

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THE BULL TERRIER STANDARD

General appearance is that of a symmetrical animal, an embodiment of agility, grace, strength and determination, and in whose formation there should be an entire absence of exaggeration of any kind.

Head should be long, but type should not be sacrificed to length. Skull flat and

widest at the ears. Viewed from above it should taper gradually and merge into the muzzle without break in the line. There should be a slight indentation down the middle but without "stop" and without noticeable brow. Foreface filled right up to the eyes, and should have a perceptible "downness." Eyes very small, black, set close together and obliquely. They should be triangular. Muzzle wide and tapering, but without such taper as to make the nose appear pinched or snipey. Nose broad, wholly black and with wide open nostrils. Under jaw strong and well defined. Lips should fit tightly and evenly and should not run too far back. There must be an entire absence of "lippiness." Teeth sound, strong, clean, regular and meeting evenly. Any deviation, such as "undershot" or "overshot," is a bad fault. Ears when standing erect should

not cause conspicuous wrinkling of the skin on the head. Ears should be cropped, carried erectly and of moderate length. It is important that there be as little cheek as possible; but where it is present it should not be bunchy nor prominent, but should merge gradually into the lines of the muzzle and neck.

Neck, slightly arched, neither long nor

short, tapering from shoulders to head and free from looseness of skin.

Shoulders, strong and muscular, but without any appearance of heaviness or 'loading.' Shoulder blades wide, flat and sloping well back.

Back, short, strong and muscular. Should be higher at withers than hips. from front to back ribs, and broad as viewed facing the dog.

Tail, straight, set on low, thick where it joins the body and tapering to a fine point. Should not reach below the hocks, nor be carried above the level of the back.

Legs should be big boned. Forelegs straight with strong and upright pas-

terns, but without the stiltiness of the Fox Terrier. Thighs, thick and wide; upper thighs, long, with muscle well developed, but without 'loading." Hocks well let down. Hind legs should turn neither in nor out as viewed from behind and carried back. Hind pasterns, short and upright.

Feet, well knuckled. Toes, short, well arched and close together; the middle toes slightly longer than outside toes. Pads thick and tough. Nails, short and strong.

Coat, dense, short, flat, stiff to the touch and with fine gloss.

Gait, springy and swinging, without roll or pace.


Color, white. Markings are a bad fault.

Weight, from 12 to 60 pounds inclusive.

Faults, light bone; legginess; round eyes; badly placed eyes; light eyes; butterfly nose; pronounced cheekiness; dished faced; lippiness; throatiness; teeth


not meeting evenly; long or slack back; long, thick or "gay" tail; loose shoulders; crooked elbows; loaded shoulders or thighs; weak pasterns; big feet; splay feet; toes turning in or out; soft coat; narrow chest; ewe neck; markings.

Disqualifications, wall-eye; pig-jaw; tail carried over the back; wholly flesh-colored nose.

There should be no slackness nor falling away back of the withers, and back should be only slightly arched at loin, with loins well developed and flanks only slightly tucked. Ribs well sprung, with no falling away back of the shoulder. Ribs close together and intercostal muscles well developed; back ribs deep. Chest deep from withers to brisket and wide



NOTES AND COMMENTS



Canadian Kennel Club Stud Book, Vol. XVI. for the year ending August 31st, 1912, is ready and has been mailed to all members of that year. In view of the change in the address of Secretary's office, it is possible that a few may have been missed. If this should catch the eye of any who did not receive a copy and who are entitled to one of this number, we should be glad if they would advise us so that the volume may be forwarded. It is, of course, distinctly understood that Vol. XVI. goes only to those members whose fees have been paid for the year ending August 31st, 1912.

Field and Fancy of June 28th reprints the paragraph appearing in last Gazette referring to Pacific Coast Clubs, heading it "A Timely Suggestion," and crediting the item from "the C.K.C. Gazette." We appreciate the acknowledgment but must ask our weekly cotem to kill the second "C."

The same paper reports the sale of the famous Bull Terrier bitch Ch. Glenmere Channel Queen to Mr. R. H. Elliott of Ottawa, Ont.

"In Ch. Glenmere Channel Queen Mr. Elliott has secured what is considered by many to be the best Bull Terrier of either sex on this side of the Atlantic and together with his noted dog, Ch. Haymarket Blazer, they should make an unbeatable brace. Mr. Goelet was flooded with answers to the advertisement in Field and Fancy offering Channel Queen for sale, but Mr. Elliott beat out all others by telegraphing immediately and the price paid was one of the largest ever commanded by one of the breed. Mr. Elliott has bred a host of good ones, but never has he owned a bitch of quite the excellence of his recent purchase, and it is quite likely that with her he should bring out a real flyer ere long. It will be remembered that Mr. Elliott officiated as judge at the last Westminster show and gave entire satisfaction."

The Vancouver Exhibition Association Dog Show will open on September 1st and close on September 3rd. Canadian Kennel Club rules will govern and the entries close on August 18th. Over five hundred dollars are offered in cash and specials and the classification is of the usual extended kind, every breed being catered to. Amongst the many specials are \$10 to the handler bringing the largest number of dogs from Victoria, the same from East of Lytton, same from Washington, same from Oregon, \$15 under same condition from Montana or Idaho, and \$25, same conditions from California. The minimum number of dogs in each case is ten. From this it is evident that Vancouver intends to make the show of an international nature. There are also a number of other cash prizes, sweepstakes, etc. The entry fee is \$2.00 for the first entry of each dog and \$1.00 additional for each additional entry of the same dog. Judging will begin promptly at 2 p.m. of the opening day, but the judges' names have not been supplied us. A cash prize of \$3.00 will be paid the winner in each winners class but the proviso that where four or more dogs compete, \$2.00 will be paid to reserve winner, is not in accordance with C.K.C. rules, and we presume that the premium list or schedule has not passed through the C.K.C. Secretary's office. There are one or two other minor items that may as well be pointed out. The first is that the premium list, or schedule, is not of the uniform size called for, 6 by 9 inches. Old copy has unfortunately been used in the publishing of the list and the headquarters of the C.K.C. are given as at the old address, and the Gazette mentioned instead of the new official organ. For the benefit of those into whose hands the list may fall we will again state that the address of the Club is 1111 Jarvis St., and Secretary-Treasurer's name Dr. Alfred Boultbee.

The supervising director of the show at Vancouver is Mr. E. G. Rolston.

Mr. J. C. Hull, Niagara Falls South, Ont., sends us the following clipping from the Niagara Falls Record of June 3rd and asks us if we have any information that would be helpful to him in this case. The contention is not a new one but occurs periodically and as far as we know there is no absolute ruling as to the age

at which a dog is a dog for licensing purposes. The clipping is as follows:

WHEN IS A DOG NOT A DOG?

"An interesting case came before Magistrate Fraser this morning when James Hull, Niagara Falls South, appeared before His Worship in answer to a summons issued against him by the police for nonpayment of dog tax. The dog in question is only 21 months old, and the defense contended that the word "'dog' is not applicable until the puppy is at least nine months old. It was further contended that the double tax on female dogs was intended to cover the litter. Attorney Griffiths argued that to prove this was the case, it was only necessary to suppose that a litter of ten puppies, for instance, would subject the owner to dog taxes from between \$20 and \$40 depending upon the number of male and female puppies. Out of this number a large proportion, or all might die within two or three weeks, and still if all dogs are liable, a man might be forced to pay taxes in cases like the above. Lawyer Griffiths for the defense claimed there must be many arguments regarding the point and would like to have time to look them up. The magistrate intimated that in case he felt that he would have to find against the defendant he thought the City Council should change the By-Law and place an age limit. The matter was adjourned until Tuesday week."

For the benefit of others who may be placed in somewhat the same position as Mr. Hull, we print our reply dated June 10th, which is as follows:

'I enclose you By-Law No. 27 governing licensing of dogs in the city of Toronto. I do not know any place more strict than this city. You will find that no license is required for any dog until he is six months old."

The Toronto City By-Law is No. 27, and provides for the licensing and registering of dogs. The By-Law was passed on April 23, 1898. It will, perhaps, be as well to give in this connection, the entire By-law, as there may be other points arise which may be governed by paragraphs other than No. 3, as is the case in this instance. The following is the By-Law:

The Board of Commissioners of Police for the City of Toronto enacts as follows:

T.

By-law No. 24 is hereby repealed.

П.

In this By-law the word "dog" shall in clude "bitch" unless a contrary intention appears.

III.

The owner, possessor or harborer of every dog shall, annually, on or before the 1st day of May in each year, or so soon thereafter as such dog shall attain the age of six months, cause the same to be registered, numbered, described, and licensed in the office of the Chief Constable, and shall cause the dog to wear around its neck a collar, to which collar shall be attached a metallic plate having raised, cast, or stamped thereon the letters C.L.P. (meaning City License Paid), and the figures indicating the year for which the said license has been paid, and a number corresponding with the number under which the said dog is registered; and every such owner, possessor, or harborer, shall pay for such license, metallic plate, and registration, for each dog the sum of two dollars, for each bitch the sum of five dollars; and every license shall expire on the 30th day of April next after the said first day of May.

IV.

No license shall be required for any dog until it is six months old.

V.

No person shall allow his dog to run at large in the City. For the purposes of this By-law, a dog shall be deemed to be running at large when found in a street or other public place, and not under the control of any person.

VI.

Any dog running at large contrary to the provisions of this By-law may be captured, killed, or otherwise disposed of by such person as may be duly authorized so to do.

VII.

It shall be the duty of the Chief Constable to appoint persons to capture dogs. under the provisions of this By-law, and dogs so captured shall be impounded in one of the pounds established by City Bylaw, and be left in charge of the Pound Keeper appointed by City By-law for such pound. It shall be the duty of the Pound Keepers to keep a record of all dogs impounded and how the same are disposed of, and to make a monthly return to the City Treasurer and to the Police Commissioners showing the amount of moneys collected and the proceeds of the sale of dogs, and any other information which may be required by the Police Commissioners or the City Council from time to

time respecting the working of this Bylaw.

VIII.

Any Police Constable, or any other person authorized by the Chief Constable, may capture any dog found running at large contrary to the provisions of this By-law, and may deliver such dog to the keeper of any dog pound, who shall impound the same, subject to the right of the owner or possessor to redeem the same within forty-eight hours from the time of capture by paying for the use of the City two dollars for each dog or bitch, and also registering and procuring a license for such dog or bitch under section 3 of this By-law, in case such license has not been previously obtained. All dogs impounded under this By-law, if not redeemed within three days after such impounding, may be sold at the price mentioned herein for redemption or at such higher price as the Chief Constable may think proper. All dogs not so redeemed or sold shall, after five clear days from such impounding, be killed in such manner as this Board may approve.

IX.

No person shall remove a collar or plate from a licensed dog.

X.

No owner of any dog shall suffer or permit such dog to attack any person on a street or other public place, or do any damage whatsoever, and if any complaint thereof is made to the Police Magistrate, or Justice of the Peace acting in his absence, such Police Magistrate, or Justice of the Peace, may, if satisfied that such complaint is substantiated, order such owner to deliver such dog over to the Police at the nearest Police Station of the City in order that it may be destroyed, and if such owner or person shall refuse or neglect to deliver such dog over to the Police within twenty-four hours thereafter, he or she shall be liable to the penalties of this By-law.

XI.

Any dog known to be rabid shall be immediately destroyed.

XII.

No person shall register a bitch as a male dog.

XIII.

Any person convicted of a breach of any of the provisions of this By-law shall forfeit and pay, at the discretion of the convicting Magistrate, a penalty not exceeding the sum of fifty dollars for each offence, exclusive of costs; and in default of payment of the said penalty and costs forthwith, the said penalty and costs, or costs only, may be levied by distress and sale of the goods and chattels of the offender; and in case of there being no

distress found out of which such penalty can be levied, the convicting Magistrate may commit the offender to the Common Gaol of the City of Toronto, with or without hard labor, for any period not exceeding six calendar months, unless the said penalty and costs are sooner paid.

We have not heard the outcome of the case and hope Mr. Hull will let us know the result.

A line from Dr. C. Y. Ford, who was in Rome, reached us a day late for last issue. He was then on his way to Vienna and Berlin and intended to sail for Quebec, from England on June 27th, to fulfil his judging engagement at Winnipeg.

Mr. Constant Van Camp, Montreal, proprietor of the Belgian Kennels of Griffon Bruxellois, was to leave for Belgium about the 1st of July and hopes on his return to bring with him a number of his bright little favorites and we trust that with this lot he may have better luck than has followed him for the past year.

It is "time for a change" for his last, and best, bitch, Griffon Brabancon, was stolen from his yard on May 23rd, just prior to the Montreal show. She certainly would have won at this show and the points attained there would have made her a champion as she already had nine points to her credit.

Mr. W. M. Sheehan of Dalhousie, N.B., is getting together a kennel of Bloodhounds, and as a start has bought from Mr. M. J. Kennedy, Fredonia, Kansas, the bitch Sheehan's Queen, A.K.C. 170,658. He also ordered two other bitches from the States, and we hope he gets good ones.

Mr. Arthur Ellison, Avondale Kennels, Mount Hamilton, Ont., invites those interested in the formation of a Scottish Terrier Club for Canada to write him at once. He has been guaranteed sufficient help to make the club a success and he thinks the time is ripe for our old friend "Scottie" to have a club of his own, to keep pushing his interests in the Dominion. We of course agree with Mr. Ellison and will be happy to assist him in any way we can towards the formation of the proposed club.

The first intimation we had of the death of Mr. P. G. Keyes, of Ottawa, came through his, and our, friend, Mr. Geo. B. Sweetnam, Toronto. Mr. Sweetnam is in the civil service and sent us a clipping from the Civilian, announcing the sad event. Mr. Sweetnam writes:

"Very many thanks for the gem of a

Bloodhound, received some time ago. The picture is now being framed, and will be an acquisition to my collection. The attached clipping is taken from the Civilian, of Ottawa, June number, and evidently refers to that eminent Cocker judge, and exhibitor, who was a much respected member of the C.K.C. Executive, and who was beloved by all dog fanciers, for his sterling qualities.

The clipping from the Civilian reads as follows:

"Perley George Keyes, late Secretary of the Department of the Interior, died at his home in Ottawa on May 27th. Mr. Keyes was born in Palmyra, Ont., in 1853, entered the civil service in 1878 and became secretary of the Department of the Interior in 1900. Last December he was forced by ill-health to retire from active service. He leaves a son and two daughters."

We can look back now with a great deal of pleasure, tempered by sadness, to the afternoon and evening that we were able to spend with P. G. Keyes in Ottawa, last September. The bond of friendship between us had always been a very binding one and he was one of a number of high grade men who helped put the C.K.C. on its feet and was not afraid to both write and speak for the Club's benefit at the right time. An extremely sensitive man, always of quiet and gentlemanly disposition, and deportment, he was one of a class that lent lustre to the C.K.C. and to the sport-and we hope it remains a sport-of exhibiting and breeding dogs. A man of many parts, highly educated, his interests were not centred in dogs alone. His tastes were aesthetic and he made his mark as an amateur grower and exhibitor of fruit and flowers. At one time he owned about the best stud of Magpie pigeons in Canada, frequently winning high honors with them as he did with several breeds of fowls also. The record of the Rideau Kennels' Cocker Spaniels and Fox Terriers is now history.

In conversing with him in September he gave us an outline of his future plans which included the development of a somewhat extensive country place, but alas! he did not live to carry them out. Never in very robust health the loss of his dear wife a few years ago was a sad blow to him and one from which he never entirely recovered. The late Mrs. Keyes was one of those inestimable women whose home was her kingdom and who combined the attributes of both wife and mother. To her husband she extended

that motherly care that a man of his disposition and constitution needed. We feel the severance of this link with the past very deeply. At one time we were greatly indebted to him for counsel and advice which was freely and unhesitatingly given, Our regret is that the exigencies of an extremely busy life prevented us from seeing as much of him during the past few years as we should have desired. To his daughters and son, whom we have known from childhood, we express our sincere sympathy and more than that, appreciation of one whom more than his family will miss.

Another old friend who has passed away and one for whom Mr. James Mortimer had always a kind enquiry, on his many visits to Canada, is Jos. Johnston, Chief Inspector of the Toronto License Department, who died in Toronto on June 20th in his 71st year. The late Inspector Johnston had a fancy for the Beagle and looked for one who could do more than toddle into the show ring, as he used them in his numerous brief hunting trips. He was an old exhibitor at the Industrial Exhibition, now the Canadian National, Dog Show, and a rather conspicuous figure in the ring in his Inspector's uniform. A good honest old type and this is the kind he wanted in his Beagles.

He had been away from the office for only three weeks. Mr. Johnston was chief constable of the old town of Yorkville, and, when the city annexed the smaller place, Mr. Johnson joined the Toronto police force. He became sergeant, and then inspector. Five years ago he was appointed licence inspector.

The years certainly do take away old friends from us and we have yet to announce the passing away of one more who was conspicuous in the canine world. We refer to Dr. John P. Bond, V.S., Toronto, whose recent demise is regretted by a large circle of dog lovers.

Mr. Mason's, Boston, Sparkling Jewel, was out again at Lancaster, Pa., and cleaned up the whole outfit as usual. She beat a lot of good ones. The judge was William M. Evans, Philadelphia, Pa.

Mr. Chas. H. Mason recently sent his crack brood bitch, Lady Bettina II. to Mr. Farewell's Pony Oho, a long and risky trip at this hot season. Bettina II. has twice won the brood bitch cup at W.K.C. for best Coeler with two of her produce, and she herself won first New York, W. K. C., 1912. Black Baronet, Black Bet-

tina, Black Billy, Princeton and La Rouge are all out of her and each won first at the W.K.C. shows.

Mr. Mason also sent Black Bettina to Count Obo at the same time.

Mr. W. W. Hunter, of Regina, and formerly of Toronto, on a recent visit to the Whitecote Kennels, Humboldt, Sask., was so taken with a White Noelson puppy that he had to have him. The puppy is out of a Bloomsbury Czar bitch.

Ottawa, as usual, is holding a show in September in connection with the Central Canada Exhibition. Mr. Alf. Belmont will judge all breeds. The building in which the dog show is held is to be greatly enlarged. This will give more room for the judging ring, something that was badly needed. The exercising ring too has been greatly improved.

In addition to the usual prizes there is a great number of specials of various kinds including medals from the Bulldog Club of New South Wales. The Airedale Club of England is also supporting Ottawa as are most of the specialty clubs in the United States. Ottawa has maintained its annual show under great handicaps but 1913 will see the dawn of better things. Mr. Geo. W. Tyrrell still holds down his job as secretary.

An Ottawa Bull Terrier Knoch-na-Cree Leader, owned by Mr. Ainslie W. Greene, was successful in winning the special for best Bull Terrier at Calgary.

Mr. K. Greene, Ottawa, has purchased from the redoubtable "Bob" Ross the Scottish Terrier bitch Drumclamph Tinker that we hope does well for her new owner and proves a capital investment.

Calgary had three hundred and fourteen dogs making the show a five pointer. Mr. Swann took up twenty dogs bringing back no less than eleven winners prizes. The express charges on the car, Toronto to Calgary and return amounted to one hundred and eighty. The Bulldog, Homewood Jumbo, was 'best in show.'

Winnipeg has close to five hundred dogs with no less than forty-five Airedales. Dr. Ford was unable to keep his engagement and Dr. Clayton of Chicago takes his place. Mrs. Gammon and Mr. Jackson of Hamilton are showing Cockers and Messrs. Stuart, of Montreal, "Saints." This is written some days before the opening of the show. We hope to get into this issue a fairly full report.



BRITISH BREVITIES



The Kennel Club, England, by a recent enactment, has in a measure, settled the trimming question. It is practically impossible to lay down any hard and fast rule that will cover all cases. Each case must even now be judged on its individual merits and we are wondering where the exhibitors of such Terrier breeds as Airedales, Irish and Wire Fox stand.

This is the letter from the K. C. Secretary apprising the kennel press of the change:

REGULATIONS FOR THE PREPARA-TION OF DOGS FOR EXHIBITION.

I beg to inform you that the Regulations as to the Preparation of Dogs for Exhibition, Appendix II. of the Kennel Club Rules, have been amended as follows:—

Regulations 4 and 5 to be deleted, and the following new Regulation to be inserted:

That any part of a dog's coat or hair has been cut, clipped, singed, or rasped down by any substance, or that the new or fast coat has been removed by any means except in the following breeds*:

Bedlington Terriers.

Collies.

Pomeranians and Pomeranians (Miniature.)

Poodles.

Yorkshire Terriers.

*A few other breeds are still under consideration.

The note following old Regulation 5 has been amended to read as follows:—

The old or shedding coat and loose hairs may be removed in all breeds.

THE TRIMMING QUESTION.

THE KENNEL CLUB'S DECISION.

In our correspondence columns will be found an official announcement from Mr. Jaquet to the effect that the Committee of the Kennel Club, at its meeting on Tuesday last, settled the momentous subject of "Trimming," which has so agitated the kennel world now for some time.

From this important pronouncement it will be seen that our kennel legislators have, with great sagaciousness, found what we feel sure will be generally regarded as an equitable way out of the very difficult situation, and what is, looking at the subject all round, probably the best solution of the problem that could be devised, and really by a very simple and slight variation in the existing clauses in Appendix II., which specifically applies to the practice of trimming the coats of dogs for exhibition.

It will be seen that punitive Clause IV., prohibiting clipping, singeing, or rasping down the coat or the removal of the new or fast coat by any means except in breeds that are specified and which come under the "exceptions" in Appendix II.—which list hitherto contained Poodles only—remains intact. To this list the Committee decided, in response to the request of specialist clubs interested, to add the following breeds:—

Bedlington Terriers, Collies, Pomeranians, and Yorkshire Terriers.

We are told in the notice that a few other breeds are still under discussion. The list, therefore, may, and no doubt will, be further augmented now and from time to time, probably, as specialist clubs are able to make out by the great majority of opinion (as is apparent in connection with the breeds scheduled) a good case before the Kennel Club in favor of the practice of cutting, etc.

This "exceptions" list will therefore figure in future as a most important part of Appendix II. We take it that exhibitors of dogs on this list may do as much, or as little, as they like to their dogs (just as in their estimation is required) with impunity, so far as the Kennel Club is

concerned. The sole authority to determine how far "the modesty of nature has been o'erstepped" in future will be the judges, who always have had the power to throw out over-trimmed dogs, but which, we think, should now be emphasised by a special mandate from the Kennel Club to that effect.

Clause V., which referred to the removal of old or shedding coat and loose hairs, has, it will be seen, been amended so as to permit of "pulling" or "plucking" the coat in connection with all breeds.

By this alteration we take it that the Committee consider that there can be no cruelty in pulling or plucking old or shedding coat or loose hairs, in which they are quite right. But assuming that trimmers pluck or pull "new" and "fast" hair, which they do and always will do, where those hairs are too long or irregular and interfere with the evenness of the coat or outward conformation of the animal (which are sometimes described as superfluous hairs), how is it to be detected? In this way exhibitors will not only continue to infringe Clause V., but will be inflicting great cruelty upon the animals, in the process. Some exhibitors contend that "plucking" is innocuous. All we have to say to such is to as's them to pluck their own "new" and "fast" hair, and then say whether it is, or is not, painful.

The whole subject is a very knotty and difficult one, and one that, as we have often pointed out, it is impossible to lay down a hard-and-fast rule that will effectually meet it in all its varying phases.

Broadly, there is no denying the fact that of late there has been a very general and powerful demand by those interested for a legislation of the 'Trimming' to a greater or less degree of certain breeds of dogs for the show bench which is at present prohibited in Appendix II. The "Trimmers," we submit, have clearly proved the necessity of it, under existing conditions of specialism, with its arbitrary standard descriptions and points, and the Kennel Club, we are pleased to be able to state, has met this demand in a broad-minded spirit of justice, fairness, and conciliation which does them credit, ignoring as they have done the tenets of a few straight-laced purists and redants who invariably crop up and try to force themselves to the front in any and every subject under the sun.



THE L. K. A. OF MASS. CASE.

The Supreme Court of Massachusetts Decides that the Anti-Ticket Was Elected—Proxies were Illegally used by the Seagrave Faction—Case May be Appealed.

(From the "Boston Globe," Saturday, June 26.)

Lizzie M. Blake, of Wellesley, and Helen M. Talbot, of Atlantic, are entitled to hold office respectively as president and secretary of the Ladies' Kennel Association of Massachusetts, under a decision given yesterday by Judge Brakey, of the Supreme Court. His honor orders a writ of mandamus to issue on their petition against Etta M. Seagrave, of Wakefield, and Mrs. Edmund Squires, of Newton, commanding the respondents to recognize the petitioners as the duly elected president and secretary and to turn over the books, papers and property of the organization to them.

Mrs. Seagrave was president of the association for thirteen years before its incorporation in 1911 and held the office since then. At the annual election May 12 she presided. There were 32 members present, 31 of whom voted. By the use of proxies Mrs. Seagrave and Mrs. Squires were elected. It was conceded that without counting the proxies Mrs. Blake and Mrs. Talbot were duly elected.

A protest against the use of proxies was made at the meeting, but according to the records written by the secretary, Mrs. Talbot, which the judge finds true and accurate, Mrs. Seagrave ignored the objection and allowed the proxies to be used and counted. She refused to put an appeal from the decision of the chair.

She and Mrs. Squires were declared elected. Mrs. Blake and Mrs. Talbot filed the mandamus proceeding. The question at issue related to the legality of the votes by proxies. There was nothing in the bylaws about the use of proxies and the judge finds there was no long established usage in the organization by which the proxies would become legal. The judge

holds the proxies were illegally used and counted. The judge says:

The selection of officers to manage the affairs of the corporation calls for the exercise of judgment and discretion. It is plain that they must be elected by hallot at a meeting in which every member has a right to participate. A right to vote by proxy is not a common law right and not necessarily an incident to membership.

In the absence of any by-law or long continued usage giving the right to vote by proxy, it follows that the power conferred by the Charter and our laws to elect a president and secretary can be exercised only by members of the corporation who are present and vote therefor.

Three-fourths of the members are not residents of the State, and all the proxies sent in came from such members. At the close of the hearing in the case this week Judge Braley said the partisanship in the organization was intense, and he suggested to counsel to try to harmonize the differences among the members, remarking that unless that were done the value of the association would be lost. The meeting broke up in confusion and the feeling between the rival factions was bitter.

Whether the respondents will appeal to the full bench of the Supreme Court or not will be decided next week. Mrs. Squires, when asked her opinion of the outcome and what the intentions of the respondents were, replied: "I have nothing to say about it. I am a comparatively new member of the association and feel that I should be excused from commenting on the case."

Mrs. Blake, of Wellesley, who is declared the legally elected president, expressed herself as very happy over the result of the trial and said she believed the incident is closed. Mrs. Talbot, the secretary, said: "I am very glad that the right prevails again. I do not look for any further trouble in the association."

Everett W. Crawford, counsel for Mrs. Blake and Mrs. Talbot, said that, although he heard the case might be appealed to the full bench, he believed that such would not happen and that there would be no further dissension in the association.—Field and Fancy.

THE BULL TERRIER

"I likes 'em with a bit o' bull in 'em, mesen," remarked the man who had stopped to criticise one of our dogs, and we heartily agreed with him. Good as all dogs are, there is something especially lovable about the dog with that "bit o' bull." Courage is the test known characteristic of a bulldog, but with it go other scarcely less desirable qualities. Your dog with bull blood in him is brave yet gentle, he is invariably affectionate, and he is amazingly pig-headed. We have mind a dog which no longer drops his ears and thumps his tail on the floor as he used to do if he so much as caught us looking at lim. He was a dog which would stand up to any living thing. There was something grand in the grim way in which he could take "punishment" without flinching, yet he was extraordinarily gentle with little children, and to be allowed to fondle a helpless kitten made him absurdly happy. He was a pig-headed brute, as gloriously obstinate in his love as in all else. It is a fine fault in a dog is obstinacy, it helps him to shut his eyes to human failings. A true dog is a fanatic in his devotion. He sticks like grim death to his one creed-the worship of the being he has deified-the big noisy man-god with the feet of clay.

Well, that is the sort of dog we have in mind when men of ripe experience suddenly grow enthusiastic over the animal with bull blood in his composition. Now, as a matter of fact, a great many modern breeds have a strain of the British bulldog in them, though their adnierers may never dream of it. The one which has the most, is, of course, the bull terrier. The bulldog himself is not every one's fancy. Grand fellow as he is, his dearest friends have in some respects been his worst enemies, for they have made of him a somewhat ungainly animal, incapable of taking much violent exercise.

Dog fanciers in a sporting class found this fact out a hundred years ago. They wanted an active edition of the bulldog, and accordingly they set to work and invented a bulldog-cum-terrier. He was not a bull-terrier in any sense, but rather a bull and terrier. His appearance, to judge by the portraits which have been handed down to us, was not prepossessing, but he was essentially a "business dog." His work or "sport" if you will, was of the class which is no longer fashionable, but which once served to amuse those who could not indulge in the country pastimes for which they yearned. While we may turn in dis-While we may turn in disgust from the dog-fighting, badger baiting, rat worrying of a byegone age, it is only fair to remember that such "sports" were not then deemed cruel, and that probably those who indulged in them the most would much have referred the more natural sport of the countryside. From such pastimes

the town sportsman was debarred, and so he invented substitutes. He could not go badger d'gging in London, but he knew where "Brock" was to be found in a barrel in Holborn, and for a shilling he could try whether his dog had any of the "right stuff" in him.

Well, of course, the bull and terrier did all that was asked of him. He fought and worried, and was a blackguard generally, but he never lost his power of loving his master faithfully. Then bit by bit as the fashion for nice-looking dogs as well as useful ones came in the refining process began. At first any terrier that was strong and active was good enough for the breeders' purpose, but by degrees terriers of a more uniform type were used. It was in the days of the white English Terrier-an old breed that many of my readers have never seenand this terrier became one of the forbears of our present hero. More terrier blood was introduced, and in course of time in place of the heavy broad-fronted, wide-skulled bull and terrier of various bulldog colors, a much more shapely pure white dog was obtained. Hinks, of Birmingham, is always credited with having produced

dogs, some few fanciers remained faithful to their favorite breed; in fact, they possessed something of their dog's tenacity, they clung on Amongst these staunch supporters was Mrs. Olive Millner, a lady who is quite sure that the bull terrier is "the" breed, and who knows more about the points of the variety than half the men who pose as bull-terrier experts.

Mrs. Millner was so kind as to let us see her dogs at Bilton Lane, Harrogate, recently, and to have a chat on bull-terrier affairs in general. Imperator, a grand example of the modern bull-terrier, made timself comfortable

tor is a dog of great power, yet of beautiful shape. Although his photograph scarcely does him justice-bullterriers always look so sleepy in a picture-it will give the amateur some dea of the essential points of a highclass bull-terrier. Notice the short back, straight muscular legs, and small compact feet. Notice especially the "clean" nec's, free from all loose skin, and the short tail, which must never be carried too high. The head is even more difficult to show on paper. In a low-bred dog it consists of a broad, massive s'cull, prominent cheeks, big clumsy ears, and eyes inclined to "'bulge," while the muzzle is generally snipy and the lips loose. Reverse all this and you have our hero. True, the skull is broad enough to show the reason of his name, while at allows rlenty of room for brains ; but it does not strike one as in the case of the "common" specimen, for the head is "all of a piece." There is no division line between skull and muzzle, they merge, they are carved out of the same block. The muzzle in proportion is as "strong" as the skull, and the two together form a mighty blunt-edged wedge. Dear, dear! how difficult even so familiar an object is to describe. The ears are comparatively small, the eyes very much so, almond-shaped and deep set, lips tight. The bull terrier should suggest enormous strength, ac-

this edition of the bull terrier some fifty years ago, and we well remember a visit we paid to the famous Brummagem kennels, though not quite so long as that since.

The white bull terrier, if never popular in the same way as the collie, the fox terrier, or more recently the bull-dog, had many influential supporters, but the breed received a serious setback when in 1895 or thereabouts, cropping, i.e., cutting the ears to make them stand "up like darts," as the old advertisement invariably put it, was declared to be illegal.

For a time matters looked black, but, fortunately for one of the best of on the hearthrug after two or three attempts to monopolise the sofa, while his companion insisted upon having an armchair. There is certainly nothing of the blackguardly Bill Sykes type about them for they are "as handsome as paint," and not at all out of place in the drawing room. This does not mean, however, that the modern bull terrier has deteriorated in working capacity. No one, as far as we know, has ever dared to suggest that the breed is becoming soft. It would be a risky thing to do, for though the bull-terrier is lamb-like enough with his friends, he is not a dog to insult with impunity. Imperativity and indomitable courage, all held in check. He is never noisy and excitable. He is rather indolent. Our best was as fond of sheep as the Fat Boy in "Pickwick." But when he was wanted, when any bull-terrier worthy of the name is required to take a hand in any game, well, you never have to ask him twice.

LIFE LONG REMEMBRANCES OF THE BULL TERRIER.

It has been said "Bull Terrier man once, one always." As the Bull Terrier appeals to me: There you see the old champion, standing on the boards as if he were molded in marble, with

the small, cruel, black eye, the expression of which indicates, if called upon, would die with his head in the right direction. As the Bull Terrier is supposed to be the gladiator of the canine race, the interpretation of the standard sometimes gives the novice the impression that he has to have a dog, which in my opinion, can only be compared with the pugilist of today, and that of many years ago. He prepares to accept a type of dog which is shapeless, bulky and not all in to form. That is why we broke away, years ago, from some of the English type of Bull Terrier, with the short, thick neck and heavy front, and other points, all of which denote pugnacity, without the beauty which is so characteristic in the Bull Terrier of today. We still however desire to retain the filled up face, that small black eye, which spells Bull Terrier, and without which, only gives you the plain white dog.

Ottawa has the distinction of being the home of some good Bull Terriers, but when the Toronto men took the breed up, it looked very much as though Ottawa was going to lose her prestige, as they have bred a number of beautiful Bull Terriers in Toronto of late years. However, due to Mr. R. H. Elliott, that good Bull Terrier fancier (who by the way has just purchased that excellent bitch, Glenmere Channel Queen), and one or two other new fanciers Ottawa should still retain her reputation in the fancy. Of course I am not forgetting other places, and I might mention Mr. Mark O'Rourke, of Hamilton, Canada, who has always managed to have a good puppy of his own breeding.

It affords me great pleasure to know that the breed of dog to which I have devoted a life study, is to have one of the largest entries Toronto has ever known.

The Whitecote Bull Terrier Kennels

A short review of the inmates of these kennels, owned by Mr. Arthur Smyth, of Humboldt, Sask., some of whose pictures appear in this issue, will give some idea of the high-class stock owned by this gentleman. Although only going into the fancy of recent years Mr. Smyth has got together some of the best blood obtainable.

His first importation was Earlsfield Tarquin, one of the best headed dogs in England but which met with an untimely end shortly after reaching Canada. Mr. Smyth next imported that good dog, Earlsfield Rival, by Bloomsbury Czar, out of Ch. Deodora Marchioness by Bloomsbury Young King. Earlsfield Rival did considerable winning for his late owner before leaving England, where he beat such well known dogs as Bloomsbury Merry Monarch, Ch. Prince Wideawake, Brendon Victor, Imperator, and many others under such experts as H. E. Monk, E. T. Pimm, and other well known judges. He has done well for his present owner at the shows in Canada but it is as a stud dog that Mr. Smyth values him most highly his progeny being of an exceptionally high character.

The two imported bitches Mr. Smyth owns were selected for him in England by Mr. R. T. Baines, the noted English judge, after months of careful search for the best blood obtainable.

Deodora Countess, by Bloomsbury Czar, out of that grand bitch, Ch. Deodora Marchioness, was bred by Mrs. T. E. Hopkins for whom she did considerable winning, being first at the Crystal Palace, London, Eng., in 1911, under Mr. H. E. Monk.

Rexena, the other imported bitch, is by Ch. Bloomsbury Rex out of Langshaw Faerie by Ch. Sam Lavender and is the dam of three winners in the Whitecote Kennels. Mr. Smyth had this bitch bred to Ch. White Noel before being shipped from England and of that mating has the grand young dog White Noelson, whose picture appears on the opposite page.

White Noelson, by Ch. White Noel and Rexena is one of the best headed dogs we have seen for some time. He has a powerful foreface, well filled under the eyes which are small and well placed, giving him the true Bull Terrier expression. He has never been beaten in his classes and at the recent W. C. K. C. show, held in Winnipeg he was awarded best specimen Bull Terriers under Mr. T. A. Armstrong of Ottawa. White Noelson is a direct descendant of the famous old Woodcote strain and as a sire leaves nothing to be desired, the unshown puppy, Whitecote Bobette whose picture is shown here also, being one of his progeny. To see White Noelson is to admire and being a home bred one Mr. Smyth is justly proud of him.

Whitecote Czarex, another home bred one is by Earlstield Rival ex Rexena. He is a fine upstanding young dog with a well filled muzzle and is the essence of type and quality and when a little more mature will make the best of them hustle.

Whitecote Animation by Earlsfield Rival ex Rexena is another high quality young one: Her head, and well filled, down face, with small dark eyes leave nothing to be desired, while her body, hone, legs, feet, front, and neat three quarter tail are as near perfection as possible. She has only been once shown, at the W.C.K.C. show, in May, where she went through her classes from puppy to winners. We predict a great future for this classy little hitch and Mr. Smyth has already refused some very substantial offers for her

There are several litters of young stock coming along which give great promise, if huge muzzle, and small dark eyes count for anything. And anyone wanting high-class puppies would do well to communicate with Mr. Smyth or visit his kennels where there is a treat in store for them.

Mr. Mason to Mr. Holdenby

The Canadian Kennel Gazette is so carefully edited as a rule that I was surprised when you published the peculiar screed from Mr. Holdenby which appeared in your June number.

Mr. Holdenby starts in the usual fashion adopted by the man who has come into possession of a dog and who in ten or fifteen years seems to know infinitely less than at the end of his two years novitiate. How does Mr. Holdenby know that the object of an article is to reflect "on my dog?" Is he already a mind reader as well as a "judge?"

An how is this: "There is a saying that when a man knocks you put him on your pay roll, but in this case it is not worth it." By what freak of imagination can a man figure that a correct statement about a dog like Peter Prim is knocking the owner? Of course I appreciate Mr. Holdenby's very Holdenby like statement that putting me on his pay roll would not be worth it and I am now interested in knowing the extent of Mr. Holdenby's pay roll as applied to dog fanciers. Whilst I think from what little I know of Mr. Holdenby his pay roll would be limited to ten cents and a free lunch if anybody has been on this roll we ought to know it.

placed over by the owner of his sire. All the lovely stuff about the dog's puppies is another advertisement but whether paid for or not I no not know. I am a little surprised though that, after the owner of the dog's sire had placed him over President, Mr. Holdenby forgot to also tell us that Mr. Holdenby placed Corporal Prim over Sharrow, an amusing demonstration of the value of reciprocity as applied to dogs and novice dog judges.

And pray who told Mr. Holdenby that I am a "self appointed critic?" Did my editor tell Him? I am sure he did not. Did I tell him? I am quite certain I did not. Of course a man who was criticising dogs before Mr. Holdenby was born might be classed with the self-appointed, or with anything else, by Mr. Holdenby or his sort, but these amusing introductions into the fancy forget so much more by the time they qualify that they are usually far more ashamed of themselves than their critics and they are invariably pleased to forget the amusement they caused.

As for a man's own doings he need not look at his dog to find them. A dog's eyes do not reflect his master's character or his record nor does any other part of the dog. In truth, one can learn more about a man from a faked picture of his dog sent to an honestly conducted kennel paper and published by that paper in good faith and without suspicion of being tricked.

As to sound. If any dog with neck, shoulders, forelegs and feet, as seen in the real Peter Prim, can truthfully be called sound then Peter Prim is sound, but these failings cannot be detected in his "clear dark eyes" any more than you can there find the real character of his master.

And as to the "portrait" of Peter Prim, it may be so termed, but it is not a likeness of the dog and, if Mr. Holdenby has nothing to be ashamed of or to be sorry for, why did he not send you a photograph from life and let you illustrate the dog as he is and not as he has been made to appear? One of our very best judges agrees with me that nobody on earth could tell that the portrait, without name, was intended for Peter Prim.

In conclusion I repeat that the dog is not a show dog and I now add that he never beat a good dog, that was in show condition, under a good judge, and that he never will beat a good dog under a good judge.

Calgary Dog Show

The ninth annual dog show of the Alberta Kennel Club was held in connection with the Calgary Fair on July 1st to 3rd. Mr. James Mortimer travelled from New York to judge the show and as usual, the "Old Guard" gave general satisfaction, he is a "laster."

The Calgary show for 1913 will become memorable as the one show in the West held under C.K.C. rules, the harance are, we believe, being held under the new D.K.C. rules.

The quality of the exhibition was good on the whole, though some of the best kennels were missed this year, noticeably, the Clipstone and the Kootenai Kennels of Airedales, in Wires, Mr. Cocksedge and Mr. Sims' representatives were missed. In Poms the keen eye of excitement was removed when it became known that the famous parti-color, Endeliff Magpie, had died the morning of the show at Mr. E. Wrightson Thorp's place. Of course, Mrs. Stickney was the recipient of much sympathy, which in a degree consoled her, not only for the loss of her little dog, but for the honors he would have undoubtedly gained. The cause of Endeliff Magpie's death was an abscess at the back of the right eye.

The dogs from Winnipeg which hitherto have been such a feature at this show were badly missed.

We have a word to say regarding the management. We would suggest that the Directors of the Calgary Fair take the management over and select from amongst the best element of the Alberta Kennel Club a Committee to act who will in turn make proper arrangements for a superintendent who will know that his duties are to run a show in an orderly manner, to see that the dogs are benched all under separate numbers and not five or six in a cage. from which any dog may be taken and

shown that suits the purpose, to see that rings are kept wholesome and clean, to see that judges are well served by competent stewards, and in turn that the stewards have paid attendants whose duty it is to bring in and hustle up the dogs for each class so that a judge's valuable time may not be wasted. And, lastly, a superintendent should know that the "Ring" is not his place morning, noon and night, but about the show generally seeing that all goes well.

Mr. Bert Swann brought a nice string of dogs from Toronto and succeeded with the Bulldog. Homeward Jumbo, a real good headed one; in bringing back the cup for best of any breed in show. Amongst other good ones in the string we noticed Mr. Bain's Airedale, Bircheliff Oorang, a quality one all over, but in poor shape. A good dog, such as he, ought not to be benched thus.

Mr. Swann brought his string through in good style, all were merry as kittens, one would have imagined they had just been let out of their kennel at home instead of a freight car after travelling 2,500 miles and been seven and a half days on the trip. This handler deserves the full support of Eastern exhibitors.

Stuart of Montreal who sent out three St. Bernards, Mr. Jackson of Hamilton, who showed his Black Cocker dog Dunbar and Mrs. Gammon, also of Hamilton, who sent out two Cockers, represented the East and took a good part in the win-We have always spoken well of Win-

nipeg show but they deserve extra praise this year. The show was a success in every way and was the result of hard work on the part of the committee and a few of the Winnipeg fanciers. Mr. W. Love is now counted one of the most efficient superintendents in the West and we wish to add our quota of praise. The show was well run. The committee worked hard during the show. Mr. Geo. Spurgeon the chairman is an adept in the art of making one feel at home, he saw that all visitors were well looked after. Mr. Fred Miller, Mr. Holman, Dr. Smith, Mr. Mermagen, Mr. A. P. Mutchmor all took a keen interest in the show and worked hard.

The show was held under Dominion Kennel Club rules and gives five points towards a D.K.C. championship to pach of the winning dogs. Not once during

the show did we find any one who had anything but a good word for the Canadian Kennel Club. Some day we hope to see the East and West again joined and governed by one body.

Dr. C. Y. Ford who was to make his initial trip West to judge was delayed by a patient in Vienna and could not get away. Dr. Clayton of Chicago was engaged to take his classes and did so in a creditable manner. Mr. E. Wrightson Thorp is becoming a popular judge in the West. He knows dogs from head to tail. We are indebted to him for a report of part of his classes, those that appear over his signature.

The quality all round we think was up to former years though there were not as many outstanding individual specimens. Mr. Jackson's black Cocker dog Dunbar took the grand championship for best in show and he deserved it. A crand little dog the more we see of him the better we like him. The award was a popular one and Mr. Jackson was the recipient of many congratulations. Mr. A. P. Mutchmor's grand little team of S.H. Fox Terriers won the special for best brace and with aid of a kennel mate took best trio of sporting dogs. Best trio of non-sporting going to Mersey Kennels sterling Bulldogs, Imera Collie Kennels were successful in winning the special for best four bred and owned by exlibitor. The special for best specimen bred and owned by exhi'itor going to

Second in the open was a new face, Lanark Rex, good body but off in skull and short in head. Novice bitches first was Lady Grey nice but hardly the right expression, second Lady Doris, a light one, could be împroved in head, third Elgin Lass is short in head, limit, first Woodcrest Patsey a good clean Setter, clean head, nice muzzle, good legs and feet, second Wasp is coarse in skull and lacks foreface, open was a repeat. There were two Irish Setters benched. The bitch Bloomfield Wonder is a Al bitch, excellent color, good legs and feet, good in eye but shown much too fat, she could be much improved by fixing up. A very nice pair of Gordons were benched, also a couple of mediscre Dalmatians.

Chesapeake Bays and Irish Water Spaniels were good classes especially the latter which contained some excellent specimens, some might have been put down in better shape. Three nice Clumbers were benched, the winner, Riverton Ronald, is a good specimen of what a Clumber should be, good head and eye nice coat, excellent bone and substance, he appealed to us very much. We would like to see this useful variety become popular in Canada.

Cocker Spaniels were as usual one of the best classes in the show. For the past three years under three different judges a Cocker has won best in show at Winnipeg.

In puppies Red Belle was first, a nice eye but young, will develop, second Fairy a fair one, nice head, third St. Helens Lass but fair, big: novice black, first Major Oak Peggy fair, plain in head and light in eye, third Lloyd George, also light in eye, but fair Cocker, limit brought out the winner, Dunbar, now a champion excellent

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color, good head and eye and a Cocker all through, second Duke Obo a nice one good eye, very fair head trifle Minched in muzzle. Dick Turpin light eye, pinched in muzzle, ordinary, was new one in open black dogs, he was third. Lass is a good boned bitch and an evenly balanced one but is long in body and plain in head, second Ferndale Irene is long in muzzle, but a good bodied bitch and shown fit. Rellimderf Red Pansy was third, we like her better than the first one, shown little thin but better in eye, muzzle and body. Limit, second was Corette, a nice little bitch bit high on legs, third Calmo Billy plain in head, fair. Open dogs Blazer, first a cobby little chap nice head and expression but gone in front. Third Ottawa Golddust good color, not good in expression and off in muzzle. In open bitches we like Brookdale Red Lady, placed third, the best. She is showing her age and could be improved in skull. Winnipeg Lass was again put to the front here. Novice parti-color Rhona G. was first not in coat but a nice one, second Wentworth Billy, a typical Cocker but undershot, third Manitoba Beauty a nice promising one, limit Ferndale Goldie a nice little one, good eye and ear. Open dogs 1 Manitoba Swift nice, thin, good in bone and body, bit light fin eye, third Rellimderi Rube was off the bench when we saw them. Open bitches parti-color brought out a new one in the third Rellimderf Ruth a nice bodied one.

Collies were quite a nice lot, it is a bad time of the year to get Collies in full coat. MALLWYD BOB DEAD

Mal'wyd Bob, champion in England, Canada and United States and perhaps the most perfect type of English Setter ever hred is dead. He died, aged fourteen years, on Saturday, June 14th, in Bellingham, Wash., at the kennels of Mr. Ross Welch, who owned him at the time of his death.

He was imported from England in 1904, by Messrs. T. P. McConnell and J. A. Robb, of Victoria, B.C., at what is said to be the highest price ever paid for a Setter. The exact amount is not known but is variously reported at from \$1,500 to \$2,000. Victoria was then, as it is now, the home of some of the leading Setters of the world.

In 1904 the famous English Setter, Bracken O'Lock had just been bought by some wealthy Seattle fanciers for the expressed purpose of beating Vic-

toria in the Pacific Coast shows. When the Eastern champion had beaten their best dogs the Victoria sportsmen sent to England for Mallwyd Bob.

He created a sensation, upon his arrival, beating Bracken O'Lock, and other flyers as fast as they appeared. He competed in nearly all the shows held on the coast, from Vancouver, B.C., to the Mexican boundary line and his career was one of continual triumph. He won specials for best of all breeds in Seattle, Tacoma, Portland, San Francisco, Oakland, Vancouver and Victoria and remained unbeaten until, at the age of nine years he was defeated by one of his own puppies, Champion Handsome Dan, in Portland, Oregon.

Mallwyd Bob was as famous as a shooting dog and as a sire as he was as a bench winner. Many are the hunting stories told of wonderful days afield, shooting over this splendid Setter, while his progeny may be found in almost every state in the Union as well as in England, many of the winning Setters on both continents being proud to claim descent from him. Arbutus Swallow, Handsome Dan, Quil Ceda Queen, Handsome Belle, Queen Rackett, Madame Mallwyda and Zola Silverheels are among the best known of his puppies.

The old champion died of a complication of diseases, due probably, to old age. Proud and noble, and game to the hour of his death, he tottered cheerfully to his master for the usual caress at dinner time. He received a pat on the head then staggered to the front lawn lay down and died.

He was wrapped in a blanket and carried to his sleeping box, apart from his kennel mates. Little children of the neighborhood came in groups and silently dropped flowers on their dead friend.

In the morning he was borne to the edge of a wood, just outside of town, where the wild birds sing their mating songs and game birds flutter and whirr as the young setters blunder upon them. It was a glorious June Sunday morning. The sun shone down warmly as if to give the old dog comfort from above as he lay beside the grave being made for him under an

As the sod was replaced over him a little wood thrush in the branches above chirped a benediction and a humming bird hummed a dirge. The soft south wind, from the cool ocean, gently fanned the air as it has done forever. Somewhere in the distance a frightened pheasant fluttered off to the shelter of the thicket. Champion Mallwyd Bob slept peacefully on in his eternal sleep.

AN INNOCENT ABROAD.

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"BANJO"

Bill Riverside in Rod and Gun

On hearing that Banjo was for sale, my brother and I drove a distance of about twenty-five miles to see him. We were pleased with the appearance of the dog as soon as our eyes lighted on him. He was one of those long-legged, short-bodied hounds, active and swift as a Collie. When we asked the owner to put a price on him he immediately wanted to know where we lived. On learning the distance we had come he answered.

"Ten dollars."

This was a much lower figure than we had expected and the deal was closed forthwith. We afterwards learned that the fellow had a scale of prices for the dog, based on the distance prospective buyers came to inspect him,-after the manner of railroad tickets,-and that he had been realizing quite a revenue from actual sales, the repetition of which was made possible by the fact that Banjo usually appeared at home after about five days' absence following the date of sale, except in those rare instances when he was kept chained up for a longer period.

We brought our dog home in a deep box and, after keeping him chained for ten days or so, took him mink hunting. All went well until evening when he struck across the country in a westerly direction, paying no attenthon to our entreaties and coaxing calls. He returned to us, however, after an absence of only three days and seemed much pleased with the reception accorded him. Evidently he had tried to find his way back to his old home and had failed. At this time Banjo was about three years old and he subsequently proved to be one of the best fox, 'coon and mink dogs ever owned in that country. He was fast enough to run foxes in quickly and wise enough to hunt and tree 'coons without getting mixed up with skunks and cats.

After we had had Banjo for about two years and had come to look upon him as one of the household, he gave us a great shock one evening by coming home with one of his front feet off. The sad expression of dismay and pain depicted on his face as he looked up at us went to our very hearts. He whined aloud with pain as he tried to lie down by the fire.

"You must shoot the poor fellow, in the morning," said father. "He will only suffer and die in the end. Even if he did recover he would never be of any use again."

As father repeated his injunction the poor dog hobbled to the door and whined to get out. We expected he would go to his comfortable house but to our surprise when we looked the next morning Banjo was not there nor could we find any trace of him. The next day we learned that we had been caught in a wolf trap which a trapper down the river had set for 'coon and it was this that had caused him the

loss of his foot. When we could find no trace of him we all felt guilty for having allowed the dog to leave the house the previous night. Why had we not bathed his feet and tried in some way to relieve his misery? We hunted in every hole and corner about the place, beneath the old driving-shed and under the straw-stack, where we expected he had crawled in and died, but Banjo was nowhere to be found.

At dinner that day mother suddenly said:

"Boys, perhaps Banjo went over to Nigger Handy's."

"Why did we not think of that before?" exclaimed my brother and I at the same time, "That's just where he has gone."

"I want a bottle of Handy's cough mixture," continued mother, "so you may run over there this evening for the medicine and see if Banjo is really there."

That evening we took a short cut across the fields. Following the cow path along the edge of the woods to the creek we turned to the right and followed the hemlock ridge for about a mile to where lit sloped down to the cedar swamp. Here we came upon a little clearing of about half an acre, in which stood Nigger Handy's cabin.

"Come in chillun," invited a hollow voice, after we had knocked upon the door of the cabin. Handy seemed to have anticipated our coming and to know who we were before we had opened the door. He always called us "chillun," although we were almost grown men.

Banjo was there sure enough, stretched out in the corner with his foot bound up. On seeing us he tatooed a hearty welcome with his tail on the floor. Handy had also two dogs of his own and several cats, besides a pet ground-hog. All were lying about in various attitudes before the hig, blazing fire-place. In the midst of them all sat Handy in his great, bulging, homemade willow chair, basking in the radiant light and warmth of the fire.

Handy raised his own tobacco and what with the smell of home-grown tobacco, the odor of cooking 'coon in the bake-kettle, the dogs, cats, and other aromas native to a negro shanty, the place was not conducive to pleasant dreams—not to dreams of white hyacinths, myrrh and frankincense at any rate.

However we were made welcome as we had often been before and were soon enjoying Handy's stories and jokes. We could see he was inwardly pleased with himself because of his goodness to Banjo and we were not slow in commending him for his kind offices on behalf of the dog. Everybody knew how kind Handy always was to both man and beast.

Handy, and Mandy, his wife, had settled there in the woods during the American War. They had been slaves in the South and had escaped to Can-

Although Handy possessed some force of character Mandy was of finer clay than he. In fact she could read and had many admirable qualities, together with a prodigious fund of fairy tales and ghost stories, no doubt the product of the days of slavery. She was much respected in the neighborhood and "Black Mandy," as she was called, was usually sent for where there was sickness. made a skillful nurse while receiving but little for her services. She used the leaves, barks and roots of the forest to make her medicine from and Mandy's "Wild Turnip Cough Cure," "Boneset and Balsam Ointment," and many other curatives supposed to possess great virtue, were the talk of the neighborhood. Mandy, however, had died some years previous to the time of this story and Handy was now alone. He made a living by trapping and gathering Ginseng, Gold Thread, Sarsaparilla, Sassafras and other medicinal barks, roots and herbs and it might be said that he lived well. His food consisted mainly of potatoes, usually made appetizing by the addition of trout from the near by creek, varied at times by squirrels, partridge, 'coon and ground hog, in the hunting of which Banjo had often taken part. Hence the affinity between Handy

As we sat by the fire that evening Handy told us about the death of his wife, Mandy. He had acted as nurse, doctor, grave digger, chief mourner and pall-bearer. Although Mandy had nursed for so many years in that neighborhood no one came to nurse her when she fell sick. Handy, alone, it was who smoothed her pillow and closed her eyes and buried her at sundown beneath the big cedar at the back of the cabin.

It would be interesting, had I the space, to give Handy's funeral oration at his wife's grave, as repeated to us in detail that hight.

We asked him about his religion. "Chillun, I has no 'ligion."

"Well, we asked, do you believe there is a Heaven and a Hell, Handy?"

"Why suah, chillun. I'se in Heaben now, don't hab to die."

"Yes," we said, "but how about the hereafter?"

"Now, see heah, chillun. 'Taint no good argifyin' 'cause we'se neber gwine ter gree on dat las' p'int what you frow out. Ma old 'oman, Mandy, done could read and spell powerful and she p'intedly say:

"Handy you must wrestle wif de angel in prayer no mo'. You must wrestle wif yourself. In de midst of life we am in debt and we sure am 'bleeged ter pay. An' we done go axe de Lord to forgive us our debts. Debts am Hell, chillun. An we has no business in dar."

Handy then went on at some length to explain the many good qualities of his late partner, after which we all lapsed into silence, watching the big fire leap and flutter and flare. The silence was finally broken by Handy singing in his weird, tremulous voice,

"Gone am de days when my heard was young and gay, etc."

On our way home that night my brother and I hummed Handy's song, reviewed his philosophy and re-told his stories and although forty clusive years have passed since then I still occasionally in my dreams see and hear old Nigger Handy.

Banjo recovered more quickly than we had expected and we had him home in about three weeks. He was no use for fox hunting after his accident but proved as good as ever on 'coon, and we used him for this purpose for a number of years until my brother and I left home for the West.

On returning for a visit several years later I found Banjo still ally although old, stupid and worthless Mother had kept him because of old associations. He had then become much addicted to dreaming and would get agitated when he attempted to sleep by the fire. He seemed to fance he was running foxes once more or hunting 'coons and sometimes barket aloud. On one occasion, as it was nearing Christmas time he had an unusually exciting dream. He jump ed up from near the kitchen stove and got outside as quickly as possible Father told us the old dog had not gone farther than the barn for two years but he did that day. We could see his tracks plainly in the fresh snow, and they led out towards the woods. Out of curiosity I followed him. After reaching the woods he had lain down in several places as though tired out but had gone on again : little later. He crossed the creek at the big jam and from there made straight for the elm swamp and, to my surprise, went to the old hollow elm tree. This was the very tree w had cut down for 'coons many year before and was now crumbling in de cav. I could see Banjo had been in the hollow of the old tree but had changed his mind and had gone on again. I still followed and he seemed to be striking for Nigger Handy's shanty. This made my pursuit all the more interesting, knowing as I did that Handy had been dead for about two years. There was no doubt but

that was where he was heading for and as his tracks drew me nearer the place I wondered if the old cabin would still be standing. The surroundings had so grown up with second growth trees that I did not see the shanty until within a few rods of it. It was with a feeling of sadness that I looked upon the old place again. Only a portion of the roof remained on it. Forlorn and forsaken it appeared surrounded as it was by a thicket of dead Mulleins, Burdock and brambles. On reaching the broken down open door I looked in upon a picture of desolation. The table was still nailed to the wall; above it were the wooden hooks where the long single barrel gun had been wont to rest. On the floor there was a pitiable litter of rusty tins, legless stools, rags and broken dishes. In the midst of it all lay old Banjo curled up-dead. He had gone in his last dream with Nigger Handy.

Every convenience possible is, or is being, installed in the kennels, electric light and drainage are already in, tile floors and a wash room with hot and cold water are being installed as well as an up-to-date heating system. The stalls for the dogs are large, about 4 by 6 and are light and airy, the place is kept scrupulously clean the stalls being whitewashed once a week and the floors constantly flushed into the drains. We have no doubt that the cleanliness in which everything is kept is one reason Mr. Adams is so successful in rearing the voungsters.

New additions are soon to be made to the kennels which will give ample room for about 40 to 50 dogs. The kennels are kept nicely decorated with prize ribbons, dog collars, framed certificates of wins, etc., these relieve the place of the bareness that usually suggests itself to one in thinking of a dog

The Mersey Kennels are well worth a visit and we wish their owner every success with them, but then Mr. Adams is now an old hand at the Bulldog fancy and has stuck with them despite many reverses. His is the true fancier spirit and he is a dyed in the wool lover of a good Bulldog.

And that in face of the fact that the latter's reasons for interference have been proved to be untenable, and some even childish. It is high time that a balt is called to these high-handed proceedings. The breeders and exhibitors of dogs who create and maintain the shows are the backbone of the Kennel Club, and the members who represent them will not be true to their trust if they do not resist in the most energetic manner the encroachments on their rights.

MORE MUDDLES.

As we expected and predicted, the Kennel Club Committee's latest method of dealing with the trimming ques-tion has landed them on the horns of a dilemma, which will become more and more apparent the longer the new rule remains in force. In fact, it may be truly said that the whole matter has never been in a more unsatisfac-tory condition. Let us take as an example Terriers. So far as the new rule affects them, these breeds must

a fanciful illustration of the farcical effect of the new rule, say Browne keeps Irish Terriers and Fox Browne keeps Irish Terriers and Fox Terriers, and assume that for the purpose of the application of the new rule Browne could be divided into two separate and independent parts. If he were to "cut, singe, etc.," his Irish Terriers with his right hand he would be wrong, whereas, enforming the same preparations on his Fox Terriers with his left hand he would be right. Now if Browne was brought before the Fennel Club Committee they would have to suspend the right half of Browne for faking his Irish Terriers and acouit the left half of Browne, although it did the same things to his Fox Terriers. And if the Kennel Club

and acouit the left half of Browne, although it did the same things to his Fox Terriers. And if the Kennel Club Committee saw the humor of the situation they might even oo so far as to praise the left half of Browne for having lived up to the new rule.

But there is yet another aspect to the question. All these breeds of Terriers are sporting dogs, and the length and quality of coat is of paramount importance in all of them. It must be supposed that "cutting, singeing, etc.," has been made penal in Section II. because it might deceive the judges and the public or deteriorate those breeds, or for both reasons, and does that not apply with as much force to the breeds in Section I.?

How the Kennel Club Committee armived at their conclusion is, and perhaps over will assent.

rived at their conclusion is, and per-haps ever will remain, a secret of their mental functions, but anybody having a knowledge of the dog world could see that their method of concould see that their method of consulting the Fancy was wrong. To take the vote of a general meeting of a special strib on such a matter as a ouide of the sense of its members is fallacious, and in proof thereof we need only draw attention to the letter from Mr. Geo. C. Anne, hon. secretary of the Wiré Fox Terrier Association, to which practically all the important breeders and exhibitors of wire-haired Fox Terriers belong. not see why Fox Tenfers and other breeds are not. It will cease to be a dog show. It will be for the best fighting dog, and any sort of three-cornered brute that can go to ground that will be entitled to everything. The

whole thing is ridiculous.

This should be engrossed, carefully framed and hung up in a conspicuous place in the committee room of the Kennel Club.

The chairman, Mr. Sidney Turner, who, in a palpable way, has all along thrown the weight of his position in the scales of favor of the field trial party, administered to Mr. Temple a distinct snub by saying he could not see any logic in that gentleman's observation. Of course, Mr. Temple cannot be held responsible for that. He simply carried to a logical conclusion the interference with the principle and purpose of dog shows which the Kennel Club Committee have initiated by allowing their field trials section to dictate conditions to the dog show comtate conditions to the dog show com-tate conditions to the dog show com-munity. If exhibitors of gundogs have to submit their dogs to a working test before gaining the title of "Champion," why should Sealyham Terriers not be why should Sealyham Terriers not be treated in the same way, and logically why not also all the other breeds of sporting Terriers? And to continue the logical sequence, why not Sheep-dogs, a breed used for important work, and for which trials are held all over the country ?

No doubt exhibitors and the field trialers can assist each other in their respective objects, but one section should never be allowed to domineer over the other. Until now the dog show people have, in many ways, done
