This series of catastrophies will not stop Mr. Finch however, as he expects to cross the water soon and to bring back

something better even than he has yet owned.

Mr. Thos. Moore, Montreal, the well known Wire Hair Fox Terrier breeder, has been to Mr. Daniel Lynn's kennel, having purchased the Wire bitch, Lynnfield Facile, that will be bred to Mr. Moore's Donington Rough.

Another of the noted Port Huron Wires to come to Canada is Ch. Lynnfield Jessica, that is now the property of that good Hamilton fancier, Mr. C. E. Mewburn. May they live long and do well.

If the Bailie had had the opportunity while in Canada of visiting some of our Eastern shows we think that his opinion on the quality of our 'Scottish' breeds would have been altered. And he would have found some grand Collies at Winnipeg and other Western points too. As for Dandie Dinmonts, we have none.

Collie clubs come and Collie clubs go, but we hope the new one may go on forever. It can do a power of good for a breed that is amongst the most deserving we have, for the Collie has a utility side to him that other breeds have not.

Langford, a business man and fancier of Vancouver, late of Somerset, England, has purchased from Tilley Bros., Shepton Mallet, England, that grand Old English Sheep Dog bitch, Shepton Pleasure. She has won many first and specials at the large shows, and is considered by her exporters, to be the best of her breed ever shipped to Canada.

Mr. Langford's Kennel is headed by Champion Sir Alex a dog that has won

prizes at all the principal shows on the Coast, including trophy for best male dog in show of any breed under Geo. A. Cranfield at Terminal City Kennel Club, Vancouver, 1912, also the Canadian K.C. Championship Cup.

The Winnipeg Kennel with the funny name is out for business in Cocker Spaniels and Bull Terriers and says so in this issue. Mr. Fred Miller is an old hand at the game and knows what's what in most breeds and the two mentioned in particular.

Then comes J. C. Fletcher, the expert handler, who can fill a commission for any breed on earth and do it right too.

His personal attention is given all dogs entrusted to his care at the shows he attends and this is what counts. We know it too for we have seen him.

If memory does not fail us the motto of the most dignified, the best in every way dog magazine ever published ran as follows:

"Nothing extenuate nor ought set down in malice."

Some present day scribes, mostly anonymous, might study this with advantage to themselves and to the canine world at large. Can no man be honest who does not agree with them? Silly insinuation but soils the pages on which it appears and hurts no one more than the writers, and those publishers foolish enough to use such twaddle.

He was pronounced by the Irish Terrier men present one of the very best ever seen and Mr. Raper and Mr. Mitchell believe him to be equal to anything ever shown in this country. He is almost a full brother to Ch. Baughfell Peggy, whom Mr. Vicary thought the best Irish Terrier he had ever seen.

The two brothers to Bantry, that Baughfell Kennels offer for sale through our columns, are almost as good as Bantry and should prove wonderful stud dogs as well as sure future champions. They are almost exact replicas of their famous sire, Thorncroft Marksman, with the same wonderful coat that he has, beautiful heads, great bone, legs and feet, and should be snapped up by some Irish Terrier fanciers in the West or better still in Canada.

Field and Fancy goes into raptures over the Bull Terrier bitch, Ch. Bow Bell, bought back by her breeder, Mr. Geo. Cranfield, of Vancouver, B.C.:

Mr. George A. Cranfield, of Vancouver, B.C., has purchased from Mr. F. M. Overbeck, of San Francisco, the grand Bull Terrier, Ch. Bow Bells (A.K.C.S.B. 137,699), a bitch that has never been beaten, and won her championship in hottest competition. She is now a double champion, having gained some forty points. Bow Bells is a daughter of the Canadian-bred dog, Haymarket Prince. She was raised and bred by Mr. Cranfield and was not sold by him until she had won championship honors. She has beaten all the best bitches on the coast, including Ch. Willemette Starlight, Edgecote Bastile, Ch. Monticito Prince, Miss Monty, Ch. Edgecote Queen Bess, Edgecliffe Beauty, Briardale Bangle and Ch. Dorian Grey, the latter now owned in Vancouver, but once graced Mr. Cranfield's kennels in California.

Bow Bells will now aim for Canadian championship honors, starting out at the Vancouver Kennel Club's show next spring. This club has held thirteen consecutive annual shows (but failed to give an exhibition last year), will be supported in 1914 by the elite of dog lovers, and business men of Vancouver and surrounding cities and burghs.

It is a pleasure to hear that that sterling Hamilton Cocker breeder, W. J. Jackson, has quite recovered from his recent rather serious illness. In fact he has put on an extra covering and scales ten

pounds more than he ever did before. But then this won't put him beyond standard weight.

Mr. Jackson has had a great demand for "Durbar" Cockers, especially from the West, a demand that he is hard pushed to supply. We hear of some beautiful black puppies by this dog, that we learn is soon to be offered at stud.

Who says the Maritimes can't put up a good show? Here comes St. John with an entry of 225, giving the show a three point value under the new ruling. The number in each breed has been given us in the following table:

Mr. Sam Bamford, the popular handler, has purchased from Mr. Thos. Harlow, a brace of Scottish Terrier dog puppies, which claim Avondale Roisterer for their sire and Rolleston Wee One for their dam. If breeding goes for anything these two should be worth watching.

A whisper from Montreal tells of some great Ascot puppies which their owner thinks are good enough to wear the kilts.

Mr. R. J. Stuart, the delegate for the German Shepherd Dog Club has just received two very fine German Shepherd dogs from Germany. The dog Rex von Luxemburg is well trained and has won many prizes in Germany. The bitch also is a wonderful dog, Flora von Luxemburg. These dogs are becoming very popular and are doing some very good work at the trials.

Winnipeg will be well represented at the coming "National" show in Toronto. Mr. Jno. Fletcher expects to bring down a round dozen and Mr. Jno. Milner, half this number. Good luck to them.

We would not be surprised to see at the "National" amongst others from the Maritimes a Bloodhound or two.

Mr. Jas. Luckwell, the old time Cocker breeder of Woodstock, Ont., is now living in Lethbridge and still devoted to his first love the Cocker Spaniel.

Mr. Harry R. Moore, of Medicine Hat, is one other who loves the Cocker and has them in numbers. Mr. Moore has been breeding Red Cockers for ten years, four of which have been in his present location. He commenced with a Gowans Coburg, bitch, his second purchase being Knoydart Red Girl, from Miss Macdonald's then well known kennels at Kingston. This bitch bred to Knoydart Coronet gave him a good start.

Mr. Moore credits the distaff side of the house with much of the success that has come to his rather extensive kennel. It is generally so where the ladies take hold, as in Mr. Moore's case.

We had a hand shake—and something else—with our old friend, Mr. Joe Reid in Montreal last week. This doyen of the Canadian Collie world is looking hale and hearty—and as fond of a good dog as ever.

"It is too bad that Trenton Fair does not get a better show or rather does its work with poor judgment. To divide a show up into three days apportioning various breeds to each day and allowing those judged to go home, is not at all common sense or fairness to the club or the public. It necessitates two-thirds of the show being vacant and there is nothing more distressing to the bucolic visitor, in fact any visitor than the empty stall.

The visitors showed their resentment by giving the show the go by and this combined with the execrable weather, must have almost disheartened the sponsors of the show, The Delaware Valley Kennel Club, who, however nothing daunted are out for another show at Princeton in December. Properly arranged this big Fair with its crowds of 75,000 people and midway between the two big cities should run a fine big show but they must do it all at once. Mr. Arnolt, naturally, as the man of all work on each day, had his taste of the vaudeville, but we are told that his good humor kept things going so that the climax came only in the catastrophe when the dog show tent blew down and there was howling and gnashing of teeth. Poor Watson came near getting his quietus when a tent pole hit his head and he had to be taken to the ground hospital."

DOMINION KENNEL CLUB REGISTRATION RULES

No dog can be registered unless pedigree in full for three generations, on both sides, is given. Registration blanks will be furnished by the Club upon application to the Secretary-Treasurer. The name appearing on the application as owner of the dog shall be deemed to be the signature of the owner, who shall be responsible for the information given in the pedigree.

Upon completion of the registration blank, it must be forwarded to the Secretary-Treasurer with the necessary fee or coupon, and he will acknowledge the receipt of same on a form for that purpose, stating when and in what paper the same will be published, and allotting a number which will be the registration number, if finally passed by the Executive Committee or a Committee appointed for that purpose.

Upon the publication of the application for registration fifteen days shall lapse before the issue of the Certificate of Registration, said fifteen days to be considered from the date of the paper in which publication is made. If during said fifteen days no objection is made to the Secretary-Treasurer of the pedigree or other information given in the published notice, certificate shall issue forthwith. In case objection shall be made in writing to the Secretary-Treasurer, of any pedigree so published, the Secretary-Treasurer shall immediately notify the owner of the dog as to the objection taken, specifying the time in which a correction must be made, and on receipt of such correction, the pedigree will again be published and the same rule followed as in the original publication thereof.

Should the owner on receipt of such objection as aforesaid, be able to satisfy the Executive Committee or the Committee appointed for that purpose, that the pedigree as published is correct, the said Committee shall have the power to order the certificate of registration to issue, at the expiration of the said fifteen days.

No dog shall be considered to be a registered dog until certificate of registration has issued, and nothing contained in the acknowledgment of the receipt of application for registration, shall be deemed to be an acknowledgment on the part of the Club, that the registration shall be passed. In case an owner has made application for the registration of a dog, and the prescribed time has not elapsed for certificate of registration to issue, before the owner is desirous of showing the dog, he may state on his entry form that application for registration has been made, together with the number that was given him on the acknowledgment of the application, by inserting in the column allowed for that purpose, the abbreviation "Reg. App. for."

A litter of three or more puppies may be registered, by the breeder thereof (if a member of the club) for a fee of \$3.00, provided applications are sent in within thirty days of date of birth, and a separate application is filled out, in the usual way, for each puppy.

All applications for registration, must be in the hands of the Secretary-Treasurer, on or before the twenty-fifth day of the month, to ensure publication the following month. Otherwise publication may be withheld until the month following.

WESTERN PIT BULL TERRIER BREEDERS WILL ASK FOR RECOGNITION AND A WINNERS CLASS

The Pit Bull Terrier breeders of the West are forming a club and intend going after the D.K.C. to put them on the list of recognized breeds. For some years this has been one of the largest classes at Western shows and breeders claim that it is time something was done by way of rewarding them for their patronage. They have been breeding for some years, to an adopted standard, and the specimens they are showing, are as near to that standard as the majority of winners in other breeds, and more particularly so, than some of the breeds of later origin. They claim a breed that will reproduce as to kind, and this fact is materially helped by some of them being able to register on their own breeding, i.e., the three necessary generations have been bred by them. The dogs being shown by them are easily recognized and can be fairly judged from the Standard adopted which reads as follows:

Head—Of medium length, skull flat, widest at the ears. Prominent cheeks and forehead free from wrinkle.

Stop—Well defined. Indenture not too deep.

Muzzle—Square and wide as viewed from the front, presenting a round appearance as viewed from above. Underjaw strong and well defined.

Lips—To meet closely and evenly all around, not running too far back, with an entire absence of any lippiness.

Teeth—Strong, clean, sound, meeting evenly.

Nose—Black nostrils, wide and open.

Neck—Slightly arched, tapering from shoulders to head, free from any looseness of skin.

Shoulders—Strong, muscular. Shoulder blades wide and sloping back.

Back—Short, strong and muscular. Higher at withers than at hips. Slightly arched at loin, which should be well developed and slightly tucked.

Ribs—Well sprung, close together, back ribs deep.

Chest—Deep from withers to brisket. Wide from front to back ribs. Not too broad as viewed facing the dog.

Tail—Short in comparison to size, set in low, wide where it joins the body and tapering to a fine point. Not carried over the back.

Legs—To have large round bone and strong, straight (upward) upright pasterns. Reasonably straight without semblance of bow.

Thighs—Long. Muscle well developed. Hock straight, well let down, turning neither in nor out as viewed from behind.

Feet—Of moderate size, toes of medium length, well arched and close together. Pad strong and nails short.

Gait—Springy and active without roll or face.

Coat—Short, close, stiff to the touch and with fine gloss.

Color—Uniform. Any color permissible. Markings not objectionable.

Weight—Not important, preferably between 24 and 56 pounds.

Eyes—Round. Black color preferred. As seen from the front they should be situated low down in the skull. As far from the ears as possible, with corners in a line at right angles with stop. As wide apart as possible to be within the line of cheek as viewed from the front.

Ears—To be cropped. Straight, of moderate length, and should not cause wrinkling of the skin when held erect.

Some of our visiting judges have tried to dodge the judging of this breed. At one show, the judge took them on the lines of a Bull Terrier.

The unfairness of this can be easily seen from the above standard.

From a canvas of Western fanciers of other breeds, I would take it, that the large majority of them are in favor of recognition of this breed, as the breeders of the Pit Bull have stood their ground for a number of years, and continued to breed and improve, with no encouragement from the kennel clubs. It is not denied that you see a vast difference of type in this breed, at our shows, but not more so than in some other breeds, and with the adoption of a recognized standard it would no doubt lead to more uniformity of type.

A meeting of the club will be held shortly, for organization purposes.

WESTERN CANADA KENNEL CLUB

A general meeting of the Western Canada Kennel Club was held in the South Board Room of the Industrial Bureau on Friday, October 10th, at 8 p.m. President Stirling in the chair. The President in opening the meeting stated that the object in calling this meeting was for the purpose of discussing details for the annual Winter show. Unfortunately, weather conditions were against having a representative meeting but this need not hinder

those present expressing their opinion or making suggestion. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved of.

The question of giving a winter show was then brought up and on motion it was unanimously agreed to hold the next annual show on February 3, 4, 5 and 6, and that the Secretary apply to the D.K.C. for permission for these dates. As the weather had no doubt kept away a number of members who are always active in connection with show matters, it was suggested, that the appointment of committees be left to an adjourned meeting to be held in the same place on Friday, Oct. 17th next.

Those present entered into a friendly discussion as to the judge question. It was felt by a number that our shows were getting too big for one judge to handle and the expense of travel made it impossible to employ more than one and bring out our finances at the right end. A suggestion was made of having local judges and in support of

the suggestion the member making it stated that other Western shows were employing our local men, and they appeared to be giving satisfaction. The question of giving money prizes was also left to the adjourned meeting.

In reply to a question as to the continuance of the monthly shows, the chairman stated, that the Executive were only too willing to give the matter another try, if a suitable building could be found. The continuance of them would depend upon the amount of interest shown in them by members. The matter was left in abeyance until the next meeting, and in the meantime the secretary was asked to try and arrange for suitable quarters.

The Secretary of the D. K. C. was present and submitted designs for a championship cup. Members of the D. K. C. who were present were asked for an expression of choice and this was unanimously agreed upon as number 4. The meeting then adjourned.

THE CRYSTAL PALACE SHOW

Our Dogs' running remarks on the fifty-eighth show of the English Kennel Club give us a very good idea of the standing of most breeds and what is being done in them. Writing of the management it says:

The arrangements of the show never ran more smoothly, and Mr. Jaquet, always a man of great bonhomie, was, if possible, more courteous, and, of course, is now a past-master in the showman's art. In Mr. R. S. Shakel, the manager, and Mr. W. Boyes, his assistant secretary, he has two trusted lieutenants who know their duties and perform them well. The vetting of such a large collection of dogs against time must always be a colossal effort, but never a difficulty with two such experienced and capable officials as Messrs. A. J. Sewell, M.R.C.V.S., and F. W. Cousens, M.R.C.V.S., who always conduct their often delicate task with a strong sense of duty to the Kennel Club and Show, seasoned with consideration towards exhibitors, who make the show. We heard of but few rejections by the "doctors," which speaks well for the improved sanitation and good health of dogs generally.

Little improvements were made in the disposition of the judging rings, and we feel sure Toy exhibitors will be grateful for their removal from the dark and dismal enclosure near the secretary's office to the open, light, and airy main transept and courts at the far end of the Palace.

Judging was commenced with commendable promptitude on the morning of the first day, and all the judges answered the roll call except Sir Ernest Shackleton, who was unable to do so through indisposition, and whose Samoyede classes were taken by Mr. W. R. Temple.

Judging dogs, although greatly improved in correctness from the old days, when general knowledge of the type, character, and fine points of dogs of high degree and somewhat crude in most judges, will probably never reach the millennium stage of perfection. It will always be to some extent a case of "many men, many minds." The grumblers this year, however, were probably less than usual in the various sections, before noticing the features of which, we will refer en passant to the well-attended judges' luncheon given by the Kennel Club on the first day, to which stewards and the Press are always invited.

THE JUDGES' LUNCH.

Mr. Desmond O'Connell always presides at this function, and very ably, too. With the judges in the middle of their duties, the few toasts honored are necessarily somewhat hurriedly submitted. Those to His Majesty the King as patron, and H.R.H. the Duke of Connaught, were, of course, first on the list, and heartily responded to. "The Judges," also given from the chair in appreciative terms, was acknowledged by Mr. Theo. Offerman, the American judge of Airedale Terriers, whose name alone was coupled with the toast—a nice compliment to the U.S.A. He said he was proud to have been allowed to judge at the Kennel Club's Show. The toast of "The Press," was responded to by Mr. Theo. Marples, who referred to the Crystal Palace now being the property of the nation and expressed the hope that the Club would long linger at its old favorite venue. He said that as the premier show, where all the best dogs were congregated, and where the best management and methods could be seen, the Kennel Club's fixture was one for other dog shows to emulate.

and for exhibitors to feel grateful for. Mr. Joachim also replied, and, before resuming his seat, proposed the health of the chairman, Mr. Desmond O'Connell, and Mr. Jaquet, the secretary, in felicitous terms, which was received with acclamation. Both gentlemen modestly acknowledged, Mr. O'Connell saying that they would, when he had gone, have to give him credit for "dis-covering" Mr. Jaquet. (Applause.)

THE DOGS.

Bloodhounds call for little comment, except to say that Mrs. Parkhouse brought out a good "Solly" young dog, which won in Maiden, and Mrs. Arncliffe another, and Mr. Unwin a good bitch in Utterance by his immortal Porthos. The section was a very good one. Otterhounds and Bassethounds were notable for Queen Alexandra being a successful exhibitor in the latter; and Beagles, a wonderful collection, in which the Marquis of Linlithgow and Mr. F. W. Jamieson had each a strong team. Mastiffs were a good average lot, but they are not yet back to the type of the old dogs. St. Bernards were another goodish group, about which the same remark applies. These will be dealt with by Mr. Manning. Newfoundlands were more select than numerous, Miss Goodall winning the dog and Mr. Gardner the bitch championship. Great Danes grow in numbers, but we fear the quality does not progress in the same proportion. The section was a very big one, and the judge very liberal with v.h.c. and h.c. cards.

Irish Wolfhounds were good, and Dr. Turner found a plum in Mr. and Mrs. Crisp's young giant, Hindhead John, who won in Junior and Novice. The section saw a return of Major Shewell to the fold, who headed Open Dogs with his recent purchase, Ch. Felixstowe Gelert. Deerhounds we must leave to our fair contributor to describe the doings in the breed, except to say that Mr. Harry Rawson brought out another St. Ronan's, which bore well the fame of the prefix. The classes were large and meritorious. Borzois were about the usual, the all-round quality being high. Miss Robinson annexed the Jog and Mr. Ashton the bitch championship. Chow Chows were a very strong section. Mrs. L. Faudel Phillips was very successful with a new blue in Blue Fox of Amwell, and Bluet, but Mr. Herbert Adams won the dog and Miss Peck the bitch championship. Sir Ernest Shackleton drew a big entry in Samoyedes, which Mr. Temple assorted with ease and intimacy, as he did a big Foreign class, in which a quaint Afghan Greyhound won. Greyhounds were good, St. Blaise, last year's winner, repeating the performance.

Pointers were a wonderful collection in numbers, dutiful David supplying the winner in a big Maiden and Graduate class with Sydney. Mr. Norrish was a successful exhibitor, but did not get in the front rank, as was his wont in yore. Mr. B. J. Warwick and Mr. Steadman captured the chief spoils

in English Setters, and in Irish championship honors were "aisy" as between Mr. C. H. Conyers and Mr. P. D. Mills, with Mrs. Ingle-Bepler a dangerous runner-up. With such an eminent expert on the "woolsack" in flat-coated Retrievers as Mr. Reg. Cooke, it was not to be wondered at that this section was a bumper. Mr. E. E. Turner had a field day with a quality bitch in Link of Shipton, who won four firsts and championship, Mr. Porch's Madely Major doing ditto, whilst Mr. Allen Shuter's field-trial bitch, Horton Rosette, won a brace of 1sts. Mr. A. R. Fish won both championship certificates in curls, and Mr. T. W. Twyford that for dogs and the field-trial class with Type of Whitmore. Nothing could withstand the superlative merit of Ch. Manor House Belle in bitches. The group was one of the best ever seen in both quality and numbers. The golden or yellow and Russian yellow Retrievers attracted onlookers, but the type is far from being fixed in the former. Spaniels were good in all the varieties, especially the Cockers. The absence of all Mr. Saunders' entries in Clumbers was not explained until the second day, when he turned up with his powerful team under the mistaken belief that it was the first day! It was a case, therefore, of "while the cat's away the mice will play." One of his dogs was present, viz., Ch. Tramp of St. Mary's, but in the form of a silver model, beautifully executed by Miss C. M. Stockdale. It constitutes the "Celbridge Champion Trophy," presented by Colonel R. Claude Cane to the Clumber Spaniel Club, and was on view at Our Dogs stand, where it attracted considerable attention.

Collies were a big entry, and as good as the country can at present produce. Mr. Lord had a field day, his win of both championships being popular. The O. E. Sheepdogs were also a grand collection, and must have caused the venerable judge, Dr. George MacGill, to put on his studying cap more than once. Mrs. H. Wilson Bedwell, who, we hear, is taking up a new breed, was alone in Dalmatians, and Mrs. Crouch frightened away all opposition in Poodles. Miniatures, however, mustered well.

A bumper entry in Bulldogs will be duly dealt with by our "Barker," Whippets were wonderful in numbers and quality.

Airedales were also a grand lot, and the American judge, Mr. Offerman, seemed to assort them with care and discrimination. It was a singular coincidence that the two championship winners were found in the Puppy class in Messrs. T. and W. Wilson's Springbank Sundown and Mr. F. A. Bottomley's Ryburn Swell, neither of which was entered in the Open classes. Bull Terriers are always a big draw at the Palace Show, and are certainly improving in make and shape, head and type, speaking generally. Fox Terriers were also a classic collection. Nothing new turned up to over-throw these two cracks, Ch. Levenside Luke

(who had a great day) and Ch. Watteau Surprise, who downed the best class of Open Bitches seen together for years. It was also unique that three of Luke's stock—two sons and a daughter out of the same litter—should win four 1sts in different classes, all shown very fit, with a couple of good jockeys in Hack and his daughter. Mr. Raper's high-priced Baby Dazzler held his own in Wire, although the assault was made by an army of good dogs. The military judge weighed them up very carefully. Welsh Terriers were a fine lot—never were better dogs gathered together,—but there were a few surprises in the awards, which were made with great deliberation. Mr. Griffith had a great day, but he has had greater, and at this very Palace Show, where he once won every 1st.

Dachshunde were a very fine section, which would open the eyes of any German experts that may have been present. The great Mancunian expert did well with his German-bred brace, Rusholme Blackmoss and Blackbush, and Blackmint and Schone, who all won 1sts, the last-named the bitch championship, and who made a fine haul; but Mr. Hayward's brace, Honeystone (who won dog championship) and Hypsipyle, together won £43 10s. in Produce Stakes, or £70 in all! What a grand lot of Bedlington's faced that past-master, Mr. Percy R. Smith, from north, south, east, and west! In Irish Terriers Mr. Evans went great guns with his Crowgill Coy and Wicklow Munster, who qualified as a full champion, Miss Paul's Portia occupying the corresponding position, and her bond not being forfeit. Sealyhams saw a great gathering of the clans. Mr. H. Adams' good youngster, Ivo Criterion, bowled over his puppy opponents, and looks like soon becoming a champion, Mrs. Brooks' Welsh Rarebit more than duplicating his victory. Skyes are rapidly becoming extinct, but Scotties are looking up, a grand brace in Bonaccord Boxer and Abertay Hero crossing the border and slaying their Anglo-Saxon opponents, the latter winning championship. Ch. Bapton Monarch repelled the Scotch invaders in bitches. A great group were the West Highlanders, a couple of very nice puppies being forward in Ornsay Defender and Walpole Wiseacre, and Scotia Forever. We did not quite follow the Open Bitch awards, but thought the last should have been 1st. Cairns were capital, English and Scottish exhibitors of note meeting in friendly rivalry. Lady Sophie Scott showed a good youngster in Bard of Harris, and of course won championship in bitches with Tibby. Mr. Gaydon won in Special Limit Dogs with Firing Fox, his late kennel companion, Firing Frolic, doing ditto in Limit and Open, and qualifying as a full-fledged champion. Dandies were good, and Schipperkes a splendid lot. Toys are all dealt with by our Toy Dog Talkist, which brings us to the second day's performance, the judging of

THE SUPPLEMENTARY TROPHIES.

The operators were the popular chair-

man of the Kennel Club, Dr. Sidney Turner, who had as coadjutors Messrs. F. W. Lowe and W. R. Temple. An extra charge of 6d. has for two or three years been made by the Kennel Club for this show, which entitles the spectator to a comfortable seat. The large auditorium was fenced in this year by a high boarding, instead of allowing the public to see over the former barrier, at which we heard much grumbling.

TORONTO KENNEL CLUB FIELD TRIALS

BY HARRY TAYLOR, JUDGE

Once more the Toronto Kennel Club demonstrated that it is entirely feasible to conduct a field trial for Beagles and Harriers. Wednesday, October 22nd, 1913, the second annual field trials of the above club were held in the neighborhood of Wilcox Lake, Ont. The club chartered a private car from the Toronto and York Radial for the convenient transportation of those desirous of attending the meet. Among those present were Messrs. T. E. Milburn, Arthur Atkinson, president Toronto Kennel Club; Geo. Tetaert, E. Sharp, W. C. Demmit, J. Aldersley, W. J. Archibald, Sam Pearsall, Dr. G. M. Trewin, Sid Perkins, C. Farrow, J. H. Webster, Dr. J. A. Campbell, A. Young, John Cornell, T. DeGeer, Ernie Jury motored out with a party, as did also J. Miller.

The day dawned dull and cloudy with every prospect of rain before night, little wind and enough dampness in the air to make scent hold good. Dryden's Corners, where the trials were held, affords pretty nearly every kind of going except swamp. Most of the hunting was in cover and second-growth poplars. The executive did all in their power to make the visitors welcome, and the hot lunch brought to the field was very good indeed. I was disappointed in not seeing any of the Guelph fanciers present, and hope they will consider favorably next year's trials and make some entries. The day will surely come when it will be one big feather in the cap of the individual who owns the champion field trial Beagle or Harrier of Canada.

The quality of the work done by the dogs was on the whole good, but the ability shown by Queen of Trump in the Beagle class, and Ring in the Harriers, was of a high order. Tom De Geer and Charlie Farrow, respective owners, may well be proud. Tireless hunters these dogs, very careful in hunting out the likely places. Ring was so quick in his movements while doing so that it was a difficult matter to follow him. He drives tremendously fast. Tony, Will Archibald's entry, considering his age, is a fast worker, too, and especially good on a warm drive, his casting is wide and rapid. Just yet a while he lacks the experience of the winner. He will probably be seen to better advantage another season.

Class A., Beagles 13 inches and under—Bugle, dog, owner T. De Geer, Toronto. This dog was put down in a second growth scrubby bush of about five acres, after a diligent hunt of half an hour nothing was started. He then moved over to the corner of the 2nd concession west, which looked good. As we were late getting away, the dog was well on, and it was decided to run Class B., 15 inches and under.

Mr. Young, the owner of Spot, was asked his opinion of allowing Bugle to run with the larger hounds, he having no objections, Class B. was called, consisting of Queen of Trumps, T. De Geer, owner; Wee Melody, T. De Geer, owner; Spot, Al. Young, owner. These three and Bugle were cast off all in charge of their respective owners. After hunting out a lot of mixed ground without a whimper that denoted business outside of some cover, the crowd started a rabbit and the hounds were faced nose on. Wee Melody opened first and all harked to and between them made things hustle through the woods, but the fur proved too clever. Queen of Trumps hit the trail eventually and was joined by her kennel mates, Spot being thrown out, was never again in on this run. His owner said he had holed the rabbit. He may have holed a rabbit, but it was not the one originally started, as De Geer's hounds ran their quarry after a check of only a couple of minutes, down past me and on past several of the spectators back again pretty much in the same course as first, then over a rocky knoll to a check. Queen of Trumps struck the proper chord and carried us at a merry pace with one check. When the other dogs got in and drove to a boggy water hole in a hollow near some cedars to a loss. Time, 2 o'clock, and as the Harrier class was scheduled for 2.30 these hounds were called up. Hounds worked well together, harking well to one another at the first note, but Queen of Trumps proved herself superior in her wider and more intelligent casting, and always had the speed and the nose of the others.

Harrier entries—Sport and Ring. C. R. Farrow, owner; Tony, W. J. Archibald, owner; Lulu, H. Sparrow, owner; Jack, Jas. Miller, owner.

No time was wasted with the big hounds. They were liberated at the edge of the road and all went to work in a businesslike way—and soon were tonguing. Ring's keen nose worked out a circling train in rapid form, being quickly joined by the other dogs, driving extremely fast right on up through the bush on over the edge, where Lulu and Jack got thrown out—here comes puss—on came the dogs fairly flying; brilliantly they run down past me, Ring leading. He is a corker on a hot drive. I almost thought he flicked the hare once or twice, as he passed me, but could not get a fair grip. Sport and Tony lopping him on either side. The

pace was too much for the rabbit, it was hole—or death—and he took to burrow. These hounds took no time for breathing or resting-up. They were within five minutes "hammer and tongs" after another. This rabbit was viewed going over the ridge by me. On a cast, Tony picked up a turn or two, but Ring always had the speed to take the lead and did most of the driving. On over the ridge they go, across the open, and packing well gave us the prettiest hunt so far. A slushy swale checked the race. Off again over the lower end of the ridge where they holed the rabbit, going towards the road. About this time Mr. Young called Mr. Sparrow's entry off, so we will make no comments, as he forfeited all the dog's chances by his action. Mr. Miller's entry did not show up very well, but will say I have seen him run here extremely well, being an industrious worker, true and willing, but prefers running alone.

At 4 o'clock hounds were called up. Awards—1st, Ring; 2nd, Tony; 3rd, Sport.

Before leaving for home a purse was subscribed to buy a couple of medals to be presented to the owners of best types of Beagle and Harrier conforming to the show standard, which were won by T. De Geer's Wee Melody and C. Farrow's Sport, respectively.

The quality was excellent throughout, and most of the dogs were shown in a condition that denoted care and thought in their preparation, and in several breeds the dogs were put down as fit as in any show I have ever seen.

Newfoundlands. The winning dog, C. O'Regan's Carlo, is a fine specimen and was shown in fine shape. The winning bitch, P. Killorn's Fly, is a grand specimen and was put down in excellent condition. Foxhounds. The winning dog, Jas. Watter's Mac, was shown in the pink of condition, and is, to my mind, fit for any competition. Pointers. The winning dog, Seth Jones' Buck, is a good specimen and a splendid mover, being put down in great condition. The winning bitch, Geo. Lockie's Lady, is fair, and might have been shown in better condition.

English Setters. A good class. The winning dog, Mrs. Robert Smith's Wyoming Valley Salop, is a grand type, and was shown in fine shape. The reserve winners dog (a puppy), Dr. C. P. Holden's Mallwyd Bill, is a fine specimen, and will be hard to beat in a short time. The winning bitch, Robt. Smith's Wyoming Valley Flash, is a good specimen, could be in better coat. Irish Setters. The winning dog, E. Alban Sturdee's Corry Law, is a beautiful specimen: sound, and shown in the best of condition. Went through to best dog in the show. Reserve winners went to Miss McLeod's puppy, Pat Grand, which is a fine young dog, needs finish. The winning bitch, Mrs. E. Alban Sturdee's Pixie Law, is a fine sound type, in fine condition.

Cocker Spaniels. A good class. The winning dog in blacks, G. Douglass Blair's Patsy, is a fair type, shown poor in coat. The winning bitch, Charles Conway's Little Blossom, is a beautiful type, rather small. Reserve winners went to Commissioner H. R. McLellan's Blossom's Baby, a nice puppy, gives great promise. The winning dog, any other color, L. W. Lehrle's parti, Sir Bonnie Kelso, fine class dog, good head, muzzle and sound all through. The winning bitch,

any other color, P. W. Cox' Heather Bly, is good, true to type in head, body, feet and legs; in good condition. Dalmatians. The winning dog, Miss G. K. Campbell's Spot, good specimen, nicely marked.

Collies. The winning dog, Miss Florence Wall's Scotti, sound and in good coat. Wm. O. Monahan's Baron Scott. took reserve winners, is better in head than winner; loses in coat and did not show. The winning bitch, Arthur Connors, Nellie, fair; good coat. German Sheep Dogs. The winning bitch, Hans Bally's Wanda Flora Von Hohenespegen, is a good specimen, shown in fine condition.

authorities who are the holders, are merely trustees on behalf of the donor until such times as some winner has fulfilled the original conditions, that will enable him to become the permanent holder.

A decision of the question is being looked forward to with interest, as similar cases are reported from other quarters. In some cases a special was offered at one show, open to all, to be won twice. At its next offering, its conditions were changed to read open to members of — club, to be won three times. I do not think this fair or having the ear mark of good clean sport. I have always had my opinion of specials with a string on and especially those appearing in the unclassified specials. The matter was forcibly called to my attention at one show and where I was an exhibitor. A special was offered for best specimen of —, owned by a member of — Club. The special was donated too late to be included in the premium list but got into the catalogue. In this way the information came to the exhibitors too late for them to be eligible for competition by joining the particular club. The first four dogs were not eligible and the other entry got it. If show authorities would only accept those specials which are sure to find their way to the best specimen, it might help the quality end of our shows.

It was Frank Dole that made the remark at one of our shows in the presence of the writer, "Look at the lady with the \$75.00 hat and the \$5.00 dog." It was at the same show, and the Smooth Fox Terrier classes were on. One of our largest breeders was holding his exhibit outside the ring waiting his class and two ladies stood near, one of whom held a Smooth that "Yorkie Wilson" would call "only a fair haired one." Her companion asked her why there was so much difference in the coats or were they the same breed. She replied that "they were the same breed, but different types. Her's was the American type while the gentleman had the English type." The classes were called and Frank did not seem to pay much attention to that American type. She braced Frank after the class was judged, and asked him "Why?" He politely told her, that the other exhibitors were poor people and needed the money but he knew she did not mind. It was only a ribbon show but that did not count with her. She has not seen it yet but thinks "Frank" the only judge we ever had here. A Pit Bull Terrier man got away with the blue and as soon as he got his dog back on the bench, rushed out to the nearest butcher shop, to buy the dog porterhouse steaks. That evening "Frank" stood talking to me about earlier days, and the Pit Bull man, tore himself away from his dog, to get Frank's opinion. Frank told him that the dog reminded him of the first dog he ever owned, "Brandy" by name, and when this dog came in the ring he just said to himself "here comes old "Brandy." Frank tickled him with a lot of good natured josh and wound up by saying, "Mister, that is a lovely collar you have on the dog." Did Frank ever rush at you with the question, "Do they tan the hide of a dog, with his own bark?"

I have been allowed to see some correspondence which is likely to be a matter of discussion, for one of the Western local kennel clubs, in the near future, "A" entered his dog at a show, making "B" the agent in the usual way. "B" had an application for service for the dog, which he took advantage of and collected a fee, but did not report the matter to "A" on his arrival home. "A" accidentally heard of it, and in his speaking to "B" was told that it was not his dog used, but

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another. "A" has obtained several affidavits from eye witnesses that it was his dog used. The question of agency would no doubt come in here, but "A" claims that as there is nothing in the premium lists of shows regarding "stud services" that the agency does not extend to this, but only covers the duties or privileges that would arise from the entry form or show rules. The question of "stud service" would only be as between "A" and "B" and the show authorities would not be a party, therefore it would be a subject of a special agency. I think that "B" has shown bad faith in withholding the information from "A" and more especially in his denial as to the use of the dog. It brands itself as a stolen service and for which the innocent party who paid his money, has to suffer. I think that the local kennel club should deal with the matter without favor, and make an example, and report their decision to the governing body. This is the only way to keep the game clean.

Word comes from Lethbridge that they will not give a show this spring. I presume that this means, there will be only one show there and that during their annual exhibition. Such being the case, I think it a good move, for all their energies to be exerted on behalf of the one show, as it is a considerable undertaking to pull off two shows so close to each other, and to be financed by the same club. Lethbridge is putting herself on the Bulldog map very rapidly, and that good sport who claims the prefix "Chinook" is not letting the "good things" get away from him. He reports another one out and I have been promised a look over this new one in the near future. "Jack" Fletcher will take him to Toronto next month. His coming to the city next week, is being looked forward to by a number of owners of matrons, but he will be advertised through the Gazette, when offered at stud.

Western Notes With Western Breeze

"PRAIRIE" BROADENING OUT

A general meeting of the Western Canada Kennel Club was held on Oct. 17th, in the South Board Room of the Industrial Bureau. Present, President Stirling in the chair, and a large turnout of club members.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved of.

Applications for new members were presented by the secretary, all of whom were elected.

Committees for the show in February next were struck, to be added to by the President, where necessary.

The appointment of judges was then fully discussed and the meeting was unanimous in a recommendation to the Executive Committee to select local judges, where possible. To a question by a member as to whether "local judge" meant only residents of the city, the chairman replied, that he thought not, from the discussion, he would infer that the idea was in the direction of specialty judges, and where a fully qualified one could not be found in the city for any breeds, provision would be made to bring in an outsider.

A motion having been made, that this next show should be a ribbon show it was moved in amendment, that the Executive be asked to try and arrange ways and means by which money prizes could be offered. The amendment carried.

Representatives from the Pit Bull Terrier Club were present and addressed the meeting as to their claims for recognition as a Standard breed. They asked for the assistance of the W. C. K. C. in bringing the question before the Dominion Kennel Club in a favorable light. It was moved by Mr. Frankfurter and seconded by Mr. Martinson.

That the Secretary instruct the representatives from the Club, on the Executive of the D.K.C., that this meeting is of the opinion that the Pit

Bull Terrier should be made a recognized breed and would so recommend it to the kindly consideration of the Executive of the D.K.C. Carried.

Mr. R. J. Foley's kind offer to the club in placing his club rooms at the disposal of the club for meeting purposes were accepted, and a vote of thanks was tendered Mr. Foley for his kindly interest in the welfare of the club.

The meeting then adjourned.

A rather interesting question has been going the rounds of kennel circles this last few days, and from all accounts the D.K.C. will be asked to settle the point. It seems that a specialty club offered (to members only) a special prize to be won twice and which they had donated from an outside source. This special was offered and won by one of its members at a show held a year ago. It seems that the award of the judge was not a popular one with the other members of the club, and in view of this it was decided to withhold this special, at the next show. To make up for this withdrawal, another special was offered, and again the donor, was not the club. The show authorities in some way included the both and the winner was the same as the previous year. The club now refuses to recognize this second win, on the original special, on the ground that the show authorities had not the authority of the club to include it in their specials. The claimant claims, that the special was originally offered as being donated from an outsider for a certain win, and nothing in the original offering is suggestive of its being a club special. In view of this the club has no voice in the placing of the special or the changing of the original conditions and above all, the special having been once offered and awarded, the winner has an equity therein, and the club or show

After judging at the Provincial Fair of British Columbia, held in Vancouver, Bailie Dalgleish went on to the United States where he judged Collies at the Western Reserve Kennel Club Show held in Cleveland, Ohio. Then he journeyed on to the Chicago specialty show where he looked over the fine array of Airedales and Bulldogs.

The Chicago Collie Club welcomed the Scotchman through the medium of their President, Dr. Henry Hertz, who made a charming speech and presented the Bailie with the Club's medal in remembrance of his visit. At the same time the President invited him to be one of themselves and lend a hand to the judge by way of stewarding the Collie ring.

Before leaving for home he visited the Abbey Kennels, also the Vickery Kennels, and while Dick Abbot, the present owner of the Abbys has some fine stock, the Vickerys are worth crossing the Atlantic to see, in fact nowhere in the world can so many good Airedales and Wire Fox Terriers be found.

The Bailie arrived in time for his native show in Edinburgh, The Scottish Kennel Club's, of which he is one of the promoters and was greeted by old friends very anxious to know how dog showing in the new world compared with the old.

He said as yet Canada was not quite up to her form but with many Old Country fanciers on her land the sport of dog showing was likely to grow in popularity and that he expects great things will yet be seen and heard of in Canada. He met some of the best sports who were satisfied to see the best dog win every time.

One of his great regrets was that the native dogs of Scotland were so poor both in numbers and quality. Collies were good and he thinks the Winnipeg bitch, Imera Whyetta, can hold her own with England's best, but his old favorites, the Dandie Dinmonts, are not to be found, while Scotties, Skyes and West Highlanders are moderate only.

Bobby Thomson has just arrived on a visit to the Old Country and is quite full of the good things of Canada. Speaking of Edinburgh show we did not think Collies quite so numerous as in past years and what went wrong that the Scotchmen did not support the show? Messrs. Tait, Dalgleish, Roxburgh, Galt, Pollock and Fraser not represented in the rough Collie section, they all have them at home.

Bulldogs were good, likewise Scotties and Airedales, also Toy dogs a great show, but the West Highland White Terriers were above the average both in quality and quantity. The special for best dog in the show was awarded to the Smooth Fox Terrier dog, Ch. Levenside Luke, which award seemed to meet with general approval, the reserve winner being Mr. Fish's Pointer bitch, Ch. Rumney Refrain.

That for best Toy dog was won by Mrs. Ashton Cross, Pekinese dog, Ch. Chaty of Alderbourne.

FOX TERRIERS AT DANBURY

The Fox Terriers under Mr. Mitchell at Danbury were very few, many of the circuit chasers going to Richmond looking for three points. In Smooth puppies J. J. Lynn showed a very nice puppy in Lynwood Matao, one of his own breeding, by Sabine Ringmaster. This pup has an extra long head, with small dark eyes, short back, good in legs and feet, and it's doubtful if

there has been a Smooth put down in years with such big, round bone. He is bound to make a name for himself. His flag sets in the right place and is always up. If he doesn't grow too large look out for him. In Niola Broker Mr. Ingwersen, of Chicago, showed a very nice puppy, good in head with small, dark eye, good legs and feet, and only needs time to make into a good one. In limit and open it was Mr. Albright's Marconian all the way, with Niola Reserve second. Marconian is a grand dog on the large side; he owns a very long head, with little dark eyes, well carried ears, nice legs and feet and is a grand shower. Niola Reserve is a very well balanced Terrier, has good head and eye, good legs and feet, well-sprung ribs, and is a size smaller than Marconian, except in bone. Delmont had him fit, and he showed for his life.

In bitches Mr. Ingwersen showed a very lovely puppy in Niola Fantasy. This youngster is good in head, eye, ear, legs and feet, and is a sound fronted one. She only needs time, and if nothing happens, should make up into a rare good one. Niola Faith was alone in limit bitches, a very nice bitch this, but had to take second to Water Lily in the open class. Water Lily is a wonderful bitch for her age. She still holds her grand form and looks like a yearling. She won the special for the best Fox Terrier in the show, which was right.

In the Wire classes Daniel Lynn seemed to have the Indian sign on the boys in American-bred classes. Mr. Lynn showed a clinking Wire puppy in Lynnfield Cymric, by his Ch. Lynnfield Salex. Cymric has a very long head, little eyes, extra small ears, short back, a coat like nails, grand legs and feet, and his bone is big and round. When this chap finishes it will take "some" Terrier to beat him.

There were no novice Wire dogs, but in limit and open High Gear won, with Lynnfield Result second. High Gear is a nice short backed little dog, rather large feet, a very small ear, which he carries well up, a grand coat, a stylish shower, tail set up and well over. In the opinion of some he was lucky in catching Lynnfield Result out of coat. Both of them are very good showers, but on the day Result was out of coat and High Gear beats him in this respect, in shortness of back, ear, and is a smaller Terrier.

There were no Wire puppies or novice bitches, but in the limit and open Calderbank Cinderella was first; she is a very nice little bitch with good length of head, good expression, nice legs and feet and good coat, but at times she flies her ears, otherwise she shows well in the ring, and Delmont had her fit. Ridgway Collarette was second; a big bitch this, with a sound coat; she has a long head and long back, good legs and feet, seemed sour as she would not pull herself up in the ring. Cinderella beats her in shortness of back, expression, spring of ribs, legs and feet. Collarette wins in coat and length of head.
