THE Canadian Kennel Club erave the indulgence of those members who have had their dogs recorded as champions since July 1, and have not received their cups. The contract with the jewellers having run out, considerable adjusting will be necessary, and it may be that tenders will have to be called for. Should this be necessary, English firms will be asked to figure, in which case several months will elapse before they can be sent out.

During the month of November will be held the dog show in connection

with the National Live Stock Exhibition in Toronto. This is an entirely new venture, really guaranteed, we understand, by private subscription, but with the approval and support of the City Council of Toronto. This city. from the doggy point of view, is probably the most favored in existence, in that two dog shows are held this year within ten weeks of each other, which, combined, offer prize money to the amount of nine thousand dollars, without calling for any risk, financial or otherwise, or demanding financial support from the dog men. This coming show aims to be just a little better than any already held, and everything points to its achieving its aim. It remains for the dog men to make this first show such a success that it will become an annual affair. The management may be counted on to leave nothing undone.

We feel more than a little pride in this our first birthday number, and we think our pride is pardonable. Kennel and Bench was undertaken one year ago with practically no knowledge or experience, and, we are quite free to confess, with considerable fear and doubt. That we made mistakes we know, but we look back with satisfaction at the many we avoided. Kennel and Bench set out in an attempt to reflect the dog world in Canada faithfully and without favor, to give a true account of things as they are, not, as is too common, to curry favor with any particular class, or to publish reports that are misleading on events or dogs. We have lost a few friends in doing so, made some enemies, but also made a host of friends, which compensate us for all the rest. There was no other course for us to pursue with self respect and none other was worth while. To do things was to make enemies, the only way to avoid them was to follow a course of uninteresting mediocrity and indecision. We have never acted

from personal feeling and have no ill will against anyone. We think our independent course has greatly strengthened the character of the dog world, both in that it is able to take criticism without feeling personally injured, and in the general increase in interest and numbers of its followers. Perhaps we take ourselves too seriously and are too optimistic, but they are good faults to pass on. In any case, this course has made our criticisms worth while and removed them from the altogether too common twaddle. The success of this little paper has been quite remarkable, but it is due, however, to anything but our own efforts; had it not been for our friends, nothing we could have done would have availed. They have stood by this paper through thick and thin, overlooked our faults and rewarded our efforts. To them we express our deepest appreciation, and ask them to continue their efforts to make Kennel and Bench what we hope it will some day be, the best kennel journal in America.

Sometimes it is impossible to escape a severe jar to our faith in dog men, or at least we must see that the highest standard of ethics is yet a long way from being attained. It seems that, without even any suspicion of dishonesty, deals are "put over" that give someone some advantage or suspicion of such which hurts the sport and is not playing the game. That such deals are often common or general knowledge before they come off and are quietly accepted by all, losers as well as winners, removes them from the plane of dishonesty, but still illustrate that there is plenty of room for improvement. That there exists frequently even a suspicion of admiration for those who work the trick does not improve matters. It is all very human, but not high grade. When an intending vendor communicates with a number of possible purchasers offering a dog for sale with the condition that,

if it does not win, some of the purchase money will be returned, and when, in addition, the judge's name has already been advertised before the offer, suspicion must naturally be cast over the whole transaction. It is probably most unfair to the judge, he cannot escape entirely free and in many cases gets an undeservedly bad reputation. It leads us to doubt the wis-

dom of allowing clubs to pick out specialist judges at all. How much better for the breed you fancy, and the game in general, to allow no suspicion to touch it.

CANADIAN KENNEL CLUB --- EXECUTIVE MEETING

A meeting of the Executive Committee of the Canadian Kennel Club was held in the offices of the club, 111½ Jarvis Street, Tuesday, September 30, at 8.30 p.m. There were present Messrs. Barron, Baldwin, McFarland, Nelles, Swann, Bain and Campbell. Mr. John G. Kent in the chair.

In the charge of White vs. Lewis, the secretary was instructed to ask Mr. Lewis for an affidavit concerning Truro Boy II. and for evidence on Lansdowne Venus.

In the charge of Overman vs. Jos. Laurin, the secretary was instructed to request Mr. Laurin to furnish an affidavit describing the bitch, Colne Lady Ballochroy, and setting forth his version of what is embodied in the correspondence, and that Mr. Overman be notified of the committee's action.

The rule re listing was referred to the Rules Committee.

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Moved by Mr. McFarland, seconded by Mr. Baldwin, that nothining be done as regards the Dominion Kennel Club until after the report of the Rules Committee.

A letter from Mr. Woodhouse was read to the committee protesting that his entry fee to Canadian National Exhibition should be returned as his dog was refused admission by the veterinary surgeon. The committee stated that there was no justification for Mr. Woodhouse's demands.

The secretary was instructed to write to Mrs. Lane under rule XXIII, for an explanation of her conduct during the Bull Terrier judging at the Canadian National Exhibition.

Moved by Col. Nelles, seconded by Dr. Campbell ,that the Canadian Kennel Club accept the offer of affiliation with Real Sociedad Central de Fomento de las Razas Caninas en Espana.

The committee sanctioned the removal of the club rooms to 774½ Yonge Street, at a rental of \$30 per month, same to include heating, lighting and telephone.

The Executive Committee decided that the Canadian Kennel Club has no jurisdiction in the matter of Mr. Johns vs. Kynoch.

The secretary was instructed to send a registered letter to Mr. Wm. Heaton, of Saanichton, B.C., requesting that he send evidence inside of thirty days in answer to the protest of Mr. Waterhouse, after which the matter will be dealt with. The secretary was also inistructed to write to the Show Committee of the Victoria City Kennel Club, asking them for evidence on which they base their decision.

A letter was read from Mr. Stroud and the secretary was instructed to notify him that the protest of Berry vs. Stroud could be re-opened by this committee only on presentation of evidence of new facts affecting the case.

Moved by Mr. Barron, seconded by Mr. Swann, that as Mr. V. B. Crothers, of Kingston, had not seen fit to answer the communications from this club referring to the non-registration of his dog at the Canadian National Exhibition of 1912, that the wins of his dogs at that show be cancelled.—Carried.

Dr. Campbell presented a letter from the Toy Dog Club suggesting changes in the breeds.

WHAT!

(From American Kennel Gazette, September, 1913).

The Secretary: After receiving a communication from Mr. C. Y. Ford, special delegate of the Canadian Kennel Club, I had an interview with him in which it transpired that his idea was that Canadian Kennel Clubs would be permitted to join the American Kennel Club in holding their shows, and hold them under both codes of rules, so that the Canadian Club would re-

cognize the American wins and the American Club would recognize the Canadian wins. He said these rules are practically identical; that although the wording may differ, their meaning is the same. It was also the case in nearly all of our amendments to the rules, and he cited the instance of the Toronto Club, which is the leading club of the Dominion of Canada, as being ready to become a member of the American Kennel Club if such a thing was possible.

The New Brunswick Kennel Club is having a show under C. K. C. rules on Oct. 29, 30 and 31. Dr. De Mund will act as all-rounder.

THESHOWS

THE OTTAWA KENNEL CLUB.

The Central Canada Exhibition, in connection with which was held the above show, was a wonderfully arranged and compact Exhibition. Most of the buildings are concrete and handsome, and the grounds are situated in an elbow of the Rideau canal, which makes a very beautiful site. If anything, it looks as if they were crowded for space and would have trouble in expanding. The crowds attending it were very large, as the weather couldn't have been better had it been ordered. The Dog Show building is well arranged and very clean, and everything was kept in the best of condition, reflecting great credit on the management. The building has been enlarged and good exercising yard supplied, but the lighting might be improved upon.

While we were there we strongly urged, and would like to emphasize again here the advisability of London and Ottawa dog shows coming to some reciprocal agreement as to the dates of their shows, with the object of avoiding a clash. We are extremely surprised at the short-sightedness of the Fair managements in not coming to some arrangement whereby the two shows would be held in two different weeks, the one following the other, and if the date right after Toronto Exhibition is the more favorable, each city could take it in turns. However, if this arrangement is not feasible, surely the dog shows could divide up the week, one show taking the first three days of the week, the other show the remaining three days, and the following year reversing the order. In this way we would have two good three day shows, both of them could easily be two points or better. The show having the first three days in the week would of necessity have to allow the dogs going to the second show off in time to catch the train to the other. This arrangement would not only help the shows, but the dog game. So important do we think this matter that we would like to have the management of the two shows communicate with each other and with us to see if some arrangement cannot be made at once for next year.

Ottawa is blessed with more and better real dog men than any town we know of, outside Toronto. In Bull

Terriers and Black and Tans they have remained supreme as breeders for many a year, and still have the men to keep them there. In American Foxhounds, also, they are very strong, and we have heard of so many who are either returning to the game or going in stronger that we predict an extraordinary revival in interest. The Ottawa Kennel Club is composed of the right sort of men, and we think under the guidance of Alderman Ainslee W. Greene they cannot go wrong. If they have any fault it is that they are too retiring and have not pushed themselves forward to the position they deserve in the game. Wake up, Ottawa; not that you are sleepy, but that you are not sufficiently wide awake.

In the big breeds there was a strikingly good entry of Great Danes, in fact, one of the best we have ever seen. The winning dog, Zebra of Sudbury, was one we missed in Toronto. He was in terribly bad condition ,due, of course, to his having just landed from an Atlantic trip; but a few weeks of feeding, grooming and open air exercise will put him in good shape. We think perhaps he is the biggest and most massive Great Dane we have ever seen. We can quite believe his owner, that he stands 36 inches, and he looks every inch of it. His head is enormous in length and looks perhaps at present a little coarse, but being an English dog, he is uncropped. If he is cropped and his ears stand properly, most of this coarseness will disappear ,and he will always have to be reckoned with. His front and bone are magnificent, his body good and his legs sound. We would prefer him without any brindle markings. We are fortunate in having such a stud dog in Canada. The removal of his owner to St. Thomas will be a great loss to Reserve winners went to Laurier, another good rangy Harlequin, a little straight in stifles but nice and fine in type. In bitches winners went to Geneva, a kennel mate of the winning dog. She is a grand Harlequin on very fine lines, though weak in hindquarters. She should produce some grand stuff, mated with Zebra. In fact, things look very bright for us in Canada in Harlequin Great Danes, and they are the greatest possible addition to any bench show. Reserve

winners went to Biddy, uncropped and a bit plain.

It was a good show also of Russian Wolfhounds. Mrs. Mathias being very well represented. Her white dog Alexander of Spring Farm that we reviewed last month, taking winners and a new one, Knave of Addlestone, getting reserve. In bitches Caerhysddu Ellka was in a class by herself. In bloodhounds a far better representative than we had in Toronto came out in Silton's Rover, a dog with a good front and grand foreface. American Foxhounds were wonderfully well represented, both in number and quality. Baldwin's Pattern being distinctly of the American type, and Baldwin's Gibson Girl, but we liked the dog best.

Mr. Hanna, with his usual generosity, sent up a full string of Irish Setters, otherwise the breed would not have been represented. They are a beautiful showy dog, and make an exhibition of themselves. In Cockers there was a good exhibit. In blacks, Mr. Armstrong had things pretty much to himself in Ch. Ottawa Don and Ottawa Iona, the reserve winning dog being Durbar, who loses in soundness. In the any other color section, novice went to Fritz, who is very coarse in skull and thick through the shoulders. Second, Sport, not in coat nor right type, having almost a Setter head. In limit, second was Duke, too fat, coat wants conditioning, not right in muzzle. In bitches, novice, Tricksy has a nice body, but is snipy and stands high. In limit, Welsh Queen, good body and nice front, but lacks depth of muzzle. - In open Cascade Sunset, what is left of a good bitch, spoilt by being shown grossly fat with falling coat which needed grooming, and she also shows age. In parti-colors limit dogs Wentworth Billy first Ottawa Oarsmen, too fat, coarse in skull and crooked in front. In open, Ch. Ottawa Romeo has a nice body and travels nicely, but lacks stop and is a bit big. Wentworth Billy is a better balanced dog and might have changed places with Romeo. In novice bitches, Ottawa Prudence II., an old black and tan, bad in front, off in muzzle, and not in show class. In limit bitches 1st was Rhona G., an extremely nice little roan, second Cascade Remah has a nice action but is high enough and large

enough. Rhona G also won open. In winners no injustice would have been done by placing Wentworth Billy first, but they were close together; but in bitches the decision was ridiculous, as Rhona G. was easily the best of the lot with a very wide margin between herself and the winner, Cascade Sunset, and the reserve winner, Welsh Queen.

The Collies were a really nice quality lot and good type, but all through they lacked substance and size. Collie breeders in Ottawa and Montreal district must remember that we are getting good big ones in Ontario and Winnipeg, and that they must increase the size in their stock if they expect to win in hot company. The pick of the lot in dogs was the home-bred Montreal dog Verdun Gordon, a dog with perfect ears, grand coat and color, beautiful skull; in fact hard to fault in anything but Second Wishaw Sparkle, a very nice tri-color, out of coat and very close to a prick ear. Seedley Scout, out of coat and light all over, good face, good front, good type. Puppy bitches were a fair lot of undeveloped puppies. Glendale Queen, the best of the lot, went through to winners; second, Otterburn Dearest, walked badly behind and is out of coat. Reserve winners Seedley Solace, a really good one with good front, but too fine all over. A very good Dalmation was shown in Bob, good size and type and very clean inmarkings, lacking only in uniformity of size and of spots. The quality and number of this breed was very strong all through. BULLDOGS were not numerous, but a few very excellent ones were shown, winners dogs Royal Albert, who seems to be improving to us, and is unquestionably one of our best lightweights, a dark brindle with a short well reached body, good spring of rib, absolutely sound, well wrinkled skull of good shape, ideal expression, perfect ears, wide, well turned up underjaw, good lay back and good width of foreface. His foreface and underjaw might be a trifle longer, but he is a dog that would take stopping anywhere and would be a nice one to send to New York to represent a team of Canadian Bulldogs. He won comfortably. Worsley Costermonger was better than the winner in shoulder, bone and lowness to ground; but loses a little bit everywhere else. On this occasion he was extremely lame in front, undoubtedly due to some accident. In bitches Layham Pride got winners, always a good one and looking fit with only her one fault, which we have mentioned before. Reserve winners was Totara's Daughter, just a little too much daylight under her, but sound, good rib, short body, wonderful underjaw, good length of skull and good ears. Driazel Queen, a nice little brindle bitch, but should not have been shown, as she was suffering from a serious accident.

Of course Ottawa's nick names are Bye Town and Bull Terrier town, so Bull Terriers were well represented. First in puppy dogs, Tinker has a good straight front, but is too heavily marked. Rex II., good face and big bone, but not the best of shoulder and ring shy. First novice Epsom Gamey, lots of size and bone, good front but long enough in body and too strong in skull. The winners dog was the Toronto winner, Epsom Confidence. like him all over, but must say we are doubtful if he will last. At present he is a very taking dog, perhaps a little doubtful in front, but a grand shower, and well shown as only an expert can put them down. Reserve winners, Knoch-Na-Chree Leader. He has a good eye, grand bone, legs and feet. In fact he has improved in body and bone, good mover but shows shoulder and is going strong in skull. In bitches Glenedyth Queen, purchased by Mr. R. H. Elliott from the Glenedyth Kennels at the Toronto Exhibition, took winners. She has a beautiful head which will last and a muzzle strong where you want it strong; bad tail, and not the best of fronts. Haymarket Empress is a very nice bitch, with bad shoulders. She has been bred to Noross Patrician, and some of her puppies should make a stir in the world.

AIREDALE Terriers were not strong in numbers. The winning dog, Rockley Dark Saint, is all a Terrier, but not level in the mouth. Colne Express Order is a good bodied dog and good bone, nice type of head and fair coat, but is little loose in elbow, and toes in. Buster Briar is grand front, legs, feet and foreface, his ears might be smaller and the peak of the skull is altogether too prominent. In bitches Rockley Logical Point and Silver Birch Queen are both really good typical terriers. Logical Point is extra good in body and coat and the cleaner all through. Silver Birch Queen is a bit big in ear.

BOSTON TERRIERS. The entry was strong, both in numbers and quality. In novice dogs Cliffside Vance, good body, nice color, a bit weak before the eyes and a bad shower. Auburn Nemo, a nice square headed dog in poor condition. Prince George was too fat. The winning dog, Blondy Hooker, has a nice body, short face, beautiful shower, good legs and feet. Rexonian's Kid, a splashed body, with nice head markings, nice type on terrier lines, but shown too light. The winning bitch was the Toronto winner, Madame Sherry. She is a little beauty, with a grand head muzzle, eye and expression, good body, shown too light. Her tail, though held gayly, is short, turns downwards at the point and the judge expresses his opinion that this is not a true gay tail. Reserve winners was Cliffside Corby, beautiful body, a little round in skull and shows wrinkle, shown in

FOX TERRIERS brought out a very nice puppy in Black and White which went through to winners. A good clean head and shoulders, good and feet, nice expression, a bit long cast. Oxspring Orion was shown too light in flesh, nice round bone, good front, nice eye, wants time to furnish, but is young and will make a good one and should beat the winner. Danby Rakeoff, nice shower, but fat, Clapton Varnisher, a nice working terrier, but out of proportion and out in front and fat. In bitches winners went to Wharncliffe Gracie, an extremely promising puppy, shown light. She has subsequently been bought by the judge. Reserve winners, Firefly loses in head and ear carriage. In Wires Mr. Moore showed his puppy Donnington Round Up a shade long in back, a bit plain in expression, good coat and front, nice length of head. The winner, Hawes Broom, has a long head and face, good muzzle, eye and expression, ear none too small, but well carried, loose in elbow, not a mover. In bitches Donnington Blossom went from novice to winners, grand body, perfect coat and a free mover, shows a bit too much foot on the ground, feet would be better for trimming, fair length of head, could do with better eye. Reserve Donnington Lady, a nicely made little bitch, loses in front of the eye.

IRISH TERRIERS were pretty strong in quality and fair in numbers. In puppies Armagh Demon; good color, nice type, coat, bone and front. The winning novice dog, Danny Bedad, a real good dog, small ears, grand front, tail a bit low, was very sick and would not show. In bitches Wainut Colleen, the Toronto winner repeated, closely followed by Drumclamph Brenda, a very taking bitch that we always liked, though she is a bit big in eye.

In SCOTTISH TERRIERS Drumclamph Ruffian winners is full, big, but has a splendid head. The winning bitch, York Scotch Highball, did not show well and Baughfell Jill is not straight in front. In BLACK and TANS, we had F. C. McLean's usual beautiful exhibit of Willowdale dogs.

In POMERANIANS, Mrs. Gruenwald had the competition to herself.

In TOY POODLES Wee girl is a very high class specimen, though a bit long in body. MALTESE TERRIERS also brought out a superior lot.

The final judgment for best in the show went to the Bull Terrier, Epsom Confidence, though he was closely pushed by Mr. Mill's Bulldog Royal Albert. We ourselves think that as the Bulldog is at a stage where he cannot go off, and the Bull Terrier has yet to prove himself a laster, the latter was lucky.

ORANGEVILLE DOG SHOW.

Considering it was their first attempt and that the facilities for holding a dog show at a country fair are limited, Orangeville has every reason to congratulate itself on a success. The fair itself was the usual country fair, with a building in which to exhibit works of art, including culinary, that farmers wives are so famous for, the cattle tied around to the fence, and a race track. We often wonder what a fair like this would be on a rainy day, but as all the shows this autumn have been blessed with perfect weather we were not allowed to test the experiment. The attendance of the fair was evidently confined to Friday afternoon, but we think the whole country must have turned out on that afternoon, the grounds were packed, and as for the dog show, it unquestionably proved the strongest attraction of the day. The dogs themselves were fastened to rings in a covered space under the grandstand, which proved a very satisfactory way as far as the benching of the dogs was concerned, but as the small space for the onlookers was very narrow and confined, it was jammed to suffocation during the whole show. While the judging was going on frequent intervals had to be allowed to let exhibitors fight their way to their dogs and back again. However, there was lots of time and everything got through splendidly. The interest and attention of the crowd, both in the dogs and the judging, is a convincing argument towards our contention that few attempts such as these towards the education of the farming community would soon stir up a surprising amount of interest, with the result that dog breeding and dog showing would in a short time be on much broader lines than those we at present experience, and narrowness seems to be our worst fault, and a handicap that we cannot too soon throw off. We cannot give too much credit to Mr. Bingham, of Orangeville, and Mr. Berwick, of Shelburne, to whom the origination, working up and carrying out of this show is due, and the experience of this year we feel sure was so satisfactory to them and the Dufferin County Agricultural Society that they can hardly fail to repeat the event next year on a larger and better scale.

Naturally the number of dogs were not great, but the quality was splendid and those fanciers from Toronto and elsewhere who, for the pure sport of the game, gave up their time at considerable expense to travel up to Orangeville, are deserving of the greatest credit. We wish particularly to thank those gentlemen who sacrificed everything to go up and judge at the show for theirs was pure philanthrophy, still this shows what a good sort our dog men are. They were Chas. Lynden, J. T. Reeves, Lance Farewell, G. R. Farquharson, and Fred Williams, and Dr. Campbell to look after the veterinary affairs and the whippet races.

In Cocker Spaniels Mr. Hitchman showed a fair specimen in Roger. In Collies the winning dog was Wishaw Sparkle, a tri-color with beautiful ears, nice head, fair type of body, but not in coat. Reserve winners Ormskirk Oberon, whom the judge put down for his bad action. In addition to this his coat was staring, but otherwise he is a beautiful dog with a lovely head, ears, profuse coat and good size. Bitches were weaker than the dogs, lacking substance and size. The winning bitch being Glendale Queen, the reserve Otterburn Delight.

In BULLDOGS first puppy Cheetham Marquis, one that is improving and will be a good one some day. Second Jewel James, a very creditable dog with lots of substance. Novice went to Jewel James. In limit Iron Chancellor took first, a cracking good heavyweight, white, with remarkably short shapely body, well sprung rib, long, well shaped skull, small well carried ears. He still lacks a little finish and is tight in shoulder, but age will cure the former, and perhaps the latter, but he will always have to be counted upon. Second was Good Shot, who does not seem to improve on a closer acquaintance. He has a nice head and good front, but is very hollow just behind the shoulder. Third Jewel James. In open heavyweights Ch. Cheetham Squire took first and eventually winners. He is in splendid shape and all a Bulldog, though not as neat or compact as the reserve winner Homewood Jumbo. We have heard this dog at this show and on previous occasions criticized as unsound. There may have been a slight excuse for this when he first appeared in Canada, but unsound to-day he is not, not even to the extent of a suspicion. Bulldog men should know that a Bulldog must show some pastern and spread of feet. Jumbo's foreleg is quite straight and standing or walking he shows no weakness either in formation or strength. He is in fact an extremely active dog, and if he puts on a few more pounds can go anywhere with confidence. In bitches puppies Cheetham's Daughter first, the winning puppy at the Exhibition and a good one. Second, Cheetham's Duchess, a fine big substance bitch and going the right way. Third Princess Ruby. Novice bitches was a repeat of the puppy class, except that Baby Nellie won third, In lightweights Little Diamond won and took winners. She is a choice little one, and we can only repeat that if ten pounds heavier we do not know where we could find her match. Reserve winners Worsley Candida, a sterling heavyweight with her one fault her hat rack. Second in open lightweights was Lady Valeria, a really good fawn smut, only beaten by two good ones.

In BOSTON TERRIERS only one came out in a local bitch named Mary, hardly up to show standard. In AIRE-DALES junjor, novice and reserve winners went to Walnut Crusader, a good long headed dog, a little bit

houndy. Winners Dalmahoy King, a dog with a cracking good coat, good body, good front, but a bit plain in the head, though a bit of whisker would greatly improve this. Mooreside Rock was put third because of his coat, but we cannot see how such a sterling terrier could be placed so low in this company. Winners bitches went to Swale Lady, not too good in color, but outside of that a very superior bitch. Reserve winners went to Bonnie Vic, whose coat alone, though untrimmed, would make her worth considering in any company. She also has a nice body, though a bit plain in head for a show bitch. She also won the Mowat special for the best coat, defeating Betty Marvel, another very valuable, good coated brood bitch. These two gentlemen, Messrs. Bingham and Mowat, cannot do better than hold on to these two sterling bitches and breed them to some good dogs. We had the pleasure of seeing two of the finest Airedale puppies with magnificent coats, out of Bonnie Vic by Ch. Graystone Growler, who will make their bow at the National Live Stock Shown in November.

FOX TERRIERS brought out the two Sabine dogs Ringgold and Racer, placed in that order, the former winning chiefly on size. In novice bitches a local bitch, Tricksy, was shown, but she is not a show specimen. Winners bitch went to the beautiful little Sabine Finery. In Wire Haired dogs a puppy named Kelly was shown; also not a show specimen. Winners went to Hawes Broom, described already at Ottawa Show.

In IRISH TERRIERS the Quarrywood brace, Commander and Duchess, gave a good illustration of the breed. Walnut Colleen reserve winners is better in size than the winner, but is not so typically Irish. In YORKSHIRE TERRIERS there was an exhibition, thanks to Mrs. Weldon, of Galt, that would not disgrace our Exhibition. Winners went to that beautiful little bitch Edna of Roundlay, beautiful in coat and color. Kitty of Galt, another good one, losing in coat, and Prince third, losing in color and size. TOY POODLES Reta Boy alone, but would have won in strong company. IN PUGS the well-known little black Dine took winners. Her owner Mr. George Hamann is a good illustration of determination, for missing his train at Toronto he took an automobile to Orangeville, a sixty mile drive, rather than have his dog absent.

In PEKINGESE Spaniel we had our two well-known Wee Chinee and Marr's Wee Wee, the former winning. They were a show in themselves. Wee Chinee being smaller and the better color.

After the judging of the dogs there were several heats of whippet racing, and also a race of a whippet against a horse. These races were very satisfactorily run off and caused immense excitement to the spectators. We regret we have not been furnished with a list of the winners.

LONDON DOG SHOW.

With a slightly reduced entry from last year, which was made up largely by the quality of the dogs present, a big attendance and the best of weather, the London Canine Association pulled off another successful event, dating from Sept. 9 to 12.

Mr. James Mortimer judged all breeds. The ring stewards were attentive to their duties and those to whom fell the duty of tacking cards up once more excelled themselves, and we had the unique experience of being faced by the prize cards up in their places on our return from the judging ring.

Amongst the 'old guard'' on deck we noticed Dr. Niven acting as ring steward, Col. R. McEwen ''full of promises for next year,'' whilst Uncle Billy McNeil ran over to see that none of the visitors were being neglected.

Toronto was, as usual, strongly represented. Messrs. Kenyon, Ward, Harlowe, Atkinson, Wood, Roberts, Marr and Taylor. Bert Swann was there with a string of twenty dogs, and accounted for his usual share of the spoils.

The Dogs.

One Bloodhound in the well-known Peter Pan, who looked well.

The least said of the St. Bernards the better, as all the firsts were withheld in this breed. Borzois Ivan Turgenoff, shown too rough, was easily the best dog. Doloe, the winning bitch, good size and coat, coarse in head properties. Leelka is too small.

Collies were easily one of the best collections in the show. Bedford Dandy, a sweet tri-color, easily leading in puppy and novice. He lacks substance. Otterburn Dandy, 2nd puppy, a big well-grown one for eight months, good body, coat, bone. His long head is too coarse and one ear could be improved. Riverdale Reward, 3rd novice, a big puppy, light in eye and bad tail earriage. Limit dogs, Imna Imprudence, seen out at Toronto, won. He was short of coat and looked light, which made Auchdoyne Sable Prince press him uncomfortably. This is a very big, handsome, long-headed sable and white, in good bloom. His head just lacks class and his hind action is none too free. Open dogs. The tri-color Imna Selected, easily led, followed by Ormskirk Oberon, who looked well. A. S. Prince running 3rd. Bitches, Holdrood Daisy, 1st novice, a big, strapping bitch with lots of quality. She is coarse enough in skull and her ears are not carried even. Bedford Splendour, 2nd, just a year old and well grown, too light in bone and skull broad enough. Imna Shrine, 1st limit, 1st open and winners, a quality bitch who showed opproaching maternal duties and was out of coat.

Bulldogs, a good show in themselves. Puppies, Good Shot, seen at Toronto. easily led. King Billie, 2nd, a real good headed voungster, tall enough on leg and tight in shoulder. Novice Good Shot again 1st, followed by the dark brindle, Ch. John Jaundice, King Billy 3rd. Limit dogs, any weight, was very hot, and after the usual scramble, Tom Sawyer, Homewood Jumbo, Moston Marshall and Good Shot were left in and after a long scrutiny were placed as written. The winner, a big heavyweight fawn, with lots of substance and in the pink of condition, was lucky. He scored in ribs only over the 2nd, and lost in shortness of face, placement of shoulder, wrinkle and expression, neither did he show or move as well as Jumbo; in fact, instead of the handler showing the dog in the case of Tom Sawyer, the dog was showing the handler, and made a good job of his task. Moston Marshall, 3rd, retrieved his defeat at Toronto by defeating Good Shot and rightly so.

Bitches, puppy, 1st, Uxbridge Midget, quite a fair sort, good in ribs and shoulder and skull, could be improved in underjaw and face lacks finish. Limit and open, Little Diamond, looking well, took winners, followed by Lady Valeria and Worsley Candida in the order named.

Airedales. Puppy, 1st, Trump, a long-faced, great boned puppy, won. He fails in coat. 2nd Crackshot, a son

of Ch. King Nobbler, fair head, beautiful dark eye, he is too small and was put down rough. 3rd, Rosseau, a very big puppy with good body properties, too short in head. Novice dogs, Moorside Rock won and afterwards winners prize and breed special. A real classy terrier of medium size. He could be darker in eye and firmer in shoulder to be hyper-critical. But he will always be there or thereabouts and the worst fault he has is that we do not own him. Limit dogs, 1st, Caerphilly Marvel, the old dog looked well, 2nd, Caerphilly Oorang, a big dog with hard coat and fair tan. His long head is not the type and he could be improved in feet. Lots of style. Swale Lady easily led in bitches. Danby Graceful, reserve winners, a good bodied sort, fails in head properties.

Bull Terriers. Inferno-You-Know, 1st puppy, novice and reserve winners, a real good puppy with size and quality. Inferno You-Don't-Know, not so well grown or developed, but a good sort. Inferno Buster, 1st limit, open and winners, is well known and his condition is on the up-grade. Stipendiary, 2nd limit and open, a read good bodied dog, short enough in head and heavy in shoulder. Princess Patricia easily led in bitches and took breed special. She looked well, and is a shower. Princess Nordica, reserve winners, owes her position to the fact that Inferno Queen utterly refused to show herself, the latter a real good bitch, beats Nordica before the eyes and loses nowhere.

Fox Terriers were good classes. Limit dogs saw the first real competition. The white dog, Sabine Ringold, looking well, easily followed by Madison Mascot, a wonderful headed dog, with good eye and splendid neck properties. He fails in shortness and shape of body, and for this reason we preferred Madison Magnet, who looked well and whose qualities are well known. Sabine Racer, reserve. Bitches, Princess Pat, in the hands of Mrs. Westbury, showed well, beating Sabine Finery a little in substance, but losing in quality all over.

Wires. Regal Boy, a real nice puppy ran to reserve winners, appears somewhat low on the leg. Professor King, 2nd puppy, lots of style, good coat, fails in head. Oxspring Outlaw wants time to make up a fair sort. Regal Boy, 1st and winners, a good-headed dog, full up to size and positively the worst front and shoulders we ever saw, receives the white ribbon. Regal Queen, 1st in bitch puppies, too short in head. Rolston Pansy we liked very much, a good headed one with extra body properties, she failed in coat only to Lynfield Jesica, who took winners and breed special.

Irish Terriers. The Quarrywood brace, looking well, enjoyed a bloodless victory.

Scottish Terriers, with Avondale Roisterer absent, were only fair.

White West Highlands, with an entry of four, easily led by Jersey Lily, a grand bitch, a bit short in head.

Bedlington's, Haslingden Pride won from a solitary opponent in Woodley Blue Bird.

Yorkshire Terriers. It was a case of Edna of Roundbay 1st, and the rest off the map.

Toy Poodles. First, a grand dog all over and won easily; 2nd, same type, not in the same condition; 3rd lost in length of body.

English Toy Spaniels, only one, Kaffir Chief II., just fair.

Whippets were quite a nice show. Jonny winning easily from Pansy, a fawn and white on the coarse side.

English Foxhounds were good, though not numerous. Bugler 1st and winners. He is very symmetrical with nice ear carriage. Spot, not so good, was second. Novice and open bitches, Comely 1st and winners. She had nothing against her so has one point to her credit for the title.

American Foxhounds, Shaver, much better built, won from a rather common looking one named Captain. Valley Kennel Tom has good bone and well built, might have gone up in his class. Bitches, Nellie, another wellbuilt, with plenty of bone, was 1st in novice. Limit and open, Duchess, 1st and winners, was well shown.

Harriers, Lady, 1st, should have been in the Foxhound class, she would have won out, a splendid-looking one, Echo, also too big.

English Setters, London, went from novice to limit open and winners. He is well put together and nice action, Dash, reserce winners, he is rather on the small side. Novice bitches had two, splendid heads, but too small and very timid, would not show, in limit class the same two with Fannie Thiers. She is very symmetrical and winning easily.

Irish Setters, two were all this breed turned out. Cory Law and Pixie Law. Pointers were absent. Beagles had a few to select from, a big falling off from last year, however. Mr. Smith had nice ones in Spider and Princess, and they should do a lot of winning.

Boston Terriers. In dogs, Revelo got winners, amber eye, good color and markings, bit cheeky, good type, wins in color. Reserve winners, Gordon Delhi, a steel brindle, long in body. In bitches, winners, Kenilworth Miss Pauline, clean nice head, good fect and legs, might be shorter, little pendulant in lip, outside of that she is a cracker. Reserve, Bellrose Girlie, good heavyweight, almost solid black. Sparkling Beauty, out of condition or she might have been reserve.

ROCHESTER SHOW.

We in Toronto are much puffed up over the beauties of our city, its parks, streets and surroundings, but beside Rochester our city, in beauty, is but a back yard. We never saw such grand parks so beautifully laid out and planted. The people in Rochester also have some idea of keeping their lawns and gardens in beautiful order, aul each house is in a little park of its own. Of course, we refer to its best districts, such as East Avenue. Rochester has the advantage of us in climate, for it is in the same belt as our Niagara fruit district, and while our trees are almost leafless and our flowers dead, there we saw even roses in bloom, and only the first touch of autumn. For its size Rochester must have twice as much park as we have and infinitely better kept. But in architecture the reverse is the case, perhaps it is due to a large preponderance of wooden houses but there is a general air of gingerbread structure so distasteful to us, and an almost absence of substantialness that we are accustomed to. The situation of Rochester, with its stately Genesee valley, its Erie canal and rolling country is extremely beautiful, but has no advantage over us.

But when it comes to dogs, they are in the novice class, and away off in the letter division at that, as compared with Toronto. Every time we go away from home we come back with a greater swelled head and more satisfied with our own town. Toronto has more real dog men to the square inch than Rochester has to the mile. You are never safe in going down any main street here with a dog without some

stranger stopping to tell you what a mutt or flier you have, and they often give you good reasons for their opinion. Most of the dog men in Rochester are hazy as to the points of their own breed. However, we must make excuses for them, we have had an annual show and many small ones for years back, and our English antecedents naturally inclines us to sports. The show was a very nice little one of something less than two hundred dogs, extremely well benched, and held in a tent. But the flies! Certainly more should have been done towards cleaning up. The show in a good many places, such as the unfinished writing up of judges' books, show that more help was needed, for, as usual, only one or two did the work. Miss Lamouree, as treasurer, worked every minute, and the show owed a great deal to her shrewd business capacity, and Mr. Buck worked hard and long. The experience of this year should make things run perfectly next year. It was well that our Canadian contingent went over, otherwise the quality in many classes would have been left to one or two handlers; as it was, however, the quality of the show was high and the competition interesting. We were well represented by Mr. Maroney, Mr. Fred Smith, Mr. Chas. Lyndon, the all-round judge, Mr. Swann and Mr. Bamford, with their strings of dogs.

The big breeds were entirely absent, with the exception of two really fine Scottish Deerhounds, something absent from our shows for some years. These were Midlothian Medalist and Maida of St. Helios.

Pointers was won by Spahn's Hops, a nice black and white quality dog, with markings not unlike a Dalmatian, wants more substance; our Canadian representative, Beech Grove Ben, a bit coarse, more on field type. In bitches an uncatalogued one, a good liver and white one, wants foreface. Maizette, better than winner, being bigger, but loses on the day, being out of condition, having recently whelped.

Two good English Setters were up in Meadowview Revel and Maplehurst Harriette, the other exhibit not being a show specimen.

In Gordon Setters, Mrs. Shannon showed a beautiful lot, but not for competition.

In Irish Setters Canada cleaned up with Judge Law in dogs, and Anna Law in bitches, the latter wants more foreface. Cockers were not in our class. It was a wonder some of our breeders did not go over and clean up some easy money, but our Cocker breeders lack ambition.

Dachshunds were represented by a good pair of Mrs. Hungerford's.

In Collies we are not sure of the placing, but think the blue merle, Master Blue Boy, won, if so, he was lucky, as we prefer Wishaw Sparkle, whose faults are that he was out of coat and is a bit high in ears. Tazewell Basco, not in condition, or would have won, good quality, carries one ear high at times, weak behind. Pansy is big and coarse. In bitches, Ch. Oak Hill Bloom won, but should have been beaten by Seedley Sonsie, who is a big one, good in foreface and coat, but plain in skull and lacks life.

Three dogs that one would shoot at sight if met in our woods and claim the wolf bounty were shown as German Sheep Dogs. A real good O. E. Sheepdog came out in Sandy Point Stylish Boy, and three good Chows were shown.

In Bulldogs it was Canada only, the others were spurious imitations. Homewood Jumbo, in dogs, had two very poor ones to beat, and Good Shot, and did it easily, also got reserve in specials for best dog in show, any breed.

Good Shot looked listless and wants a rest, he sagged very much behind the shoulders. In bitches, Candida won, we think rightly, for she is a very high-grade bitch, barring her rudder, which might also be termed a flagpole or a hat rack. She was followed by Little Diamond, a sweet little dark brindle, but on this occasion a little doubtful in ear carriage. The good fawn Lady Valeria was a very close third.

In Airedales, Caerphilly Oorang, from our own P. Bawden, was lucky to get reserve winners, he has a very long head, good ears, is a good shower, with good color and fair coat. His eyes are placed wrong, which gives him a queer expression and we do not like his body, legs or feet. He would look better if he grows some whisker. Winners was Scamp Rock Oorang, a bad shower, with a grand front, good skull and good size. Bothwell Builder was too small, loose in front, not too good in coat. The winning bitch, Bothwell Folly, is a good one everywhere except she is houndy in head. Fanny Genee, small, with a grand eye. Rockley Prescription is very stylish, but carries her ears too forward.

In Bulldogs winners went to Victor Lavendear and reserve to Inferno Buster, both from Toronto. Victor won on his grand body and front. Buster is proving a good laster. Victor eventually defeated the famous bitch, Ch. Lovey Mary, for best of the breed.

Boston Terriers complimented Mr. Quaiffe by much the largest entry of any breed in the show. The winner was Cricket K., and our own Ch. Wampagne Prince reserve.

In Fox Terriers again our Sabine Ringgold won, defeating his Toronto conqueror, Niola Reserve, who is too big. In bitches, Niola Faith won, good body and bone, splendid hindquarters, heavy in shoulder and could be better in face. Peg O' My Heart, reserve, a grand tan marked one, good neck, shoulders, legs and feet, but big enough.

In Wires a good one in Leed's Line-Up, followed closely by Hawes Broom, Round-Up, with his splendid head, winning the puppy. In bitches Donnington Blossom wins on shortness of body and coat, wanted trimming.

Irish Terriers found the judge napping, for the winning dog, Leeds Brannon, outside of his color, is very common and the worst in his breed. Reserve was Quarrywood Commander. Bitches, we think, were placed exactly opposite to correctly. We prefer Clover Hill Nooriddeen, if she is out of condition, and a bit big, and would put Quarrywood Duchess next, and the winner, Irish Rose, last, as she has little to recommend her but her size.

In Scotties the quality was grand, Ch. Fox Hills Symbol, if lacking extreme length of head and foreface, has everything else that goes to make a topper, he was shown very fit and got special for best in show any breed. Avondale Roisterer was a good third. Albourne Eclipse, a grand headed one, loses to winner in body.

In White West Highlanders our Cobourg bitch, Jersey Lily, was easily best with her grand coat.

In Toys there was a grand show, Rochester being the home of Mrs. Lamouree's Celamos. The Blenheim Windfalla is a marvel in head and skull, might be smaller. The same kennels shown a grand King in Baron, and a Ruby in Red Beau.

In the balance of the Toys Canada was well upheld by Marr's Wee Chinee in the Pekes, and by the Yorkshire, Edna of Roundbay.

VANCOUVER EXHIBITION.

The Dog Show held at the Vancouver Exhibition was by far the best, show held during the history of the Exhibition. The new building in which it was held would be hard to improve upon, being large, lofty and well ventilated. The Exhibition Association appointed Mr. E. G. Rolston as director in charge of the dog show, which was appreciated by all fanciers. He took a great interest in the show, the result being the building was beautifully decorated, benching arranged well and every dog was comfortably benched. Mr. E. J. Parish was superintendent and worked hard. He was ably assited by Mr. J. E. Owen. These two gentlemen are well known among the fanciers, Mr. Parish owning the well-known Bull Terrier Ch. Dorian Grey, while Mr. Owen owns several well-known English Setters. Too much credit cannot be given these gentlemen for the manner in which they handled the show; the building was kept nice and clean throughout the show-in fact it was spotless. Dr. Hoggan looked after the dogs' health to the satisfaction of every one.

Bailie Dalgleish came a long way to judge the dogs and gave universal satisfaction; in fact, we can recommend him to all who want a reliable all-round judge.

He took his time and went over every dog in a thorough painstaking manner, which was much appreciated by all. In some breeds he was disappointed, and in other classes he was surprised at the quality of the exhibits; but taking the show on the whole he said the specimens were a very fair lot.

The many specials were awarded as follows: F. W. Welsh's cup for the best Fox Terrier, smooth or wire, went to Ch Coat's Lady O'Rustem, owned by W. M. Coats; Dr. T. Glendon Moody's cup for best Boston in limit class went to Mrs. Wm. Wheeler, of Ed-Alberta, Bulrock Peaches monton, winning best dog or bitch in limit classes; Ross Welsh, of Bellingham, Wash., cup for best Boston Terrier in show was won by Dr. T. Glendon Moody's Ch. Wampagne Delight; Edward gold cup for best Collie went to J. J. Jackson's Seedly Smile; Edward gold cup for best French Bull over 22 lbs. went to R. F. Winch's Carpentier; The Wilcox Art Glass Studio, for best Red Cocker in shown went to J. Hodson's Pacific Red Irne; Frank D. Elkin's cup for best limit Bull bitch went to Madame De Rosa, owned by Jas. Berwick, of Victoria; G. A. Lattimore special for best Fox Terrier red marked went to Mrs. A. McConnell's Madrone Driver; the Exhibition Association silver medal for best Bull Terrier went to Mr. R. G. Wagner's Ch. Edgecoat Colin; the Exhibition Association bronze for best in opposite sex went to P. Tibble's Miss Cheeky; Association medal for best Setter pup went to Mr. Winch's Cheshire Pache; Association medal for best Airedale went to H. L. Cocksedge's Roughan Critic.

Russian Wolf Hound classes had six entries. Mrs. A. D. McRae's Volga proved to be the judge's choice; Miss Margaret McRae's Petrol second; Mrs. Margaret McRae's Boris third. Miss Blanch McRae's Secha and Miss Lucille McRae's Irma were right up with the winners. In Greyhounds Mrs. Capt. Geddes' Bobs Kitchner won everything. Bobs is a hard one to beat. Pointers were not a large entry. Charles May, of Edmonton, Alberta, sent his Pointer Crusoe down, and cleaned up all the Pointer specials from best in limit to best Pointer in show. Setters were also a good class. Geo. Brown, of Edmonton, Alberta, sent down a brace. His dog Ch. Golden Rule went through to winners, and was also the judge's choice for the special best Setter, dog or bitch, in the show. Ross Welch, of Bellingham, Washington, went through to winners with Madame Malwyda; Mr. Brown's Ch. Victoria was reserve winners. Mr. Winch showed a very nice puppy in Cheshire Pache, which caught the judge's eye and carried off the blue ribbon. Harry Nash, of Edmonton, won everything in Irish Water Spaniels, with Ballywater Mike. Eight American Fox Hounds were benched by Mr. A. L. Hawthorne. They were all good looking hounds. Dalmatious were a good lot. Ch. Alandale Liverpill met his Waterloo when the judge put his kennel mate Checkers over him. Both dogs are owned by Adam Hicks. His bitch Queen also went through to winners. Collies were a small entry. Ch. Southport Shoreman was the best among the dogs going through to winners. Shoreman looked well and is proving a good laster; Mr. McLaughlin says he is having wonderful success with Shoreman in the stud. Seedley Smile prov-

ed the pick of the bitches by a wide margin. Mr. J. J. Jackson would never have sold Ch. Seedley Sonsie, only Seedly Smile looked so promising that he felt sure she would uphold his kennel's good name. She won special for best Collie, also was reserve for champion dog or bitch in the show. Airedales were not so strong in numbers as other shows. Mrs. C. C. Scott, of North Vancouver, showed a nice pup in Capilano Chinook that won and also reserve winners, H. L. Cocksedge's Rougham Critic was shown in a much improved form and looked a lot better than he did at the last show. He had a walk-over, going through to winners, and also secured one of the C.K.C. medals for one of the best six of all breeds in the show. Mrs. C. C. Scott's Killarney May was much the best Airedale in bitches, and had no trouble going through to winners. Mrs. Scott also secured reserve winners with Capilano Chileon, a daughter of the winners. W. C. Atkinson's Vancouver Beaut was placed second in the Novice class. In Irish Terriers Dr. Hoggan's Ch. Neta again proved the best, securing winners. Fleming's Peter, Pan won first novice; Mr. Maynor's Beaumont Snowstorm first limit in the bitches; Mr. E. Halliday's Etonian Bessie cleaned up all her classes and secured winners. English Bull Dogs were a large class. Ch. Silver Shekel, owned by D. A. Tweedie, was the pick of the dogs, and Mr. Frank Mahan, of Edmont, and Mr. Jas. Bewick, of Victoria, had the two best bitches. President Charles May, of the Edmonton Kennel Club, sent his pointer Cruso, and what Cruso did to the pointer class is past history. satisfied with this he went on and won fourth best dog in the show among all breeds. Among the other successful Edmonton exhibitors were Mr. Geo. Brown, who showed Ch. Golden Rule and Ch. Victoria, a nice brace of English Setters; Harry Nash, Irish Water Spaniel, Ballywater Mike; John Jerome, Fox Terricr, Broker Boy; Tom Evans, French Bull Josephine; Mr. A. Mackenzie, Skye Terrier Ch. The question of the origin of dog shows is always an interesting one, but I am sure that not every dog fancier is quite sure of that origin. Let us hear what the "Bazaar, Exchange and Mart'' says about it. With shows like those of the Kennel Club, Birmingham, and Cruft's, to say nothing of the various big specialist fixtures, it is difficult to conceive that the great dog show system was of very humble origin. As a matter of fact, it was born, as it were, in the murky atmosphere of the early Victorian public house. Most fanciers of the present day who know anything about shows and their origin would probably, if asked, be inclined to name Birmingham as the first show of any importance. Newcastle, how-

ever, had a snow prior to primingham. This took place on the 28th and 29th June, 1859. The former was restricted to Pointers and Setters, and the latter to "sporting dogs only." Nearly a quarter of a century previous to that dog shows were being held periodically in many public-houses in the West and other districts of London, and if I mistake not, the illustrated papers of the early fifties in the nineteenth century contain more than one picture of these functions held in the evening. One of the earliest show organizers was the renowned Charlie Aistrop, who was in business first at the Elephant and Castle, Peter Street, Westminster, and afterwards at the Eight Bells, Denmark Street, Soho. This was from 1834-36, and such shows may be rightly considered as the genesis of the great system which has spread throughout the length and breath of the land, as well as to countries other than our own.

The Swiss, Cesar de Saussure, who had written several letters about England under the first two Georges, says in one of them: "Some delight in the chase, some horses and dogs, others, gain, in card-playing and in winedrinking, and some others prefer science and study to any of these amusements, but whatever English people do, they never do half-heartedly, and they spare neither trouble nor expense in their enjoyment of sports or pastimes of any kind." This was written in 1728, and, of course, the same can be said about England of the present day. With regard to dogs, in accordance with the statistics published by the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, there were 1,756,277 licenses for dogs issued in England and Wales, and 126,728 licenses issues in Scotland in 1912; 50,-394 and 5,770, respectively, more than in 1911. If we compare the year 1912 with 1907, we find an increase of more than 116,000 in favor our 1912 for England and Wales. For Ireland we may add more than 500,000, and 250,000 for exemptions. In Paris there are two and a half times as many dogs to-day as thirty years ago, or, in figures, 70,-000 and 176,000 approximately. In France there are 3,725,973 dogs "paying licenses," or about 1,500,000 more than in 1872. Most of the dogs imported into France come from England, Belgium and Germany, and, of course, the largest part from the former country.

Mr. Neil Burr, of Detroit, has bought from Mr. R. Graham, Shettleston, a nice-looking sable Pomeranian puppy, and Mr. George Mausewood, of Nova Scotia, has bought from Mr. Malcolm Low, of Baillieston, a splendid black Whippet bitch, which participated at several coursings in this country.

Mr. Haines, of Pitsburg, has just bought from Mrs. Youlden the blue Great Dane dog, Blue Laddie, of Baskerville, by The Mayor of Baskerville.

The well-known Pomeranian dog, Glapton Nigger, has just been despatched to Canada by Mr. Leverton, but the exact destination is unknown.

The West Highland White Terrier, Dudswell Drynock, has been bought by Mrs. Mellon, of New York, from Mr. Auchtedlonie. also the daughter of that dog. Mr. Parsons, of Long Island, has bought from the same gentleman the Scottish Terrier, Swilcan Norman.

A Toronto fancier has just bought from Mrs. Williams, of Aberdare, the nice black Pomeranian, Aberdare Masterpiece.

Mr. Zena Jackson, of Chicago, has acquired from Mr. Kershaw the Bulldog, Crumpsall Actor.

Miss Grace and Miss Algers, of Long Island, have just purchased from Mrs. Brener-Brichze, of London, the wellknown Poodle, Ch. Monte Christo Abbe Faria, the property of Mr. Sydney Page.

The question of the origin of dog shows is always an interesting one, but I am sure that not every dog fancier is quite sure of that origin. Let us hear what the "Bazaar, Exchange and Mart" says about it. With shows like those of the Kennel Club, Birmingham, and Cruft's, to say nothing of the various big specialist fixtures, it is difficult to conceive that the great dog show system was of very humble ori-

ever, had a show prior to Birmingham. This took place on the 28th and 29th June, 1859. The former was restricted to Pointers and Setters, and the latter to "sporting dogs only." Nearly a quarter of a century previous to that dog shows were being held periodically in many public-houses in the West and other districts of London, and if I mistake not, the illustrated papers of the early fifties in the nineteenth century contain more than one picture of these functions held in the evening. One of the earliest show organizers was the renowned Charlie Aistrop, who was in business first at the Elephant and Castle, Peter Street, Westminster, and afterwards at the Eight Bells, Denmark Street, Soho. This was from 1834-36, and such shows may be rightly considered as the genesis of the great system which has spread throughout the length and breath of the land, as well as to countries other than our own.

The Swiss, Cesar de Saussure, who had written several letters about England under the first two Georges, says in one of them: "Some delight in the chase, some horses and dogs, others, gain, in card-playing and in winedrinking, and some others prefer science and study to any of these amusements, but whatever English people do, they never do half-heartedly, and they spare neither trouble nor expense in their enjoyment of sports or pastimes of any kind." This was written in 1728, and, of course, the same can be said about England of the present day. With regard to dogs, in accordance with the statistics published by the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, there were 1,756,277 licenses for dogs issued in England and Wales, and 126,728 licenses issues in Scotland in 1912; 50,-394 and 5,770, respectively, more than in 1911. If we compare the year 1912 with 1907, we find an increase of more than 116,000 in favor our 1912 for England and Wales. For Ireland we may add more than 500,000, and 250,000 for exemptions. In Paris there are two and a half times as many dogs to-day as thirty years ago, or, in figures, 70,-000 and 176,000 approximately. France there are 3,725,973 dogs "paying ligeness " or about 1 500 000 more Terrier dog, Inversilort Toiseach, by Balloch Bhan, out of Inversilort Speirrag, brother of Inversilort Roy. The dog is a winner and typical.

The Old English Sheepdog, Shepton Pleasure, has just been sent to Messrs. Tilley Bros. to British Columbia. Before sailing, the bitch was mated to Drummer Boy.

Mr. Cooper, of Hounslow, has just purchased from Messrs. Rennie Bros. a good Scottish Terrier bitch, and the nice young dog, Bow Green Laddie, which were shipped to Toronto on the 20th of September.

It seems that Edmonton, Canada, there is a nice stock of Samoyedes owned by Mrs. Chowne.

Mr. A. G. Cowley has just sent to Boston the winning Scottish Terrier dog, Albourne After Thought, accompanied by the Scottish Terrier bitch, Abertay Bombardier, in whelp to Albourne Scorcher.

The "Field" has just published the current number of the 'Greyhound Stud Book," from which it can be seen that coursing in the Old Country is as popular as ever. More than that, it is, as it seems, on the increase each year. In his prefatory report, Mr. W. F. Lamonby, the keeper of the above Stud Book, says that the current volume is bulkier than any of its thirty-one predecessors, owing to the total entries for the past year having been the second highest known. The 5,315 registrations entered are over 250 in excess of 1912, and only 450 fewer than in 1883, when the numbers were swollen by members anxious to comply with the new order for compulsory registration. We must also note the increase in the number of owners, which number in 1912 stood at more than in 1910. Two years ago the National Coursing Club decided to abolish those enclosed meetings which were but a miserable travesty of sport. In Ireland they seem to have made a lot of fuss about the new rule, which, however, had benficial effects, and new meetings, legitimate ones, are now taking place there. From Mr. Lamonby's report, however, we can see that certain practices prevail in Ireland which should be put down. Mr. Lamonby speaks in his report of the unblushing manufacture of false pedigrees, and the infringement of the law respecting substitution. One can easily imagine what sort of "sport" can be derived from such malpractices. Mr. Lamonby mentions a case of an old Greyhound dividing a stake under the name of a sapling, and reports of suspected breeding frauds were referred to the Irish sub-committee for full investigation. I must mention the following paragraph from the aforesaid Stud Book; "The secretary read two letters from gentlemen in County Tipperary, drawing attention to prevailing malpractices in the breeding of Greyhounds, substituting old dogs for puppies when running, and the like, as well as suggesting local methods for preventing and detecting frauds."

The seven sales of Greyhounds held at the Barbican, London, last season, gave a total of 11,652½ guineas for 518 lots, but a nice lot of saplings were sold for half a guinea (sic!). It is, therefore, very refreshing to mention that, at the sale of Mr. Hill-Wood's Greyhounds, in April last, Hung Well, the winner of the last Waterloo Cup, fetched 1,050 guineas, and Heavy Weapon, the winner in 1910, was sold for 525 guineas.

Mr. J. J. Jackson, of Edmonds, B.C., who has held the premier kennel of Collies in British Columbia for the past ten years, was the late owner of the above mentioned Collies. Smile also won special for best in show at Victoria, owned by a member of C. K. C., where she beat the Boston winner, Ch. Wampagne Delight, and a number of other topnotehers of different breeds. Dr. Pettit's dogs will be shown at Denver and Eastern shows.

WINNIPEG NOTES.

Winnipeg did not clean up with its unbeaten Terriers at the Toronto Dog Show. It was Clipstone First Shot and Garry Matchmaker that formed the chief centre of attraction, and when the returns came in that both were beaten, why the wise ones said, "Impossible, can't be," whereas the knowing ones said, "I told you so." Percy can very well afford to let someone else have a chance now, as he has had quite an innings recently; besides it is good to have a change, and more especially when the change comes through sheer merit. In Winnipeg there are fanciers galore who have invested large sums of money in dogs and are willing to invest more if only they can be sure of getting a fair run for their money when exhibiting at a show.

I am sorry to say that there is a considerable amount of dissatisfaction amongst exhibitors up West over the way things have been lately at some of the shows, especially when it comes to making the awards. Feeling. is beginning to run high; some of the most experienced and most honorable men in the dog line claim that they might as well give up, as it is no use trying to beat the select circle that seem to have the whole thing up their sleeves and can do just as they please or see fit. For my part I do not intend to throw up the sponge, a quitter never gets there, like Billy Coats, of Vancouver, I feel more determined than ever to go in and wir if my dogs are able to do so-if not I shall take my beating like a man.

I have had compiaints innumerable reported to me and my advice at all times has been to the effect that the only real solution to the stamping out of any dishonest or crooked work is by publicly exposing the responsible party or parties through the columns of the Press, and I feel sure that "Kennel and Bench" would willingly take the matter up and help to eradicate from taking part in anything along doggy lines any one that would tend to lower the dignity of the cause.

By the way, talking about crooked work my attention has been drawn to the fact that there is a considerable amount of dog-stealing going on in the city and owners who have lost valuable specimens are at their wits end to understand how the inmates of their kennels so mysteriously disappear. In the majority of cases it has been young dogs that have been

The question has been put up to me why has the C.K.C. not an executive body sitting in Winnipeg the same as Vancouver to deal with all matters personally instead of by correspondence pertaining to that Club's affairs within a certain radius. Personally I believe the scheme is a good one, and knowing that the C.K.C. has a very large and influential number of staunch supporters in and around Winnipeg who would willingly lend a helping hand if only approached on the subject, there is no reason why such a body should not exist in Winnipeg.

The C.K.C. is the mother Kennel Club of Canada, and fanciers who have been well treated at the hands of the C.K.C. do not care about having anything to do with imitations, but prefer to stay by the old ship. This is a subject open for discussion, and I should like to hear others views on the matter. 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

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
