CAUTION TO JUDGES, SHOW COMMITTEES AND OTHERS.

Any person or persons acting in any official capacity, paid or unpaid, including that of judge, secretary, superintendent, steward, clerk of a show, or as an officer or member of a Bench Show Committee of any club holding a show in the Dominion of Canada under any rules other than those of the Canadian Kennel Club (Incorporated) shall be disqualified and debarred from all privileges of the same.

CAUTION TO JUDGES, SHOW COMMITTEES AND OTHERS.

The official advertisement which appears on this page plainly indicates the intention of the Canadian Kennel Club in publishing it, namely, to warn per-

sons of the consequences in officiating in a show not held under the license or sanction of the Canadian Kennel Club in any part of the Dominion of Canada.

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The advertisement is not issued in anyway as a threat.

Any person is at liberty to judge, or be officially connected with an unrecognized show, if he so chooses, but if he does so, the Canadian Kennel Club says that the presence of himself will not be permitted hereafter in any capacity at any show held under their authority.

If in the future there are unfortunately any persons who may have cause to regret having deserted the ranks of the Canadian Kennel Club for any other organization, they will be unable to plead that they did not have due warning of the consequence of their acts.

cost, it would make royal reading. We know of one member who threw down a judging appointment of considerable monetary value without a murmur, and he needed every cent of it.

The chief criticism offered to this rule has been that it was too mild, and should have gone farther, and disqualified everyone in anyway connected with a show under adverse rules. No doubt the Club erred, but on the right side, thereby not punishing the exhibitor, on whom it might act as a hardship to be compelled to keep away from shows when these are few and far between.

That the rules, or this rule, should have been left to the annual meeting to waste its time over, is childish. These rules were carefully revised by a competent committee, received the endorsement of the Executive, and were passed by a general meeting of the Club, of which meeting every member received a notice. Moreover, this meeting was well attended, and showed

a marked, even keen, interest in the welfare of the Club. Besides, the rule under discussion was passed at all three stages without objection, bar one, which expressed the wish that the opinion of the Club should be asked, and which, of course, was the regular procedure of the Club, and was done as a matter of course.

However, we must take with more than a grain of salt, this deep interest, so markedly shown by our earnest friends, who to demonstrate their interest, would hand over the whole Canadian Kennel Club to an outside club, simply because, as the branch of such a club, the remuneration of the officials engaged, might have been greater.

As an answer to the criticism of the severity of this rule, we append the rule of the "Kennel Club" (England) on the same subject, which makes our rule look like a Golden Text in mildness.

News reaches us of a split in the circles of Winnipeg dogdom. For months past a feeling has been gaining ground to the effect that unfair discrimination is being shown against some dogs exhibited at local and western shows, notwithstanding that these same dogs have been entered by a number of exhibitors who were amongst the first to establish bench shows and to advance the cause of the dog show in Winnipeg and Western Canada. Owners of many different varieties are among the malcontents, but the general dissatisfaction existing has found expression in the decision of the Dominion Collie Club members, who have announced that they decline to exhibit their dogs at the Canadian Industrial Exhibition in July, in consequence of their request for a special Collie judge to officiate at that function having been refused. In justice to the Collie fanciers of Winnipeg and Manitoba it should be remembered that no other breed (apart from bird and field trial dogs) has been so uniformly successful in Canada and the United States, in recent years, as the Collie; and that Winnipeg owners can claim the unique record of having bred or developed a champion dog or bitch of the breed at regular intervals for the last five years without a break. In support of this statement it is only necessary to mention Tom Milner's late Ch. Western Queen O'Quality, and Ch. Western All Quality; W. Harvey

ANY PERSON PROMOTING, EXHIBITING, JUDGING, or in any way Officiating at a SHOW not held under the licence or sanction of the Kennel Club or delegated authority WILL BE DISQUALIFIED from judging, competing, winning a prize, making an objection, or taking part at a Show or Field Trial held under the permission of the Committee of the Kennel Club or delegated authority. A DOG EXHIBITED or RUN at an UNRECOGNISED SHOW or FIELD TRIAL (as the case may be) is DISQUALIFIED FOR ENTRY AT ANY SHOW OR FIELD TRIAL held under the permission of the Kennel Club or delegated authority.—E. Instead of a well known dog being mentioned as the best of his breed, he was the best that ever bore the prefix The whole thing was disgusting, and what makes it worse, an Englishman was the culprit. Is it possible that professionalism can lower a dog lover to such a level?

and John Milner's late Ch. Corona Premier, and present Ch. Corona Commander, and J. Guarnera's Ch. Whyzetta, all with an international reputation earned in keen competition, and all with the exception of the last named bred and reared in the city and neighboring districts.

The feelings of the whole Collie fancy were in favor of an acknowledged expert breeder acting as judge at the July show, and so early as last March, a special meeting of the Dominion Collie Club was convened to appoint delegates to wait upon the Executive of the Exhibition, in order that the matter should be settled in good time before the publication of the prize lists.

Now the Exhibition management cannot see its way to engaging a Collie expert to judge the breed, and the Collie men disgusted with recent experiences, roundly state that they will not enter their dogs at all.

Another outcome of the undercurrent of disappointment that exists in connection with the managements of the local kennel clubs, is the proposal to inaugurate a new kennel club in the city, which it is reported will be formed and established in the near future.—Winnipeg Tribune.

Another important item is the proper definition of the duties of the veterinary surgeon. These duties have often been neglected or perfunctorily

carried out. It is now definitely stated that at all shows held under Canadian Kennel Club rules, all dogs must be examined before leaving bench; also examined on the first day before 6 p.m., and at least once every morning during the show. Veterinary surgeons should not accept appointment, who are not prepared to carry out this rule, and show committees, for their own protection, should see that it is carried out.

Is a Fine Rule.

This is one of the finest rules that could possibly be introduced into a dog show, and the enforcement of it will give the greatest protection to exhibitors.

As a fitting climax to the above, a number of Winnipeg gentlemen, loyal to the Canadian Kennel Club, held a meeting in the ball room of the Royal Alexandra Hotel on Saturday Evening.

The gathering was a most enthusiastic one, and, in opening the meeting, S. C. Taylor, briefly reviewed the events which have led up to, and rendered necessary the changes in the constitution and by-laws of the Canadian Kennel Club, which were passed at a general meeting of that body on April 30. Mr. Taylor dealt particularly with the caution to judges, show committees and others, and closed his address by asking all present to pledge themselves to work in the interests of the Canadian Kennel Club. There was not

the slightest hesitation on the part of any gentleman present in responding to this appeal, and the alacrity with which the hands went up was a pleasurable surprise to the speaker. Mr. Taylor then introduced F. E. Trautman, who had kindly consented to take the chair, and the real business of the evening was speedily taken up.

Find a Name.

The feeling was unanimous that the best interests of all lovers of true sport would be served in the formation of a new local club to be affiliated with the Canadian Kennel Club. Considerable time was spent in deciding upon a suitable name for the new organization, and, after discussing the question from all angles, it was finally decided that it should be known as the Winnipeg Kennel Club.

Mr. Davison was a grand type of fancier, courteous, and a gentleman in every respect, a keen fancier and an unswerving supporter of the Canadian Kennel Club. He was held in great esteem by all who came in contact with him, and was one of the kind of fanciers the loss of whom we can ill afford. He was only 33 years of age and his illness had lasted almost two years. During his absence Ch. Ruff has been an inmate of the Corona Kennels.

WINNIPEG KENNEL CLUB

Minutes of a meeting held on Saturday evening, May 16, 1914, at the Royal Alexandra Hotel, Winnipeg; for the purpose of organizing a local Kennel Club to be affiliated with the Canadian Kennel Club (Incorporated).

The meeting was opened by Mr. S. C. Taylor who briefly reviewed events which had led up to and rendered necessary changes in Constitution and By-laws of the Canadian Kennel Club (Incorporated), which were passed at a general meeting of that body on April 30, 1914.

Chair was taken by Mr. F. E. Trautman.

Moved by Mr. Milner, seconded by Mr. H. St. Lawrence that Mr. S. C. Taylor act as secretary at this meeting. Carried unanimously.

Moved by Mr. A. M. Belcher, seconded by Mr. P. Ross that this Club be named the Winnipeg Kennel Club. Carried unanimously.

Moved by Mr. H. St. Lawrence, seconded by Mr. A. M. Belcher that Mr. F. E. Trautman be elected President.—Carried unanimously.

Moved by Mr. P. Ross, seconded by Mr. F. Goodman that Mr. H. St. Lawrence be elected Vice-President. Carried unanimously.

Moved by Mr. D. Morris, seconded by Mr. J. Milner that Mr. S. C. Taylor be appointed Secretary-Treasurer. Carried unanimously.

The following gentlemen were unanimously appointed to form an Executive Committee:—

Dr. R. W. Kenny, Messrs. M. Ryan, J. Milner, T. Milner, P. Ross, M. D. Morris, A. M. Belcher, W. J. Harvey, J. C. McCulley, F. Goodman, W. Village, W. St. John, A. L. Boucher.

Moved by Mr. H. St. Lawrence, seconded by Mr. P. Ross that Dr. R. W. Kenny be appointed chairman of the Executive Committee. Carried unanimously.

It was unanimously agreed that the membership fee be two dollars (\$2.00) per annum.

On the suggestion of Mr. J. Milner, a hearty vote of thanks was tendered Mr. Trautman who responded in a most capable and feeling manner.

Moved by Mr. M. D. Morris, seconded by Mr. J. T. McCulley that the meet-

ing be adjourned until Tuesday evening 19th, inst.

A meeting of the executive of the Winnipeg Kennel Club was held on the 27th of May, in the south board room at the Industrial Bureau. The chair was taken by F. C. Trautman, the president of the new organization, and a quantity of general business relative to the future conduct of the club was discussed from many standpoints.

One item that was specially brought before the meeting was a letter from Dr. Boulton, secretary-treasurer of the Canadian Kennel Club, Toronto, emphasizing the statement that under the new agreement entered into between the English and American Kennel Clubs, any disqualification made by the Canadian Kennel Club would be enforced, if necessary, by the Kennel Club (England), and by the American Kennel Club.

It was also pointed out at the meeting that any dog fancier or official under the ban of the Canadian Kennel Club would be unable to obtain an export certificate; the effect of this would be to bar exhibitors from showing their dogs in the United States and preventing their dogs from competing in any American field trials.

Club Affiliated.

In answer to a query as to when the Canadian Kennel Club was affiliated to the Kennel Club (England), a reply has been received referring the Winnipeg Kennel Club secretary to the Kennel Club Stud Book (England), 1914, page xvii., whereon it is stated, under the heading of "Colonial and Foreign Clubs Affiliated to the Kennel Club," that the Canadian Kennel Club was registered in 1906.

With regard to the question of allowing dogs under proper control to travel upon the street cars, the Winnipeg Kennel Club is circulating a special petition, which has been signed by a large number of the leading business men and citizens, and which will be forwarded to the civic authorities in due course.

Mount Royal Kennel Club Show, May 26th to 29th.

We would call this the show edition de lux of any we have experienced in Canada. There was a perfection of detail, and a completeness all through that was very marked and tended greatly to the pleasure of everyone concerned, whether he be exhibitor or spectator. The energy of the committee was responsible for this. Night sessions and a careful attention to every detail on the part of the committee left no loopholes for mistakes. Putting them in the ring, and judging them as we find them, we would say that Messrs. Hanna, Budge, Hughes, Coristine, Rutley and Stuart were a very even lot of top-notchers, and from the way they agreed and worked together they must be all from one kennel. If the Mount Royal Kennel Club knows a good thing when it sees it, they will hang on to these men at any cost. There is a great absence of professionalism or monetary consideration and a strong bond of unselfishness in the lot which appeals very strongly to the general body of dog men. The show was held in the usual Coliseum, a splendid building for a dog show, very large and airy with an earth floor, which, when covered and brightened up with sawdust made splendid footing. The show was kept clean and sweet from start to finish. We would be inclined to criticize the feeding as being overdone and not done properly for the attendants were on a constant move and seemed to be feeding all the time and the dumping of wet biscuit among the straw on the benches is not wholesome. However, this is a very minor matter and easily rectified. The show was blessed with bright weather. The first days being uncomfortably hot, but towards Wednesday evening it cooled off and remained cool to the end. We are afraid the club received very little encouragement from the public as the gate was only fair. We cannot understand this or give any reason, unless it is that the position of the Coliseum is too much hidden. We have made the suggestion to the club to try one of the big parks for next year. It is necessary for a dog show to follow the public. They will attend, if it is made convenient, but not otherwise. The club very generously donated a splendid lot of sterling silver cups over

and above the regular prize money. In fact, we think they were very generous. We think that if the prize money had been spread among the classes, there might have been more dogs and more entries for many will enter on the chance of winning in one of the classes, whereas they know they haven't a ghost of a chance to get winners or reserve winners. Mr. Ben Lewis judged, and the club and exhibitors were loud in their praise of his awards. There could be little doubt, if any, anywhere. His years of intimate experience with dogs have made him familiar with every point of all the breeds, and his sunny disposition softens any disappointment. The committee looked after the ring and the board, so that the judging went along smoothly and Mr. A. Stuart, as usual, arrived in time from the Western States to lend a hand.

The outside entry from Ontario came very strong. Messrs. Swann and Bamford were there with very large strings of good quality and got the lion's share of the prizes. Mr. Nordheimer was there with his string of Bull Terriers. We were disappointed in Ottawa and think their representation should have been stronger. Mr. Tyrell came down with his Pugs and the Bull Terrier, Knoch Na Chree Leader, and Mrs. Cameron with a Boston puppy. A few dogs came up from St. John with Mrs. E. Alban Sturdee, and Bob Ross had his share from everywhere.

POMERANIANS—Puppy dogs and bitches, 1st, Wellington Jock, a chocolate, out of coat. Novice dogs and bitches, 1st, Windsor Masher, a chocolate, a bit strong in bone, but with a good coat and shows well; 2nd, Black Pride, flat in coat, hardly a show specimen. Limit dogs, 1st, Sir Bruce, last year's winner, between coats and coming in a very sound black color, a very small Pom. of very high-grade quality. 2nd, Dainty, heavy coated brown, not solid in color. 3rd, Cheeky Boy, a good sable with good action, a bit high on leg and has lost his teeth. Little Snitch, unplaced, showing age a bit and walks rather stiffly. He is very short, cobby black, and probably one of our very best stud dogs. Open dogs, black, 1st, Sir Bruce; 2nd, Cheeky Boy; 3rd, Little Snitch. Open dogs, any

other color, 1st, Cheeky Boy. Winners dogs, Sir Bruce. Reserve winners, Windsor Masher. Limit bitches, 1st, Foxhill Connie, a very profuse coated, cobby little black with a sweet foxy expression and nice head. She might be finer in bone, and she is nearer brown than black. 2nd, Cheeky Little Nipper, a beautiful tiny black, smaller and better color than the winner, loses a little in expression and coat; 3rd, Cheeky Harrogate Duchess, a splendid little sable with enormous quantity of coat, though a little soft in texture, very cobby, good in action, a little more apple-headed than we like, but still we consider that her size, general type and action should put her first, but the judge did not like her skull; still as on this side of the water we countenance the apple head more than they do in England, she should not have been so heavily penalized. Open bitches, black, 1st, Foxhill Connie; 2nd, Cheeky Little Nipper; 3rd, Cheeky Margery Daw. Open bitches, brown or chocolate, 1st, Hillside Beauty. Winners bitches, Foxhill Connie. Reserve, Cheeky Little Nipper. We preferred for winners Cheeky Harrogate Duchess. Special for the best in the show also went to Foxhill Connie. Sir Bruce, in his present coat might be placed below her on account of coat, but we consider unsoundness of color in a black the worst possible fault, and think, even under the circumstances, Sir Bruce should have won.

ENGLISH TOY SPANIELS—Puppy dogs and bitches, 1st, Glencho Deermont Firefly, a very nice ruby. Novice dogs and bitches, 1st, Queen Bess, a good King Charles. Open bitches, first, Queen Bess, 2nd, Muggie, too light in bone, and curly in coat. Ruby Spaniels, 1st and winners, Glencho Deermont Firefly. Winners bitches, Queen Bess.

PEKINGESE SPANIELS brought out an improvement in numbers and quality. Novice dogs and bitches, 1st, Chop Suey, improving very much and in good coat; 2nd, Ai Gee Whotah, loses in coat and color and is weak behind, but has very good tail carriage and good face. Limit dogs and bitches, 1st, Togo, very good coat and expression, good face, but a bit too long in body; 2nd, Chop Suey; 3rd, Ai Gee

Whotah. Open dogs and bitches, 1st, Marr's Wee Chinee, good condition, good front and splendid expression, but with one bad eye; 2nd, Chi, a very small parti-color, not typical in face. Winners dogs and bitches, Togo. Reserve, Marr's Wee Chinee, who only lost on account of his eye.

YORKSHIRE TERRIERS, not going very strong in Montreal. Limit dogs and bitches, 1st, Don Leon, best in color and coat, but even then he is too light in tan; 2nd, Lily, lacks both color and coat, but is the smaller of the two. Open dogs and bitches, a repeat. Winners dogs and bitches, Don Leon. Reserve, Lily.

TOY POODLES—Novice dogs and bitches, and winners, Lady Ripp, small one, good coat and color, not quite even in mouth.

GRIFFONS—Mr. VanCamp showed a pair of very typical little specimens in Poudie the Bruxellois, and in Queenie a Brabacoon.

PUGS brought out an extremely good entry, Ch. The New King representing the fawns, a splendid specimen of his breed, though long in ear. Novice bitches, Nettie, really nice little black; also heavy in ear. Limit bitches, 1st, Dine, more cobby and better in body, and fuller in face than the second, Nettie. Open bitches, 1st, Dine; 2nd, Nettie; 3rd, Dundee Princess, a very black fine little bitch, perhaps a little too fine and small in skull. All the exhibits had too large ears.

TOY TERRIERS—Open and winners, Bonnie Boy II., in splendid condition, in fact, a hard one to beat anywhere.

GREAT DANES, only one, and that an undeveloped brindle puppy.

RUSSIAN WOLFHOUNDS, a very fine lot, novice dogs, 1st, Knave of Addestone, a good upstanding dog, large in size, in fact, good all over, but shown with a curly coat, and in very dirty condition; 2nd, Karl, a bad shower and loses in size. Limit dogs, 1st, Knave of Addestone; 2nd, Nicholas of Spring Farm, good head and expression, but not sufficiently downfaced, bad in front and feet, lucky to be so high in this class; 3rd, Grand Duke. Reserve, Karl. Open dogs, 1st, Alexander of Spring Farm, shown in the pink, grand depth of brisket, strong loin, beautiful action, good legs and feet; 2nd, Knave of Addestone, who

beats the first in size and think would have been placed first had his owner had sufficient energy to spend a few minutes cleaning him up and picking a few straws off him. Winners, Alexander of Spring Farm. Reserve, Knave of Addestone. Puppy, novice, limit, open and winners bitches, 1st, Queen of Addington, one of the good sort and will probably make a topper.

GREYHOUNDS—Limit, open and winners, 1st, Sheriff, a lemon and white, fair only.

AMERICAN FOXHOUNDS—Novice, 1st, Jess, not a show specimen.

POINTERS—1st, novice, limit, open and winners, Sport, hard as a rock, good muzzle, bit strong in skull and slightly bossy in shoulder.

IRISH SETTERS, the usual splendid Montreal exhibit. Junior dogs, 1st, Pat O'Brien, a good head and good body, shown in good form; 2nd, Brigand, good in bone, legs and feet, a bit short in muzzle and shown light; 3rd, Laddie, moderate sort, very plain in head. Novice dogs, 1st, Pat O'Brien; 2nd, St. Patrick; 3rd, Hero, a good sort, good body, legs and feet, good color, but a bit plain in face. Limit dogs, 1st, Corry Law, shown entirely too light, was pressed hard by second, too flat in skull, pinched in muzzle, narrow in front and inclined to be flat in ribs; 2nd, Pat O'Brien; 3rd, St. Patrick. Reserve, Montrose Rheola Andy. Open dogs, Ch. Montrose Shamus O'Brien, shown superbly and won on condition; 2nd, Corry Law; 3rd, Pat O'Brien. Winners dogs, Ch. Montrose Shamus O'Brien. Reserve winners, Corry Law. Junior bitches, a fair lot, 1st, Norma; 2nd, Montrose Lallah Rookhe; 3rd, Conn Law Shiela. Novice bitches, 1st, Noreen, rather a good sort, nice color, good type, splendid legs and feet; 2nd, Clontarf Nettie, presses the first close, might have won, a bit light in color; 3rd, Jessie, very nice, good body, legs and feet, lost to first and second in head only. Limit bitches, 1st, Queenie, good head, capital body, legs and feet, good color; 2nd, Clontarf Colleen, needs time and should do well later; 3rd, also a good one, needing time. Open bitches, 1st, Ch. Montrose Ruminantly Rhue, too well known to need description, easily one of the first three bitches on this continent; 2nd, Clontarf Colleen; 3rd, Colleen Bawn.

ENGLISH SETTERS, a very large entry of a very mixed quality. Junior

dogs, 1st, Sidi, bad behind, but a nice sort of puppy, with a pleasing head and front. Novice dogs, 1st, Calumet Major, black, white and tan, on the field type, capital legs, feet and good body, won easily; 2nd, Sidi; 3rd, Sport. Limit dogs, 1st, Sutton Dangerfield, old-fashioned, but good sort, won in head, body, legs and feet and Setter character; 2nd, Fox, sound, bit plain, beats third in body, front, head and depth of chest; 3rd, Teddy, flat sided. Reserve, Dick. Green dogs, 1st, Carlo, another old style, English Setter, with a fair head, good body, legs and feet; 2nd, Rex. Open dogs, 1st, Sutton Dangerfield; 2nd, Carlo; 3rd, Teddy. Reserve, Calumet Boxer. Junior bitches, 1st, Calumet Diana, fair puppy, bit long cast, needs time to mature. Novice bitches, 1st, Mirza, bit on small side, fair head, good body, stands on excellent legs and feet. Limit bitches, 1st, Jess, just a moderate sort, shown entirely too fat. Green bitches, 1st, Mirza; 2nd, Jess. Open bitches, Calumet Queen, a very good bitch, easily the best of the lot, shown in good form, should do a lot of winning. The judge thought so well of this bitch that he bought her, and when Ben Lewis thinks a bitch good enough to buy for himself it must be a good one. Limit dogs, 1st, Auchdoyne Sable Prince, lots of size and bone, fine up-standing dog, any amount of Collie character, wonderful legs and feet, might be better in coat; 2nd, Broadland Fox, same type as first, only smaller, good legs and feet, good in ears, good head and splendid texture of coat; 3rd, Rosebank Prior. Open dogs, 1st, Auchdoyne Sable Prince; 2nd, Broadland Fox; 3rd, Rosebank Prior. Winners dogs, Auchdoyne Sable Prince. Reserve, Verdun Rex. Novice bitches, 1st, Broadland Duchess, splendid ears and head, good Collie expression, in fact, good all through, but overshot; 2nd, Oakhill Prim, very like the first

and very nice quality, only more overshot than the first; 3rd, Lady Betty. Limit bitches, Weston All Quality, a really lovely bitch, full of Collie character, good head and ears, good bone, stands on best of legs and feet, lots of substance and yet not lacking quality; 2nd was Glendale Queen, a bit shy, and did not make the best of herself, full of quality, but a bit on the fine side; 3rd, Broadland Duchess, who would have been higher except that she was overshot. Open bitches, 1st, Weston All Quality; 2nd, Glendale Queen; 3rd, Broadland Duchess. Reserve, Oakhill Prim. Winners, Weston All Quality. Reserve winners, Glendale Queen. The tri-colors brought out a very taking dog in Verdun Laddie, first in limit and open, grand in coat, bit shy at present, but should get over this and will give a good account of himself; 2nd, Wishaw Sparkle, good ears and good bone, not in coat, gay in tail and long enough in back; 3rd, Royal Jack, strong in skull, not too good in shoulders, and a bit straight in stifles, otherwise a very nice dog. Southport Proclamation, a beautiful dog, with the grandest of coats, was left out of the prize list on account of being overshot.

BULLDOGS brought out a very fair entry, but no startling quality. Worsley Costermonger, Mr. H. A. Wilson's splendid stud dog, was smothered in his crate on the way to the show. In puppies a litter of three were exhibited by Cheetham Squire. They were a very creditable lot, with good bone, good ears and good forefaces, and with promising bodies, which have still to develop. 1st, Nilo, a really nice headed, short-faced, golden brindle, lower set than the others, and very promising; 2nd, Duke, and reserve, Tango, were both a bit plainer in face and tighter in shoulder; 3rd, Drummond Little Irish Boy, a fallow pied with a nice face, excellent in roach, fair in body, but inclined to be small and walks badly. In limit, lightweights, 1st was Amherst Jeff, a fair light brindle, with good skull and ear, good substance of foreface, showed a little too much daylight; 2nd, Royal Colwyn, a very promising puppy with a splendid roll, good body, low to ground, dark brindle, nice formation of head, and good cushion. We think he was a clear first. 3rd, Dick, fair body, good skull and ears, but leggy, wanting in substance, and pinched in foreface. Limit dogs, heavyweight, 1st, Worsley

Dreadnought, extremely short in body, grand skull and ears, and an upface, a bit narrow in underjaw and might be lower to ground; 2nd, Grosvenor Dick, a red brindle with a grand foreface, which was well up, but long enough in body and a little unsound in foreleg. Open dogs, lightweights, under 45 lbs., 1st, Royal Albert, looking a little grey and not showing enough spirit, but with a splendid short body, good rib, nice flat skull, good ears and a good shovel underjaw; 2nd, Royal Colwyn; 3rd, Dick. Open dogs, heavyweight, 1st, Worsley Dreadnought; 2nd Grosvenor Dick. Winners dogs, Royal Albert. Reserve winners, Worsley Dreadnought. Puppy bitches, 1st, Woodcroft Beauty; 2nd Peg O' My Heart. Junior bitches, Cheetham's Daughter, shown in better condition than we have seen her for a long time, full of substance all over and hard to fault. She walked a little lame due to a cut in her foot. Limit bitches, lightweight, 1st, Iddesleigh Beauty, a nice little fawn smut, good body, low to ground, with a really nice upface; 2nd, Woodcote Merry Girl, a very nice dark brindle, more on the brood type. Limit bitches, heavyweight, 1st, Cheetham's Daughter; 2nd, Pitlands Blackberry, a remarkably good boned dark brindle, good foreface and cushion, shown a bit thin. Open bitches, under 40 lbs., 1st, Belgrave Lady of Lambare, a very massive little one, low to ground and sound, lacking in underjaw only; 2nd, Iddesleigh Beauty; 3rd, Woodcote Merry Girl. Open bitches, heavyweight, 1st, Cheetham's Daughter; 2nd, Ch. Layham Pride, looking in very good shape and walking more soundly than we have seen her for some time; 3rd, Pitlands Blackberry. Winners, Belgrave Lady of Lambare. Reserve winners, Cheetham's Daughter.

FRENCH BULLDOGS brought out a very nice specimen in Mademoiselle Bun Bun, who should do well almost anywhere.

We were disappointed in the BULL TERRIERS inasmuch as neither of the experts from Ottawa made an appearance, and Montreal is generally considered a good neutral ground on which to meet. Junior dogs and bitches, 1st, Glenedyth Imperator, in splendid condition and a superb dog all over, and for the first time he was shown full of life and let the ringside see what a good dog he is; 2nd, Glenedyth

Elfin, a really nice lightweight, particularly strong in head and foreface, a little uncertain in front only; 3rd, Franklyn Dynamo, who has improved in that his nose was black. He is as grand a shower as ever, nice body, bone, legs and feet, good crop, but not improving in skull, as we hoped he would. Novice dogs, 1st, Franklyn Dynamo; 2nd, Bull Moose. Limit dogs, 1st, Glenedyth Imperator; 2nd, Glenedyth Bob, who improves on acquaintance. He has a dark eye, very short body, good bone, front and feet, and a very distinct downface, and much improved in ears; 3rd, Franklyn Dynamo. Open dogs, heavyweights, 1st, Glenedyth Imperator; 2nd, Glenedyth Bob; 3rd, Knock Na Chree Leader, a good big substance dog, rather lacking in quality. Reserve, Inferno King, the sire of all our good ones, enormous in substance, but not clean enough in head to win in this company. Open dogs, lightweights, 1st, Bull Moose. Winners dogs, Glenedyth Imperator. Reserve winners, Glenedyth Bob. Novice bitches, Glenedyth Sprite, a nice neat little lightweight, with a beautiful crop, but lacking in strength of foreface, and marred by a mark on the face. Limit bitches, 1st, Princess Patricia, we never saw her looking better or showing better; 2nd, Glenedyth Elfin. Open bitches, heavyweights, 1st, Princess Patricia; 2nd, Glenedyth Elfin. Open bitches, lightweights, 1st, Calumet Rosaline, a very good bitch, good head and body, not in condition; 2nd, Glenedyth Sprite. Winners bitches, Princess Patricia. Reserve winners, Glenedyth Elfin. Sound End Sombrero was shown in the American-bred class, which he won with ease.

BOSTON TERRIERS brought out some very strong quality, in fact, probably the best in the show. Puppies dogs, 1st, Noremac's Terrible Bill, a nice puppy with a good muzzle and should do well with maturity; 2nd, Captain Jack, fair only, but with a good square muzzle; 3rd, Drummond Little Tip. Novice, 12 to 17 lbs., Captain Jack. Limit and open, 12 to 17 lbs., Blondy Hooker. Novice dogs, 17 to 22 lbs., 1st, Sir Walter, a very taking dog, light brindle in color, good markings, good head and muzzle, exceptionally good neck, capital legs and feet, gay tail and shown too light in flesh; 2nd, Sullivan's Jack, a dark brindle, good markings, loses to win-

ner in head and muzzle, very good body, legs and feet, but gay in tail. Limit dogs, 17 to 22 lbs., 1st, Sir Walter II.; 2nd, Sullivan's Jack; 3rd, Noremac's Terrible Bill. Open dogs, 17 to 22 lbs., 1st, Clifton Star, one of our best, grand body, good markings, a real brindle, good legs and feet, in fact, hard to fault; 2nd, Sir Walter II.; 3rd, Sullivan's Jack. Reserve, Noremac's Terrible Bill. Novice, limit and open, 22 to 28 lbs., 1st, Blaze Away; 2nd, Doodie Dandy. Winners dogs, Clifton Star. Reserve winner, Blondy Hooker. Puppy bitches, 1st, Winkie; 2nd, Peggie. Novice bitches, 12 to 17 lbs., 1st, Battleford Beauty, would be better in the heavyweight class, good head, good expression, good body and a grand shower; 2nd, Peggy. In limit and open bitches we came to the class of the show. 1st, Sparkling Beauty, one of the best, if not the best there is. We do not know where to fault, and as she is silky, hard as nails and showed well, we cannot criticize her. She should make a reputation for Canada anywhere. 2nd, Battleford Beauty; 3rd, Rie Rie, a little pinched in muzzle, inclined to be heavy in shoulder and not a good shower, otherwise a very taking little bitch. In the other weights brought out Ashland Pride, in beautiful condition, showing well and good enough for the best of company. Dolly Spanker was second to her, a nice cobby little bitch, too small in head, and narrow enough in muzzle. Winners bitches, Sparkling Beauty. Reserve winners, Ashland Pride.

AIREDALES we were disappointed in, especially in dogs, as nothing new or very striking came out. The same dog winning as did last year. One naturally expects something from this, the first home of Airedales in Canada. Puppy dogs, 1st, Moorside Bonsor, showing much better than he did in Toronto Evening Show, but still room for improvement. He has a grand long head, grand bone and front, a bit strong in ears, and not good in feet. 2nd, Colne Tango, very far down the line, too fine all over, rangy and loose in shoulders, good color only, ten years behind our present quality; 3rd, Rockley Diamond, wanting quality, too strong in skull, but grand in bone. Junior dogs, a repeat of puppy. Novice dogs, 1st, Colne Tango; 2nd, Bardon Rock. Limit dogs, 1st, Birchcliffe Oorang, one of the grandest showers we ever saw and so full of Terrier

quality and snap that he easily hides his only two deficits, a heavy ear and an over strong skull; 2nd, Clonmel Master Crack, all terrier, good length of head, good coat, shown in good condition, good legs and feet; 3rd, Colne Express Order, extra good substance, very short back, good front, good coat, but entirely lacking in terrier character. Winners dogs, Birchcliffe Oorang, who thereby becomes a champion, beginning and ending at Montreal show. Reserve winners, Master Crack. Puppy bitches, 1st, Colne Caper Sauce, who wins in body, legs and coat, but loses in head to Walnut Capacity, who at present is light in coat and a trifle long in back, but when furnished will beat the first bitch; 3rd, Rockley Memoir, a bit on the small side and at present undeveloped. Novice bitches, 1st, Birchcliffe Babs, a big bitch, good color and hard coat, long head, well placed ear, good neck and shoulders, too light in eye, foreign in expression, tail low set, and lacks ring manners; 2nd, Drumclaph Unexpected; 3rd, Colne Easy Winner. Junior bitches, 1st, Birchcliffe Babs; 2nd, Bothwell Peggy, nice color, lots of bone, long foreface, but not well proportioned and a bad shower. Limit and open bitches, 1st, Birchcliffe Babs; 2nd, Bothwell Peggy; 3rd, Drumclaph Unexpected. Winners bitches, Birchcliffe Babs. Reserve winners, Bothwell Peggy.

DACHSHUNDS brought out a very nice lot of reds, all markedly good in body, leg, low to ground and soundness, with flat skulls and ears set on high and not too houndy. We would like to see them all smaller and less coarse in skull. The only bitch, Nancy Lee, struck us as being very high in quality and much the best of the lot.

FOX TERRIERS (Smooth) were terribly weak.

FOX TERRIERS (Wire) made up for the weakness in the Smooths, a really good lot coming out, which was encouraging when we take into consideration the loss the fancy has had through the death of Mr. Moore's dogs, but still we notice that one or two puppies escaped and were on the deck and gave good account of themselves. Puppy dogs, 1st, King's Plate, a most wonderful finished baby, as steady as a rock and showing like a two-year-old, terrier from nose to tip, grand coat, short body, splendid head and foreface, beautiful little ears, a little uncertain in front, and his fu-

ture depends on the improvement at that point; 2nd, Bristles; 3rd, Castle Hill Lad. Junior dogs, 1st, Donington Pete, splendid front, good head, good ears, good coat, bit light, low set tail and long enough in body; 2nd, Clockwork, we thought lucky. He is uncertain in ear, flat in rib, long in body and on the big side, a nice shower with a good head. 3rd, King's Plate. Novice dogs, 1st, Clockwork; 2nd, Castle Hill Lad. Limit dogs, 1st, Walnut Regalia, a recent importation, and well up to his advance notices, which is very refreshing, as it is very rare. He has grand bone, legs and feet, the best top we have seen for a long time and a promising coat, not at present in show condition. He has a lovely neck and a fair well-balanced head, not exaggerated in length and perhaps a little full in eye; 2nd, Clockwork; 3rd, Dare Devil. Open dogs, 1st, Walnut Regalia; 2nd, Ch. Hawes Broom, fairly beaten. He is not so level on top, weaker all over and hasn't got the honest bone of the winner. 3rd, Clockwork. Winners dogs, Walnut Regalia. Reserve winner, Ch. Hawes Broom. Bitches brought out a very fair lot, not extra high in quality, the best of them being the winner, Hillcrest Feature, good head, nice carriage of ears, good coat, splendid legs and feet, shown well. 2nd, Lady Tess, lost in head and expression, but could be put in nice shape. 3rd, Donington Floss, a sweet bitch on the small side.

ST. BERNARDS were few and dogs were poorly represented after the winner, Beethoven. This dog has not improved in body and could carry much more flesh. He was in fair coat and his type was undeniable. Bitches were better as a collection. Thanksgiving, better in foreface than Winsome Lass, not so large or heavy in bone and is cow-hocked. Winsome Lass, second, better in body and size, and more sound, good front and good round bone, not so good in face or lip, but should have won. The third bitch, Queen of Spades, showing fair quality and color, nice eye and expression, cuts away too much in lip.

IRISH TERRIERS — The winning dog, Micky of York, a good coated stylish terrier, long head, good ears, full in size; 2nd, Kinkora Barney, a smart terrier, good size, color and rale Oirish, too short and heavy in head. Kilbarron Statesman, good all round dog, but partly big. Quarrywood Com-

mander was in good coat, but not up to his usual form in any other way, probably due to age, but even then could easily have stood second. In bitches, Copper Queen won easily, very typical, with good coat, long enough in back and too fat. Quarrywood Belle, second, not in good coat; beat Drumclaph Brenda in bone, eye and type.

The Any Variety Sporting was won by Ch. Montrose Ruminantly Rhu. Second was Alexander of Spring Farm, Mrs. Mathias' good Russian Wolfhound. Third was A. Champion's Greyhound, Sheriff.

Variety Non-Sporting — 1st, J. E. Dowling's Bull bitch, Belgrave Lady of Lambare. Second, F. & A. Stuart's St. Bernard, Beethoven. Third, Mrs. C. Ward's Poodle, Jet. In Terriers, dogs and bitches, any variety, 1st, W. G. Parker's Boston, Sparkling Beauty. Second, Roy Nordheimer's Bull Terrier, Sound End Sombrero. Third, Miss Townsend's Skye Terrier, Tallisker Prince. The best dog or bitch in the show was won by Ch. Montrose Ruminantly Rhu. Reserve, the Bulldog, Royal Albert. The best Collie in the show was won by Auchdoyne Sable Prince. Best Boston Terrier was Sparkling Beauty, with Mr. McQuillan's Ashland Pride reserve. Special for best Bull Terrier, Mr. Roy Nordheimer's Glenedyth Imperator, with Mr. G. F. McFarland's Princess Patricia reserve.

He is a very dark seal brindle, perfectly marked, with extremely short muzzle and head, and short screw tail, weighing 14 pounds. He is by Dr. Peach, by Nubby Peach, who is by Ch. Revilo Peach. On the dam side appear the names of such well-known dogs as Ring Master, the sire of Ch. Todboy, Captain Parker and Tommy Cabot. Little Boomer is getting small even-marked puppies.

Mrs. J. B. Burden, of Fort George, B.C., had the misfortune to lose her Collie bitch, Lady Bonnington, along with a fine litter of eight puppies.

COLLIE CLUB OF CANADA EVENING SHOW.

On Friday evening, May 15th, the Collie ranks journeyed to Occident Hall for the Evening Show of the Collie Club, for the purpose of having the old standby Mr. J. C. Reeves, of Woodmastery Conrad and Benedict fame, pass the rule over their dog. The evening was eminently successful, there being a really large number of dogs of exceedingly good quality present.

The first class was puppies under six months. First was Ashbee's Campbell Glen, a nice sable of good substance and very promising. Second was Glover's Wishaw Pride, who lost because of being overshot.

Puppies over six months brought out a very nice dog in White's Cleopus, full of style and really good all over, but especially good in coat, and substance, with a long, strong head and good ears. He is very promising. Second was Stevens' Bradford Major, heavy in ears and not good in coat. Third was Bloodsworth's Campbell Premier, good in ears, but wants substance, especially in foreface and not good in coat.

Junior was the winning puppy, and novice repeated the puppies.

Open dogs brought out for first, Mr Thedford's tri-color Wishaw Sparkle, who wins in ears and is better in head. The name of the second we did not get, but is the property of Mr. Ashbee and is by Seedley Stirling, out of Billesly Bess, a big strapping fellow, good coat good ears, walks well, little long in back, and a little strong in skull. Third was Walden Bayard, not holding his own with time, as he is getting a little weak in face, but he was in lovely coat.

Breeders went to Walden Bayard and Walden Dreadnought. The latter going bumpy in skull.

Canadian breds, first and second, went to the two Waldens. Third, Hunter's Bruce, a tri-color with lots of size and good coat, but round in skull.

Puppy bitches, under six months, first went to Western Queen, a very nice one, but too small to criticize. Second went to Wheeler's Daisy, a stylish puppy, good head, good ear carriage, but very bad behind. Third to Western Daisy, very like the first.

Puppies, over six months, second went to Miller's Cantab Nesta, a sable with grand coat, good straight front.

Novice, first went to Glendale Queen,

long lean head and good coat, but a bit fine all over. Second, Cantab Nesta. In open that grand bitch, Western All Quality won clearly. She has plenty of size, grand bone, and stands well, with a beautifully filled in foreface. She showed listlessly, however, and did not put her ears up well. Second, Glendale Queen.

Best in the show went to Western All Quality.

DOG SHOW AT THE PANAMA-PACIFIC INTERNATIONAL EXPOSITION.

The "Day of the Dog" will be triplicated at the Panama-Pacific International Exposition. The dog of a king, prince or millionaire or peasant will be entitled to a place and equal rights on the bench of the International Dog Show to be held in San Francisco, November 16, 17 and 18, 1915.

All that is necessary for the ambitious dog to do is to obtain a master or sponsor who is willing to advance transportation expenses and entry fee and he may find himself in the lists and under the critical eye of expert judges.

The amount that has been set aside for cash prizes is \$3,588, and the classifications will be as modern as the best dog fanciers of the world are able to make them.

In the International Dog Show the Department of Live Stock will live up to the standard it is maintaining in every other branch of its exhibits, and to the standard every other exposition department is exemplifying. It is to be a universal show and cannot be considered a part of any circuit. It will be an institution that will put its own brand of excellence and pre-eminence on every line of human endeavor, including the arts and sciences, manufactures, agriculture, live stock breeding and athletics.

No dogs will be singled out for special treatment in the matter of prize awards, and the American or foreign dog that is declared the winner in his class will be the best dog in that class, regardless of the rules of any organization. To the winning dog will be given a diploma of the Panama-Pacific International Exposition and the cash awards that accompany the honor.

The exposition officials have found some exhibitors of dogs who have been, at first, disinclined to appreciate the fact that an international exposition can not permit any organization, how-

ever worthy, to say who may and who may not exhibit dogs.

This attitude was discovered when the exposition Department of Live Stock made application to the American Kennel Club of New York asking co-operation in presenting the greatest dog show the world has seen. It was not the intention of the department that the 1915 show should be treated as a point show.

The American Kennel Club was simply requested to regard the San Francisco show as an international event and permit members of the club to have record wins placed in the stud book. August Belmont, President of the American Kennel Club, expressed his approval of the plan in a letter to the Secretary of the American Kennel Club, but the plan was rejected at the annual meeting of the club.

Later inquiries have elicited the information that the action in refusing to co-operate is final. This will in no way alter the plans of the exposition for the largest dog show in the history of such events.

The International Dog Show in 1915 will be given under the exposition rules and special care will be taken in the formation of the rules so that the owners of pure bred dogs will not have real reason to take exception. Recognition will be given the stud books of the kennels clubs of this and other countries.

The refusal of the American Kennel Club to assist, means that the International Dog Show will not have the unanimous aid of related societies and organizations as will every other exposition enterprise.

The opportunities and rewards that will be open to exhibitors and the fairness of the rules makes this appeal so strong that no difficulties are anticipated. There is no feeling of resentment toward the American Kennel Club and the rules will be prepared with the aim of keeping all exhibitors from evoking the displeasure of the authorities of kennel organizations.

Dog fanciers will find interest in the Panama-Pacific International Exposition Field Trials to be held in February, 1915. After the trials the hunting dogs will be shipped to San Francisco and benched in the Department of Live Stock where the awards of prizes will be under the direction of the exposition board of directors.

There will be three cups awarded,

one to the "Derby" one to "All Age" and one to the "Champion Stakes." First prize in each event will be designated "The Panama-Pacific International Trophy." This will be the first of the special activities in the Department of Live Stock.

THE SEALYHAM TERRIER.

The points of the breed as adopted by the Sealyham Terrier Club are as follows:—

No. 1. Head: The skull slightly domed, and wide between the ears.

No. 2. Jaw: Powerful and long, with a more punishing and squarer jaw than the Fox Terrier.

No. 3. Nose: Black.

No. 4. Teeth: Level and square, strong and canines fitting well into each other, and long for size of dog.

No. 5. Eyes: Set wide apart, round and large, of a dark brown or dark hazel color.

No. 6. Ears: Medium, V drop.

No. 7. Neck: Fairly long, thick and muscular, strongly set on sloping shoulders.

No. 8. Chest: Broad and deep, well let down between fore legs.

No. 9. Body: Long, and ribs well sprung, hind quarters very strong body very flexible.

No. 10. Legs and feet: The legs short and straight as possible, feet round and cat-like with thick pads.

No. 11. Stern: Carried gaily.

No. 12. Coat: Long, hard and wiry, inclined to be silky on top of head.

No. 13. Color: Mostly all white or white with lemon, brown or badger pied marking on head and ears.

No. 14. Weight: Dogs to weigh from 18 lb. to 20 lb.; bitches from 16 lb. to 18 lb.

No. 15. Height: To measure from 8 in. to 12 in. at the shoulder.

Faults: No. 1. Eyes: Light colored or small.

No. 2. Nose: White, cherry, or spotted to a considerable extent with either of these colors.

No. 3. Ears: Prick, tulip or rose.

No. 4. Color: Much black objectionable.

No. 5. Teeth: Defective.

Disqualifying Points: Muzzle much undershot or overshot. **Scale of Points:** Head, value, 10; eyes, 10; ears, 5; neck, 5; body, 15; tail, 2; legs and feet, 15; coat, 20; color, 3; size and weight, 15.—Total value 100.

Notes and News From England

As the Bull Terrier seems to be in great favor in your country, I think that your readers will find of great interest an article on the breed which appeared in one of the recent issues of the "Daily Telegraph" and which I reproduce here.

The word terrier, suggesting as it does a smart, trappy, little fellow, small enough to go underground, is more or less a misnomer as applied to these dogs, but, sanctioned by long usage, it is unlikely ever to be changed. In characteristics he has inherited much from the two varieties which entered into his composition originally—the fidelity and high courage of the Bulldog, and the readiness for vermin-killing of the terrier. There is no concealing the fact that in his early days, before the refining influence of dog shows had exerted itself upon him, he was a most disreputable character, delighting in fighting his kind, and consorting with fast 'Varsity sets or public-house loafers. At the same time his admirable qualities in other respects made him a welcome inmate of many most respectable homes. Sir Walter Scott, we know, had one, called by him "a bull dog terrier," and described by him as the cleverest dog he ever had. The writer is by no means convinced that he would rank in the intelligence of the modern Bull Terrier as highly as that, but if he is subjected to the influence of human companionship he is capable of developing brain power well up to the general level.

Evidence tends to prove that fifty years ago he was in no sense deficient. Youatt, speaking of him as a cross between the Bulldog and the Terrier, declares that he "is generally superior, both in appearance and value, to either of his progenitors. A second cross considerably lessens the underhanging of the lower jaw, and a third entirely removes it, retaining the spirit and determination of the animal. It forms a steadier friendship than either of them, and the principal objection to it is its love of wanton mischief, and the dangerous irascibility which it occasionally exhibits." Meyrick, whose little work dated 1861, deserves to be more widely known than it is on account of the good sense displayed, says: "For every quality which makes the dog a valued companion to man,

the Bull Terrier is unsurpassed by any other breed. He will hunt for him, watch his house, and fight for him; he is teachable and intelligent; he is the best tempered companion and the most faithful friend." Bull Terrier men of the present time will not be disposed to quarrel with these words of praise, for the old spirit remains in the form that must have changed considerably since Meyrick penned his book. Doubtless the practice of combining the two parent strains mentioned prevailed long before the idea of establishing an entirely distinct variety by breeding back to the terrier was involved. Walter Scott died in 1832, and it has been shown that he owned one, while some authorities date the foundation of the breed as far back as the end of the 18th century, but there may still be some doubt about the matter. Certainly some words of Meyrick imply that the type was far from being settled in 1860. He says: "The Bull Terrier varies greatly, according to the predominance of either the Terrier or Bulldog blood. It is difficult, however, to decide from the appearance of the dog how much he owes to each breed. As a rule, when the nose is short, and the jaw much underhung, the Bulldog predominates; but this is not invariable, for it is not unusual to see both long and short faced puppies in the same litter of Bull Terriers."

If Bull Terriers had been bred with any care it goes without saying that in 60 or 70 years all traces of the Bulldog should have disappeared, and the probability is that the pure white color, partaking after the partner most used, would have been fixed much sooner than it was. Beyond a form more massive than that of other Terriers, none of the Bulldog remains to-day so far as outward appearance is concerned. The reckless courage is there right enough, together with the somewhat blundering disposition of the national dog.

No very clear indication as to the kind of terrier crossed with the Bulldog remains to aid us in elucidating the ancestry of the Bull Terrier. Some writers say it was the white English Terrier, now practically defunct, unfortunately; others speak of the latter dog as containing Bull Terrier blood. Although matters are distinctly nebul-

ous, if the adjective is not a contradiction in terms. Meyrick classes English Terriers under two headings—the toy variety, that has come down to us as the black and tan, and the larger Terrier, which has all the points of the toy dog, differing only in size, strength, and pluck. He should have said markings also, for he tells us that the latter were oftener white, or white with red or black patches, which fact led to the supposition that they had some Bulldog blood in them. The weight was put at 8 lbs., which, as they became elevated to the dignity of a show standard, was advanced to 20 lbs., with a preference for less. Whether or no this Terrier was used in fashioning the earlier Bull Terriers, it seems pretty clear that in more recent days the smaller Bull Terriers were bred with him in order to reduce their size. Forty years back, in show catalogues, Bull Terriers were sub-divided according to their weight—"small size," not exceeding 16 lbs., and "large size," over that weight.

A correspondent who contemplates getting a Bull Terrier, has put to us a number of searching questions, some of which the writer trusts are answered in the foregoing. He remains a high-couraged dog, as wicked looking as ever, with his small eye and daring expression, into which no sign of fear ever enters. Fear, indeed, he knows not, and when, provoked by another, he "sees red," neither master nor any other man can call him off. He is game to the death. Obviously a dog of this temperament, unless carefully schooled in his infancy and pupillage, may develop into an awkward customer, nor easily controlled, but if he is properly trained he should be everything that a man could desire. He is essentially a man's dog, in spite of the fact that two or three of our strongest kennels are now in the hands of ladies. We know plenty that live indoors, greatly to the satisfaction of master and mistress, but we do not think we should libel them in saying that they are a bit clumsy. On the other hand, their very short, fine coats are easily cleaned and kept in decent order, and they are guards that would down any burglar, always providing they are exempt from a serious defect that is all too common—that of deafness. Naturally, a dog that cannot hear well is not of much value in doing sentry go.

The above article has elicited some

remarks on the part of our contemporary "The Bazaar, Exchange & Mart," which remarks I will cite here as shortly as possible. "Next to the Airedale Terrier, the variety is the largest of the group, and is one of the breeds of dogs which may safely be looked to not merely to guard a house when kept indoors, but to tackle any objectionable intruders should the necessity arise,....." "When consulted in regard to a dog playmate for a child, I always unhesitatingly recommend the variety....."

Therefore taking into consideration all the foresaid good qualities of the Bull Terrier, it is no wonder that the breed is in such favor in your country.

There are zootechnical laws of which we do not, in my opinion, take sufficient notice in breeding dogs. One is the law of evolution. In the beginning of the last century Goethe rose against the doctrine of immutability. Lamarck, in his important work, the "Philosophie Zoologique," (1809), has it "that the symptomatic divisions, classes, orders, families, kinds, and species are artificial, and that in nature there are only individuals succeeding each other, descending from each other, and whose specific characters possess consequently only one relative and temporary fixity. The modifications are due to external causes to the diversity of the conditions of life." Lamarck mentions, as cause of the mechanical order of the metamorphosis of the organisms, the adaptation, and if he does not speak of the natural selection, which has its influence, he puts forward, as playing an important and nearly exclusive part, the habit and the functional gymnastics (exercise or the lack of it).

The works of Darwin left a mark in the laws which govern the zootechny; the theory of Darwin, we know, is based on the battle for existence ending in "the survival of the fittest," on the conservation of useful variations, and on the doing away with the harmful variations; and he concludes that types transform themselves slowly by the hereditary fixing of favorable modifications. The pro-Lamarckians observe to the pro-Darwinians that the natural selection theory is powerless to explain certain facts of adaptation; as an instance, the appearance of white hairs in the coat had not been at the beginning a sufficient element, so that selection could assure

its transference. On the contrary, external circumstances, conditions of life and temperature can exercise on the chemical phenomena of the organism an influence which slowly modifies its structure and the molecular arrangement, the color of the coat, etc. It is a well-known, proven fact that functional gymnastics or inaction play a considerable part in specific variations. The actual conception of the species reposes on the two notions of adaptability and of heredity, which caused Isidore Geoffrey St. Hilaire—too much forgotten nowadays—to write that "the characters of the species are, so to say, resultant from two contrary forces; one, which is modificative, is the influence of ambient circumstances; the other, which preserves the type, is the hereditary tendency to reproduce the same characters from generation to generation." We may also include the spontaneous variations, which are due to unknown causes, and which represent an element of transformation.

It results from the above that types evolve. There are many examples cited in works on dogs. In the "Kennel Encyclopaedia" Mr. F. Redmond wrote a long and very interesting article on the Fox Terrier, accompanied by illustrations of dogs, champions and big winners since 1859 to the present time. Old Jock (1859), Belgrave Joe (1868), Old Trap and Grove Nettle (1862), with regard to head, do not look at all like Fox Terriers of the present day. Even Ch. Result (1883) and Ch. Vesuvienne (1887) are far from the actual type, and it is necessary to come down to Ch. Adam Bebe (1897) in Smooths, and Ch. Royston Remus (1897) in Wires, to recognize the type which had given us the champions of the 20th century. Of course, we cannot say that it is the Fox Terrier breeders who changed the type; it is the type which had undergone evolution, because the conditions of breeding, the functional gymnastics, the exercise, and the habit are different nowadays from those of the "good old times."

Another example is that of the English Setter, which nowadays is of quite different type. Of course, there had been crossings in this breed which probably ought not to have been made, but a Setter was required which would be fast and capable of holding its own against the Pointer, which latter is of more recent origin, and had been produced for a certain purpose.

There are too many dog breeders who do not quite admit that lack of exercise plays a very important part in the evolution of type. The type of dogs which do not work evolves rapidly; if, during several generations, the progeny does not work, they show marked changes. It is possible that they keep the type of the head, but the shoulders become straight, the ribs flat, the feet take any shape, and pasterns get long, the thighs flat, the stifles straight; there will not be that balance which is so necessary in a dog that must gallop. If the dog has to do gymnastics for which he was created, the effects of evolution are less apparent.

If the Borzoi is still in vigor in Russia it is because he works—he hunts!

Mr. G. R. Preston, of New York, has imported the Clumber Spaniel dog, Welbeck Roger, bred by the Duke of Portland. The shipper was Mr. Saunders.

Mrs. Taylor, of San Francisco, has bought from Mr. James Wallace the well-known orange Pomeranian dog Aquitania, winner of many prizes.

Mr. A. B. Maclay, of New York, has just bought the famous Dandie Dinmont Terrier dog, Ch. Alpin Slitrig.

The well-known Pointer dog, Broomhill Dan, has been shipped to Canada, but the name of the purchaser does not transpire. The former owner of the above dog was Mr. Eggleston, Carlisle.

Mr. H. J. Halm, of New York, has purchased the Bull bitch, Duchess of Camberwell, from Mr. James Gardner.

Editor Kennel and Bench,

Dear Sir,—It was with a great deal of interest and not a little pleasure I received the last issue of Kennel and Bench, and was delighted with the stand now taken by the Canadian Kennel Club in regard to the enforcing of its rules and to the penalties it is prepared to give to these "outlaws" and "pirates" which we in the West have been suffering an epidemic of during the past season or so. My greatest regret during the past eighteen months has been the apparent lack of interest displayed by the officials of the C. K. C. in allowing such an unsatisfactory state of affairs to have existed so long, and personally I am at a loss to understand why the C. K. C. has not adopted this policy long ago. I might say that already every good, conscientious sportsman and sportswoman who has had the privilege of seeing the last issue of Kennel and Bench, are unanimous in their approval at the policy now adopted by the C. K. C., and I have yet to meet a dissenter who says there is room in Canada for more than one governing body, and that body most undoubtedly the Canadian Kennel Club. Probably a great number of Western fanciers are not thoroughly conversant with the present state of affairs, which are so utterly antagonistic to true sport, such as the formation of the Dominion Kennel Club, which under the guise of bettering conditions in the West deliberately sets itself out to absorb the whole Dominion and bring the granting of kennel club privileges into the hands of a few chosen friends, their relatives and hirelings. As I said before, if the fanciers in the West were more fully acquainted with the true state of affairs they would think twice before accepting for granted kennel matters such as are placed before them at the present time. Unfortunately I haven't the time to write a long letter, otherwise I am quite confident I could fill the Kennel and Bench from cover to cover—for the benefit of the Western fanciers; however, I will recall one incident that occurred at the Western Canada Kennel Club's spring show. Having an appointment with a friend of mine we arranged to meet in the show build-

ing the evening before the show opened. I had just met my friend when who should come strolling up but Mr. Alex. Cheyne, the popular secretary of the Moose Jaw show. Being a Bulldog fancier, like myself, we soon introduced ourselves, and I found Mr. Cheyne very interesting; he recounted several of his experiences with Bulldogs and I found him very entertaining. During the conversation the question of the coming show at Moose Jaw was brought up, and I was very heartily invited to come up to the show and he would guarantee a good time. On promising to think it over, the question of a suitable judge came up, and Mr. Cheyne said to me, "What do you think of Mr. Coats, of Vancouver?" and I replied, "He is the most popular judge that ever came to Winnipeg; he has given the most satisfaction of anyone who has officiated in that capacity since I have been attending shows here." Mr. Cheyne replied, "It's too bad. We had practically decided to engage him for our show, but (nodding his head over to where some of the most prominent members of the D. K. C. were standing) they won't stand for him, but if we (Moose Jaw) would engage a judge suitable to them, they would bring at least one carload of dogs, otherwise not a single entry must we expect from Winnipeg, and," he continued, "I have just sent the following telegram up to the committee," and he held the copy of it up to me so that I could read it, and this is what it contained:

"Winnipeg, Feb. 2, 1914.

"To Mr. De Rossiter, Moose Jaw.

"Withhold appointment of Judge Coats; not satisfactory to Winnipeg fanciers—bucking D. K. C.

"Alex. Cheyne."

Now, Mr. Editor, we are coming to the point. Do Western show officials realize that to hold a show under D. K. C. rules they must toady to these people—as in the case of Moose Jaw—and support something that is anything but sportsmanlike, but what appears to me to be rotten to the very core? I know these are strong expressions to use, but in a case like this it requires strong treatment. Or will they, when they fully realize the conditions as they are to-day, be the sportsmen we know them to be, and refuse to accept a yoke

which sooner or later will drag them down to its own level? I wish I was able to have about five minutes' conversation with each of the Western secretaries and officials, I think I could convince them which of the two clubs represented the real article and which was the imitation. I haven't the least doubt quite a number of the shows have decided to favor the D. K. C. under the same conditions as applied to Moose Jaw, only, instead of telling them they would be boycotted they have been promised bumper entries. I am disappointed at Calgary adopting D. K. C. rules, as it was the intention of sending down a carload from Winnipeg if held under C. K. C. rules, and can assure them they would have had a carload from Winnipeg last year had we known in time that the handler who generally takes the dogs from Winnipeg in previous years had decided not to go in spite of the fact that this fixture is considered from a handler's viewpoint to me the most profitable show in the West, inasmuch as the fancier pays all expenses and the handler pockets all the prize money. I haven't the least doubt myself he was sufficiently remunerated to encourage him to boycott this show. I am looking eagerly forward to the time when the Western officials will think twice before accepting conditions as they are placed before them by these people, and inquire if the conditions, as represented, outline the correct state of affairs.

I would also like to point out to Western officials that they can be assured of a carload of Winnipeg dogs belonging to members of the C. K. C. just as easy as can be got from the D. K. C., and if they are only holding their shows under D. K. C. rules because they imagine it is the only way to get support they have been hoodwinked even beyond belief, and the quality of the dogs will be equally as good, if not better. And furthermore, they would not think they were entitled to have handed to them all the premier honors and the seals of the city hall simply because they came from Winnipeg. Of course, this is supposed to be a free country, and Westerners are entitled to do whatever they please, but whatever they do I can assure them, present conditions in Winnipeg under D. K. C. are positively unbearable. As an example of the stupendous support (?) to the D. K. C. it is

only necessary for me to draw your readers' attention to the Western Canada Kennel Club, which, when under the wing of the C. K. C., had a membership of over a hundred strong, and a good cash balance in the bank. Today, after holding four ribbon shows, they have only a membership of about one-fifth and a balance in the bank of less than \$6 at the closing of their fiscal year about three weeks ago. This will show you, Mr. Editor, there is more bluff going around than business, Wall Street methods are not as a rule regarded as a necessity by the average exhibitor. The Canadian Kennel Gazette refers to the disqualification clause as "coercion." I'm afraid he hardly realizes the real meaning of this word, or will he, until he becomes an exhibitor in Winnipeg where the present "heads" of the D. K. C. hand out their ultimatum as in the case of the Moose Jaw show, which practically amounts to this: "Be thankful for what you are about to receive (from us), otherwise we shall be under the painful necessity (even though we suffer in consequence) of seeing that you do not hold a show." This is a most delightfully refreshing state of affairs for any right thinking sportsman to have to tolerate in this fair Dominion of ours, which is conceded to be the most promising country in the world, and I would appeal to all good sportsmen to stand up for their rights and not tolerate this disgraceful state of affairs, which has already existed far too long for the good of the fancy. I am confident that such cities as Calgary, Edmonton, Lethbridge, Vancouver, etc., have plenty of good fanciers quite able to look after their own affairs without having to knuckle under the despotic rule of this one-man club which operates from Winnipeg, and I can assure you boys farther West that the writing is on the wall, and that the newly formed Winnipeg Kennel Club, which is considerably stronger right now than clubs which have been in existence for years, "will" under no consideration recognize or support any shows held in Canada under any rules other than C. K. C. Western fanciers can rest assured that, under any circumstances, they will see a show held under C. K. C. rules in Winnipeg before the close of the present season, and I can guarantee it will be a show where anything in the shape of favoritism or unfairness will on no consid-

eration be tolerated for a moment. We stand for everything that is fair and square and as the very mention of the word "clique" has been a nauseous pill that many exhibitors in the West have had to swallow lately, this news will no doubt come as a pleasant antidote. Some of your readers may think this letter rather strong, but, believe me, it is very mild to what some fanciers in the West could write if we could only arouse them to forward you the true state of affairs. Now, Mr. Editor, as I never did write anything that I had any reason to be ashamed of, and never had any use for a fancier who has to cloak himself under a *nom de plume*, be sure and print this letter in full above my signature.

The following is an exact copy of the letter mentioned above by Mr. Vredenburg:

New York, May 25, 1914.

Dear Sir,—I have yours of the 21st inst., with marked pages of the Kennel and Bench. On one of these marked pages containing the reciprocity agreement, it clearly states that the agreement is entered into between "The Kennel Club" and the clubs affiliated with it, therefore, if the Canadian Kennel Club, an affiliated club with the English Kennel Club, should disqualify any person for a violation of its rules, we are bound, under the above mentioned agreement to recognize such disqualification.

A notice from the Canadian Kennel Club to the effect that it had disqualified or suspended any person within the limits of the Dominion of Canada is all that we can require and we assume that the C. K. C. will have acted in strict accordance with its rules, and therefore do not inquire into the merits of the case.

Mr. Delmont is not a member of the A. K. C. He is a professional handler, showing dogs at the greater number of A. K. C. shows, and it will therefore be obvious to you that, should he judge at your show and in consequence thereof be disqualified by the C. K. C., he could not show at any show held under the A. K. C. rules.

"Brother Harry was a horse and dog fancier from the cradle. After we were grown up it was noticed by some of us that every individual photograph of Harry as a child had a dog or toy horse in it. He was as good a judge of a horse as one could find and was asked to judge at horse shows several times, but refused from lack of confidence in himself or other whim. 'Poeta nascitur non fit' applies to dog fanciers, too.

"Dogs are not much appreciated in this (cotton) part of the country. Four general breeds are recognized, 'Shep dogs,' 'Hound dogs,' 'Bird dogs,' and all small dogs 'Fiests.' I almost forgot our principal dog lovers, the Sac and Fox Indians. These people love fat puppies and will give 50c to \$1 apiece for them to make dog soup."
