## NOTES AND COMMENTS

St. John, New Brunswick, Show: The next show of the New Brunswick Kennel Club will be held in the city of St. John, N.B., the first week in September, under Canadian Kennel Club rules. Under a special warrant from the President of the Canadian Kennel Club, the show will be placed on the same basis as those west of Port Arthur, which, in our opinion, is eminently fair. The Maritime Provinces are developing their kennel interests and we hope that before long a reasonably large Maritime circuit may become a matter of fact. New Glasgow, N.S., has a good live club that has already held three small shows under local rules. It is hoped under similar conditions to the club in Saint John that they may see well to give future exhibitions under Canadian Kennel Club rules. Somewhat the same conditions apply to Halifax, N.S.

Canadian Breds: Our old friend and Fox Terrier enthusiast, Mr. Thomas Moore, of Montreal, Que., suggests that in addition to the cup offered by Mr. Francis Redmond that another perpetual cup, to be called the Strathcona Cup, and to be offered at four of the principal shows in Canada, be purchased by popular subscription. Mr. Moore thinks that at least one hundred dollars could be collected for the cup, and as a starter he is ready to donate five dollars. We suggest that Secretary Jacobi of the Canadian Fox Terrier Club take the working out of this into his "careful consideration." Mr. Moore thinks that the cup offered by Mr. Redmond should be a perpetual cup, and if possible that it

also be confined to Canadian breds. He gives as a reason that the Americans bar us from competition for their principal Fox Terrier trophies. We are somewhat in doubt as to whether Mr. Moore's reason is a good one.

Mr. Moore has been using the prefix and kennel name of "Donington" exclusively for twenty years, and is now applying to the Canadian Kennel Club in the regular way, for registration of this word in both connections.

A Bulldog for the Maritimes: Mr. Wm. W. Laskay, Fredericton, N.B., has imported a brindle and white Bulldog, Silver Reflex, from Mr. F. G. Rollings, of Birmingham, England. Reflex was bred by Messrs. S. & J. Thomas, Birmingham, England, was whelped August 9th, 1910, and while details of his winnings are not to hand, it is known that he won in strong company in puppy classes in England. The dog is by Silver Bandit, that goes back to C. Parkholme Crib on one side and Ch. Mahomet on the other. . His dam is Alemena by Rory O'Moore ex. Lady Algy. He is said to excel in head, bone, front and substance, has a good roach, well sprung ribs. He is well cut up with light hind quarters. He has a small screw tail and is considered the best son of the late Silver Bandit. Reflex has already been mated to Mr. Laskay's bitch, Silver Rosa.

Hard Luck: Mr. W. M. Coats, of Vancouver, is certainly having his share of bad luck, not the least of which is the illness of his respected spouse, whom we hope by this time is

entirely recovered. Mr. Coats was obliged to decline the judging appointment at Seattle, as he preferred to show rather than judge. While Mr. Coats was in Winnipeg, he received word that his Fox Terrier, Ch. Ingatestone Rustem, had succumbed to a growth in his throat, and that his dog by Ch. Resist, ex. Warren Waitress, had been run over by an electric car and killed. As if this were not enough his good brood bitch, Lady Van, also died. The whole three inside of one month. He is not discouraged as he has several good brood bitches and some youngsters coming on by Ch. Rustem. He has but the one dog puppy that he is depending on, and he is by Ch. Rustem ex. Lady Resist, and is at present a very promising youngster.

He tells us that Mr. W. D. Bruce is reported to have the best puppy ever whelped in British Columbia, a dog by Ch. Rustem ex. Ch. Wee Woman.

Mr. Coats is after a dog to replace Ch. Rustem, but never expects to get one as good, combining as he did excellent properties as a stock getter and prize winner.

Mr. A. F. Pickard, Winnipeg, has a nice Ch. Rustem puppy out of Vesta Sutton.

Another item of news that Mr. Coats gives us is the probability of Nanaimo holding a dog show in connection with their fall exhibition.

Mr. Coats is eulogistic about the abilities of Mr. A. P. Mutchmor as a secretary, but as we have said before the work is not new to our Winnipeg friend.

Gone Under: We were sorry to hear from Miss M. E. Elmes, Winnipeg, that her little chocolate Pom bitch, Knockrea Toto, had been worried to death by one of the Knockrea Kemnels Irish Terriers. We are afraid that Poms and Terriers don't mix. There is a good deal of spunk in the little mites but they have not the strength or power to put up an adequate tussle with the Terriers. This has been the experience of Mrs. J. A. Pitt, who has lost more than one Pom from this very cause. In Mrs. Pitt's case, however, the Fox Terriers had eventually to find other quarters.

Canadian Industrial, Winnipeg: The dates for the next show will be July 16-17-18-19th, 1912, and these dates have been claimed with the Canadian Kennel Club. We were sorry to hear from Dr. Bell, Secretary and Manager of the Canadian Industrial Association that he had been very ill for some two months with a severe attack of rheumatism. He expected, however, to be able to go to his office early in April. The matter of judging has not yet been considered, but it is plain that Winnipeg has got beyond the capacity of one judge to handle. For this reason at least two will be appointed, possibly more.

Mr. Thody in the West: A good many of the old timers will remember Mr. Daniel Thody, who formerly lived in St. Thomas, Ont., and was addicted to the Bull Terrier cult. Mr. Thody has now settled in Calgary after travelling for about three years, and of course must have a dog or two again.

That he has not lost interest in the Canadian Kennel Club is evidenced by the list of six new members which he sent in, all located in Calgary. Calgary is getting to be a great fancy town, both in hair and feather.

Judges shall not exhibit: American Stock-Keeper of March 30th has the following:

"Our always esteemed contemporary, "Canadian Kennel Gazette," may be depended upon to catch the points that affect dogdom, and the news that the A. K. C. had adopted the rule that judges should not exhibit at the same show is commented upon editorially. At first glance, and looking merely at the moral, and of course most important side of the question, the new ruling is one that will meet with universal endorsement from the right thinking amateur. Yet, under the peculiar conditions that beset our

show system, there is another side. The point is now made that it will affect judging appointments and morein the chance a judge has to show his dogs and those of a friend that he may have taken on to that show, and being there volunteered to handle in the ring. There is a good deal in that. In the new rule, it is expressly stated that a judge at that show shall not handle a dog in the ring. Some-well, never mind, asks us if this applies to the judge wanting to handle a dog in the class he is judging to see for himself how it handles, and will he be liable to the fine? A good deal of the sport of our ribbon shows, for instance, consists in the amateur showing dogs in the ring and many an amateur and "pro," too, being a judge at the show, and having nothing to do at the moment, has enjoyed helping out a brother fancier with his dogs. This is now tabooed, and the careless forgetfulness of the fact may cost one twenty-five dollars. So don't forget. However, the rule is beneficial as being necessary and of the greatest good to the greatest number."

If it is right for John Smith to show his dogs under Wm. Brown in one class at the same show, and for Wm. Brown to show under John Smith in another class at the same show, then our case is out of court. But we submit that it is just here the "moral" and "most important" side of the question-as the Stock-Keeper puts it-enters. Apart from any other consideration one does not have to visit very many shows to find how objectionable it is to the ordinary exhibitor. Hence the strong ground we take that judges should not exhibit at shows where they are officiating as judges.

The handler-judge question is just as objectionable under certain conditions, but this is not now under discussion.

American-bred in England: We must congratulate Mr. Farwell, of the Sabine Kennels, on the splendid win he made in England with Ch. Sabine Forever. She made her debut at the Manchester Show, where this daughter of Reckoner and Fernie won her championship. Mr. Farwell is to be doubly congratulated in that as well as being the owner and exhibitor of the bitch, he is also the breeder.

The Sealyham Terrier: Dr. C. Y. Ford is not enamored of this animal it is evident, and just to show what a word description makes it look like, we give the following standard as adopted by the Sealyham Terrier Club:—

Head—The skull slightly domed, and wide between the ears.

Jaw-Powerful and long, with a more punishing and square jaw than the Fox Terrier.

Nose-Black.

Teeth—Level and square, strong, and canines fitting well into each other, and long for size of dog.

Eyes—Set wide apart, round and large, of a dark brown or dark hazel color.

Ears-Medium V-drop.

Neck-Fairly long, thick and muscular, strongly set on sloping shoulders.

Chest—Broad and deep, well let down between forelegs.

Body—Long and ribs well sprung, hindquarters very strong, body very flexible.

Legs and Feet—Legs short and straight as possible, feet round and cat-like, with thick pads.

Stern-Carried gaily.

Coat-Long, hard and wiry, inclined to be silky on top of head.

Color-Mostly all white, or white with lemon, brown or badger pied markings on head and ears.

Weight—Dogs to weigh from 18 to 20 pounds, bitches from 16 to 18 pounds.

Height—To measure from 8 to 12 inches at the shoulder.

#### FAULTS.

Eyes-Light colored or small.

Nose—White, cherry, or spotted, to a considerable extent, with either of these colors.

Ears-Prick, tulip or rose. Color-Much black objectionable.

DISQUALIFYING POINTS.

Mouth—Much undershot, or overshot.

Young Oorangs: Mr. Jos. A. Laurin, Montreal, the owner of the famous Airedale Colne Rockley Oorang has received the following letter from Louisville, Ky., dated March 31st, 1912, which speaks for itself:

"The bitch Ellsmire Flashwood, bred to Rockley Oorang has whelped ten strapping big puppies, six dogs, four

bitches, all black and tan and fine specimens. Rockley evidently does his duty like a little man and I am highly pleased with the litter. I have had excellent success with your studs, and I think you have made a steady customer.

This is certainly a splendid litter and speaks well for the care given this sire of sires.

An English Visitor: Mr. H. G. Packwood, who so acceptably judged at the Chicago Show, was in Toronto on April 10th, and expected to leave the same day for Philadelphia. Unfortunately we missed the pleasure of a chat with Mr. Packwood as we were in Montreal on that date. From what we can learn Mr. Packwood greatly enjoyed his trip.

New Bulldogs: We learn that Major C. M. Nelles, several years ago one of Canada's leading Cocker breeders, but who has since taken up the Bulldog cult, has recently purchased quite a number of both dogs and bitches from Mr. Otto Stauder. Included in the lot is the grand heavyweight bitch, Hermit Cora, a dark brindle. Hermit's Hannah is another, a piebald puppy aged about nine months, and there is a dog puppy that is said to be something of a marvel, solid brindle in color, and about as wide as he is long. He will be registered as Typhoon, Major Nelles, it will be remembered, judged a big entry of Bulldogs at the last Montreal show.

A. K. C. Stud Book: The American Kennel Club Stud Book, Vol. 28, for the year 1911, contains a wonderful mass of detailed information. The registrations number nearly ten thousand and the book, which is printed on thin Bible paper, contains considerably over one thousand pages. Bench show winnings are given in all breeds, but only winners and reserve winners. In this point it differs from our Canadian Stud Book. It covers in addition to all this a complete list of the active members of the American Kennel Club, a complete list of Associate Members, all kennel names, prefixes and affixes, registered up to the end of 1911, and a list of all champions of record in all breeds recorded to December 31st, 1911. Details of all bench shows held under American Kennel Club rules for the year are added. We understand that the price of the book is five dollars, or to Associate Members three dollars. It speaks volumes for the system in force at the American Kennel Club offices that a book of this magnitude should be ready in about three months after the last recorded entry that it contains.

## The Hamilton Kennel Club Show.

After lying dormant for two years, the Hamilton Kennel Club received new strength this year in the form of a first class bench show.

The exhibition was held on Good Friday and the following Saturday, the dates usually obtained by the Ontario Kennel Club; but unfortunately the latter were unable to secure a suitable building for their annual fixture this year.

The Hamilton Club were most fortunate in securing the drill hall to bench their show in. The building afforded lots of space, light and air, making an admirable show room. There were about 200 dogs on exhibition, Boston Terriers, Cocker Spaniels and Toy Dogs having possibly the best representation. Several of the dogs came from long distances, even from as far as Haileybury, Ont., and Winnipeg, Man.

There were a number of notables in dogdom there, including Ted Shongo, W. A. Little's well known Boston, Otto Knapps' beautiful Boston bitch, Bright Eyes; Mrs. Carruthers Toy Spaniel, MacGregor, and also his conqueror for best dog in show special, Champion Martello, Jno. Tomlinson's beautiful black Cocker Spaniel dog.

Much regret was felt among the fanciers at the inability of Mr. Walter Sands to be present. We are sorry to say he is in the hospital at Toronto. However, Mr. Perkins, of Toronto, took his classes, with exception of Airedales, which were added to the list of Mr. Miles, and indeed did his work excellently.

A great deal of credit is due to the secretary, Mr. Colvin, and to Mr. Clendenning, superintendent of the show, whom we understand have for some little time worked night and day in the interests of the dog in Hamilton.

C. than black, were captured by Sandstone, a good Cocker. Limit parti-color was won by Wentworth Billy. Open dogs, parti-color, Champion Speculator, a good dog, but lacks somewhat in expression. Novice bitches, black, was won by Marion, a good one. Limit bitches, Marion, a good one. Limit bitches, black, went to Calmo Climo, a nice bitch, but slightly overshot. Novice bitches, A. O. C. than black, Pierport Baby, a nice one with good head. Limit and open bitches, A.O.S.C. than black were won by Cream Puff, a good bitch, with grand eye but a little weak in muzzle. Open bitches, parti-color, went to Rhoda D., a high class bitch, but lacks chiseling under the eyes. Green class, Paddy B., a fair one.


won by Walden Perfection, a nice bitch, with good legs and body, but light in eye.

#### BOSTONS AT HAMILTON.

Boston Terriers were not a very large entry, but the quality was very good, some of the best in the breed being present. Puppy dogs brought out nothing of note. Novice dogs brought out a very nice little dog in Peach, could be better in muzzle and face markings, grand body, tail, legs and feet. Limit, light weight, Ted Shongo won the blue, a very clean cut dog, could do with more flesh, which would take away his leggy appearance. 2nd to Rolston Bonnie, nice color and markings, stands wide in front, seems weak in hind quarters. 3rd, Cliffside Dipper, thick in shoulder and shows too much white of the eye, which gives him a bad expression. Limit dogs, 17 and under 22 lbs., 1st Peach; 2nd, Lord Roberts, good color, long in body, very thick in shoulders. 3rd, Preston William, good body and feet, but lacks expression and could be cleaner in muzzle. Limit dogs, 22 lbs., King Boy had a walk-over, good body and tail, plain in face and too lippy. Open dogs, 12 and 17 lbs., 1st Ted Shongo; 2nd, Wampagne Prince, good color, gay tail, seemed to be bad on hind legs, sleepy expression and a poor shower; 3rd, Bolston Bonnie. Winners dogs, Ted Shongo; reserve winners, Wampagne Prince Puppy bitches, one entry, Oxonian If, well named, a nice headed pup, but too long in body and very ring shy. Novice bitches, 1st Cliffside Corby, a very sweet bitch, grand expression, and one of the best seen here in a long time. She was shown too fat, but far the best in this class. 2nd, Firefly, a nice clean cut bitch, good color and markings, trifle long and a little weak in muzzle; 3rd, Edgwood Peggie, good color, gay tail, heavy muzzle, should breed a good pup if mated right. Limit bitches, 12 and under 17, 1st, the well known Bright Eyes, one of the best at her weight in America, a bitch that showing all the time; 2nd, Cliffside Corby; 3rd, Bell Rock Peach, out-classed by the first two. Winners bitches, Bright Eyes; reserve, Cliffside Corby.

Cairndhu Merrymaker, a good cho-colate, won, he is a good one. It is a pleasure to see two good ones such as Merrymaker and Tid Bit. In puppy bitches, Kelworth Gypsy, is small and typical. Novice, Mrs. Mark O'Rourke's Princess Patrica, an easy winner, excelling in coat, a superb black, perfect head and expression. Limit, repeat. Princess Alice not in good coat but all Pomeranian. Queen of Hearts a very small stylish sable, was shown in open bitches and finished reserve to Princess Patrica.

## Further Notes on the New York Show. BY DR. C. Y. FORD.

Judging at New York is a mixed pleasure. One enjoys seeing before him the pick of the home-breds and the gleanings of Old Land celebrities. win is a vital matter with many. The blue ribbon recipient commands a price that oft times brings joy to a housewife who has been faithful in saving the best "scraps" for the entry at this the great show of America. Many a shaky exchequer has been pulled over the danger-line by the sale of such a one: The task of placing the awards is, therefore, a responsible one. To many, the entry fee of five dollars a class, not to speak of railway and express charges, means much; to the few blessed with a superfluity of this world's goods, it means little One must take these points into serious consideration in making awards.

The collection of Collies was a very large and representative one, the largest number of actual dogs present of any other breed. This speaks well for the popularity of the breed. Collies can't be "on the wane," as some would have us believe. The signal feature was the triumph of the "American breds." In years past some very rich man has been in a position to cable to England for "the best regardless of price." The issue was a foregone conclusion. This means of winning has gone on year after year. This country became the burying ground of British Champions. How many, and their names, would make interesting reading. They never seemed to reproduce themselves, and there was always something still better to import for the next show. To name a few at random, who have appeared at Westminster Kennel Club Shows, is an easy matter: Christopher, Sefton Hero, Rufford Ormonde, Wishaw Clinker, Squire of Tytton, each cost five thousand dollars or more to bring across the Atlantic. This year found a great change. The winning dogs were homebreds. So even were many of the classes that the margin separating the winners was a very narrow one. At other shows a V.H.C. dog at New York would have headed his classes, and it may be predicted that many of those not in the money here will give a good account of themselves on future occasions.

Few realize that the Collie is a working dog. To gallop at top speed and head off a refractory ewe whose leadership may cause disaster to the whole flock, requires something more than the "long lean head, semi-erect ears and almond eyes" we all breed to and hope to reproduce. To turn quickly and cover long journeys over hill and dale demands sound legs and feet, properly constructed shoulders and strong hind-quarters. Of course we concede that these qualities are often found in Collies with coarse heads and ill-carried heavy ears. These are not show specimens at all, so are not considered here. The point is that soundness should not be sacrificed merely to produce ultra heads and ears. There is no reason for it. All round excellence, quality and soundness are typified in Mr. Mason's beautiful dog. Champion Southport Sample. Though he still stands unrivalled, his owner has him on exhibition only, being satisfied to rely on the fame of his sonsand daughters. The lion's share of the prizes went to this dog's get, and at last an old country champion is consistently making his presence felt in America.

To speak briefly of a few of the winners. Lovely, indeed, was the exhibit of Blue Merles. They have, in many cases, quite caught up to the sables and tri-colors in head and ear properties-points in which heretofore they have failed. It was a pleasure and a popular decision to award Miss Hydon's very beautiful merle, Grey Mist, the special for the "best head and ears." Colonel McEwen was second in a class of dog puppies that fairly filled the ring, with a new importation, Holyrood Bayard, a tall, dark sable by Ch. Bayard of Tytton. He should be a useful sire. There were several puppies shown of exceptional quality, but on close examination they were found to have unsound under-pinning or over-shot mouths beyond the limit. Slightly overshot is quite allowable, but a pig-jaw is an abomination. The chief interest centred on the open classes. In dogs, Mr. Untermyer scored with a home-bred Greystone Patriot, by Southport Sample. He is the type of his sire, medium sized as a Collie should be, and as sound as a sovereign. A golden sable with showy white markings, and put down in full bloom. First glance round the ring made Miss Bulloch's recently imported and stylish tri-color, Seedley Select (Imna) all a winner. His head, eye, ears and expression are true to Collie type. His outline, coat, frill, cape and sweeping tail-carriage are a delight to the eye. Alas! and how disappointing! On asking him to move he was found to have straight, stilty hocks and unsound action. He had to give way to the sounder dog, and I may say that his owner's true sporting spirit was quite equal to the occasion and an object lesson to the whining bad-loser too often seen among the stronger sex. Were all women like Miss Bulloch the franchiso and vote could not possibly be withheld. The disappointment was mitigated by her winning the special for the best in the show with Champion Imna Special, the grand tri-color. A wonderful dog with few faults, but too big for my idea of a Collie. The Collie is not a big dog.

The bitches were not equal to the dogs. Mr. Untermyer was again successful with a quality tri-color, Greystone Gleam, a daughter of Southport Sample, a charming type all through but not as good in legs and feet as

one would wish. Being a bitch she was not heavily penalized. Mrs. Gordon's former favorite, Seedley Splendour appeared under new ownership. Her poor condition and listless showing put her out of the running.

A word on the Old English Sheep Dogs will not be amiss. Mrs. Tyler Morse has spent thousands to procure the best collection procurable. They were in superb coat and condition and must have brought joy to their fair owner, when the cable reached her in far-off Monte Carlo that Champions Shepton Hero and Ominous, together with Midnight and Slumber had been awarded the cup for the best four of all breeds. In Slumber, practically a home-bred, Mrs. Morse has a perfect specimen. The O. E. Sheep Dog is not a big long-backed dog, but a short blocky cart-horse type that gives one the impression of squareness. To many keen judges Slumber should have won for the best of all breeds.

Mr. Winthrop Rutherfurd, whom many only look up as a Fox Terrier enthusiast, has always been a devotee of the smooth Collie. His recently imported trio, Champion Stockport Connie, Warren Elegant and Warren Emigrant, were representative of this neglected but useful breed.

Sporting Spaniels are always a good collection at New York, though the other than Cocker varieties are not very popular. Mr. W. T. Payne had the only Irish Water-a big dog, a bit coarse-called Sligo, by Ch. Young Patsy Boyle. He looks of a sort that would fish ducks out of any marsh, doubtlessly what Mr. Payne imported him to do. Mr. George R. Preston is true to the Clumber, and in Ch. Fielding Queenie of Ormonde, Nell of St. Marys, and Countess of Ormonde, he gives the spectator a chance to study the breed. Mr. Geo. Greer had his wonderful kennel of Field Spaniels on view and won the special for the best brace of any breed, with Brookside Magician and Brookside Naulahka.

Cockers: Dr. Henry Jarrett, as is his custom, judged conscientiously and with great care. Mr. Bloodgood, with the Mepal Kennels' usual quality lot; Mr. W. T. Payne, always to be reckoned with; Mr. C. H. Mason, who has demonstrated that he knows how to breed winners, Mr. and Mrs. Hamilton Fish Webster, who have come rapidly to the fore with the Pen Crag

Kennels of Newport, and Canada's representative, Mr. Harold M. Dyment, whose illness at the time of judging prevented his good team from having a proper showing—and many other exhibitors of less prominence, made up a collection that any Cocker enthusiast would have spent all day looking at, and the best part of the night talking about!

A few comments as to the dogs :-The class for open black dogs found Mr. Bloodgood a handy winner with Mepals Omi, rare good head, eye, muzzle, short body and a good mover. His coat needs attention. Mr. James Clarke's late Champion LeNoir, now under Daffodil Farm ownership, was for exhibition only, and a rare good Cocker he still is, and still easily holds his own. The parti-color dogs narrowed down to a struggle between Champion Newport President and Ch. Mepal's The Judge, both sound lemon and whites, showing the potent blood of Braeside Bob in the third generation. The former is just a bit strong in skull. The latter has more quality. It will always be a matter of individual preference, as they are of almost equal merit.

The Reds are not improving. Bryntwood Rainbow, still a good dogfor the third or fourth time scored winners at New York. Surely a record! It is about time Canada made one of her old-time showings in this color. The bitches were of much merit. The chief issue was between Mr. Bloodgood's Mepal's Flavia and Mr. Pavne's Now or Never. The former fails a bit before the eye, but her condition was faultless. "Pat," Mr. Bloodgood's kennel man is without a peer at "putting down" a Cocker. Mr. Payne's bitch, bred by Lance Farewell and by Billie Obo, is a hard one to fault, but her coat needs immediate attention. It was Mepal and Midkiff again in parti-color bitches. In the solidcolor-other-than-black class Mr. Dyment's Brookdale Silver must have won properly shown and brushed up.

Such breeders as George Douglas and the late "Pop" Dunn were absent, but their friends speak often of them. Cockers are still going strong at Toronto and New York shows at least.

## WHEN A DOG HAS RABIES.

The following "hints respecting rabies in dogs" have been adopted by the Toronto Humane Society from an animal report of the Royal Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals, London, England, and are published, with the advice to give dogs plenty of water and place it where they can get it at any time:—

Foaming at the mouth, raging madness and fits are the last forms of rabies.

The first signs are seen in habits—the dog's behaviour is entirely changed and its countenance is altered.

An affected animal becomes dull, gloomy and taciturn, and tries to hide itself in out of the way places, when spoken to by its master it looks up apparently with an effort to be cheerful, its countenance dropping the moment afterwards into an expression of wretchedness, and its eyes staring with a sad void in them; sometimes it collects dirty pieces of rope, which it hides, or it is restless the moment it lies down, finding no place comfortable, or it seems to be under fitful delusions and fancies it sees things or hears sounds, and starts at them, and subsides the moment afterwards into supineness.

Its temper generally changes from natural sociability to disagreeableness. In many instances it vomits, the ejected matter being streaked with blood

Though surly, it is not vicious at this stage of the malady, but on the contrary it is unusually affectionate, and yet its expressions of love seem tinged with a melancholy which impresses a careful observer with the unhappy thought that the poor creature is conscious of its serious condition, and of a danger to its friends that it may be the agent of.

Sometimes it shows distrust, preferring solitude to the company of those it has loved; at others, an imploring, despairing appeal is made to its master to save it from impending disaster.

Its master's voice always has a semimagical influence on it.

In more dedided cases it snaps at the air, apparently seeking for something it cannot find, and scrapes incessantly.

These are bad signs, especially if at the same time the poor creature becomes fastidious in feeding, or refuses food which it formerly was partial to, and, instead, shows a morbid disposition to eat carpet, wool, wood, earth, stones, excrement, etc.

When the peculiar noise is heard, which is neither a snarl, nor a growl, nor a bark, nor a howl, but all of these, in which the howl predominates, then no doubt can be felt.

Generally a rabid dog tries to escape from its master, probably tearing to injure him and others whom it loves; and then it wanders—moving along with no visible object or aim, but still going on and on, frequently at a quick pace, until its strength fails.

## WINNING THE WATERLOO CUP.

How England's Classic Coursing Derby is Run.
Poor Chance For The Puss.

BY RIGHT WING, IN THE SUN.

Liverpool, March 6 .- Over the checkerboard plains of Altear-alternate squares of harrowed and of smooth, dun-colored field - there swept the other day a fresh invigorating wind from the Irish Sea. Overhead were blue sky and driving white cloud, while an all but summer sun shone upon the broad acres of Lord Sefton and tense, double ranks of sporting men-some from 300 miles away - picturesque in riding togs and mufflers gathered witness the "Blue Riband of the Leash." Toward the north was a little shelter in which crouched a man with two lean greyhounds at tetherthe slipper - and half way down the field rode a horseman gay in pink coat and white breeches-the judge.

Through field glasses, one made out the straining dogs, a brindle and a black, their long noses pointed southward, tugging in all the exuberance of puppyhood at the restraining leathers. Swinging one's glass still farther to the north, a series of dancing points of light against a black background of harrowed field—the beaters with their flags—leaped into range of the glass circle. Up and down, up and down danced the little white specks, while the great crowd of 30,000 or more remained breathlessly, expectantly silent.

Suddenly a man cried, "Here comes puss, and a strong, upstanding one he is," and past, the little shelter of slipper and dogs flashed a streak of brown fur, tipped fore and aft with white. On he skimmed straight down the field, frightened as only a hare can be frightened, and running for his life. Out from the shelter ran the slipper, literally towed by the two lithe-limbed dogs, and as a flag fell the leather was released and the two greyhounds broke into railroad speed in full chase.

Still there was silence. Nose and nose ran the dogs, the hare putting on a sudden burst of speed that seemed to carry him skimming over the grass tops like a tiny aeroplane at the instant of rising. Seen through the slight haze that remained from the week's hoar frost and ground fog, the scene more nearly resembled a few seconds chopped from a moving picture film than an actual cross-section of English sporting life. But the reality of it came home with the roar of the great crowd when the lean black greyhound with the bit of red ribbon at his throat drew closely but surely clear of the brindle streak and in another jump was within a stride of the fleeing hare. There was no thunder of hoofs as in a horse race, no baying by the dogs as at a hunt, for every last ounce of speed and energy was applied by quarry and pursuers to the bitter matter in hand—a matter of life and death, of glory and of money.

Now puss swerved sharply to the right, and the brindle, carrying the shillings of the crowd, drew past for the first point, and coming round in a quick but beautiful curve turned, "in possess on" of the hare for the second. Again the brown bit of fur doubled, and again the black courser was master of the race. Once more the game challenge of the brindle, and for the flash of a second it seemed that the black was done for.

But the brindle had done all that dog could—all that any but a true champion could—and in the last few jumps the oncoming black picked up point after point, and shooting past gallantly in the last few strides smothered the little brown fugitive and made the "kill," Thus he satisfied both judge and crowd, for while the judge looks for the points the crowd rises to the "kill," being like many an English sporting gathering, just a trifle cruel, or to put it conservatively at least indifferent.

Up flashed a big red flag, a signal answered from hill to hill by crimson dots, relaying the news to the railroad station at Altear, three miles away, where an excited operator seat all over the United Kingdom the brief message "Tide Time wins the Waterloo Cup."

So there is another champion, another winner of a trophy that dates back to 1857, of an event that grew steadily more and more important even away back in the palmy days of another Lord Sefton, and of Lords Craven, Lurgan, Grey de Wilton, and a host of others.

Nothing that I have seen of English sporting life has made so deep an impression as this great coursing event at Altear near the sea. The sheer speed and skill of the glorious hounds, of Tide Time, the black puppy; Mr. Townsend, his popular owner, and a newcomer in cup contests, bought some time ago at the absurd price of 25 gtfneas; of Adversary, the beaten but game brindle; of Hidden Smoke, and Hyson, whose every line spells

pace; the truly representative crowd of English sporting men, including the Duke of Leeds, Sir Thomas Gooch and a host of others not so prominent but equally eager for the sport; the day and the scene, not forgetting the funny bookmakers with their raucous cockney cries—all these are pleasant memories.

But I cannot help thinking of the frightened hare which never had chance for his life. That he provided a great test, one of the greatest in the final of a Waterloo Cup, that he vindicated the speed and cleverness of the Altcar hares over a course whence the hand of man had removed those covers and shelters placed there by nature for the benefit of the hunted-so much is said for him by those who love the sport and can see little cruelty in coursing that so closely approaches the enclosed type, or who perhaps have grown callous.

I cannot forget that simister black patch with its dancing points of light to the north, and the fact that the little people of the field came out of it to practically certain death-that it was not nature that deprived puss of at least an even chance, but man, and that man has made it a thing on which to wager. The dogs do as they have been born and have been trained to do, and do it beautifully, and there is no more graceful animal in the field, I think, than the coursing greyhound, but I should prefer to see him slipped as in the days of long ago, in the unconverted field, to run his own heart out if necessary-which by the way he will do-where the issue is as nature intended, between the preying and the preyed upon, without outside interfer-

Nor shall I forget the joy with which I saw an occasional hare come skimming down the field when the slipper was not ready and the dogs had not come out, keep on over the little ditches and go sailing over the last turf parapet to safety in the cover on the other side.

There is also another picture in my mind. Going out to the course I passed, with the crowd, one of those squares of harrowed ground close by the road. Across it skipped one of the furry little racers, running for the sheer joy of the thing, unafraid, if perhaps disturbed by the honking of automobile horns, the shouts of holiday

makers and the cries of the bookmakers. Hoar frost and groundfog had all but disappeared, and the little animal was making a speed not approached by the Lydiate hares of the day before because then the heavy soil clung to their furry feet and slowed them up so that they were roundly cursed by the rougher element for being killed at too early a stage and so not providing the best of coursing.

This early romp meant nothing to the passerby, however, save that the dogs would have a longer chase and a greater opportunity to score points before the inevitable kill. I have no means of knowing whether that particular little chap was among the slain for sport's sake, but I certainly hope that he escaped and will have many another warming-up spin for pleasure before he goes out into the arena, where the sharp muzzles of the fleet greyhounds will close at his throat.

As one of the courses was being run later in the day, a course in which the hare by a superb burst of speed and intricate and clever doublings seemed likely to get away, a bookmaker forgot the dogs for a moment and cried in his enthusiasm:

"Even on the 'are; I'll give even on the 'are!"

My heart warmed to him for a moment, and I feel quite sure that this particular bookie was not quite so hard as he was painted.

The finals in the various Waterloo events, which include the Cup, the Purse and the Plate, were extremely well run, and the last dash in the Cup event was said by experts to have been the finest in many years, but the earlier days of the Altcar meeting were nothing more or less than slaughters. The ground was heavy, and the mist and wind hampered the quarry as well. This, perhaps, had something to do with the upset of the favorites; but it must be remembered that even an English sporting crowd sometimes goes wrong on form, and when Adversary and Tide Time were quoted in the early betting at 40 to 1, it was evident that even the experts had overlooked the fact that puppies sometimes come along very fast in January, even with an uninspiring fall performance behind

One could not wish to look upon more beautiful animals than these, the

personification of grace and speed, and the fact that the ultimate winner was practically without backing from the beginning made his victory in a classic event all the more interesting.

England has been a long time familiar with coursing. The first public event dates back to the middle of the seventeenth century. Even in 1869 the dogs coursed for a total in stakes of £50,000. The origin of coursing is, of course, familiar to most sportsmen. The greyhounds were used for catching hares and looked upon as hunting companions. Later owners matched their dogs against each other, and the animal that made the "kill" was considered the winner aside from any running for points as is the case to-day. Later points were considered, and as a result stakes established, of which the Waterloo Cup is the most famous. A Gosford Gold Cup is won and soon forgotten, but a Waterloo goes down into history. Hence the term, the "Blue Riband of the Leash."

It would appear then that everything possible had been done for coursing to bring it up to the highest possible pitch of merit. In the old days, when the hare had a chance, it was not uncommon to find both hare and dog dead at the end of a hard run, the greyhound not more than two jumps away from his quarry. Hares have died from fright, and hounds have broken their hearts and sometimes their necks. But the enclosed ground, used for the first time in 1876, put an end to the chance of the frightened puss. The first field was at Plumpton, and was enclosed with wire netting.

This first experiment in enclosed coursing proved an instant hit, and the stakes constantly vrew in value and importance. Gosforth was the next enclosed course, and the meetings held there were quite as successful. Kempton and Haydock Park followed in quick succession, and so rapidly did the sport spread that the Wye racecourse was converted into an enclosure. The hounds soon learned that by waiting an opponent would turn the hare so as to make the "kill" easy, and this is as much as anything else brought about the change to the present methods. Presumably courses are not now enclosed. There are no wire fences around them, but the hare that gets away at Altcar has to show almost unbelievable skill, and there are beaters who prevent his taking a side slant out of the bounds. 1st amounts to much the same thing in the long

There is considerable coursing in California, and I am told that the hare has very little more chance there than in England. I do not think the sport on its present lines could long survive in the East. It needs a generation or so of the game or more than a drop of English sporting blood to be indifferent to the slaughter of the smallest game. That is one of the unpleasant features of many English sports, the indifference to cruelty.

A follower of coursing will tell you, without the slightest sign of compassion, that hares have been taken to veterinaries in order that groundkeeper might learn the cause of a death not to be explained. The "vet" has frequently found that the little animal has literally burst his heart. It seems to me a pity that there is not some other way in which to display the virtues of the greyhound, and that the greatest trophy for which he is eligible must be fought for over courses that are not as nature made them.

I cannot forget the sinister patch of black field to the north at Altcar, nor the fact that puss runs with two dogs, all the field conditions, and probably nearly all of the twenty-five or thirty thousand people against him.


