It seems a strange anomaly that a dog registered in the English Kennel Club stud book, and accompanied by a certificate of same, may not be registered with us without fuller pedigree, but such is the case. The English Kennel Club requires certain proof of excellence in the way of winnings, along with two generations of pedigree; we require three generations of pedigree, so that many dogs registered in England are offered to us for registration and are refused until another generation is furnished. Surely the fact that a dog is registered in England, accompanied by proof of same, should be sufficient for us.

Those who have had experience in any way extensive with shows are very apt to question the value of special prizes as at present offered. In the first place, from the judges' point of view, they are generally offered with strings on or club conditions which cause a lot of worry to the judge. It is a familiar sight to see a buzzing swarm of specialty club members around an unfortunate judge, who, looks as though he were being stung to death and feels like it. Ofter exhibitors claim membership who are not entitled to same or who are in arrears and only pay up or become members when by doing so some special is in their grasp. Such members are, of course, of no value to a club, and the club is no gainer by getting them, they belong to the "something for nothing'' class. These claims add to the unfortunate judge's confusion. As often as not he leaves it entirely to the specialty club members, and there is a general grab. The whole procedure is undignified and unsportsmanlike. It would be better if a specialty club offer special prizes, to have them go with the awards of regular classes, and decided by the club itself at a meeting held after the judging.

Nor do these awards with strings on them indicate anything, as the real good dogs in a breed or class may not belong to members, so that a thirdrater may be winner of many specials.

We have the case also of the fraudulant or fictitious offer of specials, which, although few, are very annoying. This happens when members go around collecting specials on paper which sometimes are signed to get rid of the unfortunate pleader. These and the cheap skate trust to getting out of paying for one of the three reasons the specials not being won, the winner not taking the trouble to collect, or by repudiation of the signature. This failure generally reflects back on the canvasser for the special.

Next is the man who offers a cup or medal that brings out strong competition, giving a lot of trouble to secretaries, exhibitors and judges, and then expends the magnificent sum of about two dollars on it. Some specialty clubs are not free from this reproach of cheap advertising.

The unfortunate show secretary, however, is the greatest sufferer. He is expected to gather all the junk and distribute it. First he must write to each donor, notifying him who is the winner; second, he must stand all the abuse for those that go astray or are not paid at all, and the dissatisfaction, sometimes, of the winner at his prize; in fact, the winners almost look on him as the culprit in case of failure in any way.

The donor, too, even if he acts in all good faith, generally feels imposed upon, and is seldom thanked. He is usually some public man, and his leg is pulled on every occasion, and any interest or chance of interest he has in dogs is killed as dead as the proverbial door nail. We fancy many a good fancier or prospective fancier has dropped out for this reason. Of course, in the case of ribbon shows, specials are a necessary evil, but they should be confined to the awards as judged, should be in form of money where possible, and should all be collected before the show. Would it not be very much more satisfactory for a committee to collect as much money as possible before a show and offer it as actual prize money, publishing only a list of donors? In the case of big shows, such as the C. N. E., or the National Live Stock Show, where good substantial prizes are offered, we think they might well be dispensed with entirely, except those cash specials as are offered by C. N. E. for brace, trio and kennel of four, which really do not differ from the regular classes.

Mr. J. E. Comerwood, of Boston, has bought from Mr. G. C. Anne the winning rough Collie dog, Bayard of Melton.

Miss Bullocke, of Connecticut, has purchased from Mr. R. H. Lord the winning Collie dog, Seedley Stormer.

I understand that Mr. Donald Mc Kellar, late of Duncanon, and a great lover of the Scottish Terrier, is now settled for good at Burlington, Canada.

Mr. Tangye has sold to Mr. Savage, of St. Charles, U.S.A., the rough Collie dog, Cleethorpes Melton. The dog is a winner and his pedigree is of the best.

Mr. G. Raper has sold his famous Wire Fox Terrier, Baby Dazzler, to Mr. Quintard, of the United Staates.

Mrs. Feuillade has just sold to Mrs. Boyer, of Ontario, Penlaurel Nancy, a small Yorkshire bitch, by Bit of Frost. By the steamship Laurentic, on the 8th November, sailed for Canada, the Airedale Terrier bitch, Narrowdale Naomi, sold by its owner, Mr. Browne, to Mr. F. A. Taylor, of Kelowna, Canada. The above bitch is by Primrose Regent, and before leaving she was served by Ch. Rebound Oorang.

Mr. L. Yerkes, of America, has just bought a Cairn Terrier, which he took with him over the "herring pond."

Mr. H. S. Lloyd has just sold to America the Cockers, Larkspur of Ware (the purchaser is Miss Boyd, of New York), and Moneymaker of Ware (the buyer is Mr. Beard, of New York).

Mr. Francis Lloyd, of New York, has bought from Mr. G. Davidson the latter's Scottish Terrier dog, Merlewood Laddie, a winner of many prizes.

I think that the Bull Terrier is very popular in Canada. If not, he should be, for he is one of those breeds that accommodate themselves to any climate. Let us see what Mr. Leonard Herbert writes to Mr. A. Croxton-Smith, The Daily Telegraph's wellknown contributor, in this respect: "A twelvemonth or so ago, in reply to my inquiry as to your opinion of the Bull Terrier as a companion and house-dog, you expressed yourself very strongly in its favor. I think it will interest you to learn that the result of my year's experience convinces me that this is a breed which is very short of receiving the vogue it merits, this probably on account of its still bad. but undeserved, reputation from the old far-back days of dog fights, and also, to speak as a candid friend, from its not altogether lamb-like appearance. Give a dog, etc. A well-broughtup Bull Terrier has the most patient and sweet temper; it will stand any teasing or pulling about by children, its master, or his friends, even when feeding. It is obedient, a first-class guard at night (I should think protector also should the occasion arise), and, in particular, is more intelligent than any other dog I have personally owned, and I have had several breeds at various times, including two Poodles. I may say I obtained a puppy of good stock at a very moderate price as soon as old enough to leave his mother. He has been perfectly free of the house ever since, and has never given any trouble, except, of course, for the first week or two of a puppy's education as regards house cleanliness. These dogs seem almost capable of understanding conversation, and, in the case of mine at least, show a keen desire to learn any little tricks and good manners one shows them. Courageous, even fierce, as these dogs can be if set on by others-but this never unless long-provoked-mine lives in the utmost amity with the household tabby. It is almost one with the children in their games, and, to my surprise, at the seaside it proved almost as good a water dog as a Newfoundland. Probably the size discourages people from keeping this breed in towns, but I find they are less in the way than a Fox or other small terrier, for the reason that they are not fidgety. Directly mine gets home, he settles down at the domestic hearth in good bourgeois style, and 'only speaks when spoken to.' Your opinion last year was that Bull Terriers have all the virtues and none of the faults of the Bulldog. I can say from my experience that this is absolutely the fact. Stronger recommendation could not be given anyone who desires a dog as a friend, companion, and, in case of need, a guard for himself and youngsters.''

Mr. Croxton-Smith goes on to say as follows: "These views only confirm those of others who have had any prolonged experience of the breed. Far be it from us to depreciate the merits of the Bulldog, but much though we esteem him, it must be confessed that certain little habits render him less desirable in the house than the other. He is clumsier, and his way of breathing hard and snorting gets on the nerves of some people. Let us admit that the taste for a Bull Terrier is acquired rather than instinctive. At first sight there is something a little sinister about him, accentuated by the small and somewhat wicked-looking eve. Glance at him a second time, however, more carefully, and there will be revealed to you a sense of concentrated strength, and an appreciation of the clean outline and powerful frame, in which every muscle is apparent through the fine, close coat. He might almost have been carved out of marble before life was breathed into that vigorous frame. The eye, too, though small and deep set, is an intense black, which can never be unpleasing. Were it lighter it might be horrible. A vast difference to the expression is made by the color of the eye, when you come to think of it. thus providing justification for the importance usually assigned to this organ in most standards. An old Persian proverb ran: 'When the yellow dog entereth a palace there will be destruction in the gates thereof.' A yellow dog, a light eye, and, therefore, an unkindly, almost treacherous expression. May not this have given rise to the saying? Temperamentally, the Bull Terrier is endowed with a high courage that excludes fear from his mind, and those we have had the pleasure of

meeting have exhibited none of that superficial nervousness which is so apparent in many highly bred animals. It may be, though we have not examined sufficient pedigrees to speak dogmatically, that in-breeding has not been pushed to such an extent as in other varieties. . . . Fashion has decreed that the modern terrier shall be all white, whereas in the old days other markings were to be seen, such as brindle, white and fawn, brindle patched, etc., and the brindle still survives to some extent, mainly in the Midlands, we believe. . . . The standard-size of the Bull Terrier is 15 lbs. to 50 lbs., although in actual practice the minimum nowadays rarely sinks below 30 lbs. This, however, is not a large dog. . . . In the miniature Bull Terriers one meets with goggle eyes and short apple heads."

The great Kennel Club Show, at the famous Crystal Palace, has been (on the 21st, 22nd and 23rd of October 1st) and has gone, and we are already thinking about the date of the next year's Kennel Club show. A most beautiful show, with an entry of about 3,700 and nearly every dog of splendid quality. Much space is required to describe that show in all its particulars, and it is absolutely worth a visit from every distant land. It is very interesting to note that the first dog show held by the Kennel Club at the Crystal Palace, Sydenham, took place on the 17th, 18th, 19th and 20th of June, 1873, with an entry of 973. How does this compare with this year's entry, or with that of 1911, of nearly 4,000? In 1912 there were 1,056 shows held under the authority of the Kennel Club, against 316 in 1900.

I think that the scientific aspect of the question of dog-breeding is not often enough to the fore in this country. The question is, does the age of the dog and of the bitch permanently influence the progeny? It is certain that either too old or too young parents produce sickly and often difform progeny, whose power of resistance, especially against distemper, are very weak. It is not, however, from that point of view that the question of dog-reproduction is being considered, but rather from that of size, conformation, qualities and imperfections transmitted by the parent-stock, physically and morally. It has been noticed in the breeding of stock-whether horses, cattle or dogs-that it is always preferable, in order to be successful, to introduce to a female of large size a male of average size, but well proportioned. The general rule is that the male, without being of a size below the average, must be compactly built, near enough the ground, with an assured action, the result of the possession of correct limbs, and full of energy and health. It goes without saying that he must be of good temperament, for vicious and sullen animals must never be used at stud. A male who is shrunk in the flank, whose limbs are slender, who has no stamina, whose ribs are flat, and who, in a word, looks "sausage-like," will never be any use as a sire. His progeny will often be loose in limbs, and although when young they will perhaps look "elegant," yet when adult they will rarely preserve those qualities which distinguish them in their puppyhood. There are many gundogs, especially on the continents, Pointers, for instance, of medium size, but well made, who are capable of working every day from 8 a.m. till 4 p.m. These dogs work splendidly so far as endurance and speed are concerned, and, notwithstanding the great fatigue to which they are subjected, their appetites are always very good. On the contrary, one never finds on the continent, especially in France, a gundog of "elegant" conformation and large size who is capable of doing a great deal of work in the field. In order to obtain giant progeny, it is not sufficient to mate giants. Feeding plays a very important part, and animals fed rationally and abundantly during their puppyhood very often reach a size above the average. It is just the same with human beings. A breed can be improved more rapidly with the help of males, but more surely and more permanently with the help of females. The male gives the form, the female the constitution and the moral qualities. Generally, one finds in the products of the second generation the defects and qualities of the grandparents. Bitches whose mouths are hard, who are gunshy, who are independent, "thievish," (those who have a predilection for poultry), or difficult to train, often communicate such defects to their progeny. Generally speaking, one sticks too much to the male's qualities, and one does not care enough about that of the female. While on the subject of

form, a little digression may be permitted here. Certain judges have a mania for preferring straight stifles in nearly every dog. It may be admitted that the bent stiffes are allowable in certain breeds, but this cannot be admitted in the case of the Pointer, or of dogs generally. Bent stifles are the appanage of "springers," of felines, and of crouching animals, but animals built for speed, for endurance, have all rather straight stifles. By this I do not mean faulty stifles. The straight line proceeding from the point of the stifle follows the tarsus in order to terminate in the pastern, and must be perpendicular. In the case of horses this lines goes from the point of the buttocks. In the case of dogs, it is admitted that the line which goes from the point of the buttocks in order to terminate on the ground should pass about two inches in front of the tarsus in a medium-sized dog. The thigh must be long, sinewy, flat enough, and especially well-furnished at its beginning near the buttocks. All animals which are fast, and whose endurance is great, have straight stifles - thoroughbred horses, stags, roe-bucks, wolves, and hunting dogs. On the contrary, springing animals or crouching animals have bent stifles-cats, tigers, lions, foxes, etc.

IRISH TERRIER

The origin of the Irish Terrier is put in a very concise form by the late Geo. R. Krehl, Esq., editor of the London (Eng.) Stockkeeper, when he stated that "This is a true and distinct breed indigenous to Ireland, and that no man ean trace its origin, which is lost in antiquity."

For some years previous to 1879 Irish Terriers had been exhibited at some of the leading shows in England and Ireland. It was not, however, until 1879 that the Irish Terrier Club (of Great Britain and Ireland) was founded for the protection and advancement of the breed, and to define precisely and publish a description of the true type and only recognized and unvarying standard by which they are to be judged. Needless to say, the club has done an incalcuable amount of good in earrying out the object for which it was instituted. Amongst some of the prominent members might be mentioned: Viscount Castlerossa, Earl of Shannon, Dr. R. B. Carey, J.P., Dr. H. J. Twanley, Col, Ireland, Messrs. R. J. Ridgeway, George R. Krehl, J. J. Pim, Geo. Jamison, R. Erskine, E. F. Despard, Harding Cox, H. Waterhouse, Wm. Graham, F. Clifton, C. J. Barnett, J. Mayall, E. A. Weiner, T. Ramsey Ramsey, F. W. Breakell, H. Benner, T. Wallace, W. J. Parkes, R. M. Bolster, F. M. Jewett, W. H. Darker, and Miss L. A. Paul.

The Irish Terrier Club must be credited as the first to adopt regulations to abolish that cruel and unnecessary practice of cropping the ears of Irish Terriers, and of requesting the Kennel Club to extend the said regulations and make it a rule compulsory on all shows held under their rules. The Kennel Club decided to grant the request, which eventually lead to the prohibition being extended to include all breeds.

Possibly none of the dogs now being shown on this continent can compare with a few of the giants of the past, and we may be asked to point out a dog so closely approaching the standard and quality of Ch. Brickbat; or possessing the true characteristics of Ch. Breda Mixer; or with the great head, expression, body, coat and symmetry of Ch. Breda Muddler; or with the grand head, small dark eyes, keen expression, grand front and outline of that gentlemanly dog, Ch. Bolton Woods Mixer; or that of his famous son, Ch. Straight Tip.

It must be admitted, however, that great advancement has been made during recent years on both sides of the Atlantic, and that the breed generally is much more uniform in type and character, and that a much larger number of good specimens are now to be seen. This is specially so in the bitches, which leads us to believe that the difficult problem of breeding true Irish Terriers will be successfully solved within a short time.

The Irishman has won as assured place amongst the lovers of dogs, and there is no reason whatever why he should not only retain this position, but make himself more and more popular as years roll by.

Vero Shaw, Esq., author of "Book of the Dog," and late editor of the "Field," (English), writes:

"Very few, if any, more excellent varieties of Terrier exist than the plucky, red-coated, hard-haired breed which has been sent over to us by the sportsman on the other side of the St. George's Channel. The Irish Terrier is dead game, a good water dog, a first-rate companion, and a very hardy constituted animal, and no higher praise can by any possibility be bestowed upon a breed. The excellent qualities of the Irishman has enabled him to work his way into the front rank of popular favorites, and there can be no denying the fact that his success has been thoroughly well deserved."

F. M. Jowett, Esq., an eminent English authority, states:

"As a companion the Irish Terrier has, in my opinion, no superior, and I have kept most breeds of sporting terriers from my boyhood. He is very hardy, easily trained when properly handled, is a very useful size and able to stand more wet, cold and fatigue than most terriers. To see them play with children is a pleasure, so kind and gentle, and I have never known of one to bite or snap at a child during the years that I have kept the breed. When they once get full confidence in their master they prove to be highly intelligent, yet full of fire and courage when required, and from their peculiar, hardy, active habits are reserving of the foremost rank amongst working terriers."

Anyone who is familiar with the breed must have been impressed with the divergence in type at our shows, not only with the exhibits, but also amongst the winners, possibly because the latter matter rests with the judges alone, and too frequently with the allround judges, some of whom entirely fail to grasp the true type and character of the Irish Terrier. Therefore it is not only important, but essential to the welfare of the breed, that exhibitors and breeders should unite to impress upon the committees of shows the great necessity of appointing only men with a thorough knowledge of the breed, who know, recognize, and adhere to the correct type so well defined in the unvarying "Standard" and rules laid down for their information and guidance.

Possibly what we want to preserve more than anything else in the Irish Terrier is the true expression and character which is different from that of any other breed. We do not want red Fox Terriers, nor do we desire small Airedale Terriers, Irish Terriers, which do not exceed 24 to 27 pounds, can still be produced, but we must not dispense with the true characteristic head and expression indicative of the breed. We have at present in Canada some good specimens of the best breeding, and it should only require judicious mating to produce typical terriers. "RELLIM."

Descriptive Particulars.

Head.

Long; skull flat and rather narrow between ears, getting slightly narrower towards the eye; free from wrinkle; stop hardly visible, except in profile. The jaw must be strong and muscular, but not too full in the cheek, and of a good punishing length. There should be a slight falling away below the eye. so as not to have a Greyhound appearance. Hair on face of same description as on body, but short (about a quarter of an inch long), in appearance almost smooth and straight; a slight beard is the only longish hair (and it is long only in comparison with the rest) that is permissible, and that is characteristic.

Teeth.

Should be strong and level.

Lips.

Not so tight as a Bull Terrier's, but well-fitting, showing through the hair their black lining.

Nose.

Must be black.

Eyes.

A dark hazel color, small, not prominent, and full of life, fire and intelligence.

Ears.

Small and V-shaped, of moderate thickness, set well on the head, and dropping forward closely to the cheek. The ear must be free of fringe, and the hair thereon shorter and darker in color than the body. No cropped Irish Terrier, born since March 1, 1897, can compete for any prizes offered by the club.

Neck.

Should be of a fair length, and gradually widening toward the shoulders, well carried and free of throatiness. There is generally a slight sort of frill visible at each side of the neck, running nearly to the corner of the ear.

Shoulders and Chest.

Shoulders must be fine, long and sloping well into the back; the chest deep and muscular, but neither full nor wide.

Back and Loin.

Body moderately long; back should be strong and straight, with no appearance of slackness behind the shoulders; the loin broad and powerful and slightly arched; ribs fairly sprung, rather deep than round, and well-ribbed back. Hindquarters.

Should be strong and muscular, the thighs powerful, hocks near the ground, stifles moderately bent.

Stern.

Generally docked; should be free of fringe or feather, but well covered with rough hair, set on pretty high, carried gaily but not over the back or curled.

Feet and Legs.

Feet should be strong, tolerably round, and moderately small; toes arched and neither turned out nor in; black toe-nails are most desirable. Legs moderately long, well set from the shoulders; perfectly straight, with plenty of bone and muscle; the elbows working freely clear of the sides; pasterns short and straight, hardly noticeable. Both fore and hind legs should be moved straight forward when travelling, the stifles not turned outwards, the legs free of feather and covered like the head with as hard a texture of coat as body, but not so long.

Coat.

Hard and wiry, free of softness or silkiness, not so long as to hide the outlines of the body, particularly in the hindquarters, straight and flat, no shagginess, and free of lock or curl. Color.

Should be "whole colored," the most preferable being bright red, red, wheaton or yellow red. White sometimes appears on chest and feet; it is more objectionable on the latter than on the chest, as a speck of white on chest is frequently to be seen in all self-colored breeds.

Size and Symmetry.

The most desirable weight in show condition is, for a dog 24 lbs., and for a bitch 22 lbs. The dog must present an active, lively, lithe, and wiry appearance; lots of substance, at the same time free of clumsiness, as speed and endurance, as well as power, are very essential. They must be neither "cloddy nor cobby," but should be framed on the "lines of speed," showing a graceful "racing outline."

Temperament.

Dogs that are very game are usually surly or snappish. The Irish Terrier, as a breed, is an exception, being remarkably good-tempered, notably so with mankind, it being admitted, however, that he is perhaps a little too ready to resent interference on the part of other dogs. There is a heedless, reckless pluck about the Irish Terrier which is characteristic, and, coupled

with the deadlong dash, blind to all consequences, with which he rushes at his adversary, has earned for the breed the proud epithet of "The Dare-Devils." When "off duty" they are characterized by a quiet, caress-inviting appearance, and when one sees. them endearingly, timidly pushing their heads into their master's hands it is difficult to realize that on occasion, at the "set-on," they can prove they have the courage of a lion, and will fight on to the last breath in their bodies. They develop an extraordinary devotion to, and have been known to track their masters almost incredible distances.

MORE IRISH

Editor, Kennel and Bench:

Dear Sir,-I am glad to see that your able and interesting article on "Type in Terriers," in your July number, has commanded attention, and that the views it expresses have been endorsed by Mr. Colin Jackson, of North Vancouver. It would be a thousand pities to lose our Airedale, Fox and Irish Terriers and have as a substitute one terrier, varying indeed in size and color and, in accordance with its size and color, called respectively Airedale, Fox or Irish, but in which many of the most characteristic marks of these several breeds were buried out of sight Yet this is what must inevitably occur unless a period be put to the sort of judging which now obtains. Indeed, already, if one picks up a good illustrated paper it is sometimes not a little difficult to determine whether a dog portrayed is a small Airedale or a big Irishman; and the Fox Terrier is rapidly being pressed into the same mould. Yet these are all distinct breeds, having each its ardent admirers, and having, as you have so well shown, differences in conformation peculiar to each.

"The coat is a right useful one, short and broken, much harder than it looks, being a good mixture of hard and soft hair, and in fact just the coat to get dry after an immersion with a few good shakes and a roll on the grass. . . And with the hair on the top of the head much softer than on the body, as is also the case in both Bedlingtons and Dandies."—Dalziel British Dogs, 2nd Ed., Vol. II., p. 334. Who, visiting our dog shows to-day and instructed only by what he sees

there, could suppose that this is a de-

scription of the coat of the Airedale Terrier? Indeed, I remember seeing a very fine exhibit of Airedales in Toronto some years ago and being greatly impressed by the splendid appearance of one dog, which seemed to me to possess in remarkable perfection the marks and tokens of a true bred Airedale. The passage I have quoted from Dalziel describes his coat exactly. Imagine my astonishment on being told by the owner's representative-a particularly civil and apparently a very capable man-that as the dog was just imported from England there had not been time to prepare him for the show, but that 'he would look a very different dog when all that soft hair had been taken out of him!' A different dog he would look to a certainty after one of the most characteristic marks of his breed, which he displayed to perfection, had been got rid of.

Three years ago I saw a very large exhibit of Irish Terriers in Belfast. They were a wonderfully level lot and the task of judging could have been no sinceure. I was glad to see that the hideous, grostesque, trumated muzzle, monstrous and heavy out of all proportion to the skull-such as disfigured that otherwise splendid Irish Terrier, Celtic Badger-had practically disappeared, and that some of the highest prizes were awarded to dogs having muzzles of a quite different type. But I was greatly disappointed to find that prizetakers in many cases were dogs of a cobby build; and "the racinglike wiry frame, the racing build that shows speed and nimbleness-most useful qualities in rabbiting, ratting and kindred sports''-was nowhere in evidence.

Seeing a man leading a handsome bitch, I asked if she had got a prize? He replied: "Yes-first in her class." She had a good head, and carried her ears beautifully. Her coat was perfect in texture and color, her legs all that could be desired. She stood well up upon good feet and carried herself like a game cock. But she was short, tight and cobby, and her back and loin were in one straight line, as level as a billiard table. After expressing appreciation of her good points, I ventured to remark that Irish Terriers seemed to be bred with flatter loins nowadays than formerly. A friend who was with the owner interposed with the remark that he did not know what I meant. I explained that a

slightly arched loin used to be required. "Oh, no!" he said. "Never. We don't want them with lurcher rumps." I was about to suggest with becoming modesty, I hope, that even a very slight study of the official description of the breed might be useful. But somewhat to my surprise, the owner came to my support with the statement that what I said was quite correct, but that the curved loin did not seem to be required now. I said it was a pity, as straight lines are not the lines of speed, and that the arched loin is not a mere superficial fad, like abnormally long ears, or abnormally long hair upon the feet of some dogs, but a requirement based upon a fundamental quality of the breed. This has been made subordinate by judges to points of comparative insignificance, in their nature merely superficial, and which are liable to vary as much from time to time as the fashion of a lady's bonnet-e.s., the color of the coat, the color of the eve, the size and shape of the ear, and even (though more important) the conformation of the muzzle. These can vary without detracting from the usefulness of the dog; whereas the straightening out of the loin means decrease of speed.

I had a talk on this subject with that excellent judge and breeder of the Irish Terrier, Mr. M. Short, of Belfast. He cordially agreed with my views, but said: "The trouble is you can't get them," i.e., the lengthy nimble dogs, built on racing lines. But I venture to think, sir, that, although missing for the moment, this all-important characteristic is not irretrievably lost. It is merely submerged and can be brought to the surface again by judicious selection and mating.

Toronto has felt the want of an outcross in a St. Bernard stud dog for at least two years, and the purchase of Alta the King, by a local breeder, at the recent Live Stock Show has solved a knotty problem.

Mrs. Lee, of Toledo, Ohio, was the vendor, and Mr. W. E. Harkness," of Brock Avenue, Toronto, was the man who put up the price for one of the most promising youngsters of the day. Alta the King is one of the few sound giants, although just sixteen months old, he stands 351/2 inches at shoulder. His bone is immense, his forelegs like veritable pillars in their massiveness, as smooth and sound as a Foxhound's in conformation, and as straight as the proverbial gun-barrel. His color is a bright orange, with the orthodox white markings and black face shadings. His head is of the approved type, being strong in character and deep in face properties. His wrinkle is well placed and augmented by a small, dark, wellset eye; his expression is of that benevolent order so closely associated with the breed. His first appearance on the show bench was at Cincinnati, when 11 months old. He spread-eagled the puppy class. At Toronto he won 1st junior, 1st novice, 3rd limit, 3rd open. Mr. Bert Swann, who advised Mr. Harkness in the deal, on its completion, booked no less than 4 bitches to him, and as this was an impossible contract to fulfil, owing to this wellknown handler only possessing three females of the saintly order, he, too, approached the proprietoress of the Alta Kennels, with the result that Alta Eva, litter sister to Alta Big Ben, a wonderful headed lady, with bone and substance that would do credit to one of the sterner sex, was added to the Parkdale St. Bernards. This boom in large breeds in Ontario, coupled with the remarkable entry at the recent show, speaks volumes for the welfare of a breed so long associated with dog shows the world over.

CRITICIZING THE CRITICS

(By Charles H. Mason).

Our esteemed friend, Brer. Donovan, very appropriately tells us that "The idea that we should accept without criticism or remark the decisions of all judges, or any judge, is not one that we can agree with." This is sound. but it does not go far enough. After the newspaper critic has had his say, I hold that the readers of his report have an equal right to criticize the critic, and especially when the critic makes statements that are calculated to mislead the public. I would go further and insist that all reports be signed by the writers in order that the readers may be enabled to come to a fairly accurate conclusion as to who is more liable to be right, the judge or the reporter. Sometimes the person who writes the report is not even at the show, and one of these chaps got caught very neatly a few weeks ago. Here is how it happened. M. M. & Co., writing over a nom de plume in the New York Herald, announced a few days previous to the Danbury show that Dr. Jarrett would not be able to fill his engagement to judge the sporting Spaniels and other breeds assigned to him, and that Mr. Raper would judge his classes. Dr. Jarrett never had the slightest intention of not being present and, of course, was on hand to carry out his contract. The American Stockkeeper wanted a report of the show and wanted it for nothing, so Mr. Lacy went to work to supply the much-needed report from his little office in Boston. When he got to the Sporting Spaniels he was mindful of what the M. M. & Co. man had stated about Dr. Jarrett, and here is what he gave to his readers: "Several good youngsters were brought out, notably Dan Lynn's Wire, that should have had winners. Mr. Mason showed a nice batch of Cockers under Raper, but had entered for Dr. Jarrett.'' How does that appeal to you as a criticism written by a man who was not within hundreds of miles of the show? So I say that in view of the nasty conditions surrounding the dog show game in the States dog show reports should be signed. Another reason is that not one reporter in ten is qualified to criticize a dog show and the third reason is that certain critics are given advertisements for their papers by judging show managers, provided they boost these judging managers in their reports! I do not believe that things have come to

such a pass in Canada, or that the Canadian Kennel Club will permit conditions of such a nature to get a foothold, but vigilance and independence are necessary to keep you off the rocks. Nor do I believe that the Dominion Kennel Club is going to stand for anything but clean sport, and I do not write this without knowing a thing or two about some of the men who are prominent in that club.

In regard to your introductory remarks about the late show given in London, Ont., I wish to dissent very emphatically, and such statements as your reporter has made should be signed by the writer. I do not believe they were supplied by the editor of "Kennel and Bench," and even if they were they should be explained. The catalogue of this show proves that in 1912 there were 250 dogs and 508 entries, and that the rating of the show was two points. The catalogue for the last show, 1913, has this: "Number of entries, 415; number of dogs, 195; value in points, 1." Now there is no disputing this and those of us who have seen the dogs, with few exceptions, that won at the two shows, cannot truthfully say that the average quality in 1913 was superior to the average quality in 1912. The reports of the two shows from other sources do not favor the show of 1913 either as to quality or numbers, and Dr. Boultbee and Mr. H. B. Donovan, Jr., both of whom were present at the 1912 show, were much impressed by the quality of the dogs exhibited, and said so. The weather was fine and the attendance large. These are facts that cannot be disputed and yet I read in an unsigned report in "Kennel and Bench" for October the subjoined misleading remarks: "With a slightly reduced entry from last year, which was made up largely by the quality of the dogs present, a big attendance and the best of weather, the London Canine Association pulled off another successful event." A loss of over 20 per cent. of dogs and entries is surely not a "slightly reduced entry," and the rest of the opinion is just as reliable.

In the States, whenever the managcrs who place the show advertisements and select the judges, are acting as judges, the kennel papers, with few exceptions, whitewash their blunders and misrepresent the entries and the quality of the dogs, and, in return for this utter destruction, the reporters are given a job when the managing judges can place them so as not to interfere with their own financial interests! This is killing dog shows in America; in fact, one of the judging managers has stated in open meeting that our shows are now, as everybody knows, "dead enough."

If you are going to have the same "system" in Canada I will say: Wipe my name, and wipe it quickly, from your membership list, because I cannot afford to be identified with it, nor can any man who is a dog fancier. But I do not believe you are going to have it, because Canadians stand for something better.

Your neighbor tells us that the dog show recently held in Canada should have been a five-pointer. I wrote him before the entries closed that it would not reach five points, nor four points, and that I doubted if it would get three points. But you are to be congratulated for having held the first show with \$15 for prizes and an entry fee of \$2 and \$1. Next year let us hope we may be permitted to show our dogs. And now we are looking for the reports telling us why the show did not get the dogs and telling everything except the real reason. CHAS. H. MASON.

New Bulldog for Winnipeg.

Mr. Henry St. Lawrence, who has been out of the fancy now for over a year, is back into the game again, I believe, with something "real good," having just imported a magnificent white heavyweight stud dog. Although I haven't had an opportunity of seing the dog myself, I am informed by those who have seen him that he is easily the best Bulldog ever seen in the West. He is white in color and tips the beam at 51 pounds. He is low to ground, possesses a good natural front. very heavy boned, good skull, the smallest of ears, perfectly carried together with exceptional turnup and lay back with an abundance of wrinkle, together with the real sour Bulldog expression, makes him a dog that should soon become popular in the West, and, although he is not 18 months old yet, he has proved himself a stock-getter of exceptional merit and has left several litters of very promising puppies behind him in England, and he comes to this country particularly well recommended as a stud dog. It is his new owner's intention to offer him at stud in the near future through these columns.

NATIONAL LIVE STOCK DOG SHOW

Something to be remembered forcommittee and Mr. A. L. Bartlett. The many a long day was this show. For many years there has been talk in Toronto of a Live Stock Show. Thanks first to Controller Foster the event is now in the past, though we hope that the future holds many of them for us to look forward to. Next to Controller Foster, the origination of the idea of a dog show belongs to the prince of us all, John G. Kent, the President of the Canadian Kennel Club. It was he who set the ball rolling in that direction, so there is another chalk-mark on the blackboard to his credit from the dog world. We must never let him get away from us. After this the dog show section struck many snags, but thanks to the broad-mindedness of the executive, but especially R. J. Fleming and Joseph Russell, we safely sailed between them all. Then the committee was an enthusiastic, truly doggy, working one and both before the show and during it, proved their worth. They worked hard to get in entries, decided to place their efforts in certain directions of excellence and carry these through and well they succeeded. The first point was in the cleanliness of the show and we think that the universal comment was that when it was considered that the building had to be kept tight shut and artificially heated, the result was wonderful. A cleaner show was never held. The actual carrying out of this work must be credited entirely to the indefatigable energy of Arthur Atkinson. He unquestionably takes the white ribbon in this direction and it is most surprising that the result was attained by the use of only six attendants, four in the day and two at night, but Mr. Atkinson had wisely chosen for these attendants dog men who were familiar with dogs and the result was very apparent. The second point was the stewarding of the ring and the wearing by all exhibitors of their numbers, affording an opportunity to the ringside to identify the dogs, and it was proved conclusively that with a little trouble and system this was possible. This was placed in the hands of Mr. Geo. Farquharson and the speciality clubs of the Boston Terrier Club of Canada and the Bulldog Breeders' Association of Canada, and was well carried out with the assistance of the various members of the dog show

result was that the judging did not drag anywhere, though it was intentionally lengthened out until Friday night in order that the interest might not flag. The building was well and comfortably heated, and those exhibitors who stayed away on this account have only their own regrets to nurse. The attendance was good, even though we had several rainy days, especially so in the evening, as there were no counter attractions, such as the grand stand and the Midway, as there are at the Exhibition. Frequently the aisles were uncomfortably crowded, and as the dog show was the only attraction on the grounds to which an admission was charged, this is very flattering to us.

We had numerous visitors, especially among the exhibitors, some from a great distance, noteworthy being those from Winnipeg and the Northwest. It is a great compliment to the committee and management of this show to feel that in spite of the division in our ranks, still that this can be forgotten and that the interest in our common hobby is paramount. Some of these dogs were down at the Exhibition and were not over successful, which might have been an excuse for them remaining away, but true sportsmanship carried the day, and, as Jack Fletcher says, "We are 'come-backs' with a vengeance."

This time they did the trick. In fact, what they did to us was a shame. Still they had the dogs, and may they come back many times to repeat the dose or take one from us. The dogs were in charge of Mr. John Milner and Mr. John Fletcher, and they must have pretty well skimmed the cream of the West, even if they do say they left better at home. Dr. O'Brien got winners with his wonderful Wolfhound, Ch. Genest of Rosseau. In Pointers and Setters they pretty well cleaned up, and many other breeds they took a good slice of the money; but when they came to Airedales, Bulldogs, Collies and Pomeranians where the keen competition lay, they were satisfied with nothing but the top, or so close to it that it was always uncomfortable for us old Easterners. That magnificent Airedale, Clipstone First Shop, walked away with winners in extra hot com-

petition, redeeming his defeat of September, and he had better dogs to beat than on the former occasion. Then in Bulldogs they helped themselves to winners dogs and winners and reserve winners bitches, leaving our cracks to satisfy themselves with a few firsts and ribbons, and we pride ourselves we have some Bulldogs. There may be a little room in this breed to say that they were a bit lucky, but we do not grudge them the luck. He think, however, they are leaning to a common fault in this breed which may lead them into trouble, for with one exception both dogs and bitches lacked expression and sweep-up of foreface. In Collies they were well represented by Corona Commander, a beautiful sable and white, with flat skull, well filled in foreface and beautiful ear carriage, but we must confess we do not like him as well as his predecessor, Ch. Corona Premier. He does not possess the intense quality all over of that dog. In Pomeranians Mrs. Rigby got winners with her beautiful little black bitch, Tiny, well named, very cobby, but we would have liked to have seen her blacker. Her dog, Bobby, was second in the open, a black of good color, but not so cobby as the bitch. She also brought down a Toy Poodle, which had the misfortunt of being disqualified for being overweight. Mrs. Rigby herself and her little niece braved the long journey down to grace our show with their presence, as well as with their dogs.

Of the American handlers the only one that came up was the genial Ben Lewis. Perhaps if some of the rest of them knew Toronto as well as he does, there would be more of them come up. We almost consider him a Canadian, we wish he was. Perhaps if dogs go on in Canada as they are, the partnership between father and son will split up, and one stay on each side of the line. Then we had many individual visitors, each with a few dogs, Mrs. Sturdee, from St. John; Mr. and Mrs. Bob Ross, from Montreal; Mr. Newton, from Ottawa; Mr. Ruttan, from Port Arthur; Mrs. Morlock and Mrs. Wm. Schwinger, of Buffalo; Mr. Cowan, from Winnipeg; Mr. Aitken and Mr. Hanna, from Montreal, and many others from nearer points.

There were only three judges, and

we can safely say that the new ones, Dr. C. A. White, of Chicago, and Mr. Thomas Grisdale, of New York, left behind them the deep respect of every one they came in contact with. Dr. White lived in Toronto twenty-five years ago and was absolutely astonished at the growth of our city. Both he and Mr. Grisdale have expressed their astonishment at our show, at our extent of knowledge of dogs, but most of all that we keep the word "sport" uppermost and in view all the time. This is what always impresses outsiders in Canada, and if only our exhibitors would all of them cultivate this spirit to the fullest extent, we will be the envy of the dog world. Play the game as they play the game of cricket, without a murmur, no matter how unjustly or seemingly unjustly you are treated. Our third julge, an allrounder, was the old warrior, Mr. Jas. Mortimer, and may we say that we never saw him looking more genial or in better fettle. We know no one who receives greater respect from the exhibitors in general than he, and deservedly so. Due to the above many favorable circumstances the show was an extremely genial and pleasant one. We think we saw more smiles than is usual, and with practically no exceptions, were there any of those unpleasant occurrences that indicate bad temper or selfishness, and that go so far to mar a show.

As regards the dogs, in many breeds the entry was very large. In all breeds the quality was extremely high. In a few of the breeds we missed the entire exhibit of outside kennels. There was apparent also the absence of many dogs which had been exhibited at the Exhibition, and demonstrated as not good enough for the hot competition of a big show. Everybody entered their best, but many left at home the two or three inferior dogs that were entered at the Exhibition on a chance and were turned down. Still a three-point show for a first venture is creditable. In the big breeds which do more to make a show a success than anything else, this show was a glorious exhibition. Imagine nineteen grand, stately St. Bernards of magnificent quality, headed by probably a perfect specimen, the best of his kind on this continent, if not in existence. For this we have to give our sincere thanks to Mrs. Lee, of the Alta Kennels, of Toledo, Ohio. It is a distinct compliment

to us that this lady came here for the first time in many years, and our St. Bernard breeders showed their good sense and appreciation by allowing her to return with only two out of the four of the dogs she came with. Newfoundlands were also a large entry of eight dogs. Great Danes were magnificent, and the rest of the large breeds, such as Russian Wolfhounds, Greyhounds, English Setters, well up in quality and numbers. As for the Collies, we do not know to what to ascribe the wonderful exhibition, but perhaps the revival is due to the increased interest generated by the formation of a new Collie Club. The Airedale exhibit very closely resembled that of the Exhibition, with two very notable additions in the winning bitch and the reserve winners dogs. Whippets were a very large entry, and Beagles showed good representatives from every prominent breeder in Canada. In Bulldogs we had every good one in the East, with the exception of Royal Albert, of Montreal, and Ch. Argo, but with the addition of the splendid entry from the Northwest. Judge Grisdale may well feel flattered at the reception he got. It is only natural that we cannot agree with all his awards. We still confess that we have not seen a superior of Homewood Jumbo here. Comparing him with Mersey Pilot, he loses in shape of body only, but being shown very fat, this was not very apparent. In all head qualities he is vastly the superior, though neither of the dogs are strong enough in underjaw, and Pilot on the bench showed anything but a good pair of pasterns, and we consider the dogs equal in roach, both being good. We were extremely pleased to see that sterling dog, Moston Marshall, at last get his deserts, always a favorite of ours. He was put down fit, and got reserve winners. Mr. Metcalf showed his sportsmanship by exhibiting Ch. Cheetham Squire, knowing well that a dog of his type would not suit the judge, and that it was a foregone conclusion that he could not win. Worsley Dreadnought is probably the most improved dog we have seen and will in future need to be reckoned with. In bitches the judge made no mistake, except in puppy class, where the first prize winner was so well shown as to disguise a pair of hugh button ears and a bad hind action, still she had a magnificent body and that counted a lot with the judge. Bull Terriers we

never saw the equal of in Toronto. This breed has not only progressed; it is unrecognizable as compared with a year or two ago, and Canada is back in all her glory. That beautiful bitch, Princess Patricia, shown like marble and improving every day, won everything. She is probably in the first three on the continent as a show bitch, and as a breeding proposition she is first. This is unquestionable when one considers that her first litter contained Imperator, Prince Ivanhoe, Hearts of Oak and Charlwood Bee Hive. It is good news indeed for us to be able to report that she has been purchased by that sterling fancier, Mr. G. F. McFarland, who recently purchased Hearts of Oak, and was so unfortunate as to lose him almost at once. With Franklyn Dynamo, the splendid puppy shown at this show, and Princess Patricia, however, he has a splendid team. The condition of the dogs in this breed was wonderful all through, but special mention should be made of the splendid shape the Glenedyth dogs were shown

COCKER SPANIELS probably were the most disappointing breed in the show, not because the numbers were very small and the quality not very high, but because we expect so much from this breed and have such a reputation to uphold. We hope some day there will be a wake-up, and we intend to go on hammering at the breed and the breeders until something happens, so wake up you Cocker men.

FOX TERRIERS were fair in numbers and improving in quality. The Kingsville dogs helping greatly in the Smooths and Hawes Broom in the Wires.

POMS were a splendid large collection. We regret the absence of Mrs. Gruenwald's and Mrs. Wylie's dogs. With the addition of them the show would have been a grand one.

TOY SPANIELS also brought out very high quality in Mrs. Scott's dogs. SETTERS AND POINTERS were a very good entry, thanks to the Vickery dogs and those from Winnipeg.

In IRISH SETTERS the classes were all well filled with splendid quality. Mr. Hanna, of Montreal, cleaning up with bitches, and the dogs going to Dr. Gale's Con Law, and Mrs Sturdee's Corry Law.

BOSTON TERRIERS were a grand entry in every way. We do not like the placing of the dogs, not being able for one moment to see why the winner got his position over such a sterling specimen as Totem Boy, or Ted Shongo and several others. In bitches, however, both the competition and the judgment could not be questioned. Boston Terriers should do well here with the splendid backing of the Boston Terrier Club, and from the fact that the Boston Terrier is the only breed we know of where the bitches are better than the dogs. We were lucky in having put up before us that grandest of little bitches, Sparkling Jewel, a Canadian-bred one, if she is from the States. She is about the most perfect little model we have seen. Perhaps she might be a little higher stationed and better in feet. Elsewhere she is perfect. She was pushed close enough, however, by Madame Sherry.

MASTIFFS were well represented in quality by Hertford Nancy. She should be able to revive the breed in Canada.

BLOODHOUNDS brought out Dr. Russell, a really good sample of the breed. The second entry looks like a first cross.

In NEWFOUNDLANDS, Ch. Rover, a well-rounded type, took first. Earl of Suffolk, a big, massive specimen, perhaps a little inclued to St. Bernard type, but stll a good one, was second. In bitches, Mr. Smith's recent importation, Chesterfield Lassie, is very typical and a good one, lacking size only.

GREAT DANES showed splendid quality and numbers, and a good mixture of harlequins and brindles. Harlequin, Zebra of Sud-The bury, shown in much improved condition over Ottawa, got winners. For size, substance and soundness he cannot be beaten. His height is enormous. He is the longest headed dog, we have ever seen in any breed, and his head is not too coarse for its size and length. His coloring might be improved, and his ears, though cropped, have not been properly handled. We would strongly advise that they be recut by a specialist at the operation. When they are up he will be vastly improved and a hard one to stop, and a little more flesh would improve him. The brindle, Adrian Von Rosenpark, is a finer type and beautiful golden brindle color. He only lacks the size of the winner and has one bad ear. Sport Guthrie, an uncropped Harlequin, was light in eye. Niagara King first in junior and novice, a good brindle color, wide enough in skull. Niagara Queen, fine in type, but lacks size. In bitches the Harlequin, Geneva, won. She is of the fine type, full of quality, yet having lots of size. In fact, a really good one, showing only a little weakness in hindquarters.

In RUSSIAN WOLFHOUNDS we had very few in numbers, but the salvation of the breed was Dr. O'Brien's Ch. Genest of Rosseau, a dog of magnificent size; in fact one of the largest we have seen for many a day. The second dog, Nagee, loses in size. The second representative from Winnipeg, Thelma II., was too small.

GREYHOUNDS were carried, as usual, by the genial Ben Lewis and the sterling old supporter of this breed, Jas. Coulter. The winner was the wellknown Lansdowne Artimus, a fawn bitch showing wear. Reserve, Ch. Lansdowne Lottie.

AMERICAN FOXHOUNDS we can thank Mr. Hergott of Waterloo for. He sent down a very nice exhibit of three sterling dogs.

AFREDALE TERRIERS - Puppies, dogs-First, Rockley Dark Saint won; good head, eye and ears; extra good coat; good front, a bit long in body; won on maturity. Second, Rugged Mr. Bub, a marvellous coated dog, good body and front, weak in foreface, being still very young. Third, Chilmark Royal, an extremely promising puppy; long, lean head; grand eye, a grand front and shoulders. If we had the choice of the class this is the one we would take. In junior bitches, third went to Admiral of Lakeview, a good bodied one. No new faces in novice dogs. In limit and open dogs there was a battle royal and one of the best exhibits of the show. The ring was full of hot ones, both as to competition and spirit, and each dog showed his intention of winning, if not through the decision of the judge, then by the destruction of all his competitors. Winners went to the Winnipeg entry in Clipstone First Shot. On the bench this dog does not appeal to one, as his light eye is in too great evidence. In the ring he is a most magnificent shower and brings out every good quality he has, and his light eye is hidden by its good shape and expression. His body, legs and feet, substance and foreface are grand, and he won clearly enough, being cleverly shown by Ben Lewis. He lacks only in color, and at the present stage of growth his coat is soft, but he is a dog that will always have to be reckoned with. He was closely pressed, however, by a real good one and as well shown in Birchcliffe Oorang. This dog has improved and is shown for the first time in good condition since he arrived. He is yet in short coat, and had he had his beautiful harsh top coat the decision might have been reversed. He loses to the winner in skull formation and length of foreface, which, however, is stronger than the winner. Everywhere else he is the full equal of First Shot, and his black eye makes him far more a terrier. The third was Moorside Rock, another topper, a well-balanced terrier, not too good in eye, and a bad front. good size head and ears, extra good body. The reserve in this class was Caerphilly General, a big terrier and all a terrier, good substance and bone, good length, fair in ears, something of the type of First Shot. Buster Briar, short of coat, but all a terrier, with the best foreface in the show. In bitches the winning puppy was Betty Briar. She has good bone, front and coat, good body and hind quarters, just lacks quality. Second, Silver Birch Queen, a promising brood bitch, with good front and long head. Third, Ingoldsby Daisy, was off the bench. In junior, first, Rockley Logical Point, a good all-round bitch, light in eye, good in body, short of coat. She was reserve winners and ran the winner close. Second, Morning Dawn, a good sort, just over weaning. Third, Chilmark Marilla, stylish, with a good coat though short; too small and light. No new faces appeared in novice bitches. In limit and open a new one appeared in Caerphilly Betty. She has a beautiful body with magnificent coat and is a good shower. She might have more foreface.

In DOBERMAN PINSCHERS we had one good specimen in Doberman Alertine.

We saw the return at this show of an almost lost breed, namely, CLUM-BER SPANIELS. Fortunately they were well worthy to represent the breed. In fact, the winner, Reverton Ronald, is very high grade.

OLD ENGLISH SHEEP DOGS was won by Beppo, nice quality, wanting coat. Highland Laddie, nice pigeon blue and white, scored over third in size and bone. Third, Wharncliffe Lady, loses only in size.

DALMATIAN. First, Spot, a real good all-round dog.

POODLES (other than Toy), all shown by Mrs. Williams, and a splendid lot.

BULL TERRIERS, puppy dogs. The fight was started off with the drop of the hat by Glenedyth Imperator, who stepped right out to meet all-comers, and it was a fight to the finish, with Imperator on top. Imagine a puppy beating such dogs, and fairly so, as Pimlico, Inferno Buster, Franklin Dynamo, Inferno Ghost and many other good ones. We start off with his one fault. He is a little open in feet, but time will soon cure that. His head and face are perfect, and the rest of him good. One ear has yet to stand up after his recent cropping. We sincerely doubt if he has his equal in his sex. Second puppy, Franklin Dynamo, the steadiest and best shower in his breed we ever saw. and all over he is a beauty. He just lacks a little in maturity of body and the extreme length of skull and foreface which we have in many of our dogs. His tail is the best we ever saw on a Bull Terrier. His hindquarters and front and movement are splendid. His nose will darken with time. Third, Inferno You Know, shows too much daylight under him and has a gay tail, but a very nice head. Inferno You Don't Know is an extremely good lightweight. Prince Ivanhoe was distinctly unlucky. He has a beautiful long foreface, carried right to the muzzle, but was throaty and full in eye. In novice dogs Inferno Ghost first, a dog of magnificent size and length of skull and foreface. He is improving in body, but is a bit strong in skull and has a bad crop. Third in this class was Edgewood Wildfire, a good substance dog with a good eye, but a bad ear. In limit dogs (over 30 lbs.) Pimlico, shown for the first time in good condition, got second. He is a splendid type of a substance dog, with magnificent foreface, grand rib and body. His shoulder, though out, is better than usual ,due to condition. His tail is bad. Open was a repeat. Bitches were few, but wonderfully good. The puppy Charlewood Beehive is a beautiful lightweight, with the well-filled-in foreface of Imperator. In limit (over 30 lbs.) went to Princess Patricia. We never saw her looking as well, and she was shown to win; all over she is grand, except being a little full in eye. For the special for best in the breed she beat Imperator, which was going some. Along with Imperator, she is the first flight. Nothing illustrates better than does this bitch the absolute necessity of showing Bull Terriers properly and in perfect condition. You would not

recognize her for the same bitch as was shown at the Exhibition, she being much harder and better muscled up. Second was Glenedyth Katherine, wonderfully improved, especially in foreface, and pushing up to the top. Third was Princess Nordica, not filled in foreface, and shows curl in tail. The only other entry in bitches, Dufferin Venus, is off in expression and has a black mark on her eheek, but a grand body. It must have kept her busy beating the others for reserve winners.

IRISH TERRIERS, puppies, was won by Bystander, dark-eyed, long-headed dog, good color, fair coat, but doesn't want to grow any more. The winning novice, Badger Brian Boru, too young, but promising. The winning limit was the good dog Rorry, inclining to coarseness, but a grand shower. Winners went to the old champion, Quarrywood Commander, who is lasting splendidly and a really good dog. In puppy bitches, Miss Dooley, a dark eye, small ears, strong muzzle, shown bare of coat. In limit and open Walmer Straight Flush won and took winners. She has a magnificent coat, dark eye, a good head but short, and carries her ears gay enough. Second, old Killarney Belle, a good bitch, not put down in shape. Third in open was Molly Asthore, a little off in front, but with a long head and dark eye, and good coat, might have stood higher.

WHITE WEST HIGHLAND TER-RIERS—Rosebank Jack has the real rustic appearance of the bred, with a nice short, cobby body. In bitches the winner was Walpole Witty, a nice little terrier with good body, but head too flat and narrow and approaching the Scottish type. Second, Lonoch Lass, off in color. Third, Rosebank Ray, a typical little one.

SKYE TERRIERS—Donard Scott was alone. In BEDLINGTON TER-RIERS Haslingden Pride had the same competition, and in MANCHESTERS the Spider was alone. We missed the Ottawa dogs in this section.

DACHSHUNDS—We saw some very strong competition. The winning dog, Ch. Fritz Frost, a sound black and tan, a bit heavy in the ear, but sound and long in body. Komet S., reserve winners, another good red, without the intense quality of the winner. Third in open was Woodbine Warrior, a nicebodied one with good muzzle, and strong in skull and might be lower. In bitches Rosemont Babbette, a red with a beautiful depth of brisket, and a nice flat skull and high ear carriage. Reserve winners was Donna Von Niederlang, a black and tan.

WHIPPETS—The winning dog was Bonny Boy, a red fawn, very nice shape, plain in head, and a shade coarse all over. We prefer Peeping Tom for first place, a good black, put down in grand shape. The best type Whippet in the show was Lansdowne Truro Boy IL, whom the judge placed down for softness of muscle, our dogs being hard from continual racing. Lansdowne Venus won easily. Reserve was Naylor's Lill, a fawn, on the big side.

PUGS—Winners went to the famous champion, The New King, a fawn with good expression and grand body. Reserve winners was Buster, a nice little short-bodied dog, spoiled his chance by showing badly. In bitches, the wellknown black Dundee Princess won, and reserve to the black "Dine," lost in face, but shown in grand condition.

ITALIAN GREYHOUNDS—The winner was Wild Rose, a peculiar red fawn, a new face and a good one. Reserve was Princess Louise, showing age, stiff in movement, and far too fat. She should have given way to Zady, a grand miniature Greyhound, on the large side and too coarse in tail, with a real Greyhound head.

TOY SPANIELS were more quality than quantity, three of them being champions. Parkview Countess, a real good King Charles, good in body and coat, skull, ears and face. Parkview Jess, a nice short-backed Blenheim, too plain in face. Kaffir Chief, the winning King Charles dog, good body and coat, fair tan and plain in face.

BLENHEIM SPANIELS, open dogs, Ch. The Planet, an old face with his glorious head and rich orange, won; shown a pound too light. Ch. Parkview Jupiter II. scored in front and body properties. He lost in face. In Rubies, Ch. Parkview Premier, well known and in grand coat, good in ear, fringe and feather. The one Japanese Spaniel was Reba Podo.

YORKSHIRE TERRIERS—The winning dog was Golden Tip, a good little 'un, fine long coat, keeps his form wonderfully, and one that we should see more of. Reserve winners, Derby Ted, another good dog that was beaten in coat. Winners bitches went to Enda of Roundhay, well known and in good form.

In TOY TERRIERS we had the regular faces so often described, shown by John Tomlinson and Mrs. Delaney. TOY POODLES, after the disqualification of those of Mrs. Cook and Mrs. Rigby for overweight, were left entirely to Mrs. Fred Williams' good team. One good Chow was shown in Lansdown Lu Chow Ruby, who was purchased by Mr. T. D. McGaw, our old Coeker breeder, who is going to make a beginning at this new breed. Mr. Marr showed the only Pekingese, and Skipperkes brought out two new breeders in Mr. and Mrs. Lowcock with a really good pair in Dorando and Merry Widow.

BULLDOGS

" I am speeding homeward after my first and exceedingly pleasant and highly satisfactory visit to Toronto Dog Show, and sorry my stay, due to pressure of business, could not have been prolonged. The cordiality of those I met, grandeur of the settings surrounding the show, dwarfs all previous descriptions. Of those broad and progressive minds responsible for such staple and fitting grandeur, Canadians have reasons to and do feel proud. To return, I hope, failing will be a regret, if so, this one visit and my first will be one of my sweetest and most satisfactory remembrances of cordiality, broad-mindedness and progress in connection with preparedness for exhibition purposes, it has ever been my pleasure to witness anywhere.

The dog show management, headed by Dr. A. Boultbee, assisted by his able and willing staff, was truly worthy of the setting; quick service, joyful feeling and keen enthusiasm permeated the whole atmosphere, and it was to me a delightful experience. * Only one person good naturedly asked what prompted my placing a certain dog over his competitor? Good business. Being assured that after the judging that we would take up the question and possibly join in a social smoke, was dismissed, and the lucky dog in question went on his winning way and beat the lot. This fact may have sufficed to satisfy for the question was not revived. This is, I believe, the nearest I came to dispute. A harmonious experience indeed. To the exhibitors, I thank you for your generous support and true sporting demeanor displayed regarding the dogs they were a good staple lot, not quite up to championship form, with these backed up by their present wholesome representatives, Canada's Bulldog fancy is on a solid basis, and I wish you luck.

Puppy dogs, first, Hasting & Rodgers' Roslyn King, a white and brindle pied of good substance throughout, even balance and sound, ears not the best, and needs upsweep of under jaw. Second, Cowan's Doctor, a brother to winner, on the same lines exactly, and if he could might justly say he is as good a dog, however, the win is in the family, and, like Murphy of Tammany fame, might say there may be another day. Third, Mrs. Metcalfe's Cheetham Marquis, a brindle, and a sound, good one of his type, good substance, but big and slack, and needs time, like all his kind; but his owner need not feel discouraged; he also will have his day. He was pressed by other good ones in this class. Novice dogs, first, Roslyn King; second, Cowan's Doctor; third, Cheetham Marquis. Limit dogs (over 45 lbs.), first, A. E. Boothe's Moston Marshall, a red brindle, excellent in head and expression, good in substance, wants spring of rib and let down in shoulders, and should be firmer on feet. Second, Chinook Kennels' Chinook Courtney Coronet, brindle pied, a dog of extreme quality, good substance and excellent body lines, lacking in foreface, a trifle dainty in ankles, otherwise a topper. Third, R. S. Wilson's Woodcote Merry Boy, a typical red brindle, a frame of a one-time good old sport. Open dogs, 45 lbs. and over. first, A. E. Boothe's Moston Marshall; second, Chinook Kennels' Courtney Coronet; third, C. E. Metcalfe's Ch. Cheetham Squire, a brindle pied, in excellent condition and sound, a real good head on not a typical body, impressive nevertheless. Limit dogs, under 45 lbs., first and winners dogs, Mersey Kennels' Mersey Pilot, a brindle and white, a sporty one, massive, low, short with a high degree of grace of outline, soundness and quality, and a good mover, a combination and balance that to my mind nearest approached the desired. Second, Herbert Chadwick's Homewood Jumbo, a brindle pied very impressive one, strong in head and good in size and substance, loses to winner in spring of rib, roach, substance and general type. Third, H. A. Wilson's Worsley Costermonger, white pied and massive, one full of type on good bulldog lines and character; a likely one to produce type. His movement went against him to-day. Open dogs, under 45 lbs., first, Mersey Kennels' Mersey Pilot; second, H. Chadwick's Homewood Jumbo; third, H. A. Wilson's

Worsley Costermonger. Breeders dogs and bitches, first, C. E. Metcalf's Ch. Cheetham Squire; second, E. P. Hind's Ashland Lady, red fawn, off in condition and looking slight to-day; sound, on good lines, good substance, excellent in head and expression; third, Freeman Goodman's Good Shot, brindle pied, good size and substance, a trifle cramped in his lines and movement. Junior dogs and bitches, first, Herbert Chadwick's Worsley Dreadnought. white pied, good size and substance, a trifle beefy in rear, needs more width and turnup of foreface. Second; Hasting & Rodgers' Roslyn King, reviewed. Third, Robert Cowan's Cowan's Doctor. Puppies, bitches, first, C. E. Metcalf's Chetham Countess, a sturdy brindle, of good size and substance, an easy winner, ears not pleas-Second, Herbert Chadwick's ing. Cheetham's Daughter, sister of the above, white pied, also a substantial specimen and sound; wants to drop a little. Third, Joseph Perkin's Titterston, a brindle of very good substance. short and deep in body; wants more strength of foreface, good expression. Novice bitches, first, Robert Cowan's Belgrave Lady, good type, substance and quality, nice expression, is marred by lack of turnup of under jaw. Second, C. E. Metcalf's Cheetham Countess. Third, R. S. Wilson's Oakville Betty, excellent body lines and sound, lacks pleasing substance and not in ears. Limit bitches (40 lbs. and over). first, Cowan's Peggy, a typical massive one, lacks in expression. Second, E. P. Hind's Chorus Lady, a red brindle of good size and substance and sound, a trifle long cast, the best headed one in the show. Third, C. E. Metcalf's Cheetham Countess. Open bitches (40 lbs. and over), first, Robert Cowan's Cowan's Peggy. Second, A. E. Boothe's Ch. Layham Pride, a brindle of good size, substance and quality all round, marred by excessive bowed stifles. Third, E. P. Hind's Chorus Lady. Limit bitches (under 40 lbs.). First, Robert Cowan's Belgrave Lady. Second, E. P. Hind's Ashland Lady. Third, E. P. Tuson's Lady Valeria, good substance throughout, sound, lacks finish of face. Open bitches (under 40 lbs.). First, Robert Cowan's Belgrave Lady. Second, E. P. Hind's Ashland Lady. Third, E. P. Tuson's Lady Valeria. Canadianbred dogs and bitches. First, Belgrave Lady; second, Ch. Cheetham Squire; third, Cheetham's Daughter; winners

BOSTONS IN TORONTO.

The first show given in connection with the National Live Stock, Horticultural and Dairy Show was held November 19-22. The Boston Terriers, as has been the custom in big shows in the past few years, headed the list of entries, and compared very favorably with eastern shows, the bitches showing the most quality.

Puppy dogs brought out a good one in Mrs. W. C. Ingram's Little Man, by far the best in his class, a well-marked seal brindle, good flat top-not and excellent legs and feet, might be better in front of eyes, time will improve. Second, Nemo's Surprise, long in body. Third, Lord Rufus, too stilty, will improve. Reserve, Little Shonge.

Novice, 12-17-Only one faced the judge, Billy Buster, 1st, good type, a bit plain in face.

Limit and open, 12—17—First, Hillcrest Totem Boy, a lightweight of quality, good legs and feet, body and station, ring manners could be improved. Second, Billy Buster, previously mentioned.

Middle-weight novice-Clifton Ben won, a bit long in body and shown fat.

Limit, 17-22-First, Rexonian Kid, excellent head and muzzle, good conformation of body and showing the correct terrier character, condition not good. Second, Clifton Ben, previously mentioned. Third, Combustion.

Novice, 22-28—First, Lord Rufus, previously mentioned, Second, C. H. Roos' Mike, in heavy condition and too cheeky.

Limit, 22-28—First, Gordon Delhi, a good heavyweight, correct conformation of body, good legs and feet, skull flat, but too wide and cheeky and put down right. Second, Donderos Sport, a well-marked one, body and muzzle too long. Third, Sam Shongo, too bully. Reserve, Lord Rufus.

Open dogs, a repeat of limits.

Canadian bred—First, Ingram's Little Man, previously mentioned. Second, Ted Shongo, shown too corpulent, body conformation, tail and markings good, legs straight, but too fine in bone and narrow in head. Third, Billy Buster. Reserve, Lord Rufus. Winners, Gordon Delhi. Reserve winners, Hillcrest Totem Boy. Puppy bitches—First, Susie, owned by Miss Blanche Boyd, a nice little one, correct markings, good legs and feet, failing in muzzle. Second, Ingram's Girlie, long in face, time will improve.

Limit, 12-17—brought out some good ones. First, Sparkling Jewel, a good one all over, well marked, good legs and feet, correct station, square muzzle and put down right. Second, Madam Sherry, losing only in conformation of hindquarters. Third, Kenilworth Miss Pauline, coat not in good condition, trifle long cast, otherwise good. Reserve, Lady Mirthless, timid and requires more substance.

Open class a repeat of limits.

Novice, 17-22—1st, Peggy Quigley; 2nd, Lady Roberts.

Limit, 17-22—1st Ashland Pride, a wee bit high, good head, legs and feet and markings; 2nd, Lady Verna, too strong in head; 3rd, Peggie Quigley, shown too heavy and might be better in muzzle. Reserve, Torontonian Peggy, not in show condition.

Open class, a repeat.

Heavyweight, Limit and Open class —1st, Conewango Belle, good legs and muzzle, too coarse; 2nd, Victoria Lill, losing in head, legs and feet.

Canadian bred bitches-1st, Sparkling Jewel, previously mentioned; 2nd, Leader's Pride, a useful brood bitch; 3rd, Conewango Belle. Reserve, Lady Dot. Winners, Sparkling Jewel. Reserve winners, Madam Sherry.

BEAGLES

We were more than pleased with both the numbers and excellent quality, considering the show, coming, as it did, so soon after the National Exhibition in September last. It has been a long while since such an even, consistent type of Hound has been benched. Some of the winners have been out before, wins in such hot company must be more than gratifying to the owners. The winner in puppy dogs, Pattern, good in body, legs and feet, but toes out a bit. Novice dogs, first went to Clinker, a fair Hound; he beats Pattern ,third, in legs and feet, but is snippy in muzzle; they could easily exchange places. Elora Blue Skin was off the bench, so did not see her. Limit dogs and bitches (not exceeding 13 inches), this class was a hot one and competition between the first three was close. Rockridge Midget is a real

nice one in type, good every way. Blyth Brush Bugle, second, loses to winner in head, who heats Lady Primus, third, also in head, coat and bone. Sunfields Tiny, V.H.C., light in bone and pinched in muzzle. Limit dogs (over 13 inches and not exceeding 15 inches), Clinker first. The only other entry, Rockridge Driver, was absent, Open dogs, Blythe Brush Bugle first, a good type, grand bone, attractive markings, shown in good condition. Smithfield Primus second, who loses to Bugle in bone and coat, and wins over Clinker, 3rd, longer in the muzzle, of good shape, not so good in front and should have more rib. Breeders dogs and bitches, H. Card's entries I did not see as they were off the bench when I went through, hence not commented upon. First went to Smithfield's Petite a bit wide in shoulders, ears carried a trifle high, with not sufficient length, and in my opinion does not beat Lady Primus, second; Smithfield's Primus 3rd, Elora Blue Skin 4th. Puppies bitches, for small Hounds the winner, Fidget, is a good little one every way, barring the usual fault in small Hounds apple-headedness with pinched muzzle, hard to breed out. Novice bitches, the bitch class showed lots of type and quality, the sweet-faced Queen O' Trumps winning, Elora Bellbird second, Smithfield's Tiny third, Fidget V. H. C. Limit bitches (over 13 ins. not exceeding 15 ins.) Queen of Trumps first, good all over, hard to fault, shown in perfect condition, beats Lansdowne Ransome, dished between the eyes, a well-put-up Hound otherwise, Petite third, not as typical a Hound as 1st and 2nd. Open bitches, Queen of Trumps 1st; Lansdowne Ransome 2nd; Ruby 3rd; I liked better than Ransome for the place, Queen of Trumps and Rockridge Midget were easily the best two Beagles in the class and nicer types in their respective classes, it would be hard to find, both real good headed ones, well put up in body with that lovely houndy markings, black, white and tan nicely distributed. All in all there was a splendid lot of these dogs and they were well judged.

SCOTTISH TERRIERS made a very strong showing, Canadian-breds being easily the biggest and hottest class of the home product that has faced the music, and the fact that those placed toward the bottom have, almost with16

out exception, done some useful winning, makes one realize that this breed is not "coming,"-it has come. Puppy dogs. Lonach Bonaccord won. He owns a lengthy head of good shape, nice eye and ear, short back, good coat and bone, fails in elbows. Roderick second, beaten on maturity, but shows promise of making a decent terrier providing he does not grow. He owns a long lean head, beautiful eye and ear, short back and tail. Could do with more bone and harder coat. Broadway Mac is too big, long head, nice ear, fair in body. In limit and open, Argyle Lad won from Avondale Ascot. The former is a wonder from the ears back low, short and cloddy, correct size, and a real "cart-horse." Ascot, a fiery little terrier, with very lean skull, good eye and ears, carty body and a rare coat. More underjaw would improve him. Drumelimph Ruffian followed, a rare headed one with powerful foreface, nice eye, coat and bone. Moves well, shade big in ear. The Canadianbred class was an eye-opener, not only in numbers, quality was to the fore. This class was led by Drumclamph Judy a rare made little un; her faults are few and her virtues many; put a shade smaller ear on her and give her more confidence and she could give them a gallop anywhere. Her head is all quality, quite long enough for her size; her back is extra short, grand body lines and bone enough for a big one. Her front is about perfect, as is her coat. Second, Rodborough Joan, a low, cloddy bitch with short back and tail. Her head is long and of good shape, coat like nails and a rare boned one. Her eye could be darker and her ears closer; still a very nice puppy that should do well as she matures. Craigendarroch Belle came third, shown much too fat; she is short in back, has a very small ear and good coat. Her head is shapely if rather short. Did not make the most of herself in the ring. Bitch puppies brought out two new faces, one in the winner, Argyle Lilly, a real good puppy, low and short, beautiful head, eye and ear, good coat and tail; fails a little in front. R. Joan was second here, third being Drumclamph Jean, not yet ready, but looks like making a topper. Wonderful head all through, extra short back with big ribs and quarters. Her bone is tremendous, yet straight. Her ears were showing the effects of teething, which detracted from her general appearance. The winner in limit and open was York

Scotch Highball, a beautiful bitch that has improved considerably of late. She has a beautiful body, coat, bone, front and quarters. Her head is long and lean, with strong foreface, finished with a nice eye and ear. She is hard to fault, but to my opinion is just a shade down-faced, still not sufficiently so as to spoil her expression. Rolleston Wee One, a nice one, has a god coat and long head, but has a foreign expression.

SMOOTH FOX TERRIERS-Sabine Radical, the puppy winner, does not need to grow any; he has a nice headpiece, eye and ear, good in neck, shoulders, legs and feet. Clapton Varnisher is a "varminty" terrier of the right size, a heavy-boned dog with a lean. shapely head, small dark eye, looks all a "workman." Should make a good sire. Rifle Sutton, just on the big side, but a nice quality one, good front and bone, with lots of style. Needs the services of an optician. Sabine Ringgold, the size and full of quality, beautiful bone, front and feet, rare body and quarters; fails only in foreface, which is a little weak. Stoney Coronation loses in expression, but scores in neck and shoulders, front and coat, and is a sound mover. Walnut Cricket is a real nice puppy with a quality head, short back, wonderful bone, good front and feet; should do well later. Broadway Mollie won the novice, a rare sized one this, extra good in front, legs and feet, rare body properties and perfectly sound. Warren Resemblance is a really nice bitch, about her only fault being that she falls away before the eye. Broadway Donation has a beautiful outline; she is the correct type, but could do with a little more substance. This bitch could found a kennel if mated properly.

WIRES—Hawes Broom made another "clean sweep." He was well handled, as every broom should be. A really great dog this, beautiful head, eye and ear, rare neck and shoulders, in fact quality all over. Just a shade lacking in substance, and when one has said that it is about his only fault.

ST. BERNARDS—Nineteen St. Bernards actually benched, such a brave show, they filled two sections of benches, and the best in America were there. The local breeders turned out in full force. Mr. Harkness benched four, Messrs. Giles and Spence three. Added to these, Messrs. F. & A. Stuart of Montreal added to their Exhibition entries by sending four dogs, and these, topped by the Alta Kennels of Toledo. Ohio, whose owner brought along another four, made the finest show of St. Bernards seen in Toronto for many a day. Junior dogs-First, Alta the King, a giant, just 16 months old, by Ch. Alta Marvel. This dog, when filled out, will do some winning; his movement is excellent, his bone magnificent. with beautiful expression and quality. He needs to fill out and let down. Second, Robert the Bruce, a 7 months youngster of all-round merit. He needs a little more skull, which time will surely bring; grand muzzle, bone and sound and in good shape. Mountroyal third. Apart from his head we do not like, good dark eye with sweet expression. He is good in size, but needs to be heavier behind, and his hind action is none too pleasing. Novice dogs were "as you were" with the first two. Silver King of Parkdale, of the great skull properties and looking well, came third. Limit dogs, with 8 entries, brought out the tit-bit of the section in Alta Big Ben, the sensation of the Westminster Show last February. At that time we cavilled with the award that gave him winners. He was lacking in skull, and was undoubtedly flatsided. To-day as a 2-year-old he is one, if not absolutely the best, of his breed alive. Grand in head properties, extraordinary in muzzle, sweet expression; a big dog with the activity of a setter and the body qualities of a miniature Clydesdale, his breeder and owner is a person to be envied. 2nd, Beethoven, litter biother to the winner, with the family qualities in foreface and expression. We would like more skull, and his body needs building. Third, Alta the King. Open dogs, repeat. Junior bitches, a nice closs of six. First, Queen of the Altas. A big, richcolored bitch with good movement. We would like more bone for her size and her face finish requires time; sweet expression. Thanksgiving 2nd, a youngster who gave a lot of age away, shows a lot of promise. Third, a big sound almost brindle and white, who lacks in head. Novice bitches, Queen of the Altas, first. Second, Alta Eva, a lowset bitch with magnificent head properties, grand muzzle, and lip corner. Her hind action is correct, but the bone of her forelegs is not straight. Limit bitches-The only new faces were Flashlight of Parkdale, who came second, a grand quality bitch, sweet all over, but too light, and Lady of Pearls third. This a good colored, well marked, sound bitch, with good eye, expression and foreface. Her head lacks chiselling and she was bare of coat. Winners, dogs, Alta Big Ben. Reserve, Beethoven. Winners, bitches, Queen of the Altas. Reserve, Flashlight of Parkdale. Alta Big Ben was awarded breed special.

COCKER SPANIELS-First, Mr. Anderson's Glenora Laddy, good body, nice eye, out in front. Second. Mr. Fred Lewis' Calmo Bingo, long in head, poor muzzle, and light in bone. Limit, open dogs-First, Mr. Huckle's Captain Scot, nice body, legs and feet, moves well, plain in head, all cocker. Second, Mr. Jackson's Durbar, good eye, well-placed ear, out in front and rather coarse. Third, Roger, poor type. breeders, dogs and bitches-First, Captain Scot. Second, Mr. Anderson's Glenora Lass, good body, nice front, nice expression, but a little fine in head. Novice dogs (red)-First, Mr. Lewis' Calmo Blanko, good bone, poor expression, not good in head. Second, Mr. Herd's Rob Roy, not a show type. Third, Mrs. Gammon's Red Domino, poor head and too small all over. Limit and open dogs (red)-First, Golden Glow of Ferndale, good eye and ears, nice muzzle, fair head, should be shown fatter, light in bone. Second, Calmo Blanko. Third, Rob Roy. Limit and open dogs (parti-color)-Mrs. Gammon's Wentworth Billy, good muzzle, nice front, legs and feet, thick in skull and a little undershot, good body. Puppy bitches-First, Mrs. Gammon's Golden Sally, snipy, thick in skull, fair body. Second, Mrs. Worthy's Crescent Jeanette, nice body, good front, sour expression, a little on small side, in beautiful condition. Novice bitches (black)-First, Mr. Fred Lewis' Calmo Marengo, good body, nice eye; could be better behind, fair head. Second, Glenora Lass. Third, Mr. Huckle's Bessie Obo, good body, lacking in head. Limit and open bitches (black)-Calmo Marengo. Novice bitches (red)-Mrs. Worthy's Crescent Glow, a wonder for her age, and in beautiful condition. Novice bitches (parti-color)-First, Mr. Tyrwhitt's Mepals Clarita, beautiful front, nice dark eye, lots of feather, good bone, good body, could be longer in face, and not in good condition. Second, Golden Sally. Limit and open bitches (parti-color)-First, Ben Lewis' Lansdowne Debutante, good head and expression, nice body, a little thick in shoulders, in beautiful condition. Second, Mepals Clarita. Third, Mr. Fred Lewis' Calmo Dremo, short

muzzle, thick in skull, nice body but too small.

POINTERS-Junior dogs and bitches -We much prefer Jersev Whirlwind to winner, as she is better in head. neck, shoulders, legs and feet; Cash's Freckles, short muzzle, thick head, ears too high, and stands wide in front. when in action her tail was between her legs; a sporting dog should use this in action. Novice dogs and bitches-Cash's Freckles, 1st; Jersey Whirlwind, 2nd; Countess, 3rd; the latter one of the leggy sort and will never make a good one. In limit dogs Mr. E. B. Chase's Lansdowne Rifle and Yuma Toni met. The former we like better than Yuma Toni, as he is better in head, neck, shoulders, legs and feet, and shows more Pointer character. The winner is short in muzzle and neck, thick in skull and shoulders. Open dogs was a repeat. Canadianbred dogs and bitches-The Pearlstone. the winner, is very snipy, stands wide in front and light in bone, although she shows a lot of real Pointer character. and rightly beat Cash's Freckles. Limit bitches-First, The Pearlstone, already mentioned. Second, Ottawa Bess, we much prefer for first; is better in head, neck, shoulders, bone and Pointer character; shown entirely too light, and no doubt this was what proved her doom on this occasion. Third, Rockley Silent Witness; we also prefer to the winner. If Mr. Mortimer had placed the second first, the third second, and the first third we would have endorsed. However, it's as poor old John Davidson used to say, "It was only his think that counted on this occasion." Open bitches, a repeat.

ENGLISH SETTERS-Not a big, but "quality" entry. Puppy dogs-Lord Kildare, not a show dog by any means, with a common head, stands wide in front, bad expression. Junior dogs and bitches .- 1st, Lord Kildare; 2nd, Vickery Sultan; 3rd, Vickery Bloom. The verdict in this class, in our humble opinion, should have been: Sultan 1, Bloom an easy 2nd; Lord Kildare 3. The railbirds could not possibly follow the judge when this award was made. In limit dogs, Glenview's Pride 1st should have been followed by V. Sultan and V. Bloom. Open dogs brought out Champion Deodora Prince II., looking better than we ever saw him. This dog is a typical Englishman, with grand head, beautiful neck, shoulders, deep chest, well sprung ribs, and

carried himself like a good Setter should do.

IRISH SETTERS were probably the highest quality collection in the show, the bitches being just as good as the dogs. The entry certainly was a compliment to Mr. Mortimer, who passed the rule over them as only a man can who thoroughly understands the breed. Con Law, winners dogs, a great big upstanding quality dog of the right type, shown in the usual Ben Lewis style, and had a comparatively easy win. Reserve, Corry Law, a good-sized dog, in nice condition, but lacking the expression so essential in this breed; might also be longer in neck and stronger in muzzle. Third in open. Judge Law, a very nice upstanding dog. sound in legs and feet, good body and color, but a bit strong in head. Shanasagh, another good sort, full of character, stands on good legs and feet and a good mover; he might easily have changed places with Corry Law and no harm done. Redale Retzian, a very decent sort. In bitches, 1st open class and winners, brought out Mr. Hanna's well-known Ch. Rhuminantly Rhu, shown in grand shape, better than we ever saw her; we doubt if there is another bitch anywhere that can come near her. First limit-Same owner's Nora Law, much improved since last time out, close up, a good, sound, wellbalanced bitch, grand head, body, coat and color, short tail; could be a little longer in neck and has "just enough" bone. She also took reserve winners. Second, limit and open. Maroney & Johnson's Annie Law, another good one, a very sweet bitch, a little on the small side, but deserved all she got. Joe Lewis' Kerry Kate did not show to advantage and was in poor shape owing to being "held up" at the lines, and only arrived at the building in time to be uncrated and led into the ring. This was also the reason same owner's Kildare II. was out of the running. Otherwise he is a really high-class Setter, a gay tail being his worst fault.

POMERANIANS—A liberal response to a liberal classification was manifest in Pomeranians. We have never in the history of dog shows in Canada, with the exception of last show of National Exhibition, had the pleasure of seeing the classes so well filled. Whether this changed condition is due to the exertions of the Toy Dog Club, or the growing popularity of Poms the world over, or the fact that we have so many Old 18

Country fanciers in our midst, we are not prepared to say. Probably all these causes combined is the explanation. The classes are worthy of note from the fact that they had the support not simply of the local fanciers, but had attracted exhibitors from across the line, and even as far as Winnipeg, and we are sure the local exhibitors did not begrudge the honors won by their friends, who had inconvenienced themselves to a degree to be present. We were specially pleased to welcome Mrs. Morlock of Buffalo, a lady who is gathering a select kennel of Toys, and Mrs. Rigby of Winnipeg, and we trust the kindly attitude of their welcome, no less than the honors they carried home, may induce them to come again. As in the case of most shows, the quality may be described as "good, better and best," although in the placing of these degres of qualities we are presumptuous to the extent of differing from Mr. Mortimer on some of his awards. The puppy class brought out two high-class puppies in Goldmine Midget and Goldmine Tiny, owned by W.J. Webb of Toronto, placed as written. Mr. Webb is one of our new recruits, and deserves the congratulations in the success of his first effort. Midget is a small cobby chocolate of rare quality. Tiny is after the same type, but not up to the quality of the first. She, however, excels in color. Third went to Mrs. L. Parker's cream, a nice proportioned Pom, but lacking in all-round quality to first and second. Novice class brought out Sailor Prince, a heavy coated chocolate that shows well, followed by Mr. Herd's Kupie, a black of good color and short back. We should like to see her when in full coat, and we are likely to hear from her again. Third, Litle Black Masher, Also unfortunate in the matter of being out of coat. He appeared in the ring as being a little wide behind. Limit class-First to McPherson's Brookside Masher, a fair-coated black. Stylish in ring. Second, Sailor Prince. Third, Mrs. Rigby's Bobby. The latter is typical, but inclined to be wavy in coat. We had looked for Mr. Mc-Naughton's Pomeria Hompride, taking a good place in this class. This dog has a beautiful texture of coat, jet black color, and showed to perfection. Open dogs, under 8 lbs., brown or chocolate-First to Sailor Prince. Second, Mr. Hingley's Dandy, a chocolate of sound and even color, heavy in bone.

Third, Mrs. Morlock's Chocolate Boy. a puppy of good quality, which will improve both in coat and general appearance with a little age. Open, under 8 lbs., any other color than black, brown, chocolate or white-First, Mr. and Mrs. Smith's cream, carries a very heavy coat. Second to Goldmine Birdie, a first-class dog, but unfortunate not only in being out of coat, but in his allround condition. This dog was evidently sick, and no inducements under these circumstances could persuade him to show. Open dogs, white, in quality were not up to the standard that we have seen at other shows. Kelworth Little Billie being the outstanding dog. He carries a magnificent coat of pure color, good body, and with a fine head would be one of the best whites on the bench to-day. Second to Mrs. L. H. Lucas with Kilworth Peter, could hardly be described as a show specimen. Eight lbs. and over-First, Carnarvon Jupiter, heavy coat, and a dog hard to fault. Second to Ed Ward's Orange Blossom, a useful female. Limit breeders, under 8 lbs., any color-Mrs. Rigby's Tiney won here, and was afterwards placed for winners. She is a black of fair quality; could not, however, follow Mr. Mortimer in his placings of this class. Second, Mrs. Herd's Kupie, which we had selected for winners. Third, Mrs. Howarth's Gipsy Girl, a sweet-headed female, but not so short as those above her. Open bitches, any other color than black, brown, chocolate or white-First to a good little chocolate sable. The definition of color would be a matter of controversy. Second to Slatz, a cream of fair quality. Open bitches, white-First to Juno, a nice white, by the well-known international winner Champion Afon Bolo. Second and third to Kelworth Sylvia and Kelworth Dodo, useful females. The latter were heavier of coat than Juno, but lacked her all-round quality.

COLLIES — Puppy dogs, first, Vietor Wild, a shapely black, tan and white, good head, ears and eye, also a constant shower; could do with more coat and size. Second, Cantab Pincher, sable and white, nice type of head, good ears, eye and expression, but small in stature. Third, Riverdale's Reward another sable and white, good body, legs and feet, too coarse in head and low ears. Novice dogs—First, Corona Commander, sable and white, shown in good form, has good body, legs and

feet, abundance of bone for his size, head well filled up and eye small; his ears are thick but well carried. Second. Victor Wild. Third, Cantab Pincher-Glen Grove Bob Blue Merle, a big dog with lots of bone, nice eye and good texture of coat, owns a long head but coarse. Limit dogs, sable and white-First, Corona Commander, Second, Holyrood Marquis, good length of head, nice body, legs and feet, but not in best of coat. Third, Imera Peacock, nice dog all round, but small and out of condition. Weston Emperor, a big dog with good legs and feet, owns lnog head of the right type, good eye and expression, ears small and nicely carried; could do with more flesh. Tazewell Busco, long head of the right kind, good eye and expression; his ears are too high and he fails in hindquarters. Open dogs, sable and white-First, Corona Commander. Second, Hollyrood Marquis. Third, Ormskirk Oberon, a big dog, sound in body, straight front and carries heavy coat, but his eye is round. Limit dog, any other color-First, Coila Pawky Chief, a big dog with lots of bone, has long head, of right type, and small ears well carried. Second, Victor Wild. Third, Wishaw Sparkle, possesses long head, is weak in foreface and out of coat. Open dogs. any other color-Repeat. Breeders, dogs-First, Corona Commander. Second, Imera Peacock. Third, Cantab Pincher. Canadian-bred dogs-First, Corona Commander, Second, Imera-Peacock. Third, Victor Wild. Junior dogs and bitches-First, Corona Commander. Second, Victor Wild. Third, Corona Crystal, a tri-color, has well-balanced head of the right kind, good eye, ears and expression, a shade light in bone. Winners, Coila Pawkey Chief. Reserve, Corona Comander. Puppy bitches-First, Glendale Quen, a nice quality sable and white, good head, eye and sweet expression; could do with more coat and bome. Second, Otterburn Dearest, long clean head, good ears, but of light build and not in show form. Third, Otterburn Delight, same as above but smaller in stature. Novice bitches -First, Corona Crystal. Second, Imera Thelma, is small but has good bone. Third, Bedford Splendour, good head, with nice eye, poor shower. Limit bitches, sable and white-First, Glendale Queen. Second, Imera Thelma. Third, Bedford Splendour. Open bitches, sable and white-Repeat. Limit any other color-First, Corona Crystal.

Second, Riverdale Violet, good sort of head, but shows age and is low to ground. Third, Campbell, good skull, but weak in foreface, has good body, legs and feet. Open bitches, any other color—First, Corona Crystal. Second, Auchill Patricia, good level head with nice ears, but dead out of coat. Third, Riverdale Violet. Breeders, bitches— First, Imera Thelma. Second, Otterburn Dearest. Third, Otterburn Delight. Canadian-bred bitches—First, Corona Crystal. Second, Glendale Queen. Third, Imera Thelma. Winners—Corona Crystal. Reserve—Glendale Queen.

The winning bitch, Mrs. Kenneally's Dainty, good coat, body and legs.

Winners value, three points.

I cannot close without speaking of the show as a whole. It was conducted in a manner that a great many of our shows in the United States could take as an example. The officers were courteous at all times and were untiring in their efforts to make everything pleasant for exhibitors and visitors alike. VICTORIA CITY KENNEL CLUB SHOW

On Sept. 24th, 25th and 26th the second annual fall show of Victoria City Kennel Club was held in connection with the B. C. Agricultural Association. The number of dogs exhibited was very small, making a onepoint show; this is accounted for through some talk of rabies existing on the Coast, and as many of the exhibitors did not wish to take chances their dogs were not entered. We are glad to report there was no foundation for this rumor, and that up to the present time no rabies have been discovered.

While the number of dogs was very small, the quality was much better than the average. Nothing new of a sensational character was brought out, although some very good specimens were on exhibit.

In the Irish Setter class special mention might be made of Killarney Kim, bred by Mr. C. A. Goodwin, and owned by Mr. H. W. R. Moore; this dog going through from puppy to winners in his class. He is a fine dog, good bone, coat, head and expression, and is the type of dog that ought to have a good future.

In the Bulldog class, Trilby, owned by Mr. A. R. Poole, of Maywood, carried off the honors, but was beaten for best bull by Ch. Ashgill Jim, owned by Mrs. Watson, of Nanaimo. The latter dog was extremely good quality, and the fact that he beat Trilby is no reflection on the latter.

Collies brought out a very nice class, every representative being a good one. Seldom do you visit a show where the Collies average up as they did here.

Special mention might be made of Seedley Smile, owned and bred by Mr. J. J. Jackson, of Edmonds, B.C. This bitch is an unusually good one, possessing all the qualities that go to make up a true Collie. At the time of show she might have been a little longer in coat, and there is no doubt that had she been shown a few months later she would have gone to the top as best dog or bitch in the show. Many fanciers thought she should have gone there anyway, but she was not in just as good show form as the dog attaining that high position should be. In this connection we might mentiou that a great deal of credit is due to the persistent efforts of Mr. Jackson to breed the best, and he is to be complimented on his large number of wins in the last few years.

Mr. C. Bennett Thompson exhibited a very nice Wire Fox Terrier in Oakes Craven; this dog not only went through for winners in his elass, but obtained the prize for best of opposite sex in show.

I may say on the whole that the show was a success from exhibitors' standpoint and also financially, and that the club is in a good flourishing condition and already hard at work preparing for our spring show.

Another judge will be chosen, as the same judge will not be used twice, and in the spring the judges will form a committee to pick the grand champion of the winter parlor shows, and a suitable prize will be given for the same. All champions are barred from these shows. The club has about 100 members now and more names to be voted on at the next regular meeting. The Terminal City Kennel Club will hold their 3rd annual show Good Friday and the following Saturday.

I paid a visit to the Rougham Kennels, at Whonnock, B.C., and found there seventeen nice terriers, Airedales, Smooth and Wire Fox Terriers. Mr. H. L. Cocksedge has a beautiful home and good kennels, acres of exercising grounds, running creeks, lots of grass and plenty of shade, making in all a perfect lay for Terriers, lots of bush, where game is plentiful, too. Mrs. Cocksedge lays claim to a Wire puppy dog, all white in color, and if nothing happens this pup and he matures as he is now going on, he will certainly make them all sit up and take notice. He has a wonderful good coat, a perfect ear if ever there was one, good length head, wonderful good bone, legs and feet, and a very cobby body. This is the most promising puppy I have ever seen. Mr. Cocksedge has also a nice Airedale bitch puppy that at present looks very promising, grand bone, good coat, and the color could not be beat. She is sired by Rougham Critic ex Ch. Rougham Lass, both owned by Mr. Cocksedge. His Wire and Smooth Fox Terriers, Ch. Emroy Bristles and Brymor Toff, were looking in their prime, in fact, much better than they ever did in any show. Ch. Brooklyn Jeanie looks like a pup and as full of life as ever.

J. A. Thurston has imported a pair of Airedales. His bitch, Preference, has beaten the best bitches in England, including the following, Excelsior, London, Road, Queen, Marvellous Girl and other big winners. She was only shown a short time in England and won 30 firsts and numerous specials, including cup for best in show at Blackburn, and was then withdrawn for breeding at Manchester. She was the sensation of the show, and is the mother of that great Airedale, Ch. Rebound Oorang, said to be one of the best Airedales ever benched in England. Preference is also the mother of Persister, who won six firsts at Blackburn and was sold to America. also dam of Sudell Queen, 2nd at Cheetham and other winners. She arrived in whelp to Primrose Rebound and since whelped three pups, two dogs and a bitch, the dogs look very promising. Her son, Ch. Rebound Oorang, has won over 100 firsts and specials and challenge certificates at Belfast, Manchester, Alexandra Palace, London, and special for best in show, all breeds, at several shows. This blood will certainly improve the Airedale blood in British Columbia.

Mrs. Thorton Sharp is importing another Wire; this time a stud dog, which comes very highly recommended.

Mr. J. Fennessy has bred his Airedale bitch, Grizzly Alert, to Elruge Monarch on Oct. 1st.


