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
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Notes and Comments

Dr. A. W. Bell, Winnipeg, was in Toronto this month, looking for entries and business for the big summer show of 1914.

The Canadian National will, as in the past, pay all broker's fees on dogs and other stock coming in for exhibition. They make this announcement early for fear that the recent change from this practice at the "National" may militate against the success of the 1914 show.

This is not a Christmas number of the Canadian Kennel Gazette, though we have attempted to put a little of the holiday spirit into it. We have been pressed, both East and West, but especially the latter to put out a special holiday number, but, as we have hardly yet got our new gait, and think the time hardly ripe we have deferred consideration for at least a year. None the less we most heartily thank those who so kindly and freely volunteered to aid us with both pen and purse. To these good folk, as to all others we most heartily wish a very Merry Christmas and a most Happy New Year. To our enemies—if we have any, and we hope not—not a jot or tittle less.

With about four hundred and twenty-five dogs present the National Live Stock Show has a winners value of three points. We were looking for more with the money put up and the low entry fee, in fact we anticipated a five point show. But we were not disappointed and the new show got off to a good start. The attendance was very fair and a good deal of local interest was apparent. In many ways the show was not ideal, the judging was allowed to drag on too long and as no steward's books or award boards were used it made the compiling of awards and reports difficult. Perhaps we were looking for too much. Next year's show should certainly result in the coveted five points. More than one dog here expected to complete his championship with a fiver.

The feature of the show was the success of the Western contingent. They have the dogs and are both good losers and good winners. May they continue to come East and may the East reciprocate. Where competition was anyway keen the local dogs did not keep the pace in many cases and most of the "winners" went outside Toronto. Our regular report shows this.

Mr. Grisdale and Dr. White got through their lots—Bulldogs and Bostons—quickly and left the downstairs rings, thrown into one for Mr. Mortimer who had the great bulk of the work to do.

Mrs. Lees' kennel showed us what St. Bernards should be and the winning dog is really a magnificent fellow.

Mr. Short, who is now living in St. Thomas, won handily with Geneva and another harlequin in Zebra of Sudbury, in Danes.

The winning Borzois, Ch. Genest of Roseau, a big one with grand brisket won, while in Greyhounds Ben Lewis' old standby, Ch. Lansdowne Lottie, and Deodora Fleetwood outdistanced the local dogs. There were no English Foxhounds and the American entry was confined to that of Mr. Hergott's. Red Banks Boy won out in Pointer dogs, a good clean cut one, and The Pearlstone in bitches. English Setters came along nicely and their red coat cousins numbered 15, a nice turn out.

Airedales were made sensational by the return of Mr. Mutchmors' great Terrier, Clipstone First Shot. He was in better coat and shape than when here in September and such a shower ! On parade every minute in the ring, a big upstanding Terrier with body, legs, head and substance to match. Mr. Bawden made a good win in a hot class with Caerphilly Betty, a bitch of style and substance.

It is years since we saw a Clumber of the quality of Reverton Ronald. Cockers were light classes, most of them well known. The Collie classeswere large and full or quality. Our report will show that winners went East and West.

Bulldogs a big string and a lot of hot stuff. The Western lot quite turned the trick and one was struck with the evenness of type that prevailed in the dogs from Winnipeg. We were looking for the reserve bitch to win, though she is not as good in chop or underjaw as the winner.

Sabine Ring Gold won in Smooth Fox Terriers, a sensible type and all a Terrier. A neat Terrier of Mr. Mutchmor's had little trouble in taking a like place in the ladies' section. Hawes Broom, illustrated in this issue, was "it" in Wire dogs, Donington Blossom taking the rosette in bitches. Mr. Lynn's entries were absent.

Princess Patricia was another to come back, in Bull Terriers, where we thought Mr. Miles rather badly treated with his Inferno Buster, a high quality Terrier. We do not like the winner's reddish eye otherwise good. The judge of Bostons is reported to have stated that he found little quality in his classes. Mayhap he didn't look far enough for it. Sparkling Jewel, looking like a gem, outclassed the rest. The entry was light where so much money was up.

There was not much new in Irish Terriers, all sizes and sorts. Avondale Ascot in Scotties was caught a bit light in flesh and coat. Mrs. Ross showed a cobby, sturdy little bitch that we were looking for to do better. West Highlands were very fair. Skyes, Bedlingtons and Black and Tans had but one each. Beagles came to the front with a good, quality entry. Dachshude beat the half a dozen by one. Whippets quite a good class. No less than five Pugs so the breed is not extinct. Italians one less, Poms a big string with thirty-four entered. They retain their popularity. Here again the Westerners scored taking both winners prizes. Mrs. Rigby was unfortunate in having her entry in Toy Poodles scale a half pound over the limit. Mrs. Scott positively farmed the Toy Spaniels and Mr. Marr's Pekes had no competition. Mrs. Williams showed a neat little Jap and a quite extensive kennel of Toy Poodles. There were five Yorkshires, a good little lot. Half a dozen Toy Black and Tans, two "Skips." Mrs. Lewis' Chow and Mr. Van Camp's Griffon closed the catalogue outside the miscellaneous classes where by the way the names of the breeds are not given.

Now it is as but a tale that is told, a memory, but an incentive to a bigger and better show next autumn.

A good photograph of Mr. Jos. Perkins', Toronto, now famous wire Fox Terrier, is given on the front cover of this issue of Canadian Kennel Gazette. We have never had anything but good to say of the dog since we first saw him at the Canadian National in September where Dr. C. Y. Ford, the judge, became quite enamoured of his general quality.

In his report of his classes to this paper Dr. Ford wrote :

"The limit and open dogs brought forward what might be considered the best Fox Terrier in the show in Mr. Joseph Perkins' Hawes Broom. This Terrier is a tan-headed one with black and tan body markings and carries one back to the palmy days of the immortal Meersbrook Bristles. He possesses a head piece of much quality with the sort of expression a Terrier ought to have. His neck is long and properly set on shoulders and front that are good. He is a short-backed one and has a coat of cocoanut-matting hardness—the sort that does not require artificial preparation. He is neither too big nor too small. With proper opportunities he should do the breed a lot of good in Canada, as his pedigree is of the best."

Surely this is high praise from one or Dr. Ford's experience.

His wins here in addition to those taken at the Canadian National include first limit, first open and winners at Ottawa, where we had a good word to say for him. Orangeville gave him a repeat of these wins. At the recent "National" Show in Toronto, under Mr. Mortimer, Hawes Broom won first limit, first open, winners, special for best Wire and in addition special for best sporting Terrier, open to members of the Toronto Kennel Club. He here beat classical Airedales, Bull Terriers and others.

He should, from his individual quality and classic breeding be of great service to us here and we look to see his services freely called upon.



"Our Dogs" states that Mr. F. A. Taylor, of Kelowna, Canada, was so much impressed with the winners out there emanating from the "Narrowdale" Kennels that he has induced Mr. C. L. 


important of these is the tendency of some Mastiffs to show traces of the St. Bernard ; their coats, and especially their tails, being rough and coarse, the coat and tail should really be of a fine, close texture. Also the head should be distinctly square in appearance, and shorter altogether than the St. Bernard, but at the same time it must have massiveness, depth and width. Another point is the tendency of a few Mastiffs to be out in their forelegs. A Mastiff must be also as straight in his forelegs as a Terrier. Light eyes are fortunately on the decline now, although ears would be better a shade smaller.

Newfoundlands.—None too numerous of late in the north-eastern counties, having been seriously depleted by a demise of a brace of well-known blacks. Cavalier, owned by Mr. R. R. Coats, of North Shields, recently succumbed to inflammation of the bowels.

> Bred by his late owner, Cavalier was a son of Gladiator and Colina, and was a winner at Darlington Ch. Show, Newcastle-on-Tyne, etc., but his claims to fame are mainly as a sire, Ch. Kaiserin, Captain Hedworth, and other good stock being amongst his progeny. Then we have the regrettable news of the death, from poisoning, of Mr. Wm. Collins' (South Shields) Shields Monarch, by Hedworth Colonel ex Ridley Mona, a winner at Newcastle and other shows in the north. Several deaths have occurred recently in the Shields district, so that it behoves all dog lovers to be thoroughly on the alert.

The Eastern Collie Breeders Association held a Collie show in Boston on December 9th. The show was open to members only.

Mr. Holland Buckley, the best known English Airedaler, is to judge this breed at Philadelphia in March.

Late press news is to the effect that the Show Committee of the Pomeranian Club of America have secured the services of Mr. Midgeley Marsden as judge of their specialty show in January. Mr. Marsden is one of the best judges of Toy dogs in England, and his selection for this show is one that cannot be too highly recommended.

Field and Fancy describes the winners dog and bitch at the recent American Boston Terrier Club Show in the following terms:

"A dog of unusual type and probably different in general makeup from the average specialty show winner. He was admirably handled here and made the most of his chances, and the win seemed to be a popular one ; with a little more development in body there is little to ask for, barring a little better tail carriage ; but this is a minor fault when other things are satisfactory. While he does not match with the winner's bitch, he is a dog of beautiful color-a rich, dark mahogany brindle and a very expressive head ; has a splendid Terrier front and stands well ; should carry more weight to be a perfectly balanced dog. Strange to say, the winner's bitch, is also applicable to the same suggestions, but she scores over the dog in head type ; she was not shown hefe in as good condition as she might have been, but she won special for best in show over a good class of dogs entered for specials, including that splendid old specialty show winner, Ch. Auburn Happy, Ch. Sudbury Nemo, and others. Ch. Sudbury Nemo won special for best dog in champion class. Altogether the show produced some very good dogs and bitches, but the puppies were erratic as to quality-a good one here and there."

The Bulldog Club of America has been asked to inaugurate a specialty show in Chicago.

Mr. Chas. G. Hopton will manage the Pomeranian Specialty Show to be held early in 1914.

Newark, N.J., will hold a show under A.K.C. rules on February 14th next. Mr. J. Whealan, Newark, is Secretary.

Field and Fancy has a novel way of giving dead beats publicity by advertising their accounts for sale.

Mr. Nichols will judge both Smooth and Wire Fox Terriers at Boston.

The Bulldog, Dreamwold Centaur, was adjudged "best in show" at Albany, by Mr. C. G. Hopton.

Boston judges so far appointed are : Dr. C. Y. Ford, Sporting Spaniels ; W. J. Nichols, London, England, Terriers, Bulldogs, Japanese Spaniels, Poms and Pekingese, variety classes and unclassified specials. Dr. Jarrett takes the big dogs and sporting classes except Pointers, Irish Setters and Beagles. Mr. Claire Foster takes Bull Terriers, and Mr. Sam Foster, Bostons. Mr. Le Noir, Pointers, and the Toy breeds, other than Mr. Nichols', Mrs. Bauman.

Just too late for last issue came the news of the death of Sabine Kennels' great Fox Terrier, Ch. Sabine Fernie. She was run over by an auto in Orange, Tekas. A great producer and a great show bitch, the loss is a heavy one for Mr. Farewell.

After all is said and done Mr. Lacy, there is but one New York and a win at New York still bears the impress of the Hall Mark as does a win at the Kennel Club Show in Britain.

The Bulldog, White Marquis, is being imported by Mr. D. P. Ritchey. He is an all white 55-lb. dog.and a winner in England of over one hundred prizes.

He is a wonderfully bred dog, being a son of that great dog, Ch. King Oorang, out of a Ch. Tintern Royalist bitch.

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In reporting the Toy Spaniel Club Show at New York Field and Fancy says, writing of Poms :

"The judge, Dr. C. Y. Ford, was very painstaking and deliberate in his awards, and every dog was thoroughly overhauled and examined. His awards in general were well received by the ringsiders, and in many cases evoked unanimous applause, but in one or two cases it was the consensus of opinion that he penalized overtrimming to too great a degree. It is well enough to take a firm stand against this practice, moderation of which is an absolute necessity just as it is in Wire-haired Terriers, but to place a vastly inferior dog on top merely because he is shown in natural condition, is carrying the point a bit too far. All in all, however, the Doctor once again demonstrated that he is a thorough student of the right type, and a man of his own convictions."

Might we ask F. and F. if "over trimming" can be too heavily penalized ? Isn't "over trimming" more or less of a polite term for a word that doesn't look nice in print ?

Mrs. C. M. Castle, of Fenlon, Man., who by the way is going to reside in Victoria, B.C., next spring, has lost two valuable Bostons in whelping. As both were prize winners the loss is the more severe. Mrs. Castle is not dismayed or discouraged but will try again. This lady finds light weight Bostons rather delicate.

S.P.C.A. TREATMENT OF LOST DOGS.

The new electric cage for the destruction of dogs has been installed and is giving perfect satisfaction. It is at the corner of Mill and Ash Streets, Point St. Charles, where the Society has located their pound.

All dogs found running at large on the streets of Montreal are picked up by the police and are handed over to the officers of the Society and are kept for three days. The first day they are put into Pen No. 1, second day Pen No. 2, and third day Pen No. 3, and if they are not claimed then they are either sold or placed in the electric cage.

The Society will always have a number of dogs to dispose of on payment of pound fees and the taking out of a license, and any one losing a dog should immediately get in touch with the Society and find out if it is in their pound, as all lost and strayed dogs are immediately handed over to the Society.

While under the care of the Society the dogs are well fed and properly cared for. The S.P.C.A. has gone to a great deal of trouble and expense to protect the owners of dogs, and it is hoped that the public will respond by joining the Society.

The above notice is issued by the Society, and I have much pleasure in calling the attention of my readers to it. A great deal of interest has been displayed by our readers in the matter of vivisection, and enquiries have come asking if any statement has been obtained from those institutions where vivisection is practiced. No reflections have been made or are being made on our universities, where doubtless all that is possible to be done is done in the way of properly authorized and supervised experimentation with animals. At the same time the public would be glad to be reassured on this point. Would it not be possible, for example, for a duly qualified and authorized representative of the S.P.C.A. to visit, without notification, those places where vivisection is practised ? This suggestion is laid before the Society.

TOY DOG TALK.

There was a fair contingent of Toy Dogs at the Kennel Club Show, benched together at the upper end of the nave of the Crystal Palace, with two convenient rings, adjoining, though one or two of the breeds were adjudicated in the side courts.

Pugs were most gratifying to Miss Little, who is ever a consistent, even-minded judge. Quality and quantity were well to the fore.

There were some lovely black puppies brought out, Miss Cooper's Vashti heading the sextette.

The entry in Toy Spaniels was distressing, and evidences forcibly the fact that either greater unanimity or a forceful push in the right direction is needed to uphold the breed, only twenty entries being made. Only one challenge certificate for the Black and Tan or Ruby varieties was given. No Rubies were entered, and only two Black and Tans, of which one was absent.

Japanese were another disappointing entry. Mrs. Gordon Gratrix had nine entries, Lady Decies, Mrs. Hay, and Mme. Oosterveen one each. There was little competition.

Italian Greyhounds mustered only four, Mr. Mathews' brace of bitches taking the best prizes in both classes, B. Silver Mite winning her second challenge certificate. Miss Knowles' Dante was the only dog. Mrs. Scarlett's Serenita won the L.K.A. Medal.

Maltese did not show up as purely white as we have seen them at other times. Mr. Cornish Bowden's Imp was the challenge certificate winner, Mersham Cupid being reserve.

In Miniature Black and Tan Terriers, Mrs. J. M. Walker won her full title with the little Model Perfection, the L.K.A. Spoon following the award. Mrs. Twigg only took Juanita. Yorkshire Terriers mustered very well, and there was a fine display of quality. Mr. R. Marshall won the Dog Challenge with his new purchase, Billy Boy, his wife taking the Bitch Challenge with Sweet Pansy.

There was a splendid entry in Griffons Bruxellois. The best puppy was Miss Curtis' Little John, who annexed the Taylor Challenge Bowl. Mrs. Handley Spicer followed with a new one in Copthorne Chip, who annexed the Fielding Silver Trophy. Mrs. Whaley's youngster, Glenartney Jester, was shy, and Brookville Buck was absent. Brookville Bruce continues to win ; he annexed two firsts and the challenge silver tea service, the Harcourt Clare Cup, the Breeders' Trophy, and the Lambert Silver Cup.—Our Dogs.

THE "NATIONAL" SHOW AT TORONTO

Boston Terriers.

Thirty-five dogs were entered in this breed of which thirty-one were benched. The entry was rather small in all classes, but with two exceptions the dogs exhibited were well up to the average in quality. Considerable dissatisfaction was heard on all sides regarding the awards, and in some instances the judge was observed marking his book before the dogs were moved in the ring. Dr. White apparently favored the "bully" sort, yet he mixed the different types occasionally, and did not pay strict attention to soundness.

Puppy dogs brought out four. 1, Ingram's Little Man, small, good color and markings, inclined to be grubby and long in underjaw; 2, Nemo's Surprise, good color, perfect markings, slightly long tail; 3, Lord Rufus, good color and markings, lacks expression and bad in stop.

Novice dogs, one entry, Billie Buster, nice trappy dog, could be improved in markings. Limit dogs, 12-17, two entries, 1, Hillcrest Totem Boy, good color and markings, long in underjaw; 2, Billie Buster. Open dogs, 12-17, two entries, a repeat of previous class.

Novice dogs, 17-22, one entry, Clifton Ben, a fair type, splashed. Limit dogs, 17-22, three entries, 1, Rexonian's Kid, attractive, evenly marked, splashed, well placed; 2, Clifton Ben; 3, Combustion, short and cobby, rather too thick in shoulders for his size. Open dogs, 17-22, a repeat of former class.

Novice dogs, 22-28, two entries, 1, Lord Rufus (in puppy class); 2, Mike, very coarse and poor quality, long in body and muzzle. Not a show specimen. Limit dogs, 22-28, six entries. 1, Gordon Delhi, coarse, heavy type, poor quality outside of head and markings; 2, Dondero's Sport, good color and markings, but poor in hindquarters; 3, Sam Shongo, clean cut trappy dog, half white head, beyond a doubt the best heavy weight dog in the show. Open dogs, 22-28, repeat of former class.

Canadian bred dogs. 1, Ingram's Little Man; 2, Ch. Ted Shongo, too well-known for comment; 3, Billie Buster.

Puppy Bitches, two entries. 1, Susie, good color and markings, fair type, lacks in stop; 2, Ingram's Girlie, small, good color and markings, could have gone higher. Novice Bitches. 1, Peggie Quigley, good color and markings, nice type, well placed; 2, Lady Roberts, small, good color, lacks in markings and muzzle.

Open Bitches, 12 to 17. 1, Sparkling Jewel, good dark color, perfect marking, slightly thick in shoulder, a good shower, well placed; 2, Madame Sherry, good color and markings, slightly heavy in head and loses to winner in hindquarters; 3, Kenilworth Miss Pauline, good color and markings, slightly long in body. Limit Bitches, 17 to 22. 1, Ashland Pride, good markings, lacks in color and distinctly Terrier type, might be cobbier; 2, Lady Verna, good color and markings, well shown, slightly heavy in shoulder but should have been placed higher according to previous awards; 3, Peggy Quigley. Open Bitches, 17 to 22, a repeat of former class.

Limit Bitches, 22 to 28. 1, Conewango Belle, slightly long in body; 2, Victoria Lill, fair type, good expression. Open Bitches, 22 to 28, a repeat of former class.

Canadian Bred Bitches. 1, Sparkling Jewel; 2, Leader's Pride, light in eye, could be better in stop and muzzle; 3, Conewango Belle.

Winners dogs, Gordon Delhi, Reserve, Hillcrest Totem Boy. Winners bitches, Sparkling Jewel. Reserve, Madame Sherry.

On Wednesday evening, after the judging, the Boston Terrier Club of Canada entertained Dr. White at a banquet held in the New Woodbine Hotel, and the same was pronounced by all to be a great success.

Beagles.

Considering the show, we were more than pleased with both the number and excellent quality, coming so soon after the Canadian National Exhibition. It has been a long while since such an even, consistent type of Beagle has been benched here. Some of the winners have been out before. Wins in such hot company must be more than gratifying to the owners. The winner in Puppy dogs, Pattern, is good in body, legs and feet, but toes out a bit.

Novice Dogs. 1 went to Clinker, a fair hound, he beats Pattern third in legs and feet, but is snipey in muzzle. They could easily exchange places. Elora Blue Skin second was off the bench so did not see her.

Limit Dogs and Bitches (not exceeding 13 inches). This class was a hot one and competition between the first three was close. Rockridge Midget is a real nice one in type, good every way; Blythe Brush Bugle, 2, loses to winner in head. The latter beats Lady Primus, 3, in head, coat and bone. Smithfield's Tiny V.H.C., light in bone and pinched in muzzle.

Limit Dogs (over 13 inches and not exceeding 15 inches). 1, Clinker, the only other entry, Rockridge Driver, was absent. Open Dogs, Blythe Brush Bugle, 1, a nice one. Smithfield's Primus 2, loses to Bugle in bone and coat and wins over Clinker, 3. The latter is longer in head but well shaped, not so good in front and should have more rib.

Breeders' Dogs and Bitches. Hiram Card's entries I did not see as they were off the bench when I went through, hence not commented upon. 1 went to Smithfield's Petite, a bit wide in front, ears carried a triffe high with not sufficient length and in my opinion does not beat Lady Primus, 2. Smithfield's Primus 3, Elora Blue Skin fourth.

Puppies, Bitches. For small hounds the winner, Fidget, is a good little one every way, having the usual fault in small hounds, appleheadedness with pinched muzzle, hard to breed out. Novice Bitches. The bitch class showed lots of type and quality, the sweet-faced Queen of Trumps winning, Elora Bellwind 2, Smithfield's Tiny 3. Fidget, V.H.C.

Limit Bitches (over 13 inches not exceeding 15 inches. Queen of Trumps 1, good all over, hard to fault, shown in perfect condition; beats Lansdowne Ransom, dished between the eyes, a well put up hound otherwise. Petite 3, not as typical a hound as 1 and 2.

Open Bitches. Queen of Trumps 1, Lansdowne Ransom 2, Lansdowne Ruby 3. I liked better than Ransom for the place.

Queen of Trumps and Rockridge Midget were easily the best two Beagles in the class, and nicer types in their respective classes it would be hard to find; both real good headed ones well put up in body with that lovely "hound" markings, black, white and tan, nicely distributed. All in all there was a splendid lot of these dogs and they were well judged.

Hertford Nancy was alone in Mastiffs, a fair one.

There were two Bloodhounds, Dr. Russell quite a good one, but Sheehans Queen did not meet the judge's favor and so went cardless. She is not a show Bloodhound.

Ch. Rover was quite the best of the Newfoundlands, in type and conformation. Earl of Sutton, that followed, is long cast, shows some quality. Winners was withheld in bitches which about represents their value.

It was when we came to the "Saints" that we found quality in abundance and numbers too, nineteen in all. With Mrs. Lees' four, the Stuart dogs from Montreal and the big local kennels represented, it is some time since we saw so many good ones together. We were so impressed with the class that we at once decided to devote the January Canadian Kennel Gazette largely to the breed.

Alta the King is a big upstanding dog on good pillars. He wants filling out as he now looks lathy and flat-sided. Robert the Bruce next in junior and novice, a nice type, rather easily defeated Silver King of Parkdale, that is bad in pasterns. Queen of the Altas is a bitch of high quality with excellent expression, but peculiarly crooked bone formation in front legs. Mr. Swann had a puppy here that we liked and should grow into a winner. Thanksgiving second, a typical St. Bernard, sound, nice type of head. Alta Eva stays in Toronto as we note elsewhere, a high quality matron. Beethoven has not the size of the winner to which he went reserve, but he has quality all through, is well set up, with a St. Bernard head and is built in proportion to his inches. Alta Big Ben is an enormous dog of high quality all through, massive in bone and body and with a grand head and proper expression.

A lot of very nice ones behind these.

Geneva, our Ottawa find, won handily in Great Dane bitches, followed by a lighter built one in Niagara's Queen. Mr. Short's other entry a massive Harlequin also won out, a sound dog with a good head and foreface. The reserve winners is a typical Dane that will suit many.

The Winnipeg Russian Wolfhound, Ch. Genest of Rosseau, outclassed the others. A grand big dog with great chest and running gear. Nagee quite a nice one on the lighter side, good head, neck and legs.

Ch. Lansdowne Lottie and Deodora Fleetwood are beautiful in conformation and outline and trained as statues. Mr. Coulter's entries followed and are well known. Three American Foxhounds from one kennel and not an Englishman, do not fairly represent the breed.

Eight Pointers, a better class than we generally see nowadays where the breed, once so popular in Canada, has dwindled to but a shadow of its old self. We hope this inaugurates the return of better days.

The winner in dogs is a clean cut Pointer with good head and legs. Shown in excellent condition as indeed were all the others. It was a close touch between him and Red Banks Boy. The winning bitch, The Pearlstone, is of beautiful type and character, nice head, front and stern, and the rest of the class were good.

English Setters, too, seem to be "coming back," judging by the quality we had here. Lady Madcap, a sweet one in formation, head, expression, body and legs was not catalogued. Vickery Bloom, a grand Setter, was reserve to her. The winning dog leaves little to be desired and in the reserve and one or two others he had good company.


There were sixteen red coats, a very handsome display of Irish Setters. The winning dog was found in Conn Law, a big dog, good in head, body, legs, feet and coat. A bit darker eye would improve him. Reserve came in the Maritime entry, tooled by his owner, Mrs. Sturdee. He did well in this company, a nice type and shown very fit. Both winners and reserve in bitches went to Montreal with Norah Law looking far better than when we saw her in September and Mr. Hanna's well known winner, Ch. R. Rue.

Rhu was winners, there may be a turn over some of these days. A nice lot behind these.

Tampus Shannon is a nice Gordon without the substance and type of the old kind.

A grand class of Collies and plenty of them, thirty-three. Mr. Roy's new tricolor was made the winner. He is a slashing big one, true in front and bone, clean in head, long well filled foreface and neat ears. He is slightly foreign looking in expression and there is the least bit of wave in the coat over his quarters. An excellent modern Collie.

Holyrood Marquis, another grand Collie, excellent coat and formation, gets one ear up occasionally. Weston Emperor is a quality dog, good head, expression. A. Sable Prince, a big, fine Collie. Imera Peacock, is a grand Collie, teems with quality, good head, eye and expression. A taking youngster is Victor Wild, a tri-color, good coat, front and bone and nice head and expression.

As a whole the dogs outclassed the bitches and must have taken some placing for many others are good enough to win. In the ladies quality—that indefinable term—counted. Corona Crystal is a very sweet Collie, beautiful head and expression. Glendale Queen also a grand one in type, head and formation. A lot of nice ones behind.

The winning Bobtail was best in substance, head and quality of coat. H. B. D.

Airedale Terriers: Rockley Dark Saint was first puppy dog, a good coated and headed one, big and long cast. Rugged Mr. Bub, second, lacks in foreface, good in coat. Chilmark Royal, third, has a good eye, nice in front, a promising young one. Admiral of Lakeview, a nice one in body, was third in junior. Clipston First Shot won in limit and open, and won well; he is well known and needs no comment. He shows as well as ever. Birchcliff Oorang, second and reserve winner, was not in the best of condition; he is a good one with a nice dark eye. Third, Mooreside Rock, another good one, good head and ears, and a nice bodied one. Puppy bitches was won by Betty Briar, a very fair all round one, good coat, could be improved in muzzle, eye and ears. Silver Birch Queen, second, is light in eye and soft in expression. Rockley Logical Point won in junior, and took second limit and open and reserve winners, a nice, well-put-up bitch, good substance, front, legs and feet, light in eye. Caerphilly Betty, the winning bitch, is a nice bodied one with a good coat and all Airedale character. Morning Dawn and Chilmark Morilla are a couple of very fair ones.

One nice Doberman Pinscher was shown in Doberman Alertine, and an excellent Clumber Spaniel in Reverton Ronald.

In Cocker Spaniels, Glenora Laddy won in novice dogs, not right in front, but very fair body and expression. Second, Calmo Bingo, long in head and light, only a fair one. Captain Scott came out in the limit black and went through to winners, nice in body, but high in legs and long in face, good Cocker expression. Second and reserve winners was Durbar, not right in front, but grand head and body. Third, Roger, a poor one. Novice dogs red was won by Calmo Blanko, not good in head or front, second, Rob Roy and

third, Red Domino were but fair. Golden Glow of Ferndale, good expression, eye and muzzle, light. Limit parti-color, Wentworth Billy won, good neck and shoulders, undershot and fine in muzzle. Puppy bitches brought out Golden Sally as the winner, snipy in muzzle, only a fair one, Crescent Jeanette too small, was second. Novice black was won by Calmo Marengo a nice bodied one, with a very fair head. Third Bessie Obo, was the other new one, very fair body but a poor headed one. Novice bitches, red, brought out a good one in Crescent Glow, shown fit and should develop into an A1 Cocker. Novice parti-color was won by Mepals Clarita, not shown quite fit but a good one, good in eye, front and body. Lansdowne Debutante won in limit and open, shown fit, a good one in head and body. Third, Calmo Dremo, small and heavy in skull.

Three Old English Sheep Dogs were shown. Beppo was put up the winner, a nice one, out of coat. One nice Dalmatian was shown in First Spot. Some nice Poodles (other than Toy) were benched.

Bulldogs, Roslyn King, was placed first in puppy dogs, a nice sound one, could be improved in underjaw, second, Cowan's Doctor, same breeding as the winner, could be better in ears and underjaw but a good bodied one, third, Cheetham Marquis, a big, high one, wants filling out. In limit, 45 Ibs. and over, Moston Marshall was first, good in face, skull and head properties, lacking in rib, second, Chinook Courtnay Coronet, lacks in foreface but good in body. Third, Woodcote Merry Boy. Open, over 45 pounds, brought out Cheetham Squire, who was placed third, a sound one, good in head and body. Limit under 45 lbs., was won by the Winnipeg dog, Mersey Pilot, a good bodied one, cobby, with substance, good in head and sound, we like him, second, Homewood Jumbo, good in jaw, foreface, front and nice skull, lacks spring of rib, third, Worsley Costermonger, long cast, large skull, did not show as well as he might have. In the breeders class, Ashland Lady, second, a nice one but out of condition. Junior dogs and bitches was won by Worsley Dreadnought, lacks in foreface but one of good substance. In puppy bitches, Cheetham Countess, a nice one of good substance was first, second, Cheetham's Daughter, another nice substance one of the same breeding, but high on the leg, third, Titterstone, bit weak in foreface but a nice short bodied bitch. Novice was won by Belgrave Lady, a nice stamp of bitch of good quality, lacks in turnup of underjaw, third, Oakville Betty, lacks in body. Limit bitches, 40 fbs. and over, first, Cowan's Peggy, lacks expression, but a good typical one, second, Chorus Lady, a long cast one with excellent head properties. Second in open was Layham Pride, the C.N.E. winner, and well known. Third in limit and open under 40 lbs., was Lady Valeria, good body, pinched in underjaw.

Smooth Fox Terriers were not a large show. In puppy dogs Sabine

Radical was alone, a nice headed one. Clapton Varnisher is a good one, good head and eye, lots of bone, Sabine Ring Gold a nice one, good headpiece, plenty of bone and good legs and feet. Rifle Sutton, a bigger one, with good substance but cross eyed. Stoney Coronation is a nice fronted one, not quite right in head. Walnut Cricket, a promising puppy, good in head. Broadway Molly is a good, typical one, good body and set on good legs and feet. Warren Resemblance, the nice Winnipeg bitch, went through to winners. She is a good one. Broadway Donation is another good stamp of bitch.

Wire Haired, Oxspring Teddy a nice one, that should improve, was first in puppies with Donington Selected second and Oxspring Outlaw third. Jos. Perkin's Hawes Broom, came out in limit and won through to winners, a short backed one, with a nice head, neck, shoulders and expression. Brier, a Maritime dog, was placed third. Dominion Kennel Club Constitution and By-laws

CONSTITUTION.

Article I.

Sec. 1.—This Club shall be known as the Dominion Kennel Club, with headquarters, where the President and Secretary-Treasurer are resident.

Sec. 2.—The objects of the Club shall be to promote the general improvement of dogs, dog shows and dog competitions. To encourage the breeding of pure bred dogs, and to protect the interests of owners and breeders.

Article II.

Sec. 1.—The Club shall consist of an unlimited number of members, whose election is solely vested in the Executive Committee, and shall be by ballot. Two negative votes to exclude.

Sec. 2 .-- Candidates must be nominated by a member of the Club, on the printed form for that purpose, such nomination to be sent to the Secretary of the Club, accompanied with the fee. A list of such candidates must be sent by the Secretary, to each member of the Executive Committee, not less than five days prior to the date of the meeting, at which their names shall come up for elec-The Executive Committee shall have the privilege, however, of appointing an Election Committee, from amongst their number whose duty shall be to pass upon the list of applicants for membership. In the event of such a Committee being named, their ruling as to the application of any candidate, shall be final.

Article III.

Sec. 1.—The officers of the Club shall be a President, First Vice-President, Second Vice-President, Secretary-Treasurer and an Executive Committee of three representatives from each affiliated club, all of whom shall be elected annually.

Sec. 2.—Any club having at least ten members of D.K.C., in good standing, shall be entitled to elect three representatives, towards the Executive of the Club, and the Club making such election, shall be deemed an affiliated club. Such representatives, when elected, shall appoint from amongst their number, the President, First Vice-President, Second Vice-President and Secretary-Treasurer, but to facilitate the work of the Club, the President and Secretary-Treasurer shall be residents of the same city or place.

Sec. 3.—The management of the affairs of the Club shall be entrusted to the Executive Committee, and a quorum shall be declared when at least one half of their number are present or are represented at a meeting.

Sec. 4.—Any member of the Executive, who may find it inconvenient to attend any of the meetings, shall have the privilege of appointing anyone to attend and act for him, and the action and voting of such appointee, shall be binding upon the appointing member.

Article IV.

The Constitution or By-Laws of the Club may be amended, at any general or annual meeting of the Club provided that due notice has been given each member of the Club of the time and place of the holding of such meeting, and that such notice contained the proposed change or changes. They may also be amended by a majority vote of the affiliated Clubs. and in such case the mode of procedure shall be as follows : The Secretary-Treasurer of this Club shall send to the Secretary of each affiliated Club, by registered letter, a copy of the proposed change or changes, and appointing a time when the Executive will meet to consider the proposed changes. It shall be the duty of the affiliated Club, to place such proposed changes before the members of his Club, and obtain an opinion, for or against such proposed changes. He shall transmit to the Secretary of the Club, without delay, the opinion so obtained, and the majority of such opinions, so obtained, for or against, shall decide.

BY-LAWS. I.

Sec. 1:-The President shall preside at all meetings of the Executive or Club, and on all occasions where the Club is officially represented. He shall appoint all special Committees, unless otherwise ordered, and shall order meetings of the Executive Committee, whenever in his judgment he may deem it necessary. If in his opinion, any business arising for the Executive Committee to transact, is not of sufficient importance to require their personal attendance at a meeting, he may instruct the Secretary-Treasurer, to notify each member of the Executive Committee as to the nature of such business, and to invite their written opinions thereon. In such case, however, he must appoint a time, when he will consider the replies to such notices, and such notice shall mention the time so appointed. He shall have the sole right of deciding such a vote on the replies so received, but may withhold his decision thereon, and order a meeting of the Executive Committee called, requiring their personal attendance. In all such cases, however, it shall be his duty to see that the Secretary-Treasurer notifies each member of the Executive, as to his decision.

Sec. 2.—In the absence of the President, the First or Second Vice-President shall have the power and assume the duties of the President. In the absence of the President and both the Vice-Presidents, the members present shall appoint a presiding officer from amongst their number.

Sec. 3.—The Secretary-Treasurer shall conduct all correspondence, keep the minutes of each meeting of the Executive, and of the Club, and have charge of, and be responsible for, all books, papers, and property of the Club, He shall collect and take charge of, all monies belonging to the Club, shall pay all bills when properly approved, and submit a report thereof, together with a statement showing the financial condition of the club, to the Executive Committee at every meeting. He shall keep a book showing a list of all the members of the Club in good standing. He shall prepare a financial statement and report for each annual meeting, and shall forward to the auditor, all his account books and vouchers, at least two weeks before the annual meeting.

Sec. 4.—The funds of the Club shall be deposited in a chartered bank, to the credit of the Club, withdrawable only by cheque, signed by the Secretary-Treasurer, and countersigned by either the President, or First Vice-President.

Sec. 5.—Each officer on the expiration of his term of office, shall transfer all the property of the Club, in his possession, to his successor.

11.

Sec. 1.—It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to forward the best interests of the Club, and to promote a feeling of harmony amongst its members. It shall be the duty of each member thereof, to keep in touch with all matters effecting this Club which may come before the meetings of the Club of which he is the representative, and to report thereon to the Secretary-Treasurer.

Sec. 2.—It shall be the duty of the auditor, to audit the books of account and financial statement of the Treasurer, and to make a report thereon. The whole to be submitted to the annual meeting.

Sec. 3 .- The Executive Committee may from time to time, appoint any member or members of the Club, to assist in scrutinizing and confirming the correctness of the pedigrees of dogs that have been submitted for registration. Should any objecton be made by such appointed member to any pedigree submitted for registration, the Executive Committee shall cancel the member allotted at the time of publication, and shall not issue a certificate for registration, as provided for in the Rules for registration. Should such appointed member pass upon the correctness of the pedigree, it shall be deemed as sufficient evidence as to the correctness thereof, and the Executive Committee shall order a certificate of registrationn to issue, provided, that the rules governing the registrations have been complied with, by the owner.

III.

Sec. 1.—The annual meeting of the Club shall be held in the month of April in each year, and due notice of the time and place of holding such meeting shall be given each member of the Club, the Executive Committee shall have the power of appointing the day and place, of such meeting.

Sec. 2.—Special meetings of the Club may be called at any time, by the President, upon the written request of at least twenty members of the Club, but such request shall state the purpose for which the meeting is called, and at such meeting no business that such request does not give notice of, shall be considered. The President shall appoint the time and place of the holding of such special meeting.

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Sec. 3 .- A meeting of the Club may be held, where convenient, during all shows held under this Club's rules, but at such meetings only suggestions as to the welfare of the Club shall be considered, unless the meeting has been called as provided for in the foregoing rule. The Secretary of the Club desiring the meeting to be called, shall obtain the permission of the Executive Committee (through the Secretary-Treasurer) and upon permission being granted, shall undertake the conduct of the meeting, and as soon after as possible, send his report to the Secretary-Treasurer, as to any suggestions made at said meeting, and as to the action taken by the meeting regarding same.

Sec. 4 .- Meetings of the Executive Committee shall be held at the call of the President and as often as he may think it necessary. The President shall call a meeting of the Executive Committee upon the written request of at least five members of the Committee, but such request shall state the purpose for which the meeting is called, and at such meeting, only the business that is stated in such notice shall be considered. Such meeting must be called within five days of the receipt of said written request, but the President shall appoint the time and place for the holding of such meeting.

Sec. 5.—Due notice and reasonable time shall be allowed by the President, in calling all meetings. That is to say, at least three days shall be allowed over the time necessary for a letter to travel to the farthest distant affiliated Club or member of the Executive and return. In the event of a question arising as to whether due notice was given, the declaration of the Secretary-Treasurer as to time and place of posting, shall be deemed sufficient evidence.

Sec. 6.—At all special meetings of the club that have been called under the provisions of Sec. 2, and at the annual meeting, voting by proxy shall be allowed, and the appointee as named in the proxy, shall be considered the duly qualified agent of the member appointing.

IV.

Sec. 1.—The annual dues shall be three dollars which must accompany the application for membership, and shall be subsequently payable on or before the day of the annual meeting.

Sec. 2.—A fee of one dollar will be charged for all registrations, when made in compliance with the rules governing registrations. Members of the Club will be granted one free registration each year.

Sec. 3.—A fee of twenty-five cents will be charged for listing for each show.

Sec. 4.—A fee of twenty-five cents will be charged for search of pedigree. Sec. 5.—Certified copy of pedigree fifty cents. To members, twenty-five cents.

Sec. 6.—A fee of fifty cents will be charged for transfer of registration and issue of certificate therefor. To members, twenty-five cents.

Sec. 7.—Registration of Prefix, Affix and Kennel Name, two dollars.

Sec. 8.—A fee of twenty-five cents will be charged for duplicate copy of Certificate of Registration.

V.

Sec. 1.-The Executive Committee shall have full power, by a twothirds vote of those present at any of its meetings, to suspend, disqualify or expel, any member, and the member so suspended, disqualified, or expelled, shall have no claim against the Club or be allowed to enter into any competition held under the rules of the Club. Such member shall have the right to appeal to the Club from the action of the Executive Committee. Suspension, disqualification or expulsion shall be either for a definite period or for life, and the member thus suspended, disqualified or expelled, shall be reinstated only on application to the Executive Committee.

Sec. 2.—Anyone having personal knowledge of the facts may prefer charges of improper conduct against any individual. The person making such charges must send them in writing to the Secretary-Treasurer of the Club. The charges thus forwarded must be accompanied by a deposit of five dollars, as a guarantee of good faith for each charge preferred, which shall be retained, should the charge be deemed on investigation to be frivolous or malicious. In the case of non-members, a fee of one dollar shall be charged for investigation.

Sec. 3.—Publication of any suspension, disqualification, expulsion or any notice of a charge having been made against any member or individual, shall not be made, until the charge has been proven. If in the opinion of the Executive Committee, the charge has been made through malice, or with intent to libel the party so charged, the Executive Committee may thereupon suspend, disqualify or expel, the party so making the charge.

Sec. 4.—Any individual or individuals found guilty of misconduct with dogs, shall be debarred from all privileges of the Club, including registration.

VI.

The Executive Committee may make whatever arrangements they think best as to the publication of notices of meetings, registrations, etc., but such notices must be published in the paper which the Club agree to supply to its members.

WESTERN NOTES WITH WEST-ERN BREEZE

What is Doing in the Prairie Provinces

What about that Airedale club for the West? Moose Jaw had undertaken the formation of this and the Airedale boys are waiting patiently to hear of organization. Time you were getting started, if you intend to inaugurate the Stake Events, that have been spoken of. A lot of promising puppies down this way and which the owners are keen to nominate. Get busy.

The article appearing in the October issue of the Gazette under Notes and Comments, and iouching the advertising question, is ably put. I find so many breeders, who have had the benefit of a good business training, but who hesitate at inserting an ad. in a kennel paper, to assist them in disposing of their surplus stock. I have been approached by several within the last few days, who have puppies for sale and with the request that if I hear of anyone wantin~ such a puppy to remember them. When you ask them if they have advertised them, they tell you, "What is the use?" They simply tell whoever they meet, which is generally another dog man, with a bunch to sell, and which he will push to a finish to all enquirers and no doubt knock the breed that he has been asked to remember. If they would only stop to consider their mode of procedure when they buy a dog. They do not run around the street, proclaiming the fact. They buy the kennel papers and look up the ads. and make a selection. Again, through an ad., your patrons are not all local ones, so that each dog you ship out is in itself an ad, for you. Some one else sees it and asks the owner where he got it. Within the last week I have been looking for a breed of dog that I cannot finh an ad, for in the Gazette. Had such a breed been advertised in your paper, they would no doubt get the business, but as it is, I had to write an Eastern friend for the name of a breeder. The dog "fancy" in Canada may not be a business, but it is more than evident, that it would not suffer any with the application of a few business methods.

The most discussed question in Winnipeg doggy circles at present is the proposal of the Executive of the Western Canada Kennel Club, to ask local fanciers to act as judges. When this was first spoken of, it was feared ihat such a move would affect the entry, but from a canvas of the city I find that all are in favor of it. This club has always tried to hold its shows in February, but owing to the New York Show being held that month, they found it next to impossible to get an all-round judge, so had to postpone their dates. The lease of their present quarters, calls for the first part of February so that it cannot be postponed.

I have been looking around for some one with an objection, in order that the other side of the case might be presented, but so far I have been unable to uncover him. The success of the move will depend entirely upon the selection of judges, for Winnipeg has many good dog men, who are fully capable of filling this important post, and whose decisions would be just. They have been filling the office for outside shows, and have always drawn a good entry, and appear to have satisfied exhibitors. It takes differences of opinion to make dog shows, but these differences are so great between some shows, that it looks like accident. By all means criticizing the judges placings, in all fairness, but when the kennel papers publish a criticism. let them insist in the party writing it, signing his name, in order that the readers may place a proper value on the criticism. An unsigned article cannot be considered an opinion and the absence of the signature or name of the author, would have the appearance that to have signed it would detract from the value of it. It is good way to "knock" the other fellow's elog and come out of it yourself with a whole hide. I can readily understand your regular correspondent for a certain district, using a nom de plume but when he steps outside of his ordinary duties, and starts in to criticize either owners or dogs, let him sign his name.

I am informed that the Dominion Kennel Club has now over 200 members. This is certainly "going some," but the Executive do not intend stopping here, and are aiming at not less than 500 to close the year with. They are now considering additional privileges for members, and which will no doubt be made public shortly.

George Kynoch reports the sale of several Airedales. A little "ad." George, might assist in disposing of the rest. At any rate it would tell the boys that you are still in the game.

I have just been allowed the first look at the new arrival in town. He only got here this afternoon after a long trip, so could hardly do justice to himself. With all that he is a top notcher, and Easterners will be given a chance to see him at the Toronto show. His name is Yuma's Tonti and this will be quite familiar to those who follow the American show reports. Dr. C. E. Johnson is to be congratulated in securing this one and Western Pointer men will no doubt take advantage of his services. His first show was at New York, 1913, where he was placed first novice, second limit and reserve winners, beating amongst many other well known dogs, Maxim's Dan, winners dog at the Canadian National. Since then he has been placed first novice, first limit, Pittsburg ; first limit, first open, reserve winners, Columbus ; first open, reserve winners, Chicago ; ihird limit, Baltimore ; second limit, Washington ; second open, Nufolk Portsmouth ; first American bred, reserve winners, Sheepshead Bay ; first open, reserve winners, Mineola; first open, Lancaster; second open, Auberndale ; second open, first American bred, Devon ; first limit, Cincinnati ; second open, Long Beach ; second limit, second open, reserve winners, Newport ; finst open, winners, Rockingham; first open, winners, Ambler; first open, winners, Allentown; first open, winners, Syracuse ; first open, winners, Lennox ; first open, winness, New Richmond. He is only three years old so has lots of time to make a Canadian record.

In looking over the back numbers of the Gazette, I notice the question asked, "Can a judge withhold winners, after having awarded a first in the lower classes." I note the views of the editor on this question, and as claiming the judge has the right to withhold any prize. I cannot see it this way. I do not think the rule giving the judge full discretionary powers to withhold any or all prizes for want or merit, covers this particular point. While the judge, in a winners class, no doubt makes a decision as between the winners of the lower classes yet, the classes themselves might, or in fact usually, decides this. To quote the rule it reads, "Full discretionary power is given the judge of each class to withhold any or all prizes for want of merit." Another rule reads, "That all the separate classes of any breed must be adjudicated upon by the same judge." So that in the first rule, the word "class" means breed. "To withhold any or all prizes" means, that he may withhold first prize, or second prize or third prize or the three of them. The dog show rules define the winners class as being open only to winners of first prizes in any recognized class. To have a winners class you must have first prize winners, therefore, if you have any first prize winners, you have candidates for a winners class. If you have only one candidate he should be the winner, as he already qualified by winning a first in one of the lower classes. The plea of "lack of merit" is not a good one, as the dog must have shown the same want of it, in the other class. There are not different standards of quality for each class. I have seen one of a breed entered in a show and as getting first novice, second limit. The judge stated that he showed merit as a novice but not in the limit. Is this judging the future of the dog or not? I think that all awards should be made on a basis of the present, as no one can prophesy with any certainty, as to what the dog may be. Again, in the puppy class, you will often hear the exhibitor asked the age of the puppy. The only interpretat-

ion is, that allowance is being made for age, and that the judge is making allowance for a possible change in the puppy, and which change may never take place. The excuse is often made that the first is given in the lower class to encourage the exhibitor, and winners is withheld, so that championship points will not be counted. It does not work out that way in the majority of cases, and the exhibitor is usually more disappointed at not getting winners, when he had won a first, than if he had been told to start with, that his dog lacked merit.

Glad to see Mr. R. G. Persse back in the game. Thought that he could not stay away from it for long, "Pat" has purchased a dog pup from F. Goodman, bred the same way as Good Shot. He should know this breeding well, as he bred the dam, a full sister to that sterling bitch, Crescentwood Norah.

Anyone thinking that interest in dog shows was on the wane in Winnipeg, should have been present the Saturday evening, when the dogs were leaving for Toronto. The express office was a busy place, but the best evidence of there still being interest taken was to listen for the amount of each shipper's express charges as he weighed up. \$11.00 per hundred does not look much on paper, but it counts up on an express scale. I heard the express agent say, \$16.85, \$18.00, \$14.50. That was enough. I think the Western exhibitor cannot be accused of lack of gameness.

As another hint for the man "not to believe everything he heard," I listened to two doggy men telling the good qualities of their dogs. One owned a Bull Terrier, who had tackled a burglar breaking into the house one night, knocked him down and stunned him by beating him with his tail. The other owned a Retriever, and the owner and friend were hunting one day, and the friend in firing accidentally hit the They were greatly surprised to dog. see the dog come to them, with its tail in its mouth. We have good Retrievers in the West, and they are just as game as the exhibitors.

A good joke is being told on one of Winnipeg's doggy men. It appears that he required a cookstove for use in the kennel, and the proprietor had one sent out. On visiting the kennels some days after, the proprietor noticed the stove and pipes, just where it had been unloaded from the rig. He asked the kennel man why he did not put it up and got the following reply: "You fellows thought you were putting one over on me, when you sent round stove pipes, to fit an oval hole, on the back of the stove."

The Mersey Kennels have been keeping quiet, but I have it on good authority, that the proprietor known in the city as "the Bulldog King," will visit across the water, after the New Year. To use his own words, "I just want to see the best one in the West so that I will know how good a one I will have to bring out." And he will do it, but if he stops at one, I miss my guess. Hop to it "Jack" and get them here for the Western Canada Show.

"Dug" McKay has bred his Pointer Jean, to Dr. C. E. Johnson's new importation, Yuma's Tonti. Should a litter result, "Dug" will be well fixed for Derbies for the Field Trials. The rule calls for nominations to be whelped after Jan. 1st.

Secretary Love is getting busy and has started his committee meetings in connection with the Western Canada Show in February. The boys intend making this one a "hummer" and are getting at the details good and early.

A meeting was held on the 21st in the Industrial Bureau, Winnipeg, for the purpose of organizing the Airedale Fanciers of the West, and starting a specialty club. The name chosen for the new club is The Dominion Airedale Club, and the officers elected are as follows :

Brandon, Medicine Hat, Fort William and Regina will be asked to name representatives. Stakes events will be inaugurated at once and of which notice will be given through the Gazette. "Produce," "Puppy" and "Stud Dog" stakes are being considered. These will commence with the beginning of the New Year, but in the meantime a sweepstakes is being arranged for the Western Canada Show in February, for "best puppy dog," "best puppy bitch," and "best brace."

The specialty club movement seems to be catching, as I already hear rumors of the Bulldog, Collie, Spaniel, and Pit Bull Terrier men forming clubs of their own. I think this is a move in the right direction and as one inclined to help along the shows. I have it from one of the Pit Bull Terrier fanciers, that they are talking of asking the D.K.C. to give them recognition and to call their breed "American Bull Terriers." The word "Pit" is rather suggestive and to some it sounds distasteful. None of our fanciers are breeding for this quality so why tag the dog with such a suggestive name. (A happy suggestion .--Ed.)

There was much excitement in Winnipeg doggy circles as the reports of the doings of the local dogs at the show in Toronto, came in. "Dug" McKay had arranged for a wire each night and the sporting page in the Free Press was much sought after, each morning. John James Adams increased his weight with each successive hand shake, and it is said that he got so much hand shaking, that he acquired the habit, and could be seen shaking hands with himself every few minutes. "Bob" Cowan just smiled and said it was one that he had in cold storage. "Doc." Johnson is more satisfied than ever, with his recent importation. Winning has become a habit with "Vic" Kobold. It is by no means a bad habit. In the midst of the rejoicing, those that had fallen were not forgotten, however, they are all good sportsmen, and know "that it is all in the game." It is differences of opinion that makes dog shows, and without them there would be no shows. "Doctors disagree, and patients die." I hear now that it is the wise ones that are saying, "I told you so," whereas the knowing ones say "Impossible, can't be."

At a meeting of the Brandon Kennel Club held on 3rd inst., it was decided to hold a bench show during the Winter Fair, (first week in March), under D.K.C. rules.



SPANIELS AND HUMANS.

There were so many matters of interest to attract attention to the recent International Congress of Medicine in London that comparatively little heed was paid by the public to the English-speaking conference on infant mortality-a great and imposing affair at which this country, and indeed every other English-speaking nation, was adequately represented. It may be for this reason that certain re marks of the Right Hon. John Burns were allowed to pass unnoticed ; for otherwise it is hardly possible to understand how he could with impunity have used such arguments as he did in his appeal to the fanciers of cats and lapdogs.

Referring to the statistics of certain districts where working women are overburdened with children, he observed that elsewhere there were too many mourning over cats and keeping the company of Toy Terriers, and added that, "if, instead of wasting their guineas on overcoats for lapdogs, slippers for hounds, and bracelets for favorite puppies, some of these ladies would come to him, he would be pleased to convert himself into a children's agency and provide them with human substitutes, and it would do them more good than they thought."

If Mr. Burns had followed the latest controversy on experiments on animals he would have known very well that his appeal was fdle. In the course of that interesting discussion Mr. John Galsworthy quoted with obvious approval the following saying of some "If I were conanonymous lady : demned to spend twenty-four hours alone with a single creature I would choose to spend them with my dog." And he added that besides himself there were "innumerable people in all ranks of our civilized world who would echo the words," for human companionship, generally speaking, is not the same as that of the dog, "with its ever-ready, touching humility."

If children were only as humble and as servile as dogs it might be possible to offer them as adequate substitutes, but, as Mr. Galsworthy remarked, he saw a Spaniel that very day looking up at its mistress with a perfect confidence rarely seen in a child toward its own mother. The fact is that many good people are like the late Frances Power Cobbe, who loved dogs by nature but humans only by grace,—N. Y. Sun.


NO RECIPROCITY AGREEMENT YET.

Our friend the Collie Folio takes up the matter of reciprocity between England and the United States, cays the American Stock-Keeper. Owing to some restricted policy on the part of the

A. K. C. nothing of this subject has been made officially public, so we took upon ourselves the burden of inquiring into the matter when in New York the other day. The reciprocity treaty seems to be all on one side-the American-and the fun of it is that the Reciprocity Committee here knows precious little about it and has never done any business in the matter, nor has anything pertaining to reciprocity been sanctioned or indorsed by the delegates or directors. Early in the year there was a mention made in the report of an A. K. C. meeting that the members went into executive session and on reconvening it was stated that they were in entire accord with the matter discussed, or words to that effect. It became rumored about that a dog once registered on the other side could not be registered here under another name, that the two countries recognized each other's prefixes and so on, and that the "black list" of each country would be mutually respected.

Mr. A. P. Vredenburgh, secretary of the American Kennel Club, in his course of a letter to Mr. Mason dated January 17, 1913, stated :--We now have a reciprocity agreement between the English Kennel Club and the American Kennel Club under which if this man is disciplined by the English Kennel Club we as a necessity must recognize that discipline in this country."

As a matter of fact this was not so at the time, but it is illustrative of the jump or miss style we have of doing things. When the other side was approached on this subject they willingly entered into the matter, though Dr. De Mund, chairman of the Reciprocity Committee, states that he and his fellows have had nothing much to do with the agreement. While Dr. De Mund was away in California the secretary had a beautiful set of engrossed agreements to these effects drawn up, and they were signed by August Belmont and sent to England. But. with that thorough perspicacity which serves to distinguish the English Kennel Club methods from our own, the former began to take serious notice and look into things. They were willing that everything should go through but the "'black list" reciprocity, for they found on looking up things that the secretary of the Canadian Kennel Club had been disciplined by the American Kennel Club (it was because he would not come down and testify about alleged wrongdoing in the ring at Buffalo several years ago unless his expenses were paid, nor yet furnish an affidavit ; then he was disqualified). Now, the Canadian Kennel Club being an affiliated club with the English, the latter very politely showed that so long as this disqualification stood in the way naturally they could not recognize American disqualifications without offending Canada, but all the rest was satisfactory, and if the other matter can be fixed up by the reinstatement of the Canadian they will sign the agreement, but as yet, we can truthfully say, there is no such agreement as related above in the secretary's letter, nor in the supposition of our contemporary.

FOR THE NOVICE.

It is remarkable how difficult it is to make some people understand that to rid a dog of worms you must go about it in a rational manner. There are a great variety of remedies in vogue for this purpose, and some of them are recommended as being effective without the need for giving any aperient afterwards. Personally I have always preferred to give a subsequent aperient, so as to make sure of an effective clearance. But it is not so much with that aspect of the question that we are concerned at the present moment, rather it is in regard to preparing dogs beforehand that there is a good deal of perverse negligence. It is particularly essential that a dog should get a dose of worm medicine when his stomach is fairly empty. This does not mean that he ought to be starved for twenty-four hours beforehand; but it does mean that it would be wise to send him to bed supperless, and then give him the vermifuge first thing next morning. By so doing you ensure its quick effect, and if an aperient-say, a brisk dose of castor oil-be given afterwards, it will be all the more expeditious and effective .- Medicus, in Our Dogs.

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BULLDOG TYPE

BY HENRY D. COGLAN

At this time, when the national dog of Old England bids fair to become also a typical Canadian, the following comprehensive article from Field and Fancy is of more than common interest. We in Canada have need to settle on a type. Our shows prove it, and none better than that just held in Toronto.

There is said to be a stream in America named for some Indian chief. The sounds are unlike those for which the English alphabet was fashioned. There is therefore, much controversy as to what is the proper spelling of the name. As a result of this uncertainty the natives have come to the conclusion "th'aint no proper way to spell it."

The Bulldog world is in much the same condition of uncertainty respecting Bulldog type, and in the light of recent articles and the work of certain judges at our shows, are settling down to the grim conclusion that "th'aint no such thing."

Whether history repeats itself, or it is the same old heresy which has been smoldering all these years, the condition of the Bulldog world to-day is much the same as that described by Mr. James W. Berrie as existing in 1875. "At that time," says the venerable president of the Bulldog Club (Incorporated) of England, in his preface to the standard of that club, "there were three factions among the fanciers, all holding the same views as to the correct points required in their dogs, but each believing that his own strain and ideas were the only correct ones. There was Thomas Verrender, of Barnet Common, who believed in a cloddy, well-made dog, but of the decidedly small type; Bill George, of Kensal Green, had a large strain, equally good, but differing in size. Then came the Lamphier and Eden strain, descended from King Dick. Speaking figuratively, these men each believed that his own strain was the only correct thing."

Shades of the past. It is hard to refrain from thinking that the spirits of these pioneers have not been reincarnated in their prototypes of the present. We can easily imagine how Thomas Verrender, of Barnet Common, would place Centaur and Deodora Monarch, for instance. And we are equally certain that Bill George, of Kensal Green, would reverse the order, and, with a firm and an honest conviction, that his "was the only and correct thing." That the spirits of these men live in the fanciers of the present there can be no doubt. But I am degressing.

Organization of the Bulldog Club.

In order to overcome the confusion related by Mr. Berrie, and have the Bulldog take its place in the modern canine world, The Bulldog Club, Incorporated, came into being in 1875. It was founded upon the remains of a club of the same name formed in the early sixties, and which boasted of a standard which had been in effect since about 1865. This standard was adopted by the younger organization, substantially as it was written and has been regarded since and is today the ten commandments of the Bulldog world.

Writing of the enactment of the provisions of The Standard, Mr. Berrie says : "The points of the Bulldog were discussed and determined long before the present generation was ever thought of, and have been collectively handed down to us by men of undoubted experience and judgment, who have not only studied (mark this word, brother fanciers and judges-studied) the written and verbal opinions of their older brother fanciers, but have compared them with the famous dogs of the day" * * * "This standard has stood the test of nearly a half century and dogs are bred with the aim of possessing all the collective points in The Standard, and should have them to be a perfect specimen of the breed."

The Standard a Composite Model. The Standard, therefore, is not a description of any man's dog, but a description of a composite specimen -of a beautifully balanced Bulldog. combining character, expression and apparent utility. Like the Venus of antiquity, it is a composite model of all the good points in beautiful proportion and symmetry, and was placed high, as Mr. Berrie says : "So that every dog should be brought up to The Standard, and no loophole given to bring The Standard down to any man's dog." Thus was there created a goal towards which the breeder, should direct his mental efforts, for in that direction, and that only, is the only real improve-

ment of the breed. In the canine world there exists for each breed an accepted standard of what should and what does constitute perfection, as understood and agreed upon by the majority of experienced judges and breeders. "New types are not wanted," says "Great Dane" in his admiral treatise on "The Principles of Dog Breeding." "Indeed there are even now more markedly distinct strains * * * than our judges know well what to do with * * * In all established breeds, then, type should conform to the published and generally accepted standards." To define

The Standard Type in Bulldogs

is, perhaps, a trifle difficult, and one that is rarely attempted, strange to

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say. But in doing so I am backed by an array of authorities and an experience that gives me a feeling of confidence I should not otherwise have enjoyed in approaching such a subtle definition. And, if it will bring about a better understanding in the Bulldog fancy and ameliorate the conditions confronting judges and reviewers, I shall feel amply repaid for my efforts.

The Points of the Breed Combined With Character Make up What is Termed "Bulldog Type."

Type is an aggregate of all the points in The Standard, existing in a more or less degree of proportion as regards size, quantity, extent, etc., and symmetry of outline, all merging into a harmonious whole, which in combination with character-the attitude, gait, carriage, expression, and much more hard to describe in an article of this character, but easy to recognize by the experienced eyeconveys to the eye that impression of harmony and balance between the parts.

The Excellency of the Type is Measured by the Scale of Points of The Standard-this is the

Quality.

The excellency of perfection of the type thus gleaned is measured-not literally, but by comparison-by the scale of points of The Standard, which specifies in figures the relative merit of one point to another, and the relative bearing of one point to the whole. Therefore, the first impression which the specimen conveys to the experienced eye determines the type, and the excellency of the specimen is then weighed and considered from the standpoint of the relative merit of one specimen of type to The Standard, or to another specimen of "the type." Quality is different from character, though it enters into the latter in the last analysis. It is a refinement arising from perfection in details of proportion, symmetry and character-the same refinement which in "humans" is designated as the "gentleman."

There is Type and Near-Type for the Purpose of Judging.

While a Bulldog without type and character is not a correct specimen of the breed, it frequently, nay, often happens, that specimens are put up for comparison possessing type and character in head, and lacking same in body, and vice versa. In other words, a dog with a good head and a poor body, etc. In making this distinction I hope I will not be classed with "Puddin' Head Wilson," immortalized in Mark Twain's book of that name, whose attempt to differentiate between the half of a dog raised an isuse in a community which lasted for years, until a simple explanation cleared up the mystery. But a subsequent article will elucidate "What he is going to do with the other half of that dog."

"A perfect specimen," says Mr. Berrie, "is one which cannot be improved, and the alteration of any point would render it imperfect." Therefore, exaggeration in a given point is just as fatal as lack of excel-

And lence of that particular point. the excess or lack of perfection in any point in a given specimen is an exact measure of the extent in which the point fails in being a perfect point of the breed. Likewise the aggregate failings of the whole of the points is an exact measure of the failure of the specimen in being a perfect Bulldog, according to The Standard.

This is so necessarily, because perfection is not based upon an absolute standard of measurements, but rather upon a proportion and symmetry of measurements of all the parts of a specimen. That is to say, The Standard of the Bulldog is

Based Upon a Consensus of Judgment

which requires no fixed or arbitrary measurements, but simply that the specimen shall come within the definition of the standard Bulldog, and be about fifty pounds in weight, for a dog, and forty pounds, for a bitch. Therefore, by the same token, the only other definition possible would be that the specimen must be neither abnormally large nor abnormally small. And within that limit a large specimen, possessing in equal degree the points of the breed in symmetry and proportion, could be as near perfection as a small one, and vice versa. But as a matter of competition it is also possible to say, that other points being equal, the specimen nearest the Standard weight would have the preference, because The Standard has expressed this weight as being the most desirable. If this interpretation is accepted, and I submit that it is the only one which can be, it will forever put a stop to the interminable controversy of the Bulldog world as to the merits of the "little 'un" and the "big 'un."

Summarizing.

To summarize for the purpose of conclusion, the proportions of the specimen as regards size, quantity, extent, etc., in symmetrical outline, in combination with the true characteristics of the breed, constitutes TYPE. The degree of perfection in which the points of The Standard and the characteristics of the breed exists in a specimen determines the QUALITY, or degree of perfection of the typical specimen. That there is type of head and type of body. That as regards weight, all other points being equal, the specimen nearest The Standard weight-under or over -is the most desirable and therefore the better one, provided it be neither normally large nor abnormally small.

Therefore, a typical Bulldog is one that may be taken as a sort of a model-a living illustration of The Standard and the study of such specimens they are rare-with a critical eye is absolutely indispensable to the breeder, the critic and the judge.

To be more specific I would have to reiterate the published description of The Standard, but in lieu of the same I have taken the liberty of producing, by way of illustrating the point, a cut made from Mr. Desmond's admirable painting, reproduced in Mr. Herbert Crompton's "Twentieth Century Dog," which is on frontispiece this week.

This is said to have been painted from a model of one of Mr. Jeffries' dogs, with the assistance of that able breeder's advice and direction as to the points of the Bulldog to be embellished and portrayed to emphasize The Standard type. It is, of course, a picture of a composite dog, but helps to convey to the reader stronger and more lasting than mere description, The Standard type. It shows the evolution of the Bulldog from the fierce animal of bull baiting days to the symmetrical, well-proportioned character individual sought for "The New Order." The short, broad, blunt muzzle, the wide sweeping turned-up underjaw is here depicted, with the strikingly massive and large skull-the most prominent feature of the Bulldog. The heavily made foreparts taper to fine hindquarters and give the correct outline. This dog radiates Bulldog character, and is the very antithesis of the straight-jawed, Terrier-fronted, "leggy," flat-backed Terriers-the wastrels, which fill our benches to-day.

Thus will the fancier see that there is a distinct well-defined type, and a definite well-defined measure of what constitutes a Bulldog, above the opinion of any individual. But to weigh the dog by the measure-as I said, it is a measure of comparison-will in some cases always create a legitimate difference with judges, for the "human element" is always present, but it is this very difference which creates the sporting situation and makes the game .- Field and Fancy.
