## NOTES AND COMMENTS

"Prairie" in his notes this month gives us a broad hint that the Dominion Kennel Club is reaching out for control in British Columbia. This was to be expected as the connection with Manitoba, Alberta and Saskatchewan points is, of course, much closer to British Columbia than it is to that of the East.

By the way, are the two governing bodies ever coming together, or are they working to that end?

If three general kennel clubs in Toronto result in the elimination of the regular Eastertide show, we wonder where four or five clubs would land us? Isn't it time we got together? One town, one club, is a good motto. Division leads to disaster. Anyone with open eyes can see it. This applies equally well to the West as to the East, and to the East as to the West. Advancement of the dog should be our united aim.

We are sorry we missed seeing Mr. R. G. Persse, Winnipeg, when he called at the Gazette Office on April 2nd. Better luck next time.

Mr. Persse is one of Winnipeg's influential men who is largely interested in the good of the dog.

Through the courtesy of the Honorary Secretaries of the Calcutta, India, Kennel Club, Messrs. C. W. Atkinson and L. M. Medley, we are in receipt of a copy of the catalogue of the Club's eighth championship dog show held under the India Kennel Club rules, on January 23, 24, 1914. The catalogue is very similar to those that we see on this side of the water, contains, as is usual here, a list of the officers of the Club, the rules under which the show is given, details of the dogs entered, full list of exhibitors with their addresses, and a separate list of the official awards. The book, which to us is of very great interest, in demonstrating the cosmopolitan, world-wide interest taken in dogs, is further embellished by a number of half tones from photographs of several breeds, together with a brief description of the breeds illustrated. For instance let us take the Irish Terrier. An engraving of Ch. Mile End Muddler is used. This is followed by a description of the Irish Terrier and a standard of points. Under the heading of "Uses," it says, "A companion, rabbiting and vermin dog." It gives the origin as "uncertain."

The number of dogs catalogued is 285. Classes in several breeds provided are Open, Limit, Novice, and Puppy. Rather curiously the Indian Kennel Club reverses the order to that in general use in Canada, beginning with open and ending with puppy.

The judges were, Col. S. J. Rennie, Major W. Hesketh, Mr. K. S. Lawrie and Mr. F. W. Harris. The show was given under the patronage of His Excellency, the Governor of Bengal.

The Mount Royal Kennel Club, of Montreal, will give a general show on May 26, 27, 28 and 29, in the Coliseum Building. Mr. Ben Lewis—somehow that "Mister" sounds funny as a Lewis prefix, he is always Ben to us—will judge all classes, and if he doesn't get them right it won't be his fault. Five hundred dollars in cash will be put up, and in addition an unusually large number of cups, medals and other specials. Entries will close on May 12th, the fee being one dollar for each entry.

Mr. Harold Hughes will again act as Secretary and Superintendent of the show. His address is 109 Youville Square, Montreal. Mr. Hughes got his first taste of blood at the last general show, and the three evening shows held under his supervision have all added to his experience, and to his knowledge of what is necessary in the management of an up-to-date dog show.

The Spratts benching formerly owned by Messrs. Thomas and Innes has been purchased by several well-to-do members of the Club, and will be available for this and future shows. The whole output is being thoroughly disinfected.

With no general spring show in Toronto this year, the Queen City fanciers should see that Montreal get a carload or two, just to show them what Toronto dogs are like and to evidence that friendly feeling that should exist between the two cities, even though there may be a healthy rivalry.

We look for big things in Montreal. The city is coming to its own in dogdom, and the promoters of this show are looking with confidence for greater help in entries from outsiders. We hope they may not be disappointed.

The election of officers for 1914 for the Ottawa Kennel Club resulted as follows: President, A. W. Greene; Vice-President, F. C. Taylor; Treasurer, T. A. Armstrong; Secretary, G. M. Tyrell; Executive, Messrs. R. H. Elliott, K. A. Greene, W. J. Newton, J. C. Cox, W. Webber, R. Ronan, F. C. McLean, J. P. Cain, Dr. W. Austin, D. J. McMinn.

The Show Committee of the Club is now considering the matter of judges, and several names have been suggested, any of which should draw a big entry.

The following is the full text of the Reciprocity Agreement arranged between the Kennel Club, England, and the American Kennel Club, and ratified on March 12th, 1914. It affects Canada in so far as the Canadian Kennel Club is affiliated with the Kennel Club, and that any part of the agreement affecting relations between the United States and England, will also affect Canada in the same degree, that is as far as the C.K.C. is concerned. It is



not clear to us that under our laws the black list of one club can be accepted by another without independent trial. This is an old matter of controversy, and one that has not been settled. However, we do not anticipate any trouble arising.

### RECIPROCITY AGREEMENT.

Between The Kennel Club as representing The Kennel Club and the Clubs affiliated with it, and The American Kennel Club as representing the United States of America and its possessions.

The following agreement between The Kennel Club, London, England, and The American Kennel Club, New York City, New York, has been duly approved and ratified, this 12th day of March, 1914.

I. A mutual exchange and recognition of "Black Lists" as they now exist, and any addition or alteration thereto to be at once mutually communicated. (A "Black List" to mean the official communication received by one Club from the other containing the names and addresses of persons who have been either suspended or disqualified under the Rules of "The Kennel Club," or who are not in good standing under the Rules of "The American Kennel Club.")

II. That any desired information of a confidential nature pertaining to the standing or reputation of any person engaged in judging, breeding, or showing dogs, shall be freely exchanged upon request of either Club through the official channel of its Secretary.

III. In order to prevent the granting of Kennel Names, prefixes and affixes, that may be identical with names granted or pending with The Kennel Club, The American Kennel Club agrees that it will not grant any application for a Kennel Name, prefix or affix, that may have been published in each month's issue of "The Kennel Gazette" (English) under the heading "Applications for Prefixes," until after the receipt of the latest number of said Kennel Gazette.

The American Kennel Club further agrees that it will not pass upon or grant any application pending with it before the twentieth day of each month.

IV. That every registered dog imported from the one country to the other must be re-registered in its adopted country in its own name, and in every particular as registered in the country of its birth, and that if its own name be already registered in the country of its adoption by a dog of the same breed, it must still be re-registered in its own name, to be followed by the abbreviation "Eng." or "Am." as the case may be, and that no dog imported from either England or America that has been registered in accordance with this rule can be renamed.

V. That as The American Kennel Club only permits American-bred dogs to compete in its Novice Class, The Kennel Club agrees to frame a regulation prohibiting dogs to compete in any of its Novice or Maiden Classes that have acquired the title of Champion under American Kennel Club Rules.

Mr. Wm. L. Barclay as chairman of the A.K.C. Stud Book Commission, has already made the following pronouncement.

"At a meeting of the Stud Book Committee, held March 9th, 1914, the following ruling with regard to the registration of imported dogs registered in the English or Canadian Stud Book was approved. "No dog which is already registered in the English Kennel Club or Canadian Kennel Club Stud Book shall be registered in the American Kennel Club Stud Book under any other name than that under which it is already so registered, but this rule shall not

prevent the addition of a prefix to the name under which it is registered."

Mr. Frank Trainer, of Winnipeg, is building a kennel to accommodate a number of Scottish Terriers, including Mr. Walter Ellison's "Emigrant" Scotties and his own "Glen Lyons" of the same breed.

Perhaps some Gazette readers will not connect Mr. Fred. Scott, the English Setter breeder, of Winnipeg, with the big fire that occurred in the Scott Block on Main St., on March 24th. Mr. Scott is the owner of this block, which was completely destroyed. Loss amounted to one hundred and fifteen thousand dollars on the structure alone, the total loss on building and contents being a quarter of a million. There were several narrow escapes, but luckily no deaths.

A general meeting of the Canadian Kennel Club has been called by the President for April 30th, at 8 p.m. The special business of this meeting is to consider the revised Constitution, By-Laws and Rules. We presume that final revision will not take place at this meeting so as to give members of the Club outside of Toronto and neighborhood an opportunity of discussing the proposed changes. This would seem to be but fair.

A meeting of the executive of the Club was held on April 2nd, with the President in the chair. In the official report several matters are mentioned, but without detail. The President was authorized under dog show rule twenty-three to suspend Mr. L. Parker, we do not know for what cause. The Secretary was instructed to request Mr. G. A. Hull and Mr. E. D. Adams to reconsider their decision to resign office. The financial report showed the Club to be in a very excellent position, but we are of the opinion that under the heading of liabilities should appear the cost to the Club of Stud Books yet to be published. This item of course is a direct liability. The paid membership for 1914 was four hundred and twelve. The March registrations number one hundred and thirteen. Several new members were elected from different provinces in Canada.

It is with a good deal of regret that we heard of the serious illness of Mrs. Atkinson, wife of Mr. Arthur Atkinson, President of the Toronto Kennel Club, and a helper in everything that means the good of the dog.

**WITH THE SHOWS.** Mr. Dan. Thody writes us that Brandon Show was a great success. He had twenty-six dogs there for his various clients, and made a good winning. The show was well patronized, being crowded all the time from start to finish. It was a three pointer, and was Mr. Thody's first time under Mr. Fletcher's judgment. The exhibitors were so well pleased with Mr. Fletcher's work that, as we said last month, they gave him a banquet in the G. T. P. Hotel, where about seventy-five dog men sat down. After this an adjournment was made to the parlors, where speechifying was indulged in by several of the exhibitors.

Mr. Thody had thirty-two dogs at Moose Jaw, and intended to visit Vancouver and Victoria this month with a big string for the Easter shows in these cities.

A new kennel club has been formed in Edmonton called the Capitol City Kennel Club (Incorporated). We have not been advised of the aims of the new organization, but presume they consist largely of proprietary quality.

The last of the series of three evening shows given by the Mount Royal Kennel Club, Montreal, was far better than the two preceding shows. The attendance was large, the entry heavy, and this little show resulted in a net profit to the Club of some fifty dollars. Mr. Bob Ross, Mr. Thos. Moore and Mr. John Sheehan



were the judges. The prize list elsewhere gives the placing of the dogs, and we must congratulate the M. R. K. C. on the pronounced success of these little Winter shows, which do so much to increase the interest in the various breeds of dogs. They will be continued, and probably further extended, next Winter. Everyone in Montreal is now getting ready for the big show to be held next month, and which we refer to in detail under heading of Notes and Comments.

The Toronto Kennel Club evening show of March 24th, made the third of the series of four on the programme for the Winter and Spring of 1913-14, and it was a success. On April 28th the final judging of the winners in each breed will be made for the respective trophies, and they are many. Everyone, whether a member of the Club or not, is invited to attend this show and see the dogs judged. Members have the privilege of reduced entry fees, and Secretary Mumford tells us that his list is not yet nearly full. Local breeders and outsiders are all invited to join.

Winnipeg dogs did a good deal of winning at the St. Paul Show, where they were handled by Mr. Fletcher, who brought back with him over two hundred dollars in cash, besides many valuable specials. The winnings of the Winnipeg dogs are given elsewhere in this issue.

From what we can hear from the Toronto contingent the Genesee Valley Kennel Club, Rochester, gave visitors a right royal time. They practically owned the town during the time of the show.

**SPANIELDOM.** Probably none but some of the old timers will connect the death of C. T. Mead, Toronto, which occurred a week or two back, with one of the greatest kennels of Field Spaniels that ever existed in Toronto.

"Charlie" Mead was one of the largest exhibitors of Field Spaniels when the breed meant something, and he imported several of high quality. Amongst familiar names of dogs he owned was Napoleon II., Sampson, Woollton Wonder, Woollton Ebony, Woollton Dagman and others. This was in Geo. Bell's time when it was no unusual sight to see from twelve to twenty Field Spaniels of the highest quality exhibited at Toronto. We can now almost count them in the Dodo class.

The late Mr. Mead was a comparatively young man, about sixty years of age. He had been under the Doctor's care for some time. We do not think he owned any dogs at the time of his demise.

In the Moose Jaw catalogue the name of Mr. Harry Nash's splendid Irish Water Spaniel is given as Ballywater Mark, instead of Ballywater Mike. We are asked to make this correction, and glad to do so. Mike has been winners many times, and is as good as, or better than, he ever was.

At the dinner held by the Cocker Spaniel Club during Westminster Kennel Club Show, New York, Mr. Lance Farewell and Dr. C. Y. Ford were present from Canada. We hear they had a right good time under the tooling of Mr. A. C. Wilmerding, whom we have not seen in Canada for some years, and others.

After the following from Field and Fancy, we fear that our bright, weekly confrere will need a spring rejuvenator. Perhaps an overheated system requires "Lance"-ing.

B. C. Cocker breeders will regret to hear of the death of Mr. David P. Creswell, of San Francisco, who died suddenly last month.

Mr. Creswell's name was a familiar one in Cocker Spaniel circles on the Coast, where he was held in very high esteem.

**BULLACITY.** Mr. F. C. Mahon accompanied Mr. Thody, as a pleasure trip, to Brandon, where he had the pleasure of seeing his champion Bull bitch, Ch. Trafford Bullacity, take the grand champion prize for best dog in show. And, by the way, the winner was also an Edmonton dog, the Russian Wolfhound Ch. Genest, owned by Dr. Reid.

We had a chat with Mr. Bert Swann the other day, when we had from him some details as to the death of Homewood Jumbo, reported in last issue. The dog did not die while en route from Boston to New York, but succumbed while at the Boston Show, so that there can be no question whatever as to the cause of his death. Homewood Jumbo, after being exercised at Boston, sought of his own accord the large crate of one of Mr. Swann's St. Bernards. Here he was closed up for the night, and was found dead on opening the crate in the morning. His death was evidently quite painless.

By the way, Mr. Swann is on the lookout for a moderate price Bull bitch or two in whelp.

Mr. John Sheehan, who can talk Bulldog till the cows come home, is congratulating himself on the nice litter by Kildare Baron, that is by Rockaway. The dam is by Moston Commission. There are four in the litter, which look most promising.

The Easter Friday Specialty Show, given under the auspices of the Bulldog Breeders' Association of Canada, may be put down as a most pronounced success for an initial event. Sixty-one dogs were entered, and if anyone had told us ten years ago, or less, that there were sixty-one Bulldogs in Canada we would have laughed him to scorn.

The show was held on two floors of a store on Church St., Toronto, the dogs being benched on the lower floor, with the judging ring on the one above. The judging was begun at noon by Mr. J. B. Dale, of Petrolia, Ont., who officiated, finishing his classes, including specials, before six o'clock. Our regular report gives the standing of the various entries and leaves little for us to say. There were one or two reversals which would go to show that the judge was not averse to correcting an error when he was of the opinion that he had made one, or perhaps, as is frequently the case, the "under dog" got up a little extra steam and a more winning attitude. The show was open to the public, and the ring at all times was surrounded by an interested coterie of Bulldog fanciers, and other dog men who like the Bulldog simply because he is a dog, and whose fancy runs in other directions. The officers of the Club are as follows:

President, Geo. R. Farquharson; 1st Vice-President, H. Bailey; 2nd Vice-President, Bert Swann. Show Committee and Executive: C. Kordell, H. Preston, H. T. Bailey, H. Schumacher, H. A. Wilson, J. E. Dowling, Bert Swann, H. Rann, H. Ryder. Secretary-Treasurer, H. A. Wilson. The Show Secretary was Mr. Joe Perkins, who had things in good order. He kept the ring well supplied. Several outside fanciers were present, including Mr. A. A. Lees and Mr. Colvin of Hamilton, Mr. McKellar, Mr. Wilson and Mr. Meadows, Oakville; Mr. E. P. Hinds, who was considerably under the weather, of Niagara Falls, N.Y.; Mr. Jas. McComb, of Oshawa, Dr. C. Wilson, of Parkhill, and others. There were 31 exhibitors.

In view of the fact that Mr. Hinds showed such a good son of the Little Nipper, formerly owned by Mr. H. L. Thomas, Montreal, in Ashland Little Nipper, it will be of interest to know that poor old "Nipper" went to his reward a little while ago, passing away painlessly in his sleep. The Little Nipper was one of our very best Bulldogs when he came out first and was successful as a sire and as a winner.



Our report is by Mr. H. T. Bailey, who has himself occasionally donned the judge's robes and is the owner of the famous Radiant Stone, a son of Rival Stone. Radiant Stone is a fifty-three pound dog whose services are now offered breeders through Gazette. A glance at his pedigree will show how classical he is bred.

By the way, Mr. Hinds has booked three bitches to the twice New York winner, Strathray Prince Albert. In Mr. Hinds' opinion, and he is backing his opinion by using the dog, he is positively the best Bulldog that we have. What his ability is as a sire the future will tell.

**TERRIERS.** It came as a surprise to us that Mr. Perkins had parted with that excellent Wire Terrier, Ch. Hawes Broom. We learn that the dog is now owned in Montreal, where he should do much good to the breed. His new owners are Messrs. Aikin & Silver. Mr. Aikin has already Dachshunde, and Mr. Silver is an old time Bull Terrier man, who had some good ones when Sidney Britcher was showing the right stuff in the city around the mountain. We congratulate "Broom's" new owners on the possession of such a splendid specimen of a Wire Fox Terrier.

Mr. Finley has bred a good bitch to Mr. Joe. Meehan's imported Irish Terrier, Kilbarron Statesman. Mr. Meehan's best bitch of the same breed is also in whelp to the same dog, and a whisper has reached us that he is nibbling for matrons here and there, both across the line and across the water.

The Gazette did it again. Rev. Lawrence B. Henn, Vanscoy, Sask., advertised two Airedale bitches in February issue. He now reports that both have been sold through his advertisement in Gazette. Woodbine Nell, who was a winner at the recent Western Canada Show, has been purchased by Constable H. F. Morren, R. N.W.M.P., Estevan, Sask. Woodbine Vesta came east to Mr. John C. McCann, Doon, Ont., who has just taken up the Airedale cult and is very well satisfied with his first purchase.

We are glad to be able to prefix the magic word "Champion" to Mr. J. A. McGlynn's Boston stud dog, McGlynn's Sensation. Business has been active in this kennel, and the visiting matrons have been many. In fact the kennel has not been without one or more during the present year. Matrons have been shipped from as far east as Ontario, and as far west as British Columbia, for which Mr. McGlynn says, "I thank your grand paper, the Canadian Kennel Gazette." So we must take it that the old Gazette is doing good work for some of its advertisers. The only kind of advertising that is efficient is that that is persistent.

A puppy from this kennel won Puppy and Novice at the W. C. K. C. Show held in Winnipeg in February. A real good one by Ch. Sensation, about four months old, has gone to a fancier in St. Paul. Another to Mr. Strome, N.D. Some little time ago a very nice eight months bitch went to Mr. D. E. Rogers, of Winnipeg, and a really nice brood bitch to Mrs. C. C. Bonniecastle, Victoria, B.C. This bitch is dam of the best puppy mentioned above, that is, the one winning last February in Winnipeg.

Mr. McGlynn assures us that the Boston Terrier has taken a firm grip in the West, and a grip that it is going to hold too.

In last issue of Gazette Mr. Sid Perkins, of the Rockley Kennels, Toronto, was kind enough to give us a very gratifying testimonial as to the pulling qualities of the Canadian Kennel Gazette as a seller of dogs. He now tells us that the bitch he advertised in whelp to Birchcliffe Nailer was claimed by no less than seven of those who saw his advertisement in Gazette, but of course only one could have her. He also sold something like fifty Airedale puppies of different ages, so that most decidedly the interest in the Airedale is not abating to any degree.

By the way, a bit of rather surprising news we have this month is that Mr. Bain has disposed of his famous Airedale, Birchcliffe Nailer, to a gentleman in Guelph.

Those who are looking for good Airedales should not overlook the ad of Mr. Harry Clayton in this issue. Buster Briar is a frequent winner, the price is one hundred dollars, while Silver Birch Charm, a litter sister to Rockley Logical Point, in whelp to Buster Briar, is offered for just half this money, and she is a bargain at the price. Mr. Clayton needs the room or else he would not dispose of them.

Terrier turnovers keep active with Mr. Sam Bamford. He has three now coming out from England, two Fox Terriers, and an Airedale. Also three are coming from the United States, and good ones too. The half dozen are for clients of Mr. Bamford's.

Mr. Joe Perkins recently bought three wire Fox Terriers on the other side, one of which, Leeds Waltz Beam, promptly won a medal for best Fox Terrier in the show at St. Paul, handled by Mr. Alf. Delmont. Mr. Perkins has in view the importation from England of another wire dog to take the place of Ch. Hawes Broom.

Mr. E. W. Mermagen's, Winnipeg, imported Irish Terrier, Seven Oaks Playboy, recently attained his championship, and is now entitled to use the prefix that all dog men are aiming for. At the recent St. Paul show he was placed third to Leeds Historical and Vicary Demon. In the near future we hope to show on the front page of Gazette what Playboy looks like.

At a recent meeting of the Irish Terrier Club of America it was decided to hold an Irish Terrier specialty show in connection with the Terrier Show to be held in Philadelphia on June 6th. Mr. W. P. Walcott will judge the Irish Brigade.

If we were in the prophecy business we would forecast an Airedale specialty show on July 1st at the Exhibition Grounds, Toronto. Nice time for a one-day open-air event.

We are sorry to hear of the death of Sabine Racer, Mr. E. Bailey's, of Kingsville, useful smooth Fox Terrier. While a bit on the big side, he had both quality and character which helped him to do considerable winning.

Mr. W. P. Fraser told us some time ago that he expected Mr. W. L. McCandlish, who came across the water to judge Scottish Terriers at New York, would pay a visit to Toronto. Being absent from the city we did not meet Mr. McCandlish, but we know that his all too brief visit was made pleasant for him.

The addition of the famous Bull Terrier, Ch. Sound End Sombrero, to Mr. Nordheimer's Glenedyth Kennels rounds out a remarkable aggregation of the white coats. Sombrero was winners at New York in 1913; at Boston, Newark, Chicago and Rochester in 1914, and was best of all breeds at Canton, Ohio. We welcome this kennel, which has become famous in such a short time, to the pages of Gazette, and note that in addition to the several stud dogs offered at very moderate fees a number of puppies can be secured at reasonable prices.

Reference to last month's issue will show in our New York report what Mr. Humphrey Elliott thinks of Glenedyth Imperator. In Mr. Elliott's opinion he is the dog of the future, and he should know.

In reporting on Airedales at New York Show we omitted to mention a very creditable performance by Mr. Bingham's Ragged Mr. Bub, who got into the letters in a very strong class. This, after having just recovered from distemper contracted at the Joint Terrier Show.



The Airedale Terrier Club of Canada intend holding an open show at an early date. We hope all hands will rally to the cause and give the Airedale the fillip he so richly deserves. Now is the time to get your entries ready.

Another sale we have to record at Rochester Show was that of the Airedale bitch Bothwell Peggy, a sister to Ch. Bothwell Sorceress. She won her class, beating winners of previous classes, and was promptly secured by H. Dudley-Waters for Mr. H. Clayton. She is by Ch. Soudan Swiveller ex. Champion Kenmare Sorceress (reputed to be the best Airedale Terrier living). Mr. Clayton intends mating her to Clonmel Master Crack. This should satisfy the veriest glutton for blood. We congratulate the lucky owner and wish him the best of luck.

The Airedale, Vicary Footlights, who ran second to Ch. Bingley Blossom at New York Show, and who won such favorable comment, is by Clonmel Master Crack.

**COLLIEDOM.** The Weston Collie Kennels, Winnipeg, have just made another noted sale, that grand young Collie bitch, Ch. Weston All Quality, going to a Toronto fancier, Mr. J. D. Strachan. Weston All Quality has been frequently shown and is a big winner, having cleared the boards at Toronto, Lethbridge and Winnipeg, winning her championship before she was thirteen months old. All Quality also took res. winners at Fargo, N.D., Edmonton, Fort William and Winnipeg. We understand she is to be mated to Parbold Picador, so that if Mr. Strachan's ambition is realized he should not only have a litter of winners, but add considerable fame to Toronto Collie circles.

Col. Robert McEwen, of Byron, has several choicely bred bitches safely in whelp to Holyrood Marquis. He also has a good litter by the same dog out of a Parbold Proclamation dam that he is counting on to supply some future winners, and Col. McEwen is generally able to pick them out early. He says the Chicago Dog Show had just a fair entry, with some good Collies.

**TOYLAND.** In February Canadian Kennel Gazette we had something to say about the petition presented to the Canadian National Exhibition, requesting that all Toys be judged not later than the second day of the show. Mr. Donovan is now in receipt of a letter from Mr. Fred. W. Jacobi, Superintendent of the show, where under date of April 6th he very kindly says that he will use every effort to have the Toy dogs judged not later than the second day. With the Superintendent's assistance, we surmise that we can look on the matter as being as good as settled.

Mr. W. G. Gray, of Sault Ste. Marie, has just imported a brace of Toy Black and Tan Terriers from England—the best that he could buy. The weight of the dog is four pounds, that of the bitch six pounds. They are a sound black with rich tan, well pencilled, and with good thumb marks. The bitch was bred before leaving the Old Country.

Mr. Gray begins advertising in this issue to tell Gazette readers something about them. He is offering at stud Fagley Atom, the four pound Black and Tan Toy, and also the Yorkshire, Bloomfield Laddie, a three and a half pound dog. His imported Yorkshire bitch is nursing two dog puppies by Laddie, and both look remarkably promising.

Since writing the above paragraph, we are sorry to report that Mr. Gray has had the misfortune to lose the Toy Black and Tan Terrier bitch imported, but is having another sent out, and she will, it is expected, arrive in Canada almost immediately. We

sincerely hope that he will have better luck with this specimen, of what we consider, a most delicate breed.

The petition of the Toy Dog Club of Canada to the Canadian National Exhibition Dog Show, that the judging of Toys be completed not later than the second day of the show, has been sent by registered mail to Mr. F. W. Jacobi, Superintendent. We give in the following the full text of the petition with signatures attached, and Mr. Donovan's letter to Mr. Jacobi accompanying same. We have no doubt whatever but that the Canadian National Exhibition, with its usual courtesy, will agree to this request.

Mr. A. E. Field-Marshall, of Beamsville, Ont., reports a very curious case in connection with his kennel of Poms. One of his Pom. bitches recently gave birth to a freak puppy. It has no tail and shows the organs of both sexes. He asks us if this is not very unusual. It certainly is, and we should be glad to know if the puppy was born alive.

There were one hundred and eight Poms. at the Glasgow Show held in March, Sables and Blacks being in the majority, Browns and Chocolates were comparatively few. This doesn't look as though the Pom. was declining in popularity, despite the advent of the Pekinese and other Toys in their hundreds.

It is now proposed in England to hold a show exclusively devoted to Pugs, a breed in which there appears to be a considerable revival of interest.

Mrs. Gruenwald's, Montreal, importation of Poms. from Mrs. Williams, Aberdare, South Wales, proved a rather unfortunate investment. The dogs were shipped on a slow boat, and at least one succumbed on the way over, while the others arrived in wretched condition. The shipment consisted of four: two Black dogs, one Black bitch and one Sable bitch. Several litters of Pom. babies are reported in this kennel.



The same kennel sent out to Mrs. Peter Herd a Black show and stud dog, Aberdare Star, that has since been successfully shown under the name of Kelvinside Star, and an Orange bitch shown in Canada as Kelvinside Sable Girl.

We have been asked to publish the Standard of Points for Toy Spaniels, and print herewith the Standard adopted by the Toy Spaniel Club of England at a special general meeting held about one year ago.

#### Description and Standard of Points.

10. SKULL—Massive in comparison to size, well domed and full over the eyes.
10. EYES—Very large, and dark, set wide apart, with eyelids black and square to face line, and with pleasing expression.
10. NOSE—Black, with large, wide open nostrils, very short and turned up to meet skull.  
The stop between skull and nose should be well defined.
10. JAW—Muzzle square, wide and deep, and well turned up, lower jaw wide, lips exactly meeting, giving a nice finish. The cheeks should not fall away under the eyes, but be well cushioned up. A protruding tongue is objectionable, but does not disqualify.
10. EARS—Set on low and to hang quite flat to cheeks, very long and well feathered.
5. SIZE—The most desirable size is from 8 to 10 lbs.
15. SHAPE—Compact and cobby, on refined lines, chest wide and deep, legs short and straight, back short and level. Tail well flagged and not carried over the level of back.
15. MOVEMENT—Free, active and elegant.
10. COAT—Long, silky and straight, a slight wave allowed, not curly. The legs, ears and tail should be profusely feathered.
5. COLOR—King Charles—A rich glossy black, with bright mahogany tan markings on muzzle, legs, chest, lining of ears, under tail, and spots over eyes. Tri-color—A ground of pearly white, with well distributed black patches, brilliant tan markings, lining ears, under tail, and spots over the eyes. A wide, white blaze between the eyes and up the forehead. Blenheim—A ground of pearly white, with well distributed chestnut red patches. A wide, clear blaze, with the "spot" in centre of skull. The Spot.—A clear chestnut mark about the size of a sixpence in the centre of skull. Ruby.—Whole colored. A rich chestnut red.

Disqualification.—The presence of a few white hairs on the chest of a Black and Tan or Ruby is undesirable, but a white patch shall disqualify.

In last issue we mentioned that the French Bull bitch, Marquise De Maintenon, owned by Mr. Bertie, of St. Jerome, P.Q., had been mated to the Prospect Heights Kennels' La Sauterne. We now hear that the result of the mating is five beautiful puppies of the very best quality. All have screw tails and very short noses. Very naturally Mr. Bertie is extremely pleased at the result of the Marquise's thousand mile trip.

As Gazette readers will know, we are not an advocate of the keeping of Toys under unnatural, artificial conditions. We have more than once commented on the hardness of the Pom., specimens of which breed we have seen frisky and full of life on Toronto and Montreal street, when it was anywhere from ten above to ten below zero. We are sustained in our views by the following paragraphs from the Illustrated Kennel News, but with our climate a little artificial heat is necessary in some seasons, more specially at night.

"Are we keeping our Pekingese under conditions which are too artificial? is a question that will soon have to be generally discussed. Certainly we hear this spring of a great number of barren bitches, a result which may easily be attributed to the physical decadence of sires, who are 'coddled' unduly.

"The Pekingese is by no means the weakly breed he is generally supposed to be, and can stand almost as much cold as a Terrier if he has never been kept in heated kennels. We know of one kennel, which has had its share of breeding success, where many of the dogs have never seen a fire in their lives.

"The enervating influence of artificial heat even upon human beings is well known, and it is more than probable that a number of the disappointments we hear of are the direct result of lowered constitutions, the result of the artificial conditions under which many dogs are kept."

**ST. BERNARDS.** Mr. Frank E. Stuart, of Montreal, gives us a chatty letter on the "Saints," which we print in full as sent us. Mr. Stuart touches on a new phase of the St. Bernard cult in his reference to the production of sleigh, or sledge, dogs. It will be interesting to watch its development.

"St. Bernards keep moving, as you probably know it is very rarely I have done much advertising, and I get any amount of enquiries. I sold Robert The Bruce to Mr. Kountze, of Kountze Bros., Bankers, New York. Mrs. Lee made an offer for him, but not enough. I also sold the same party a male puppy by Clove Valley Duke and Hellgate Thankful and brought home a sister of this puppy to raise. The sire has the blood and the same short head of the old Canadian dog, Ch. Duke of Watford, very much the best blood that ever went out of Canada. I tried to buy another of same litter (the best), but though only seven weeks, \$100 was no use. The bitch will do me anyway.

"Since New York I received a cheque for a puppy by Beethoven from a party which you kindly recommended, Mr. J. F. Harris, of Cardinal. I sold another to Mr. Douglas T. Taylor, Treasurer Dominion Brokerage Co., of Quebec City, and another to Mr. A. J. McDougall, Finch, Ont., and still another to Mr. J. B. Bergeron, La Tuque, Que. The latter is to be used in the business you are in. It seems they use a lot of dogs for driving around to mark and measure the piles of lumber and pulp wood, and this pup goes down where the Laurentide Paper Co. do business. It seems a distemper epidemic took off about fifty dogs last year. The Laurentide people use about a dozen, and Mr. Bergeron figures on raising sleigh dogs from the bitch he purchased. Another order I have is for a puppy to go to Mrs. W. F. Davies, Waterbury, Vermont; another puppy to Mr. Ernest George, Saranac Lake, N.Y.

"Mr. G. R. Wincott, Glen Ewen, Sask., and myself, are now corresponding with a view of bringing on one of his bitches, Glenora, by Agawa Bruce and Lady Marmion (another of Ch. Marmion's progeny), and breeding her on shares to Beethoven. In fact the bitch is now here, although the deal is not yet settled, and she has been mated. This should be a good mating as the bitch has great size and bone. Though only ten months old she is bigger than any bitch I have.

"Mr. Dolan showed a grand bitch puppy, twelve months old, at the last monthly, a sister to Robert The Bruce. She has a capital head, lots of wrinkle and a very fine body, is sound and straight, grand type, so she should do a lot of winning."

Surprising how a little publicity helps a breed.

The loss of the Champion St. Bernard, Viola of Parkdale, a half sister to Ch. Agawa Duke, is one that will be felt in Canada. She was one of those matrons that proved herself able to bring forth winners. She died whelping to Alta the King, and her four puppies, splendid, big headed ones, died with her.

We hear that Mr. Frank Stuart, of Montreal, has sold his winning puppy, Robert the Bruce, the youngster that created such a good impression at the National Live Stock Show in Toronto in November.

C., kennel matters in the three Prairie Provinces are now under one governing body, and everything points to a busy summer season. Calgary opens the season on June 30th, July 1st and 2nd, and this should be a bumper show. The new ones will meet here for the first time, and it will be a good chance for a tryout. The Canadian Industrial,

Exhibition rates are given which means a single rate to, and back free from the show, otherwise it is single rate each way. I think if the management of the Vancouver Exhibition Association would line up Calgary, Edmonton and Winnipeg, they would get a car quite handily. In fact, between these three cities, Moose Jaw, Lethbridge and Medicine Hat, I doubt if one car would provide sufficient space. Start the car at Winnipeg and arrange for a stop over for "pick ups" to Calgary. Make a day

a good "old Terrier," and "Bill" looks as if he had a few more shows in him yet.

There are always a few chances to crawl when you find yourself in a corner, but when one goes home with a strange scarf in his valise, and his wife unpacks the valise, it is time his "think tank" started to unload. It does not help any to state "that you do not know how it got there." That makes it worse. It was a "love-ly scarf."

The show game has its humorous side as well as its up and downs. Watch the novice showing his Greyhound. He holds its tail up like a Pointer. He saw Jack Fletcher do it in the Pointer class. This is the force of example. I overheard one man tell another coming into the ring for the Bulldog classes, "Sit on that dog's back, he's too long." I guess Mr. Cranfield heard it also, for the handler never got a chance to sit long. I like to see the "Bulldog King" with Pilot, and "Bob" Cowan with Peggy in the ring, and the judge going after them "to show their dog." Both look as if they were not afraid to lay down and go to sleep beside hard work, and I always try to get the judge to give them a good "work out." The exhibitor that did not win or who lost his dog six weeks after the show, found consolation in "that is D. K. C. Rules for you."

Alex. Cheyne, Secretary of the Moose Jaw Club, was in Winnipeg on the 16th, lining up the entry from here. His trip must have been a successful one as the car is leaving for Moose Jaw this afternoon, and I understand has over sixty dogs on board, in charge of Messrs. Fletcher and Kynoch.

Bert Finch and Mrs. Finch, of Edmonton, were in the city on the 20th on their way to England. He has some twenty commissions for dogs of various breeds, so that the Western shows will no doubt see some new faces this coming year. They expect to return about October.

In all seriousness and after giving the matter due and careful consideration, "Yorkie" Wilson and "Scottie" Kynoch have decided to go to work. A meeting will be held in the near future to decide on when this important step is to be taken, but both wish it distinctly understood that this is no idle jest.

Dr. M. C. O'Brien has uncovered another Russian Wolfhound. It turns out to be one that he had lost some two years ago. The Doctor thinks a lot of him and considers him a better one than either Odin or Genest ever were. This is pretty stiff talk. I saw this new dog to-day and he is a big one with lots of bone, long, lean head and with a wonderful depth of brisket. Would like to see him ranged up alongside either of the other dogs before making any comparisons.

The Winnipeg Whippet men are getting busy for a big year. A meeting was held last week for the purpose of considering a programme for the coming season, and I understand that the fixtures of this club will be announced shortly.

The coming year promises to be the greatest in the history of Amateur Field Trials. In conversation with "Dug" McKay, the popular secretary of the Western Canada Amateur Field Trial Club, he told me that they expect not less than seventy entries. The Manitoba Field Trials (which are professional) will not be held this year, as an effort will be made to get the Amateur Trials well started. I think this a good plan, as the latter will no doubt be a runner up for the professional trials in the future.

Mr. J. Warren, who promoted the Wheat City Kennel Club Show, the first week of March, passed through Winnipeg on his way to Chicago on the 16th inst. I understand that he intends remaining in Chicago. His recent Collie importation, Caulderbank Conqueror, will be shown at St. Paul Show, and then shipped to Chicago.

Clare Moore, of Winnipeg, regrets the loss of his Newfoundland dog, Tyke, which died recently of acute indigestion. He was about as good a specimen of this breed as I have seen for some years, and he will be missed at future fixtures.

Mr. Wm. McCall reports the death of his Clumber bitch, Hemstead Doll, which he recently imported from England. This is the bitch that Mr. Cranfield put over the same owner's sterling good dog, Ch. Riverton Ronald, for best specimen. I could not see it at the time, and was rather surprised at the owner taking sides in favor of the decision. He has since acknowledged that he considered Ronald as being the best.

Ed. Bissett has had exceptional hard luck with his puppies, losing Capt. R., Capt. Rap, and a litter out of Girlie Cash. Winnipeg Winters are too hard on winter puppies, unless artificial heat is supplied.

W. J. Jackson, of Hamilton, sent the Prairie Kennels a Black Cocker bitch, and a few days after her arrival she whelped six good, strong puppies by Ch. Durbar. There should be something good in this bunch.

One of our prominent Pointer men has the grappling irons out for a good dog. He has turned down some pretty good ones in answer to his enquiries, as not being good enough. I hope he will come out Vic-tor-ious.

The first Annual Stud Book of the Dominion Kennel Club is now being prepared and will go to the printer after the first of the month. Registrations have already reached nearly the eight hundred mark, and the executive

Winnipeg, follows about ten days after and the Winnipeg boys have warned Dr. Bell to increase his benching accommodation. Edmonton comes next in August, and the manager, Mr. Stark, can always count on a good entry. Both Calgary and Winnipeg are large contributors to this show, and the local following is a big one. I would figure that both Calgary and Winnipeg should bench at least 500 dogs at their next shows, and Edmonton go close to 450. Lethbridge and Medicine Hat will each follow, the latter having only to arrange the question of a suitable building before announcing dates. Regina will also give a show this summer so that this makes six fixtures in sight at the present. I hear of two others being talked of, but these will hardly be held before September. It seems to me that Vancouver might do well in considering an exchange of entries. The carload question is a possibility, and could no doubt be worked out. Owing to the classification of freight

I am more than pleased to report that "Billy" Village is around again. He has been confined to the hospital for some time, and underwent an operation for appendicitis. To listen to Bill's experiences would make your hair stand up, but it is hard to kill



think this a good showing for the first year.

The President of the Dominion Kennel Club, Mr. J. H. Holman, is spending the Winter in California, and will return in May in time for the annual meeting.

The two local kennel clubs of Brandon have reached an understanding as to kennel matters in that city. The Brandon Kennel Club will attend to the Field Trial end of it while the Wheat City Kennel Club will look after the bench shows. This I think a good arrangement, as two local clubs with the same end in view can hardly hope to succeed in any city. Brandon will hold Field Trials the latter part of August.

It is reported that the Weston Collie Kennels have sold the bitch, Ch. Weston All Quality, and that she will now figure in one of the eastern kennels.

I also hear that the Corona Kennels have disposed of that promising puppy, Corona Curfew, and that his next appearance will be at St. Paul. This puppy got reserve winners to Corona Commander at the Western Canada Show in February. Only a seven months puppy, but he showed the class. I wonder what these kennels have up their sleeves now. I heard of a good bitch puppy, litter sister to this Curfew dog. If she has improved, as I would expect her to, since I saw her at three months, she will look after some of the shows.

#### WINNIPEG SHOW.

At a meeting of the dog show committee in connection with the Canadian Industrial Exhibition, Winnipeg, the list for the coming show was revised and several changes adopted. These changes and additions were based upon the showing of last year and the number of entries made. There is always the rule which empowers the judge to divide a class as to sex, where there are six entries of one sex, so that it is simply up to

the exhibitor to have added classes for his breed. Mastiffs and St. Bernards were left as last year. The open classes in Great Danes were combined and to read "open dogs and bitches." Newfoundlands and Russian Wolfhounds were not altered. The novice and limit classes were cut out of Irish Wolfhounds, as this breed did not turn out an entry last year. Bloodhounds, Greyhounds, All Setters, Dalmatians, Irish Water Spaniels, Retrievers, Field Spaniels, Clumbers, Bulldogs, French Bulldogs, W. H. Fox Terriers, Bostons, Dachshunde, Manchester, Bedlington, Skye, Welsh, West Highland White, Pugs, Pomeranians, Toy Poodles, Japanese Spaniels, English Toy Spaniels, Pekingese, Schipperkes, Chow Chows, all remain the same. Limit class was struck out of Deerhounds. Foxhounds to read "open dogs and bitches." Pointers are to be divided in the limit class as to weight and fifty pounds was suggested as the division. Some of the committee thought 55 would be better, but this will be decided later. Puppy dogs and bitches were added to Chesapeake Bay. In novice and open classes in Cockers, dogs and bitches any other solid color than black and parti-colored will go together. The puppy classes in Collies will be divided "puppy dogs over six months and under nine months" and "puppy dogs nine months and under twelve months." Puppy bitches the same. The novice class in Old English Sheepdogs was cut out. Beagles drew an addition in novice dogs and bitches. In Smooth Fox Terriers "puppy bitches" was cancelled, and it will now read "puppy dogs and bitches." In Airedales "puppy dogs and bitches" will now read "puppy dogs" and "puppy bitches." Two classes were cut out of Bull Terriers, and the sexes were combined in novice and limit. Novice dogs and bitches is added to Scottish Terriers, and the open class is combined. The same in Yorkshires. Limit dogs and bitches is added to Whippets. Novice dogs and bitches is added to Italian Greyhounds, and the open class combined as to sex, and provincial dogs and bitches added. Classes added for Samoyedes.

Messrs Tom Milner, Walker and Guarnera waited upon the committee on behalf of the Dominion Collie Club, presenting a request from that club for a Collie specialist as one of the judges.

A selection of judges will be made later.

Is the formation of more than one local kennel club in any one city a wise course for local fanciers to adopt? I should say no. While each club may be fortunate enough to succeed and come out financially at the right end, yet, how much greater the success would be if the efforts were combined. The new club is generally formed through a personal grievance, such as the disappointment of some office seeker, the loss of some award at the show, or possibly through the action of some over zealous officer of

the club. Are any of these of such great importance, or is there no other remedy but to form a new club? The disappointed office seeker has another chance at the next annual meeting. The man that did not win can find plenty of opportunity to get another opinion, and an officer that is not acting in the best interests of the club can have his "comb cut" at the next annual meeting. There is not sufficient in this game for any of us to lose our friends, but a lot of the trouble could be smoothed over, if the club's executive would only carry out what they are elected to do and endeavor "to promote harmony and good feeling amongst its members." There is not a city in Canada that can support more than one local kennel club as a club should be. This does not include specialty clubs which can be made to be the "runners up" for the big event. You do not find two baseball franchises for the same league in any one city. A club formed through personal grievances can never hope to succeed, as in such a case it is merely the satisfying of personal interests, and the good of the fancy as a whole is not being considered. To improve the game we must be prepared to make a few sacrifices and not get our backs up every time we don't get our own way. We cannot all think alike, nor do we see through the same eyes, but experience can often be gained by trying different plans, and from which we can finally pick out the best. Give and take a little, and do not try and make it all take.

The action of the American Kennel Club in cancelling some of the wins at Fargo because the entry was made in the name of the kennel, and the kennel name was not registered with them, should be a warning to some of our exhibitors. This is an old rule and one that has been adopted by all governing bodies. While the D.K.C. have not been pressing this rule in the past, yet it appears in their show rules. I think a broader view should be taken, as after all it is the dog that wins the award, and not the name that it is entered in. It might be enforced so far as to protect the exhibitor who has registered a prefix or kennel name, against some other exhibitor using it, and in such case cancel the wins, but otherwise it looks like an effort to grab an additional fee for the registration of the name. Make it a rule that the first applying for any prefix, etc., should get the right, regardless of how long anyone else had used it and dodged the application for it and the payment of the fee.

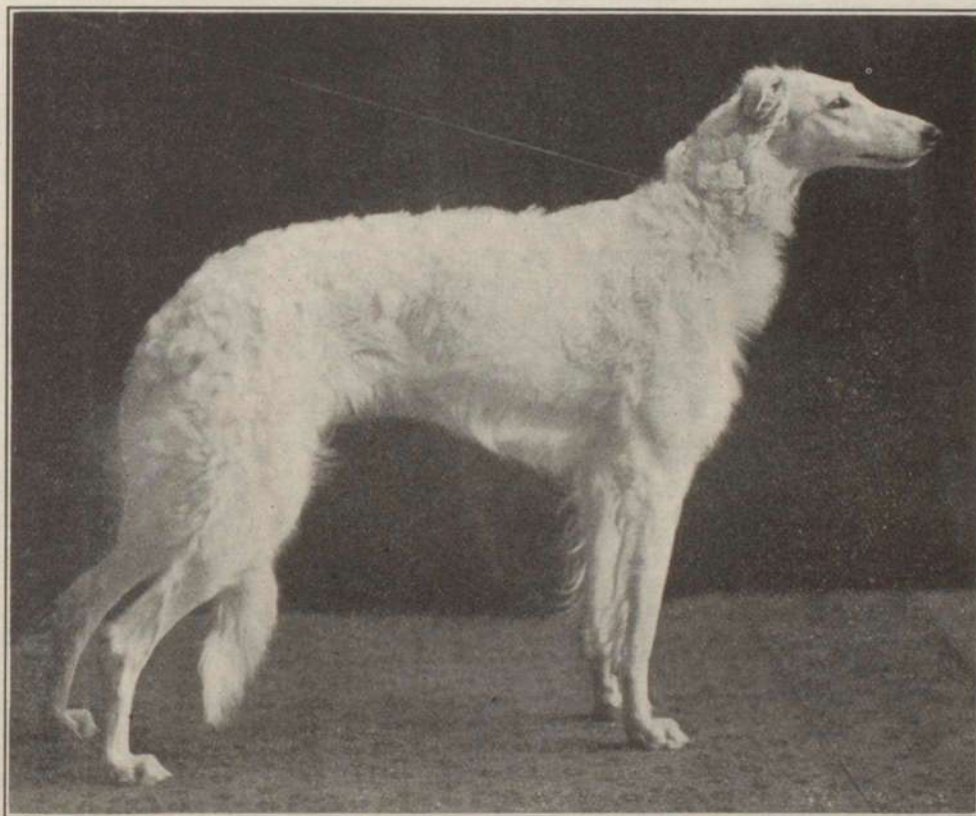

Dale, of Petrolia, and gladdened the hearts of the show officials. The show was a good one with a rather bigger entry than was expected. The only drawback was the inadequate building. Mr. Wilson, Mr. Jos. Perkins and a few other enthusiastic members of the Association kept things going. Competition was keen in most classes and Mr. Dale handled them in a capable manner. Moston Marshall, the winning dog, took the special for best in show, with the winning bitch, Cheetham Countess, best of opposite sex. The special for the best puppy went to the winning dog puppy, Pentland Clansman. The judging was through in good time. It lasted all afternoon and kept up the interest, but there was no undue after dinner rush to finish up the specials. All in all, it was a nice specialty show, and we hope the forerunner of better ones to come. Mr. H. T. Bailey's report of the exhibits themselves follows.

## Frae Bonnie Scotland

The writer met a gentleman at a leading show quite recently, and the question was put, "Now, suppose you were to be instructed to buy a small kennel of really good dogs, not only as a hobby, but as a speculation, what particular breed would you take on?" "Well," said the writer to the gentleman with the speculative turn of mind, "if I fancied Toy dogs I would go for Pekingese or Japanese because I am certain they will always be good sellers, but they are the fancy of the ladies." "What would you say for the male exhibitor?" "Well, so far as I can see, large breeds are not so popular as they were, and Terriers are, in my opinion, always good to sell, because if not up to show form then they always go for pets, and the surplus stock could always be cashed to pay kennel expenses. Nearly all Terriers are good, but would give first place to Scottish Terriers." Having visited a number of dog dealers in Great Britain during the past year, they all inquire for "Scotties." They sell well and, while the competition in this particular breed is very keen, there are always plenty of buyers for the good ones, and more money can be got for a really high class specimen than say an Irish or Airedale. They are so smart and taking in their style that they are gaining in popularity every day, and much more easily kept than the others referred to.

Next to Scotties I would invest in the old fashioned Dandie Dinmont Terrier, who has for years been in the background, but is now looking up, and we hear Scotland is this year to celebrate the anniversary of Guy Mannering by making a special show in the interests of the dog made popular by so famous a personality as Sir Walter Scott. There is a growing demand in England amongst the better class people to own a Dandie Dinmont, not as a show dog, but as a reliable companion and house dog, and he makes the best.

When in the Old Country I found the Collie, once a most popular dog, quite behind in value compared with, say, a Scottie or Dandie of equal merit, and when visiting some old fanciers was surprised to find that one fancier who was at the top in Collies had filled their places with Dandie Dinmonts, and from conversation with him I learned he had not regretted the change, and he is one likely to know what is to be the dog of the future.

West Highland Whites are not going as was expected; they are very prolific breeders, and while we see well filled classes at shows, they are hard to sell. The neat little Cairn is creeping up on them, and the Sealyham is every day becoming stronger in numbers and better in type.

Then sporting dogs are just about the same, and here I would say in

passing, the value is not so high as at one time.

Great Danes are forging ahead, but like Airedales are very prolific breeders and they abound in large numbers everywhere. Another breed many fanciers are hopeful of coming right out is Newfoundlands, a noble dog, finding more favor every day, but here again they are slow to move.

### Improving Canada's Canines.

"Bob" Thomson has returned to his adopted home in Calgary with a shipload of Scottish dogs, including Dandies, Scotties, West Highland Terriers, Collies, Greyhounds, Fox Terriers, Airedales, Pomeranians and Bulldogs. We wish bon voyage to brave Bobby with such a handful.

While travelling to Kilmarnock Show per the Scottish Express, we were delighted to meet with Mr. Morrison, late of Dalbeattie, but now in Calgary. Mr. Morrison informed us that he was getting out a Scottish Terrier bitch with Bobby Thomson's team, and hopes to do some good to the breed in the West.

The Scottie seems to make new friends right along the line, and no wonder, because he is a cockie little fellow, yet no less is the Dandie Dinmont, whose dour disposition wins for him friends in every place. He is slow but sure, and carries himself with the dignified air of "Little Jock Elliott," whose text was "Wha dour middle we me."

This is the time the dog thief is busy in the Old Country. We daily hear pitiful tales of house pets going amissing, and long and anxious hunts are made to recover, not to speak of the very handsome rewards offered. But invariably the dog thief manages to escape. If all civilians were of the same calibre as the lady in Edinburgh who, when offered a tiny Pom by two men whom she suspected of stealing it, invited the men to come in and give the full history of the dog, while she had instructed her servant to telephone for a detective, and here she kept them until they were arrested and the dog handed back to the rightful owner.

Don't be too ready to buy a good looking dog until you are satisfied the venders are bona fide.

## MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL MEETING OF THE BULL TERRIER CLUB OF AMERICA, HELD AT THE GRAND CENTRAL PALACE, N.Y., FEB. 25TH, 1914.

Owing to the absence of the president and both vice-presidents, Mr. Britton was asked to preside over the meeting.

There were present Messrs. Britton, Cunningham, Mayer, Alan Northridge, A. P. Northridge, Platt, Stott, Truman, Elliott, Nordheimer, O'Rourke, Casey and Libby; and by proxy, Messrs. Bellin, Broadfield, Foster, Pepper, Rankine, Spence, Thomas, Tomlinson, Paget, Seeley, Benedict, Schmidlapp, Shepard, Gartner, Green and Frey.

After the roll call, motion was made that the reading of the minutes of the last meeting be dispensed with.

### Secretary's Report.

Annual Report of the Bull Terrier Club of America.

That the Bull Terrier Club of America is flourishing is shown by the election of sixteen new members during the last year, making a net increase in membership of eleven, and a total membership of sixty-seven. The fact that they are from Virginia, Ohio, Colorado, Pennsylvania, and three from Canada shows that the Bull Terrier is steadily increasing his territory. Another fact that shows the increased interest in the breed is that there were over 400 Bull Terrier dogs and bitches registered with the American Kennel Club during 1913, as against 350 in 1912, or an increase of nearly 15 per cent.

In addition to the stud book, I should invite your consideration of a plan to establish a blue list for Bull Terriers analogous to the "Register of Merit" and Advanced Register of dairy cattle. To this list only dogs should be admitted that have performance records either in the show ring or as sires or dams of winning dogs. The details of the requirements of admission will, of course, require some time to work out. Make the requirements hard enough to meet so that they will really mean something. My idea is that the number of credits that should be awarded to a dog for winning in a show should be based upon the number of dogs showing in the particular class in which he wins.

I have received a number of inquiries for literature on Bull Terriers, and I recommend that the president appoint a committee of three during the coming year to prepare a concise, illustrated booklet, setting forth the merits of the breed, at a cost not to exceed \$100.00.

Another matter I should like to have taken up at this meeting is the establishment of a list of approved judges. During the past year I have had repeated calls from various kennel clubs for such a list.

Motion was made and carried that Article 4, section 1, of the by-laws be amended to read: There shall be an annual meeting held at 8.30 in the evening of the first day of the Westminster Kennel Club Show at New York instead of as it reads at present. This motion was laid on the table to be voted on at the next meeting in accordance with Article VI. of the Constitution.

Motion was made and carried that the secretary cast one ballot for the election of the following officers for the coming year:

President, W. S. Gartner; 1st Vice-President, R. H. Elliott; 2nd Vice-President, Roy Nordheimer; Secretary-Treasurer, John W. Britton II., 69 E. 92nd St., New York City; Delegate to A. K. C., Dr. A. ### SEEK TO DEBAR ALL DOGS WITH CROPPED EARS.

In the report of the annual meeting of the American Kennel Club, published in the American Kennel Gazette of March 1, appears the following:—

"I submit the request of the Humane Society to the American Kennel Club to pass a rule preventing the showing of dogs whose ears have been cropped and have not yet been registered.

"On motion of Mr. Hooley, the matter was laid on the table."

The medium through which the request was made was A. P. Vrendenburgh, secretary of the American Kennel Club.

How long the brutal practice of cropping will be countenanced by the leading kennel body of this country depends much on the activity or inactivity of the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals. That the latter should have remained silent so long is a grim tribute to the efficacious-

ness of its work. Cropping is a barbarism reminiscent of the days when brutishness dominated man's inclinations to a degree which would not be tolerated to-day. In the days of dog fighting and bull baiting cropping served a purpose. To-day it serves no purpose and only merits the bitterest condemnation.

With the exception of Great Danes, no valid reason can be offered for cropping dogs, and in the case of Great Danes the reason for cropping has become so exceptional that they, too, should be exempted from the practice.

When the English Kennel Club many years ago passed a law prohibiting all cropped dogs from competition at shows under its rules, it did that which has done more to establish the confidence and respect of all earnest dog lovers than all the other legislation it has evolved.

With the request of the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals squarely before it, the American Kennel Club can no longer evade the issue.
