T<sup>O</sup> show or not to show. At the risk of repeating ourselves we come back to this old, time-worn and muchdiscussed subject. It is one that crops up without fail whenever dog men gather, the views expressed are as diverse as possible. There is the opinion cu one side of the exhibitor, who shows only under a favorable judge. experience that a judge has placed a certain dog over others, or in other words, that a judge likes a certain dog. It may go even farther and may mean that a judge is open to influence, and in spite of suspicion, we prefer to believe this is very rare. While it is only human to want to win, it is also only true sportsmanship to be able, ready and willing to lose. If all exhibitors belonged to this class, where would our shows be and who would compose our exhibitors? Only the greenhorns and the prejudged winners. And the first of these under this system would soon die out, leaving the sure winner alone with nothing to defeat. And how are we to get at the merit of our dogs, if our best dogs refuse to take the chance of a defeat? Under no stretch of imagination is this good sport or likely to improve the game. The good sport is he who is willing to take a beating by a better dog or one on a par, but better far is the one who will, with a smile, take a beating by an inferior dog. There can be only two reasons for such an occurrence, the incompetence, carelessness or indifference of the judge, or dishonesty; in either case your dog is not injured by the decision, and nothing will right such wrongs so quickly as true sportsmanship, win or lose.

The other side, to show every time you can, will build up a grand sport, it will break down criticism, it will pay in the long run and results will be more satisfactory than the pick and choose policy. And fortunately, human nature is a grandly uncertain quantity to deal with, your sure thing we see fall down time and again, there may be too many sure things, the judge may not be feeling too well, or he may feel his reputation wants renewing, and the dog you have been sport enough to show against odds gets the blue. To show has it.

In this connection we would speak of the reprehensible practice of leaving out a dog in order to let another win. What are our shows for but to generate competition? What are our novice, limit and puppy classes for but to give new dogs their required chance to show and to eliminate too keen competition. No other restriction than this is needed, and a dog should be shown if only

in the open class, if for no other reason than to give others a definite goal, to equal or defeat a good one. Of course, club or evening shows are an exception to this, as they are to encourage the novice. A champion also may retire gracefully on his laurels, but better still if he stays in the game.

We come across another bad phase of exhibiting. A dog goes out with the definite aim of winning a championship, such fact being widely and well advertised. As he goes on, it is well known how many points he still lacks to the title. We see too much leaning towards giving such a dog winners just so that he may be helped on to the desired goal. The dogs under competition are sized up on this standard, rather than on merit. If he is a champion he does not need the points, give winners to the one that wants the points. If one dog is only three points another a greater number from the title and the show is a three pointer, hand it to the former. Competition is destroyed. us, and we believe that they are no better and no worse than the average, and a great deal of talk of dishonesty is only talk. Still we do not like to hear the pre-judging assertions of the certainty of a dog winning even before the competition is known and worse still does it taste when we see that dog win sometimes against superior competition. At some shows this feeling seems to be in the air, and sudden and vociferous applause when such a decision gets put over sounds like the bray of an ass to hide its grotesqueness.

### Genessee Valley Kennel Club

We expected and predicted great things for this show. It was better than we expected or predicted, and we wish right at the beginning of our report to congratulate the Club and its members. They are really a grand lot. In the first place they took their show seriously with the result that every one of them were on duty and worked hard. The preparation seemed more advanced than is usually the case, especially for a first show of a new club. There were no signs of unreadiness when the show opened. The catalogue was ready and very free from mistakes, though we think there was a retrograde step in its make-up, in that they went back to the old style, instead of the now familiar form of giving a full list of the dogs in order of number at the beginning of each breed. The men at the head of this show are the right stamp to manage a club and to run a show. They are big, yet not too formal or important, with the result that everyone felt at ease, everyone was happy, and the show ran very smoothly.

The dogs were benched at one end of the building and in a separate hall were two large roomy rings, and a stage on which were judged the Toys. The only objection, perhaps was the lack of light in the judging rings. Everything was scrupulously clean and neat, for which the Superintendent, Mr. Geo. Foley, deserves great credit. We are lead to understand that the show was a financial success, and the club deserves it. The quality of the dogs was very high. In fact, in some breeds higher than at New York. The Canadians sent over many of theirs, and many of our exhibitors followed them over. From the results of the judging, and for the sake of the Canadian contingent we hope the walking home was good. We haven't seen them all yet. Without a doubt they did not win enough to tip the conductor. But my! they had a good time, and when Rochester holds its next show they will be there again, even if they have to walk both ways. The Rochester men took them in hand on Friday night, and ran them out to a brewery and a famous brewery at that. Imagine ! Added to this, to level everyone, the whole party, ladies and gentlemen were all gowned in white with little paper caps and tassels. A

fine supper was served accompanied by the finest beer in the land. Several of our boys have sworn off since. They say, because that beer spoilt them for any other brew, or was it the results? We have been told that the "Tango" as danced by Charlie Hopton and T. R. McGeer has been copyrighted by a New York cabaret, and that the Rochester Street Railway Company have offered Joe Perkins a salary that will make him independent for life, in a year, if he will teach their conductors how to gather fares. Those who did not go to Rochester are still hearing of it, and have vowed to go next year.

But their is a fly in every ointment, and we are sorry to say that Rochester had theirs, but it was in no way the fault of the club, or the management. We refer to the judging. It is not unusual for one judge in a lot, or even two to have an off day but it is very unusual for the whole card to slip up. We do not like to critize the charming personality represented in the Toy judge, or the jolly good fellow we met in the genial Terrier judge, but there were no exceptions. However to err is human, and the flesh is weak. But it undid the whole value of the show, and from one important standpoint, the comparative merits of the dogs, almost as well if they had been there for exhibition only.

The show was opened by the Canadian dogs. The first being Mr. Dickinson's Mastiff "Hertford Nancy" well shown by Mrs. Dickinson. She was in better shape than usual, but had no competition. ST. BERNARDS had only the two from Toronto belonging to Mr. Bert Swann. We never saw Alta Eva looking better. She is really a magnificent looking picture, but with one fault, her front legs, and this is well compensated for by her enormous bone. Second to her was Flashlight of Parkdale another really good one.

GREAT DANES brought out three, the winner being Prinz von Weiseman, a fawn with good muzzle, a good front, good bone and good size and bad behind. Second and reserve winners was Falcroft Viking a black with good bone, thick in skull, out in front, poor condition and a bad tail, a rank decision, as he was easily beaten by the third dog Cash, a quality brindle with good head and beautiful ear carriage, a bit fine in bone and might be stronger in fore face and is ringed in tail, but still a Dane. The winning RUSSIAN WOLFHOUND was Thora of Hegeman wanting in size and body. Reserve was Vonia of Tatiana which defeats the winner easily in size and is as good otherwise. The third in the open class was Barrari O'Valley, good size, good deep rib, well tucked up good coat and condition, good front, but light in eye and walks badly behind, but still the best in the class.

SCOTTISH DEERHOUNDS, winners Ch. Closeburn Clansman, a real big one with a grand coat, followed by Closeburn Chieftain, another one with good size. The whole exhibit in this breed was very high grade. In GREY-HOUNDS winners went to Lansdowne Butcher Boy, grandest of body, neck, legs and feet, plain in head, showing age. Reserve Lansdowne Solitaire, a very whippety fawn. Third, Tip, a blue lacking size.

The FOXHOUNDS were a show in themselves. We never saw their equal and any section of the country is fortunate in having such a pack, and too much credit cannot possibly given to Major Wadsworth. They were simply magnificent. The whole pack being uniform in size, color and type, enormous in bone and substance all over. The winning dog Potaphar, being particularly strong in legs and feet.

While it is well known that Dr. Fairbank's experience as a breeder and exhibitor of Pointers and Setters was extremely limited and that his connection with the Spaniel fancy was of comparatively recent origin, nevertheless, the hope was expressed, that owing to the small entry in all his classes, and the further fact that none of the competitions were really close or difficult to decide that he would get through without serious blunders, but, unfortunately he seemed absolutely unable to accurately value structual defects, for as one onlooker remarked, the Doctor seemed to estimate shoulder formation and elbow placement at about one half the total value of the whole dog.

In POINTER puppies Silk M an easy winner, a stylish little dog with a fair head, Fix Cricket second and King third are not show dogs.

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The novice class, winner Sport E. Z. a rather plain dog, comparatively sound, was an easy first in a bad class as Pointer second, and Max third, have neither type or soundness to recommend them.

Sport E. Z. repeated his win in the Am. Bred class with Spahn's Hop second, and Tom McKinley third.

In limit class, two really good Pointers appeared and that very sound litle dog, Maxims Dan won, a dog of excellent type and character, his one fault being a rather short thick neck.

Bob White Pam second, is rather plain a trifle light in eye and would do with more bone and better muscled quarters, and as he was low in flesh he did not look his best.

Open and winners were repeats as there was nothing in the dog classes to compare with these two dogs.

Fix Cricket, previously described, was awarded the blue in novice bitches as she was fortunately alone.

Dr. Fairbanks made his first serious blunder in limit bitches, were he awarded first to Bob White Ginger, a nondescript little dog, white and liver in colour, with a large tan splash on her cheek, and with nothing to recommend her excepting a comparatively clean pair of shoulders, as she is wrong practically every place else.

Wildacres Glorianna second, in beautiful condition was an easy winner, but her long clean neck, symetry of outline and high quality made no impression on this Judge.

In open bitches, Landsdowne Prim, in wretched condition, her hair off in spots and generally dejected looking, was awarder the blue, while Sunshine, in beautiful shape, and as sound as a new dollar, was second, and Wildacres Glorianna was third.

In winers, it was Landsdowne Prim first, and Bod White Ginger Res. It is doubtful if a few Pointer bitches were ever more badly mixed.

In ENGLISH SETTER puppies, Sunnycroft Trixie and Topsy, 1st and 2nd, show considerable quality and if they develop as well as they now promise will do to bring to the shows again. Prince Jeff the novice class winner, is a very plain dog with little to recomend him except soundness, while Frank second, and Brooklyn Steadfast third are not show dogs.

In limit and open dogs, it was Bob White Don first, Malwyd Edward second, and Lansdowne Ruler third, a descision that was a great surprise to the handlers of these dogs and to all the rail-birds. Edward was in grand condition and showing beautifully, so it was thought that his magnificient type, character and substance, good body, and excellent loin and quarters would return him an easy winner, for Don's skull formation is not right and he is far from right behind. Lansdowne Ruler third, a compact little dog without prominent faults, but lacking the class of the other two.

Sunnycroft Trixie, the puppy class winner, repeated in novice with Mc-Kinley's Sis second and Counter third.

In Am. bred bitches, it was Peg O' My Heart first, light in eye and plain in head, but a sound bitch with considerable quality, Bob White Victoria second, and Bob White Active third, show their excellent breeding, but several minor faults will always stop them in strong competition.

In limit bitches, Pride of Rockland, who was V. H. C. at New York was returned the winner, notwithstanding her plain head and slouchy movement, while Bob White Lena 11, who won at New York was placed second. This is a high quality bitch with a lovely head and expression, possibly a trifle low set and not just right in the shoulders, but she looked like the winner here with something to spare. Cinders Rock third is heavy in shoulders and too coarse in head, but a bitch of good character.

Open winners were repeats.

GORDEN SETTERS were few in number and a comomn lot outside of Mrs. Shanon's well known winners, and as usual Ch. Trampus Shannon had no trouble beating the lot.

IRISH SETTERS had only young Dermot and Mickey Flynn to save them, and they were placed as written. In COCKER SPANIELS, the Midkiff dogs accounted for the majority of the prizes and as Midkiff Kermit. Midkiff Dariole, Midkiff Firefly and Midkiff Duke have been at practically all the recent shows and have been consistent winners under all kinds of judges, further criticism is unnecessary. They were put down in beautiful condition, and this, with their high class quality, made them stand out clear in the various classes in which they entered, although there were several other very nice Cockers, notably, Captain Scott, shown by Thomas Huckle, this is a very good young dog, for outside of a rather plain head and long face, it is difficult to find serious fault with him, as he has a beautiful body a wonderfully good set of legs and feet, plenty of bone and a lovely coat.

Letty from Lynn, the puppy class winner, is a most attractive little bitch and should do considerably more winning, while Lady Kemah and Kemah's Wada both show type and quality.

Dinah May Belle, who was second in the limit and open bitches has a lot or good in her and should make a grand brood bitch.

In BEAGLES-Puppies, White Oak Dixie, second, good bodied bitch with poor head, being dish faced. Third White Oak Peerless, about the same. Devonshire Lasher, first, nice clean cut little dog, very light in bone and shown thin. Novice dogs, first, Devonshrire Lasher. Second, Bob, a little out in elbows, good body, head and shoulders, a pretty nice dog. Limit dogs, first, Lansdowne Benedict, good all over, except in elbows which were very bad. Second, Blythebrush Bugle, the working kind and good all over, but a little slack in face. Third Devonshire Lasher. Open, a repeat. Winners, Lansdowne Benedict. Reserve Winners, Blythebrush Bugle. Bitches, novice, Queen of Trumps, alone.

Limit. First. Lansdowne Ruby, a real good one though light in bone. Second. Maywood Tip, a mistake and a bad one, as she should not have been in the money, big in size, ont at elbows, fat, and heavy in whelp. Third. Queen of Trumps, good bone, good body, if a little long, perfect hind quarters, perfect tail carriage with a sweet Beagle face, might have been in better condition. Open bitches and winners, Rockridge Midget, an almost perfect thirteen inch Beagle. We believe Queen of Trumps was placed second in this class, which would be a reversal from the limit class, but would be no injustice. Local dogs and bitches. First. Maywood Tip; Second. White Oak Trixie. Mr. DeGeer won with his Beagles the cup for the best dog, other than Terrier from Canada, and medal for the best sporting dog from Canada.

In BULLDOGS, Moston Marshall unfortunately became seriously ill just before the judging and was scratched, taking out all the interest for the Canadians, but the real joke of the judging of the whole show was for winners dogs, and the "spontaneous applause" was anything but satisfactory. Two dogs met and one, Drewstone Pike, was placed over (notice we do not say defeated), the other Ch. Hewlett King Orry. Of course, we are told that Hewlett King Orry is getting old. He is a Bulldog and a good one, in grand condition and well shown, and will have to deteriorate about 75 per cent before Drewstone Pike can beat him under a man that knows anything abont Bulldogs.

In bitches novice was won by our Canadian Cheetham's Daughter, in anything but good shape. In limit bitches Worsley Candida won over Old Square Selina, which was wrong as Candida was as thin as a crow. In good condition there might have been some reason for her winning.

DACHSHUNDS were represented by a few good ones. The South Shore Kennels winning with Vitte and Myra.

In COLLIES there were some striking blue merles, especially Grey Mist, whom we greatly preferred. He has a good coat of good colour, good ears and a grand head and a good tail, but a bad coloured eye. The winner was Billesley Cap, good eye and expression, good length of head, wants coat, too big in ear, bad colour and carried his tail over his back, and could do with more bone. He wins on size only. Third in American breds, Grover, has a gay tail, tulip ear and a staring coat, but good in size. Second in American breds and third in limit was Tazewell Busco, wanting in coat, gay in tail and inclined to prick ear, otherwise a good one. Second in limit was Imna Stormer, a grand type with a good eye but too fine everywhere, and showing all quality. The bitches were won by Seedley Blue Girl and Oakhill Iris.

In AIREDALES no fewer than fifteen puppies were entered, so the class was divided by sex. The winning dog puppy Bothwell Sorcerer is a big one, good in bone, legs and feet, big strong foreface, good coat, good shoulders, weak in loin, a bit houndy, especially in ears and domed in skull. Second, Master Hero is a big one, deep in brisket, good in bone. Third, Kenmare Bobs was on the small side, has a grand front and bone, good behind, good eye, good expression, only fair in feet. The winning bitch puppy Soconi Seraphie we did not note. Second was our own Morning Sunbeam, very much improved as she is going up in the air, grandest possible coat and a good eye. She loses a little only in front of the eve. The only Canadian dog to make any impression was Moorside Rock who won the novice and limit and was third in the open; for once he showed well and was improved in front. He has a grand short body, good rib but is a bit bitchy in foreface. Second and third in the novice were the winning dog puppies. Second in limit was Bingle Briar, a dog of good size and substance. Third, Kootenai Firebrand, very common, full eye, bad feet, probably the poorest dog in the class. The wining dog in the American bred class was Baughfell Broom Stick, a good big substance dog, not quite true in front. In open dogs Vickery Ruler was first and winners. King Oorang second, both of them fair only. Vickery Ruler is good in coat and colour, has a long head and is a very big dog, but when moving is not straight in front, and hocks are not well placed, and he is houndy. He wins mostly in size, but loses in Terrier type and character to King Oorang, who however is very weak in foreface, which is composed entirely of whisker and is roach backed. He is a strongly built dog, but generally lacks quality. The winning bitch was Afton Queen Oorang, good body and bone, good color and grand expression, full in eye and a squirrel tail. Reserve winners was Vickery Rainbow, excelled chiefly in size, and good bone. She is bad in ears, full in eye, and heavy in shoulder. Third in open class was Aire, good color, good size, but absolutely lacking in bone and too rangy. Her placing was a joke as at least three, including Morning Sunbeam were easily superior to her. The winning novice, Bothwell Peggy had size, but was soft coated.

The whole judging of the Airdale was a ridiculous farce, the leaving out of our two Canadian representitives, Birchcliffe Oorang and Master Crack can only be treated as a blunder. There was apparently only one chief desideratum and that was size; quality and terrier character were entirely disregarded. As an indication of the comparative merits of the dogs, the judging was simply a waste of time.

In BULL TERRIERS we did not expect much in the judging, and we got less than we expected. Sound End Sombrero was handed the winners ribbon,

with little or no inspection. He is a big dog standing high and lacking bone perhaps due to his poor condition his front is good, his feet perfect, his body fair, his tail good. His skull is too wide for our liking, tapering down to a rather fine nose, but he has the true wedged shaped head. His cheeks are very clean and his foreface well filled up. The great width of his head gives the impression of shortness to it. We consider he is a dog of a mixed type, his head approaching the English in strength but the strength not carried to the very end, he is high up like the American type. His eyes are very small and well placed, his ears are good. Second to him was Ridgemog of absolutely the opposite type, a low set, longbodied, big boned dog, with a head like a brick short filled up and carried full to the muzzle but marred by being undershot. His type is consistent and well balanced, but the type we do not like here, to us he is a very unattractive dog. Third was Gilt Edge Seely, a common yellow-eyed dog of no type at all. Fourth Glenedyth Imperator. No doubt we will be accused of partizanship when we say that he had more good and fewer bad qualities than any other two dogs in the show and that he is worth any two of them. His head is longer, cleaner and more lean than any of them, he has more bone, he is neither high nor low, in fact he is a well balanced dog of consistent type without a single prominent fault. He is criticised for the color of his eye, having examined the same and made comparisons on the spot, we state he is the same color as Noross Patrician and darker than Sound End Sombrero. In bitches the winner was Leeds Charlewood Marvel a weak faced bitch, a Toronto cast off who was given away by her breeder, and in no way licensed to beat Princess Patricia. Such judging as we saw here in Bull Terriers only injures the game.

POMERANIANS. First puppy was Kelvinside Perfection. Second and third Mrs. Wylie's Cairndhu Mina and Cairndhu Mona. First in open and winners was Banner Admiral 2nd an orange with very profuse coat, grand tail, but off color in nose; although this is not a disqualification it is a serious fault, and should be, and probably soon will be considered a disqualification. He was also heavy enough in bone. Reserve winners, was Kelvinside Perfection ran

him close on account of his soundness of color and smaller size but he lost in coat. In bitches the winner was Bogota Sunbeam, nice type, and good in coat, but badly off color and in no way entitled to defeat the reserve winner, Cairndhu Beauty the New York winner, who defeated her in every point except in quantity of coat. The excuse for the decision was given as the artifical light, but the unsoundness of the color of the winner was apparent to anyone twenty feet away. Second in open was Banner Colleen, better in color but inclined to flatness of coat. Third, Oakhill Poppy, a nice type, and good in coat.

PEKINGESE judging was a happy family, and there is no question that our Canadian dog Marr's Wee Chinee should have been higher in bitches, but the manner of the judging was worse than the judging itself. A strict independence between judge and exhibitor is more satisfactory to the other exhibitors, but when in addition to a marked friendship between these two, there is added a third element of congeniality, namely a ring steward who is an officer of the club and a relative of the exhibitor, the other exhibitors are inclined to feel frozen out, and they were.

In PUGS Mr. George Hamann's Dine kept up her winning record.

#### QUEEN CITY KENNEL CLUB EVEN-ING SHOW.

The Queen City Kennel Club finished up their season of evening shows with their Toy dog night. They are much to be congratulated at the success of their first season, and should be encouraged by their success to renew their efforts next year. Mr. Bert Swann officiated as judge, and was very successful in placing the dogs correctly.

Pomeranian puppies dogs and bitches any color, first, Mr. A. Blackburn's Little Sailor, a chocolate wanting in coat, and big in bone. Second, Merry Prince, more quality and finer bone, but in bad shape, humped in back and refused to show. Third, F. Johnston's Silver King, still in the kindergarten class. Open, black-First, Mr. Mc-Naughton's Pomeria Masterpiece, grand quality dog, good in head and small ears, with a fair amount of coat which is not quite enough stand off, and looks wide behind, due to over-abundance of coat on the leg. Second, Mr. McPherson's Brookside Masher, another good

one, shorter in back, but not so true in color. Third, Mrs. Smith's Prince Vietor. Open, any other color—First, J. Eydon's Sailor Prince. Second was Boyie's Chocolate Don. For the best Pom in the show, Pomeria Masterpiece was first; Brookside Masher second.

Yorkshire Terriers brought out one in Mr. McIntyre's Derby Ted, a real good one, good in coat and color, a little long and not level in back.

Cockers, puppies brought out two blacks shown by W. Garrity, Black King and Black Frank, too small to be criticized.

The Pekingese were won, open, by Marr's Wee Chinee. Puppies by the same owner's Chop Suey.

Toy Black and Tans brought out Mrs. Delaney's Gay Boy, in good coat.

Blenheim's, Mrs. Scott's Ch. The Planet, who is lasting well, has a grand head and face and good coat.

The special dog collar for the best pup of the series was won by the English Bulldog pup, Pete, owned by Mr. G. R. Farquharson. He is improving greatly and promises well.

The special cup for the best nonsporting dog was won by Mr. H. A. Wilson's Costermonger. He was in grand shape, though he had no easy time defeating Pomeria Masterpiece, or Mr. Marr's Pekingese bitch, Wee Chinee, who was only defeated on account of a defective eye.

Special for the best sporting dog in the show (Meerchaum pipe) was won by the Cocker Spaniel, Black King.

#### TORONTO KENNEL CLUB EVEN-ING SHOW.

With Mr. Crawford as judge the Toronto Kennel Club could not but have a successful evening show for Toy dogs, as it is worth while to get the opinion of an expert, such as he is, on little ones. There was a good attendance and the spectators and dogs were well and carefully looked after by Messers. Mumford and McGeer. We understand the final evening for specials and cups will be held on Tuesday, April 28th.

Black Pomeranians, (open dogs). First, was Mr. McNaughton's Pomeria Masterpiece, a very nice type of Pom. with a good coat and sound in color, but a little short of undercoat, otherwise a nice dog. Mr. McPherson's Brookside Massey, good type of dog, the smaller of the two, but not quite so sound in color, and a little coarse in head. Bitches Open, (black). First, Mrs. Peter Herd's Kelvinside Model, a very nice sound colored female with plenty of Pom character, exceptionally good in head, ears and body, with a little time will make a flyer. Second, Mr. L. Parker's Jet, rather large, good coat, unfortunately not sound in color.

Puppies, dogs, (black). First, Mrs. Smith's Prince Victor, sound colored black, but a bit long in back, good coat; second, Mr. A. Blackburn's Murray Prince, just a fair dog.

Puppies, bitches, (black). First, Kelvinside Model. Second Little Eva, just a fair puppy, a little too young to criticize.

Chocolate Poms. Open dogs, Mrs. Herd's Kelvinside Perfection, a very stylish little dog, an exceptionally good color for a chocolate, small ears, short back, small size, would do with little improvement in head, otherwise a good all round dog.

Pekingese. Open dogs. First, Mr. Marr's Wee Chinee, a very good type of Pekingese, with exceptionally good head and body, wanting a little cont. Second, Chop Suey, a sable puppy, will improve with age. First puppy, Chop Suey.

Toy Poodles. First, Mr. J. H. Grady's Buster, a very heavy coated white French Poodle, a little on the large side, shown in grand condition.

Prince Charles. First, Mrs. Babcock's Braeside Fancy, good all round bitch, splendid in color, nice size, but could do with a little squarer muzzle, very sound for a Toy Spaniel.

King Charles. First, F. C. Lofthouse's King, just a fair dog.

Toy black and tan. First, Mrs. Delaney's Gay Boy, nice type and well marked, very small in size.

Pugs, (black). First, Mr. George Hamann's Dine, a good black, could be improved in head.

#### MOUNT ROYAL KENNEL CLUB EVENING SHOW.

The last Mount Royal Kennel Club's evening show was held at the Mount Royal Riding Academy, Thursday evening, March 25th. Messrs. R. A. #### CHICAGO SHOW.

The Canadians were well on hand at the above fixture. Mr. Nordheimer having his Bull Terrier string there, and winning in dogs with Glenedyth Bob, second American bred, second limit, and second open, and with Imperator third limit and third open. In bitches he showed one of his own breeding Glenedyth Sprite, who won first puppy, first limit, under thirty pounds and third novice, and Glenedyth Elfin accounted for first limit, second open and reserve winners, and special for first brace and first team. Mr. Perkin's recent purchase "Leeds Waltz Dream" was also shown, and she accounted for two seconds.

In Bulldogs "Good Shot" owned by Mr. F. Goodman of Winnipeg made a splendid showing, winning three firsts, and also the Henry D. Coghlan Cup for the best American bred Bulldog under two years old, the Dorchester cup for the best dog or bitch, bred by exhibitor and the W. H. Horn-Melhorn trophy for the best bred by exhibitor. This is a remarkable performance for a Canadian bred Bulldog, only 18 months of age. Good Shot has been shown fearlessly, commencing his show record at the Western Kennel Club's spring show, 1913, where he won four firsts and one special prize. At the Winnipeg Exhibition, 1913, he won two firsts and two special prizes. At the Toronto Exhibition, 1913, he won four firsts and several prizes. London Exhibition, 1913, he won two firsts and one special, at Orangeville, 1913, he won three firsts and one special, and at Rochester, N. Y., 1913, he was awarded three firsts and reserve winners. He probably holds the winning record for his age, and his win at Chicago is easily the best performance ever made by a Winnipeg Bulldog. We understand he is a greatly improved Bulldog, going the right way and should soon get his championship.

Mrs. Wylie of Vincland also exhibited Cairndhu Beauty, who was again successful in annexing three firsts and and winners and six specials.

#### DOGS AND ALL ABOUT THEM BY ROBERT LEIGHTON.

When we find a good thing, we like to pass it on, and in the present case the above volume is the good thing. Most of us will remember the splendid set of monthly parts got out by the same author and the same publishers (Cassell & Co.) some years ago under the title of "The New Book of the Dog." This was a very exhaustive publication, but the price of it put it beyond the general purse. The present volume is a hand book designed to take the place of the larger one to those who want a quick, ready reference that may be depended upon to be authentic. It contains everything necessary for the novice or the expert, giving the history of each breed, the different strains. discussions on various types and points, and a complete standard in each case. The low price of this book makes it acceptable and not too expensive to the breeder who is interested in one breed only, and will naturally lead him to read and gain knowledge of the other breeds, and in that way encourage a broader view of our hobby. It is well printed, well illustrated and of a handy size. We have arranged to supply copies of this book at the publisher's price 75 cents or it can be procured direct from Cassels & Co., Toronto.

'Mr. Allan Northridge, of Noross Bull Terrier fame, and the breeder and owner of the famous Ch. Noross Patrician, was a visitor in Toronto during March. He is a true type of fancier who shows his own dogs, and is keen to win. Through the kindness of Mr. McFarland he was lunched at the University Club and afterwards motored out to the Parkdale Kennels to examine Mr. McFarland's Bull Terriers on their native heath. He was well rewarded by seeing the three Bull Terriers in splendid condition, hard as nails, racing over a five-acre field. We spent a most delightful afternoon and evening with Mr. Northridge, digging as deep as possible into the breed and its history. Mr. Northridge is a strong advocate of the American type on which ground we can entirely agree with him. He promises us a visit in September to the Exhibition.

### DOGS AND A SUGGESTION by HARRY. B. HAWES

#### VALUE-continued.

A trained shooting dog to-day is cheap at \$150, and most of them bring a higher price, and this price is brought at a year old. A horse or cow has to be kept for three years before the same amount could be realized.

An old darkey put this estimate on the value of his dog:

"Dar's a mighty fine monument standin' right nigh,

But to me dis poor mound looks bigger,

For dar's a monument money can't buy-

A yaller dog's love for a nigger."

Thanks to some of our rich men, we yearly import to this country some of the best prize winners of Europe. We have been taking so many of their best that they are now beginning to come to us for stud dogs. This is particularly true of the Setter class.

My fad at one time was Irish Terriers. The Terrier is a very bright, intelligent little fellow, with a shaggy coat, bright eyes and an engaging disposition. He is an agitator, a regular devil for a fight and fond of visiting the neighbors. While breeding these dogs I had occasion to send one to the Rev. J. D. O'Gorman, at Gananoque, Canada, for service, for which I paid \$50. Some years later I met the revcrend father at the Detroit Dog Show and was introduced with much ceremony to Celtic Badger, the champion Irish Terrier of America. I asked Father O'Gorman what he would sell him for and this splendid man replied: "Well, Mr. Hawes, I don't know. I have a very poor parish in Gananoque and Celtie Badger does much to support it. Last year I received \$1,800 for his services. I do not know how the parish could get along without him. I have been offered \$2,200 for him and, as we need an addition. I may have to sell him, but I hope not."

There are more than fifteen weekly and monthly publications devoted exclusively to the subject of the dog. Take up "Country Life in America" or any of the other big periodicals dealing with kindred subjects, and you will find more advertisements for dogs than for all other kinds of animals combined. "American Field," one of the oldest sporting publications printed, devotes pages to him in each issue. There are at least ten large factories manufacturing dog foods and dog biscuits and as many more patent medicine houses that make a specialty of dog medicines.

These illustrations indicate his value. Strange to say, the average man considers the dog of little commercial value and, while he would not ask you for a horse or a cow, he would think nothing of asking you for a dog.

I was on a four days' shoot with a friend some years ago, who had a very fine female Setter. The dog was much admired. As we went from farm to farm, he was frequently asked for a pup and, while extolling the virtues of his dog, he freely promised a pup not only to those who asked, but offered one to many who made no request. I watched this performance for several days, and one evening I said: "Do you know you have promised twenty-two pups and will never be able to deliver them?"' He thought for a while and then said: "Hawes, it's a mighty poor man who won't promise a pup.'

#### Toys.

It will interest the ladies to know that some of the largest classes in the bench shows are composed of what are called "pet" or "toy dogs." They represent a large part of the breeds, bring faney prices and are frequently treated like young princes.

We have in St. Louis five dog hospitals. The dog doctor calls in his automobile, attends to the patient and, if necessary removes him to the hospital where he has his own bed and apartment, the same as a human being.

St. Louis also has a dog cemetery; a burial lot bringing \$5 and the dog undertaker lays out the dog, covering him with a little shroud, and handles the funeral in approved style.

Dog dentists. clothes and collar makers seem to be found necessary by the faddists. While not fancying these little toy dogs myself, they seem to fit into the city household very comfortably and are usually intelligent and companionable. They display a degree of affection unequalled in the animal world.

We all remember the account of the

lap-dog of Mary Queen of Scots, which accompanied her beautiful mistress to the scaffold and continued to caress the body after death, refusing food and dying of grief a few days later.

#### Contests.

The bench show brings into competition the best dogs of the various breeds. The dog winning ten blue ribbons in open competition in different shows becomes a champion. This is not easy and sometimes requires years for its accomplishment.

Field trials are held for sporting dogs in various portions of the United States; the Setter and Pointer here compete in speed, bird-sense, deportment and scenting qualities. They extend all the way from Manitoba, Canada, down through the Eastern and Southern States, the championship being run in Tennessee each January.

Greyhound coursing matches are held under much the same conditions and the contest between Beagle hounds is particularly attractive. The dogs winning their championships only under the most exacting conditions then become exceedingly valuable.

Time will not permit of a more extended discussion of these enjoyable trials, in which the dog of the poor man contests with the dog of the rich, and the happy owner of the winner is more elated than by any other sporting event.

#### Advice.

Housing, feeding and training cannot be satisfactorily discussed in my allotted time. A few things, easily remembered, will add to our friend's contentment and his master's satisfaction.

The kennel should be dry, clean and frequently whitewashed.

Scraps from the table, when fresh, are the best food and cost nothing.

Feed the dog yourself; you will control him better.

Feed twice a day, morning and evening. The big meal at night, as the dog should not be worked immediately after eating.

Do not feed chicken bones; they are covered with a hard substance which frequently cuts through the intestines.

Use a leather collar, not one made of metal. Don't chain unless necessary. If the dog sucks eggs, open one end of an egg and put in some red pepper.

The master is responsible for a vicious dog; if it is vicious it is largely his fault.

Properly introduced to the cat, there will be no "cat and dog time."

If he jumps upon you in caress, gently press your shoe upon his hind foot. Do this a number of times and he will stay on the ground.

The pup will imitate an old dog; but don't try and train two young dogs at the same time; give each a private lesson.

Put your own name and address on the collar-not the dog's.

Don't kick your dog or strike him on the head. Use a switch or, grasping him by the neck and back, give him a shaking.

Don't "holler" at a dog unless he is at a distance; talk to him in a moderate tone. He is guided more by intonation than words. You exhaust your emphasis in continuous "hollering" and he fails to understand.

Don't let your dog chase horses or autos on the road; it is a very bad habit.

Don't use more than three letters in your dog's name; if you want to use a longer one for his pedigree, give him a short kennel name.

Don't borrow a dog and don't lend one; you may spoil your friend's dog or he yours; a dog must know his own master.

Don't punish a dog long after his fault has been committed; be sure he knows exactly for what the punishment is administered.

Don't keep a dog in a hot room all day and put him out in the cold at night.

Try and keep a breed that will not require to have their ears or tails trimmed. This is a custom which is properly growing in disrepute.

The English owners of various terriers have long believed that biting the tail off was better than cutting it. A friend recommended his English coachman to me to perform the operation and sent him to the house. One squeal from the first pup was enough. A red hand appeared in the doorway, soon followed by the indignant form of the cook, armed with a broom. On this one occasion, at least, the Irish beat the English, that is, with a broom, but the English beat the Irish to the front gate, since which time I have tried to get along without this practice. Take your dog into the ehicken yard when young and let him stay by your side while you work with the chickens. He will then learn to know that they are your property and respect them. If he is old when you get him and he kills a chicken, try a thrashing; if that fails, tie the dead chicken around his neck and let him carry it all day. He will soon get enough chicken and will leave them alone. This is a favorite method of "bird-dog men" in breaking a Pointer or Setter from chasing rabbits.

I have also thought it would be a wholesome method of punishment for the chicken thief if one of our ebonyhued friends should have an old Dominecker rooster tied around his neck and be compelled to parade around town all day. He, too, would become sick of chickens.

But, let us try and devise a practical plan for the utilization of at least one useful breed of dogs by the State. Some of the leading fanciers, judges, owners and handlers of dogs in the United States were gathered at my home one afternoon. In order to start the conversation I asked the innocent question: "Which is the best breed of dogs?" There was a long silence and an effort to change the subject; I persisted and started an argument; it started a fight and broke up the party, and to this day I don't know.

Each has its especial advocate and each its particular use.

For the farm, however, it is my judgment that the rough-coated Seotch Collie is the best general utility dog, besides being beautiful and companionable.

The word "Collie" is simply the old Highland term for "sheep dog."

These dogs have been used for centuries in handling all kinds of domestic animals. They are serviceable as companions, watch dogs, and have an all around general utility. They are adaptable, loyal and easily trained to perform all sorts of service.

The tests to which they are put in sheep-dog trials are most severe. A long course is marked out by flags, and the dog is compelled to conduct three strange sheep over the course, which is interrupted by hurdles, and deliver the sheep into a pen. These dogs are directed only by the voice and signals made by the hands and arms, and are unaccompanied by the owner, who mast remain at a distance.

Some years ago I ascertained that

there were 22,000 dog licenses issued in St. Louis alone. It is safe to say that not one-third of the dogs in the city are licensed. If I am even approximately correct, there are at least 50,000 dogs in St. Louis, and probably as many as 250,000 in the State.

Missouri spends money each year in bettering the breeds of cattle, horses, swine and poultry. Why not spend a small sum on the dog? Or, if the State will not do this, why can it not be done by subscription?

The average Collie litter contains from six to eight pups. In nine weeks a pup is born. In sixty days he will be ready to send to his new home. This will require only five months from the date of breeding to the date of delivery. Thirty brood bitches and five stud dogs could be bought for a comparatively small sum, and in many cases devoted for the experiment; these would, in a year's time, supply one or two good Collies for each county in the State.

The annual maintenance of a State kennel in Columbia will not be large.

I may be overestimating the value of this plan, but I believe it to be practical, useful and will add much to our State's reputation for progressiveness.

#### Senator Vest.

Senator George Vest illuminated this subject in an address to a jury; time and changed political issues may cause us to forget his great speeches, but this classic will always be preserved:

"Gentlemen of the Jury,-The best friend a man has in this world may turn against him and become his enemy. His son or daughter that he has reared with loving care may prove ungrateful. Those who are nearest and dearest to us, those whom we trust with our happiness and our good name, may become traitors to their faith. The money that a man has he may lose. It flies away from him, perhaps when he needs it most. A man's reputation may be sacrificed in a moment of illconsidered action. The people who are prone to fall on their knees to do us honor when success is with us may be the first to throw the stone of malice when failure settles its cloud upon our heads. The one absolute, unselfish friend that man can have in this selfish world, the one that never deserts him, the one that never proves ungrateful or treacherous, is his dog. Gentlemen of the jury, a man's dog stands by him in prosperity and in poverty, in

health and in sickness. He will sleep on the cold ground, where the wintry winds blow and the snow drives fiercely, if only he can be near his master's side. He will kiss the hand that has no food to offer, he will lick the wounds and sores that come in encounter with the roughness of the world. He guards the sleep of his pauper master as if he were a prince. When all other friends desert he remains. When riches take wings and reputation falls to pieces he is as constant in his love as the sun in its journey through the heavens. If fortune drives the master forth an outcast in the world, friendless and homeless, the faithful dog asks no higher privilege than that of accompanying him to guard against danger, to fight against his enemies, and when the last scene of all comes, and death takes the master in its embrace and his body is laid away in the cold ground, no matter if all other friends pursue their way, there by his graveside will the noble dog be found, his head between his paws, his eyes sad but open in alert watchfulness, faithful and true even to death."

#### THE BULLDOG BREEDERS' AS-SOCIATION OF AMERICA.

The Breeders will hold their eighth annual open show on the roof of the Albermarle-Hoffman Hotel, Saturday, May 9th, 1914.

Mr. Ritchey is making extensive alterations on the roof and there will be provided one of the largest judging rings, for an indoor show, in the country, when alterations are completed.

Mr. Vinton P. Breese will judge. It is his first appearance as judge at a big specialty show of Bulldogs in the East, in some years. He paints Bulldogs and knows them as few of us do. He is entitled to a bumper entry.

The prize money, in all the regular A. K. C. classes will be \$5, \$3 and \$2 for first, second and third, respectively.

Premium lists will be in the mails by the middle of April and the entries will close April 25th, 1914.

The fifth offering of the Breeders' Produce Stakes will be judged at this show.

Thanks to the courtesy of Mr. E. W. Jaquet, the very capable secretary of the Kennel Club of England, who is at the same time the very capable Editor of the "Kennel Gazette" (offical organ of the Kennel Club) and of the Stud-Book, who has kindly sent me an advanced copy of the K. C. S. B. for 1913, I am able to pass in review that volume. First of all let me say that, notwithstanding the fact that, this year, the volume in question appeared about a fortnight later than in former years, which was simply due to the Kennel Club's removal to their present splendid premises, Mr Jaquet and his "aidesde-camp ''--Messers Russell, Boyce and Shakel and the whole clerical staffdeserve every praise for the splendid way in which they have acquitted themselves in their most difficult task, for it is only those who are "in the know" that can judge of the enormous difficulties which attend the issue of a Stud-Book of the dimensions of that of our Kennel Club.

The Volume 41st. has very much in common with its predecessors, but it would be just as well to mention a few parts of same. The most important features of the new volume are: (1) the pedigree-section, which is of great importance to dog-breeders; (2) the section containing the record of dogs which are winners, which section forms part of that of the Calendar; (3) the reference-section, which has been rendered as simple as the A. B. C.; (4) all winners of the first, second and third prizes at championship shows, for which challenge certificates have been offered by the Kennel Club, are mentioned with all their wins; (5) then comes the section of winners at fieldtrials. The most important part of the K. C. S. B. is the "Summary of Events," which has been introduced by Mr. Jaquet, and on which he ought to be heartily congratulated.

There were in 1913 1035 dog shows under K. C. rules and sanction, of which 35 championship shows, 496 nonchampionship shows and 504 sanction shows. This compares very favorably with the year 1912, for, then, 1030 shows took place under K. C. rules and sanction.

Needless to say that the Kennel Club Stud-Book is a very important vade

mecum for every dog-breeder and fancier, and should occupy a very important place in his or her library.

#### SPANISH KENNEL CLUB'S STUD-BOOK.

The Kennel Club of Spain, affiliated to the Kennel Club of England and to all the leading Canine Societies of Europe, the Colonies and America, have just issued the Volume II of their Stud Book. At the head of the governing canine body of Spain are such wellknown fanciers as Count de Lerida, Colonel Javier de Beranger and Captain Cesar Martinez, besides several others. No wonder, therefore, that the canine "affairs" in Spain are in perfect order and healthy condition. This is the third year of the existence of the Kennel Club of Spain, who every summer have their dog show in Marid. The first of their shows took place in 1911, the year of the formation of the Spanish Kennel Club. Count de Lerida and Colonel de Beranger are the heart and soul of the Club, and they have paid a visit to the English Kennel Club's Show in October 1913. The volume  $\Pi$  is as interesting as the volume I: all the entries are arranged in a very methodical and business-like manner, and the volume contains very interesting illustrations of Spanish dogs of several breeds. It contains also an introduction by Count de Lerida in which this gentleman points out the great progress which the dogfancy in Spain has had since the formation of the Spanish Kennel Club (on the 27th. of June 1911), also the report of the General Meeting on the 11th. of January last. The later speaks also of the voyage of Count de Lerida and Colonel de Beranger to England, and thanks the English Kennel Club and others for the very kind reception reserved to the above two gentlemen. We heartily wish the Spanish Kennel Club every future success. Mr. G. Horowitz is the English representive of the Club.

#### THE HOME KENNEL: The Expectant Mother. No. 5-By Mrs. Donald Shaw.

By far the most interesting event in streets, a perfect little bitch of Vickery dog breeding is the arrival of the first litter of puppies. It comes after weeks spent in preparation, after the purchase of the bitch there is the selection of the mate, the wonder whether there is to be reproduction, and if so, what form it will take. The nine weeks of gestation are weeks of speculation, during which the expectant mother must be watched and cared for as carefully as though she were human. It is not until you have lived with the female of the canine species as a daily and homely companion that you appreciate to the full how essentially she shares in various proclivities usually claimed as the special prerogatives of women.

Some friends of mine possessed a female Welsh Terrier who had been disappointed over the arrival of her first litter, I forget exactly from what cause, but afterwards as regularly as the breeding period arrived she (although carefully guarded and segregated) imagined that she was destined to bring forth a family, and throughout the full nine weeks she took upon herself all the respects of pregnancy, growing heavy and inert, accumulating milk and finally making her bed, after which she returned to he" normal aspect and habits until the time came round again. At the expiration of two years she was allowed to breed, after which the mysterious symptoms disappeared. If I had not been an eyewitness of all this I should have doubted its accuracy, as probably most of my readers will, but I know it to be a fact.

The point to which canine jealousy will go was proved to me at the time when we possessed a Fox Terrier dog of such intelligence and beauty that he was officially made an hon. member of the officers' mess, and was destined to be immortalized on canvas had not the gun of a wrathful gamekeeper cut short his career. As this case was my first attempt at systematic breeding it remains in my memory for various reasons. After considerable search for a mate who should be worthy of the ever-to-be-remembered Peter, and yet be within reach of our limited means we unearthed in the domain of one of those species of dealers who keeps their wares in lofts and up back stock, a prize winner, and with all the points required, who was being sold for \$6 because she absolutely refused to breed.

We bought her and took her home, expecting to have the nuptials consummated in about a month or two's time. She was a sympathetic, playful little person and her general appearance led one to suppose that she had been kept on painfully short rations for some time past. As the days passed she grew visibly plumper. At first this was attributed to plentiful feeding, next to overfeeding, and finally to its rightful cause-she was in whelp.

I have never seen anything quite so funny as that dealer's face when he saw her, some seven weeks after he sold her, and he promptly offered to buy her back at double the price we had given. This we refused and took her away before he could treble it.

Our disappointment, however, was great and our experience limited. Not to be outdone, my husband bought a young Redmond bitch, and we fixed up their separate kennels, fondly imagining in the ignorance of our hearts that they would settle down in love and amity.

The new arrival was quite affable and friendly. Not so the expectant mother, who, in spite of her approaching maternal responsibilities, had conceived an affection for her intended husband and acquired a prerogative over the cushions of the hearth-rug. The ladies were shut up at night in outdoor kennels, Peter occupied an armchair in the dining-room. It was the accustomed habit of the servants to let the dogs out as soon as they got down in the mornings, after which they rushed upstairs and fought on the top of me until they were flung off onto the floor and chained to the bed-posts.

The second night after the new arrival appeared, her predecessor was delivered and consumed her entire litter out of sheer hysterical jealousy. For a week afterwards she whined and shivered as though conscious of her crime and only took any interest in life when she could fly at the throat of her rival, and a fever similar in its symptoms to puerperal fever set in which necessitated much care and nursing.

The expectant canine mother, as her time of deliverance approaches, pecomes fretful and uneasy, she hates solitude, and will follow you round the house and cling close to you as though fearful of her impending ordeal.

A bed, of course, warm, dry and screened from inquisitive eyes, must be arranged for her and she must be persuaded to occupy it.

Ten chances to one, however, she will take a violent dislike to it and after examining every corner of the house (a warning to those who are watching, that the pups will soon appear) she will select some spot that suits her and evade your vigilance by every subtle trick in her power.

One bitch of mine decided that she would house her babies in a cupboard adjoining the kitchen range, where the boot brushes and other housemaids' paraphernalia were lodged, and succeeded in doing so. While another developed a partiality for the place in the pantry where old newspapers were kept and was only discovered in time to carry her bodily to the kennel she objected to.

The expectant mother will, if she be highly bred and a house pet, be "finicky'' about her food. She will refuse milk and eat voraciously of garbagesome days she will eat nothing, but always she will drink vast quantities of water, which she must never be left without day or night.

She may become fretful, quarrelsome and snappish, her entire disposition undergoing a complete temporary revolution. I often think that many valuable bitches and litters might be saved if kennelmen and surgeons recognized the fact and also the extraordinary eraving on the animal's part for human companionship. Too many of them are shut up alone in kennels and left in solitude at the crucial time, and people do not realize sufficiently that the modern highly bred dog has kept pace in his or her nervous development with that of man and woman, and that what affects a human being affects in a similar manner the canine, whose brain and nervous system are being trained up to the level which will enable him to keep his place in man's regard.

#### NOTES AND NEWS FROM ENGLAND.

Mr. Thomson, who now lives in Canada (Calgary), having finished his holiday in the old country, has left again for Canada on the 28th of February, accompanied by many dogs of nearly every variety known in England. Mr. Thomson is judging at Moose Jaw Show, in Mareh.

Mr. Dalgliesh has sold his rough Collie dog, Ellwyn Eagle, to Mr. A. J. Craig, of Tracy, Minnesota. This dog is a winner of many prizes.

To Mr. Robert Thomson, Calgary, Mr. Dalgliesh has sold the rough Collie bitch, Stratheden Gem.

Mrs. Lee of the well known Atla Kennels, Toledo, Ohio, has bought from Mr. T.Pickford the nice young rough-coated St. Bernard dog, Maxweltoun, by Saxony out of Ch. May Bloom, bred by Mr. G. Sinclair.

Colonel Ruppert, of New York, has bought from Mr. G. Long, the roughcoated St. Bernard bitch, Lady Lyndon.

I cut the following very interesting item from Our Dogs of the 27th. February last: "Our fancy (the St. Bernards) has been going strong in Canada of late, and future prospects look rosy. English fanciers find it hard to realize the immense distances which seperate the important dog centres, and the difficulty of getting a good muster at any one of them. Classes for the breed have been provided at the Queen City Kennel Club's Show, the Toronto Kennel Club's evening show, and the Vancouver Exhibition Dog Show, while the Mount Royal Kennel Club of Montreal are to cater for the breed on March 15th, next, Mr. J. McCulley, in the far-away Winnipeg, has brought out a fine young rough bitch in Lady Carlisle, a daughter of Mentor ex Lady Lyndon, whom he imported as a two-months' puppy. We have before us as we write a photo of Mr. Bert Swann's rough bitch, Alta Eva, daughter of Mr. G. Long's King Lud, and litter sister to Mrs. Lee's Alta Big Ben, the winner at New York last spring. A grand-headed bitch this, with beautiful coat and colouring, and, bar her pasterns, about as good as anything on this side. Mr. W. E. Harkness, of Toronto, has a strong lot in the young rough Alta the King (another of Mrs. Lee's breeding), Ch. Viola of Parkdale, Lady of Pearls, etc. He has been breeding some fine stock from Mistress Marmion,

one of Miss Field's breeding, by Ch. Marmion ex Oakworth Minerva.''

Apropos: from time to time one hears complaints from importers of dogs in Canada, United States of America, India, etc., that dogs do not as a rule reach them in as good condition as wished for. Well, I must say that I have sent, and am still sending a great number of dogs of nearly every breed to the Continent of Europe, to India, to the United States of America, etc., etc., and the dogs have always arrived in as perfect condition as when they had left our shores. In fact, some of them have been taken straight from the boat to the show, and have done well at the latter. I am, of course, with pleasure at the disposal of fanciers in Canada for choosing and shipping dogs of any breed to them.

The Waterloo cup, which, for the Greyhound, is of the same importance as the Derby for the thoroughbred horse took place on the 18th., 19th. and 20th, of February last, at Altcar, near Liverpool as usual. The number of visitors was very great, and many members of the Greyhound Club of France were conspicuous at Altcar, for I must say that Greyhound coursing in France is getting as popular as it is in England, Ireland and Scotland, There were three Greyhounds from abroad competing for the Cup: Once Australia and Captain Wood (both from Australia), and property of the famous actor Oscar Asvhe, and Chekan, from Russia, property of Count Cheremetieff. The latter is a fawn dog, very big, very heavy. The Australian ones weigh from 46 to 60 pounds. The Greyhound is the only breed of dogs which has preserved the same appearance as it had many centuries ago. Why? Simply because the Greyhound has always been bred for one purpose: the coursing. Of course, the show judges pretend-and very rightly too-that the coursing Greyhound is too heavy in the shoulders, not quite true in front and not quite true in his feet, but how can a dog be expected to look like a "sleeping beauty" when he has to do his proper work? Your readers will understand my meaning. The rules of Greyhound coursing have remained the same as many centuries ago, and our National Coursing Club puts the same principle to the judge: the Greyhound that

contributes the most towards the "kill" is the winner. The Waterloo Cup consists of the Cup itself, in the Purse and in the Plate. The value of the Cup is a £100 added by the Earl of Sefton (President of the National Coursing Club) for 64 subscribers at £25 each: £500 for the winner, £200 for the second, two dogs at £59 each, four dogs at £30 each, eight dogs at £20 each, and sixteen dogs at £10 each. The purse is of £315 taken from the Cup stakes for thirty-two dogs beaten in the first round of the Cup: the winner gets £75, the second £30, two dogs at £15 each, four dogs at £10 each, and eight dogs at £5 each. The plate consists of £145 taken from the Cup stakes: £75 for the winner, £30 for the second. two dogs at £10 each, four dogs at £5 each. This year's winner of the Waterloo Cup was the bitch Dilwyn (Messrs Dennis), a red one, by Batchelor's Acre out of Denwa. The Waterloo purse was divided between Brummagen and Legal Letter, and the Plate was won by Once Australia, the Greyhound from Australia. Such was the ending for the "blue ribbon of the leash." as the Waterloo Cup is commonly called in this country. If anybody says that coursing is not as popular nowadays in the old country as it has been some years ago, that person does not know what he or she is talking about: it is only necessary to go to Altear during the "Greyhound festival" to be persuaded of the contrary.

It would seem that Chow Chows are getting popular in the United States of America, and it is to be hoped that they will do the same in Canada. Many a good specimen of that breed has already left our shores for the land of dollars, amongst which Canfield Donker, a very nice red dog, sold by Mrs. Tidd.

Dr. O. P. Bennett, of Washington, United States, has just bought from Mr. Hugh Ainscough the well known Collie dog, Parbold Picaroon, which has already left these shores accompanied by a young bitch by Ch. Wearsdale Lord.

The well-known Sealyham Terrier bitch, Ace of Spades has been sold by Mr. Harold Chadwick to Mr. W. Ross Proctor of New York. The latter has also bought from the forrmer the wellknown Sealyham Terrier, Grand Slam. G. HOROWITZ.

Cairndhu Beauty, Mrs. Wylie's little black Pom bitch has a wonderful record when we consider that she is only eighteen months old. At the Canadian National Exhibition she won four firsts and winners, nine specials, including best Toy in show. At the Westminster Show, New York, she won three firsts and winners, special for best bitch and for best Canadian or American bred. At Rochester, first limit and open. At Chicage, three firsts, six specials, special for best Pom in show. She is a Canadian sired by that king of stud dogs Ch. Cairndhu Merrymaker, and up to the present has met and defeated most of the big importations around New York and Chicago.

#### BOSTONS AT ROCHESTER.

Puppy dogs brought out a poor class as far as the quality was concerned. Ist went to Checkman, a very ordinary pup, poor color, snippy in muzzle, with poor front legs. He may make up better but will never make a real good one. 2nd went to Babie a local owned one; could have changed places with the winner. 3rd went to Prince Anthoney, good color, markings and tail, but extremely course, and a heavy one.

Novice dogs went to Beau Boy who did not gain a place in the puppy class. 2nd, to Snookums, 3rd, to Murphy, these dogs were a very ordinary trio and as poor a novice class as I ever saw.

Limit under 22 lbs. went to Peters King, a half white headed dog but a good one, good in head, body and legs, and of a very strong type my kind of a Boston Terrier barring poor head markings. 2nd, to Evergreen Pro, high stationed, with no expression being lippy. 3rd, to Dallans Sample. In this dog I was very much disappointed as I expected to see a much better dog from what I had heard. A dog that was not placed at all in this class, that was an easy second was Arab Jr., good blocky type, perfect in markings and good all over, how he was lost in this class is more than I can see.

Open dogs over 22 lbs. 1st, to Peters King, 2nd to Yankee Bob, this dog has fallen away under the eyes, not as good a dog as when I saw him last fall, 3rd to Evergreen Pro. Dictator 3rd could easily have been third here as he had more class than either the second or third placed dogs, but as the judge said he could not place a dog that had a spot in the eye which was very small and he has won down East with it I cannot see why he should be placed at one show and thrown down at another.

Limit over 22 lbs. 1st Kiddo the Demon, good color and markings, but very high stationed, and shown thin. 2nd Dondero's Vicker, long in muzzle and bad in front. 3rd Dondero's Sport, poor skull and muzzle.

Open over 22 lbs. 1st Kintore Raffles, one of the old blocky type with plenty of tail, lucky to get away with this class. 2nd Kiddo the Demon, 3rd Dondero's Sport.

Winners dogs went to Peters King, Reserve to Kintore Raffles, here is where he was lucky again as there were at least three dogs that should have been placed over him.

Puppy bitches. 1st went to Trimount Lida the New York and Philadelphia winner, here is where the standard needs correction as no Toys are allowed to compete for championship honors this little bitch will never make 12 pounds in my estimation, although she is a very sweet little bitch, a trifle high on legs she is a beautiful shower and has expression that goes a long way sometimes in placing them. 2nd to Oidono, somewhat long in body and was poorly shown with her ears off, she will be heard from later. 3rd Pittsford June, good color and markings, but poor in head and muzzle.

Novice bitches 1st Oidono, 2nd Pittsford June, 3rd Tessie who could have changed places with June.

Limit under 22 ponuds, 1st the Pink Lady, white bodied with perfectly marked head put down in perfect condition, but cannot see where this bitch can defeat such good ones as Sparkling Jewell who was placed second who is decidedly more of a Boston Terrier than the winner whose body leans to the French Bull. Jewell who shows true Boston type than the lady, being perfect in markings and equally as good in head shown a trifle thin should have gone to the front here. 3rd Demons Joy, a good even marked one that with her ears off will do well but had no license to go where she did here as Madam Sherry who was not placed at all, a good sound marked bitch, should have been in the money here as well as in the following class.

Open under 22 lbs. 1st, The Pink Lady, 2nd Sparkling Jewel, 3rd Lady Matchless, how a bitch like this one can be placed over one that is practically sound as Madam Sherry is I cannot see as she has not a sound leg under her, Evergreen Evelyn a good sort of a bitch was not placed here at all.

Limit over 22 pounds. 1st Roseely Trixie, 2nd Lady Leath, a good one that has done considerable winning could easily have changed places with the winner. 3rd Lady Lucile.

Open over 22 pounds was a repeat of the Limit class.

Local dogs and bitches. 1st Lady Leath, 2nd Massoit Nick, 3rd Pittsford June, the old veteran Ch. Revilo Peach now owned in Rochester was on exhibition and looked to be in as good condition as I have seen him in late years. Winners bitches. The Pink Lady, Reserve. Sparkling Jewell, easily the better one and Madam Sherry should have been reserve.

Toy dogs and bitches went to Howards Betty the only one shown.

#### WINNIPEG NOTES.

We have never failed to attend the Annual Fixture of the W. C. K. C. in Winnipeg since its inception, and have experienced great pleasure in observing its healthy growth. We took a keen delight in personally commending the Executive of this Club at their show in May 1913, and on their choice of management generally, being so elated with the brilliant prospects that the future seemed to hold for the fixture that we believed all things possible for them, and would not have been in the least surprised if we had heard in another five years' time of a show being held with 1,500 dogs being benched, but alas for cherished hopes; We visited their show last month expecting to see an exhibition that would establish another milestone in steady advancement, but the movement instead of being forward was retrograde.

Our feeling almost baffle description. We are not built on sentimental lines, if we were, many tears would have been shed, but the fact remains, we were greatly dissappointed at seeing over 300 dogs huddled together in a building scarcely large enought to comfortably bench half the number. The isles were so narrow that the visitors found it almost impossible to stand and look at any exhibit in which they might feel particularly interested, they having to keep moving with the crowd, or suffer the penalty of being roughly jostled or crowded on to the benches.

This in particular struck us as defeating the very object for which dog shows are, or should be held. We have had considerable experience in dog shows in various countries, and we maintain that conducted on right lines they are an education to the general public, and not merely a gathering of breeders and selfish fanciers to squable and fight about the judges decisions and the possession of a few ribbons.

And where were many of the oldtimers? Gentlemen who had previously never failed to have entries, and attend in person, this fixture. Real sportsmen whose acquaintance it was a pleasure to renew, and with whom we used to discuss dogs and shows of years ago, and indulge generally in reminisences to our mutual benefit. Many of these were conspicious by their absence, and instead of the cheery faces we were accustomed to seeing, the majority of exhibitors this year were going around with expressions that we would expect to see at a funeral of some dear friend.

These conditions should not exist, and we are prepared to admit that lamentations will not go far towards improving matters, but if a timely hint will prove to be of any service in prompting the executive of this club to seek for the cause that produced this effect and eliminate it at future fixtures our effort will not have been made in vain, and we will be gratified in the knowledge that our humble effort has been productive of humble results toward the elevation of what should be a noble sport.

We also journeyed to Brandon to attend the first show held by the Wheat City Kennel Club, March 4th.-6th., and take this opportunity of heartily congratulating the exectutive on the success which crowned their first effort. Special mention might be made of Mr. W. E. Williams superintendent of the show, for his general courtsey, and untiring efforts in making the event prove an unqualified success.

In marked contrast to the feeling which prevailed at the Winnipeg Show, one could no help noticing the general good feeling which existed among exhibitors at Brandon, indeed so much was this in evidence that it was generally remarked upon throughout the show.

Mr. J. C. Fletcher, of Winnipeg, was judge of all breeds, and we wish to compliment this gentleman on the remarkable good judgement displayed by him in all classes. This was evidenced by the fact that there was not a single objection to his placings made throughout the entire show, and if we may be allowed to prophesy we predict a great future for Mr. Fletcher as a judge.

In further proof of good feeling that existed, a number of exhibitors (winners and losers alike) combined in tendering a banquet to the judge which was held at the Prince Edward Hotel after judging was completed on the closing night of the show.

The banquet was a briliant success, the guests afterwards retiring to the drawing-room where a most enjoyable time was spent a number of speeches being made, the affairs being wound up by Mr. S. C. Taylor of Winnipeg moving a hearty vote of thanks to Mr. Fletcher for the efficient manner in which he had fulfilled his arduous duties, this was seconded by Mr. Harrington of Moose Jaw and carried unanimously.

#### A BIT ON BULL TERRIERS.

To Editor of Kennel and Bench:-Dear Sir,—For the edification of novices that are breeding and showing Bull Terriers I shall esteem it a favor if you will publish a few remarks written by that eminent judge of the breed, Mr. Vinton Breese.

There are so many that confuse check muscle, shoulders and front of a Bull Terrier with those of a Fox Terrier that I feel confident that the following will enlighten many.

Mr. Breese says: The understanding that there should be no check muscle is about as ridiculous as it would be to insist that a pugilist have no biceps. It is the check muscles that gives the sides, and the lower part of the dogs head, its smooth, slightly rounded appearance by hiding the bony structure of the skull and jaw.

The Bull Terrier is the widest fronted of all Terriers. Not at shoulders. but wide because of its width of brisket and well sprung ribs. This width offers a two fold advantage; great stability and plenty of lung power, both of which are essentials of his vocation. His shoulder are strong, muscular, slanting and sit firmly on the chest. His forelegs are straight and strongly boned down to the feet, which are close and well knuckled up. As previously remarked he is the widest fronted of all Terriers, yet this is an essential to which little attention is paid nowadays. In fact instances can be called to mind where dogs possessing this quality were unknowingly spoken of by the judge as "thick in the shoulder." A thick or loaded shoulder should never be confused with a wide front. It is an over abundance of muscle on the outside of the shoulder blades.

Some months ago I sold a Bull Terrier puppy by White Nelson ex Deodora Countess to Mr. W. M. Hunter, of Regina, Sask., (by the way he is an old Toronto Bull Terrier man.) This puppy which Mr. Hunter named Bloomsbury Whitecoate, was brought out at the W. C. K. C. annual show in Winnipeg in February, where he annexed five first winners, and special for the best specimen under Mr. Cranfield, a Bull Terrier expert of Vancouver. At present this puppy is a little loose in the body but he is one of the best headed dogs we have ever seen, with a small, dark, eye and a muzzle almost as large as his skull. Mr. Cranfield the judge, thought so much of him that he is contemplating sending his Ch. Bow Bells, probably the best Bull Terrier bitch on the Coast to be bred to him.

Mr. Smyth sold to superintendant Boomer of the C. N. R. of Edmonton, Alta., a very promising puppy by White Nelson, ex Rexena, by Ch. Bloomsbury Rex. Mr. Boomer made a trip to Humboldt in his private car to visit the kennels, and was so greatly taken with it that Mr. Smyth had to let him have it. This gentleman is a good judge of the breed, and insists upon a small eye and well filled muzzle of the down faced type. He will bring out this pupy at Edmonton and Winnipeg next summer.

Mr Smyth has also sold the winning, Whitecote Czarex, who is twice inbred to Ch. Bloomsbury Rex and Bloomsbury Czar to Sheriff Wilson, of Humbodlt, Sask., who is greatly pleased with his purchase.

Czarex is a litter brother to Ch. Whitecote Animation, who attained her championship honours under Mr. Cranfield at the recent W. C. K. C. show in Winnipeg.

Another new recruit to the Bull Terrier fancy is Mr. Robbits, of Battleford, Sask., who some time ago got a Whiteeote Bull Terrier puppy and is going in strong for the breed. M. Braun of Sask., Mr. Davies, Dominion Land Agent, Mr. Rodgers, of Edmonton and Mr. Rexson have all purchased puppies.

Five years ago the Bull Terrier was practically unknown in Saskatchewan and Alberta, but to-day they have a strong following amongst influential people. There is a bright future before the breed in Western Canada.

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


