THE efforts of the Canadian Kennel Club have resulted in the adoption of a new set of rules, which are the same as were published in the February and March issues of "Kennel and Bench" with very few changes. These are reported in the meeting of the Club in this issue. We think the Club is to be congratulated on the good results of their efforts.

Probably the most important change is the introduction of the rule printed

CAUTION TO JUDGES, SHOW COMMITTEES AND OTHERS.

Any person or persons acting in any official capacity, paid or unpaid, including that of judge, secretary, superintendent, steward, clerk of a show, or as an officer or member of a Bench Show Committee of any club holding a show in the Dominion of Canada under any rules other than those of the Canadian Kennel Club (Incorporated) shall be disqualified and debarred from all privileges of the same.

CAUTION TO JUDGES, SHOW COMMITTEES AND OTHERS.

The official advertisement which appears on this page plainly indicates the intention of the Canadian Kennel Club in publishing it, namely, to warn per-

above. The force of this rule will be better understood when we explain that under the Reciprocity Agreement between the English and American Kennel Clubs, in which the Canadian Kennel Club is included, being affiliated with the English Kennel Club, a disqualification by the Canadian Kennel Club is recognised, and becomes a disqualification in both of these clubs. The fairness of the rule will also be recognized when it is pointed out that this rule does not in any way affect exhibitors or their dogs.

The next important change over which there was a great deal of discussion was the elimination of Club representation on the Executive. It was pointed out that this tended all to the advantage of Toronto, for Club representation outside of Toronto was purely figurative, whereas in Toronto there are eleven Clubs who could each possibly have representation with a very small membership and so control the club affairs. The elimination of this part of the old rule, leaves the

sons of the consequences in officiating in a show not held under the license or sanction of the Canadian Kennel Club in any part of the Dominion of Canada.

The advertisement is not issued in anyway as a threat.

Any person is at liberty to judge, or be officially connected with an unrecognized show, if he so chooses, but if he does so, the Canadian Kennel Club says that the presence of himself will not be permitted hereafter in any capacity at any show held under their authority.

If in the future there are unfortunately any persons who may have cause to regret having deserted the ranks of the Canadian Kennel Club for any other organization, they will be unable to plead that they did not have due warning of the consequence of their acts.

club entirely elective, beginning with next September 1st.

The registration of prefix, affix and kennel name was all combined in one, one fee covering them all. This will do away with any chance of the registration of the same name as prefix by one fancier, and as a kennel name by another.

One important change in the rule for registration of dogs is that application for registration must be made on forms supplied by the club. It is the intention of the club to supply these forms to every provincial Vice-President in order to facilitate the getting of them by members at a distance. For a short time there may be confusion and some delay in getting this method started, but it will tend greatly to uniformity in the files of the club, and to the avoidance of mistakes.

The new dog show rule number XIII which was passed after much discussion, unamended, is one which must go through an experimental stage. It can be easily understood that the right

to withdraw dogs from competition and demand the return of entry fee might work out greatly to the injustice of some show. If it happened that the change of judge at a show caused a great deal of dissatisfaction and the withdrawal of many of the dogs, along with the return of their entry fee, it might be the ruin of the show, as there must, in every event, be considerable outlay before the judging starts, but we think we can trust to the fair mindedness of our exhibitors that such an event does not occur.

The recognition of the Junior Class by the Canadian Kennel Club is a step in the proper direction, though it adds considerably to the work of the office. This is a very popular class, in fact, in the larger breeds it fills the place of the puppy classes. The puppy class also is now thrown open to imported dogs. The only restriction in this class is the one of age.

Changes in winners class are numerous and important. To compete for points for a championship cup a dog must be registered as well as belong to a member, and for the title itself, three different shows and three different judges are necessary.

The number of dogs for a five-point show have been lowered from 650 to 600. When it is pointed out that it

was very uncertain that we could get enough dogs for even one five-point show in each year under the old rule, the lowering of the necessary number was eminently fair.

A new set of points has been introduced as an experiment for class shows. Time will show if they are of value or not.

Under the regulations, No. I, Sec. 3 prohibits similar dates being granted to two clubs within two hundred miles of each other. The wisdom of this is obvious.

We have already commented on II., Section 3.

III., Sec. 2 allows the acceptance of entries up to within two days of the show. As the old rules of seven days was one that was never observed, the club thought fit to reduce this to the closest date possible and to enforce the observance of the same.

Probably no part of the rules so much needed proper definition as that of the duties of the veterinary surgeon. These duties have often been neglected, or perfunctorily carried out. It is now definitely stated that the dogs must be examined before being benched; also examined on the first day before 6 p.m., and at least once every morning during the show. Veterinary surgeons should not accept ap-

pointment who are not prepared to carry out this rule and show committees for their own protection should see that it is carried out.

In the printing of the rules an omission was made of the rule referring to medals. This rule remains as it was in the old rules, the Club having no intention of making any change.

We wonder why so many of our fanciers are inclined to falsify or exaggerate the price paid or offered for a dog. We recently saw a publication of a ridiculous offer of \$800 for a Pit Bull Terrier, an unestablished and practically unrecognized breed, each owner having his own type; in fact, a breed kept for pit purposes as its name indicates, and therefore not subject to a standard of type for showing, and accordingly of very little value as a show dog. Do the publishers of such reports imagine for a moment that they deceive anyone? They only make laughing-stocks of themselves and bring a bad name to the dog game. There is nothing gained by this form of dishonesty. It is not necessary to state or publish the price of an offer or of a sale; but if this is done, the true figure would advance the dog, its vendor, purchaser, and the fancy more than any fictitious value.

General Meeting of the Canadian Kennel Club, Inc.

For purpose of adopting a new Constitution, By-Laws and Rules.

The meeting was called to order by the President, Mr. John G. Kent, at 8.30 p.m. in Simpson's Hall, 734 Yonge Street, Toronto on April 30th.

Mr. G. F. McFarland spoke of the necessity of having new rules on account of the change of conditions in the Club, and in dog affairs in general, and outlined the work done by the Rules Committee.

The rules were then taken up separately, and all were passed without comment, with the following amendments:

Article V, Section I, Mr. McFarland spoke at length on the dropping of the representation by individual clubs on the Executive Committee, pointing out that there were eleven of such in Toronto, and that it tendered to give Toronto undue representation on the Executive Committee. Mr. Atkinson and Mr. Jacobi also spoke.

It was moved by Atkinson, seconded by Mr. Milburn that Article V, Section I, be adopted as read. CARRIED.

RIED.

Law V, Section 7. Moved by Mr. A. A. Lees, seconded by Mr. F. Jacobi that it read as follows: "Registration of prefix, affix and kennel name \$3.00. Annual renewal of same 50 cents. CARRIED.

Dog Show Rule XIII. Moved by Mr. Atkinson, seconded by Mr. Coulter, that the old rule be restored. LOST.

Moved by Mr. Farquharson, seconded by Mr. Wilson that rules be changed, so that it require that the dog remain on the bench, but that the entry fee will be refunded. LOST.

The new rule XIII was then put before the meeting and carried.

Dog Show Rule XV. Moved by Mr. Farquharson, seconded by Mr. John Kenyon that the following class be introduced as Section 2nd:

The Junior Class shall be for dogs over six months and not exceeding eighteen months of age, and no entry can be made of one whose date of birth is unknown. CARRIED.

Part of Section 5th was amended to read as follows: "All winners of classes recognized by the Canadian

Kennel Club must compete in the Winners class. No entry fee shall be charged for entry fee in this class.

On Rule XXII the word "objection" was corrected to "protest."

Regulations governing clubs holding shows under C. K. C. Rules. No. XII was corrected to read as follows: "Within twenty-four hours after the close of the show" instead of "within twenty-four hours."

Moved by Mr. McFarland, seconded by Mr. Jacobi that the old Constitution, By-Laws and Rules be rescinded. CARRIED.

Moved by Mr. McFarland, seconded by Mr. Atkinson that the Constitution, By-Laws and Rules be adopted as amended and come in force at once with the exception of the Mount Royal Kennel Club Show, which will be held under the old Rules.

Moved by Mr. Kent, seconded by Mr. Barron that a standing vote of thanks be given to the Rules Committee for the large amount of labor and careful attention given by them in drafting the new set of rules. CARRIED.

The meeting adjourned.

Reciprocity Agreement

Between The Kennel Club as representing The Kennel Club and the Clubs affiliated with it, and The American Kennel Club as representing the United States of America and its possessions.

The following agreement between The Kennel Club, London, England,
and The American Kennel Club, New York City, New York,
has been duly approved and ratified, this
12th day of March, 1914

I. A mutual exchange and recognition of "Black Lists" as they now exist, and any addition or alteration thereto to be at once mutually communicated. [A "Black List" to mean the official communication received by one Club from the other containing the names and addresses of persons who have been either suspended or disqualified under the Rules of "The Kennel Club," or who are not in good standing under the Rules of "The American Kennel Club."]

II. That any desired information of a confidential nature pertaining to the standing or reputation of any person engaged in judging, breeding, or showing dogs, shall be freely exchanged upon request of either Club through the official channel of its Secretary.

III. In order to prevent the granting of Kennel Names, prefixes and affixes, that may be identical with names granted or pending with The Kennel Club, The American Kennel Club agrees that it will not grant any application for a Kennel Name, prefix or affix, that may have been published in each month's issue of "The Kennel Gazette" (English) under the heading "Applications for Prefixes," until after the receipt of the latest number of said Kennel Gazette.

The American Kennel Club further agrees that it will not pass upon or grant any

application pending with it before the twentieth day of each month.

IV. That every registered dog imported from the one Country to the other must be re-registered in its adopted Country in its own name, and in every particular as registered in the Country of its birth, and that if its own name be already registered in the Country of its adoption by a dog of the same breed, it must still be re-registered in its own name, to be followed by the abbreviation "Eng." or "Am." as the case may be, and that no dog imported from either England or America that has been registered in accordance with this rule can be renamed.

V. That as the American Kennel Club only permits American-bred dogs to compete in its Novice Class, The Kennel Club agrees to frame a regulation prohibiting dogs to compete in any of its Novice or Maiden Classes that have acquired the title of Champion under American Kennel Club Rules.

No show could be run successfully in Victoria without the help of Miss Gladys Creighton the charming daughter of President Creighton. Miss Creighton is the oldest young exhibitor on the Pacific Coast, and worked hard having charge of the prizes at this show and had them nicely arranged, and handed them to Mrs. Brownlee who in turn presented them with all grace to the successful winners.

Dan Thody while in Victoria bought from Frank Turner Ch. Mallwyd Prince by Ch. Mallwyd Bob ex Alberts Rosiland. Ch. Mallwyd Prince is considered the greatest sire on the Coast since the death of his famous sire, Ch. Mallwyd Bob. All the Coast fanciers were greatly disappointed on learning of Ch. Mallwyd's Prince departure, but what is the Coast's loss will be Alberta's gain.

The mix up in the judging ring at Victoria while judging Limit Airedale dogs was very unfortunate in more ways than one, and at that a lucky one for no one was hurt and Captain Kettle next morning showed but two wounds from the previous nights battle with Ellwyn Oorang.

TORONTO KENNEL CLUB EVENING SHOW.

The Toronto Kennel Club held their final event on Tuesday, April 28th. For this occasion they had the large dance hall in Occident Hall, a splendid room for the event, and every effort was made to have the show a success. We do not think the dog men in Toronto sufficiently appreciate the efforts of the club to help on the game by these evening shows, or both they and their dogs would have turned out in larger numbers. Surely it is not that the paltry admission fee charged kept them away. Perhaps it was the lateness of the date. However, the club did their best and deserved better support. The cups offered were a beautiful lot, too good for evening shows.

The judge of the evening was Mr. Chas. Lyndon, a wise choice for an all-rounder, and his awards were generally well accepted. The Sir Henry Pellatt cup was awarded to Mr. Joseph Perkins' Hawes Broom. The Kent cup was competed for by the Mastiff, Hertford Nancy, and the Whippet, Blue Prince. Blue Prince was in poor coat, not having recovered from the effects of his burns, otherwise he should have easily won, as the Mastiff was very weak behind and in anything but good condition. Mr. J. E. Dowling was alone in the competition for the Bain cup, and the Mortimer cup, winning both with Belgrave Lady of Lambare. The competition for the McFarland cup brought out a good Airedale puppy by Buster Briar, which does not show himself well yet, but has a very nice stamp of head. The bitch, Persister, shown heavy in whelp, won the cup, however. The Ben Lewis cup, the Two P's cup and a collar were won by Mrs. Peter Herd's beautiful little chocolate Pom, Kelvinside Perfection. Marr's Wee Chinese carried off a beautiful set of silver tea spoons offered by Mrs. Carruthers. Five dollars in gold, offered by Mr. Joseph Perkins, went to Mr. Thomas Harlow's neat little Wire-haired Fox Terrier puppy. The Ryrie medal went to Kelvinside Model. The consolation cash special was won by Mrs. Delaney's Toy Black and Tan Terrier.

After the judging Mrs. Carruthers very kindly and graciously donated the prizes and cups to the winners, and a flashlight was taken of the club members.

TERMINAL CITY KENNEL CLUB SHOW

The 3rd Annual Bench Show of the Terminal City Kennel Club went down in history as the greatest show ever held in Vancouver, the management could not be improved upon, everything went smooth as clockwork, and the weather was ideal which helped swell the gate receipts. The Wire Fox Terriers were a strong class and the ladies were in the majority as Exhibitors.

DACHSHUNDS. Schubert went from puppy to winners, a fair one all over. Bitches, Tootsie went to winners and secured special for being best in show being a wonderful black and tan, her head points are good, she also has a grand body, legs and feet of the best.

WHIPPETS. Limit bitches, Wild Fern only fair. Open and winners went to Polly Jones a nice Whippet all over.

C. Finlay, Mr. Alf. S. Ansleay, Mr. N. R. Miller, Mr. J. Meehan, Dr. A. E. Mooney, Mr. Lindsay, Messrs. Kerr Bros., all dropped out from active showing, greatly to the detriment of the fancy. Let's hope we can coax them back again.

FIRST ANNUAL SHOW OF THE BULLDOG BREEDERS' ASSOCIATION OF CANADA.

We fancy the first experience of this worthy club will act as an incentive toward many repeats. It was one of the best run, quietest specialty shows in our experience, very little fuss and all business, and an entry of 59 dogs present indicates that the Committee and officers worked hard and well, and the exhibitors showed their confidence and appreciation by such an entry. We think the club was wise in the way they carried out their show, that is, at a minimum expense. The results were just as good as though they had been lavish and extravagant, while the Club's exchequer must tell a vastly different story. It is better for a small club to go slow, and err on the economical side. The Bulldog Breeders Association may be accused of this, but we think they can sit back and fold their arms and smile at the criticism. The show was held in a vacant store on Church Street, two stories being used, the lower for benching and the upper for judging. They proved too small, but that was due to the success of the club in getting out the big entry. Had the entry been smaller, the space would have been ample. The benching was kindly lent by the Boston Terrier Club, the generosity of whom has made many shows possible. The judging ring upstairs was as big as could be had in the building, but altogether too small, especially as there were several posts in it, and to this was due any errors that the judge made in his decisions, for at times there were sixteen dogs in the ring at once, and it was difficult to avoid stepping on them and almost impossible to get a good view from either inside or outside the ring. The stewarding of the ring was well carried out, and we can heartily commend the innovation of having the wins announced by the ring steward, Mr. Joseph Perkins, at the end of each class. This was even better than the usual score board. Let us speak one word to the credit of the followers of this breed. The dignity, and serenity of the breed was reflected in the behavior of the exhibitors, and that is as it should be.

The judge Mr. Dale, of Petrolia, can only be congratulated for the fearlessness of his judging. He was under every possible handicap and was, as usual, criticized for making reversals; but as his reversals were in nearly

every case corrections of mistakes made in judging at the early stage of the game, they are to be commended rather than to be criticized. His judgment in the main was consistent.

PUPPY DOGS started in the hot stuff at once with the first "Pentland Clansman" one we have spoken of very often at our evening shows. He is a massive heavyweight brindle, with magnificent front, bone and shoulders, very low to ground, sound all over, well ribbed. He is a little long cast, and lacks massiveness of head, which, however, is of beautiful type all through. Second, Ashland Jumbo, grand substance and foreface, good straight legs and well ribbed, with a good short body and sound. He was an easy second, in fact, the first and second in this class stood rather well away from the other seven. Third, Lucky Strike, a white pied with good wrinkle, good bone, sound, good rib, good skull but gay in ears and lacks ring manners. Reserve, Pressgang Don Solano, has a good underjaw, grand substance of foreface, which, however, is not sufficiently finished, a bit long in body and at present a little high, big in ear but in the ring they were well carried. Unmentioned were Largo who lacks bone, and is long enough in body, and King Harold, small in head and plain in face, but will improve. In Maiden dogs, first Pentland Clansman, second Black Diamond, grand short body, splendid roach, deep foreface, but a little short in underjaw and not sufficiently up-faced. Third Willie Sykes, has a good skull and grand rib, might have had a bit more bone and is high enough. Junior dogs, first, Pentland Clansman; second, Black Diamond. Third, Ashland Little Nipper, the little fellow we liked so much in New York, and wonderfully improved as his only serious fault, his feet, have been in the hands of the manicurist which has done him a world of good, we liked him much the best of all the lightweights. Unquestionably he was placed too low in his class, which mistake the judge saw later on and rectified. He has a short body and massive bone, and walks with the typical Bulldog roll. His head is a dream, with a splendid turnup of underjaw and a really well broken upface, and splendid expression. Whether he or Pentland Clansman should have received reserve winners is a question, but Little Nipper is by far the most typical dog, only marred by his bad feet. Reserve, Lucky

Strike. Unmentioned was Cheetham Marquis, magnificent in skull and face, but a backward dog that should come on. Novice dogs, under 45 lbs., first, Black Diamond, second Largo; Limit dogs, under 45 lbs., first, Ashland Little Nipper; Second, Golden Star, the best roached dog in the show with a good compact body and a nice type all over, but he was lucky to beat the third dog, Worsley Costermonger, well shown and in good condition, massive lightweight, extremely low to ground, and therefore a little awkward in action, but easily the second best dog in the class, if not the best, which evidently the judge thought later on when he reversed himself, and put him second in the grand challenge class. Reserve, Toronto Bill, short body and good front, but wants bone. Open dogs, under 45 lbs.—First, Ashland Little Nipper; Second, Ch. Argo, who either has gone back, or his company has improved. His lack of bone was very marked. He looks stale and tight in skin. Third, Golden Star. Reserve, Worsley Costermonger. Novice dogs (45 lbs. and over). First, Pentland Clansman. Second, Willie Sykes. Third, Cheetham Marquis. Reserve, Biligan, good head, ears and face, well sprung rib, a bit long in body and high and wants bone. Limit dogs, (45 lbs. and over). First, Moston Marshall an old favorite with a splendid foreface, length of skull and grand underjaw, good front and fair bone and ribs, but getting a little weak behind. Second, Ashland Tom Sawyer, a fawn with good ribs and body, but lacking expression, finish of face and bone. He was extremely lucky. Third, Woodcote Merry Boy with his grand body, bone and skull but is showing signs of age. Reserve, Radiant Stone, a dog with strong points and strong faults. He was probably the best bodied, boned dog in the show, and has splendid girth of skull, but is tight in shoulder and absolutely lacking in all underjaw properties, still he might have been either second or third. Breeders dogs, first, Black Diamond. Second, Ashland Little Nipper; Third, Ch. Argo. Reserve, Ch. Cheetham Squire. It is very evident from this that the judge does not like an extremely big dog such as Cheetham Squire, and who though short in leg towered above the others on account of the depth of his body and his great size, but we cannot see how any judge got past his

face and placed him so low in this company. Canadian bred dogs. First, Black Diamond. Second, Ch. Argo. Third, Ch. Cheetham Squire. Reserve, Cheetham Marquis. Stud dogs.—First, Ch. Cheetham Squire. Second, Ch. Argo. Winners dogs, Moston Marshall. Reserve, Pentland Clansman. As we said before, however, it was a toss up with Little Nipper for reserve. Veteran dogs. First, Moston Marshall; Second, Woodcote Merry Boy.

Puppy bitches. First, Ashland Disappointment, good in body and bone, a bit high and a bad placement of eye, which are too oblique and spoil the expression. Second, Lady Kitty Canuck, good length of skull, but narrow in foreface, too straight in underjaw and a bit high. Third, Sheila of Lambaré, a nice cobby one of general good type, good roach and shoulder with a doubtful ear, but we place her an easy first in the puppy class. Reserve, Donna Pressgang Despeca, a miniature of good type, cobby, well developed, with a grand underjaw, and we prefer her as second in this class. Maiden bitches. First, Ashland Nigger, very short, good body, nice bone, good underjaw and grand expression but her condition, both as to coat and flesh, were poor. Second, Nelly Diamond, a good type golden brindle, hard to fault, well broken up face, deep stop, but a bit high. Third, Pentland Lass, wants bone, and is high enough, good ears and good body. Reserve, Dundee Lady Betty, a good type bitch with straight hocks, but absolutely not fit to show. Junior bitches.—First, Cheetham Countess, a grand brindle, grandly conditioned, grandly shown and grandly handled, and, as she was in the ring, won in a walk, and will push the best anywhere. On the bench she may have doubtful ears, but the judge tested her carefully for this, and could not fault her. She took winners fairly. Second, Rydal Stone Ruby, fair bone and bad eye, splendid wrinkle, good body and roach. Third, Shiela of Lambaré. Reserve, Ashland Disappointment. Here the judge corrected his mistake of the puppy class in these last two bitches, and by leaving Lady Kitty Canuck out entirely. Novice bitches, under 40 lbs. First, Ashland Nigger. Second, Sherwood Miss Gallant, a fair brindle pied. Third, Nelly Diamond, who might have been second. Reserve, Ashland Lucky, good body, shoulder and bone, good cushion, but not square

enough in foreface. Limit bitches, under 40 lbs. First, Ashland Nigger. Second, The Little Diamond, shown in perfect condition, and a lovely model of a Bulldog everywhere, easily the best in this class, and our choice by a wide margin for reserve winners. Third, Ashland Lady, a fawn with good rib but pinched in nostril and not strong enough in underjaw. Reserve, Dundee Lady Betty. Open bitches, under 40 lbs.—First, Little Diamond. Second, Belgrave Lady of Lambaré, too well known to need description, but showed listlessly, having recently whelped. Third, Ashland Lady. Reserve, Dundee Lady Betty. Novice bitches, 40 lbs. and over.—First, Donna Salonga, grand foreface and underjaw, good big flat skull, lacking in bone, and long in body. Second, Pentland Lass, uncertain in one ear, might be lower and with more bone, in fact needs finish, has a beautiful deep brisket. Third, Rydalstone Ruby. Reserve, Lady May, big foreface and good rib, lacks layback and is heavy in ear. Limit 40 lbs and over. First, Cheetham Countess. Second, Ashland Bonnie, grand substance, rich brindle color, splendid bone and good shoulder, but unfinished in face. Third, Donna Salonga. Reserve, Rydalstone Ruby. Open bitches—40 lbs. and over—First, Cheetham Countess; Second her dam, Ch. Layham Pride, looking well, stiff behind. Third, Ashland Bonnie. Reserve, Merry Widow Stone, a good ribbed fawn, low to ground and fair in head.

Breeders bitches.—First, The Little Diamond. Second, Titterstone. Third, Ashland Lady. Reserve, Oakville Buster, uncertain in ears. Canadian bred bitches.—First, Cheetham Countess. Second, The Little Diamond. Third, Belgrave Lady of Lambaré. Reserve, Donna Salonga. Brood bitches.—First, Worsley Peggy, good short body, but lacks layback. Second, Rydalstone Aysha. Veteran bitches.—First, Merry Widow Stone. Second Lady May. Miniature. (Dogs and bitches). First, Gypsy Queen. Second, Oakville Glory. Brace class.—First, Mr. Boothe. Second, Mr. E. P. Hinds. Third, C. E. Metcalf. Trio class.—First, Mr. E. P. Hinds. Second, C. E. Metcalf. Third, H. A. Wilson. The grand challenge class was won by Moston Marshall, second, Worsley Costermonger. Third, Ashland Little Nipper. Reserve, Belgrave Lady, which position should have

gone to the Little Diamond.

Winners bitches, Cheetham Countess. Reserve, Ashland Nigger, who, as we said before, should have given way to the Little Diamond.

CH. WESTON QUEEN O' QUALITY DEAD.

Collie breeders and owners will no doubt regret to hear that Mr. Tom Milner has lost, through abortion, that great prize winner and brood bitch, Ch. Weston Queen O' Quality. Queen was well known East as well as West. Fresh in the memory is her debut at O. K. C. show when as a puppy Donald Munroe sent her from puppy to winners. She repeated her performance at C. N. E. under Dr. Jarrett. At London, Ont., two years in succession she walked away with highest honors, including the Dr. Niven silver cup for best Collie in show. At Winnipeg, under Frank Dole, she was the leading lady, taking everything in sight. Below is given reports by Collie authorities, which prove she was no "handler-made champion." Canadian Kennel Gazette, Nov., 1911, says on her win at C. N. E., Toronto: The winning bitch, Weston Queen O' Quality, is of exceptional merit, sound and of good substance, beautifully fashioned, long head, excellent expression and symmetrical. James Watson, in his report of London show says: Weston Queen O' Quality took winners in a walk. The American Field, in their report of Toronto show, says: "The winner in bitches, Weston Queen O' Quality, is most aptly named, being a grand Collie all over, with a perfect head, ears and expression, good legs and feet, and sound hindquarters." As a brood bitch she produced Ch. Weston All Quality and many other winners, including Weston Primrose, a grand 12-month puppy, a big winner at Winnipeg, Brandon and Moose Jaw the only times shown. We feel sure that her death will be regretted by many owners and fanciers as sincerely as it is by her breeder, Tom Milner. Queen was the first Canadian-bred Collie to win championship honors in Western Canada.

The Ontario Collie Club intend holding an evening show in Occident Hall on May 15th, with Mr. J. T. Reeves as judge.

The well-known Scottish Terrier bitch, Champion Romany Olivia, has been sold to Mr. F. Stern, of New York, by her owner Miss McKenzie, of Kirkeudbright. She is a grand bitch, indeed.

Mr. W. C. Morrison, of Calgary, Canada, while on a visit to Scotland, has persuaded Mr. R. J. Shennan, the keen Scottish Terrier breeder, to part with the very promising young Scottish Terrier dog, whose name, however, does not transpire.

As St. Bernards seem to be in great favor in Canada, I think that the following criticism sent to "Our Dogs" by Mr. Montefiore Kahn will be of interest to your readers. Of course, the St. Bernards at the late New York Show, with Mrs. Lee as judge, form the subject of this criticism. The entry of 30 dogs, making 51 entries, was very poor for America's biggest and best show, and with few exceptions the specimens benched were hardly up to the usual standard. Puppies mixed (3 entries): first and second, Messers F. and A. Stuart, Robert the Bruce and Thanksgiving, litter brother and sister, a nicely marked pair; the former a fair pup on the small side, and a little long in face; the latter rather small and light in bone. Roughs—Novice Dogs (4 entries); first, F. and A. Stuart's Beethoven, a fair specimen with fine bone, but small, wants expression through a too-black mask. Second; T. O. Crown's Valais Imerator, fair type, and may improve with age, ears set too high, lacks expression, might move better, and curly in coat. Third: Willowmere Kennels White Star Bobbie nice big dog, with type and good head, shown light and in poor coat, otherwise might have gone top. American bred: Dogs and bitches (3 entries)—first—Ch. Pfeleiderer, Valais Wolfram, of the imported smooth, Flo of Denbigh, a fine big dog, in good form, lots of substance, grand legs, good carriage, and only lacks benevolence owing to his solid black mask, ears a bit high for popular taste, but this only emphasizes his breadth of skull. Second: White Star Kennels, Hercuven Night Watch, another grand dog, shown out of coat, and a strong competitor for first, big all through, great depth of face and breadth of skull, nice small eye and

ear, and moves like a hackney. Third: J. Ruppert Jun., Elkwood Perfection, a grand bitch, big, upstanding, and teeming with type, fine head, small eye, and the best action of any shown. Res. Beethoven. Limit—Dogs (4 entries): V. Wolfram, H. N. Watch, Beethoven, V. Impeator, in order named. Open—Dogs (3 entries): first and second repeats. Winners Dogs repeats. Novice Bitches (3 entries): A weak class. Limit bitches (4 entries) first J. Ruppert Jun., the newly imported Lady Lyndon, the one magnificent specimen of the show. subsequently winning special for best St. Bernard, shown in grand form, has coat, markings, expression, bone and action, only possible criticism is exaggerated depth of brisket. We look to this bitch for the future of the breed if properly mated. Second: Messers F. and A. Stuart's Montphesa (exported by Mr. F. C. Randall): a fine typey bitch, but small, with a marked resemblance to her sire, Ch. Lord Montgomery, good head, nicely marked, but lacks expression. Third: E. Perfection. Open Bitches (3 entries), repeats. Smooth—American bred, Dogs and Bitches (3 entries)—first Mrs. Bardsley, Alta Lady Guide, has size and color to recommend her, but might be heavier in bone, plain in head, and expression spoilt by a full eye. Second White Star Kennels Dolly La Valetta, a grand bitch, shown in good form, and full of quality, fine color, might have won. Third: J. Ruppert Jun. Southwind, a bitch much on lines of winners, but a bit better in face. Limit, Open and Winners Bitches—repeats.

The Kennel Gazette, the official organ of the Kennel Club of England, in its issue for March, 1914, contains a "Résumé" and details of the "Agreement between the American Kennel Club and the Kennel Club," of which I will quote the résumé in extenso. It is with great satisfaction, writes Mr. Jaquet, the very able Editor of the "Kennel Gazette," that we are able to announce that a reciprocity agreement has been entered into between the American Kennel Club and the Kennel Club. This agreement will have a salutary and far reaching effect, not only as regards good government in canine affairs

throughout the world, but as further cementing the already firm friendship which exists between the Kennel Club and the governing body of America. . . . The intention of Clause I is to ensure that persons disqualified from exhibiting at any show under the authority of either Club in the one country, will also be disqualified in the other. This must have a very wide application, for in addition to the person being disqualified, the disqualification extends to the dogs owned by him. Further, it must be remembered that disqualification applies not only to persons guilty of fraudulent or discreditable conduct, but also to those who may have taken part in any capacity at unrecognised Exhibitions, in this case the persons implicated, and all dogs owned by them, become equally penalised. In these circumstances it is manifest that any application from a disqualified person for an export certificate for a dog intended for America, will be refused by the Kennel Club. The meaning and intention of Clause II is so obvious that no reference is required beyond and expression of opinion that nothing but good can result from such exchange of confidential communications as are there indicated. Clause III will prevent the registering of the same kennel name, prefix or affix by different persons. Clause IV deals with the registration of dogs imported into either country, whereby it is agreed that a dog registered in one country must be re-registered in the country of origin, followed by the abbreviation "Eng." or "Am." respectively, as the case may be, and further that no imported dog can have its name changed under any circumstances. The object of Clause V. is to prevent any dog which has acquired the title of "Champion" under American Kennel Club Rules, competing in Novice or Maiden Clases at Shows held under Kennel Club Rules.

We feel sure, concludes the Kennel Gazette, that every one interested in the breeding and exhibition of dogs will hail with satisfaction an agreement which has not been arrived at without much careful deliberation on both sides, and which will prove to be of the greatest benefit to all who recognise the advantages of stable government.

I continue to receive enquiries from Canadian fanciers whether I would undertake to procure and ship dogs of

English or Continental breeds, to which enquiries I can again say "with the greatest pleasure," and may add that everything in my power shall be done to give the importers every satisfaction with regard to the dogs chosen, as well as with regard to the shipment of same. My long experience in dogs of all breeds and my judging appointments in this country and on the Continent, (France, Italy, Spain, Portugal, etc.) can vouch for this.

But there is at least one man in the Peg that can name such a specimen, and that honor falls to the lot of "Yorky." Then comes Madison Magnet, a terrier that needs no comment upon, as he has proved his worth too often, "and is ready for it again." I hope the owner of Warren Resemblance will not take the above phrase in the wrong light, but when one sees these reports on dogs going round, the reverse to what they should be, then it is up to somebody to jump in. Hoping this will catch the eye of "Oculus" and ease his mind a little.

She found out that there was no doubt that Ruby Royale had picked up poison spread for rats, when she went behind the counter at the drug store, and as the same thing occurred at the time of the death of Lady Halstead, there is little doubt she also had picked up some poison. Both cases were in the same drug store. There are a great many dogs killed by accidentally picking up poison in both houses and stores. Everybody has trouble with rats and mice, and naturally put poison about to kill them. It is also natural for dogs to nose about in dark corners and behind counters just where the poison would be placed. The death of Mrs. Halstead's dogs should act as a warning to fanciers to keep their dogs at heel or on
