning career may be continued.

Baching it: Our old friend, Mr. James Watson, who judged so acceptably at London, and whose report of that show appeared in last issue, we learn from a personal note, has left Hackensack, N.J. Mr. Watson's present address is 10 West 39th Street, New York, and the cause is the absence of Mrs. Watson, who is across the water visiting, where she will likely remain all winter.

Toronto Kennel Club: This lively organization is in the field early this year with its announcement of a series of winter shows. The T. K. C. which is an incorporated club, was organized in 1891. The present show committee consists of E. T. Campbell, Chairman; J. E. Mumford, Secretary, H. Rider; J. A. Campbell, V.S., J. Meadows, W. Sands; H. A. Wilson, Club Treasurer.

The monthly shows will be held in the club rooms, Chapter Hall, 3rd floor in Occident Hall, S.E. cor. Queen and Bathurst Streets, at 8 p.m. on each of the following dates. Entrance fees in each class, 10 cents to members, 25 cents to non-members. Classes will be puppies and open, and sexes, color, etc., divided where the competition warrants. Ribbons will be given for first, second and third prizes. Admission free to members and their friends. Following is the schedule:

November 15, 1911 — Bull Terriers, Boston Terriers, Bulldogs, French Bulldogs, Toy Black and Tan, Manchester Terriers.

December 20 — Old English Sheep Dogs, Pointers, Cockers, Dachshunds, Irish Setters, English Setters, Collies, Irish Water Spaniels, Field Spaniels.

January 17, 1912 — St. Bernards (rough and smooth), Great Danes, Newfoundlands, Russian Wolf Hounds, Whippets, Grey Hounds, Blood Hounds, Beagles, Harrier, Dalmatians, Fox-Hounds English and American.

Wednesday, Feb. 21 — Fox Terriers (rough and smooth), Irish Terriers,

Scotch Terriers, Skye Terriers, West Highland Terriers, Airedales, Welsh Terriers, Bedlingtons.

Wednesday, Mar. 20 — King Charles, Blenheims, Poodles, Yorkshires, Pekinese, Japanese Spaniels, Italian Greyhounds, Toy Poodles, Pomeranians, English Toy Spaniels, Schipperkes, Pugs, Prince Charles.

Wednesday, April 24 — Final judging for the J. A. Campbell V.S. Cup, open to members only.

In sending out the above announcement, the new committee adds this word of congratulation to their predecessors:

"In sending out the catalogue of the monthly shows of 1911 and '12, we wish to congratulate the committee which had the last monthly shows in hand. The classes were numerous and in nearly every case well filled. We are very pleased to say the utmost good feeling prevailed throughout the entire season. This year a number of extra classes have been added, which we think will suit every fancier. The judges will be selected for their well known ability to judge their respective breeds and their utmost impartiality in placing their awards. That Prince of good fellows, Dr. J. A. Campbell, who has done so much for the dog and dog men, has generously donated a valuable cup for the best dog in the season shows. "Come along friends of the dog." New Brunswick Kennel Club Show.

The third annual bench show of the New Brunswick Kennel Club was held under the auspices of the Canadian Kennel Club in the Queen's Rink, St. John, on Sept. 26th, 27th and 28th, 1911. The show was undoubtedly a financial success this year although two judges instead of one officiated, Mr. M. T. Mason, of Northampton, Mass., U.S.A., judging Newfoundlands, Foxhounds, Pointers, English Bulldogs, Bull Terriers, Airedales, Boston Terriers, Fox Terriers, Irish Terriers, Black and Tan Terriers, Yorkshire Terriers, Collies and Miscellaneous. Mr. Caleb West, of North Stoughton, Mass., U.S.A., judging St. Bernards, Great Danes, English Setters, Irish Setters, Cocker Spaniels and Field Spaniels.

The hall where the show was held is a large, well ventilated building near the centre of the city, and the judging ring was placed directly under a sky-light which gave plenty of light to look the dogs over thoroughly. The benching, which is owned by the Club, was well arranged around the sides of the hall and after the first day a good exercising ring was provided. The

Club made no arrangements for disinfecting the building or feeding the dogs and each exhibitor fed his own dog.

The quality of dogs in most of the breeds was good and the awards seemed to give satisfaction in most cases. The judging commenced at 2 o'clock on the second day of the show and was not completed until 9 o'clock on the last evening.

St. Bernards were four in number and were lacking in size. Newfoundlands, there were two very fair specimens of this breed shown but they also lacked in size. Great Danes were three in number and although they were good size they were not up to the standard on type of head, having broad skulls and short muzzles. Pointers were four in number and a poor lot, the awards in puppy class being withheld.

English Setters were nineteen in number and were of very good quality, in the puppy class there were five very

es and parti-color dogs. Mr. L. W. Lehurle winning several special prizes with Sir Bonnie Kelso and Lady Buff, a very nice pair of dogs. The Field Spaniels consisted of only three dogs and of fair quality. English Bulldogs were small in numbers but made up in quality, Mackworth Major winning everything in the regular classes and taking the special for the best dog of any breed in the show. He is as good a type as would be found in any of our big shows.

Bull Terriers were not strong in numbers or quality and the puppy entry was disqualified, being pronounced under age by the club's veterinary. Airedale Terrier classes contained three dogs of fair quality, while the Boston Terriers only had two. Wire hair Fox Terriers were a very good lot and kept things lively in the ring during the judging of their classes. Mr. Le B. Wilson's pair (Brier and Northern Janet) would have won the special for the best brace of any breed in the

promising youngsters. Peter O'Leck a little more refined than his kennel mates, taking 1st. The novice winner, Mike, is a well formed sturdy dog and shows a lot of quality, beating Peter O'Leck on muscle and bone. Peter O'Leck when older and more matured, gives prospects of doing better. The limit and open classes brought out four dogs of high quality. Wyoming Valley Salop, the winner, being shown in the pink of condition and well handled in the ring. Stoughton Prince of Brunswick, was out of condition and too fat, otherwise would have gone higher. The bitch classes brought out some good ones in Flirt and Bess Queen of Furness, who loses to Flirt in lack of stop and length of muzzle. Irish Setters consisted of only one dog, but he was a very good one, and has quality enough to do some winning in good competition.

Cocker Spaniels were of good quality and fairly large classes in black bitch-

show had they been in as good condition as Mr. Lehurle's Spaniels. The smooth Fox Terriers were a good lot but not quite up to the quality shown in the wire hair classes. Irish Terriers were good in quality and the classes were fairly well filled.

Collies brought out a good entry and were of good quality, particularly the winning dog and bitch.

The judging for the best dog in show attracted a great deal of interest and it was a hard task for the judges to decide between the English Setter, Irish Setter, Cocker Spaniel, Bulldog and Wire Hair Fox Terrier. The Bulldog finally won with the English Setter reserve.

THE GARDEN OF THE PAST.

Mr. Lacey grows reminiscent in his article on the Madison Square Gardens, soon to be a thing of the past. "The Gardens" is an old stamping ground of Canadian dog owners and many a good "Canadian bred" and Canadian bought has made its debut at Madison Square. The late Tom Davey, Mr. Gooderham, Mr. Laidlaw, Mr. Douglas, Mr. Laurin and dozens of others made history in the old show place.

Well, all things mundane must go, though the Crystal Palace is still with us and report says is to stay with us.

Mr. Lacey writes:

The "Stock-Keeper" was the only kennel paper last week to announce the change of venue that the Westminster Kennel Club was compelled to make because of the tearing down of the Madison Square Garden. The official confirmation is given in Mr. Mortimer's notification in another column, also of the change of dates which fact was also given in these columns some time ago. We were not indebted in any way to Mr. Mortimer for this news, for this impressario makes it a point to treat all the press alike. It is understood that it will be impossible to bench all the dogs on one floor, in fact, it is said four floors will be required, which of course would rob the show of the splendid effect which has always been such a source of pleasure to the visitor at the Garden, for by merely hopping to the gallery one could see all that was being done in the numerous judging rings, with of course the exception of the femininity display in the Concert Room which was always worth a special visit. This special retreat will be much regretted next February.

The next show of our leading organization will labor under other difficulties, for we understand electric lighting prevails even in the daytime at the Palace, which of course will be a godsend to the light eyes and wrong colored ones, though in contradistinction to English methods, which will not tolerate artificial light judging, we are pretty well used to the artificial, in fact some of our most important judging is wrongly done in the false glare, not in the interest of the dog, but the gate. The beautiful "easiness" of the Garden from the street will also be lost, for approaches to the Palace floors are by elevator. However, there is no situation that has not its antidote, so to speak and the timid exhibitor will welcome the fact that the coming show will open its doors with no danger from left over distemper germs.

The dailies have from time to time spoken of new buildings to be erected to fill the crying need of a big exhibition hall in New York and it was cir-

cumstantially stated the other day that a grand show edifice near Herald Square and with an opening on Broadway, would be put up, backed by wealthy men who had secured the guarantees of the men back of the big show enterprises, like the Horse show, Sportsmen's show, Dog show and Poultry shows, etc. The first five story space was to be devoted to an up-to-date structure with a dome, replete with every convenience for such affairs as these great spectacular undertakings. It is to be hoped that the plans materialize before the season of 1913.

The great advance in every way that has characterized the shows of the Westminster Kennel Club under the able guidance of Mr. Mortimer, is a wonderful tribute to the W.K.C. committee in assuming such risks, and the sport loving attributes of our people which have in so many ways received an all-round impetus in every direction of sport, much of which was but here-say ten years ago. But most of the success of the New York shows is due to the untiring energy and ambition of one man, James Mortimer, whose name will be indissolubly connected with the history of the old Madison Square Garden so far as it relates to dog-shows. This is not the first time Mr. Mortimer has had to pick up his desk and put it in a strange building, for as everyone knows, the earlier shows of the W. K. C. were held in the old Gilmore's Gardens, a ramshackle old place that used to be a railroad station or something of the sort, before Gilmore made a show place of it in the late seventies. When the present structure was being built the show moved up to the old American Institute that was up in the sixties on Third Ave., at that time a section of open lots and scattered tenements and beer gardens. When poor Stanford White's fine work was finished, the W. K. C. availed itself of its grand facilities, and has been there ever since.

What a transformation has come over "Fancy" in the years that have passed. Naturally it would take several issues of "Stock-Keeper" to go into particulars in each breed, but generally speaking the old Garden has seen the birth of the Terrier cult in this country and the passing of the St. Bernard and the Mastiff, and other big dogs. When the W. K. C. opened the Garden show an entry of forty to sixty Mastiffs could be brought together. In 1889 there were 67, while now, and for years past, one could not find one of these grand old examples of the canine race with a toothcomb, the last entry, 3, being made in 1903.

At the time the earlier shows were held in the last of the eighties, the lordly St. Bernard was cock of the

walk. It was a great solid fancy and the grand displays on the benches were the feature of the show. The biggest entry was in 1891, the year that Raper first judged here, and Miss Whitney judged them as she had for several years round about that time. Nearly ten years after the entry went to 181, and then the deluge, for every year thereafter the breed could not reach a hundred, though it just missed by one in 1909. However, there are signs of a renaissance and the importations of Col. Ruppert are sure to give the breed an impetus. The Garden had long been used before we had a Russian Wolfhound, for the first entry is but twenty years old. There were eight, last year 89. In those early years there would be an entry of a dozen or so Newfoundlands. The last two years at the Garden there has not been one. Those early years were the glory days of the Greyhound for some of the best the world has ever seen came forward and the general class and fancier interest in the long-

they were pretty tough. They grew in favor and class until Mr. Mortimer has had to record as many as 109 entries in 1909. The year after, 1887, saw the first Bloodhound, one entry, when Mr. Taunton came over and through the negotiations of Mr. Winchell with Mr. Taunton to act as agent for his and the Brough kennels, the later advent of Dr. Lougest, Dr. Knox and others, the breed rose to an entry of 33 in 1907, but of late years has receded, though the quality shown is exquisite, and women have taken the places of the sturdy men who once held sway.

The early days of the Gardens were noted by big entries in Pointers, in fact, Pointers and Setters have always been main breeds at the Garden. It was in 1890 that the Pointers reached their highest entry, 155; two years before there had been 150 and very few years has the entry gone below the hundred mark. This historic ground has upheld some memorable conflicts in the Pointer ring, when such lights as

of the examples were very good, especially in the years after 1890, when Mr. Blossom, Mr. Morris, Dr. Meyers and others contributed to a lively fancy. The hey-day of the Irish Setters was in the eighties and nineties and in the days of the old Gilmore's Gardens they had an entry of 159. The new Garden saw the gradual decline of the breed until in 1909 there was only an entry of 30, but the last two years have seen a "come back."

In the old days we had comparatively good displays of Water Spaniels, while right from the start Field Spaniels have been one of the most consistent breeds on the bench, reaching their greatest number of real fields about ten years ago. At first there were no Cockers, they were all lumped, at least there is no record of them as such till 1883, when there were 45, and then along came the years and the Cockers and the stirring interests of rival American and Canadian kennels until in 1906 the unprecedented total in any breed of 236 was reached, that has never been excelled except by the Bostons. It was in '98 that the Cocker got out of its first hundreds and it has never turned back, and for this it has to thank one of the oldest exhibitors in Mr. Bloodgood. The early years of the Garden so far as Beagles were concerned were given over to the old-fashioned types known as the pleading eye, and it was not until Joe Lewis and Mr. Kreuder and later Mr. Kernochans, made their memorable importations that the Beagle became a Foxhound in type, so to speak. Eleven years ago the biggest entry on record was polled, we believe on the occasion of an English judge passing over them, and since that date they have always kept well to the front, the Garden welcoming the advent of the Appleton, Rockefeller, Post, Read, Karnochan and all the rest, in fact we could pretty nearly say everyone of the present day lovers of the little Hound saw their first show in the Garden.

Dachshunde never did very much, although always a dependable entry until Mr. Klein and Dr. Motschenbacher got into the rivalry game, but the old Garden has seen a splendid uplift of the breed in numbers and quality until last year with its hundred, it put up about the keenest all-round competitions in any one breed, for they were all good.

The Garden was still young when Fox Terriers got out of its swaddling clothes of the first hundred. It has always been a standby of the old Garden since the days of the Rutherford boys—the days of Ch. Royal and Diana—and we can see the very pitch of the rings in those early eighties when the late Lewis and the present owner of the Warrens, Winthrop, made such a noticeable brace of young collegemen. There have been great times in the breed, the Garden has seen some keen struggles and it has also viewed

tails of that time would make the present day group look shabby or rather those of the inter-period, for the last year or two there have been signs of a revival. In the early days of the Garden over forty would be entered, and we must bear in mind that in those days there was not the duplicate system of classification that contributes largely to the entry to-day. A record of entry in the eighties usually meant the total of dogs, few being duplicated.

Those early times were also the hey-days of the Deerhound, which thanks to Mr. Mackenzie, Mr. Theodolind and others, took a brace later on, but the fancy was a very live one in those days, when Col. Thayer, Edward Kelly, Mr. Page, Dr. Van Hummel and others were ding-donging it. There were no Great Danes until after Mr. Mortimer assumed control of the show, for 1886 saw the first entry of 11 and

Meteor, Graphic, Robert le Diable, Beaufort and the rest of the great guns came together in a stirring Pointer age that taught the few of us who are left, what a real Pointer looked like.

These early days were also the glory of the English Setters, another breed that always favored the Garden show more than any other. It was one of the few breeds that went above the two hundred entry mark, the others being in later days Bulldogs, Bostons and Collies. But the early days of the Gardens, peculiarly enough, saw the lowest entries the breed ever had; that was just before the 90's and during that next decade, with here and there a flash—a return to old form of well over a hundred entries. But this depends a good deal on who judges, for the English Setter man knows his judge. In the former days when the Garden was opened, Gordons had goodly entries of near fifty and some

with equanimity the constant uplift of the smooth Fox Terrier until to-day it is one of the isolated breeds in which America could hope to compete on even terms with Old England. When the Garden opened there were precious few wires and none of any account till Brittle came over in ninety-one, we believe it was. The Garden has seen the fancier rise and fall of August Belmont, Clarence Rathbone, George Gooderham, Fred Hoey, and many lesser lights in the Fox Terrier game and the breed is responsible for our oldest active exhibitor, Winthrop Rutherford, and the rise to fame of Mr. Farwell and his Sabines the last ten years.

There were all sorts of Collies up to the later eighties when the breed struck its hundred gait and Dublin Scot, Scottilla, and the Flurrys began to set the pace, led by the now Dr. Jarrett, who saw his first Garden show in 1887. The Collie has always been true to the Garden, for right from the start it was a favorite whatever may have been said of its quality. There have been some grand scenes in the Collie ring at the Garden, and not only Collie men but lovers of other breeds have stopped to admire the Rufford Ormonds, Sefton Heros, Squire of Tytons, Anfield Models, Southport Squires, and a host of world wide representatives of the Almighty Dollar's power. The old Garden has seen the grandest collies that were ever produced in the world, and any new building will have to grow a coat before it approaches the record.

The Garden had become well versed in the wicked ways of a metropolis before there was a smooth Collie or a bobtail benched. It was in '94 that a classification was brought out and they have shown spasmodic interest ever since so far as the breed's fortunes go, but as an all-round special lifter, the Sheepdogs have had an envious career for, somehow, put down in form, they seem to hypnotise the all-rounder.

When the Garden opened, and before there was a club to look after the short-faced breed, the Bulldog ran anywhere under twenty, but here and there with the late eighties came the Salenis of the breed, and when the dawn of the nineties pierced the dome of the old Garden, things began to happen. It has seen the first special shows of the breed under the old club and has in later years lent its wide end to a magnificent display of the breed under the club's electric banner. Some of the world's greatest Bulldogs—King Orry, His Lordship, Bedgebury Lion, Katerfelto, Duke of Albemarle, Ivel Doctor, Ivel Rustic, Rodney Stone, Bromley Crib—but who could begin to name the grandees that have passed in review under the old iron girders—it would be a history of the breed on both sides, and what have we bred from it all? The old empty

Garden answers—What?—experience and Broadway, and those that died young.

Bull Terriers have always been a sound proposition in our fancy and the breed up to a year or two ago was very strong in the home breeds. The old Garden has seen some grand specimens from Comet, Starlight, Woodcote Monarch and other cracks of "old man" Dole, Princeton Monarch, Tommy Tickle, and the galaxy of Canadians, we have had some grand stuff, but the last show or two in the Garden has not been all the well wishers might ask, this more on account of the reckless judging than anything. But a new venue will prove lots of the old vim left and we expect to see the breed take a brace.

In the old days most anything that looked rough and Scotch was a Skye Terrier, so the early show entries of anything to 23, must be squinted at, for when the breed got down to tacks as the real article, it never got much support.

It seems funny that the Garden had been opened some time before the Irish Terrier got out of the teens, and of course it was not until 1891 that the breed began to sit up and take notice, when Walter Comstock got Merle Grady and His Honor, Dunmurry and others over, and Geo. Thomas had Jack Briggs, Briggs' Best and so on in later years. Then Mr. Donner formed the club. The breed plied along until it made 89 in '99, and has gone since the Irish Terrier Club became more active and the cracks began to come over, as high as 135, which was two years ago. The old Garden has seen this Terrier develop in type and style as no other building will ever do, for the dog has reached its zenith in this respect. There were good Black and Tans in the earlier nineties and late eighties when Dr. Foote became interested and began importing his Meersbrooks. It was not until the Garden had added a year or two to its growth that the Yorkshire, although always a favorite in its indefinite way, began to get the real color and coat, in the last of the eighties and nineties, when the Salem kennel of Mr. Symonds, and Mr. Coombs, were in their heyday. The Toy Terriers we always had, more or less, of weird forms, but the Pugs were some pumpkins in the early days of the Garden, which has lamentably seen the fall of this once grand little dog, who, if all the signs point true, will do better in the new building. In the early days an entry of near fifty was not unusual when Mrs. Pugh, Miss Whitney, Dr. Cray, the New Haven man who brought out Bradford Ruby, and later Al. Eberhart started in. Fifteen years ago the dry rot set in.

Toy Spaniels have been a very consistent friend of the Garden shows, running an average of about fifty, though in 1906 they went to 107 and five less two years after, and sixteen

years ago they had 59 and this year they had just one less, though it ought to be said Japs were included in the earlier records. When the Garden was young we had some splendid shows of Italian Greyhounds, when Jos. Lewis, Dr. Hoyt and others were busy with the delicate breed which shows but spasmodic life just at present. Seventeen years ago they could raise sixteen entries.

And now it will perhaps surprise the uninitiated to hear that the breeds mentioned above comprised the sum total of the show proper held in the early days of the old Garden, for it was '83 before a Poodle was added to the list, which for many years comprised the shows on this historic ground. How strange it would appear to people who have contributed so largely to the record of over two thousand dogs, if the fancy was to be lopped off at the breeds we have mentioned! Even the Airedales did not venture to poke their varminty heads down Fourth Avenue until 1898! Just think of it and look at the breed to-day. The hottest on the bench perhaps, but a lot of things may happen in a dozen years, even old Diana has to find a new game pocket. There were great shows before the day of the Boston that didn't come along until 1894, when just thirteen toed the scratch that Mr. Mortimer had been compelled to mark. What tales the old balconies could tell about the dickens since then in this breed! How the smart Boston caught the metropolitan eye for form and color, and the "good thing" was worked to a standstill, but doing a big share towards paying the rent of the Garden in the meanwhile. It has the proud distinction of having the biggest entry in one breed—312 in 1907—the only breed that ever reached three hundred in the old Garden or any other Garden for that matter outside of a specialty show.

The Garden had begun to put on airs when the first Scottie came forward as a regular diet. Of course we had Scotch Terriers before that, but no classification, until Tires came over in '91 and the breed was taken up by Brooks and Ames, and all along the breed has held its own until now it is one of the tony crowd that swaggers along the aisles. But in those early days of Johnny Naylor, if his coat had been turned white he would have been a West Highland that could win anywhere from Poltalloch to Alaska. That year was big in our fancy for it first saw Welsh Terriers, white English and Schipperkes. Of course in the enumeration of these breeds we speak a lot from memory, although the dates are correct and here and there a breed might have been represented in the miscellaneous class but not as one worthy of separate consideration. This applies to Pomeranians that had the first showing in 1897, when three turn-

ed up. Maltese, Whippets, and the now lively French Bulldog had their first bow to a Garden public that year, when Mr. Phelps made such a spectacular exhibit. Then came Airedales as stated but they were pretty so-so till Lorillard Arden got over Compton Marvel in 1901. The only other new breed in '98 was Dalmatians, with a modest five. It was 1905 when the Pekingese trundled along as a special fancy with seven entries, last year they had over seventy. The rest are easy.

And so it has gone—twenty-eight years—in round numbers, a quarter of a century ago—there were only half the breeds catered for that Mr. Mortimer has spent many anxious moments over nowadays, and there is no more conclusive evidence that the old Garden has seen the practical limit of new breeds than is shown by the small entry in the "miscellaneous," which used to have as many as 27. And what big changes in sentiment will the new years in a new building bring forth? There is one thing sure if we have to import the dogs to win there is no necessity to import the judge, for we are making good ones very fast.

work it properly. It would be next to useless to try and beat it yourself for the game would go out on the other side, and away. Hiring beaters is out of the question, but a brace or a couple of brace of good working Spaniels would do the trick. O how one has longed for a team of Spaniels that would face thick covert under such conditions! They would be invaluable. What chances there are to get a good shot when you haven't got a Spaniel! So by all means if you are going to Canada and desire to have some of the best rough shooting the globe affords, take a brace of Spaniels. Let them be good strong Springers or Clumbers. Leave the Toys at home when you set out for Canada, for only grit in man and dog is required there. Above all see the Dog Bill of Fare is Spratt's Biscuits to ensure hard working condition.

There are many shows in Canada, the largest being at Toronto and Montreal. When the former great annual event has been seen, then you may rest content. For it is the finest all-round event in the world, not excepting the Royal Agricultural Society's show at Sydney, N.S.W., Australia. Sheep dog trials are now held in connection with the Toronto event, and, generally, one or two English judges are invited over to officiate. Toronto has owned some of the best smooth Fox Terriers, while quite remarkable Collies and other dogs have been bred in the neighborhood.

There could not be better bred and looking Collies than are to be found in kennels overlooking Montreal and the beautiful St. Lawrence River. So bearing this in mind it would be well to send or take Collie bitches to Canada. The stud dogs, and the best of them, are there already. It is unfortunately a fact that Americans make the very great mistake of buying dogs. They, as a rule, "have no use" for bitches. That is another reason for their non-success as breeders of first-class dogs. And it is in this particular that the Canadian "wipes the eye" of his neighbor; we will find him exhibiting and winning with stock that he has bred himself. Five times out of six the Canadian will beat the American at this particular game. So let bitches be sent to Canada. Another most popular breed is the Airedale. One Montreal gentleman imports them by the score he must have bred thousands. This breed stands the climate, a severe one, during the winter. They live in outdoor kennels. At a moment's notice they were prepared to draw a Canadian badger or take their death at anything. Because of these inclinations or propensities of the Airedale, he has become exceedingly popular, from the Atlantic to the Pacific, in Canada.

A beautiful sporting country is British Columbia, and here the English or Chinese pheasant thrives in the wildest

Advice to the English Who Intend to "Go West."

By Spratts Patent, Limited.

Perhaps, to-day, more eyes are turned towards Canada, than in the direction of any other of the great Colonies of the British Empire. It is such a huge country and the possibilities of the Dominion are without end. With the two great railway systems spanning with steel a mighty continent, agriculture and commerce will grow apace. It is a fact that the concern of the people of the North-West is not the growing of the red grain that shall feed half of the world, but the getting it out, to the sea or lake board, is the chief trouble of Canada—the Western part of it is essentially English. It is true there has been a great rush of Americans, but they are of the industrious practical sort who will make two ears of corn grow where one grew before. Such a community is always fond of dogs, and, perhaps, in no place can gun or bird dogs be seen to more advantage than on the vast prairies. There is an abundance of game, and prairie chicken shooting is not only

to be remembered as a most excellent sport, but the game that shall find its way into your bag or pockets is of the substantial kind. The "chicken" is a large grouse with the same habits as the famous Scottish bird, only he feeds almost exclusively on grain. For, truth to tell, they waste more in the wheat belt than is grown in some places nearer home.

Pointers and Setters, therefore, are of the utmost value in Canada, never minding wherever you might go. For Canada affords much more sport with the gun and rod than does the United States. On the prairies there are what are called "bluffs." These are patches of stunted trees, bush and hassocky grass. They form great shelters for game; and it is into these that the game flies to escape the dash of the pursuing hawk. There is always, or there should be always, game in these bluffs, and it has been the experience of most of us that it is very hard to get a Pointer or Setter to

state. There is such a plenty of woodland and the feeding suits him in every way. It is no place here to write about the best trout fishing that can possibly be imagined, but the hint is dropped that the Western province is an unqualified paradise for the devotee of the rod and gun.

And it is in British Columbia that we will find a magnificent strain of English Setters. They are big dogs with a wonderful cut of long, well-chiselled head. Beautifully ticked, good at their elbows, and workers, they are, indeed, as good as they look. As you could not get better stud dogs if you knocked at the door of the best kennel of Setters anywhere, it would again be well to take a good English Setter bitch or two, should you be crossing the Atlantic Ocean and the Rocky Mountains for the lovely hills and valleys of British Columbia.

There is a great deal of coursing to be had in Canada, and especially is this the case on the prairies. The game is the Jack-rabbit, and the coyote or prairie wolf, the latter about the size of a decently made Collie bitch. As remarked in the preceding chapter, the jack-rabbit is as fast and clever as the European hare. It takes a good brace of Greyhounds to kill him if there be a bluff or cover within reasonable distance. But it is reckoned good and game as the English Greyhound is, that the rigor of the winter is somewhat against him. Therefore another kind of "long dog" is requisitioned. It will be noticed that the old English term "long dog" is in use on the prairie, that definition generally meaning a Greyhound or some cross from a Greyhound. So it is that taking one consideration with another, the long dog, most in use, is a cross made up of English Greyhound, Scottish Deerhound and Russian Wolfhound (Borzoï). This dog has more the appearance of a Deerhound than aught else. The farmers who keep these dogs for the double purpose of running down jack-rabbits and coyotes, argue that their long dog has the combination of all the three breeds mentioned above. He possesses most of the speed of the Greyhound, the constitution or robustness of the Deerhound, and the killing and holding powers of the Wolfhound. Not only does this argument appear well on paper, but we know it to be a fact when the long dog has been put to the test. Coursing the coyote is rare sport; it is on a par with riding to a brace of Greyhounds running one of the smaller antelopes of Africa. As there is not much difficulty in finding a stud long dog, say in the neighborhood of Brandon, Manitoba, if you are going West, don't forget that a Scottish Deerhound bitch or a Russian Wolfhound bitch, or both, will, later on repay you for your trouble and outlay. 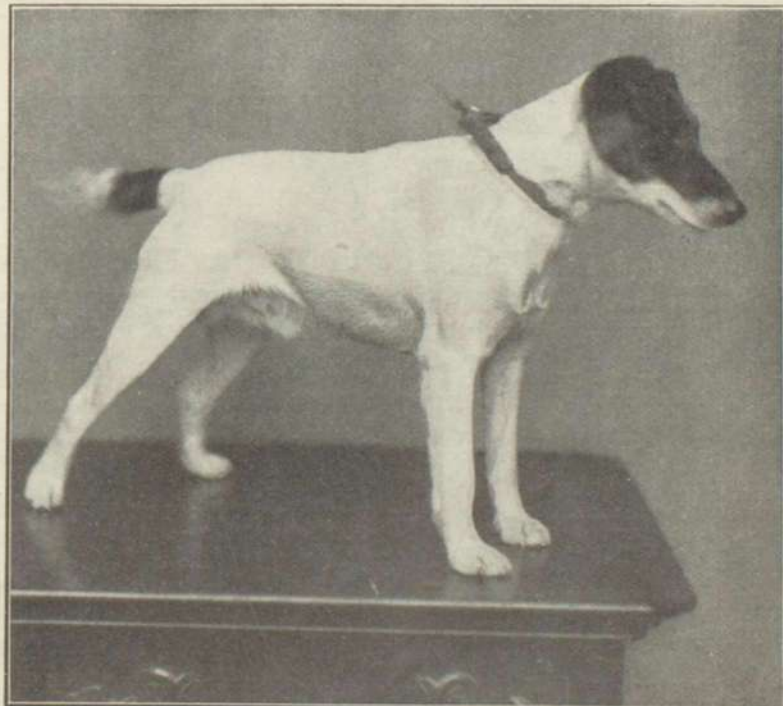
