NOTES AND COMMENTS

Both in Toronto and London the dog poisoner is unusually active just now. Many splendid dogs in both cities have succumbed, and in both cities meetings of active dog men and humanitarians have been held in the effort to put a stop to the work. In London a substantial reward is being offered for the conviction of any one found guilty of poisoning a dog or dogs. This is offered by the Humane Society, and the companion society in Toronto is doing the same thing.

In addition to the specific case printed in our Setter column, Mr. Wm. Clark, London, has lost a Setter, winner of many prizes; Dr. F. P. Drake, two of his prize winning Fox Terriers, and the prize winning Pointer, Blake, owned by Mr. W. Gurd was another victim.

A meeting of the London Canine Association was held on July 7th, which Mr. W. J. Clark, John S. Brown, Capt. Walter Smith and many others attended. It was here suggested that a large reward, probably five hundred dollars, be offered for information that would lead to the conviction of the dog poisoner. In each case strychnine has been used, and one dog owner stated that many dogs could be saved if a heavy mixture of salt and milk were forced into the dog's stomach. It is well worth trying if any Gazette people should happen to have a case.

The Vancouver Exhibition Dog Show is advertised in this issue. The show is being held under Dominion Kennel Club rules and entries close on August 20th, with Mr. H. S. Rolston, Manager and Secretary, 424 Pacific Building, Vancouver, B.C., who will gladly send a prize list to any one who may apply for it. A copy at this writing is in our hands. Cash prizes of over five hundred dollars are offered, as well as many valuable specials. The show will open on September 7th, and close on September 9th.

We are always glad to receive little dog stories, and for the sake of the dog himself, or herself, and as showing what canine sense can do, Mrs. Gruenwald, Montreal, was kind enough to send the little story from Hartford, Conn., which we print in this issue, and in doing so writes: "I do enjoy all the interesting doggy stories published by you each month. This month's Gazette was just a treat with them."

In talking over kennel matters with Mr. Sturdee in St. John, N.B., a few days ago, he informed us that the St. John Dog Show would this season be held in connection with the Exhibition, the probable dates being September 8th to September 11th. The entry fee will be, for the first entry of a dog, seventy-five cents, and for each subsequent entry twenty-five cents. St. John, N.B., is in the throes of a drastic dog by-law just now, and the local kennel club committee have had several meetings with the Commissioner and other city officials. The by-law rules that no dog shall be allowed on the streets except under leash. This admittedly goes too far, the laudable object of the by-law being simply the removal of ownerless curs from St. John's streets. We suggested to Mr. Sturdee that this might be attained as readily if the by-law were changed to read simply that dogs should not be allowed on the streets except when under proper control, i.e., in charge of the owner or some other competent person, but not necessarily on leash. We have no doubt but that the local kennel club, which is exceedingly active and has now a membership of about forty, will be able to arrive at some satisfactory compromise with the city authorities.

While in Halifax we took up with Mr. Chas. McKinley, the subject of holding a dog show in connection with the Halifax Exhibition. Mr. McKinley, whose faithful pal is a canny Scottie, would be glad to see this accomplished, and to help in any possible way. Halifax is a sporting city and there are numbers of other dog lovers in Halifax who would be glad to see a dog show added to the Exhibition programme, and who would gladly help make it an annual success. We commend the idea to the Exhibition authorities—now is as good a time as any.

"Novice" writes us as follows: "I have two imported English Bloodhounds, both registered in the Stud Book in England. Two bitches, whose parents came direct from Lord Eglington's Kennels in Scotland. One, half Foxhound, half Bloodhound, bitch, pure-bred on both sides. One dog, half Bloodhound and half Terrier. Am I entitled to a kennel license? The Assessor claims that all dogs have to be registered before a license can be obtained, and none of mine are registered in this country." This law is an Ontario Statute which requires that every dog in a kennel should be registered before a kennel license is issued. The Assessor is undoubtedly right.

The Whippet races at the Canadian National will be run off Wednesday, Thursday and Friday of the dog show week. They will start at 6 p.m., (note the change in time, 6 p.m.), in front of grand stand.

In the past these races were held at 2 p.m., but owing to the track being occupied the heats were run off on the back stretch where the public could not see them and only the final was run in front of the grand stand.

Now everything will be run in front of the grand stand, and as we know it is always crowded at this hour. The first announcement of the dog show to be held in connection with the Panama Pacific Exposition, San Francisco, has been made. The date of the show is November 16th to November 18th, and it is being held under no other rules than those of the Exposition, although we notice that the National Dog Breeders Association is offering five hundred dollars in supplemental money. The puppy prizes are, four, three and two dollars, the prizes for dogs over one year old are, five, four and three dollars. The schedule says that all entries are free, but it also adds that a bench fee of three dollars will be charged. This means, we presume, that a dog may be entered in all classes for which he is eligible, for the one fee of three dollars, not an additional fee for each entry.

We were sorry to hear that our old friend Joe Reid of Montreal, met with a painful accident two weeks ago, falling down the front stairs of his residence. Being a dog man of course he had to "bark" his shins very badly. He was confined to his home for some time, but we are glad to say is now very much better.

The generosity of the Dominion Kennel Club in supporting the Canadian National Exhibition with several medals is to be greatly commended. What is it that old adage used to say about catching more flies with honey than with vinegar?

The following appears in the American Kennel Gazette. We hope it does not mean that now a pact has been accomplished with the Canadian Kennel Club, that the American Club can do as they please. Serious consideration should be given any change that would affect Canadian interests.

Amendment to Rule V., Section D.

Rules committee, American Kennel Club:

Gentlemen: We hereby offer the following amendment to Rule V., Section D., of Rules Governing Dog Shows:

Strike out all words after America so that Section D. shall read: "The American-bred Class shall be for all dogs bred in the United States of America."

Just as we are closing the forms for this issue of Canadian Kennel Gazette we are in receipt of very encouraging information from the West. Advices tell us that Calgary had over three hundred and eighty dogs, a considerable increase over last year's show, where we understand two hundred and forty-seven were benched.

Medicine Hat has over two hundred dogs, a splendid entry for a first show.

Winnipeg has over five hundred dogs, the highest number they ever had at a show in the Manitoba capital.

WITH THE SHOWS. The Western Canada Kennel Club, Winnipeg, are to be congratulated on the success of their first Matinee Show, held in the Exhibition Grounds, Winnipeg, on June 20th. The standard of quality ranked high and everything passed off in the best of style. This was not a complete all-round show, but thirteen breeds being catered to, so that the number of dogs benched (168) will surely remain as a refutal of the popular supposed hoodoo of the number thirteen. The attendance at the show was large; judging began at one-thirty and went through to the finish without a stop. The

Bulldogs were judged by a lady, Mrs. P. Persse, the first lady to don the ermine in this way in Winnipeg. At the completion of the judging she was presented with a large and handsome boquet, by the members of the Dominion Bulldog Club.

Mrs. McGlynn is another lady who is to be congratulated on the success of her Boston Terriers, handled in the ring by herself.

We admire the courage of the Queen City Kennel Club, that under the most adverse local conditions, put on a very attractive show at Hanlan's Point, Toronto, on Saturday, June 13th. Bulldogs and Pekingese were quite attractive features, and most breeds were represented by excellent individuals. But looking it straight in the face, men, isn't an all-round show held in Toronto of about 165 entries and about 155 dogs present, with a winner's value of but one point, closely approaching the ridiculous? It is a matter of quite as much regret to us as to the Queen City Kennel Club that they were not better supported, but until the three divisions in Toronto are united into one entire whole we cannot, perhaps, look for very much better conditions.

TERRIERS. We had the pleasure of spending an hour or two with Dr. Hoggan, V.S., of Vancouver, in Montreal on June 11th. Dr. Hoggan is interested in Terriers of most breeds, but the Irishman in particular, which breed he judged at the recent Irish Terrier Specialty Show held in Seattle, as reported in June Canadian Kennel Gazette. Dr. Hoggan was on his way west and intended stopping over at several points en route.

At the recent meeting in Toronto, called in the effort to unite all Terrier Clubs into one All Terrier Club, no action was taken, although the matter was very freely discussed.

In our Montreal report, referring to the Irish Terrier bitches, we are made to say that Copper Queen was a very "fair" type, when we wrote a very "fine" type, that is, fine as opposed to coarseness. This correction is due Mr. Ross's good Terrier.

A letter from Mr. W. R. Aitken of Montreal, written on board the "Corsican," advises us of this gentleman's visit to the Old Country, where he intends holidaying in Scotland, and we wish him a happy time in the enjoyment of the Heather—and other things. While across the water Mr. Aitken intends keeping his eyes open for something decent in Terriers, also a Dachshund or two. He hopes to be back in time for the big Toronto show.

Ch. Hawes Broom is being given a rest this month but his stud advertisement will resume its place in Gazette beginning with our August issue.

Mr. Harry Clayton's Airedale bitch, Silver Birch Falka, is the happy mother of five dog puppies and one of the opposite sex, who own as their sire the famous Ch. Rebound Oorang. Good wishes and good luck.

Mr. B. Wellsbank, Quill Lake, Sask., is taking up the Airedale cult and intends showing Stormy Weather at Winnipeg. This is a son of Ch. Caerphilly Marvel out of a good Game Cock bitch. He has recently had out quite a nice young bitch from Mr. W. M. Berwick. This bitch is named Dufferin Topsy Turvey.

Canadians will appreciate the fact that Mr. Winthrop Rutherfurd has been invited to judge Smooth Fox Terriers by the Committee of the Kennel Club at their show to be held next December. No breeder in the States is more respected in Canada than the owner of the Warren Kennels. Mr. Francis Redmond, well known to us here, is to judge the Wires. Messrs. Bamford & Hudson, Toronto, have just imported from J. & A. Parkington, England, the good, winning, Wire Haired Fox Terrier, Betel Hornby Pride. She was bred to Presto before leaving England. Presto is the sire of the Montreal winning dog, Walnut Regalia.

A new arrival in Winnipeg is the winning Boston Terrier bitch Lady Mirthless, purchased by Mr. H. McMillan. Lady is a thirteen pounder, and winner of many prizes in the States, including winners at such shows as Westminster, N.Y., Rochester, N.Y., Detroit, Mich., Binghamton, N.Y., etc.

Our old Scottie friend, Mr. James L. Little of Brookline, Mass., is receiving the congratulations of his friends on his recovery from a six weeks tussle with peritonitis. Mr. Little has just got rid of his doctor and trained nurse. In a chatty letter of recent date he says: "It certainly is a good many years since we have been acquainted but have never met, and I trust some day we may. My clients and correspondence re Scottish Terriers takes me, in spirit, all over this continent of North America, and I feel as if I knew a large lot of people and lots of children who have my dogs and with whom, through letters, I keep in touch. I wish you could see my album of photos, which children and grown ups send me year after year, and have done so since I started in Scots in 1885.

My information through pedigrees, photos and published matter in Scots is quite remarkable. I am the oldest breeder of these dogs in the U.S.

You have some good sports up your way, who know a Scot— Jim Lindsay, Billie Fraser and Arthur Ellison.

I have at present nearly one hundred of these dogs, young and old. Am just getting out a crackerjack Scottie dog, the sire of winners. He ought to be here now but there is some delay.

My best wishes, Mr. Donovan, and any time you want any points on Scottie lore in the States, I hope you will call on me, and if I can inform you shall be glad to."

The proprietor of the Newcastle Kennels is one of the right sort, and if he will just sit down and give us a page or so on a dog that we have always favored, why "Barkis is willin'."

Colne Kennels, St. Eustache, near Montreal, of which Mr. Jos. A. Laurin is proprietor, are making a special offer of Airedale bitch puppies, sired by the great imported dog, Colne Renown. To introduce the stock the very low figure of fifteen dollars each has been put upon these puppies and they should not remain long at this price.

SETTERS. Princess Patricia, a Setter, owned by John S. Brown, of 391 Queens Avenue, is dead, and her eight twoweeks-old puppies are motherless.

The Setter went out Saturday evening for a few minutes and on a nearby lawn picked up a piece of meat upon which strychnine had been sprinkled. When she came back she was gasping and in half an hour she was dead. Before she died she lay in such a position that her puppies could not feed, her animal instinct saving their lives. Had they secured the poison in their food everyone of them would have been killed. The mother must have realized this, for before her death she lay flat on the ground and refused to let them come near her.

Princess Patricia was regarded as one of the best Setters in London. She had taken all prizes in her class at the shows, and was to have been started in field trials. She was No. 27036 in the American Field Stud Register.

"No money could have taken that Setter from me," said Mr. Brown.

Several valuable dogs have been destroyed with poison within a short time. Messrs. W. A. Brock and William Turnbull have both lost hunting dogs. In addition to the English Setters which Ben Lewis bought at Montreal, and which purchase we reported in last issue, we have since learned that three Irish Setter bitches from Mr. Trudeau's kennel also went with him.

While in St. John, N.B., lately we had the pleasure of spending an evening with Mr. and Mrs. Sturdee, dog lovers of the right kind. In fact Mr. and Mrs. Sturdee do not own the very comfortable residence in which they reside, for it is given up largely to the interest of their Irish Setters and Toy Spaniels.

We shook a paw with Corry Law, the beautiful colored Irishman that is soon to be the happy father of, we hope, a big family from a fine, roomy, typical headed matron that is his kennel companion.

We presume the dog has been featured in the "Movies" before now, but Mr. John F. Campbell of Montreal will be interested in knowing that he and the Irish Setter, Corry Law, were on the screen at the Imperial Theatre, St. John, N.B., some time ago. More than that, every time the picture appeared it raised a cheer.

The Irish Setter is evidently making good in Western Canada. The latest arrival is the good dog, Cushbawn Desmond, by Ch. Dermott. Desmond is a good winner at English and Irish shows, and as he is bred in the purple he should be of great use to Canadian breeders. He has been imported by Miss Walsh, of Winnipeg.— Our Dogs.

TOYLAND. Mrs. Gruenwald now reports the death of the Pom, Aberdare Blackie. This is the third of the four ordered from Mrs. Williams that has succumbed. The sole survivor of the quartette has gone to Mrs. Tetreau of Outremont, Montreal. This lady now possesses Cheeky Margery Daw.

Mrs. Gruenwald is importing, through Mr. Samuel Lee of Manchester, a three and one-half pound dog that is described as quite a flyer:

Mrs. Pitt, Montreal, has a beautiful, small, sable puppy by Sir Bruce ex. Idol Toppie. This little lady is four months old and tips the scales at one and one quarter pounds, so that the Montreal Pom enthusiasts are looking for her to do some winning.

Mr. Geo. Ward of the well known Ward Bros., in this issue is giving notice to Pomeranian breeders that a meeting will be held at eight p.m., on July 22nd, to consider the advisability of establishing a Pomeranian Club for Canada. Mr. Ward invites correspondence and opinions from members outside of Toronto and vicinity, and we hope that Pomeranian fanciers in Montreal and other eastern points, as well as those in the west will write him and give him what he asks for.

Under the subject "Breeding Pekingese for color," a correspondent writes the Illustrated Kennel News:

I note there are some breeders still troubled about this matter. It is, no doubt, a fascinating pursuit, and appeals to people who desire quick results; but, in point of fact, as many are finding out, it is very elusive. For, just as you think you have made a discovery and established a rule, a litter arrives which falsifies previous conclusions. As a foundation on which to build principles for guidance in breeding for other points it may be useful, for, no doubt, if there is any rule that governs color, it will also control the reproduction of other desired qualities. But breeding for color alone is open to a very grave danger, for while we are disturbing ourselves over what is, in fact, no point, we may very easily be mating couples most unsuitable in other respects, and, even if the desired feature (not point) is obtained, it may well turn out to be at the expense of more valuable qualities.

Surely we should take as our motto, "A good dog cannot be a bad color." A good color and pretty markings, as also a plentiful coat, may fill the eye, but often they hide a multitude of sins. It should be our aim to go below such superficial charms, and seek for type, quality of eye, skull, frame, etc.

Let breeders for color take note of the number of our champions with a black mask. A black mask often conceals a bit of nose, while a dog that can win without one must be far better.

A black mask, though no doubt an attractive feature, labors, to my mind, under a serious disadvantage—it goes grey very early, and the dog begins to look old before it should.

Our Dogs of June 26th says that: Mr. Eli Ward, of Barley, has just exported to Toronto, by the s.s. Royal George, a brace of Poms. Miniature, dog and bitch. One of them is Young Comedian, a grandson of Ch. Dragon Fly, and winner under some of our best judges. The bitch is out of a granddaughter of Dragon Fly, and by a son of Ch. Mars. Little Nipper, Nanky Poo, and others of our best sires are included in the pedigree, and Mr. Ward is hoping that with such a combination his client, will be able in the near future to found a good kennel. Mr. Ward, like many other people who elect to live in the country, is too far from a station to make exhibiting either a joy or a comfort, so from time to time he sells off his best. He has now quite a number in the best of health. Sickness, he tells us, is almost unknown in his kennels. With the exception of one Collie bitch, all his dogs are Poms.

Miss Watson, Montreal, has been again unfortunate in the loss of a Pekingese, her Wee Wee succumbing quite recently. Wee Wee had been on a visit to the kennel of her former owner, Mr. Marr, and on her return to Montreal was found to be seriously ill, eventually dying, despite the care of a vet. and her owner.

COLLIES. We had the pleasure of meeting Col. Robert McEwen in Montreal last month, where he was en route to England, on the hunt for high-class sheep. If he does not have to pay too high for his mutton, a good Collie, if to be found, may return with him. Col. McEwen told us that the farmers were taking an increasing interest in Collies and using them intelligently for the work for which they are intended.

BLOODHOUNDS. Mr. Wallace M. Sheehan, Dalhousie, N.B., has shipped his Bloodhound bitch, Sheehan's Queen, to Mr. Max J. Kennedy, Fredonia, Kans., from whom he purchased her. She is to be bred to Dr. Max, one of the kennel's best Hounds.

BULLDOGS. The subject of the Dudley nose is causing a good deal of stir in the States and is one equally interesting to Canadian Bulldog breeders, as the letters elsewhere in this issue will go to prove.

In addition to the letters printed, Mr. H. A. Wilson, Toronto, gives his opinion in favor of heavy penalty but not entire disqualification. In support of this he instances the fact that many of the best Bulldogs have Dudley noses.

Mr. Joseph Perkins modestly states he does not feel qualified to say definitely, though as to the qualifications we are inclined to disagree with him.

If other breeders have aught to say on the subject we would be glad to hear from them for August Gazette. Mr. Meadows of Oakville, Ont., the owner of Ch. Argo and other Bulldogs, in writing us regarding the Dudley nose, adds: "I am glad to see you are taking such an interest in the Bulldog through your newsy paper. I also admire your policy of treating everyone alike, also their dogs, whether an advertiser in your paper or not."

Mr. Meadows has sold a nice dog pup to Mr. E. L. Jarvis of St. John, N.B. The puppy is a son of Ch. Argo, and Mr. Jarvis recently visited Oakville to see his dog's sire.

Mr. R. Furness of Toronto, was another who visited the Lake Shore town, taking back with him a sister to Mr. Jarvis' puppy.

Still another was Mr. E. P. Hinds of Niagara Falls, N.Y., who, with Mr. Vint. Breeze, called on Mr. Meadows recently. Mr. Breeze was greatly taken with Dundee Lady Betty and if she had been for sale would have taken her back with him. However, she is good enough for Mr. Meadows. Mr. Breeze says that she reminded him much of Ch. Oak Nana.

By the way Ch. Argo is now in the West, together with Dundee Lady Betty, where they will take in several of the big Western shows. As the services of Ch. Argo will be available, we hope that some Western breeder may later on be the possessor of a duplicate of Ch. Cheetham Squire.

Mr. F. McBrill, Oldfield, Cheshire, writes us that he saw Mr. Bert Finch on June 26th, and sold him the little Bulldog, Contempt. Mr. Finch since showed his new purchase at Birkenhead, where he got third in very hot company.

Mr. Frank C. Mahan of Edmonton, Alta., is greatly taken with the new stud dog which he imported from Scotland. He is a sixty pound, golden brindle, with a large head, good body and cushion, and excellent ears. He has been shipped to Calgary to see what he can do there.

The Chinook Kennels, Lethbridge, Alta., have imported from the Penfold Kennels of London, England, a young, heavyweight bitch, described by the breeder as a better bitch than Madam Stonewall, and he should know, having turned out so many champions, including the noted Madam Stonewall herself.

A change in the Chinook Kennel's business announcement will be noticed in this issue. Ch. Courtenay Coronet is one of the best Bulldogs living, and his kennel companion Ch. Silent Prince has improved beyond expectation, and has developed into a dog with wonderful head properties. He has great length of skull, exceedingly wide between the eyes and a pair of very small ears that are set on right. He possesses in addition a big foreface, combined with good bone, splendid spring of rib and fine rear parts. A dog that is sure to make his mark in the stud. As the fee of both these dogs is merely nominal, we hope that they will be freely used by Western breeders. They are in the hands of Mr. J. C. Fletcher, Winnipeg.

SPANIELS. Mr. "Billy" Payne, Kingston, Pa., was in Toronto recently on his annual still hunt for Cockers and lots of them. We understand he did not find very many, and one or two that he wanted were not for sale.

We are glad to know that Mr. Lance Farewell still retains his interest in what used to be called "our national dog," and has a number of good puppies that are coming along nicely. Also three or four bitches in whelp, which will add to his spring crop.

Mr. Coristine's Field Spaniel dog arrived safely in Montreal early in July. Mr. Coristine is summering out of town but the Customs preliminaries were looked after in his absence by the ever obliging Harold Hughes.

Airedales.

Puppy dogs—1 Garry Contempt, a nice puppy, good body, legs and feet, nice head. 2 Prairie Snooker, has not the timber of the winner, still a typical puppy.

Novice and limit were repeats. Open dogs—Ch. Clipstone First Shot, looking very fit, was an easy winner. 2 Ch. Auckland Luckystone, often reviewed, a very sound old dog. Joe Wildewood, 2 in novice, was shown rough, good body, bone, legs and feet.

Puppy bitches—1 Garry Sidestep, a litter sister of the winner in puppy dog class. She is a very promising puppy, which, with ordinary luck, should develop into something really good. These two puppies are a credit to their sire, Clipstone First Shot. Ashburn Bess and Ashburn Daisy, placed as written, are both very useful puppies.

Novice bitches—1 Ashburn Madge, a very nice headed bitch, good neck and shoulders, but hardly up to the mark in body. Limit bitches—1 Clipstone Betty, a grand old bitch, wonderful body, bone, legs and feet, for head, neck and shoulders she is hard to beat. 2 Prairie Gipsy, a really nice stamp of bitch, very typical all through.

Open bitches—1 Ch. Cheltenham Venus, nice body, front, legs and feet. She is hardly the correct pattern in head and more timber would improve her.

Ch. Clipstone First Shot won the cup for best specimen.

Boston Terriers.

Puppy dogs—1 McGlynn's Delight, a very promising puppy, extra good in body, not at his best just yet. 2 Tony Ringmaster Jr., a smart little light weight, needs time to furnish in body. Ch. McGlynn's Sensation took winners, a very high quality dog, nicely marked, might be a little better in feet, and carries a shade too much lip.

Limit bitches—1 Lady Mirthless, a charming little bitch, grand body, neck and shoulders, fails a trifle before the eye, otherwise hard to fault. Ch. May Saxon won in open bitches and special for best specimen. She still retains her unbeaten record.

Collies.

Novice dogs—1 Scott, a nice sable and white, showing plenty of quality, more substance would improve him. 2 Imera Gold Nugget scored in size but has not the quality of the winner. 3 Imera Clover is just a fair sort. Limit dogs—1 Imera Toreador is a very stylish sable and white, plenty of size and substance, perhaps a shade coarse in skull. 2 and 3 repeats.

Open dogs-Imera Peacock won, a very high quality dog on rather effeminate lines. Imera Thelma took winners bitches, a real nice bitch.

Ch. Imera Whyzetta was entered for specials only and although not in her best bloom, had no difficulty in annexing the cup for best Collie in show.

Smooth Fox Terriers.

Garry Mack took winners dogs and special for best specimen. He has plenty of bone and substance but hardly shows enough quality.

Puppy bitches was won by Garry Marjorie, a nice quality little bitch, rather erratic in ear carriage. Novice bitches—1 Garry Marjorie; 2 Madison Magpie, just a fair sort. Limit bitches —1 Garry Medley, a real nice little bitch, good head, body, legs and feet. 2 Ashburn Girl, a smart bitch, a shade long in body and weak in fore face. Open bitches, a repeat.

Open dogs, Ch. Seven Oaks Playboy was an easy winner, correct size, good body and head, might be a little better in coat.

Puppy bitches—1 Seven Oaks Colleen, is very stylish, typical body, good coat and color, she is a bit straight in face but would be greatly improved by face furnishing. 2 Seven Oaks Bridget, a useful sort of bitch but lacks the quality of winner. Open bitches, Ch. Seven Oaks Playbox took winners, very typical all through, excellent coat and color.

Pointers.

Novice dogs, Mr. Weir's dog won. He is a well put together dog with good body, bone, legs and feet. 2 Mystery, is on the small side but looks as if he could make good use of himself in the field. Limit dogs— 1 Sir Royal Tick, in grand condition, a high quality dog, fails a little in bone and substance. Open dogs—1 Ch. Yumas Tonti, an easy winner, very stylish, good body, legs and feet, carries a gay tail occasionally. 2 Sir Royal Tick; 3 Ch. Bangs Doc, a very nice headed dog, plenty of bone but rather slack in couplings.

Pointer bitches—1 Girlie Cash, grand body, bone, legs and feet, fails a little in head. She was shown a trifle too fat. 2 Birdie Cash, another good type of bitch, not so good in body as her kennel companion. 3 Norah Dahlquist, is a very stylish bitch, nice racy body, could be improved in head. She did not make the most of herself in the ring or might have been higher. Annette came 3rd in open, she was not in her usual good form.

English Setters.

Mr. Weir's dog won in novice, a nice headed little dog, good legs and feet, a bit slack in body. 2 Canada King, a useful type built on galloping lines. 3 Lanark Fritz would no doubt be more at home in the field. Limit dogs—1 Lanark Prince, a big racy dog, well shaped head, deep brisket, when in good form will be hard to beat. Tango won in bitches. She is a beauty, with a little better head she could hold her own in any company. Lanark Patsey scores over the winner in head, she fails in front and is long in body.

Irish Setters.

Limit dogs—1 Cushbawn Desmond, is very typical, for body, coat, color, legs and feet, he is hard to beat. 2 Bloomfield Larry, a nice racy type of dog that looks as if he could cover the ground in good style, not in his best coat. Open—1 Cushbawn Desmond; 2 Ch. Gilmore Shaun, is not so typical as winner, still a nice dog. Ch. Bloomfield Wonder won in bitches. She was not in as good a form as we have seen her.

Russian Wolfhounds.

Miss Maryon Galt's "Czar Michael" won in dogs, he is very stylish with plenty of substance. Thelma III., won in bitches, a nice type that will, no doubt, improve with age. Ashburn Rose is a very useful bitch.

Whippets.

Puppy dogs—1 Strathcona Star, a nice racy looking puppy, will do well later. Limit dogs—1 Peeping Tom, a black, and a good one, nice outline, good front, legs and feet. 2 Strathcona King is not much behind the winner. Ch. Worley Junior came 3 in open. It was no easy matter to separate these three dogs. They are all good ones. In bitches the puppy, Merton Primrose, went right through to winners and took special for best in show. She excels in body, legs and feet and when fully matured it will take an extra good one to stop her.

BULL DOGS AT THE W. C. K. C. SHOW.

By the Judge.

The puppy and novice classes presented only one entry, Mersey Marquis, a fair specimen of apparently ten months of age who was duly presented with two first ribbons.

Limit and open dogs (under 45 lbs.) brought forth the famous Mersey Pilot and Silver Rival, and as I had carefully noticed both dogs at other shows I had no hesitation in handing two first ribbons to Pilot whom I consider the best all round specimen yet exhibited in Western Canada, with the possible exception of Bullacity (female), and, by the way, I would

for comparison. Pilot is a particularly nice little dog that is hard to fault, unless one might criticize his rather quiet expression when not on the qui vive. He has a nice compact body with well sprung ribs, good tail and roach, deep in brisket, nice feet and legs, and a well formed skull and foreface along with perfectly carried ears. In other words he would be my ideal of a Bulldog had he a little more determined expression and three to eight pounds more weight. Silver Rival is an entirely different style of dog, being a very heavy, thick-set fellow with particularly big bone and good front, in fact Rival carried off the special for best front in show. He falls down against Pilot in badly carried ears and very heavy hindquarters.

In open (45 lbs. and over), the much heralded Argo was alone in his glory and I gave him a first although he was not at all my fancy of what a Bulldog should be. I expected, from what I had heard, to see a dog who would easily overcome any local competition but candidly I was disappointed in this, and when brought into the ring with several other dogs for the specials judging, he was not mentioned in despatches.

In the novice bitch class Chinook Star Turn was awarded first and Winnipeg Girl second, both dogs being far from my ideal, the former tall and rangy and very close to a black, while the latter is a nondescript fawn that as far as nerve and ring style is concerned is anything but a Bulldog.

In limit and open bitches (under 40 lbs.), a class of five was shown, first going to Chineham Reflection, a good specimen but appearance injured by a badly turned fore-leg and button ears. I understand I was censured by a few onlookers for giving this bitch a blue ribbon on account of the ear carriage but I would remind those who disagreed that the Standard of Type as compiled by "The Allied Bulldog Club of Great Britain" simply states the button ear is objectionable and as only 15 points are assigned ears, out of a possible 300 points, I cannot see where faulty ears should be severely dealt with when other points outshine those of competitors. Second was given the Toronto Lady Betty, a nice white specimen who beat the third, Chinook Queen, in foreface. Queen is too like a Pug in the eye and too weak before to suit me. The other dogs were only fair specimens.

Limit bitches (40 lbs. and over), found Rose Smith and Brockley Biferous looking for honors and the ribbons were handed out in the order named.

Open bitches (40 lbs. and over), was the same as limit except Champion Cowans Peggy desired a look in and beating Rose and Biferous in most points, carried away the blue.

The special for best in show was awarded Mersey Pilot, as was the special for best head, Peggy taking special for best opposite sex and best body. Silver Rival carried off special for best front May Persse.

COLLIES AT MONTREAL SHOW.

Collies at Montreal show made perhaps, the best display.

There were one hundred and eleven entries in the regular and local classes, with thirty one dogs. This made the best showing of Collies that Montreal has had for some years, and it was a real pleasure to look them over.

In junior dogs and bitches, eight entries, Lewis Hersey's Coila Joe (Southport Proclamation - Coila Mollie), was first. This is a nice quality sable and white, with a real smart head. He was inclined to carry one ear a little high on the judging day, a good fault in a young one. He carries a fine coat, and is a promising youngster. This dog, in my opinion, should have gone through to winners. 2 W. S. Johnson's Wallace (Southport Proclamation-Pearl), was not on the bench when I was taking notes. I saw him the first day, however, he is a good type. 3 W. J. Little's Rockland Laddie, a nice showy tricolor, with good eye and expression. Ears a trifle low. Reserve, J. G. Reid's Broadland Dutchess (South-Port Proclamation-Broadland Bessie) was easily the best Collie in the show, to my mind. She was shown in full bloom and carried a beautiful coat. For head, eye and expression, she would be hard to beat. Her one fault is that she is a little overshot, but not enough to penalize her, as the fangs in the lower jaw are well in front of those in the upper jaw. I tried, through a friend, to buy this bitch but did not succeed, I may get her yet. She is a classy specimen that I should be proud to own.

Novice dogs, seven entries, 1 J. S. N. Dugan's Verdun Rex (Coila Swatch -Nettie), a very showy tricolor, with good ears, nice eye and expression, shown in nice bloom. 2nd and 3rd already reviewed.

Limit dogs, ten entries, 1 Andrew Thow's Auchdryne Sable Prince (Seabank Shiner-Invercauld Dolly), a big coarse, sable and white, far too coarse for a show specimen, fair ears, good expression, in fair coat. 2 J. G. Reid's Broadland Fox (Colia Canny Chiel-Broadland Patti de Bel), has thickened in head since he made his debut at Montreal a year ago, a nice shower, with good ears and expression. 3 Wm. Lyall's Rosebank Prior (Calton Puppy - Torbane Queen), this is a real nice quality sable and white that might easily have been higher up. He is a trifle on the small side and was not in full

coat, and for the latter reason, might have been second to Lewis Hersey's Coila Joe, which, as I said, should have gone to winners, with Mr. Lyall's dog reserve winners. This latter has a very pleasing profile, with good head, ears, eye and expression.

Open dogs, nine entries, winners, have all been reviewed.

J. Stanley Down's Prince and Clinker, two young tricolors, too young to show against older dogs with any chance of winning.

A. H. Hersey's Southport Proclamation was shown in grand form, with his usual massive coat, easily the best in the show. It certainly must be a hot class where this dog cannot get in the money when shown in the condition he was in, in Montreal. We have had few dogs in this country that carries such a coat, and with it all he is a quality one, and was easily one of the three best in the show. He had the satisfaction, however, of having sired most of the good young ones in the show.



SOME DIFFERENCE OF OPINION.

The June number of your paper contains an article by A. P. Mutchmor which takes issue with some statements made by the Winnipeg Kennel Club. As an old subscriber to your paper and also a member of the W. K. C., I would like to be allowed to reply to the same.

A. P. Vredenburgh has given a plain answer to A. P. Mutchmor's doubts as to how the C. K. C. stands in regard to the "Reciprocity Pact." He has also issued a warning to Americans who may be called upon to judge D. K. C. shows, so I need not labor that point. The back door, so designated by A. P. Mutchmor, seems to be a wide open front door.

Let us look at the status of a disqualified person. If he has dogs registered in the D. K. C. Stud Book and sells one to an American, the buyer will have to pay duty into the U.S. The U.S. Customs do not recognize the D. K. C. Stud Book. This is no delusion or surmise. Tom Milner, of this city, sold three Collies to a man in Chicago. He sent along certificates of registration from Mr. Mutchmor, but the Customs charged the buyer twenty dollars duty.

Again a disqualified person wishes to enter a dog in the American Field Trials. What happens? The A. F. T. Club is affiliated with the A. K. C. which has his name on fyle, "the black list." What is he to do? He will know whether disqualification is real or imaginary.

We may as well face the facts. We

ing bodies in kennel affairs in Canada. Are the majority of dog winners going to stand for the taxation and confusion entailed? If the answer is in the affirmative then why stop with two. Friction is bound to arise among the following of the D. K. C. and other ambitious men will follow A. P. Mutchmor's footsteps, and we will have still more taxation and confusion. There will be nothing to prevent Calgary, Edmonton, British Columbia and the Maritime Provinces each having a governing body. It is up to the dog owners to settle this question for all time.

Here in Winnipeg we are regaled with the noble thought that the C. K. C. is only a group of Toronto fanciers and that the D. K. C. is a Western organization. The C. K. C. has governed kennel affairs in this country as long as I can remember anything, and has done so honorable and fairly. The D. K. C. is composed of men who, while holding responsible offices in the C. K. C. formed this opposing body in defiance of ordinary club loyalty, to use no stronger term. Are these the men who we can afford to trust again, with the custody of the Canadian Stud Book, the register that should contain the pedigrees and records of wins of our dogs and which to be of service, should be administered jealously and honestly.

RECEIVING PUPPIES.

"Many people who buy puppies do not give them proper care on their arrival in their new home. In order to ensure success with a new puppy, take it carefully from the crate in which it is received, making as little noise as possible in so doing. Speak to it in a pleasant and sympathic way, calling it by its name, if it has any, which fact should always be ascertained before receipt of the puppy, if possible. After removal from the crate, be careful that the puppy does not get frightened and run off and hide. In order to avoid this, let the youngster out into a space of moderate size at first. Bear in mind that the journey, however short, has the tendency to frighten and make nervous any young dog.

"After allowing the puppy some freedom and an outing in an enclosure, for sufficient length of time for it to attend to nature's calls, give it a bowl of boiled milk and bread broken up, or a soft-boiled egg or two. Feed lightly for a few days, at morning, noon and night. If kept out of draughts and petted, the puppy should soon get fully accustomed to his new home. The sooner the puppy is made to feel at home by kindness and attention, the better it will thrive and grow, and the less will it feel the shock of the change to his new quarters."





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
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the degenerate are, by the same law, likely to produce degenerate and defective children. Nature is very fond of accentuating certain physical characteristics in certain families. For instance you may trace the Hapsburg nose back from Alfonso of Spain through half a dozen generations. Many families can be recognized at once, by a gait in walking characteristic of the whole family.

Now the Dudley nose in the Bulldog is due to a congenital lack of pigment in the tissues of the nose, often



Question. In reply to yours of the 16th inst., re the Dudley nose in Bulldogs, this is a matter in which I feel very strongly, no departure whatever should be made from the old country Standard, which

calls for direct disqualification. We already have too much inconsistency in the judging of Bulldogs and to my mind what is hindering normal advancement is the engagement and awards of those who call themselves "alrounders." What is the use of endeavoring to advance the breed in obtaining typical specimens, to have placed over you specimens one can pick up for "a couple of quid," then be expected to come back again for the same kind of a licking.

Another point touched upon in your report of the Bulldog classes at Montreal, you got the right nail on the head when you wrote that judging from the type of pups being raised, we must be breeding from the wrong kind of bitches, as we certainly have the sires.

Canada wants to keep clear of the big mistake made across the line. To go to the top they still have to buy England's best, and why? Because they nearly always import the best dogs, seldom the best bitches, and most of their best bitches are nonbreeders, considered by their owners too valuable to chance losing by whelping troubles.

Now, in my opinion, a Bulldog having this glaring fault should be disqualified and not allowed to compete. The English Bulldog Standard plainly says in its description of the nose, that it should be large, broad and black. As to the nostrils, it says they should be large, wide and black, and I think the sooner we make it a disqualification the better for the breed.

It is much allied to albinism in the human (we are all familiar with the white hair, colorless eye lashes, and weak eyes of these individuals).

There is only one way to eliminate the Dudley nose, that is to cease breeding from Dudleys. You could eliminate the epileptic and the degenerate if you could follow the same process.

While the Dudley dog, or bitch, may produce no Dudleys in their own litter, the second and third generation is apt to be Dudley. Sometimes we see a grand specimen of Bulldog a Dudley, but this is an exception, and where you get one of these you get a dozen white eyed, scrawney Dudleys, who should have been drowned at whelping, for if allowed to survive they do nothing but harm to the breed.

The Dudley nose should be an absolute disqualification. It is a bad congenital defect, and if allowed to go unchallenged at the shows, will ruin the breed, and instead of the grand old Bulldog expression, you will have a lot of liver nosed "muts," a disgrace to the type we have striven so hard to produce.

DISCOVERED ANIMALS DYING OF HUNGER.

Kittens and Dog Left to Themselves While Mistress Went Holidaying.

Can inhuman cruelty go very much further than the case recounted in the Toronto World of July 11th, as follows:

As a result of a raid on the premises of a prominent society woman on Palmerston Boulevard by the police and officers of the Toronto Humane Society, eight kittens and a dog in the last stages of starvation were found, lying in the midst of an unspeakable collection of filth on the floor of a board enclosure, where no light and little air could penetrate, in the cellar of the house.

It appears that the woman left town two weeks ago to fulfil her social engagements, and relying on the intelligence of her pets to make it last, left what she considered was sufficient food to keep them nourished and in comfort till she returned. Her pets greedily gobbled up all the food, so that for almost two weeks they have been suffering starvation and thirst in a dark and filthy hole.

"It is the most shocking case of cruelty and neglect that has ever come to our notice," said Secretary Craven of the Humane Society.

Six of the kittens were so wasted as to be little more than skin and bone and were unable to move. Two others, wild with fear and hunger, fled before they could be caught. The dog, which seems to be a species of French Poodle, lay on the cellar floor almost lifeless. In addition to a goitre from which it has been suffering for some time the unfortunate animal has contracted a loathsome skin disease. as a direct result of the ill-treatment and neglect it had received both before and after it was shut up. Most of the hair is gone from its body and what few tufts left were full of vermin.

The seven suffering creatures were hurried to the Humane Society's hospital at 197 McCaul Street, where they received expert attention from the veterinary surgeon. The kittens' eyes, which were in a terribly inflamed condition, were bathed, while food in the form of eggs and milk was administered, but it was found necessary to put an end to their lives yesterday.

The dog was given an antiseptic bath and otherwise treated medically.

The woman was summoned to appear before Magistrate Kingsford yesterday afternoon, but failed to present herself, and the trial was adjourned for a week.

The medical health officer will also bring a charge against the woman for the filthy condition of her premises.

VALUABLE DOGS STOLEN, OWNERS ARE ENRAGED.

Are Co-operating with the Humane Society to Trap Thieves.

Owners of valuable dogs in the city are very much enraged over the large number of canines that have been stolen and poisoned during the past six weeks, and they are co-operating with the Toronto Humane Society, 197 McCaul Street, for drastic action.

In this connection a fund has been launched whereby a reward of \$100 will be offered for each case that is reported and the guilty party apprehended. Mr. Craven, Secretary of the Humane Society, yesterday stated that much of the dog poisoning is very hard to explain, while stealing is apparently being carried on systematically by certain individuals for the profit that they find in the business.

He explained that valuable dogs are being stolen every day and sold to vivisection institutions, where they are used for experimental purposes. Upwards of fifty cases of poisoning have been reported during the past couple of weeks, most of the poisoning having been done with strychnine. A member of the society reported that a young woman called at her

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home a few nights ago and walked off with a \$150 pup, which, she said, she desired to show her mother, before purchasing it. The young lady and canine are still missing.—Toronto World.

COCKERS IN ALBERTA.



Placing her offspring in safety, the spectators were amazed to see the mother repeat the feat until she succeeded in carrying to safety, one by one, all her family of seven puppies, the last one being brought out only a few moments before the building collapsed. CANADIAN KENNEL GAZETTE
