

NOTES AND COMMENTS

We have hinted more than once that a kennel club was in process of formation in Oakville, and now the desired end has been accomplished. Mr. Donald McKellar is the president of the Club, and that keen Bulldog enthusiast, Mr. R. Scott Wilson, sits at the receipt of custom.

The Club started out with a membership of twenty, and it is proposed to hold a general show in connection with the Oakville Annual Fall Fair, which makes such a pleasant regular holiday for so many Toronto and Hamilton people.

With the advent of these numerous kennel clubs, the interest in dogs, and dog shows and breeding, cannot help but rapidly increase, and Oakville is ideally situated for the holding of a show.

Mr. Fred Blake, of Almonte writes us as follows:

"As you ask for notes of interest through the Gazette, I would like to ask if you ever heard tell of a bitch disowning her puppies. A friend of mine here has a bitch, and she dropped six puppies last week and she refused to nurse them, and of course they all died. When we put them up beside her she would pick them up in her mouth and throw them to one side. She wouldn't have them near her. She has had several litters before, and was always very attentive. Are cases of this kind rare? There surely must be a cause for it."

Cases of this kind are more numerous than is generally supposed. It is hard to account for them. Bitches when due to whelp should be allowed, if possible, to choose their own place for whelping, and should not be disturbed more than necessary. It is a time of extreme nervous excitement with some matrons, and this will sometimes lead to disturbance which proves fatal. If the dam will not naturally take her puppies, they should be removed from her to a warm place by a fire, and returned one by one after the mother has quieted down. Only experience will tell what should be done.

Mr. Dan. Thody, formerly of St. Thomas, Ont., now of Edmonton, Alta., is preparing a big bunch for competition at the Vancouver and Victoria shows. We are glad to know this, as without question British Columbia can greatly help the Prairie Dog Shows, and in no less measure can the Prairie provinces assist the shows on the Pacific Coast. An inter-provincial exchange of courtesies in this way will do much to engender a friendly feeling, and in time Winnipeg will doubtless be the great trying out point for east, west and centre.

Just while we think of it, let us say that in addition to our regular list, every exhibitor at the Westminster Show, New York, will receive a copy of this issue of Canadian Kennel Gazette.

The London Standard of recent issue contains a most interesting article on the origin of the dog, as reporting a lecture by Prof. W. Bateson, delivered at the Royal Institute.

The subject of Prof. Bateson's lecture was "Animals and Plants under Domestication," and referring to the dog he said:

"It was undoubtedly one of the earliest animals to be domesticated," said Professor Bateson. "The point is, what was it before it was domesticated, and how did it become domesticated? A very probable theory to answer the latter question is that it became domesticated by hanging about man for leavings and scraps, attaching itself to particular groups of nomads, and ultimately losing its liberty as a wild animal. But when you ask what sort of an animal it was at first, whether wolf or jackal, or some kindred creature, you find yourself faced with practically blank ignorance. As far as history goes back, man has always had his dog. In ancient Egypt and Assyria they had hunting dogs, watch dogs, pet dogs, mastiffs, dachshunde, greyhounds"—and the professor threw on the screen pictures of dogs which were pets in 600 B.C.

The wolf or the jackal were the most probable stocks from which dogs may have sprung, said the lecturer. The fox could be ruled out of the question altogether. The bones of the ear were entirely different from those of the dog, and an instance of a cross between a dog and a fox had never been recorded. Until last year there had never been any example of a cross between a rabbit and a hare, but recently successful experiments had been made to this purpose, and the results were being awaited with keen interest. Investigators were faced with the same difficulties in regard to the cat. Unlike the dog, the cat was not known in the ancient classical world, but existed, of course, in ancient Egypt as a sacred animal.

Professor Bateson pointed out that the domestication of animals was the source of a great part of man's power. With the aid of the horse he could move swiftly and carry out heavy work. By domesticating wheat, man obtained the power of living in cities. Until wheat was developed to produce human food in large quantities it was impossible for considerable bodies of people to occupy one comparatively small area of ground. This differentiation and development of types along certain utilitarian lines had given us our control over Nature. In importance the invention of wheat was at least comparable with the invention of iron.

This is a very old subject and one that has many times been hotly debated. Some twenty or twenty-five years ago, the Stock-Keeper, which, unlike most of the kennel papers of to-day, was more than a mere gatherer of news items, had a most interesting controversy on the origin of the dog and the attempted crossing of the dog with other animals.

We may at once dismiss the fox as an ancestor of "man's best

friend." Time and time again have experiments been made attempting to produce a hybrid between dog and fox, but none has ever been recorded. We do not say absolutely that it is impossible, and if we ever have time and accommodation to carry out systematic experiments, we shall try a plan we have had in mind for some years, the rearing of the young of the fox on the canine mother, and vice versa, leading to a familiarity that might produce the desired result.

The production of hybrids of any kind has always been of great interest to us, and many feathered hybrids, including those between different species of cage birds, Pheasant and fowl, etc., have passed through our hands.

That the wolf is more than second cousin to the dog cannot be controverted. We have ample evidence of it in our north land, and even in the Toronto Zoo, some four or five years ago, were cross breds between wolf and dog, in fact there may be some there yet.

A correspondent in Calgary tells us that the Alberta Kennel Club have decided to cast their fortunes with the Western governing body, and that the next show in Calgary will be held under Dominion Kennel Club rules. If we are not mistaken, this gives the Dominion Kennel Club an unbroken field in the three Prairie Provinces. Last year the decision was given on a seven to six vote, but this time, we understand, the turnover won by eleven to five.

Mr. B. Finch, of Edmonton, hopes to leave New York for the Old Country on March 26th, to remain for about six months. Of course the Gazette follows him.

WITH THE SHOWS. The second of the series of evening shows, given under the auspices of the Mount Royal Kennel Club, Montreal, was a success in every way, barring the attendance. The extreme cold militated against the presence of a large number of those interested directly or indirectly in dogs.

The cup for the best sporting dog was won by Mr. J. C. Hanna's now famous Irish Setter, Ch. Ruminantly Rhu, while Mrs. Gruenwald's no less famous Pom., Sir Bruce, took the cup for best Toy. The variety class included Scottish Terriers, and Mrs. Bob. Ross' York Scotch Highball was winner here.

Report of the show appears elsewhere in this issue.

London is evidently coming to its own in the dog world, and we look with confidence to a regular mid-winter show before another year has gone by.

Last month a very successful one-day open show was held under the auspices of the London Canine Association, of which Dr. E. Palmer Smith is secretary. The show was held in the Town

Hall, and the attendance was all that could be wished for. There were a number of outside dogs, from St. Thomas, Strathroy, Ridgetown and other points, so that the show took on the aspect of rather more than the usual one-day local show.

That well known sportsman, Mr. Marshall Graydon, judged the Setters. Mr. C. H. Waters, of St. Thomas, Pointers and Poodles. It looked good to see our old friend Geo. Douglas back in the Cocker ring, and Mr. McCarroll judged the remaining classes. A report of the show appears elsewhere.

Next we have an evening show in the pretty and growing town of Oakville, that lies along the lake shore between Toronto and Hamilton.

About twenty dogs were present in McPherson's Hall. The show being held on February 20th. Mr. Donald McKellar, the Scottie breeder, judged all classes.

With reasonably good train service there is no reason in the world why Toronto fanciers should not compete at Oakville; and Hamilton breeders have a trolley service right to their doors from Oakville. Report is printed elsewhere in this issue.

COLLIEDOM. A meeting of the newly formed Dominion Collie Club was held in the Industrial Bureau, with President Tom Milner in the chair. Secretary Phil Walker submitted the minutes of the previous meeting, which were adopted, after a strong recommendation by Joe Guarnera to the effect that a photo of Ch. Anfield Model appear on the cover of the constitution of the club.

The president addressed the club with a view to having a Collie specialist judge the breed at the Winnipeg Industrial Show in July. G. H. Lavender addressed the meeting and voiced the general opinion of those present when he stated that no man could judge all breeds and satisfy all that they had had a "fair run for their money."

At the invitation of the chairman, the Collie Club members named a few judges who they thought were capable of giving a decision "without fear or favor" to the best dog on his merits in the ring. The names included those of Dr. Ford, Dr. Daws, Dr. Jarrett, James Watson and R. McEwen, and it was decided to approach Dr. A. W. Bell with a delegation from the Dominion Collie Club, requesting him to appoint a Collie specialist as judge of the breed at the Canadian Industrial Exhibition next July.

After a protracted discussion on the conditions governing the Collie puppy stakes, the meeting was adjourned.

The meeting reported above was a most enthusiastic one, and we hope that our weighty friend, Dr. A. W. Bell, may be able to accede to the wishes of the Western Collie men in giving them a specialist judge for the breed. This would not be so difficult or so expensive as might be supposed, as many, if not all of the gentlemen named are specialists in other breeds also. We are assured that if some well known Collie judge is appointed that he will get the best entry ever turned out in the West.

Mr. Robert Thompson, who has been visiting the Old Country, has returned to Canada with four Collies, two of either sex. These include Carnegie Park and Bellfield Benedict.

The Weston Collie Kennels have sold to Mr. J. Rea that good bitch, Weston Riverview Quality. This bitch, as a puppy under Mr. Coates, went from puppy class to winners at Winnipeg in 1912.

Mr. Rea is a newcomer, but has already registered the prefix Kildonan, and in Riverview Quality has made a good start, for besides being a winner herself, she has produced some good ones in Riverview Masterpiece and Weston Admiration.

We are asked to say that the address of the Secretary of the Dominion Collie Club is Mr. Phil Walker, 254 Magnus Ave., Winnipeg, Man.

SETTERS AND POINTERS.

We are informed that at a recent meeting of the Alberta Kennel

Club it was decided to hold field trials near Calgary in August or September next for Setters and Pointers, and possibly for Retrievers. There will be three stakes—puppy stakes for dogs whelped after January 1, 1913; an all-aged stake, open to dogs of any age; and a shooting dog stake. This latter stake will probably be for dogs which have never won any prize in any field trial, and professional handlers will be barred.

It is possible that the Edmonton, Lethbridge and Medicine Hat Kennel Clubs may also hold similar field trials in their districts this summer, and if these are held the Alberta Kennel Club feel that their success will be such that next year one big field trial under the auspices of all kennel clubs in America will be held.

These field trials will, of course, prove of great interest to all those interested in shooting dogs.

Mr. A. de B. Winter, of Calgary, has been honored by being re-elected a member of the Board of Governors of the English Setter Club of Philadelphia.

A rather curious case occurred recently in Portland, Oregon-An Irish Setter bitch was bought by Mr. Eugene Simpson, of Portland, at Nanaimo, B.C., and while en route gave birth to six puppies. The whole shipment was held up at Seattle, as the customs requirements, which are very strict, gave permission for the entry of but one dog. We have not heard the outcome, but no doubt it was satisfactorily arranged.

Mrs. E. Alban Sturdee, of St. John, N.B., is to be congratulated on the win of her Irish Setter, Richwoods Boy, at New York. Richwoods Boy is known to us in Canada as Corry Law. Corry Law won first limit, first open and winners. Mr. J. C. Hanna, of Montreal, cleaning up the bitch classes with his great brace, Ch. Rhuminently Rhu, who went through to winners, and his Toronto purchase, Nora Law, taking reserve winners.

Dr. C. Johnson, of Winnipeg, has sold his Pointer Dog, Kumsack's King, to Mr. Ed. Chevrier, of Winnipeg. Mr. Chevrier has got an excellent Pointer in King, and one with highest breeding.

By the way, Dr. Johnson's other Pointer, Yuma's Tonti, has just completed his championship at Brandon, and we congratulate the owner of what is considered the best Pointer in Canada. He is well built and has ample bone for his size. In fact, he is a perfectly proportioned dog, and excels in symmetry.

The Irish Setter bitch, Pixie Law, C.K.C. 13673, by Ch. Pat Law, ex. Ch. Holly of Culbertson, whelped October 13th, 1912, died from the after effects of distemper on February 24th, the same day that her full brother, Corry Law, took winners at the New York Show.

If all goes well there will be some good young Pointers for the western autumn shows, for Dr. C. E. Johnson reports two big litters. Both are by his famous stud dog Yuma's Tonti. One litter of ten were whelped on January 3rd, another of eight came in February.

Mr. Kobold, of Winnipeg, has a fine litter of Pointer puppies that he is offering for sale in this issue. They will go quickly.

That grand Pointer, Ch. Prince Cash, is offered at stud as is the English Setter, Ch. Ringo. Both these dogs are both field and bench winners.

TERRIERS. Mr. Fred Blake, of Almonte, is the possessor of a very fine Airedale bitch out of Ch. Culmington Nettle, by Freeman Terror, who presented him recently with a fine litter of eight, of which six are dogs. They are of excellent color, jet black with rich tan markings.

Messrs. Quilley Bros., of Edmonton, the Irish Terrier enthusiasts, have a grand litter by Crowgill Tim, out of that splendid bitch, Woodland Biddy. They were four weeks old on the first of March, and already show that keen, dare-devil expression typical of the Paddy. All have good heads and strong bone. Quilley Bros. had a very tempting offer for the pick of the litter, but refused to entertain any sales for the present.

Mr. Dan. Thody, who is now living in Edmonton, has a litter of three from the American Bull Terrier bitch Queen, a winner at Chicago and Cleveland. Rather curiously, the puppies came at St. Paul, Minn., during the bitch's trip to Edmonton. All arrived in perfect safety. This bitch is now in the hands of Mr. Clute, who is purchasing Ch. Millionaire, and has just finished a nice row of Kennels. Mr. Clute has now around a half a dozen of American Bull Terriers.

Baillie Dalgleish, of Scotland, has shipped a brace of Airedales to a well known fancier in Edmonton that will, it is expected, take some beating when they arrive. We are promised full details later.

Mr. E. W. Mermagen, Winnipeg, has now three excellent stud Irish Terriers, all bred in the purple. He is greatly pleased with the recently imported Seven Oaks Playboy, who is giving a good account of himself. The grandsire of one of his dogs is Tipperary Tyke, another is Belfast Rufus, and the third is a son of Crow Gill Shamus. The ladies of the kennel include Ch. Seven Oaks Playbox, a daughter of Ch. Paymaster, and two of her get by Crow Gill Shaun.

We asked Mr. Jno. F. Campbell, Montreal's critic of the breed, to give us a report of the Black and Tan Terriers at New York. The Hon. Jno. says there were none worth reporting on, and he should know.

The services of that famous English champion Scottish Terrier, Babton Blacksmith, are now offered breeders by Mr. Morris, Toronto, at a moderate fee considering the quality of the dog and the opportunities that he is likely to have in Canada. Babton Blacksmith is one of the best Scottish Terriers living of sturdy type and most typical in every way.

Mr. Morris is also offering some good young bitches of best breeding, with free service to Babton Blacksmith. They should be picked up quickly.

Mr. W. Ollard, of Tacoma, Wash., is a claimant for some of the Irish Terrier business, especially that that is to be picked up at the Coast and in the Western parts.

It may be of interest to Gazette readers to know that another Irish Terrier dog, Coast Native Son, that was advertised in Gazette by Mr. Ollard, was sold by wire to the Viking Kennels of Newburg, N.Y. On receiving the dog, Mr. Larsen, of the Viking Kennels, wrote Mr. Ollard as follows:

"I hope you will pardon my not having written you before about Coast Native Son. He arrived here Friday afternoon, the 9th inst., in apparent good shape. He was getting on fine, so last Sunday we took him for a run. He felt fine and was very lively and showed off fine, but when we brought him home at night he would not eat. I called in the vet., who stated he had caught a shipping cold. I was worried to death for fear we were going to lose him, but by nursing he pulled through, and is now eating well even to his dry dog cakes.

"Rip (C. N. Son) is all Terrier and a fine one. He has some head and can, we think, take a good chance with Marksman the Irish Terrier of the east. I am delighted with him, and to say he is a game and stylish and typical Terrier in every way is but giving him his due and not at all over-rating him. When he gets in shape he will surely hold his own in the ring, and he certainly can show to advantage.

"He is the Terrier I have been looking for for many months, but I could not find one here. I really like him better than some of the cracks of England I have seen.

"I shall advise you of his doings later on, but he will not be in condition for New York or Boston this year, as his illness brought his weight down.

"Thanking you for this fine Terrier, and also the fine crate you made for his comfort, and hoping some day to do future business with you, and wishing you lots of success."

Mr. J. A. Thurston, of Vancouver, B.C., has just imported the well known Airedale Terrier dog, Bachelor's Boy, from Mr. C. L. Brown, South Reddick, England. Bachelor's Boy was first shown at Manchester Championship Show, where he won as a novice. Next at Blackburn where he won seven firsts and specials, beating several well known Airedales. He also here took a challenge cup for best dog or bitch in the show. At the Royal Lancashire Show he won in all his classes, and in addition the gold medal for best dog or bitch in the show. Next at Southport he won all through, including special for best Airedale dog or bitch.

Bachelor's Boy is in excellent shape and will be shown at all the coming Coast shows.

Mr. Thurston expects some good litters next month for the imported bitch, Preference, dam of Ch. Rebound Oorang, has been bred to a young dog of Mr. McConnell's by Ch. Elruge Monarch out of Ch. Christmas Bells. Escort Jessamine had been bred to Bachelor's Boy and Escort Lady Junior has been bred to the imported dog, Romping Sultan. There surely ought to be some good Airedales out of this bunch.

Ch. Hawes Broom looks natural in the stud ad devoted to him by his owner, Mr. Jos. Perkins, Toronto. We continue to hear good results of Hawes Broom's capacity as a sire of winners.

BULLACITY. Referring to paragraph in Canadian Kennel Gazette of February, mentioning the advertisement of Chinook Kennels of Lethbridge, the following letter from this kennel places rather a different interpretation on the supposedly objectionable paragraph.

"In regard to your editorial remarks in February Gazette, applying to statement contained in our stud advertisement of Chinook Courtenay Coronet, we are under the impression that it is quite in order although we remember that Ch. Argo was placed over Ch. Cheetham Squire at Toronto last March. Reference to our advertisement will show that our claim is that Chinook Courtenay Coronet is the only dog in Canada who defeated Ch. Cheetham Squire at the first time of asking, while we are under the impression that Squire has beaten every other Bulldog out."

The loss of Homewood Jumbo by heart failure, en route from Boston to New York, is one that hits the dog's new owner, Mr. Booth, Toronto, an exceedingly hard crack. Homewood Jumbo was in Mr. Booth's possession but a short time, and he had little opportunity of availing himself of the dog's services. Mr. Booth has the satisfaction of knowing that the inevitable happened, as Mr. Bert Swann, one of the most careful of handlers, has a certificate giving the cause of the dog's death as heart failure, probably due to excitement.

Canadian Bulldog breeders will regret to hear of the death of Mr. J. W. Berrie, certainly the dean of the English Bulldog fancy. The late Mr. Berrie was perpetual President of the Bulldog Club

(Incorporated), and had been acquainted with the breed from, as someone has so aptly stated, "the Bill Sykes stage," to its present state of perfection. For several years Mr. Berrie had been somewhat failing in health, so his death, which came quietly during sleep, was not unexpected. Amongst dogs that he had bred were Old King Cole, Ch. Venim, Ch. Monarch, Ch. Gamester, Blackwall Crib, Ch. Blackberry, etc.

Preliminary notice of the first specialty show of the Bulldog Breeders' Association of Canada is given in this issue of Gazette. Details are not yet ready, but votaries of the breed are promised a rich feast in the coming show to be held in Toronto, Good Friday, April 10th. Mr. H. A. Wilson, 204 Beach Ave., Toronto, will be glad to give, or send, full information to those who ask for it.

Mr. R. Scott Wilson, Oakville, tells us of a wonderful litter of puppies that he has seen, seven dogs and one bitch, sired by his old dog, Woodcote Merry Boy. They are all dark brindles, about fourteen weeks old, and are large for their age. In fact, they looked so good to Mr. Wilson that he could not resist the temptation of buying three of them.

Mr. F. C. Mahan, of Edmonton, has added to his kennel of Bulldogs a new imported stud dog, and a new bitch that will be heard from at the coming shows.

TOY-LAND. Mr. J. B. Chandler, of Montreal, has got together quite an extensive kennel of French Bulldogs, recently purchased from one of the large kennels of the States. These include Babette, Boutons Laurie and Batuse D'Alos.



THE NEW YORK DOG SHOW

America's Foremost Show Again Scores Success - Canada Well Represented at the Gathering of America's Best Canines

The Westminster Kennel Club's 38th annual show, held February 23 to 26, in the New Grand Central Palace, New York, was again the meeting place of the best dogs and canine fanciers in America. The show itself was well up to the usual high standard of this fixture, but the attendance on the whole dropped, due no doubt to the cold, inclement weather. However, no matter how much the public neglected the show the doggy man did not. No one who can help it misses New York. It is the Mecca of enthusiasm. Superintendent Jas. Mortimer had things ready, all ran according to schedule, and the judging was done promptly. Seventeen judging rings on the three floors were used. A large amount of interest was displayed in the variety classes and unclassified specials. In the sporting variety classes Dr. C. R. Stewart's English Setter Arbutus Lady Bird was first. This bitch in her regular classes did not do better than H.C. B. F. Lewis jr.'s. Grey hound Lansdowne Butcher Boy was second, with Mrs. Mathias' Russian Wolfhound third. In the non-sporting Kinnelon Kennels were successful with their O.E. Sheepdog Night Rider, second was the Poodle The Juggler, with the Bulldog, Dreamwold Blunderbuss, third. The Terrier class was won by the W. H. Fox Matford Vic, with the smooth Beau Sabreur Divinity second, and the Bull Terrier Merry Lad third. Glenedyth Kennels of Toronto were reserve here with Glenedyth Imperator. In the toy class the Poms St. Julien, Young Galt Spec and Cairndhu Beauty were placed in the order named.

The champion class, in which champions only are allowed to compete was won by Mrs. Tyler Morse's O.E. Sheepdog Slumber, who afterwards won the special for best in the show from a class of about thirty-five dogs. The W. H. Fox Terrier Vickery Fast Freight was second. Mrs. Morse was also successful in capturing the team and brace specials.

The number of Canadians that visit the New York Show is rapidly increasing every year. Mr. Bert Swann was down with a fair sized string, while Mr. Bamford also attended, handling a few dogs. Besides this we met from Montreal, Mr. Jos. Meehan, Mr. Jno. Campbell, Mr. W. Ormiston Roy, Mr. Jos. Reid, Mr. J. C. Hanna, whose Irish Setters again did well, handled by "Bob" Ross, Mr. and Mrs. Mathias, Miss C. D. McGill, Mrs. Gruenwald, and Mr. and Mrs. Frank Stuart, Mr. R. H. Elliott and Dr. and Mrs. Webster (Ottawa), Mrs. E. Alban Sturdee (St. John's, N.B.), Dr. C. Y. Ford (New York), and from Toronto, Mr. Lance Farewell, who judged Cocker and Field Spaniels, Messrs. T. E. and W. Milburn,

Mr. C. McQuillan, Dr. A. Boultbee, Mr. George Barron, Mr. Roy Nordheimer, whose Bull Terriers were in charge of his kennel man, Fred Smith, Mr. and Mrs. G. F. McFarland, Mr. Jack Webb, Mr. Jno. Moroney, Mr. George Smith, Mr. and Mrs. Dowling, Mr. H. Clayton, Mr. Jno. A. Meadows (Oakville), Col. Robert McEwen (Byron, Ont.), Mr. Mark O'Rourke, and Mr. A. A. Lees, Hamilton, Mrs. Wylie (Vineland).

Bloodhounds mustered five, Otterhounds one and Mastiffs five. These came as a sort of preliminary to the real show, for next came St. Bernards with twenty-nine entries. Mr. Frank Stuart, who is reviewing the classes in detail for us was successful in capturing 1 puppy with Robert the Bruce, 2 puppy with Thanksgiving, 1 novice, reserve American bred, 3 limit, 2 open and reserve winners dogs, with Beethoven and 2 limit and open and reserve winners bitches with Montphosa.

Great Danes were a large showing of real good ones, much improvement can be seen on the type of the present ones benched, this no doubt is due to the recent German importations. Forty-one were entered here, of which Prinz Von Weisenau was awarded winners dogs, and Fawn J. winners bitches. Russian Wolfhounds honored Mr. Hopton with a great showing of forty-five, of which twenty-five were entered by Valley Farm. Mrs. P. F. Mathias' Caerhysddu Elka won 1 limit and 3 open bitches. The winning dog Postiel of Woronzova, a big well built imported one is really a great Wolfhound. Irish Wolfhounds and Scottish Deerhounds were not large classes, but some good ones. Greyhounds mustered nine, Mr. B. F. Lewis, jr., had things all his own way with his excellent kennel. Harriers and Foxhounds, both American and English, were well filled as usual, principally from the packs of the hunt clubs. The judging of the Hounds in packs on the last day of the show by Mr. Will Nicolls, of the Montreal Hunt Club, attracted a lot of interest and was well worth seeing.

Pointers were an excellent entry of about seventy. In dogs Bob White Rifle was the winner, with Rostrevar Rattler reserve. Two distinct types of Pointers were taken by the judge in the winner and reserve winner, second in the open Bob White Pam might have changed places with the winner, shorter in body, though the winner was perhaps a bit better in head. In the under 55 lb. class Rostevar Rattler, one of the long light bodied kind, was first, with Furlough Quail second, an even all-round one, third, Dedman Jeff, a nice Pointer but gay in tail and a bit thick in head. Maxims Dan dropped to V.H.C. in the open, after winning the limit class he could have done better. In bitches the winner was Saucy Queen, lacking in substance, reserve was Mallwyd Maud, a fairly good all-round Pointer.

June L. with third in open, lacks in loin, Ch. Wildacres Victoria second in open bitches under 50 lbs. is a cracking good one that should have done better. Wildacres Gloriana V.H.C., another good one that should have been higher. Midkiff Imperous Maud, the winning novice bitch is a good Pointer with a nice body and head.

English Setters were a smaller entry than last year, Mallwyd Edward, the winning dog deserved all the good things said about him, with substance, body, head and action, he won well. Bob White My Choice was reserve, another good one of substance, failing to the winner in head. Brooklyn Steadfast, owned by Oliver Flett, Toronto, was shown in the novice, but the company was too hot for him. Ch. Wyoming Valley May was returned the winner bitch, a nice headed and better body than the reserve Bob White Lena II. Gordon Setters were fewer than ever and seem to be gradually dropping out.

A nice display of Irish Setters was benched. Here Canada had a field day, Mrs. Sturdee's Richwoods Roy. known in Canada as Corry Law, was returned the winning dog, a nice headed one of good color, reserve was Ch. Muskerry Ten, a nice headed one with good body and ribs. In bitches Mr. J. C. Hanna accounted for winners and reserve winners with Ch. Lansdowne Rhuminantly Rhu and Nora Law placed in this order, Rhue scores in body and shoulders. Moroney and Johnston won second limit and third open with Judge Law, nice in body, legs and feet, failing in head and not fit. Annie Law second in limit and third open is a nice one failing in color and head.


Dachshunde were a large showing of excellent quality. The South Shore Kennels had a fine display of about twenty benched. They were well up in the awards, taking both winners and reserve in bitches. Whippets were a nice show but not a large entry. German sheep dogs were a big showing of about seventy. This useful dog is rapidly growing in favor in the States. Poodles were a nice showing and put down in wonderful coat and condition. Chow Chows are another favorite in the States that we do not see many of in Canada. The quality was of the best at New York. Dalmatians were well represented and had a nice showing. Samoyedes, Boxers, and Doberman Pinschers, all had good classes and were somewhat new to the Canadian visitor.

Beagles were a large showing and good. Mr. T. R. De Geer, Toronto, won with Blythe Bush Bugle, second limit and second open under 13 inches.

Bulldogs were on hand stronger than ever, a wonderful class of one hundred and fourteen dogs entered. Much interest was centred in the Bulldog ring, all the fanciers being eager for the opinion of Captain Beamish, who came from England to judge the breed. Strathroy Prince Albert, last year's winning dog, was again returned the winner. Dreamwold Irish Boy was the reserve winner, he has a wonderful head and muzzle, though not as good in body as the winner, being a little long, Dreamwold Centaur is a dog we like, it has always been a question of which was the better, he or Prince Albert. Centaur has it in body and spring of rib, he also has a good head and face. The winning puppy dog, Fern Lea Marquis, is one that will improve a lot, good head and bone, he wants making up. The novice winner was the second puppy Roselea Saxstone, an excellent headed one. Drewstone Pike, the winner of the American bred, and Newington Merry Lad, the winner of the limit under 45 lbs., are two that deserve mention. The former has great substance and an excellent face, the latter is a nice headed one, good skull but could do with more under-

puppy bitch Trimount Lady went through to winners a symmetrical one but very small. Rockcliffe Beautiful Doll was reserve. Sparkling Jewel dropped to reserve in the open 12 to 17, which, like some of the other awards, came as a surprise.

Sealyham Terriers have become popular in the States, about thirty being benched, Mr. McCandlish who came out from England to judge them upset the prevalent idea of Sealyham type. He went in for crooked fronts and long backs. West Highland White Terriers hold their popularity and came out strong in quality especially. Welsh and Dandie Dinmonts were both represented by fair entries, while Skyes had two lone entries. Bedlingtons and Black and Tans were few. Schipperkes were a nice showing. Poms were as usual a good dis-Mrs. Howorth's kennels were missed from the Canadian side, but a new exhibitor, Jack Webb, of Toronto, was successful in winning third puppy and novice bitches, third limit

jaw. In bitches Dreamwold Juanita was returned the winner, a heavyweight hard to fault, excellent face and skull, good substance, rib and body, reserve was Ch. Crissie Denton, another heavy of high order, a bit finer than the winner. Hedgerowe Patricia was the winning puppy bitch, a cloddy one with a good head. Belgrave Lady of Lambrae, under Bert Swann's care, won the novice, a nice white and brindle, showing a good head and face. Gaby Deslys the winner of the American bred class is a small one of good quality. Limit under 40 lbs. was won by Dreamwold Diadem, a good one, excelling in face. In limit over 40 lbs. Lassicot, a big one, good in body, sound with a good face and skull, was first.

French Bulldogs made a strong showing, and competition was keen in most classes.

Boston Terriers were out stronger than ever in numbers, Trimount Roman being the winning dog, with Tony Ringmaster reserve. The winning bitches, 7 lbs, and under, brown, with Goldmine Midget. Cairndhu Black Spec from Mrs. Wylie's kennels won third novice. Cairndhu Lynda winning second limit dogs and bitches over 7 lbs., and Cairndhu Beauty first novice bitches and first open, 7 lbs. and under. English Toy Spaniels had an entry of twenty-two. In Japanese Spaniels Canada was represented by Miss C. D. McGill's Cio-Cio San, who won first limit, second open and reserve winner bitches.

Pekingese were a big entry, and their popularity was well illustrated by the big classes and the A1 quality. They are attractive little beggars. A few each of Pugs, Toy Poodles, Yorkshire Terriers, Maltese Terriers, Toy Black and Tans, Griffon Bruxellois, Chihuahuas and Italian Greyhounds rounded off the show.

ST. BERNADS AT NEW YORK.

By F. E. Stuart.

It is a good many years since St. Bernard exhibitors at New York have seen the dogs placed as correctly as they were at the show of 1914. Mrs. Lee knows them, and the able manner in which every dog was thoroughly gone over did not fail to draw the admiration of the ring-siders and breeders, some of whom have given up exhibiting altogether owing to the glaring incompetence of some of those who have had the handling of the ribbons during the past few years. Let us hope that this year marks the beginning of a long era of up-to-date judges, unless we get this the breeders gradually lose interest and end by dropping out forever. I overheard an old exhibitor at this show say that "this is more like the good old days when the St. Bernard fanciers were like one family, all pulling for one type and nothing but good fellowship all round." Mrs. Lee knew what she was looking for and she got it in every class, there being only one decision that did not meet with the full endorsation of the St. Bernard colony, this being when Mrs. Crown's grand headed dog Valais Imperator was placed ahead of Mrs. Kemp's Carmen Count, who had the other dog beaten in all save head, and head is so important in these non-sporting dogs that there was method in the award.

The puppy class brought out three, my two, Robert the Bruce and Thanksgiving and Duchess Jr., and were placed in the order named, the latter is a large puppy but failed in color of eye and in muzzle. Novice rough dogs, first Beethoven, from the writer's kennel, second Valais Imperator of the good head but light in bone and body and very straight behind, third White Star Bobbie, a very large framed dog, excellent type, good bone, nice wrinkle, a very poor color (gray and white) spoiled his chances and he was thin; reserve Carmen Count, not pleasing enough in expression, good wrinkle, straight and sound, good color. He was shown light, and fails in skull and depth of face. V.H.C. Kaiser, a yearling by Hellgate Meteor, a dog who has turned out a lot of winners for these shows. Kaiser has a good dark eye but lacks wrinkle, well marked. American bred dogs and bitches, first Valais Wolfram, that we spoke well of last year. He has made up into a very large good bodied dog, straight and sound, a bit rough in coat and a rather gay tail, he has a capital skull and short, but hardly enough depth of face for his inches and weight, off in pasterns, he would look better with more grooming. Second Hercuveen Night Watch, who possesses a wonderfully well chiselled head which only lacks a dark eye, he fails in body being roach-backed and flat sided and shown light in flesh did

not help any. Third Elkwood Perfection, a large colored bitch, straight and sound, good muzzle, lacks face shadings and is heavy in ear, it takes a good one to beat her. Reserve Beethoven. V.H.C. Hellgate Hamlington, a large sound dog, well marked, only fair in head and muzzle and heavy in ear, no wrinkle; Hellgate Victoria was some way behind the class, failing in muzzle and shoulder. In limit dogs Valais Wolfram first, second Night Watch, third Beethoven, reserve Valais Imperator, open Valais Wolfram, Beethoven and Hellgate Hamlington in this order. Night Watch and Valais Imperator not being entered.

Winners, dogs, Valais Wolfram and Night Watch; novice bitches, rough, first Hellgate Victoria, who already appears in the American bred class, second Duchess, long in foreface, beautiful color and coat sound and straight, third Willowmere Baby Beautiful, only a moderate one. Limit. first Lady Lyndon, the best St. Bernard in the show and awarded same though, through a mix up in the numbers the marked catalogue does not give her as the best, she is one of the best bitches ever seen here and we have seen some good ones, her dam has already made herself famous in this country having produced Champion Altadorf and Lord Chatsworth. Lady Lyndon excels in all essentials except finish of muzzle, being a large, heavy boned specimen, sound, white with a few rich orange patches, grand skull, wrinkle and eye and plenty of depth there, though it does not carry through to the finish, second to the writer's Montphosa, who carries the same type and almost the same blood lines, third to Elkwood Perfection, already commented on, reserve Flora VIII. good eye, color and markings, open repeat and winners to Lady Lyndon, with Montphosa reserve.

Smooth dogs had one entry and he absent, viz., Ch. Billy Thunder, who we are told died just before the show. Bitches nothing in novice, but the American bred brought out, first Alta Lady Guide, a very large bitch, pale color, capital skull and square muzzle, lacks face shadings and not right behind; second Dolly La Valletta, good color, depth of face and eye, rather flat in skull and a trifle Roman nosed, sound and straight, now in her sixth year; third Southwind, nice size and muzzle, plain in head, lacks shadings, but is sound and straight, her coat is profuse enough for a smooth and she was beaten in eye. Limit and open were repeats and Dolly La Valletta was reserve to Alta Lady Guide in

Alta Big Ben was benched for exhibition only, a very large dog, grand color, body, bone and skull, his muzzle has great depth but narrow, and the bridge of the nose slants into the skull where he needs some chiselling out, he moves well but stands narrow in front.

AIREDALES AT NEW YORK.

Airedales were one of the best collections possible to get at any one

show, both in quality and numbers. Puppy dogs started the ball rolling with twenty-six entries, Young King Nobbler getting the blue. He is well grown, with a very long, lean head, good eye, at present carries his ears low, beautiful neck and front, short body and sound coat; 2 Larchmere Host, nice size, good head, eye and ears, first class coat and color, loses in body to winner; 3 Orchard Knoll Imperialist, good coat and color, shade light in eye and heavy in ears.

Novice, 1 Larchmere Host, 2 Orchard Knoll Imperialist, 3 Kenmare Swiveller, a real good sort, not quite ready. American bred, 1 Young King Nobbler, 2 Vickery Loadstar, nice head, shade heavy in ears, good body, coat and color, a good shower; 3 Larchmere Host.

Limit, 1 His Highness a big dog with lots of bone and substance, grand coat, body and hindquarters, good shaped head marred by a foreign expression, 2 Larchmere Pretender a quality Terrier with good head, dark eye and well carried ears, true front, good bone and body, 3 Gamecock Chance a useful sort excelling in bone and substance, long head and a hard coat. Unexpected was missed in this class, a real good Terrier combining size and quality, might have won this class.

Open, 1 Ch. Abby King Nobbler, he has a beautiful head, very dark, well placed eye, small, correctly carried ears, grand neck let into perfect shoulder, his front is all that we can wish for; a little more rib and a better coat would put this dog in a class of his own. 2 Ch. King Oorang, another top sawyer put down in good shape, but did not make the most of himself in the ring, therefore losing his chance. 3 Vickery Emperor similar to His Highness. Winners dogs, Ch. Abby King Nobbler; res., Ch. King Oorang.

Puppy bitches, 1 Red Starlight, well grown, fair head, nice body, and good behind, 2 Kenmare Conceit an eight months puppy, grand type, with intense quality throughout, looks like making a flier when matured; 3 Larchmore Hostess, a nice sort, good front and hind quarters, rather heavy in ears, wants to make up in body.

Novice, 1 Kenmore Conceit; 2 Bingley Babby, a big one coarse in head, good bone, front and coat, a good mover; 3 Larchmere Hostess. American bred, 1 Princess Peggy, a sound one, good all over but a size small; 2 Kenmare Conceit; 3 Larchmere Hostess.

Limit, 1 Dargle Dimity, good head, eye and ears, shelly on body, not sound in front and straight behind; 2 Vicker Footlights, might have won this class, good head, ears and expression, good bone, and front with a nice body, coat might be more dense; 3 Princess Peggy.

Open, Ch. Bingley Blossom won, long, lean head, good eye and ear, beautiful neck, shoulders, legs and feet, with a first class coat and body, sound behind and showed well; 2 Vickery Soubrette, another good one excelling in head, front, coat and body,

moves well; 3 Kenmare Conceit. Winner bitches, Ch. Bingley Blossom; res., Ch. Vickery Soubrette. Ch. Bingley Blossom won special for best Airedale, either sex.

IRISH TERRIERS AT NEW YORK.

The Westminster Kennel Club Dog Show has come and gone and is now a matter of history, and we have repeatedly heard it said that the attendance was not up to former years. To an outsider it would not appear so. when you take into consideration that the dogs are distributed through three very large flats and are judged there, there being five rings on each flat for that purpose, and which were continually surrounded by spectators, while the dogs were being passed upon, and throughout the day, the building was always filled, more especially in the evening. We had the pleasure of meeting the celebrated F. M. Jowett, of Irish Terrier fame, being to-day the Dean of the Fancy, whom Chas. H. Mason was kind enough to introduce to us. While in conversation with Mr. Jowett it does not take one long to find out that he knows what he is talking about, he is so explicit even to the minutest detail, and gives his reasons for so doing. So very few will do that, we would be delighted to have such an authority amongst us. His opinions would be very beneficial to Irish Terrier breeders here. We also had the pleasure of meeting the owner of that great dog Ch. Thorncroft Marksman, Mr. Thorndike, and of renewing acquaintance with Mr. J. G. Bates, of "Blarney" fame, two great admirers of the "Dare Devils."

The Irish Terriers numbered 62, all told, with only one absentee. The following is a review of the classes as they were judged:—

Puppy dogs brought out 12 entries, with Blarney Beau Brummel first, a well balanced, small dog, whose flaws were hard to pick out, put down in the pink of condition and showed himself like a veteran. Shaune Rhue, a very close 2nd, who had just as many admirers as the winner; 3rd went to Castlegould Masher, a good sort but too small for his age. Reserve Kilvara Bandit, long cast, with coat of good texture and a good shower. V.H.C. Coast Native Prince, a very pleasing little dog, a good shower, with a sound coat of the right color, we expected to see him higher up, he is one who will have to be reckoned with when fully developed. dogs, 1st B. B. Brummel, 2nd Shaune Rhue, 3rd Kilvara Huntsman, reserve Newry Omadhaun, good type ears, very erratic and not in very good shape. American bred, 1st B. B. Brummel, 2nd Brenden Banker, shown in very poor shape, all Terrier with an extra long head, good eye and ear well carried, in proper shape, will make the best of them go some, probably on the big side to suit some, 3rd Castlegould Masher. Limit dogs. Endcliffe Gael, a good sound, all round Terrier, one that is always sure to be in the money; 2nd, Annanlee Alan,

good racy one, A1 front, good expression, sound in coat; 3rd, B.B. Brummel. Open dogs, Endcliffe Gael, 2nd B.B. Brummel, 3rd Abbey Playboy, a very pleasing Terrier with a good coat of the right texture, good front and feet; res. Parcel Post. This one has lots of character, a sound Terrier all over. Open dogs and bitches (bred by exhibitor), 1st Blarney Brenda, 2nd Castlegould Betsy, 3rd Kilvara Bandit; reserve Castlegould Banker. Junior dogs and bitches, 1st B.B. Brummel, 2nd B. Brenda, 3rd Thorncroft Silhouette.

Puppy bitches, 1st Castlegould Betsy, on the small side, would not show herself to advantage, put down in good form, 2nd T. Silhouette, good color and coat with a good front and A1 expression; reserve went to Chilmark Norah. Novice bitch, 1st B. Brenda, 2nd Castlegould Betsy, 3rd T. Silhouette, reserve Lady Ingleside, a grand quality one, rich in color, coat of the right texture, beautiful head, grand ear carriage, it is too bad she is not a shade smaller. American bred, 1st Aroostook Brenden Belle, one of the best in the show, and one that will always keep in front, a great shower, a sound Terrier all over; 2nd B. Brenda, 3rd Castlegould Betsy, reserve T, Silhouette. Limit bitches, 2nd Aurora Glory, one of the correct type with small, well carried ears, perfect front and feet down in splendid form. Open bitches, this class was worth a journey to New York any time to see such a class of flyers. I doubt if a better lot was ever seen in the ring at the one time, all put down in grand condition and all handled well. Ch. Blarney Belinda getting 1st, 2nd Vickery Bessie Belle, 3rd Brenden Belle, reserve Aurora Glory, with Ch. Abbey Red Fly and Ch. Baughfell Peggy V. H. C., winners bitches B. Belinda, Bessie Bell reserve. Blarney Kennels won team class with Vickery reserve. Brace were repeats. Ch. Thorncroft Marks-Brace man won the Father O'Gorman Memorial Trophy, looking like a twoyear-old, a very sound Terrier all over. It was the general opinion that the judge, Mr. Rutherford, gave entire satisfaction. Every one seemed satisfied. Here's wishing that we may meet the same bunch of good fellows in 1915!

BULL TERRIERS AT NEW YORK SHOW.

Judging was to start at 10 o'clock and, as usual, everyone was getting ready, so the judge kindly waited till everyone was ready and then started about eleven.

The puppy class brought out a good one in Mr. Bellen's White Chief, who won first, a very showy puppy with beautiful outlines with tail carried a little high, but, taking him all over, a very hard puppy to beat. 2nd Wentworth Crystal, a nice all white puppy, losing to the winner in show quality, and might be a little stronger in muzzle. 3rd, Noross Masquerador, a big puppy in poor condition. Novice class was a repeat of puppy class.

American bred dogs. This class brought out the best light weight dog shown in years, Noross Conqueror, one of those true under thirty pound kind so hard to get. The judge did not seem to be able to get away from him, so he won out over the good heavy weight White Chief. 2nd, White Chief the winner of first puppy and novice. Some of the fancy thought that the heavyweight dog should have won, as they don't like to see a lightweight win over a heavyweight, and again others say that a good puppy should not be placed over a good dog that is fully developed. However, I think that the best Bull Terrier won. 3rd, Glenedyth Bob, a very nice clean headed dog with one very bad ear that spoils the expression.

Limit dogs not exceeding 30 lbs.

1st, Noross Conqueror had an easy win in this class; 2nd Fort Orange Cardigan, a nice little dog with two marked ears and light eyes; 3rd Wentworth Diavola, an all white dog a little weak in muzzle. Open dogs under and not exceeding 30 lbs. 1st Noross Conqueror, 2nd Wentworth Diavola, 3rd Teurus, a very good little dog two years ago, shown in very poor condition and seems to have seen his best days as a show dog. Limit dogs 30 lbs. and over. This class brought out Glenedyth Imperator, the Canadian bred dog. I think the best dog brought out in years, and is going to take Champion Patrician's place on his retirement from the show ring. All he needs is just a little more development of feet and bone and you will see all the good ones go down one by one, as he is going to be a laster. 2nd White Chief, 3rd Fort Orange Patron, a nice young dog that ought to develop into something good, having beaten in this class Williston Lavender, Wentworth King, White Chapel Hero and several other good ones. Open dogs 30 lbs. and over. 1st Champion Noross Patrician, a grand Bull Terrier, a laster. In fact he seems to improve with age. A champion at seven months old, the leading show dog, the leading stud dog, in fact, leading in everything in connection with Bull Terriers in America, and winning the special for the best Bull Terrier in show over his own puppy, Champion Willison Rose, 2nd Glenedyth Imperator, 3rd White

Puppy bitches. 1st Noross Fashion, alone in this class. Novice bitches. 1st Noross Morning Glory, a lightweight bitch with nice outline, a little weak in muzzle and light in eye. 2nd Glenedyth Elfin, an all white one, a little loose in front, but a nice little 3rd Fort Orange Susan, a bitch. marked bitch, a little weak in foreface. American bred bitches. Scott L. Libby's Williston Rose, the very best bitch in America, showing a little lameness behind from an accident with an automobile last Fall, and in the best of condition. 2nd Bellin's Burning Light, a grand bitch, only losing to the winner in this class in flatness of skull. 3rd Noross Radiant, a very fine, big bitch, full of show

quality, losing to the winners in head. Limit bitches, not exceeding 30 lbs., 1 Noross Chance, a good little bitch, as I remember her, with a big pair of ears not cropped; 2 Anna Ax Me, a very nice little bitch, one of those true under thirty pound bitches so hard to get. A lot of the fancy thought that she should have won in this class; 3 Leeds Heward Belle, that won first at New York last year, a true under thirty pound one, and one of the very best. Limit bitches, 30 lbs. and over, 1 Burning Daylight; 2 Princess Patricia, a very nice, stylish bitch, only a little light in bone, but it always takes a good one to beat her; 3 Noross Radiant. Open bitches, 30 lbs and over, 1 Williston Rose; 2 Burning Daylight; 3 Haymarket Queen, a good old bitch, with good strong muzzle, a little light in eye, in poor condition and a very poor shower.

I might add that in class 709 for Terrier dogs and bitches of any breed, that two Bull Terriers were successful in getting ribbons in a very large mixed class. Merry Lad got third, and Glenedyth Imperator got fifth under all round English judge.

NOTES ON THE NEW YORK SHOW.

Dr. O. Prescott Bennett, who has made a study of breeding Collies, and imported many celebrities to America, was a popular choice as judge of his favorite breed, and the painstaking manner in which he judged them was a guarantee of his ability to fill the role. The entry was not as large as in recent years, but that was not a reflection upon the judge's popularity. In the days when J. Pierpont Morgan was an exhibitor, the entries began to fall off as the average exhibitor failed to see where he came in in an effort to compete with a multi-millionaire who filled the classes with the gleanings of the best kennels abroad and at home "regardless of price." Then came Mr. Samuel Untermyer with his bank roll, and to-day we have a replica of former days in the advent of Mr. Hunter-a true fancier and charming gentleman he is-who has bought England and Scotland's best, no matter what they cost. From time to time the press has heralded the purchase of this or that champion at figures running into fours. As a result, the ordinary mortal was better pleased with his five dollar entry fee securely in his pocket. The much mooted question "Are Collies on the wane?" is again to the fore. To answer it is difficult as the type of Collies of the present is a departure from that of the past, not, it may be truthfully said, of all other breeds. In general appearance we may declare that the Collie of a few years ago, with his wealth of coat and frill, well knit frame and strong legs and feet, was more useful and beautiful to look upon than the present type, whose head and ears are the first consideration. Their flat coats, shelly bodies, light, unsound underpinning, and alien expression are much too prevalent. The

wooden expression and the objectionable Borzoi Roman nose, Nobody wants to return to thick skulls and low earcarriage, but there is a medium and it is not being adhered to! This year there were many benched of excellent type, and it was gratifying to notice that that good old color, the tricolor or black, white and tan was prominent in the prize lists. The honor of breeding the best brace fell to a real sportswoman in Mrs. Lunt, of the Alstead Kennels, but this is a feminist age. Her lovely brace of tricolors, Alstead Altus and Alstead Astral, won most successful, and rightly so for they possess true Collie type, with size, coat and quality to match. They accounted for eight firsts and many valuable trophies, the chief honor going to the bitch, who captured the much coveted winners rosette, many British champions being behind her. Colonel McEwen was well up with Holyrood Policeman, who, despite the fact that he is black with very little white, will stand close analysis, for he is a big sound youngster with a long head, dark eve and correct ear carriage. To pass on to the open dog class where we find the centre of attraction is the Collie that it has taken thousands to produce, Mr. Hunter supplied a brace of English celebrities in the Champions Seedley Stirling and Weardale Lord. We must confess to being doomed to disappointment in the former. True he has the much sought after length of head and good ear carriage, but his coat is short and flat, he lacks spring of rib and is quite unsound behind. He is a dark sable with little white. It looked like the easiest sort of win for his kennel companion Weardale Lord, who, though not in tip top form, owns great size, grand bone, legs and feet, coat of the right texture, and though not just right in expression, has a well balanced head and good ears. Of course there were many others of merit, and bitches with long lists of wins, but many did not do themselves justice, being quite out of coat and condition. Though February should find Collies in best coat, the writer has never seen such a lack of the essential at a New York Show. While in this part of the show it is only fair to mention the magnificent display of Old English Bob-tail Sheepdogs and the wonderful coat and condition they appeared in. Mrs. Tyler Morse had the satisfaction of a field day when it came to the all round specials, for her team accounted for best of all breeds, with Champion Slumber: best brace and best four in the show. A recent recruit in Sheepdog ranks is Mr. Morris Kinney, his recently imported Night Rider being a grand dog. The display of German Sheepdogs, due to the fad for police dog trials, was an example of what a boom will do. Seventy actual dogs were entered. True they have rare intelligence and courage and in appearance are a reddish sable. Their erect ears and glaring eyes, shambling gait and light hind quarters strongly suggest the Collie-Wolf cross.

Fox Terriers have of recent years

dropped off in entries, especially the smooths, which at one time were considered the aristocrats of dogdom, and patronized by people of wealth and leisure. The wire haired Terrier has quite outstripped his smooth brother and is enjoying a boom. Only twentynine smooths entered and several absentees is a sorry showing for New York. Mr. Winthrop Rutherfurd, of Warren fame, was the judge, and his placings, though they show independence, gave the ringside many surprises. The principal winners were cast-offs from the powerful Sabine Kennels, who are confining their efforts to exporting their best to England, despite the six months' quarantine. Here the dog and bitch winners were Sabine Rexonian, who is light all over, and Sabine Divinity, a bitch of rare quality and Terrier character. To pass on to the wires, of which there were fifty-nine entered, a truly great show they were. England has gone wire mad and almost any price has been paid for top-notchers. America has caught the fever and there has been a mighty scramble of dollars for various millionaires to procure the best at any cost. In judging these classes, Mrs. Rutherfurd put the cat among the pigeons as was evinced by the Oh!'s and gasps from the crowded ringside when the ribbons were given out.

The cables have been working overtime to bring news of the startling purchases of Mr. George W. Quintard, a young New York millionaire, who commissioned the veteran George Raper to go the limit in picking him up a team of wires that would sweep all before them. As a starter, Raby Dazzler, who has won the challenge certificate at the Crystal Palace, left Raper's Kennel for the tidy sum of £500. Then negotiations were opened for the invincible Matford Vic, who has been awarded the special for best of all breeds at the great Birmingham fixture—it took £700 to tempt her owner to let her go. Of course there must be a team of four, and to make sure in case of indisposition on the part of principals when judging, a few extra ones were added, all celebrities and at prices befitting their exalted position. To make sure, Mr. Raper was procured as manager and showman, and brought from England. Alas! how many slips there are betwixt cup and lip. The first blow came when the crack puppy, Ridgeway Revival, came out of the ring with a V.H.C. res. card. The same fell to Rideway Backfire in American breds. However, the open class was to come, and after all Raby Dazzler was the central figure. In he came, all fire, but from outward appearance not "put down to the minute"-some whisperings has it that he and Matford Vic had literally been doing the cabaret show till the wee sma' hours of the morning! He is almost black, with a few splashes of black and tan, has good shoulders, legs and feet. A neck that might be longer and a skull cleaner - coat, of course, "hard as nails"! After the parade, the judge looked 'em over, and cruel fate, a red ribbon has Dazzler's portion, the blue going to Vickery Simplex, and a neat well shown little Terrier he is, but not just the class. Mr. Quintard did better in the bitch classes, for his lovely trio Rideway Patience, Cromwell Cheeky and Matford Vic accounted for the puppy, limit, open and winners. It is difficult to fault Matford Vic, all that might be said is that she is a bit masculine. Her head, eyes, ears and expression are a marvel. Lovely neck, shoulders and front, body, hind quarters of best and a "hard as nails" coat. Her like has not been seen on this side of the Atlantic. She was not in her best form, and this must have been the cause of Mr. Rutherfurd when the specials were judged, placing the Vickery brace, Fast Freight, a gentleman all over and in superb form, and Vickery Simplex, over Matford Vic. The famous Vickery brace, Gypsy Moth and Estelle were benched for exhibition. Mr. Daniel Lynn was always there or thereabouts when the American-bred classes were judged. During the show much sympathy was expressed for Mr. Thomas Moore for his great loss, and hopes that he would come out stronger than ever.

Scottish Terriers were the best lot imaginable, and a splendid entry greeted Mr. McCandlish, crossed the Atlantic who judge them. Dollars were again in evidence for a comparatively new recruit, Mr. Walter T. Stern, has spared no expense to, as it were, corner the market in Scotties. Reclining or tartan-lined benches and cushions to match, embellished by brass fixtures, were a group of these engaging little Terriers well worth a journey to New York to gaze upon. Mr. Stern, who calls his kennel The Early Bird Kennels, was indeed in keeping with the name he uses in being up early and late to get such galaxy of celebrities together. Though a quiet man, he acknowledges that the Scotties have "got him all right." He thinks of them all day and dreams of them o' nights. To give vent to this veritable mania, he gave a special "Scottie Dinner" on the second night of the show in the ballroom of the exclusive Ritz-Carlton Hotel. Each guest was expected to bring a brace, to be scored by the guest of honor, Mr. McCandlish. A ring, festooned by various tartans and Gaelic designs, was arranged in the centre of the ballroom, under a huge crystal chandelier, where after a dinner par excellence had been enjoyed, the "scoring began." But to return to the dogs. Mr. Stern was a good winner with Ems Troubadour, a compact, big boned little chap with a long, powerful jaw, raw expression, and perfect short tail. He might be smaller in ear and harder in coat. The famous Daligan did not compete. There was great disappointment that Mr. Wm. M. Morris' Bapton Blacksmith failed to meet his engagement. He must have put a keen edge on competition had he been present. His litter sister, Bapton Beryl, won all before her, and a lovely Terrier she is. Such a head, eye, ear and expression, grand body, bone and coat. Real Scottie hind quarters. Her kennel mate, the famous Scotch champion, Romany Oliver, came second. Her headpiece is absolutely perfect. All the prominent kennels were represented, and so strong was the competition that several champions were glad of a V.H.C. card.

TORONTO K. C. MONTHLY SHOW.

The Toronto Kennel Club held the third of their series at Occident Hall on February 24th. It proved a regular gala night, upwards of thirty Terriers being presented for judgment, Mr. H. Dudley-Waters took the whole of the classes, in addition several (not intended for competition) were brought up for him to go over.

Everything was carried out in the usual thorough manner of the Toronto Kennel Club. The Honorary Secretary worked hard at the desk, while Mr. A. Atkinson had charge of the floor. The judge was not called upon to start until 9 o'clock. This is a matter that will have to be altered for the final night, otherwise some hasty decisions may take place.

Judge's Report.

Puppy dogs, 1 Corona Curfew, a grand one, wonderful body, legs and feet, good head, nice ear carriage, good expression, put down in good form and well deserved his win. 2 Imera Clover, an attractive sable and white, good head and coat, but could improve in feet; 3 Weston Star O' Quality, needs time to improve, was not at his best. Novice dogs, 1 Riverview Masterpiece, a nice quality one, good body, fairly long in head and carrying a good coat; 2 Scott, a well grown sable and white of correct type; 3 Imera Clover. Limit dogs, 1 Imera Toreador, a good big one with lots of coat, but a shade thick in head, good ear carriage; 2 Ellwyn Admiral, might have given way and changed places with the third, downy in skull and a poor mover, good coat; 3 Riverview Masterpiece. Open dogs, this brought all the good ones together, and with fourteen dogs in, there was lots of competition. 1 Corona Commander, an upstanding dog full of Collie character, good expression, lots of coat of the right texture, good head and best of legs and feet, shown in good form; 2 Imera Peacock, full of quality, carrying an immense coat, good head and ears, fine expression, good body, shown fit, a little stronger foreface would improve him; 3 Imera Toreador. Puppy bitches, 1 Weston Primrose, a shade fine all over, but with more age will make her presence felt in ring; 2 Lady Minto, a promising one with a good head, too small; 3 Lady Wylie, sister to the second, loses in head and is shelly in body. Limit bitches, 1 Weston Primrose; 2 Imera Thelma, too snipey; 3 Alta Girl, fair head, full in eye. Open bitches, 1 Imera Whyzetta a grand sable and white, hard to fault, of exceptional quality all through, showing type from stem to stern, well known; 2 Weston All Quality, good in head, body and coat, a shade full in eye; 3 Weston Primrose. Winners dogs, Corona Commander. Res., Corona Curfew. Winners bitches, Imera Whyzetta. Res., Weston All Quality.

Toy Poodles.

Puppy dogs and bitches, 1 Babe, a good solid white, too high on leg; 2 Buster Brown, right type but marred by having brown patch on back. Novice dogs and bitches, 1 Chicklet, a showy one, but a little on the large size; 2 Tiny Toodles, quite the best, but refused to show; 3 Babe. Limit and open, repeat.

English Bulldogs.

Puppy dogs, this class failed to bring out anything startling, 1 Mersey Skipper, fair body and front, poor head, pinched in foreface, could have changed places with 2, Roslyn King, a good headed one, good head and body and moves well, 3 Cowan's Doctor, the right kind of head, but not enough of it. Novice dogs, 1 Mersey Skipper; 2 Cowan's Doctor; 3 Crescentwood Yamamota, poor specimen. Limit dogs, 45 lbs. and over, 1 Chinook Courtenay Coronet, a grand headed brindle and white, well smashdeep stop and good skull, good front and brisket, excellent spring of rib and as active as a Terrier. Jack Fletcher is to be commended for the splendid condition and ring manners of this dog; 2 Chopping Stone, a solid brindle, good head and skull, low to ground, a shade long coat; 3 Chinook Silent Prince, a massive white one, good shoulders with flat skull, deep face and good underjaw, a little on the big, much improved since I first saw him. Limit dogs, under 45 lbs., 1 Mersey Pilot, an attractive lightweight, grand body, good front, deep muzzle, fair turnup, good bone and a sound one. The absence of wrinkle detracts greatly from his appearance, rather large in ears; 2 Cyclone Silent Prince, fair head and front, too light in body. Open dogs, 45 lbs. and over, 1 Chinook Courtenay Coronet; 2 Mersey Chineham Tormentor, a real good headed one, but too long in body; 3 Chopping Stone. Open dogs, under 45 lbs., 1 Mersey Pilot; 2 Silver Rival, a real good one in shocking condition, when in shape can trouble the best of them; 3 Cyclone Silent Prince. Winners dogs, Mersey Pilot. Res., Chinook Courtenay Coronet. my seat I had a good chance to size up how this decision suited the "rail birds," and from the remarks I overheard would think that opinions were evenly divided. The Bulldog men were out in force to see these classes judged. Here we had a rattling good lightweight and a rattling good heavyweight. It is a hard proposition, and the judge certainly got his two best, as between them it is simply a matter of fancy. The future of these two dogs in the ring will be watched with interest. Both owners are the right sort, good sportsmen, keen and fearless exhibitors, and any decision between the two dogs would only be cause for a good handshake between the owners. Their example could be well followed by others. This makes two falls for the Pilot dog, but Coronet is not the kind to go back any, and the next meeting will be just as interesting. Puppy bitches, this class looked a tame one after the struggle for winners dogs, but it served as an intermission before the ringing in of the best bitches. Onlivon, a brindle, could be well described as "one-live-one;" 2 Hercules Winnipeg Girl, not so strong as the name suggests; 3 Hercules Hatch Floss, also ran. Novice bitches, Elgin Princess Eva coming into this class moved the puppies back a peg. Quality improved a little, but they were all an ordinary bunch. Limit bitches, 40 lbs. and over, 1 Vedra, a good brindle, well smashed up face, good skull, a nice front, a better spring or rib would improve her; 2 Brockley Biferous, a golden brindle shown too thin, fair head and front; 3 Chinook Star Turn, a dark brindle with not much to recommend her, a fair head and looks like a useful brood bitch. Limit bitches, under 40 lbs., 1 Mersey Chineham Reflector, a good bodied one, only fair in head and carrying two button ears, could easily have given way to

ed up face, well turned under jaw,

2. Chinook Queen, a good little red with a real Bulldog head in the miniature, good body and very active; 3 Crescentwood Nora, well known, and I have seen in better shape. bitches, 40 lbs. and over, 1 Cowan's Peggy, had it all her own way, a compact white, grand skull, well smashed up face with lots of wrinkle, deep stop, good sweeping turnup, wonderful bone and spring of rib, a good clean mover; 2 Vedra; 3 Mersey Snowdrop. Open bitches, under 40 lbs., repeat of limit under 40 lbs. Winners bitches, Mersey Chineham Reflector. Res., Cowan's Peggy. can't see it yet. Peggy to my mind beats Reflector in every section. I think the "Bulldog King" drew a lucky number here or had a horse shoe in his pocket. Best specimen, Mersey Pilot. Best kennel of four. and all other specials, Mersey Kennels. I looked for a surprise here, but the Chinook Kennels fell down with their bitches. I think that such an award should be made on evenness of type rather than on class standing. The Mersey Kennels showed two lightweights and two heavyweights, and the Chinook Kennels three heavyweights and one lightweight, the latter being close to the limit. As they stood, the Mersey dogs won out and fairly.

French Bulldogs.

Le Parisien Kennels were the only exhibitors, and benched four, their two puppies, 1 Marionette, and 2 Eplingette, are both promising, and in time should be heard from. Open dogs and bitches, 1 Normandy Nomad, well known; 2 Deau Deaux, I like better, but penalized here for condition. This bitch we learn has since died and is a big loss to her owners.

Boston Terriers.

Puppy dogs, two in with 1 Governor Nip; 2 Tony Ringmaster Jr. Novice dogs, repeat of puppy with 3 Criterion Prince. Limit dogs, 18 lbs and over, 1 Bostonia II., well known and looking fit; 2 Criterion Prince. Limit dogs, under 18 lbs., 1 McGlynn's Sensation, alone but deserving of good company. This would trouble him little as he can hold his own with the best of them. A good seal brindle with a white blaze, good head, good legs and feet and nice body. Open dogs, 1 McGlynn's Sensation, made good the opinion I got of him in the limit class, followed by 2, Ellsworth Lord Fi Fi, a kennel companion, marked the same as the winner and between the two there is little to choose; 3 Bostonia II. Puppy bitches, 1 Bell Rock Queen, wins handily from 2, Jiggers Blossom, poor in head and light bone; 3 Beauty. Limit bitches, under 18 lbs., 1 Bell Rocks Queen; 2 Lady Dainty, aptly named; 3 Beauty. Open bitches, 1 May Saxon, had an easy thing of it, a grand brindle, well marked, a hard one to beat; 2 Semie, a kennel mate. Winners dogs, McGlynn's Sensation. Res., Ellsworth Lord Fi Fi. Winners, bitches, May Saxon. Res., Semie. All from the same kennel.

Airedales.

Puppy dogs, 1 Bingley Sandy, a well matured one, plenty of bone and

substance, rather slack in body and would improve with more Terrier character; 2 Bingley Clip's Double, might have changed places with first, a well grown puppy, good body, legs and feet, nice head with Terrier expression and a shower; 3 Kingsway Mac, good color but coat inclined to curl, nice legs and feet but poor in head. Novice dogs, 14 in when the weeding started. The finish of the class found still in the ring, 1 Bingley Sandy; 2 Tonka Crack Shot, a Minneapolis entry, rather fine all over, fair coat, but weak before the eyes; 3 Bingley Clip's Double. Limit dogs, 1 Richard I., a stylish little dog, but on the small size, shown fit; 2 Tonka Crack Shot; 3 Ashburn Dinas Lad, on the small side, not right in expression, fair coat, good color. I like an unplaced dog in this class, Ettrick Marvel, and fancied him for second choice. Nearest in type to first dog, but lacking maturity. Open dogs, 1 Clipstone First Shot, had practically a walk over, looked better than ever, has improved wonderfully in body and handquarters and retains his good front and head qualities; 2 Auckland Lucky Stone, showing age but yet a Terrier, time has not dealt kindly with his head and front; 3 Richard I. Puppy bitches, this class failed to bring out anything startling or what one might figure on for future shows. Bingley Blue Bells being quite the best, followed closely by her kennel mate, Bingley Painted Lady and Ashburn Bess third. Novice bitches, 1 Silver Deputy, on the small side, her head being the worst of her, moves a shade stiff behind; 2 Queen, I like better than the first, but condition told against her here. Limit bitches, 1 Western Gamestress, very typical, plenty of quality, a real good head and Terrier expression, would like her a shade bigger and with a better coat; 2 Silver Deputy; 3 Queen. Open bitches, repeat of limit with Woodbine Nell taking the place of Queen for third place. A useful type of bitch shown in the rough. Winners dogs, Clipstone First Shot. Res., Auckland Lucky Stone. Winners bitches, Weston Gamestress. Res., Silver Deputy. Best specimen, Clipstone First Shot.

Bull Terriers.

Puppy dogs, 1 Bloomsberry Whitecote, a good one with the best head seen here for a long time, nicely placed dark eye, good body, a little out at the shoulders; 2 Whitecote Candidate, fair in head, could be improved in body; 3 Jack Krafcheuko, a reward of eleven thousand would never be offered for this one's capture. Novice dogs, repeat. Limit dogs, 30 lbs. and over, 1 Bloomsberry Whitecote; 2 White Noelson, the sire of the first, slack in body and not pleasing in head, which is not improved by badly carried ears, too full in eye and too heavy in lip. Limit dogs, under 30 lbs., 1 Whitecote Candidate, all alone. Open dogs, 1 Bloomsberry Whitecote; 2 White Noelson; 3 Whitecote Candidate. Puppy bitches, 1 Miss Kerfrauko, alone, a fair sort. Novice bitches, repeat. Limit bitches, 30 lbs. and over, 1 Whitecote Animation, a good body, fair head, a darker eye would improve her; 2 Rellinderf Repeal, good body, legs and feet, fails in head, plenty length of head, but not down faced enough. Open bitches, repeat.

American Bull Terriers.

This was the first show at which winners points have been awarded in this popular breed. The formation of the American Bull Terrier Club of Canada, and the adoption of a Standard, had the effect of bringing out exhibits of more uniformity of type than seen at former shows. Limit dogs, 1 Pal, a dark brindle, well made, with good legs and feet; 2 Chip, much the same type; 3 Ginger caught my eye as being nearer the new Standard than the first and second. Open dogs, 35 lbs. and over, 1 Gyp, a big strong red dog, too leggy; 2 Pal; 3 Chip. Open dogs, under 35 lbs., 1 Terry Mack, alone, an active one. Puppy bitches, 1 Josie; 2 Biddy, little to choose between this pair, both of a nice stamp. Novice bitches, 1 Josie; 2 Frou Frou, a nice type, but overdone in shoulders; 3 Biddy. Limit bitches, 1 Red Flirt, a good one, good head and front, well ribbed up body and sound, carrying a good whip tail; 2 Nemo, good body, legs and feet, fair head; 3 Frou Frou. Open bitches, 35 lbs. and over, 1 Faultless Flirt, a nice one showing lots of quality, good body, legs and feet, nice head. for general conformation hard to beat; 2 Red Flirt; 3 Nemo.

Scottish Terriers.

Puppy dogs and bitches, only a moderate lot, 1 Glenlyn Moray; 2 Scottie, not much between them, neither showing Terrier character. Novice dogs and bitches, 1 Jack, an easy winner but needs improvement in head and expression; 2 Roderick Dhu on the leg and weak in foreface; 3 Glenlyn Moray. Open dogs and bitches, 1 Roderick Dhu; 2 Glenlyn Moray; 3 Birkie Chief, quite a puppy that will need to grow a lot, faulty in shoulder.

Dachshunde.

Only two entered. Rex is quite the best, with a good front and fair head, shown fat; Queenie is poor in front and lacks bone.

Yorkshire Terriers.

Limit dogs and bitches, 1 Marquis, a nice little dog with a fair coat; 2 Queenie, a fair sort; 3 Jennie, too high on leg and short of coat. Open dogs and bitches, 1 Marquis; 2 Nurrie, a very small one that refused to show herself plenty of coat but not of right color; 3 Dolly will make a useful brood bitch.

Skye Terriers.

As usual the old warrior Sandy Mc-Pherson was alone, quite a good one. I wonder if there is another dog in the Dominion with as many points to his credit as "our Sandy."

Whippets.

Novice dogs, 1 Village Smith, plenty big, good front, not pleasing in head; 2 Strathcona Boy fails in body. Limit dogs, 1 Village Smith; 2 Peeping Tom, I picked to win, a nice size, good in head, body, legs and feet, good depth of brisket and very symmetrical all over; 3 Strathcona King a dark fawn, a useful sort and looks as if he could sprint well. Open dogs, repeat. Novice bitches, 1 Sweet Repose, rather fine all over; 2 Vesta Tilly, a nice type. Limit bitches, 1 Flower Girl, a good racey type; 2 Strathcona Girl, a shade on the coarse side for the bench; 3 Sweet Repose. Open bitches, 1 Watford Dream, a very nice bitch, grand front legs and feet, shown fit, not so good in head as 2, Jess of Hayden, with better legs and feet. would be hard to stop, good body and good head.

Pugs.

Dolly Betty, the Yorkton entry, alone, a nice sized fawn, shown too fat.

Pomeranians.

Puppy dogs and bitches, Cigarette and Wascana in the under named, both too big. Novice dogs or bitches, chocolate, 1 Knockrea Saucy Atom, alone, a pleasing little chocolate. Limit dogs or bitches, chocolate, 1 Rajjie a fair one; 2 Knockrea Dainty Atom, close up; 3 Knockrea Saucy Atom. Open dogs or bitches, chocolate, 1 Little Atom Nipper, a nice coated one and quite the best chocolate here: 2 Rajjie. Open bitches, chocolate, Knockrea Dainty Atom alone. Limit dogs and bitches, black, 1 Tiney, well known, looking a shade ragged in coat to what I have seen her, a topper, and when in form a hard one to pass; 2 Bobby, a kennel mate, a good solid colored one, rather inclined to be wavey in coat, otherwise hard to fault. Open dogs, black, 1 Bobby, alone. Open bitches, black, 1 Tiney, the only one in. Novice dogs or bitches, white, 1 Brockley Snowball, a very showy one, very compact, rather too flat incoat and had all his ears with him; 2 Anona Ruffles; 3 Anona Teddy, both on large side. Limit dogs or bitches, white, this was a repeat of novice, with Anona Snowflake taking the place of Anona Teddy, much too big. Open dogs, white, 1 Brockley Snowball; 2 Anona Snowflake; 3 Anona Jim, greatly oversized. Limit dogs and bitches, A. O. C., 1 Dolly Gray, a nice wolf sable, profuse coat of the right texture; 2 Babbington Bruce. off coat and carries himself wild; 3 Fido, too big. Open dogs, A. O. C., 1 Babbington Bruce; 2 Wee McGregor, nice size, but not sound in color. Open bitches, A. O. C., 1 Dolly Gray; 2

Toy Spaniels.

Ashton Aladdin, quite a fair Ruby, was alone.

Bedlington Terriers.

Brockley Blue Gown, a good bitch, shown fit, was the only entry.

Italian Greyhounds.

Limit dogs or bitches, 1 Zeko, a very typical one shown in good form; 2 Zetonia; 3 Zeko, little to choose between 2 and 3, very much the same type. Open dogs or bitches, 1 Zeno Boy I have seen looking better, he

appeared listless in the ring; 2 Zeward a good headed one, shelly in body and poor front.

West Highland Terriers.

Two entered and both are fair ones.

Schipperkes.

Only one shown, Daisy, a nice one a little light in bone.

Pekinese.

Mersey Peiching Petra had the going all alone. A nice bitch out of coat and very shy. I have seen her looking better.

AMERICAN KENNEL CLUB ANNUAL MEETING.

Since writing the paragraph in Notes and Comments, we have received the American Kennel Gazette for March, which contains a report of the A.K.C. annual meeting. From it the following extracts are of interest to Canadians particularly.

"In regad to the 'Reciprocity Agreement' which has been brought to our attention, we find that no contract or agreement has as yet been entered into with the English Kennel Club, as the agreement has never been executed by both parties."

"In regard to the running of the secretary's office, we have made a thorough investigation, and we believe that the office is doing good work for the benefit of those interested in dogs.

Your committee has suggested to the secretary some minor changes in policy, and we hope that with the putting into effect of these changes, that much of the discord between the secretary's office and the public will hereafter be eliminated."

Mr. August Belmont was again elected president, and Mr. A. P. Vredenburgh secretary-treasurer. The following paragraph is from the secretary's report.

"At the December meeting it was ordered that the Boultbee case be reopened. I would suggest and recommend that the board of directors shall resolve itself into a trial board, and consider the case at this meeting. Dr. Boultbee and his witness have promised to attend."

Later on, this was acted upon as follows:

"The secretary: 'At the last meeting it was decided to reopen the Boultbee case, and I have just received a message that he is now in the outside office.'

"After a general discussion, Mr. Hooley moved that the privileges of the American Kennel Club be restored to Dr. Boultbee. (Carried.)

"Mr. Boultbee then appeared before the board of directors.

"The chairman: 'I want to say to you that we are sorry to have kept you waiting so long, but the board has passed a resolution extending to you again the privileges of the American Kennel Club.'

BULL TERRIER'S CHEEK MUSCLE, SHOULDERS AND FRONT.

It is surprising how often we hear of exhibitors and sometimes men that judge Bull Terriers speak of them being clean in cheek and shoulders with a front all the same Fox Terrier. This has prompted me to ask you to publish a few remarks written by that eminent judge of the breed, Mr. Vinton Breese, therefore I feel confident that the following will enlighten many. Mr. Breese says: The understanding that there should be no cheek muscle is about as ridiculous as it would be to insist that a pugilist have no biceps. It is the cheek muscles that give the sides and lower part of the dog's head its smooth, slightly rounded appearance by hiding the bony structure of the skull and jaw. The Bull Terrier is the widest fronted of all Terriers, not at shoulders, but wide because of its width or brisket and well sprung ribs.

This width offers a twofold advantage; great stability and plenty of lung power, both of which are essentials of his vocation.

His shoulders are strong, muscular, slanting and sit firmly on the chest.

His forelegs are straight and strongly boned down to the feet, which are close and well knuckled up. As previously remarked he is the widest fronted of all Terriers, yet this is an essential to which little attention is paid nowadays. In fact, instances can be called to mind where dogs possessing this quality were unknowingly spoken of by the judges as "thick in shoulder." A fluck or loaded shoulder should never be confused with a wide front. It is an over abundance of muscle on the outside of shoulder blade.

MEETING OF COLLIE MEN.

Dominion Collie Club Will Ask Manager of Exhibition for Specialist to Judge Breed.

A meeting of the newly formed Dominion Collie Club was held in the Industrial Bureau, with President Tom Milner in the chair. Secretary Phil Walker submitted the minutes of the previous meeting, which were adopted, after a strong recommendation by Joe Guarnera to the effect that a photo of Ch. Anfield Model appear on the cover of the constitution of the club.

The president addressed the club with a view to having a Collie specialist judge the breed at the Winnipeg Industrial Show in July. G. H. Lavender addressed the meeting and voiced the general opinion of those present when he stated that no man could judge all breeds and satisfy all that they had had a "fair run for their money."

At the invitation of the chairman, the Collie Club members named a few judges who they thought were capable of giving a decision "without fear or favor" to the best dog on his merits in the ring. The names included those of Dr. Ford, Dr. Daws, Dr. Jarrett, James Watson and R. Mc-Ewen, and it was decided to approach Dr. A. W. Bell-with a delegation from the Dominion Kennel Club, requesting him to appoint a Collie specialist as judge of the breed at the Canadian Industrial Exhibition next July.

After a protracted discussion on the conditions governing the Collie puppy stakes, the meeting was adjourned.

Unusual Precautions Just Adopted by The MacIntosh of MacIntosh.

ODDS AND ENDS.

By Sinac, in the Illustrated Kennel News, England.

Dogs, unless they are thin or in poor condition, or very old, do not require three meals a day. When it is necessary a little milk may be given at a person's breakfast time, but if milk does not agree with the dog, which is sometimes the case, then a small quantity of fish or bacon fat with bread or biscuit may be given, or even a piece of dry biscuit.

As to kennel dogs, they, for many reasons, are best fed night and morning. The morning is a more convenient time than middle day, and this meal should consist of a small quantity of dry biscuit. Then at night the principal meal should be given, and this is the best time for a good meal,

as the dog usually goes to sleep afterwards, and is quiet, which is a great advantage, especially when one has neighbors. The food should consist of meat about one part and crushed biscuit or Rodnim or Melox two or three parts, and, if the dogs will eat the biscuit or meal dry, so much the better, but if the meat is picked out and the biscuit left, then it must be soaked and mixed up well with the meat. The flesh is best given slightly cooked, but not cooked to death so that all the goodness is lost. When the dogs will take dry biscuit with the meat the fluid in which the meat has been cooked may be thrown away, for there is very little nourishment in it unless the meat has been stewed for hours and

When green vegetables can be obtained, especially in the spring, when a dog's skin is inclined to be somewhat irritable, the addition is an advantage, more particularly for dogs kept in big towns, where they cannot get a supply of grass to eat; but for dogs living out in the country one need not bother so much about green food, as the dogs will eat plenty of grass.

It is not a bad plan for people who keep dogs in cities to grow some corn in big boxes, and when the big green blades show about eight or nine inches high to put it in the exercising yards, so that the dogs can eat it when they feel inclined. This makes a very good substitute for the coarse grass that dogs are so fond of.

It is also a good plan once a week to give a dog's stomach a bit of a rest by feeding him, entirely on dry biscuits. Sunday is the best day, as kennel dogs particularly do not get much exercise then. A change like this is really beneficial, and, besides, it saves the man a lot of work. The next day the dog enjoys his ordinary food all the more.

There are many dogs, especially of the smaller kinds, that are very difficult to feed. They will often refuse the most dainty food, and owners are at their wits' end to know what fresh kind of food to offer. Chicken, which dogs are generally very fond of, does not always digest very easily in the canine stomach. It is rather strange that doctors usually recommend people who have been ill to eat chicken when they commence to take solid food, and if it is given to a dog after an illness it more often than not makes him sick, whereas muiton does not, but a little grilled chicken liver mixed with other food will often tempt the dainty feeder. Grilled melt is often appreciated by bad doers, fish of different kinds, particularly sardines, which may be mixed with rice; sheep brains, too, are also liked, but they are rather relaxing. Dogs are also fond of kidney, and bullock's kidney is not expensive. This is not a food to be given regularly, but only occasionally for a change.

There are lots of dogs who feed well, but do not put on flesh. In such cases

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well-boiled suet pudding mixed with meat or liver, if the appetite is not good, is helpful. It is a very good plan to cut up the raw liver, mix it with the suet pudding, and cook the two together. The liver then flavors the whole pudding. Marrow, either from beef or mutton bone, cooked or raw, and mixed with other food, is very fattening. It is much better than cod liver oil, and dogs prefer it. For small dogs, from half to a teaspoonful may be given twice a day; large dogs may have a tablespoonful twice a day. Stewed rabbit with rice and bread makes excellent food for small dogs, particularly for dainty feeders.

London One Day Dog Show Best Ever Held in the City

Largest Number of Entries, Greater Variety of Dogs, and More Class Than Ever Shown-Quality of **Outside Entries a Striking Feature**

"I don't think there was ever a dog show in London that could show as much class, as good a variety of specimens and as large an entry list as this one," was the opinion expressed by a well-known local dog fancier, when a London newspaper representative asked him, between the bowwows, and the yelps, and the growls at the dog show, what he thought of it all. We thought maybe he was just a little too enthusiastic, but after we had talked with a few more of the canine fanciers, and had been around and viewed all the dogs, from our own point of view, we agreed with him. In fact, we'll go him one better. There never was a dog show held in London that could compare with the one held in the old city hall building. It was complete in every point, every minute detail that goes to make a dog show a success.

Big Crowds Visited It.

The members of the London Canine Association have no cause to regret the time and effort put forth to make this exhibition the best of them all. On the contrary, they feel greatly encouraged over the interest shown by local people, and outsiders as well. From the time the show was opened, at nine o'clock in the morning until it closed at ten o'clock in the evening, hundreds of people visited the exhibition. A large number came from St. Thomas, Strathrov and other nearby points. Everyone was liberal in his praise of the exhibit, the way it was conducted and the class of dogs shown, and there is no doubt now that a mid-winter dog show will be an annual affair in London.

London Leads in Dogs.

In speaking of the show last evening, Mr. W. J. Clarke, a member of the executive of the London Canine Association, told the Advertiser that he didn't think there was any city in the country that could show as good a class of dogs as London. "London leads in chickens and in dogs. About the only inconveniences we have had has been caused by some people wanting to take their dogs out after they have been judged. They forget that the public pays its money to come here and see the dogs, and that they should be left until the show closes."

Judges Had Busy Time.

The judges had a busy time. It was nearly 6 o'clock at night before the last dog had been judged. The prize list was one of the biggest in the association's history. One of the features was the large outside entry: St. Thomas fanciers sent over a splendid bunch of specimens. Messrs. Speight, Short, Cyril Plomley and Mrs. C. W. Waters were among the exhibitors from the Railway City. They donated a trophy for the best dog or bitch bred by the exhibitors. and then displayed a splendid spirit of sportsmanship by refusing to compete for it. One of the most attractive of the St. Thomas entries was Geneva, a Great Dane, with a litter of seven pups. One of these pups is pure white, something never before existing in this breed. If it lives it will be worth a considerable sum. Zebra, of Sudbury, the sire of the litter, is one of the biggest dogs ever seen in London.

Some Outside Entries.

A splendid specimen of Mastiff was that exhibited by Mr. J. W. Prangley, of Strathroy. This dog attracted a great deal of attention for his size. Another Strathroy exhibitor was Mr. A. McLachlan. Peter Bawden, the well-known Ridgetown lawn bowler, was among the outside exhibitors. "Pete" had a fine bunch of Airedales, and he carried off some of the prizes.

Woodstock was represented by Mr. Muller's Pointers, while Mr. Allen, of Bothwell, who has handled some of the best dogs in the country, had some fine Setters.

A Fine Setter.

Probably one of the finest Setters at the show for his age was a ninemonths-old puppy belonging to Mr. W. J. Clark. This dog carried off everything in the novice class, and took second in the other class against a fine exhibit of older specimens. Mr. Clark states that he is one of the finest dogs of this breed he has ever seen, and he intends to show him in New York.

In the Irish Setters' class, Sister Queen, owned by Mr. H. W. Kemp, of London, was prominent. Sister Queen is a prize winner at all the good shows.

In the English Bulldog class, Mr. Ashley Cooper's King Billy took two firsts. King Billy is a fine, rugged specimen that has carried off a bunch of ribbons.

Mike, the Fire Fighter.

Mike, the London fire department's Boston Terrier, was entered by the firemen at the central hall in his class, and they were a proud bunch of fire fighters when they learned that Mike took first and second. Nothing will be too good for that dog when he goes back to the fire hall all decked out in his new laurels.

In the Manchester Terrier class, one of the prettiest breeds of dogs in the whole show, Mr. Mike Morkin's Snipper took two firsts. Snipper is a two-year-old of much promise, and Mr. Morkin will likely show him in Toronto and other places.

It's a Bear.

A feature of the exhibition was a real live bear, the property of Mr. Fred Jackson, London, Bruin is just ten months old, but he is a wise looking cub, and although he cannot reason out just why he should be mixed up in a dog show, he seems to be having a lovely time. He chewed up a perfectly good broom after he had been there only an hour or so,

and then tackled an iron pipe. However, the pipe is still intact. He gave up trying to eat it after a time, and settled down to lick it instead.

The judges of the different classes were as follows: Mr. Marshall Gray-don, English Setters; Mr. C. H. Waters, St. Thomas, Pointers and Poodles; Mr. Geo. Douglas, Woodstock, Cocker Spaniels; Mr. McCarroll, St. Thomas, all other classes.

A Three-Day Show Planned.

The association is at present seriously considering the question of having a mid-winter show under the Canadian Kennel Club rules. This show would last three days. As one of the officers of the local club put it, it's just as much work to prepare a one-day show as a three-day show. Such a show would be the most important held in Western Ontario, and would undoubtedly attract a large


