MEN PROMINENT IN CANADIAN DOGDOM

MR. A. P. MUTCHMOR, WINNIPEG, MAN.

The young looking man presented this month cannot be as young as he looks for we have known him for lo! these many years, in connection with dogs and dog shows, pigeons and poultry, and other kinds of fancy stock, including as he says himself, white mice. In his humorous way he gives us an insight into his first dip into the troubled sea of dog showing. Reminiscently he writes:

"I remember the first dog I ever showed. It was a long time ago. With the splendid classification that was offered by the Toronto show, there seemed to be only one place for him, and that was in the Great Dane class. He was made a Great Dane forthwith. His claim to this distinction was based on the fact that he was a very big dog, and weighing 155 lbs., the express rate was the cheapest part of him. That dog was worth my going to Toronto to see him make his initial bow to the public. Well, I never saw him judged but his kennel was decorated with "also ran" when I got back from lunch. The editor of the Gazette referred to this dog in his next issue. I should have stated that the dog was sired by The Duke of Wurtemberg. The editor referred to his most royal breeding, and said that he felt sure that the Duke would have felt honored, etc. I have just tumbled to the fact that the editor may have been taking a poke at me."

The first Fox Terrier owned by Mr. Mutchmor was the wire, Compton Vindex, C.K.C. 3288, which was a good one. We remember him well. He won 1st puppy and special for best American bred at New York. This was in 1894. Compton was the prefix of Mr. Wetherall who was at that time quite active in Terrier circles, both Fox and Scottish. He soon

added the wire bitch Bonnet, a good brood bitch. While Vindex would not compare in head points with the dogs of to-day, he could hold his own in body, legs and feet and like many another old timer, would smother a lot of the moderns in coat. After this Mr. Mutchmor dipped into English Foxhounds, securing the stal-

lion dog, Hector, from the Montreal Hunt, which with a good brood bitch called Beatrice, he and Mr. J. G. Walters, the Bull Terrier man, showed most successfully. In fact they won in Toronto under Mr. Raper.

Following a change of residence Mr. Mutchmor was out of the game for a couple of years. The start of his present kennel of Smooth Fox Terriers, was the purchase, in whelp, of Aldon Trinket from

Mr. A. A. Macdonald. This bitch is by Ch. Tipster ex Ch. Diversion and has proven herself a most useful brood bitch. Like many other Ottawa Old Boys Mr. Mutchmor thanks "Andy" Armstrong for much of the knowledge he can show regarding the dog. Everything he has in Fox Terriers has first been passed upon by Mr. Armstrong. He gave him Clapton Felicia that Mr. Mutchmor thinks the best brood bitch that one could hope to own, Ottawa Marquis, Garry May, Garry Madam, Garry Mainstay, Garry Maintop and Ch. Clapton Blue Blade. The death of the latter shortly after he got him was a sore touch as he was one of the best of pals. Mr. Armstrong then bought for him Sabine Famous, a daughter of Ch. Sabine Rarebit, Warren Vehement, now a champion, Warren Resemblance, a granddaughter of Ch. Warren Remedy and Warren Repeal, the bitch that Mr. Francis Redmond spoke so highly of at Toronto.

When Mr. Armstrong returned from judging Calgary last summer he thought so highly of the Airedale Clipstone First Shot, that he advised Mr. Mutchmor to buy the dog. This he did together with four bitches and they are all good ones. He has now in his kennels thirty-five Fox Terriers and five Airedales, as well as several out on walk. Asked if he found the dog game to pay he answered in one word "Sure," adding that he gets more enjoyment and hard work in looking after these forty dogs than he ever gets out of any other game. He only wishes he had room for more. While living in Ottawa the subject of our sketch was Secretary-Treasurer of the Ottawa Kennel Club for two years and with Messrs. T. A. Armstrong and J. Cromwell Cox took an ac-

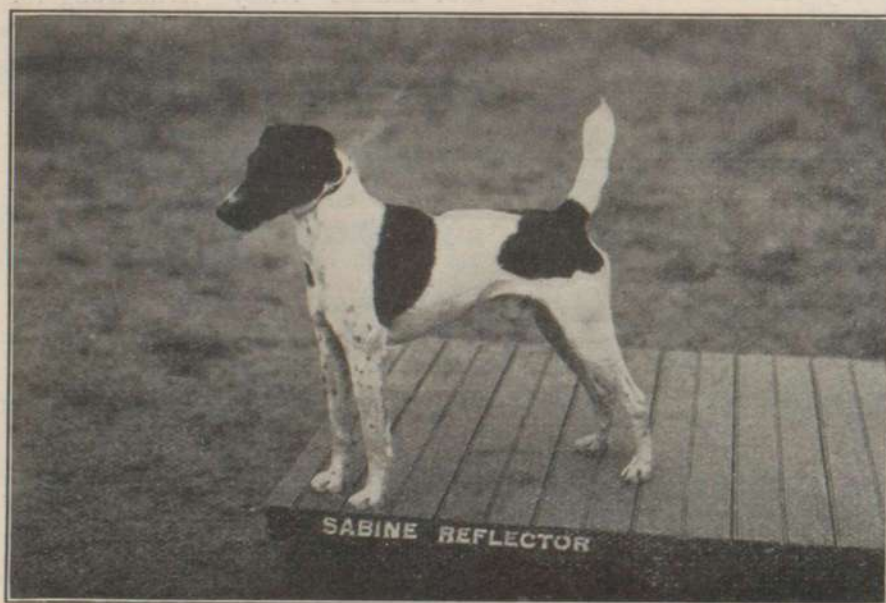

This is the regular annual spring show of the Western Canada Kennel Club and it will now be held under Dominion Kennel Club rules. Mr. T. A. Armstrong, of Ottawa, Ont., who has most acceptably judged in the West before, will take all breeds, and entries close on April 24th. Prize lists and other information may be had from the secretary, Mr. W. A. Love, 495 Newman St., Winnipeg, Man. Mr. Love is no novice at this game, he has

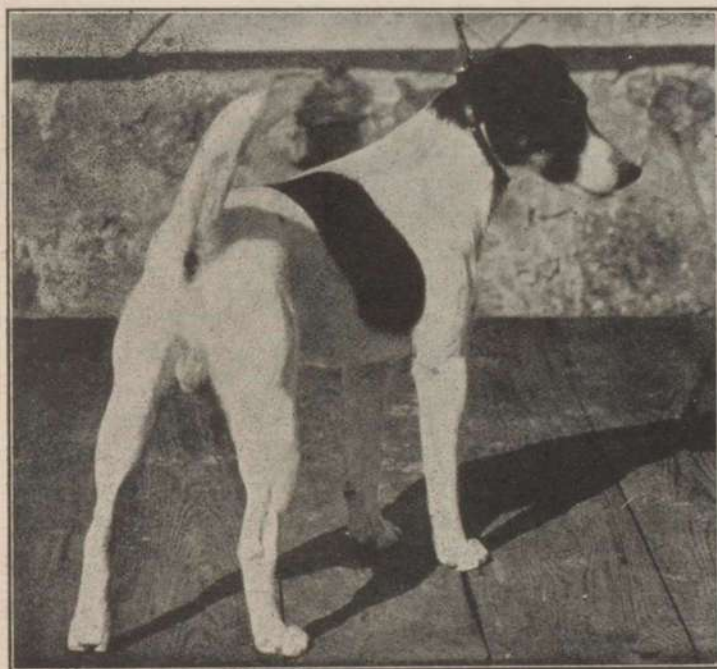

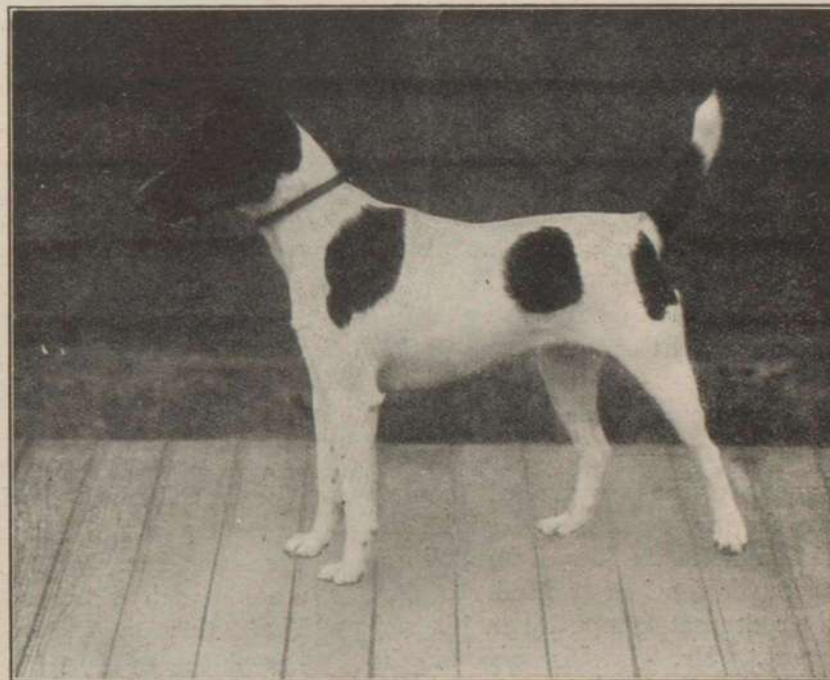
while whelping. "Andy" feels his loss badly as he considered Stella about the best he has ever raised in a long line of good ones.

we print herewith the despatch and correspondence regarding it.

Ottawa, March 1.—The Canada Gazette announces that the order in council of May 21, 1908, respecting animals for the improvement of stock, is cancelled, and the following regulations in regard to the entry of animals for the improvement of stock are prescribed, under the customs laws, the same to be in effect on and from April 1, 1913:

No animal imported for the improvement of stock shall be admitted free of duty unless the owner is a British subject,

resident in the British Empire; if more than one owner, each is a British subject, resident in the British Empire; and there is furnished an import certificate stating that the animal is recorded in a Canadian national record or in a foreign record recognized as reliable by the National Record Committee.

I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 3rd instant respecting the announcement in the Canada Gazette covering new regulations for entry animals, and asking if these regulations apply also to dogs and poultry.

In reply I am to state that the regulations referred to were issued by the Department of Agriculture and do not apply to dogs and poultry.

The Vancouver fanciers were all shocked to receive the sad news which befell Geo. Tinto of Seattle in the loss of Mrs. Tinto. The Vancouver fanciers extend to Mr. Tinto their deepest sympathy in his sad bereavement. Mr. Tinto is one of the oldest Collie fanciers on the Pacific Coast.

We understand that the Dominion Kennel Club has very favorably considered what we said in last issue about the recognition of A.K.C. wins made by Canadian dogs and that likely the matter will be decided in the near future. Of course there must be restrictions and some limitation to the recognition of these wins, but our aim should be to give the good dog all that is coming to him.

We understand that Messrs. Holman, Miller, Sims and Mutchmor, have written the C.K.C. resigning their positions on the Executive. These gentlemen being active in the formation of the Dominion Kennel Club, were prompted by the delicacy of

their positions to take this step, which of course was the only right one. We presume that the resignations need not necessarily be accepted.

We are sorry to learn that the Corona Collie Kennels, Winnipeg, Man., have had the misfortune to lose Corona Caress, one of the best young Collie bitches ever bred in Canada. She accidentally broke her left foreleg and had to be destroyed. However this kennel has still left two grand producers in Corona Daisy and Corona Carnation, so that they are well off still and hope within a few months to have something as good or better.

By the way we note that Corona Kennels' famous stud and prize winning Collie, Ch. Corona Premier, whose very latest wins were made at the Joint Show in Toronto, is again placed at stud at a fee of twenty dollars. Corona Commander, the most famous of Collie breeding, will also soon be placed at stud.

At a recent meeting of the Mount Royal Kennel Club, Montreal, the following lengthy list of officers was elected: Hon. President, Lord Stratheona; Hon. Vice-Presidents, Messrs. James Lindsay, Joseph A. Laurin, John F. Campbell, Joseph Reid, H. L. Thomas; President, Mr. D. W. Ogilvie; First Vice-President, Mr. J. C. Hanna; Second Vice-President, Mr. Edgar Budge; Secretary-Treasurer, Mr. Harold H. Hughes; Executive Committee, Messrs. J. R. Innes, Aylwin Corestine, Fred R. Phelan, Frank E. Stewart, Robt. A. Ross, R. C. Binning, F. W. Cook.

The new President, Mr. Douglas W. Ogilvie, was some years ago president of the Montreal Canine Association, and interested largely in Fox Terriers. The Secretary-Treasurer, Mr. Harold H. Hughes, is connected with Spratts Patent, Montreal. The other names are all those of well known lovers of the dog.

It is proposed to hold a show this spring if suitable arrangements can be made. The Arena is talked of, the week following the horse show.

The initial meeting of the Bench Show Committee of Toronto's big fall Exhibition, the Canadian National, was held on April 3rd, with the chairman of the committee, Mr. W. P. Fraser, presiding. Several changes were made in the prize list. The names of the judges were discussed but no selections have yet been made. Two classes for Canadian bred, viz., one for dogs and one for bitches, were added to Boston Terriers. In the hope of bringing out a larger entry in St. Bernards than has been the case for some years past, both novice and junior were divided by sex.

Great Danes will have two open classes instead of the mixed open of last year. In Scottish Terriers, a breed that is growing rapidly in favor, classes were added for Canadian bred dogs and Canadian bred bitches. The puppy Beagle class was divided, a separate class being given for puppy dogs and one for puppy bitches. The classification for Doberman Pinschers, a breed that has not caught on here, was cut down to open dogs and open bitches.

There is no probability that a new building will be provided for 1913, but the old, wooden erection will be thoroughly disinfected, cleaned and newly painted, and in the words of the poet 1914 is "bright with hope."

We hope to feature the Scottish Terrier in May Canadian Kennel Gazette, publishing the Standard of the breed, engravings of prominent dogs and other appropriate matter that we can get. We would be glad to hear from all breeders of the canny Scot, and to use photos of good dogs at practically the cost to us.

The Sabine Kennels of Orange, Texas, are making a special bid for Canadian trade and offering very special inducements to British Columbia breeders in particular. Dogs in this kennel have won all over America, and not content with this, have also won in England. There are no better Fox Terriers extant, and to introduce the blood more liberally into Canada, most reasonable prices for high quality specimens will be quoted. It is the opinion of this kennel, and we are inclined to agree with them, that as good dogs as can be secured in England, or even better, may be had at one half the cost entailed by purchase and shipping expenses from across the water.

Everything looks good for a Terrier show in Vancouver, May 1, 2, and 3.

Mr. Coats has been engaged to judge all breeds at the fourth show to be held at Tacoma, Wash.

One of the biggest winners in British Columbia Fox Terrierdom is Coat's Ch. Lady O'Rustem. She has won prizes without number, including many specials and winners. She was special for best smooth or wire bitch at Seattle, 1911, special for best Fox Terrier at the same show in fall of 1911, five specials, including one for best smooth Fox Terrier at the Vancouver Fox Terrier Club Show, 1912. At Tacoma, under Mr. George Thomas, she was made best Fox Terrier, 1912. Her latest wins were made at the

BRITISH BREVITIES

Much praise is due to Mr. Kinney for his plucky endeavor to bring the Mastiff into favor again in America, and we are sure breeders on this side will join us in wishing him success in his undertaking. The team should certainly make a sensation when shown. Mr. Kinney is not taking Champion British Monarch and Marquis of Lidgett to America till April, and till then he has placed them at the service of breeders.—Illustrated Kennel News.

The same paper says elsewhere that Miss Brice, an American lady, is taking from the Alderbourne Kennels a very good small red dog back to America with her, but, unfortunately, she is not going to show him.

We mentioned recently "Long, level and nicely-modelled" as the outline description of the Great Dane's head, and now propose to fill in the details. In accordance with the general character of the breed the head must naturally be long, and its length should be properly apportioned to skull and foreface, the distance from the end of the nose to the point between the eyes being greater, but only slightly so, than from that point to the occiput — or, in other words, an imaginary line between the ears, if these organs are properly placed. A great fault is inordinate length of the foreface, and it should not be overlooked either in judging or mating, as it is very hereditary in most breeds where length of head is desired. For instance, the writer, who was for many years much interested in Irish Terriers, recollects a period when the defect was very prevalent in that breed, and dogs so affected were frequently described as having ant-eater heads. For-

tunately, that ugly formation is not common amongst Great Danes.

It is reported that the Irish Terrier, Arklow Mike, has been despatched to a fancier in the United States.

Is there any one who wishes to make any remarks?

Dr. J. Aubrey Ireland: May I ask to what this would apply? Does it refer to dogs shown in local classes?

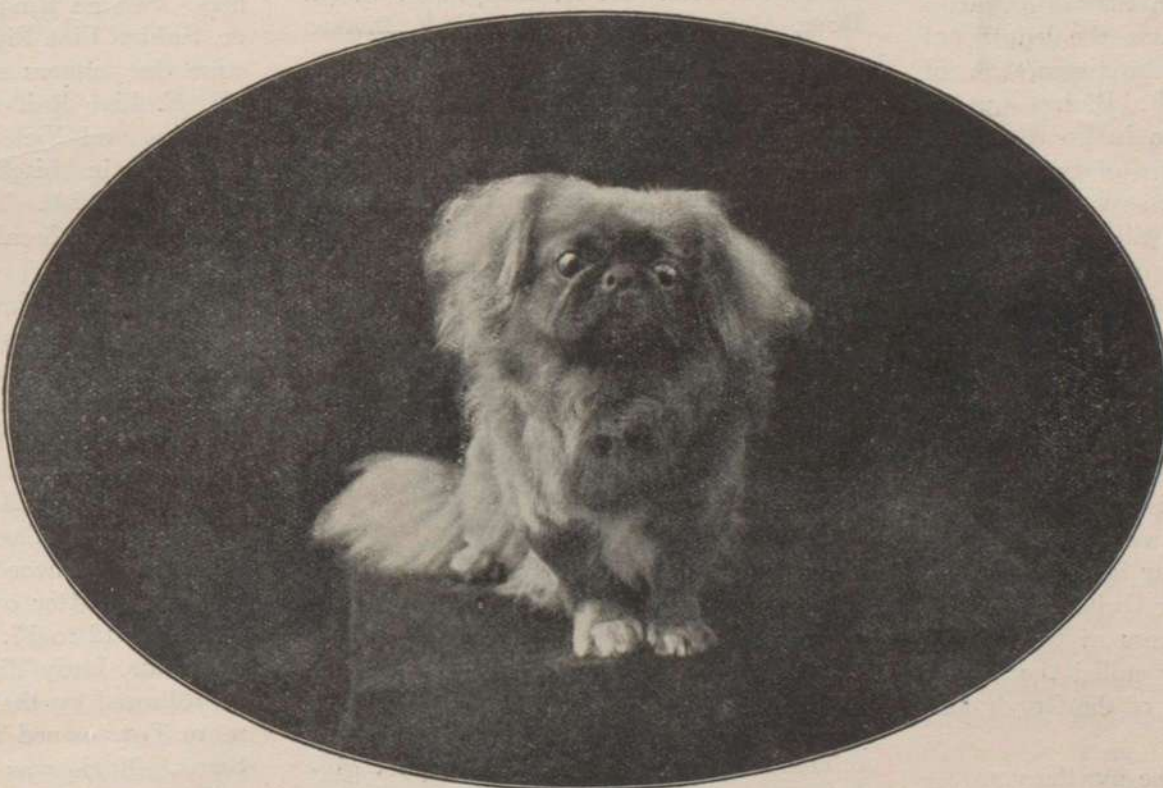
The Chairman: Yes. Am I not right, Mr. Secretary?

ACROSS THE LINE

In an excerpt from Diseases of Dogs, Field and Fancy refers to the age to which dogs live. We appear to have come across an unusual number of cases of extraordinary age in dogs during the past few months and rather curiously they invariably have been close companions of their master or mistress. In more than one instance a merciful putting away would have relieved pain and a worn out system, for as with man, if a dog's years pass beyond the allotted span, he is frequently a trouble to himself and to others.

Following is the clipping we refer to:

The duration of life in the dog varies greatly. Cuvier calculates the length of life of the dog to be seven times that of the period of his growth. Blaine says he knew a mother and son in good health and vigorous at the ages of twenty and twenty-one, and Youatt says the dog has been known to linger on till he reached his two and twentieth year; and occasionally cases are reported of a much greater age, but I have never seen an instance supported by proof.

Some time back a number of correspondents favored me with communications on this subject in "The Bazaar," but only in one case could I feel satisfied that the dog had reached the age of twenty years. That dog was of no particular breed, and was owned by a farmer near Guildford. Dame Juliana Berners, authoress of the "Book of Hunting," commonly called the "Boke of St. Albyn's," writing of the Greyhound says:

"When he is comyn to the nynthe yere
Have him to the tannere
For the best hounde that ever bytchie had
At nynthe yere he is full badde."

Many dogs, however, retain almost pristine vigor until long past that age, but, as a rule, at fourteen or fifteen, if not at an earlier age, a dog becomes offensive in smell, and in many other ways a nuisance.—"Disease of Dogs."

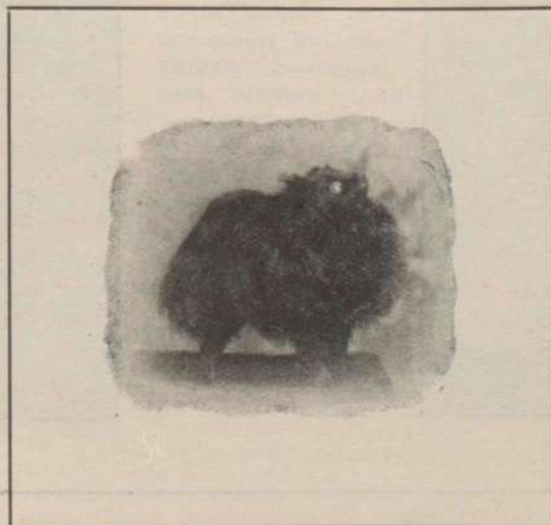
Edited by a Lady

Points of the Fox Terrier

The Standard Recommended by the American Fox Terrier Club

1.—Head.

The skull should be flat and moderately narrow, and gradually decreasing in width to the eyes. Not much "stop" should be apparent, but there should be more dip in the profile between the forehead and top jaw than is seen in the case of a Greyhound.

The cheeks must not be full.

The ears should be V shaped and small, of moderate thickness, and drooping forward close to the cheek, not hanging by the side of the head like a Foxhound.

The jaw, upper and lower, should be strong and muscular; should be of fair punishing strength, but not so in any way to resemble the Greyhound or modern English Terrier. There should not be much falling away below the eyes. This part of the head should, however, be moderately chiselled out, so as not to go down in a straight slope like a wedge.

The nose, toward which the muzzle must gradually taper, should be black.

The eyes and the rims should be dark in color, small and rather deep set, full of fire, life, and intelligence; as nearly as possible circular shape.

The teeth should be as nearly as possible together, i.e., the upper teeth on the outside of the lower teeth.

2.—Neck.

Should be clean and muscular, without throatiness, of fair length, and gradually widening to the shoulders.

3.—Shoulders.

Should be long and sloping, well laid back, fine at the points, and clearly cut at the withers.

Chest.

Deep and not broad.

4.—Back.

Should be short, straight and strong, with no appearance of slackness.

Loin.

Should be very powerful and very slightly arched. The fore ribs should be moderately arched, the back ribs deep, and the dog should be well ribbed up.

5.—Hind Quarters.

Should be strong and muscular, quite

power, together with the greatest length of stride that is compatible with the length of his body. Weight is not a certain criterion of a Terrier's fitness for his work—general shape, size, and contour are the main points; and if a dog can gallop and stay, and follow his fox up a drain, it matters little what his weight is to a pound or so. Though, roughly speaking, it may be said that he should not scale over twenty pounds, in show condition.

WIRE-HAIRED FOX TERRIER.

This variety of the breed should resemble the smooth sort in every respect except the coat, which should be broken. The harder and more wiry the texture of the coat is, the better. On no account should the dog look or feel woolly; and there should be no silky hair about the poll or elsewhere. The coat should not be too long, so as to give the dog a shaggy appearance; but, at the same time, it should show a marked and distinct difference all over from the smooth species.

THE EASTER DOG SHOW

Held Under Joint Auspices in Toronto

Dogs Present, 253—Winners value, 2 Points.

If it were the province of the Canadian Kennel Gazette to "knock" it might easily say that a show of 253 dogs held under the auspices of two big associations and a big specialty club was more or less a failure. In numbers it undoubtedly was as the show simply made its second point on three dogs. Mr. Metcalf, who very efficiently steered the show, told us that there were 265 dogs entered with 253 actually present. Owing to exasperating delays the show had practically no preparation, could not be properly advertised nor was the premium list issued sufficiently early. These handicaps, while unavoidable, must have militated greatly against the success of the show as far as entries are concerned. The Armouries, in which the show was held, is an admirable place for such an exhibition, clean, well lighted, and airy. The public responded nobly, especially on the Good Friday when the attendance must have reached a record. That friction still exists between the two Toronto Clubs there is no gainsaying. It does not help kennel interests that such a condition should remain indefinitely. Why not forget all bickering, strife, innuendo and petty jealousies and get together with the one object of advancing the dog. Let us "play the game."

We are not in love with mixed specials but there is no doubt in the world but that they are a tremendous attraction to the onlookers and at this show as much as ever. Mr. Landon judged the general specials, that for best specimen in the show going to the Bull

Terrier Princess Patricia. A condition of the prize is that competitors must be Canadian bred. It is open only to members of the Ontario Kennel Club. This naturally brought out a number of good ones, the best in their sections. While Patricia is a beautiful specimen and on the Saturday was looking at her best, our vote went to that wonderful Collie, Ch. Corona Premier shown in splendid coat and condition. Still our vote did not count and that of the judge did. For the ladies' prize there was a very keen fight, several very excellent Toys competing as well as a host of others. The award went to the Boston Terrier, Pretty Bessie II., owned and shown by Mrs. F. Jennings.

There was but one St. Bernard. What a come down from the splendid classes judged by Mr. Mason at this show two years ago. Literally "How have the mighty fallen." Mr. Robertson's unnamed Russian Wolfhound is a very fair, big, upstanding dog. Rover was made the best of the half dozen Newfoundlands shown. Mr. Coulter's Prince and Queen had a bloodless victory in the Greyhound classes. The one Pointer was not considered good enough for winners. There really was a wonderful class of Collies and these with the tremendous entry of Bulldogs and the addition of the heavy Airedale entry went largely to make up the show. Mr. Hinds has kindly promised us a special report on Bulldogs. He expressed a high appreciation of the dogs but stated that the bitches were below par. He changed the position of several

dogs with doubtless the best of reasons. In Bull Terrier dogs we had two distinct types. The winner, Pimlico, a good headed one with splendid body, well sprung ribs, Bull Terrier tail, plenty of bone, but loose in one shoulder. Mr. Nordheimer's Victor Lavender, recently imported, was the runner up. A beautifully coated dog that does not want to get any more cheeky. Finer all over but has not the body and ribs of the winner, nice head and good Bull Terrier eye. The Beagle classes were excellent ones. The one Dachshund was just fair. Mr. Ross had a nice class of Irish Terriers before him. There wasn't a bad one in the lot. The "Paddies" are looking up. Avondale Ascot again won in Scotties for Mr. Ellison, greatly improved since we saw him first. A nice bodied and headed dog, that will look better as he improves in coat. Winners was withheld in Bedlington. Flora was the only Skye. Madison Magnet, the Winnipeg dog, won in S. Fox Terriers, with the Ottawa dog, Clapton Varnisher, second. Both are now well known. Outside of these two there was nothing startling with the exception of Sabine Racer, the novice winner, a good type of Terrier. The bitches were moderate. No harm would have been done if Clapton Catharine had won. Timepiece was the best in Wires. A long headed dog that wants a bit more ginger. The classes were very light. Tinker Jim is a pleasing one and a Terrier.

Mr. Hanna's grand brace of Irish Setters were up for exhibition only—a great pair.

COCKER SPANIELS.

Novice dog, any other color than black, brought out a real good one in Red Domino. W. J. Jackson's Durbar captured the limit dogs, black. He is

a fine Cocker with nice expression. In the parti color dogs, Wentworth Billy came out on top, he is a good one.

Open dogs, black, went to Jos. Hill's Farlo. He is a beauty, nice expression, grand neck and shoulders. Open dogs, any other color, went to Wentworth Billy with Sir Bonnie Kelso second. He was too fat and out of condition. In novice bitches, black, Betty Carol got the premier place. She is a good sound bitch. Monafair was sadly out of condition but got second place.

Novice bitches, any other color, went to Crescent Ora. She is another nice one, good behind.

Limit and open bitches went same as novice classes.

The classes as a whole were not the best seen in Toronto. L. Farewell.

THE CLASSES JUDGED BY MR. BOB ROSS.

Bull Terriers. The Bull Terriers, all round, were a mighty fine lot, not a weedy to be seen. The winning dog, Pimlico, is a fine type of heavy weight Bull Terrier, big, strong and with lots of life. He might be a little cleaner in shoulders. Puppy dogs brought out a nice one in T. E. Bilton's Edgewood. The bitches were even better than the dogs, being of exceptionally high order. The puppy bitch, Mrs. Lane's Princess Nordica, went right through to winners. She has a magnificent head and eye and beautiful expression. The second in open bitches was Mr. Carter's well known Dufferin Venus. She is a beautiful bitch, nice body, good spring of ribs but has black touches in eyelids which somewhat spoil the expression. The third bitch, Mrs. Lane's Princess Patricia might have been at the top but for the fact that she was heavily fed just before entering the ring, which made her look blown out and altogether spoiled the

appearance of her body. She is a good one, in fact at another time any one of the three bitches might be at the top. The well known Knock-nachree Leader belonging to Mr. Greene, of Ottawa, was poorly shown, being sadly out of condition.

The Collies were I think the finest lot benched here in recent years. The puppy dog class brought out three good ones. 1st Mr. Metcalfe's Walden Bayard, a fine, big, upstanding sable and white. Second Wm. Fairweather's Bruce, is another good one close up. Limit classes showed us a fine dog in Mr. Roy's Southport Proclamation. He is a good one, big heavy coated, lots of size and substance, might be a little better in mouth and pasterns. 2 another good one here but as thin as a rail and in poor condition. The new face in open classes was Harvey and Milner's Ch. Corona Premier, too well known to need much comment. He is a beauty, fine front and a perfect showman. The bitches were not as high class as the dogs. The puppy bitch being the exception. In fact she was good enough to go through to winners. Reserve winners fails in size. Collies all round were best lot seen in years and many that were not placed might have won in other company. Many good ones lost on coat.

Irish Setters were very few. The puppy dog was a good one and went through to winners. He is a very fine one and should be heard from later. We were glad to see Mr. Hanna's dogs benched but were not in competition. Dalmatians brought out one good one, nice type but might be a little better spot. He looks the part of a real coach dog.

In Scottish Terriers, Avondale Ascott repeated his win at the Terrier Show. He is a good one but it was a close fight with second dog, Argyle Lad.

Irish Terriers were fine, not a bad one in the lot. The winners dog, Marywood Commander is a hard dog to beat and was put down in good condition. The reserve winners, Rory, hardly up to first but has lots of character. Bitches brought an old timer but still good enough for winners in Marywood Biddy. She is a good one but might have changed places with second, Molly Astom, had the latter attempted to show herself. Killarney Belle placed third is another good one, would look better with longer coat.

English Setters were only fair and winners were withheld.

AIREDALES AT THE JOINT SHOW.

The Airedales at the Joint Show were a fine lot although many of the old notables were absent, the youngsters were of a high order.

Puppy dogs brought out a real nice evenly balanced one, in F. Wood's Moorside Rock. He looks like a corner. His worst fault is a little light in eye. The second, S. Bamford's Walnut Crusader is a heavy boned dog, good head but heavy in ear. Third was quite ordinary.

The winner of the novice class, Mr. Harry Clayton's Buster Briar, went through to winners. He is a nice shouldered dog, well built and possesses a magnificent muzzle.

The puppy bitch, E. W. Billinger's Morning Dawn, cleaned up the bitch classes and got winners. She is a nice coated dog, good color, nice face and excellent bone. Harry Clayton's Walnut Croquette is another good one, but wants to develop. Third, Fred Wright's Hawthorne Marvel, is a large bitch, somewhat loose in front.

Limit bitches brought out a new third in Mr. Reg. Pellatt's Cliffside Persister. She is a good colored one, nice eye, a fine brood bitch. The third in Canadian bred was Venus Briar, she is a nice bitch. Two new bitches

were shown in the green classes, getting second and third to Peter Pan, both were but fair.

BOSTONS AT THE TORONTO SHOW.

Puppy dogs, 1 Prince Ranji, almost solid brindle, grubby before the eyes. 2 Bill Shongo, still showing cast in eye, good body and tail. 3 Squantum Billy, but ordinary, novice, 1 Rexonian Kid, who was put up to winners, a nice headed one, good in body and tail, could be improved in front. 2 Booby, cheeky and heavy. Limit, 17-22, the new one was Clifton Yankee Doodle, a nicely marked one, good in body and tail, lacking in foreface. Limit 22-28, 1 Shongo Boy, clean, well set up one. Limit 12-17, went to the well known Totem Boy, the best one in the show if in condition but he was a sick dog at this show. Open dogs brought out Ted Shongo who got second, one of the extreme Terrier kind.

Puppy bitches was won by Lady Ranji, a nice colored one, good head and eye, nice body, should improve greatly. 2 Pattillo's Patricia, good color and body but coarse. Could be improved in front, 2 Dobbins, but fair. Novice, 1 Torontonian Peggy, coarse in shoulder, a good bodied one and nice color. Limit 12-17, 1 Kenilworth Dolly Logan, a nice one, good color and nice body. 3 Pretty Bessie II., lacked condition, a fair one. Limit 17-22, 2 Somerses Nettie, weak in muzzle, good body. Open, 1 Bright Eyes IV., the winner, well known now, a good one, clean head, good eye, well coupled up back, fails in stifle. Limit 22-28, Sullivan's Lady, a very fair, heavy, weak in hindquarters and muzzle. 2 Squantum Saucy, but fair. H.B.D. Jr.

BULLDOGS AT THE TORONTO JOINT SHOW.

Special Report by the Judge.

Puppy dogs. 1st Duke of Marlborough, a well developed white with no glaring faults except a carelessly carried ear. 2nd, Tuanbrook Tufel, a fair pup with a disagreeable underjaw. 3rd, Athos of York, a real Bulldog that was set back for having two badly buttoned ears. If this dog's ears come right, I expect him to eventually become one of the best Bulldogs in Canada. Reserve, Royal Diamond, a pup I had heard so much about that I supposed of course he would be placed first but in looking him over was unable to see anything good back of his eyes. He is very short in face and has a wonderful underjaw as do all of Wilson's dogs.

Novice dogs. 1st, Mahomet III., a big, massive, fawn, with black mask. He has nice ears in shape and they are thin and small for such a large dog, but one of them was buttoned at times. He has a small, well tapered tail, very long and held at an angle of about forty-five degrees above the level except when he is in repose. I compared this dog very carefully with Cheetham Squire when the two were in the ring together as I wished to see how the latter would look against a big dog and Mahomet III. beats every dog in the show in massiveness, bone, front and shoulders, skull and spring of ribs. Besides this he has a wonderful underjaw and as nice a shaped body as one could wish to see although it is a little long. He is low to the ground and absolutely sound. It is very rare to see a dog of this size cut up in loin so nicely and be so narrow behind.

The rest of the class was poor. Limit under 45 lbs. 1st, Homewood Jumbo, a real Bulldog that no one could overlook, with true pear shaped body, low and cobby. His faults are a very disagreeable underjaw, weak left leg (at the ankle) and the fact that his front is unsound except when placed. 2nd, Imperialist is a brindle,

smooth in every way with hardly a thing lacking except massiveness. He is one of those dogs that have to be looked over carefully to be appreciated. 3rd, Golden Star, a nice little red who is more cobby and lower than Imperialist but loses in ribs, size and stamina.

Limit 45 lbs. and over, 1st, Mahomet III. 2nd, Fairstone Rex, something on the plan of Imperialist if I remember right. 3rd, Woodcote Merry Boy, a nice little dog that appeared to have a wry neck. He has a nice shaped body, good bone and no shoulders. I did not examine him carefully as I could not convince myself that he did not have a wry neck. He was not placed back for having a wry face as although several told me after the judging that he had a twisted face, I could not see it.

Open dogs, 45 lbs. and over. 1st, Cheetham Squire, scores over Mahomet III. in shortness of face, tail carriage and expression, also in general appearance and ear carriage. Mahomet III. is better in skull, body, bone, front, shoulders, spring of ribs, lowness to ground. Both of these dogs are too long in body. 2nd Mahomet III. 3rd, Fairstone Rex. 4th, Woodcote Merry Boy.

Open under 45 lbs. 1st, Argo, a wonderfully even little dog with hardly a thing wrong about him except his eyes which look rather like a Pug's, and his underjaw which is too straight. He could have more wrinkle. 2nd, Homewood Jumbo who will give Argo all he wants if he gets right in his left pastern. Both need new underjaws, but both will have to be reckoned with at any show. 3rd, Imperialist. Reserve, Golden Star.

Winners went to Argo who beats Cheetham Squire in all body properties, length of skull, front, shoulders, ears, length of upper lip (without which, no dog can have a perfect lay-back). There was not much difference in bone when size of dogs was considered. Squire is better in general appearance when viewed in front, eyes, shortness of face and underjaw. Squire was shown with a straight left leg, but in going over the two dogs carefully could not see that this was due to anything except incorrect placing.

The bitches were probably the smallest sized bunch of Bulldogs ever benched in America and were practically all out of condition in coat, thin and most of them appeared very weak; several of them hardly able to walk. I doubt whether there were four in the show that weighed over thirty-three pounds and only three of them looked able to raise a pup from a fair sized dog. I finally gave winners to the best of these three which was sound. However it looks as if a mistake was made in not withholding winners as any Canadian dog man would feel badly if any Bull bitch in this show was taken to the United States and exhibited as a champion. I happen to know that there are good bitches in Canada, but guess they were all home raising puppies.

Puppy bitches, one poor specimen. Novice bitches, 1st, Twanbrook Zulu Maid, a fair little bitch that was later placed down for weakness. Not much else in class.

Limit, under 40 lbs. 1st, Little Diamond. A massive bitch of about 30 lbs., lacking in ribs. Good head, roach and nice body when taking a side view. 2nd, Worsley Peggie, a good headed bitch of about the same size but very thin and out of condition. 3rd, Duchess Ivel. A wonderful bodied bitch that sulked all the time; she was down faced. 4th, the novice bitch.

Heavyweight bitches, limit and open, were the same in each class, three entries. 1st Merry Widow, had a nice shaped body, good skull, small well placed ears and was one of the few bitches in the show in good condition.

Canadian Kennel Club Stud Book Now Recognized by the U. S. Department of Agriculture

It is now a matter of history that for years the Canadian Kennel Club contended that its Stud Book was entitled to recognition by the United States as is that of the Kennel Club, England. Time after time the previous Secretary of the C.K.C. brought the matter up before the U. S. authorities and also the A.K.C. The latter organization, some three years ago, was kind enough to recommend the recognition of the C.K.C. Stud Book and to this is no doubt due the information contained in a despatch that reached us while in Montreal last month. We immediately wrote Mr. A. P. Vredenburg, the Secretary of the A.K.C., asking him if he could verify the truth of the despatch, but he was unaware of the change and advised us to write Washington direct. This we did and the following correspondence explains the present status of the C.K.C. Stud Book.

This should be but a step to further recognition, "reciprocity" if you will, between kennel interests in Canada and the United States.

Was it the correspondence we had some two or three years ago, as I know the A. K. C. favorably reported on the matter as you informed me when I saw you in New York, at least this is my recollection of it. Just in what position will this regulation, if report be correct, put the entry of dogs registered in the C. K. C. Stud Book when entering the U. S.? I hope I am not giving you too much trouble but I, of course, look on your office as the regular clearing house for all such matters.

If the news is true I have no knowledge of what influence was used to bring it about. I do know that several years ago I recommended the recognition of your book to the Government and it was turned down.

Whether the same regulation that governs importation from England will apply to Canada I cannot say. The latest circular from the Department of Agriculture designates the English Stud Book, Harriers and Beagles, the Foxhound, the Swiss and the Belgian, so that dogs sent from either of these countries must have been registered in the Stud Book of that country, and the registry receipt together with an export certified pedigree must be filed with the Department at Washington to obtain free entry.

You will have to apply to the Department in Washington for the information which you are in search of.

Sir:—In reply to your letter of the 31st ultimo, I beg to advise that the Canadian Kennel Club has been recognized by this Department, such recognition becoming effective on and after the 15th ultimo. I am enclosing a copy of B. A. I. Order 186 and a copy of Amendment 3 thereto, regarding the recognition of the Canadian Kennel Club. This means that when the three generation certificate of the Canadian Kennel Club, certified by the Secretary of that Club, is submitted to this Bureau, with the other papers required under the regulations of B. A. I. Order 186, the dog covered by that certificate will be eligible to this Bureau's certificate of pure breeding, when imported into this country. Our certificates, however, are not issued until after such animals are imported and in this connection, I wish to call your attention to section three on page two of the Order.

Regulation 2, section 4, paragraph 2 of the regulations governing the certification of recognized breeds and pure-bred animals, issued under date of January 18, 1912, effective on and after February 1, 1912, and identified as B. A. I. Order 186, is hereby further amended so as to include and recognize for the purposes enumerated thereunder all of the breeds of dogs registered in the Stud Book published by the Canadian Kennel Club, Dr. Alfred Boulton, Secretary, 111½ Jarvis Street, Toronto, Canada.

THE REGULATIONS OF ENTRY.

(B. A. I. Order 186.)

Regulations Governing the Certification of Recognized Breeds and Pure-bred Animals.

U. S. Department of Agriculture,
Office of the Secretary.

Under authority of paragraph 492 of the act of Congress, approved August 5, 1909, entitled "An act to provide revenue, equalize duties, and encourage the industries of the United States, and for other purposes" (36 Stat., 11), the following regulations are issued governing the certification of recognized breeds and purebred animals imported into the United States for breeding purposes. For purposes of identification these regulations are designated as B. A. I. Order 186, and supersede all previous regulations on the same subject. They shall become and be effective on and after February 1, 1912.

Done at Washington this 18th day of January, one thousand nine hundred and twelve.

Regulation 1.—Certification of Pure-bred Animals.

Section 1. Bureau of Animal Industry to issue certificates.—The Bureau of Animal Industry of the Department of Agriculture is hereby authorized to issue certificates of pure breeding under the provisions of this order.

Section 2. How to obtain certificates.—In order to obtain such certificates of pure breeding, importers shall conform to the following procedure:

Paragraph 1. Application for certificates.—An application for certificates shall be made to the Bureau of Animal Industry on forms furnished or approved by the department, showing the number of animals imported or to be imported, the breed and sex, the port of shipment, the port of entry into the United States, the name of vessel by which shipped, and the probable date of arrival. This application may be signed either by the owner, the importer, or the agent, stating the name and address (in the United States) of the owner of the animal or animals.

Paragraph 2. Certificates of pedigree.—Certificates of registration and pedigree for said animal or animals, issued by the custodian of one of the books of record given in Regulation 2, section 4, of this order, shall be furnished to the Bureau of Animal Industry with the application.

Paragraph 3. Vendor's certificates.—A certificate from the seller or his agent shall be furnished to the Bureau of Animal Industry with the application, giving the name and registry number of each animal sold to the importer, the date of sale, the place of purchase, and the name and address

(in the United States) of the purchaser. Vendor's certificates furnished by the custodians of foreign books of record, containing the above information, may be used; otherwise, the form of vendor's certificate furnished or approved by this department must be used.

Section 3. Applications will be given consideration by the department in the order in which they are received. When the application and accompanying papers are satisfactory, certificates to that effect will be issued and forwarded, along with the foreign certificates, to the collector of customs at the port of entry. However, the certificates of pure breeding of the Bureau of Animal Industry will not be issued until the descriptions of the animals, taken by an inspector of the Bureau of Animal Industry at the port of entry, are received at the department in Washington. The department will request customs officers to return the foreign certificates to the importer, or his agent, as soon as they have served the purpose of the Treasury Department. All papers for animals which do not meet the requirements of this order will be retained or returned, in the discretion of the department.

Section 4. Eligibility of animals.—Where the provisions of this order have been otherwise complied with, animals will be certified as purebred which have been fully registered in good faith in one of the books of record for one of the recognized breeds given in Regulation 2, section 4, of this order, except those which have been registered on inspection.

Regulation 2.—Certification of Recognized Breeds.

Section 1. Application for certification.—Before an additional breed to those shown in section 4 of this regulation shall be added to this order, the custodian of its book of record shall submit to the department a complete set of the published volumes of such book of record to date of making application, together with all rules in force on said date affecting the registration of animals in said book of record. The department will consider the case on its merits and use such information as may be available to determine whether the breed is a recognized breed and whether the animals registered in the book of record are purebred.

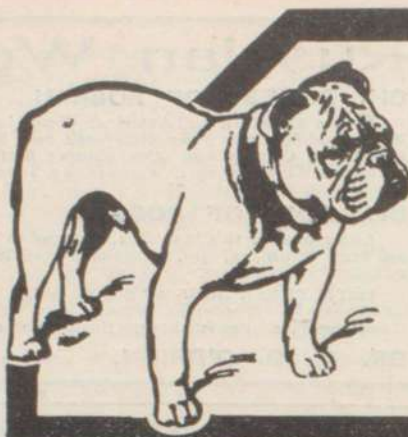
