The Advertisements should reach us not later than the 26th.

THOSE members who have won championship cups will welcome the news that the club have made satisfactory arrangements for the manufacture of these cups in England. They are to be of exactly the same design as the cups the club has been giving for the last few years, and of the same size, but if anything of better quality. Twenty-four cups have been ordered for immediate delivery, having been already won. They will be shipped direct from England to the winners as soon as manufactured.

The Rules Committee for the revision of the rules, constitution and by-laws have at last completed their very arduous task and we are able to give the result in this number to our readers.

The personnel of this committee, Messrs. Kent, Bain, Jacobi and McFarland, naturally led the members to expect good results, composed, as it is, of men of very extended experience and with critical legal minds, and surely they have not been disappointed.

The meetings were many and no rule passed without consideration, and some were discussed for many meetings before a satisfactory wording was reached. The main object aimed at is simplicity, and this was attained by cutting out much ambiguity, many superfluous clauses and some repetitions. It must be distinctly understood that these changes are only proposed and have not been passed by even the Executive Committee, nor will they be in any way retroactive.

In the election of officers, the chief change has been in the elimination of the nomination meeting, nominations being sent direct to the secretary. Nothing is gained by these nomination meetings as the only business was to receive nominations, and that can all be done by the proposed change.

The duties of the Executive Committee have been more clearly defined.

The financial year of the club has been changed to end July 31st, making it possible for an audited statement to be presented at the annual meeting.

The change in fees has been chiefly in registration of kennel names and prefixes. A fee is introduced for annual renewal of these, with the principal object of permitting the club to allow those to lapse that are no longer in use. The club is to-day publishing and carrying prefixes which are long out of use and many of the owners of same have passed to the great

unknown. Had this rule been in force these prefixes would have lapsed.

An important rule has been introduced allowing change of a registered name. There are occasions when an injustice is done by the old rule and the only serious objection was the amount of work entailed on the office of the club, but this will be covered by the necessary fee.

The registration of dogs already registered in England is a valuable change, and the necessity for that registration to be in the same name will avoid confusion.

All rules throughout as regards discipline have been much simplified, but at the same time made much more comprehensive and definite.

In the Dog Show Rules, though there are some changes in the first twelve rules, these are only towards clearness and have not altered the original meaning to any extent. Rule XIII. allows an exhibitor to withdraw his dogs in case of a change of judge, an eminently fair alteration.

Rule XV. only more clearly defines what was always understood to be a recognized class.

The ten point rule for championship has been rewritten, chiefly to make it clearer, with the important addition of the necessity of winning at three different shows and with the addition of the necessity of registration in order that points may count towards a championship cup. The first part has long been contemplated and its fairness accepted; the second will be an extra inducement towards registration, and everyone is agreed that it is very desirable that every dog eligible for registration should be registered. The introduction of a scale of points for what might be styled "group shows" is a very important step and in the right direction, but the grouping and the scale is open to discussion. No doubt our readers will tell us.

The changes in the rest of the Dog Show Rules are mostly of minor character, with the object of making them clearer and more workable.

In the club regulations the clashing of dates is prevented, as well as the claiming of dates too long ahead.

The old seven-day rule for closing of receiving of entries which has never

been strictly observed, has been changed to two days. We believe this will serve to protect the exhibitors, while helping the shows.

The requirement of the publication of rules of the C. K. C. in the catalogue has been abolished and none too soon.

With the object of simplifying shows and taking any unnecessary burden off

them, the rules forbidding the acceptance of puppies under age, or dogs not listed, or the employment of anyone under disqualification, have been eliminated. These already occur under dog show rules, and the entire onus is now placed on the offending individual and not on the unfortunate show secretary.

PROPOSED CHANGES

CONSTITUTION, BY-LAWS AND RULES

ARTICLE I.

Organization.

Sec. 1.—This Club shall be known as the Canadian Kennel Club (Incorporated).

Sec. 2.—The head office of the Club shall be in Toronto.

Sec. 3.—The object of the Club shall be to promote the breeding of thoroughbred dogs in Canada, and to protect the interests of owners and breeders, to formulate rules for the government of Dog Shows and competitions, and in such other ways as it may seem fit, attempt to guide and advance the welfare of dogs and their owners.

ARTICLE II.

Membership.

Sec. 1.—The Club shall consist of members and patrons.

Sec. 2.—Application for membership shall be made in writing to the Secretary, accompanied by the requisite fee, who shall then submit the same to the next ensuing meeting of the Executive Committee to be voted upon. Voting shall be by ballot. Two-thirds of the votes of the members present must be in favor of the applicant before he can be elected.

ARTICLE III.

Officers.

Sec. 1.—The officers of the Club shall be President, a First and Second Vice-President, and one Vice-President for each Province, and Secretary-Treasurer, all of whom, with the exception of the Secretary-Treasurer, shall be annually elected as hereinafter set forth, and shall hold office for one year or until their successors shall be elected.

ARTICLE IV.

Nomination and Election of Officers.

All candidates for office must be nominated by a member in good standing.

Nominations shall be made in writing and sent addressed to the Secre-

tary, to be in his hands on or before August 1st.

When the nominations are closed, a ballot slip showing the nominations for officers and Executive Committee shall be sent by registered mail to each member, with instructions to return same to the Secretary. All ballots must be mailed to members at least twenty-one days before the annual meeting.

All ballots must be sent to the Secretary, and be in his hands before the first day of September.

Ballots shall be returned in a specially printed envelope, marked "Ballot," to be supplied by the Club, and shall be counted at the annual meeting. All ballots must bear the initials of the Secretary-Treasurer.

In case of a tie vote, the tie shall be decided by a majority vote of the members present at the annual meeting.

Sec. 2.—The Executive Committee shall have power to fill vacancies for the unexpired terms.

Sec. 3.—An Honorary Solicitor, Honorary Veterinary Surgeon and Auditors shall be elected at the annual meeting without previous nomination.

ARTICLE V.

Executive Committee.

Sec. 1.—The Executive Committee shall consist of the officers named, except Secretary-Treasurer, and twelve other members elected at the same time and in the same manner. It shall convene in September during the time of the Dog Show held in connection with the Canadian National Exposition, and in January, April and June, and as often besides as may be deemed necessary at the call of the President, or the written request of six members of the Executive.

Sec. 2.—The Executive Committee shall exercise a general supervision over all the activities and affairs of the club, and shall have, in addition

to the powers specifically granted herein, full authority to take any action which in their opinion is advisable or necessary in order to carry out the objects set out in Article I., Sec. 3 of this constitution.

ARTICLE VI.

Amendments.

The Constitution or By-laws of this Club may be amended at any general or annual meeting of the Club, provided notice of the proposed change is given in the official organ of the Club, or by special notice to each member, published or posted at least twenty-one days before the date of such meeting, and provided also that two-thirds of the members present at the meeting in person or by proxy vote in favor of the amendment.

BY-LAWS.

LAW I.

Duties of Officers.

Sec. 1.—The President shall order all meetings of the Club and Executive Committee, except as hereinbefore provided in Article V., Sec. 1, and when possible preside at the same. He shall see that the affairs of the Club are managed according to the terms and spirit of the Constitution and By-laws; and shall at the annual meeting report on the working of the Club during the past year.

Vice-Presidents.

Sec. 2.—The First Vice-President, or one of the other Vice-Presidents, shall perform all the duties of the President in his absence.

Secretary-Treasurer.

Sec. 3.—The Secretary-Treasurer shall keep the minutes of all meetings of the Club, conduct the correspondence and have charge of and be responsible for all the books and papers of the Club, collect all fees, and deposit same in a chartered bank to the credit of the Canadian Kennel Club (Incorpor-

ated). He shall submit a report of the general financial standing of the Club at each ordinary meeting of the Executive Committee.

The Secretary-Treasurer shall submit at each annual meeting a financial report, up to the 31st of July of that year, which report shall be duly audited and certified to be correct. He shall also submit at the same time a report of the general condition of the Club.

He shall keep a record of the names and addresses of all the members of the Club. He shall furnish a Guarantee Company's bond to an amount satisfactory to the Executive Committee, at the expense of the Club. His remuneration shall be fixed and determined upon by the Executive Committee.

Sec. 4.—All accounts shall be submitted to the President or his duly authorized representative by the Secretary-Treasurer for inspection and approval, and shall be paid by cheque signed by the Secretary-Treasurer and countersigned by the President or his duly authorized representative.

Sec. 5.—Each officer, on expiration of his official term, shall transfer all property whatsoever of the Club in his possession to his successor.

LAW II.

Duties of Executive Committee.

Sec. 1.—The duties of the Executive Committee shall be to endeavor to further the objects and purposes set forth in the Constitution, and to secure and maintain an efficient organization of this Club. It shall have power to provide for such committees as it may deem advisable. Five members shall constitute a quorum.

LAW III.

Auditor and Stud Book Committee.

Sec. 1.—It shall be the duty of the auditor to audit the Treasurer's books and accounts and submit a report duly certified at the annual meeting.

Sec. 2.—The Stud Book Committee shall be appointed by the Executive Committee at their first regular meeting. It shall be the duty of the Stud Book Committee to scrutinize the registrations appearing each month in the official organ, investigate each and send them initialed to the Secretary for a final insertion in the Annual Stud Book.

LAW IV.

Meetings.

Sec. 1.—The annual meeting shall be held at such time and place as shall

be appointed by the Executive Committee.

Sec. 2.—At the written request of twenty members, the President shall call a special meeting of the Club. Twenty shall be a quorum at a general or special meeting.

Sec. 3.—Notice of all general meetings shall be given in the official organ of the Club, or by special notice to each member, published or posted at least twenty-one days before date of such meeting. At least ten full days' notice shall be given by mail to each member of the Executive Committee. A schedule of all the items of business to come under consideration shall be duly supplied with the notice of meeting.

LAW V.

Fees and Privileges of Membership.

Sec. 1.—The following fees shall be charged:

1. Annual membership fee \$3.00 (payable in advance).
2. Cost of registration \$1.00 each. One free each year to each member.
3. Cost of listing 25c for each show.
4. Fee for search of pedigree, 25c.
5. Copy of pedigree to members, 25c, to non-members, 50c.
6. Transfer of registration, 25c.
7. Registration of prefix \$3.00. Annual renewal of same, 50c.
8. Registration of kennel name \$3. Annual renewal of same, 50c.
9. Transfer of prefix \$3.00.
10. Transfer of kennel name \$3.00.
11. Duplicate of certificate, 25c.
12. A fee of \$1.00 to cover average cost is charged for the investigation of each complaint not arising out of misconduct at shows, held under C. K. C. rules. No charge is made to members. (See also By-law VII.)

Sec. 2.—Failure to renew prefix or kennel name shall involve the cancellation of the registration of same, but no prefix or kennel name so cancelled shall be re-registered until after the expiration of ten years from the date of such cancellation. At any time during the said period of ten years the person or persons in whose name or names the registration stood at the time of cancellation may re-register the said prefix or kennel name on payment of all arrears of renewal fees.

Sec. 3.—The annual Stud Book shall be supplied free to members.

LAW VI.

Registration.

Sec. 1.—A dog may be registered in

the Stud Book on application and payment of the requisite fee, and the following information duly authenticated must be supplied with each such application:

1. Name of dog.
2. Breed, sex and color.
3. Date and place of birth.
4. Name and address of breeder.
5. Pedigree for three generations.

Such application must be made on the form supplied by the Club.

A dog already registered in the English Kennel Club Stud Book may be registered with only two generations of pedigree, provided the application is otherwise complete and the applicant submits the registration certificate from the English Kennel Club.

Sec. 2.—No dog which is already registered in the English Kennel Club, or American Kennel Club Stud Book, shall be registered in the Canadian Kennel Club Stud Book under any other name than that under which it is already so registered, but this rule shall not prevent the addition of a prefix to the name under which it is so registered.

Sec. 3.—The registered name of any dog may be changed on payment of a fee of \$5.00. Provided that if the application for change is received during the fiscal year of the C. K. C., in which the original registration was made, the fee shall be reduced to \$2.00.

LAW VII.

Discipline.

Sec. 1.—The Executive Committee shall have full power by a vote of those present at any of its meetings to suspend, disqualify or expel any person, whether a member of the Club or not, and the person so suspended, disqualified or expelled, shall have no claim against the Club, or be allowed to enter into any competition held under the rules of this Club. Such person shall have the right to appeal to the Club from the action of the Executive Committee at the annual meeting, or at any special meeting, provided notice of appeal has been given to the Executive Committee. Suspension, disqualification or expulsion shall be either for a definite period, or for life; and the person thus suspended, disqualified or expelled shall be reinstated only on application to the Executive Committee.

Sec. 2.—Anyone having personal knowledge of the facts, may prefer charges of improper conduct against

any individual. The person making such charges must send them in writing to the Secretary-Treasurer of the Club. The charges thus forwarded must be accompanied by a deposit of \$5.00, as a guarantee of good faith, for each charge preferred, which shall be retained should the charges be deemed on investigation to be frivolous or malicious. In the case of non-members, a fee of \$1.00 shall be charged for investigation.

Sec. 3.—Any person suspended, disqualified or expelled in accordance with the provisions of Section 1 of this by-law shall be debarred from all privileges of the Club, including registration; and shall not be eligible as an exhibitor, agent, handler, judge or official of any show held under the sanction of the C. K. C.

LAW VIII.

Order of Business.

The order of business at all meetings of the Club or Executive shall be as follows:

1. Roll Call.
2. Reading of Minutes.
3. Reports and Communications.
4. Unfinished Business.
5. New Business.
6. Election of Officers.
7. Adjournment.

DOG SHOW RULES.

For the Government of Dog Shows, as Adopted by the Canadian Kennel Club (Incorporated).

I. The word "dog" whenever used in these rules includes both sexes.

II. Every dog must be either listed or registered with the Canadian Kennel Club previous to being exhibited. The cost of listing is twenty-five cents for each show. The Show Secretary is authorized by the Canadian Kennel Club to accept listing fees from exhibitors with their entries, provided that the entry blank contains the following statement: "This Club assumes the collection and forwarding to the Canadian Kennel Club of all listing fees."

The cost of registration, which is good forever, is \$1.00, and the application for registration must be made direct with the Canadian Kennel Club on its official blank, which will be supplied by the Secretary. Penalty for non-compliance with this rule is cancellation of all winnings.

III. Every dog must be the bona-fide property of the person making such entry on the day of closing the en-

tries, and must be not less than six months old. The entry must clearly identify the dog to be exhibited by name. If the dog is already registered in the Canadian Kennel Club Stud Book, the Stud Book number of the dog should be given with the entry.

IV. If the name of a dog which has won a prize at any show recognized by the Canadian Kennel Club has been changed, the old name must be given in the entry blank and published in the catalogue of the first show recognized by the Canadian Kennel Club at which the dog is shown, after the change of name.

V. Exhibitors must abide by any errors made in entering their dogs.

VI. The breeder of a dog is the person owning or leasing the dam at the time of her being bred.

VII. The authorities of any show may decline any entries they see fit and may refuse to receive or may remove any dog on account of disease, vice or other cause, and no one shall have any claim or recourse against the organization holding the show or any official connected therewith.

VIII. A castrated dog or spayed bitch shall be disqualified and forfeit any prize which may be awarded to it.

IX. Total blindness, deafness or lameness shall absolutely disqualify. If the judge or veterinary surgeon is satisfied that the deafness or lameness be temporary, the dog shall be allowed to compete.

X. A judge may disqualify a dog which, in his opinion, has been improperly tampered with, subject to the decision of the veterinary surgeon. Should the judge's disqualification not be sustained by the veterinary surgeon, the class must be re-judged if necessary.

XI. The judge's decision shall be final in all cases affecting the merits of the dogs, and appeals can only be entertained where misrepresentation or breach of the rules is alleged.

XII. The judge of each class shall have power to withhold any or all prizes for want of merit.

XIII. Should an appointed judge be unable to fill his engagement, the Committee shall have the right to fill the vacancy. In the event of an appointed judge not officiating it shall be optional with the exhibitor before the commencement of the judging of the breed to withdraw his dog or dogs from competition and from the show, in which event his entry fee shall be re-

turned. All the separate classes of any breed of dogs must be adjudicated upon by the same judge, or judges, acting in conjunction.

XIV. In any class where there is a limit of weight, the person in charge of the dog entered in such class may claim of the manager, superintendent, secretary, or any member of the show committee the right at any time after the opening of the show, and before the judging, to have the dog weighed, and the weight of the dog shall be registered and held good at the time of judging.

Any competing exhibitor or handler shall have the right to demand of the manager, superintendent, secretary or any member of the show committee, the weighing or measuring of any dog during the judging of the class, other than those whose weight has been officially registered. The Club must provide scales for the use of the exhibitors and judges.

XV. Bench Show Committees may provide such classes for dogs of established breeds as they choose, providing they do not conflict with the under-mentioned classes recognized by the Canadian Kennel Club; all such classes shall be under the supervision of the Canadian Kennel Club.

1st. The puppy class shall be for dogs over six months, and not exceeding twelve months of age, and no entry can be made of one whose date of birth is unknown.

Puppies may be removed from a show after they have been judged, but only after the closing of the show in any evening.

2nd. The novice class shall be for American-bred dogs, never having won a first prize at any show recognized by the Canadian Kennel Club or the American Kennel Club, wins in the puppy class excepted. No entry for novice class can be made that does not give the name and address of the breeder. An American-bred dog is one born on the Continent of North America.

3rd. The limit class shall be for all dogs never having won four first prizes in the limit class at any shows recognized by the Canadian Kennel Club or the American Kennel Club, but no dog having obtained the title of champion anywhere shall be eligible for this class.

4th. The open class shall be for all dogs.

5th. The winners class at any show shall be open only to winners of first prizes in any of the above classes, recognized by the Canadian Kennel Club at that show. Winners class or classes must be provided for in every breed recognized by the Canadian Kennel Club for which a classification has been provided.

Before awarding reserve in the winners class, the dog or dogs, having been placed second to the winner in any of the classes recognized by the Canadian Kennel Club must also be brought before the judge for competition.

All class winners must compete in the winners class. No entry fee shall be charged for competition in this class.

Winners classes shall not be allowed where two or more breeds are combined.

The winners class shall be divided by sex, provided at least the open class is also divided by sex.

Only two winners classes may be offered in any one breed (except Cocker Spaniels), one for dogs, and one for bitches. In Cocker Spaniels, four winners classes may be offered, i.e., black dogs, black bitches, any other color dogs, any other color bitches.

Ten points, which must be won under at least three different judges at three different shows, shall constitute a championship, the winner of which shall be recognized as a champion by the Canadian Kennel Club and duly recorded as such. If all ten points have been won while the dog was registered in the Canadian Kennel Club Stud Book, and while owned by a member of the Canadian Kennel Club, he shall be entitled to a championship cup.

The number of points allotted at any show shall depend upon the number of dogs actually benched, as follows:

- Not less than 600 dogs shall count five points.
- Not less than 500 dogs shall count four points.
- Not less than 400 dogs shall count three points.
- Not less than 250 dogs shall count two points.
- Less than 250 dogs shall count one point.

The scale of points for all shows held west of Port Arthur and in the Maritime Provinces shall be as follows:

- Not less than 300 dogs shall count five points.

Not less than 250 dogs shall count four points.

Not less than 200 dogs shall count three points.

Not less than 150 dogs shall count two points.

Less than 150 dogs shall count one point.

In case of shows confined to any three breeds, or to any one of the following groups:

- (a) Sporting Terriers.
- (b) Sporting Spaniels.
- (c) Sporting dogs, not included in (a) and (b).
- (d) Non-sporting dogs, large, to include Collies, St. Bernards, Great Danes, Mastiffs, Newfoundlands, Old English Sheep Dogs, Dalmatians, Pinschers.
- (e) Non-sporting dogs, small, to include Bulldogs, Boston Terriers, French Bulldogs, Black and Tan Terriers, Chows, Samoyedes.
- (f) All Toys, including Schipperkes and all Poodles.

the scale of points shall be as follows:

- Not less than 200 dogs shall count four points.
- Not less than 150 dogs shall count three points.
- Not less than 100 dogs shall count two points.
- Less than 100 dogs shall count one point.

In case of shows conducted by specialty clubs, and confined to one breed, the scale of points shall be as follows:

- Not less than 100 dogs shall count four points.
- Not less than 75 dogs shall count three points.
- Not less than 50 dogs shall count two points.

6th. The miscellaneous class shall be open to all dogs of established breeds for which no regular class has been provided in the premium list. Entries in this class must specify the breed of the exhibit. Failure to comply with this condition shall cancel the award, if any.

XVI. In estimating the number of prizes a dog has won, the number of prizes won shall be calculated up to 12 p.m. of the day preceding the closing of the entries of the show.

XVII. If a prize winner is disqualified, the next dog of merit as placed by the judge shall be given the prize thus forfeited, and the win shall count in every respect the same as if it had been the original award. An equal first prize shall be counted as a win for each dog, dividing first and second

money, the dog next in order of merit receiving third money.

XVIII. No dog eligible for special prizes can be withdrawn from competition unless it has been stated on the entry blank, "Will not compete for special prizes."

XIX. Dogs may be entered for exhibition or for specials only, if so stated on the entry blank, but dogs competing for specials only must be entered in one of the regular classes in which they need not compete.

In judging "general specials" or specials of a similar nature, the competition shall be restricted to dogs that have won first in their respective winners' classes. In cases where a special prize has already been awarded for the best of a breed, only the winners of this special shall compete.

XX. No special prizes may be accepted or offered by a show committee after the regular judging has commenced.

Any club, organization or association giving a show shall be held responsible for the collection of special prizes and delivery to the winners thereof, within sixty days of the closing of the show. In case of default on the part of the donor of a special prize, an appeal may be made to the Canadian Kennel Club Executive.

XXI. The age of a dog shall be calculated up to and inclusive of the day preceding the show; for instance, a dog whelped April 30th shall not be eligible on April 30th of the following year to compete for dogs under twelve months of age.

XXII. A protest may be made by any exhibitor, or any member of a club holding a show under the sanction of this Association; but must be in writing, and be lodged with the secretary of the show within seven days of the last day of the show, but a protest may be made to the Executive Committee of the Canadian Kennel Club within one month of the close of the show, in event of which notice shall be given to the club holding the show. No objection shall be entertained, unless accompanied by a deposit of \$5.00, except the same is lodged in the name of the Canadian Kennel Club, which may be made at any time. (For subsequent proceedings in protest see Rule XI. of Club Regulations.)

XXIII. A person guilty of misconduct of any kind in connection with dogs, dog shows or field trials, may be

suspended, disqualified or expelled by the Executive Committee of the Canadian Kennel Club. The suspension, disqualification or expulsion of an owner shall apply to all dogs owned by him or connected with the perpetration of a fraudulent act.

XXIV. No person under suspension or sentence of disqualification or expulsion may enter, exhibit, judge, act as agent or handler for an exhibitor, or take a dog into the ring at any show, or be connected in any capacity with dog shows held under the Canadian Kennel Club Rules.

XXV. Entries made in the name of a kennel must be accompanied by the name or names of the actual proprietors, unless such kennel is registered with the Canadian Kennel Club. The partners in a kennel will be deemed equally culpable in the case of fraud perpetrated in the kennel name.

A kennel located in Canada and owned exclusively by Canadian citizens, whether resident in Canada or not, shall be considered a Canadian-owned kennel.

XXVI. The person presenting the identification ticket shall be recognized as the agent of the owner in the latter's absence, and his receipt for prize money shall be binding on the owner, unless notice to the contrary is endorsed on the identification ticket.

REGULATIONS GOVERNING CLUBS HOLDING SHOWS UNDER C. K. C. RULES.

Any organization, club or association may hold a dog show under Canadian Kennel Club Rules, provided it abides by the following regulations:

I. Sec. 1. Application for dates, and for sanction of the show must be made in writing and filed with the Secretary of the Canadian Kennel Club for approval by the Executive Committee, or such sub-committees as may be empowered to grant dates, but no dates or sanction shall be granted more than four months previous to the opening of the show.

Sec. 2. The Executive Committee shall have power to grant or withhold dates.

Sec. 3. The same dates or any part of them shall not be granted to more than one club within two hundred miles of each other, unless such clubs are specialty clubs of entirely different breeds.

Sec. 4. Such approval, however, shall

be subject to the subsequent endorsement of the premium list as being in accordance with the requirements of the Canadian Kennel Club.

II. Sec. 1. Application for dates and sanction of show must be accompanied by a deposit of \$25.00, which must be forfeited in event of the show not being held, or failure to comply with the requirements of the Canadian Kennel Club, as set forth herein.

Sec. 2. Shows not exceeding 250 entries will be charged a fee of \$10.00; 250 and under 350 entries, \$15.00; 350 and under 450 entries, \$20; and over 450 entries, \$25.00. The counting of the number of entries for this purpose shall include every entry in the catalogue, whether in classes recognized by the Canadian Kennel Club or not. The difference between this amount, and that of the deposit shall be refunded when complete returns have been made to the Canadian Kennel Club.

III. Sec. 1. The show shall not extend beyond four full days.

Sec. 2. Entries shall not be received less than two days prior to the first day of the show, and a club accepting any entry after that date shall be subject to a fine of not less than \$10.00 for each entry so accepted. No alteration of the date of closing entries shall be allowed.

Sec. 3. Classification shall be confined to established breeds, which may be divided by sex and otherwise, as provided for in the dog show rules. No change in classification will be allowed unless announced before the date for closing entries, unless such change is covered by the published regulations of the show.

IV. Sec. 1. Every bench show must employ a qualified veterinary surgeon.

Sec. 2. A qualified veterinary surgeon is a graduate of a recognized college entitled to confer the degree of V.S., or one who without having a diploma, has had at least five years' practical experience to fit him for the practice of his profession.

He must examine all dogs entered, and no dog shall be benched unless passed upon by him. He must also personally inspect the dogs on the benches, and in the quarters where the dogs are crated and exercised, before 6 p.m. on the opening day of the show, and also at least once in the morning of each day during the continuance of the show. He must hand in a written

report to the Dog Show Committee.

V. The premium list must contain the dog show rules and regulations of the Canadian Kennel Club, also a list of the officials under whose management the show is to be held, who, with the exception of the paid employees, are held responsible for the payment of all prizes within sixty days of the last day of the show, in default of which the said officials, or such of them as the Executive Committee of the Canadian Kennel Club deem culpable, shall be suspended, disqualified or expelled for such time as the Executive of the Canadian Kennel Club shall determine.

VI. A certificate of the number of dogs actually present, signed by the president or chairman of the Bench Show Committee, and the secretary or superintendent of the show, and endorsed by one or more members of the C.K.C. Executive Committee, shall be sent by registered mail before the close of the show to the Secretary-Treasurer of the C. K. C. Blank forms for this purpose will be supplied by the C. K. C.

VII. All prizes must be in accordance with their description in the premium list. Prizes must be of the purity of standard coin, except in the case of gold, which must not be of less than 12 karat. Prizes in a given class shall be awarded regardless of the number of entries, except as otherwise defined in Rule XII.

VIII. A club may act as agent for exhibitors and accept the fee for listing, but must make immediate returns thereof to the Canadian Kennel Club. A penalty of \$10.00 for each day will be enforced for any delay beyond thirty days from the date of closing of the show, in making such returns to the Canadian Kennel Club.

IX. The catalogue of the show must give all particulars required of exhibitors in entering their dogs, as provided in Rules II., III., IV., XV., (Sections 1, 2 and 6), of the Dog Show Rules. It must also contain a list of officers under whose management the show is held.

X. Only Canadian Kennel Club Stud Book numbers shall be used in the catalogue.

XI. Sec. 1. In event of a protest being filed in accordance with Rule XXII. of the Dog Show Rules, the mode of procedure shall be as follows: Immediately upon lodging of a protest

with the secretary of a show, it shall be his duty to request the judge to select reserve numbers, if he has not already done so, in order that any prize which would be affected by the disqualification of the proest of dog may not fail of being awarded.

Sec. 2. An objection must be decided by the Committee of the Dog Show within twenty days from its receipt. If not decided during the show, five days' notice of the date and place of meeting for that purpose must be given to all parties interested.

Sec. 3. From any such decision or decisions appeal may be taken to the Executive Committee of the Canadian Kennel Club, but such appeal must be forwarded to the Secretary of the Canadian Kennel Club within seven days of the decision being rendered, together with the deposit of \$10.00. If the decision appealed from is sustained, the \$10.00 deposit shall be forfeited to the Canadian Kennel Club, but if the decision is reversed, then all deposits must be returned to the applicant.

XII. In the event of the cancellation of a win or disqualification of a dog by a Show Committee, notice of such shall be forwarded within twenty-four hours to the Secretary of the Canadian Kennel Club, who shall at once notify the President, or in his absence, the Vice-President, who shall investigate the case, and, if he see fit suspend the penalty until the next meeting of the Executive Committee. The Executive Committee must at their first meeting thereafter either cancel or sustain the decision of the Show Committee, and impose such penalty as they deem fit.

The disqualification of an owner shall apply to all dogs owned by him or connected with the perpetration of a fraudulent act. The Executive Committee of the Canadian Kennel Club is, however, empowered to use such discretion in the enforcement of this penalty as shall protect innocent parties.

No person shall, however, be disqualified without due notice, and formal charges and specifications, and an opportunity given of being heard in his own defence.

XIII. Such regulations may be adopted for the government of any show as shall be considered necessary, provided they do not conflict with any of the foregoing or of the Dog Show Rules.

MEETING OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OF THE CANADIAN KENNEL CLUB.

A meeting was held in the offices of the club, 774½ Yonge Street, on Monday, January 26th, at 8.30 p.m.

Lieutenant-Colonel Nelles in the chair.

There were present Messrs. Farewell, Jacobi, McFarland, Nelles, Nordheimer, Swann, Wilson, Miles, Farquharson, Sands, Dr. J. A. Campbell.

The Committee on Revision of Rules reported their completion. It was moved by Mr. McFarland, seconded by Mr. Sands, that they be published in Kennel and Bench and taken up at the next executive meeting.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Miles, seconded by Mr. Farewell, that the Victoria City Kennel Club be requested to get an affidavit from Mr. Wolfenden to substantiate their decision in the appeal of Waterhouse vs. Heaton.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Miles, seconded by Mr. Farewell, that a copy of Mr. Laurin's sworn statement be sent to Mr. Overman, and that in the opinion of the executive committee of the Canadian Kennel Club, the evidence does not show any misrepresentation on the part of Mr. Laurin, and that unless further evidence can be produced showing misrepresentation, no action can be taken by this club.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Farquharson, seconded by Mr. Wilson, that Mr. L. Parker be notified that unless he can satisfactorily explain to this committee the false entry at the National Live Stock Dog Show, and the incorrect pedigrees and other irregularities charged, on or before March the 1st, he will be disqualified.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. McFarland, seconded by Mr. Nordheimer, that Mr. E. F. Stedman, of Strassburg, Sask., be elected as Provincial Vice-President for Saskatchewan.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Farewell, seconded by Mr. Sands, that the Ottawa Kennel Club be informed that this committee is of the opinion that the La Fama cup should be awarded to Mr. Jas. G. Walter's Epsom Confidence, and that they be requested to act accordingly.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. McFarland, seconded by Mr. Sands, that the deposit be returned to the Toronto Kennel Club.—Lost.

Moved by Mr. Jacobi, seconded by

Mr. Nordheimer, that the action of the previous meeting of the executive committee, granting dates April 9, 10 and 11 to the Toronto Kennel Club be rescinded and the deposit returned.—Carried.

A letter was read from the Bulldog Breeders' Association, referring to the duplication of names registered here and in England and United States, and the confusion caused thereby. The letter was referred to the Rules Committee.

Moved by Mr. McFarland, seconded by Mr. Swann, that the election of the Manitoba Advisory Board be ratified.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Swann, seconded by Mr. Wilson, that the secretary be instructed to advise the Pacific Advisory Board that in view of the impending action of the Manitoba Advisory Board, the matter of the powers of other Advisory Boards be held in abeyance.—Carried.

The application for the prefix "Roslin" was refused on account of its similarity to a prefix already registered.

Mr. James W. Bain's resignation from the Board of the Canadian National Exhibition was received and accepted, and Mr. John G. Kent was unanimously elected on that board.

Mr. E. Alban Sturdee, of St. John, N.B., was elected Provincial Vice-President for the Maritime Provinces.

The secretary was instructed to order from England the necessary championship cups.

The secretary was instructed to issue sight drafts for the annual membership of all members in arrears.

We publish a list which gives the approximate value of cups and money to be won at Rochester in the various breeds, which will be increased before the entries close. Every individual breed has at least one cup, and the cheapest cup in the lot is worth over \$5. The average ones running a little over \$20 in the breeds.

In unclassified specials there is a \$150 sterling cup for the best in the show, and \$50 cup for the best of the opposite sex. Sterling cup for sporting and non-sporting dogs; a cup for best Toy; for the best Terrier from Canada; the best other than Terrier from Canada; the best Smooth or Wire Fox Terrier, and the club has put its medal up for the best sporting dog, the best non-sporting, the best Terrier and the best Toy from Canada. In English Bulldogs there is a cup for the best American or Canadian-bred, and another for the best Canadian or American-bred bitch. In Bull Terriers there is a cup for the best Canadian-bred dog or bitch. In Wire Fox Terriers there is a cup for the best Canadian or American-bred dog or bitch.

There are over twelve cups offered in unclassified specials and over 65 in the individual breeds.

SPARKLING BEAUTY

Dear Sir,—Will you kindly allow me space in your valuable journal to reply to your criticisms on Sparkling Beauty and myself as to why she has not appeared on the bench oftener. Allow me to correct you in her age, and you will see that she has not been held back so much. Beauty is not a litter sister to Sparkling Jewel, but eight months younger, being from the next litter, same breeding, which makes her a full sister. As she was whelped July 19th, 1912, she lacked about three weeks from being able to appear at the Boston Specialty Show of 1913. When your spring shows came off she was very low with distemper and we did not succeed in getting her on her feet again until the middle of June. Then we took her to our camp on the lake-shore and allowed her to run at large to regain her health, with the result that her coat got harsh from the sands and she kept herself thin, so that she was in no shape for the Exhibition Show.

However, we led her out at London the following week in as bad shape as she was and won 2nd novice, 2nd limit and 2nd open, and you commented on her at that time that she could have gone higher had she been cropped and in better condition. When the National Show came off she had just been cropped and was suffering with stomach trouble.

Now, when we thought the hottest competition of them all, the Boston Terrier Specialty Show, came off we led her out again and went through and won the Walker House trophy for the best in the show, winning her novice, limit and open classes, 12 to 17 lbs., and winners bitch, also carrying away fourteen (14) special prizes. Does this look as if we had cold feet or did not know what we had? We never would have entered there if such was the case as you stated.

I trust now that this will explain why she has not appeared oftener on the bench.

JOINT TERRIER ASSOCIATION SHOW

The above show was held in St. Paul's Hall on Jan. 9th and 10th. Through the kindness of the Boston Terrier Club, their benching was lent to the association and left in position from their show on January 1st, thereby saving the Joint Show a lot of work. The arrangements were perfect and very well carried out. Mr. Atkinson looked after the show in general, and Mr. H. Dudley Waters looked after the judge and the ring. Mr. Chas. Hopton judged all classes and in the main gave good satisfaction. We do not think this show is having the proper support of the Terrier men throughout the country. They are working very hard to push forward Terriers, and should have the support of everyone. It should not be any trouble for them to have one hundred dogs benched, and with the added incentive of a two-point show under the proposed new rules, this should be easily reached in another year. We think all shows in Toronto are following out a penny-wise and pound foolish policy by holding their shows in obscure and inconvenient halls for the purpose of saving money. A determined and bolder effort in this direction, and a hall in the centre of the city, and on a main street, even at a greater expense, would be cheaper in the end. Why should not the Boston Terrier Club and the Joint Terrier Association choose dates immediately following each other, secure a good place between them, and reap the harvest?

It had not been our intention to give any report on the dogs, but as the promised report from the judge did not materialize until the last moment, owing to the indisposition of Mr. Hopton, we went ahead. However, Mr. Hopton's report came to hand and we must apologize to him and to our readers for an overdose.

The Judge's Report.

While not the largest Terrier show ever held in the Dominion, the second annual exhibition of the Joint Terrier Association of Canada, held at the St. Paul's Hall, North Toronto, on Friday and Saturday, January 9 and 10, was in many ways an exceptionally good one, the quality seen in the majority of the breeds being very good, with competition most keen, especially in

the puppy classes, where some future champions won. While the "filthy lucre" is a second consideration with the majority of the Canadian fanciers, a little of the coin of the realm attracts one, and many seemed to think that the lack of interest shown by certain fanciers was because of the absence of money prizes. With three organizations in Toronto going strong, it seems as though any show with a liberal list of money prizes would pay well in this great city, and it behooves the different clubs to get together and dispel the petty jealousies now somewhat apparent, and give a show which will appeal to all.

The officers, from the president, Jas. W. Bain, to the sincere secretary, Arthur Atkinson, are all imbued with the right spirit, and all ardent Terrier men, who are as keen as can be to breed a flyer.

The specials were of some value, the best being the President's Cup for best in show, which was awarded to the well-known Airedale, Birchcliffe Oorang, a rare stamp of a Terrier, with a wonderful head and expression; his coat, however, was not at the best, which made it no easy task to divide the first two, reserve going to a very good Bull Terrier puppy, Glenedyth Imperator, shown in perfect form, which is quite one of the best of the breed produced in the Dominion, which is saying a great deal. He subsequently won cups for the best puppy in show and best Canadian-bred. The cup for best bitch in show went to a very smart Bull Terrier, Inferno Queen, a daughter of the late Ch. Inferno, and showing much of the sire's type, with his wonderful bone and front.

Airedale puppies had thirteen, all showing type. The winner, Rugged Mr. Bub, while lacking in muzzle, scored in eye, legs and feet, texture of coat and quarters. Second, Rugged Gentleman Monk, is a brother to the winner and much on the same type, with possibly more substance before the eyes, but loses in ear carriage, eyes and coat; a good-boned specimen, and sound in body. Rockley Ranger, third, is a stylish sort, with the right expression, but unfurnished on the day. Among the V.H.C. crowd was Chilmark Royal, quite a good sort in head and

color, but loses in legs and feet and spring of ribs. Juniors was a repeat, as was novice, with the exception that the second came up a peg, as the winning puppy was not entered, third going to Birchcliffe Boy, a very promising son of Soudan Swiveller, which wants time to furnish. Limit went to Buster Briar, a big, rare-boned sort, well up to fifty pounds, with wonderful bone and the sort of quarters which denote strength. Apart from his somewhat heavy ears, which are well carried, he is hard to fault, as he had to be to beat that good, sound terrier, Moorside Rock, a quality one all through, with a better texture of coat than the winner, but lacking in bone, color and strength of muzzle. Birchcliffe Nailer, third, is another useful sort, much on the same type as second, but not so good in expression or front. Then came the open, where the sensation of the show appeared, Birchcliffe Oorang, which is quite one of the best of the breed out to-day, exceptionally good in all head points, very small and well-placed dark eye, perfect ear carriage, clean neck and shoulders, and straight front. He is just a shade open in feet, which can easily be remedied, while in shortness of back, spring of ribs and quarters he is all that one can wish. As to color and texture of coat, he was easily the best in show. He won easily from the limit winner, which finished reserve to him in the winners.

Bitch puppies were rather mixed in type, and the judge promptly went for the medium size and cobby body, where Morning Sunbeam excelled. Apart from her lack of coat she was easily the best. Second, Casa Loma Lady, very good in type, but smudged nose and soft in coat, rightly beat Beacon Filly in head and body. Junior and novice were repeats. Limit went to Rockley Logical Point, a very good stamp, and, while not in good coat, she scored in legs and feet and all body points over Caerphilly Betty and Casa Loma Lady, eventually finishing second in open and reserve in winners to that wonderful bitch, Ch. Culmington Nettle, which is as clean as a puppy in skull and shoulders and was shown in rare form. The best of the breed went to Birchcliffe Oorang.

Bull Terriers followed with a wonderful puppy, Glenedyth Imperator, shown in tiptop form, easily the best. This is the puppy which did so well at the recent Bull Terrier Club show in Brooklyn and should make history in the breed. Inferno Secundus, second, is a very promising sort, excelling in eye, strength of muzzle and bone. Inferno Buster, second in the other classes, is an imported dog, much on the English type, a shade strong in cheek and shoulders, but especially good in strength of muzzle, dark eye and rare bone, a dog which should do the breed lots of good in the Dominion.

John Miles, as is his wont, brought out a very good puppy in bitches, Inferno Firefly, good all over, with exceptionally dark eye, well-filled muzzle and perfect bone. She won easily in her classes, but was beaten in winners by Inferno Queen, a rare good big one, with the right stamp of head and expression, and Princess Nordica, which apart from a lack of substance in muzzle, is all type. The puppy dog won for best of the breed.

Smooth Fox Terriers were only fair. I withheld all firsts in the bitch classes. The winner in dogs was Sabine Ringgold, an all-white son of Sabine Rush, of the right size, evenly balanced head, and perfect front, with cobby body, harsh coat and sound quarters. He won easily from Tillbridge Pegman, much on the same type, but coarse in skull and short in neck, as is Wharfedale Crack, on the big side. That great little Terrier, Hawes Broom, shown in rare form, was the best in Wires and beat the smooth dog for best of the breed.

Irish Terriers were somewhat mixed in type, Mrs. D. Macdonald winning in limit with Rory, a very good stamp, rather short in coat, but excelled in legs and feet. Quarrywood Commander, looking very fit was easily the best in dogs. The old dog still retains his good head and front, while in texture of coat and color he is very good. George Barron introduced a new bitch, Killarney Belle which won right through in the bitch classes. While not in the best of coat, she scored in ears, bone and body over Walnut Coleen, which won in puppies, and is quite a good sort, excelling in expression and color, and the well-known imported champion, Walmer Straight Flush, which is beginning to show the effects of time. The best of the breed rightly went to Quarrywood

Commander, which had much the best of it in coat and color.

Skyes had one very good specimen, Donard Scott, a steel blue, with rare coat and long body.

Scottish Terriers, or "Scotch" Terriers, as they call them in the Dominion, had some quality, Arthur Ellison winning in both sexes with a very good pair of dark brindles. Avondale Adam, the winning puppy, is a real topper, of the pronounced "earthhorse" type, with rare legs and feet, dense coat and perfect quarters. He beat Roderick, a good-headed specimen, in bone and all body points. Avondale Ascot, the winner in limit and open, is another good Scottie, long and clean in head, keen expression, perfect front, cobby body and harsh coat. He won easily from Albert Sandy, a good-headed brindle, which lacked spring of ribs and is quite high enough on leg.

The West Highland "white," Lonach Lass, was very much sandy in color, but, apart from that, was quite a good sort, albeit much too heavy in flesh.

Boston Terriers were only fair. The best in puppies and under 17 pounds was Ingram's Little Man, a very good-colored seal brindle, overdone in shortness of face, but good in front and very cobby in body, points where he beat the better-headed but unfurnished Hillcrest Star. Hillcrest Totem Boy, a trappy, dark brindle and well marked, was the best in open and winners. Ashland Pride scored in head and front over Pretty Bessie II. and Peggie Quigley in bitches, but was beaten for best of the breed by Hillcrest Totem Boy. Yorkshire Terriers were a surprise, Mrs. J. W. Weldon winning with a very good pair, exceptionally small, sound in color and in perfect coat. The winning dog, Weldon Tony, a recent importation, weighs but two and a half pounds and is all a terrier, with lots of coat and as game as an Airedale. The bitch, Edna of Roundhay, was in superb coat and excelled in richness of color.

The winners in Toy Black and Tans were Mrs. S. A. Delaney's well-known pair, Bonnie Boy II. and Rosabelle.

Airedale puppies, first, Rugged Mr. Bub, the winning novice at the National Live Stock, a wonderful coated dog, improved since that show, good bone, good front and shoulder, above

the average in body, good eye and a grand shower, still weak in foreface. Second, Rugged Gentleman Monk, litter brother of the above, and better in foreface and as good all over as the winner, except in coat, though his coat is not poor. These two sons of Ch. Graystone Growler show what that dog could produce. Third, Rockley Ranger, a big strapping puppy with lots of style and a good crisp coat, dark eye but too strong in skull. Junior was a repeat. In novice dogs, with Rugged Mr. Bub out, third went to Birchcliffe Boy, a dog with a very long head, wonderful bone, fair coat, but too close to the ground. Limit dogs, first, Buster Briar, wonderfully improved, his enormous size and growth since last we saw him has been much to his advantage, for it has prevented him from coarsening, has made him balance up splendidly, and to some extent compensates for the size of his ears, which do not seem large. He won clearly. His foreface standing out over any other dog we have seen for many a day. Second, Moorside Rock, was in a very bad temper and could not have acted worse in the ring. He is a well-balanced, good type dog all over, wanting a little strength in foreface, and might be darker in eye. Third, Birchcliffe Nailor, anything but improved and extremely lucky in beating Clonmel Master Crack. We like this last dog for his wonderful style, good coat and foreface, though he might be more compact. Open dogs and winners went to Birchcliffe Oorang, another dog that has improved wonderfully, since arriving here last May, he has put on a lot of size, and strengthened in foreface. He has a most remarkable body and spring of rib, coal-black eye and a very strong foreface. He could be cleaner in cheek and smaller in ear. His coat showed too silky from overgrooming, but this only indicated the dog's grand health, but the texture was coarse. He showed beautifully. The second was Buster Briar, and third Moorside Rock. In breeders, Moorside Rock defeated the puppy winner. In Canadian-breds Buster Briar won, with Moorside Rock second, and the puppy third. Winners went to Birchcliffe Oorang, with Buster Briar reserve.

In bitches, puppies, the winner was Morning Sunbeam, who won on coat and has a good body, but is snipy. She

is not clean in neck, and is heavy in shoulder, and was distinctly lucky. Second, Casa Loma Lady, short in head, long in body, wants bone. Third, Beacon Fiwy, thick in skull. We are of the opinion that the judge went away off in this class. We preferred for first Walnut Capacity, who has a good front and bone and a lean, long head, though houndy in ear, and Silverbirch Patricia, though much too young, could easily have been in the first three. Birchcliffe Babs was too shy. In junior bitches, first and second were repeats, with Silverbirch Patricia third. Novice bitches was a repeat of the junior. Limit bitches brought out Rockley Logical Point as first, a beautiful bitch all over, but a bit on the small side. Second, Caerphilly Betty, a big strapping bitch with grand coat and good body, not the best of head. Open bitches went to the grand old dame, Ch. Culmington Nettle, who, in spite of all the drawbacks of her age, can still win in good company, with her splendid coat and body and gun-barrel legs. She was shown in grand condition. Breeders was won by Rockley Logical Point, as was Canadian-breds, with Casa Loma Lady second, and Silverbirch Patricia third. Winners went to Culmington Nettle, and reserve to Rockley Logical Point, and the breed special went to Birchcliffe Orang.

Bull Terriers—Puppy dogs was won by Glenedyth Imperator, who went straight through and took winners, and has possibly the best record of any puppy in Canada, considering the competition he has met. He improves daily and was shown in perfect condition. Second, Inferno Secundus, a first-class puppy with wonderful body properties, good tail, down face, showing a bit of shoulder, but wants time to show what he will do. In junior dogs Imperator won, with the puppy second, and Franklyn third. The latter dog losing entirely on condition. In novice dogs, Glenedyth Bob took first, with his wonderful short body, good rib, front, legs and feet. Second to the puppy, and third to Franklyn Dynamo. In limit, under 30 pounds, the judge slipped up in putting the puppy over Inferno You Don't Know. In the first place the puppy is in the weight limit only because of his age, whereas the second dog is a genuinely good lightweight to be counted on in

any company. These weight limit classes should be confined to dogs over a year old. In limit, over 30 pounds, Imperator won, with Inferno Buster second. Buster is preserving his clean cut head wonderfully, and promises to be a luster. Of course, we do not like the extreme English type, but that is a fad of ours. Third went to Victor Lavender, grand everywhere, but gone cheeky, and lucky to beat his kennel mate. Open dogs were a repeat, Winners dogs went to Imperator, with reserve to Inferno Buster.

Puppies bitches went to Inferno Firefly, a really good one, with a good body and splendid lean head, and extremely promising. Second to Glenedyth Elfin, with a very clean head, but a little off in front. Junior bitches, novice bitches, limit bitches, all repeats. Limit bitches, over 30 pounds, went to Inferno Queen, second to Princess Nordica, third to Glenedyth Elfin. Open bitches was an extremely bad piece of judging in that Princess Patricia was placed last in the class. To be sure, she showed listlessly, needed to be more closely trimmed and groomed and lacked general fitness, but even then her general type, good body, well-filled-in foreface and downface puts her clear away from the rest. We can only excuse the judge by saying that we think he got her mixed with her sister, Nordica, and placed her aside without careful examination. Anyway, the mistake was a bad one. The first bitch was Inferno Queen. She has a beautifully lean head and well filled in foreface, but her body in size entirely over-balances her head. She was shown hog fat, and is very roached and loose enough in elbow. Second was Princess Nordica. She has a grand body, but is large in eye and pinched in muzzle. Third, Glenedyth Elfin. Canadian-breds were a repeat. Winners went to Inferno Queen, with Nordica reserve.

Smooth Fox Terriers were rather a weak lot outside of the two Sabine dogs and Tillbridge Pegman. Sabine Ringgold is much improved and has lost his excess of shoulder. Sabine Racer, very nice in head and front, just too big. Tillbridge Pegman shows quality, also on the big side. Danby Dragoon, a tan marked one, fails in body. The two Sabines took winners and reserve winners. The bitches were not a good lot, all firsts and winners being withheld.

In Wires the well-known Hawes Broom was alone. He looked extremely well, and completed his championship with this win.

Irish Terriers—Puppies, junior and novice went to Bystander, a bit thick in head. Quarrywood Commander, in better flesh than we have ever seen him before, and lasting splendidly, easily took all firsts and winners, followed by Rory, a good shower, but losing in quality to Commander. In bitches, Walnut Colleen took juniors. Limit, open and winners went to Killarney Belle. This is one we have known for some time, but she was a hidden goldmine, and we never scratched deep enough below the surface to find out her true worth. She always appealed to us as a grand headed one, but she generally carried anywhere from two to six inches of superfluous hair, which entirely hid her beautiful outline. On this occasion, she was trimmed right down, and it was quite evident from the numerous shades of color, and from her neck being entirely devoid of anything but undercoat, that the trimming had been done only a couple of days before the show. Still, we could see the dog, and she was one of the sweetest we have seen for many a day. She is perfectly balanced from end to end, is a beautiful size, inclining to small, is thoroughly Irish and on racy lines, and there is an entire absence of cloddiness anywhere. Given a good coat, which she seems likely to have, and it will be a long time before she will be beaten. Walnut Colleen, second, is a nice size and good color, and good body, bone and coat, but her head is of the Fox Terrier type. She would make a valuable breeding proposition to anyone with a good dog. Second went to Ch. Walmer Straight Flush, with splendid color and coat, good legs and feet, well sprung rib, but too much of a cloddy and heavy type all over. Third Quarrywood Duchess, a bitch on the same lines as the winner, Killarney Belle, but some pounds too big, but a real Irish.

Skye Terriers—Only one, Donard Scott, in splendid coat.

Scottish Terriers—Puppy dogs, Mr. Ellison brought out Avondale Adam, an extremely promising one, with a small dark eye, beautiful body. Second, Roderick, a steel brindle, with a wonderful face, nice eye, well-carried ear, though big enough, little soft in

coat, and a little high up. Junior and novice were repeats. In limit and open, Avondale Ascot won. We have often commented on him and have nothing but praise for him, though we wished he were a little stronger in foreface. Second, Albany Sandy, was a serious mistake. The dog has a strong muzzle, and a short back, but he is out at elbow, short in head and muzzle. Third, Lonach Bonaccord, should have been easily second, good head and eye, short back, good coat.

White West Highlands brought out one, Lonach Lass.

Boston Terriers—Puppies, first, Ingram's Little Map, the cracking little puppy we commented on so favorably at the Boston Terrier Show last month. Second, Hillerest Star. Winners went to Hillerest Totem Boy, looking in splendid shape, too well known to need comment. Winners bitches went to Ashland Pride, another well-known one. Second to Pretty Bessie II. Third, Peggy Quigley.

In Yorkshire Terriers dogs we saw the new importation, Weldon's Toney, a remarkably smart little chap. He has a black terrier eye, and a regular terrier face, with sharp expression. His coat is splendid and he is about the smallest Yorkshire we have ever seen, as he cannot weigh much over two pounds. He lacks a little bit in tan color. In bitches, Edna of Roundhay won easily, being in splendid coat and very strong in tan. She completed her championship at this show. Kitty of Galt, a very fair Yorkshire, loses both in size and color.

In Toy Black and Tan Terriers Mrs. Delaney had her usual team there in grand condition, and won, both dogs and bitches, with Bonnie Boy II. and Rosabelle.

QUEEN CITY KENNEL CLUB EVENING SHOW.

The usual place on Friday, January 16th. The attendance was large, and the dogs well represented. We think these clubs holding evening shows are losing sight of the main issue, namely, their educative value, and there is getting to be too much of a sameness about them. It would be far better if only two or three dogs of each breed competed and a demonstration given by the judge explaining the points of each. We have been flattering ourselves that we have as good judges in Toronto of most of the breeds as there are anywhere. Surely they are com-

petent to demonstrate to a lot of novices the points of the breeds they judge. The first club that undertakes this in a systematic manner will have a crowded house and will win out. It is not necessary to cut down the exhibits to two or three of each breed. The more the merrier, but one or two of the best might be picked out for demonstration. Our breeders are ready enough and competent enough to express their opinions on the dogs to each other. Why not as ready and confident to express them to a gathering of fanciers?

Cockers were judged by Mr. Clark, whom we recognize at once as a brother to a very familiar face, the late Jim Clark, who held the premier position in Cockers a few years ago. He showed a perfect familiarity with the breed and should be heard from again. He was quite a find for the Q.C.K.C. Puppies brought out Mrs. Worthy's Crescent Jennette, improved since the Fat Stock Show, short body, good front, shown in good condition, but has a sour expression. Second, Lothian Phill, big enough for a puppy and wants to be lower to the ground. In dogs, Mrs. Worthy showed her grand stud dog, Brookdale Toby, too big for a show dog, has a good muzzle and a dark eye. Second, Dovercourt Beauty, short body, good legs and feet, but shown fat. In bitches, Babe Obo, a black with a good head, dark eye, short body, little thick in shoulder and wanted feather. She was alone.

Boston Terriers were judged by Mr. Little, and were easily won by Madame Sherry. Second to Nemo's Surprise, beautifully marked, and good expression, a real good one.

In Foxhounds there was one, a good big ten-months-old puppy named Jake.

Whippets brought out the splendid Blue Prince.

English Bulldogs—Dogs, first, Costermonger, shown in splendid condition, and may be described as of the exaggerated type, being low to an extreme, almost too wide in front, magnificent shoulder, plenty of rib, good skull, good ear, very short in face; an ideal stud dog. Second, Iron Chancellor, a top-notch if it were not for his leg-giness. Third, Cheetham Marquis, with his magnificent skull, foreface and underjaw and good bone. He still has to make up in body, and is a little uncertain in one ear. Bitches, first went to Belgrave Lady of Lambare, a su-

perlative bitch at every point, except that she is down-faced, and lacks expression. Second, The Little Diamond, a far more typical little bitch than the former as she possesses "perfect turn-up and width of underjaw, and the grandest of expression, and is good all over; nor does she lack substance, but loses to the winner in size. Third, Cheetham Countess, a beautiful bodied brindle and grand bone, might be better in action and in ears. Goldie, a brindle with splendid rib and body, was unplaced. She is a bit high and not good in ears; but is a grand breeding proposition. In puppy dogs, Pete was first, a massive brindle, grand in substance, and if his head will make up in size, will be one of our best heavyweights. Second to Imperator, hardly a show dog. In puppy bitches Sheila of Lambare was alone. If she grows no more and remains a miniature, she will be a flyer, or if she grows like a weed and puts on substance, she will be a good one, but we are afraid she looks like the half-way mark of a bitch between thirty and thirty-five pounds, which will make her neither "fish, flesh nor good red herring."

TORONTO KENNEL CLUB EVENING SHOW.

This club held one of their usual successful events in Occident Hall, on Tuesday, January 27th. The evening was rather warm, which, unfortunately, made it rather uncomfortable in the crowded room; but everything went off very smoothly.

Boston Terriers were first and the dog class was won by Mr. McQuillan's Clifton Star, a very nice bodied dog, well stationed, and short. He was lucky, however, to beat Hillerest Totem Boy, a dog of better size and more quality. Third went to Marquis, too big and coarse and too much tan marking. In bitches, Madame Sherry was alone, one of our best, beautiful clean head and muzzle, good body, might be a little more compact. They were judged by Mr. Fraser.

Bulldogs were judged by Mr. H. Bailey. Puppies were won by Mr. Farquharson's Pete, grand bone, good body and substance, splendid shoulder, a bit heavy behind. He has fair lay-back and nice shaped head, and good cushion, but his head will have to coarsen and grow very much to properly balance his body, still he has lots

of time. Second, Emperor, has a good head, is a bit high and very long in tail. In dogs, Iron Chancellor was alone, and the more we saw of him the more we regret that we cannot cut about two inches off each of his four legs. Outside of that he is of magnificent type. We consider his skull perfect, being large with great length between eye and ear, splendid expanse of skull, which is flat. In fact, a regular half brick skull. His ears are small and well set. His foreface wide, his layback splendid, his cushion grand. His underjaw good and fairly well turned up. His body is extremely short, his rib well sprung. His tail well set and down, his front wide, his shoulder good. In fact, were it not for his one fault, all the rest of our Bulldogs might go back and sit down. In puppy bitches Sheila of Lambare was first, a beautiful quality little white, of splendid type everywhere. She had no faults but the lack of size, and if she grows to become more than forty pounds will beat anything we have. Second was Rydal Stone Ruby, good in substance, but buttons her ears and wants more turn-up of underjaw. In open bitches, first was Belgrave Lady of Lambare, winner at the N. L. S. Show. She has the most wonderful bone of any bitch we ever saw, is extremely low to ground, big ribbed and perfectly sound. Her skull is good, ears small and well placed, good depth of foreface. Her real fault is that she is very down-faced and lacking in underjaw, which absolutely spoils her expression, and she is a little hollow in the back. She got the special for the best of the breed. Second to her was Rydal Stone Aysha, rather thin in muzzle, and wants bone, has a good skull and roach. Third was Miss Glendenne, gay in tail and bad in ears, and wanting bone, good in rib and roach, would make a good brood bitch.

French Bulldogs, first went to Romeo, second to Emperor Napoleon, two of the same type, both compact and good in body, both too long in the face. Romeo wins on size only.

Cocker Spaniels were judged by Mr. D'Orsay. First in red bitches went to Belmont Fanny, good muzzle, and in good feather, a bit on the large size. Second to Dan, too flat in skull and long in muzzle. Third to Dovecourt Beauty, nice short body, good color, shown fat, or would have been second.

In puppies Lothian Phill, a good red, age will give her a fuller muzzle, her body is short. A good black was shown in Beauty.

Bull Terriers brought out Edgewood Wildfire and Kim, placed in that order, both in grand hard condition. Edgewood Wildfire has been re-cropped, and his ears stand better, though short; both have grand body and bone, but lack quality in head.

MOUNT ROYAL KENNEL CLUB.

The first evening show was held on Jan. 15th in the Riding Academy, Westmount, a clean, high, airy place, extremely well lighted and very comfortable. In short it is an ideal place to hold a show and the management did everything possible to make everybody feel at home, and things ran smoothly. Of course, the judges didn't please everybody. But whoever heard of a dog show where they did? Mr. Jas. Lindsay judged Irish, Airedale and Scottish; Mr. F. E. Stuart judged Fox (rough and smooth) and Bull Terriers; Mr. E. Outhet judged the variety classes. Mr. Harold Hughes (Spratt's Patent) acted in the double capacity of secretary and superintendent, and was ably seconded by Mr. Alwyn Coristine. Messrs. Hanna and Rutley were ring stewards. They thoroughly understand their duties so things went with a swing.

Airedales brought out six dogs in all. In the novice dogs, Julius Caesar first, a big rare colored one, not right in front, might be darker in eye and could be improved in coat. Second, Rokey O'Brien, another good colored one, but coarse. Third, Newbold Revival, a really good youngster, did not make the most of himself, but can top the heap. Open dogs, first, Julius Caesar; 2nd, Rocky O'Brien; 3rd, Colne Express Order. Newbold Revival was left out here. Personally I thought it was between the two latter for 1st and 2nd places, and Julius Caesar 3rd. However, what's the use? It wasn't our think that counted and Mr. Lindsay must have had his reasons as he went over the dogs carefully. In bitches, Nebold Debutante won from She is My Daisy. The former a very sweet bitch, will bear watching. The latter quite a nice useful sort.

In Bull Terriers, Calumet Boy, same owners, Calumet Rosaline, want time,

and cropping will improve them.

Irish Terriers—In dogs, Kinkora Barney won, a game showy terrier, but hardly "Irish" enough. Danny Bedad second, could be made look better, particularly in feet. In bitches, Drumclaph Brenda won, a good headed and coated bitch, could be better in eye. Molly Bedad, a good fair third.

Scottish Terriers—Beecher's Brook, one of the real low cloddy kind, won, and was in better coat than we ever saw him. Second to Avondale Alert, a real smart Terrier and put down fit, but has not the substance of first. Novice bitches—Drumclaph Jean, first, is a better size and shorter in back than Mr. Patterson's Jess, otherwise a very useful bitch. Open—York Scotch Highball, first, same owners, Good little Drumclaph Judy second, and Jess third.

White West Highlands—only one entry was shown, entirely in "the rough."

Wire Fox Terrier dogs, Mr. Stanford's Clockwork is a nice headed youngster, with good shoulders, legs and feet. Looks like making into a good one. Mr. A. Hawker's Dandy, a tan marked one, a well-balanced little chap and sound at both ends, grooming would improve him greatly. Third, Jack. Reserve, Teddy.

Wire bitches, Mr. Leithhead's Tess won, a Donington-bred one and looks the part. Second to Drumclaph Wasp, loaded in shoulders, otherwise a real nice terrier.

In Smooth Fox Terrier dogs the winner turned up in Mr. J. D. Kippen's Belvoir Nipper, a very nice terrier and a grand shower, shows a lot of quality. Second, Fireworks, on the large side, should be a good stud dog. Third, Rip Van Winkle, close up. In bitches Mr. Stanford won with Shira, a rare hard-coated one. Busy Bee second. It must have been close between these two. Kate, third, just fair.

NEWS AND NOTES FROM ENGLAND

Mr. McNaughten, of Canada, has imported from Mrs. Williams, of Aberdeen, that good little black Pomeranian dog, Little Homebide, which should do well for Canadian lovers of the breed.

On the 24th of January, Mr. Thomson has again returned to Canada with a very strong collection of dogs of several breeds. While in Glasgow, on a visit to the Old Country, Mr. Thomson sent to Calgary a brace of Pomeranians, an Airedale bitch in whelp and a couple of Dandie-Dimmonds.

Mr. D. C. Sampson, of Calgary, has purchased the blue Great Dane bitch, Figaro Star. I understand that Messrs. Thompson and Sampson have just started a Great Dane Club in Canada, and, as a Great Dane specialist of long standing, I shall always be very pleased to help those two gentlemen in their undertaking.

A month or so ago, our great daily, the Daily Telegraph, published some very important notes on the kennel legislation, which should be of great interest to your readers. Several features of interest, thus begins the above paper, invested the annual dinner of the Kennel Club with unusual importance this year, principal among which were the pronouncements of the chairman, Mr. J. Sidney Turner, and Mr. Mark Beaufoy, on the question that is occupying so much attention at the moment—that of universal registration. Every extension of the registration rule has met with opposition, and it was not to be expected that that of recent date would escape the fate of its predecessors. The pity of it is that the subject should not be debated in a Socratic spirit, without the introduction of extraneous matters, many of which will not bear analysis. Whether or no, dogs exhibited at sanctioned shows should come within the scope of the rule is a matter for legitimate discussion, concerning intimately not the largest, but a certain section of the exhibiting public. Mr. Turner made out a strong case in favor of the rule. Without such a rule it is difficult to put down some of the abuses that are known to exist; with it these must diminish considerably, if they do not disappear entirely.

Then comes a consideration of the fee imposed for this work. To hear the way some people speak, one might imagine the members of the club a generation of parasitical bloodsuckers, enriching themselves at the expense of the community, instead of being, as Mr. Beaufoy happily put it, plain, hard-working men seeking to do their best for exhibitors as a whole. In the old days, with a fee of one shilling, the club was constantly on the verge of insolvency, and if legal proceedings had been entered against it in connection with any of its decisions, arrived at in the interests of the public, the committee would have been responsible for the expenses, no fund existing which could be drawn upon. Now comes the question of the public interest. Obviously, this position was intolerable, and it cannot for a moment be thought that the dog-showing public would be mean enough to expect the performance of certain duties without being willing to meet the obligations. Those who went closely into matters saw clearly that the more registrations increased in numbers the greater would be the loss. Some critics took the philosophic view of the old street vendor, who lost on oranges sold, but made it up on the quantity. It cannot be too widely understood that, unlike some businesses, the more registrations that have to be handled the higher the proportionate cost, because the trouble of searching the books is so much the heavier. Twenty-five thousand per annum cannot be dealt with at five times the expense of 5,000. Under the present fees a sound reserve fund is being established entirely on behalf of the administrative side of the club; the social side will not benefit in the slightest. That is altogether distinct from the other, except in the question of apportioning certain expenses which are in a sense mixed up together. Heating, lighting, attendance, rent, and rates have to be divided up as equitably and in as due proportion to the services enjoyed by the two departments as it is possible.

Undoubtedly a certain saving could be effected on the score of rent if the offices were removed into a back street in another neighborhood, but the divorce would be attended by many in-

conveniences, and the economy would not suffice to bring about any reduction of charges. Supposing, for the sake of argument, that £200 could be saved, this would work out at less than 2d per registration. On the other hand, one is disposed to contend that the offices of such a body should be at a decent address, and it is doubtful if the same attention could be given to the official business if the two departments were separated. Questions are continually cropping up needing the advice of the chairman or some member of the committee, and, with the social department under the same roof, it usually happens that some one is about when wanted.

Workers or Sybarites? With every desire in the world to make smooth the path of the workingman exhibitor, one may be excused for pointing out the benefits he derives from a strong kennel government. But for the legislation directed towards the extermination of abuses, it is a practical certainty that dog-showing would never be enjoying a tenth of its present popularity among the wealthier classes, who constitute the market for the poorer man's dogs. The Kennel Club has been the best friend the straightforward workingman ever had, and the impost of half-a-crown for registration is far from being unproductive. A dog, itself registered from registered parents, is infinitely more salable than one about whose lineage there is much dubity. Those who hope to turn an honest penny by the sale of their dogs, have everything to lose and nothing to gain by any weakening of the club's influence, and the attempts to discredit members by suggesting that public funds are being used for private ends are not praiseworthy controversial methods. Either the critics who take this attitude do not know what they are talking about or they are deliberately endeavoring to mislead. It must be one or the other. Is there any other club in London that gives its members so little for a five-guinea subscription? The writer has never seen one yet, and he has been in many. One general room, and a luncheon-room capable of seating sixteen at a push, is all they get in their "palatial" new premises at 84 Piccadilly. As it happens, mem-

bers are perfectly content with this good fellowship being more to them than luxurious surroundings, and they may well be amused at the fanciful pictures drawn of the supposed cost of keeping up such an establishment.

The Kennel Club has just made an arrangement with the Olympia, London, to hold their shows there for a number of years, and beginning with this year the Kennel Club Show will take place in December, instead of in October, as heretofore. This change of date was principally brought about by the fact that in December there would be more entries in the gun-dog section (especially Pointers and Setters) than in October, when most of our working Pointers and Setters are at work on the moors.

Ch. Majestic, dam of Ch. Killarney Christmas Bells, has just been bred to the international champion, Kootenai Chinook. All these Airedales won their titles in Canada, Chinook being also an American champion, the first American-bred Airedale to win the dual title. He is a favorite with Canadian Airedale breeders, whose judgment in his favor is well grounded, his progeny including many of the best young Airedales in Western Canada. The latest bitch to be sent to Chinook is Connell Queen, the winning bitch at Calgary, under Judge Mortimer. Grizzly Alert, a famous hunter, and dam of bear dogs, was bred, in October, to the famous old Elrue Monarch, also owned by the Kootenai Kennels.

Mrs. Thornton Sharp, the enthusiastic Wire-haired Fox Terrier exhibitor, and once the owner of some rattling good Bull Terriers, has purchased from Miss Lewis, of Paignton Kennels, Devon, Eng., the well-known Wire-hair, Receipt of Paignton, who won at Fox Terrier Club show, Paignton, Ladies' Kennel Club Association, Bristol, under Messrs. Glynn, Morton, Desmond, O'Connell, and others, before leaving England. Receipt combines the strains of Sylvan Result, Comedian of Notts and Donington Venture. He has an extra good head and muzzle, neck, shoulders, legs, feet and coat, with Donington Venture's Terrier character. Receipt will be benched for the first time since crossing the pond at Terminal City Kennel Club show next April 9 and 10, in Vancouver, B.C.

WINNIPEG NOTES

We sincerely regret to announce the passing away of one of the finest sportsmen that we ever had the pleasure of meeting. We refer to the late Mr. Thomas Johnson, who died at the family residence, 3 Academy Road, Crescentwood, Winnipeg, on Wednesday, Jan. 7th.

In the death of Mr. Johnson, Winnipeg loses a prominent citizen, and the world of sport one of the most generous, honest, whole-hearted patrons that ever lived.

Mr. Johnson was in his 64th year, and was a resident of Winnipeg for over thirty years. He was a native of England, and came to Western Canada in 1882, and soon after his arrival was employed as traveller with Messrs. G. F. and J. Galt, and in later years was manager for them, continuing with the firm until 1910.

Mr. Johnson participated actively in the formation of the Commercial Travellers' Association in Winnipeg in 1885-6, being a charter member when it was secured in 1887, and in the following year was elected its second vice-president.

Horse-racing, baseball, shooting and curling claimed his attention, but he was best known as a dog breeder, fancier and expert. His dogs always taking a high standing at dog meets and field trials. Mr. Johnson was the only man who has bred and trained a Pointer to win an international trophy known as the "American Blue Ribbon," and he was frequently in demand at dog meets and field trials as a judge, especially in the classes of Pointers and Setters. Indeed, in some of the Southern States he was known by the cognomen of "Judge" Johnson, and in this branch of sport was widely known.

As a sportsman he was favorably known in other respects than those mentioned, and had a fine shooting lodge at Lake Manitoba, where he frequently entertained his friends, some of them coming from as far as the Gulf of Mexico, and among whom he had the reputation of being one of the finest entertainers on the continent.

He had suffered with dropsy for about two years, but would not give up until a year ago it became necessary that he should go to Hot Springs, Ark. Not benefitting by this, however, he turned to Winnipeg, and has been under medical treatment since.

As a writer in "Field and Stream" he held a high position, and as an authority on bird and dog life we fear that it will be many years before his equal will be seen in Canada.

For thirty years the name of Thomas Johnson has been prominently before Canadian and American sportsmen in connection with his field trial Setters and Pointers, which were largely bred from the best English working strains imported by himself. He realized his highest ambition, when, about three years ago, he won the national championship field trials at Grand Junction, Tenn., with the Pointer, Manitoba Rap, probably the greatest bird-dog known on this continent for the last quarter of a century. Mr. Johnson was later persuaded to sell Manitoba Rap to an American sportsman, Mr. Thomas Peace, for what was stated at the time to be the highest figure ever given for a field trial dog in Canada.

In the heyday of his success Manitoba Rap's fame was the theme of two continents; his portrait was painted in oils and publicly displayed in the windows of Winnipeg stores, and his owner congratulated on all sides for the manner in which he had persevered for years in order to breed a field trial dog that could hold its own with the best dogs in the United States.

Manitoba Rap was followed by Manitoba Frank, who as a puppy bid fair to even eclipse the performances of the great Rap, but was unfortunately cut off in his early prime, after winning several good stakes and showing great form in the field.

Mr. Johnson's first fancy was for Setters, and two of his best were Manitoba Blythe and Manitoba Beau, but his later successes were all achieved with Pointers, of which he maintained a magnificent kennel. Another good dog that was running in Mr. Johnson's name before he retired from active participation in the sport was Manitoba Glean.

Although comparisons are supposed to be odious, we cannot refrain at this point from mentioning that we heartily wish that some of our present dog fanciers would emulate the examples of true sportsmanship shown by Mr. Johnson, as we greatly fear that comparisons (if drawn) would scarcely be favorable to them.

Dame Rumor has been busy in Winnipeg of late, and we hear whisperings of a dark horse in the shape of an Airedale Terrier which is to make its debut at the W. C. K. C. show. We are always pleased to hear of a good one, irrespective of breed (for we love them all) and we wish the debutante every success.

We experienced an unexpected pleasure a few days ago (and the pleasure was greater, being unexpected) in meeting Mr. A. M. Belcher, a resident of Winnipeg. Mr. Belcher is the owner of the finest brace of Field Spaniels that we have seen for a number of years. Bred in the famous kennels of Messrs. Taylor and Swann, England, and imported direct by Mr. Belcher, this brace should make history in the Dominion.

The dog, Sir Ebony, two years old, is by Ch. Carnfield King, ex. Normanton Surprise, and we understand has not yet been shown. The bitch, well known in the Old Country as Long Lady, having been a winner at several shows, including Carnarvon and Bangor, has been re-named by Mr. Belcher and is to be known in future as Lady Ebony. She is three years old, sired by Ch. Brownhill King, ex. Ch. Ynysowen Iris. She is full sister to Ch. Carnfield Queen, generally conceded to be the best of her breed in England.

Mr. Belcher intends showing this brace in Winnipeg, and we have not the slightest hesitation in stating that by the time this goes to press, we believe that he will be the happy possessor of some jewelry in the shape of specials won by this brace, in addition to a bunch of ribbons.

We take this means of extending our deepest sympathy to Mr. and Mrs. S. C. Taylor, of Winnipeg, in the death of their Boston Terrier bitch, The Belle of Winchester, (14195). She was a bitch of exceptional quality, having won her blue in hot competition in the Eastern States, quality of which we regret to admit we see too little in this western country.

Visiting these kennels about two weeks ago, we missed this handsome bitch, and on enquiring about her, Mrs. Taylor, with tears in her eyes, informed us of her death. All our efforts at condolence were in vain, Mrs. Taylor declaring that it was a loss which could never be replaced. S. C. himself, although feeling the loss keenly, takes a more philosophical view of the mat-

ter, and, while admitting that they have lost the finest bitch they ever owned, considers it an incentive to go forward, and has adopted that grand old motto, "Nil Desperandum." If the good wishes of all true fanciers are of any assistance, we assure S. C. that he has them.

Since the formation of an advisory board for the C. K. C. in Manitoba doggy men in Winnipeg generally are more than delighted at the sudden change of affairs and as a proof of this one has but to listen when travelling around when the opinion is freely expressed that this thing is a step in the right direction. It is to be fervently hoped that the gentlemen who have been elected on the board will make it their business to see that things are conducted in a thoroughly straightforward manner, and that by so doing gain the entire confidence and respect of all true lovers of the dog throughout the Dominion. There is no reason why Winnipeg cannot stage the very largest dog shows in Canada, situated, as she is in the very centre and with the C. K. C. right in line again, I would suggest that each and every fancier should unite and help to make the thing an accomplished fact. There is no denying that Winnipeg has some of the finest dogs of their respective breeds on the continent; then why not invite all comers to come forward and make the competition the very hottest possible? A win under such conditions is worth something. Under the present system there is very little glory attached to it.

Mr. Bobby Thompson, of Calgary, is having a high old time in his homeland, between judging, piloting winners innumerable and picking up some plums at different dog shows for his numerous clients up west. It strikes me that he will be glad to get back to the Golden West, which, I expect, he will be by this time. Than Bob Thompson no bigger or better sportsman ever graced the inside of a dog show building, and before I forget I want to say that he has few equals as an all-round judge of dogs in this country to-day. What about Village & St. John, a partnership that held such a strong hand in Fox Terriers in this city but a short time ago? For the stake of the fancy we hope that they have not given up the show game in despair. Men who have owned such top-notchers as Ch. Madison Monarch, Madison Magnet and Ch. Arabella are

surely not so easily beaten off. We will not classify you as come-backs, but go forwards and don't forget it.

LONDON FANCIERS ARRANGE DOG SHOW.

Decide to Stage Exhibition During February—Will Offer Two Trophies.

London is to have a dog show, probably the first week in February. This was decided at a well-attended meeting of the London Canine Association in the Western Fair offices on Tuesday evening, the 13th. It was also decided to offer two trophies for competition among members of the association only—one trophy to be competed for by dogs in the sporting classes, and the other by dogs in the non-sporting classes. It was not decided what form the trophies would take, but it is likely that they will be silver loving cups, to be won three years in succession before becoming the permanent property of the winner.

Providing the old city hall building is not leased by the Royal Bank in the meantime, the winter ribbon show will be put on there, the probable date being Feb. 6. A large number of entries are expected, and, judging by the attendance at previous shows, the event will prove a big attraction.

ALBERTA KENNEL CLUB.

At a largely attended meeting of the Alberta Kennel Club, held Monday at the Exhibition offices, Victoria Park, a very pleasing incident was the presentation to E. D. Adams, who recently retired from the presidency of the club, after seven years' service in that capacity, of a silver tea service and tray, suitably engraved. The presentation was made by Mr. A. De B. Winter, the new president, on behalf of the members, and was feelingly acknowledged by the recipient.

The club has decided to have a special meeting on February 16, to debate the question of affiliating with the Dominion Kennel Club or remaining with

the Canadian Kennel Club. There are the two supervisory organizations for kennel affairs in Canada, the D. K. C. having been formed at Winnipeg a year ago with the idea of controlling kennel affairs in Western Canada.

There is a section of the local club in favor of joining with the Winnipeg organization as practically all other clubs in the three Prairie Provinces have done so. Another group is insistent on remaining with the parent club, the C. K. C., as they claim there has been no cause to justify the formation of a second governing body, the chief result of which has been to confuse matters and put breeders to greater trouble and expense than formerly.

The one point on which all are agreed is the desirability of the C. K. C. and D. K. C. forming some sort of amicable working arrangement so that the ordinary fancier and breeder will not suffer by reason of the desire of different groups to control.

Beginning March 9, regular monthly meetings will be held on the second Monday of the month. Dogs will be on exhibition and judged at each meeting. The breeds chosen for the March 9 meeting are Spaniels (all varieties except Cocker), Setters, Pointers and Retrievers. These will be judged by Mr. Thomas.

THOS. MOORE'S LOSS.

A fire which banished for ever from show benches the best Wire-hair Fox Terrier America has seen, occurred recently at the rear of Thomas Moore's house, 44 Bellingham Road, Outremont.

The famous Donington Kennels, with 30 dogs, were burned out, only three puppies crawling out to safety. Bloom, which American authorities admitted would win in her class at New York next month, was among the thirty victims, and so was Donington Patch, another celebrity. The total loss is placed at about \$8,000.

"Breed again? Never," said Thos. Moore to a Star reporter this morning. "These dogs I bred were the result of over 40 years' breeding. I am 75 years old now and it is too long a leeway to make up."

"I had just finished dressing up Donington Bloom for the New York entries. The greatest American authority, Jas. Mortimer, who judged at Toronto last year, told me that if Bloom went to New York she would beat all America."

"It was Bloom that I tried to save when I first saw the fire. I rushed in and opened the inner door, but was knocked down by the gust of smoke and flames. I couldn't even lay hands on her. That is the last of the Donington breed. They beat everything in their class, bred on this side of the water, both in Chicago, New York and other centres. So far as I am concerned that is the end."

Mr. Moore told the representative of the Star of the origin of the Donington Wire-haired Foxes.

"I won with a Wire-haired Fox at Crystal Palace in 1865, and when I came to Canada in 1880 I brought two dogs with me, one I got from George Welch, of Donington Castle, was called Bristles, and the dog I called Donington Bristles. That was the first of the breed. Last night was the end."

For the past two years this breed of Wire-haired won in the West. They are owned by H. B. Sims, Moose Jaw, Sas., who purchased from Moore.

Mr. Moore has no idea how the fire started.—The Montreal Star.

Weldon's Toney, their beautiful little dog, also contracted pneumonia, but we understand that he is pulling through.

Mr. Bert Finch, of Edmonton, is importing two good Bull bitches from Mr. Clifford, of Coventry, England, and with Mr. Cowan, of Winnipeg, is purchasing one of our best stud dogs.

Mr. E. Bailey's good puppy, Sabine Radical, has been having a hard bout with distemper, but we are glad to say she is pulling around.
