THE inevitable has happened. The Canadian Kennel Club has been compelled, very reluctantly, to disqualify a number of those who have officiated at shows contrary to the rules of the club, among them previous officers of the club, old friends and old members. Nothing could have been more unpleasant to the executive committee than to have to take such a step,

indeed, its desire and efforts to avoid doing so amounted almost to weakness for they hesitated long. But they acted with firmness when the necessity arose. Every opportunity was given to each offender to explain, two registered letters having been addressed to each, one of warning before the offence and one asking for an explanation after; and, no doubt, any reasonable explanation would have been accepted, so that the only view to take of the stand of those who refused to take advantage of these opportunities was that of open and intentional defiance of this club's rules. Those who have now come under this club's discipline, therefore, have no one to blame but themselves.

There is an extraordinary and almost unbelievable impression among some of the opponents of this club, that it is acting in the aggressive and is attacking its opponents. Nothing is or can be farther from the actual facts. For many months this club stood all sorts of misrepresentation and underhanded attack without notice, and, not until these attacks became such as to injure personally those who had remained loyal to it, did this club take any steps, and then only such as to protect those who were being injured in those sections where the disaffection is active, and then only at the earnest solicitation of those who were feeling keenly the weight of the attack. And the steps taken were only such as to preserve to this club rights and liberties that it had held for over twenty years.

It is astonishing the ignorance displayed by many as to the rules of the Canadian Kennel Club, and of its recent enactments. Fanciers of some years' standing and who naturally would be expected to have some knowledge of what is being done, accuse this club of having rules that do not exist in its constitution, or demand changes that have already been made. We have been accused of tying down the Western Provinces under the dictation of our provincial vice-presidents, or, in other words, to what has been termed one-man rule. Anyone who takes the trouble to inform himself of the club's affairs knows that we were not only willing but eager to give an advisory board to Manitoba, and that such a board is in existence; that British Columbia has for years had a written agreement with the club whereby every club holding a show under C.K.C. rules was given a representative on the advisory board, and that this board now exists, consisting of a representative from the Victoria City Kennel Club, the Terminal City Kennel Club, and our provincial vice-president. We have also repreatedly urged the members in Alberta to form an advisory board. And it is on the strength of such ignorance the club is being attacked.

A favorite expression with those who wish to criticize this club is that it cannot see beyond the Great Lakes. What object would be gained by such an attitude it is hard to understand, and if any such short-sighted feeling

exists it is in the minds of those so fond of using the expression. The personnel of those at the top of affairs in the Canadian Kennel Club is far too broad in mind and heart to give any excuse for such an opinion being attached to them, and they consider at all times the general good of the club. To be sure, they are not mind-readers, nor are they responsible if, in the past, complaints have been suppressed. They cannot correct grievances of which they are ignorant. But every petition or grievance has always received their careful consideration, whether thrifling or important. On the other hand, those who wish to take advantage of the club, counting on its ignorance, need only look for failure. It is well informed as to conditions and individuals at home as well as to those separated from it by a distance, therefore, attempts to pull the wool over its eyes must be expected to fail. It does not need eyesight sufficient to pierce a brick wall to recognize such attempts and to know the origin of veiled attacks, even when coming from a protestingly friendly source.

It should be well understood that No. II., Section 3, of Show Rules, concerning disqualification, acts automatically, and that it is not necessary that it should be passed on by any meeting of the Executive Committee or of the club. Any explanations, however, from those who have infringed on this rule will be brought up and considered at the next executive meeting of the club.

A contemporary of ours published in the United States is very solicitious of the position of our president, Mr. Kent. It fears that he was acting in ignorance of the actual affairs of the club when he wrote the editorial in last month's "Kennel and Bench." Sufficient for us to say that no one in the Canadian Kennel Club is more closely and fully conversant with the actual affairs of the club than its president. All important documents are put before him, and he visits the office of the club very frequently. In fact, he is giving the club a great deal of time and attention, and knows what he is saying.

Notes and News from England

Mrs. Thomas W. Larsen, of Newburgh, New York, has brought from Mrs. Moore the well-known Chow Chows, Hildewell Blue Muff, Hildewell Snow & Hildewell Inky.

Mr. P. L. Savage, of St. Charles, U. S., has purchased from Mr. W. Grimshaw that well-known winning Collie (rough) dog Parkside Pro Patria.

Mr. Benedict, of Denver, Colorado, has bought the well-known Bull Terrier bitch, Judy in whelp to Silver Cheeky.

Knowing that Canadian dog fanciers are greatly interested in St. Bernards, I think that the following will draw their special attention. The St. Bernard Club have recently issued their report, in which Mr. H. Stocken passes in survey the position of the breed in 1913. He says that the St. Bernard is as good and typical nowadays as it has ever been since he started exhibiting, and he continues thus: "With a bitch like Ch. Destiny of Duffryn and a dog like Ch. the Pride of Sussex to lead the breed, how can people talk as I have heard them? No St. Bernard has ever done what these two have done, and if the breed has so deteriorated, well, then, all other breeds must be very bad, indeed, and I think we can safely leave these croakers to get what consolation they can get out of this. Again, there is no getting away from the fact that at the present time the dogs exhibited are, with very few exceptions, sound, and when I started breeding they were just the opposite, it being the exception to find sound dogs." Mr. Stocken is quite right in what he says about the soundness of the present-day St. Bernard. He also says that many new exhibitors have joined the ranks of the St. Bernard fanciers, and some of the old ones, who had abandoned the breed, have returned to the "flock."

In the same report one reads with interest Mr. L. C. R. Morris-Elye's reminiscences of the Club, reminiscences going back to 1882. It was then that the first show of the St. Bernard Club took place, with 252 entries. When Mr. Morris-Elye was proposed to serve on the Committee, his proposer, among other considerations, urged that he was a fast bowler! A member, while speaking once about a dog which had been exported to America, said: "I have always wondered why Blank sold Blank

to America." "Perhaps to improve the breed of St. Bernards in England," was the very sareastic reply.

In "the Daily Telegraph" there appeared quite recently a very interesting article "Collie Reminiscences," by Mr. A. Croxton Smith, which I wish to quote to your readers.

".... by happy chance Mr. Stevens came along, and we entered into a discussion upon the respective merits of these dogs to-day and their forebears of twenty years ago. Mr. Stephens is well qualified to express an opinion, considering that since the death of the Rev. Hans Hamilton he may almost be looked upon as the doyen of the variety. Possibly Mr. Tom Stretch may have been exhibiting before him, but of this I should not like to speak with any certainty. At any rate, the active association of the first-named gentleman goes back to the year 1880. He was able to recall that in the year 1884 in that very town (Tunbridge Wells) he was exhibiting with success, and from the catalogue that he has been good enough to send for my inspection I see that he won first in a large class of bitches with Norwick Moss. The entry then is very different from what it was last week, one class alone containing sixteen dogs-described, by the way, as "Collies and Sheepdogs," Among others of the old brigade represented were Dr. Edwards Ker and Mr. W. W. Thompson. This carries us back to the palmy days of the breed, when prices were begining to bound upwards, and a man looked upon Collie farming as one of the most profitable of pursuits. It was about 1887 that Mr. Megson gave £500 for Ch. Metchley Wonder. Before this he had paid £250 for Rutland, who in 1885 had distinguished himself by lowering the colors of the previously unbeaten Charlemange. Good dogs not being as common in those days as at the present time, Charlemange (bred in 1879 by Mr. Bissell) never failed to attract the public when it was announced that he was to appear at any show. In 1890, his last time out, he won the special for the best Collie at the Collie Club Show, held in the old Central Hall, Holborn. It has been said, however, that sentiment favored the veteran on that occasion. Some of the stories told about Rutland are not altogether authentic, notably

that which ascribes his sale by his breeder, the Rev. Hans Hamilton, for £5. Mr. Hamilton, always generous, gave him away, but he was afterwards purchased for the sum mentioned by Mr. Beddington. On one occasion Mr. Hamilton told the late Lord Davey that an offer of £300 had been refused for Charlemagne, to which came the prompt rejoinder, "Two fools," However, the clergyman was able to give the great lawyer some information which made him revise his opinion, although this was a year or two before breeders began to think in thousands. It is common knowledge that during the past few years Collies have been under an eclipse, and those who thought they discerned better times in view cannot derive much encouragement from the registration figures. Since 1906, when 1368 were registrated at the Kennel Cub, the decline has been uniform, untill last year the sorry total of 795 was recorded. Various reasons, into which I need not enter now, may be suggested to account for this lamentable result. With regard to the dog, Mr. Stephens is optimistic, as he writes to me; "In my opinion the Collie has improved in make and shape. He is better in neck and shoulders, legs and feet. The head is much longer, the muzzle finer. The skull must be sufficiently wide for brains, and a fine tapering muzzle is correct, provided there is no weakness of the jaw or an over shot mouth. The ear of the present day Collie is a little more than half the size, and the correct semi-erect carriage which breeders strove hard to obtain years ago is now almost always seen. The round full eye has been superseded by a dark, more almond-shaped one, which gives the dog a keen and intelligent expression. The modern Collie is an improvement on the old-fashioned in every feature, but coat. Coats nowadays are nothing like so heavy or harsh in texture as thirty years ago, and that very essential undercoat is often lacking in some of the noted prize-winners. Not being a Collie man, any criticism of mine is not likely to carry much weight, but I cannot help feeling that the heads are a bit on the fine side, while many muzzles have the appearance of weakness. As I write, before me is a picture of a bitch, Beck Bridget, owned by Mr. Stephens many years back, and as far as looks go I prefer her style of head to the modern. Hers seemed to be long enough and fine enough for all purposes. Most will be agreed that coats have deteriorated, and I suppose the majority will also be in accord with Mr. Stephens in praising the newer ear, eye and better body properties. Deficiency in covering is a serious defect, for the beautiful, profuse, showy coats of the Collies took everyone by storm, making them general household favorites."

The well-known Yorkshire Terrier dog, Pellon Earlsmead Bobby, has been sold by Mr. J. Greenwood to Mr D. Mitchell, of Alberta.

KINGSTON COMING ON.

Dear Doctor,—On Monday last on the occasion of the Kingston Old Boys' Reunion we held an informal open-air dog show in this city and succeeded in getting 210 dogs on exhibition, only three of which were without classified breeding. The ribbons were given by the humane society.

The object of the informal show was to furnish a feature for the home owners, to stimulate interest and to stir up enough interest to start a kennel club in this city. I think we have succeeded in every object, and you may hope for another ally to the C.K.C. No entry fees were charged for dogs in our little enterprise, nor were any admission fees charged to grounds. No money prizes were given, no list published, no regulations enforced. took all entries at the ringside, encouraging ladies and children to bring their pets and join in the undertaking, which they certainly did. We had fully 2,000 people around the ring from 9 a.m. until 1.30 p.m. Tuesday evening we intend organizing the Frontenac Kennel Club, which will include the entire county, and the best people in the city, together with many members of council and his Worship the Mayor are with us in our work.

Six years ago the Kingston Kennel Club was organized, but it has never met since, nor has it given the faintest evidences of life. It was evidently born, died and buried on the same night. It was more a society affair than a dog club. There were five men present the night it was organized out of over 600 dog owners in this city. We now have the names and addresses of over 150 owners of good dogs, which we shall try and get out Tuesday night.

Round one.-The fight between the Winnipeg Kennel Club and the Dominion Kennel Club. The title being the Exhibition Dog Show belt, is now a matter of history. The referee who judged the competition had no hesitation at the sound of the gong in awarding the decision to the Winnipeg Kennel Club, who, he said, while being unable to administer the knock-out blow, had the better of the round from the start, having carried the fight to the opponent's corners right through the round, also by aggressiveness, and by the clean-cut manner in which the welldirected blows were delivered. At the sound of the gong the Dominion K. C. appeared decidely groggy, while the Winnipeg K. C. left the ring fresher and stronger than ever. Some idea of the weak condition of the D. K. C. may

be gathered from this fact; the Exhi- the dignity of a club which pretends to bition Board were compelled to seek assistance by canvassing from house to house in order to see the D.K.C. safely home.

No doubt many of your readers will be wondering how the Winnipeg K. C. is progressing and I am pleased to state we are doing better than our most sanguine hopes would have ever allowed us to believe, at every meeting of the executive several new members have been elected, composed of the very best fanciers any clu- could desire.

During the Exhibition I visited the Dog Show on three occasions and it was the general comment among both visitors and exhibitors on the poor quality of the dogs benched. In fact, had you taken the Edmonton entry out of the show, and about 100 of the local dogs, instead of being a dog show, it would have looked more like a poundkeeper's back yard. One thing that impressed me very forcibly and which was very gratifying, was the amount of support the C. K. C. is rapidly winning back and it is no exaggeration for me to say that every show held and run by the Dominion Kennel Club not only weakens them but sees them rapidly retreating farther and farther from the object they so fondly imagined was almost within their ambitious and unscrupulous grasp. One gentleman who had travelled a long distance from the West to see the Exhibition assured me it was anything but the wishes of the fanciers that the West had gone over to the D. K. C. He particularly advised the Winnipeg K. C. to stay with the clean end of the game, and had no hesitation in foreeasting that this year would see the Western fanciers administer the coup de grace to the Dominion Kennel Club, an organization which has forced itself upon the West and which now realizes that, apart from making endless trouble and confusion, has absolutely no justification for its existence.

While at the Dog Show I took the trouble to count the number and found 445 dogs benched. Other fanciers who counted them will verify this number. although Dug McKay, who is the official mouthpiece of the D. K.C., claims in the Free Press 486 dogs benched. However, even at 445 the D. K. C. is to be complimented on getting such a large entry, although the methods adopted were anything but befitting uphold its rules and do nothing but elevate the "fancy" on any and every occasion it can possibly find an excuse for patting itself on the back and blowing its own trumpet through the press. Another \$70 worth, please.

When the gong sounded the entry (not dogs) only totalled 640-it was then decided that a time for entry's closing was only a matter of form anyhow-and an article appeared in the local press saying entries would be accepted up to 10 a.m. on date of opening of show, in addition to which a personal house-to-house canvass was adopted. Interrogated on this houseto-house canvas. Mr. Spurgeon admitted the fact, but denied the D. K. C. were paying the expenses, and stated the Exhibition Board itself were paying the canvosser's expenses. You'll agree with me this is a fine situation for the committee to find itself in, after refusing the offer of the Winnipeg Kennel Club's guarantee insuring them the largest entry ever seen at a western show. Needless to say, the Exhibition was severely criticized through the press for its lack of quality in dog show section. Another trivial point was got over by allowing exhibitors (who could be persuaded to show) to bring their puppies with them and suckle on the bench. This was done, and was no end of agaisement to the small boy and the younger generation. Another minor point which can be used to obtain entries is allowing puppies under age to be entered and benched. This was also resorted to.

Having got all the dogs, including the good dogs, the bad dogs, the small dogs, the big dogs, the puppies under age, and the puppies not yet weaned. safely benched, we kick off with the judging and listen to what Mr. McKay (the official mouthpiece) says about it in the Free Press: "The third day of the Dog Show proved as popular as the two previous days, and saw all breeds adjusted according to the opinion of the judges." I think a little explanation is in order here "Dug." Why were the judges allowed to sort out the winners? Was it because the committee had gone to lunch, or was it because they were suffering from that which overtakes everything in this world when lying on its deathbedremorse of conscience? It would certainly be interesting to know how such

an important part of a dog show as the awards came to be left to the mere opinion of the judges. He then continues: "Which has stirred things up and sent winners in different breeds to all points of the compass. Everybody was well pleased, etc., etc." It would appear to me that he is trying to explain that, owing to the judges being allowed the privilege of forming their own opinion, it had stirred things up some, but that they, the 'faithful few,' who had unfortunately been left on this occasion, could probably hope to be better in line at the next 'event' when they will not again fall into the error of allowing the judge "his opinion." It is also significant that the judges having their own opinion sent the winners to all points of the compass, which is such an unusual procedure. Mr. McKay could not help commenting on it, although I don't recollect any of the winners' ribbons going

A great deal of literature and correspondence has been scattered throughout the West during the past season, claiming a great injustice was being imposed on the West through lack of proper representation, etc., thus disguising the real reason for the formation of the D. K. C. As an old member of the Western Canada Kennel Club, and one of the half dozen who were successful in working up enough enthusiasm to persuade them to run their first winter show (which, by the way, was the most successful show ever held in Winnipeg) I would like to know where all this dissatisfaction originated. Certainly not among the bench show members of the W. C. K. C., who are now fast rallying to the aid of the Winnipeg Kennel Club. The seeds of dissatisfaction were sown by some ambitious fancier whose object by this time is well known. Certain it is we never heard of any discord at any of the meetings of the W. C. K. C., and it would be interesting to know on whose authority these requests were made, if they were ever made. However, we have a fine opportunity now for letting in a little daylight. In the last issue of Kennel and Bench the president, Mr. John G. Kent, gave them every opportunity to vindicate themselves by asking for the fullest information and a request to state their case. This is going to present all kinds of little titbits. One of their strong cards is that

Ivanhoe Violet, a fawn bitch, about 40 lbs., very short in back, low to the ground, big bone, nice shoulders, good front, good underjaw, deep stop, good expression, would like to see her a little flatter in skull, but an extra good bitch.

Mackworth Rosa, a bitch owned by Mr. Herbert Alward; this is an all brindle bitch, low to the ground, good front, nice bone, good ear carriage, nice shoulders, good in ribs, is inclined to be somewhat flat in back, but a sitch that will take a lot of beating.

Mr. Perey Gunn, of Sussex, N.B., has a beautiful Bulldog in Kingsdale Nipper, by Gotham Lord Beresford. This is a dark brindle, with grand shoulders, nice ribs, good in hindquarters, very short body, good skull, deep stop, nice underjaw, long flat head, a dog that always has to be considered when shown, and for a dog of 50 lbs. extremely active.

Mr. J. F. MacDonald has purchased the Bull bitch, Patricia of York. This is the bitch I mated to Rockeliffe the Devil's Deputy. She whelped three puppies, one dog and two bitches. These puppies are extra heavy in bone; in fact, at this age are very hard to fault, except their tails could be a little shorter. I have one of the bitch puppies, Mr. MacDonald the other, and (these are brindle) Mr. Condon, a new man at the game, purchased the fawn puppy, which should make into a good one.

Mr. E. W. L. Jarvis has a very nice puppy, which he bought from Mr. Meadows, although this was at his summer home, consequently I did not see it. It is reported as being a very nice one.

Hon. Judge McKeown has a very good dog, which he imported from England, and Mr. Tingly has one he imported from the States.

I saw a very nice brace of Irish Terriers, owned by Mr. Percy Magee. I did not get their names, as Mr. Magee was away from home when I called. These, dog and bitch, are a nice size, beautiful brick red coats, and very harsh, the dog, I believe, is by Thorncroft Dictator.

I came back with three Irisa Setter puppies, bred by my brother, ex Pride of Erin, by Ch. Shamus O'Brien. The judging is likely to be in the capable hands of Mr. J. Mortimer, of New York fame. All the Eastern and Western owners have promised to come in force and with over three hundred dogs from the city alone, it promises to be one of the best shows ever held in Western Can-

I am afraid a large number of the dogs seen at the Exhibition show will want remodelling badly before they can be expected to get honors among a good class. This was especially noticeable in the Collie class, where the Weston and Corona Kennels were sadly missed.

Mr. H. St. Lawrence, I hear, is ready to back his Bull bitch in opposition to statement made that "there was not a Bull bitch in the city fit to take a third place that was not there."

Mr. G. Binnie, of the Morley Avenue Kennels, is likely to have a good say in the tri-color Collie class at the forthcoming show with his two black, tan and white puppies, and his Blue Merle. He will be also heard from in the Sable class.

Mr. R. Simpson, of East Kildonan, has a smart, well-knit young Boston Bull bitch out of Miss Jackson. She looks like a winner, and both she and her dam will be heard from in October.

Mr. J. Simpson, from the same quarter, should give owners of Collies in the puppy, novice, limit and provincial classes (if not further) a hard run for their money with a handsome young dog, by Mr. Tom Milner's Weston Emperor.

It is expected Winnipeg will be well represented at Toronto in September, with a lot of dogs who through the present Kennel Club mix-up in the city have not been shown since the February show here.

NOTES FROM BRITISH COLUMBIA.

A photo of the Boston Terrier, Lady Halstead, appeared in one of the Vancouver dailies, stating that this dog would be shown at the Vancouver Exhibition on Sept. 7, 8 and 9.

This dog was owned by Mrs. A. G. Halstead, one of the best known lady fanciers on the coast, and one of the vice-presidents of the Terminal City Kennel Club.

I have permission to state that Mrs. Halstead is not showing at the Vancouver Exhibition, or at any other show held under D. K. C. rules. Furthermore, this dog has been dead for 18 months.

Acts like these are very misleading and deplorable. About two weeks ago appeared an article in the daily papers here that all clubs of "repute" from Winnipeg to the coast were being held under Dominion Kennel Club rules..

The Dominion Kennel Club's representative here certainly tried to line them all up, and we can give the fanciers the true facts.

The only clubs that have been holding regular meetings, during the year, are the Terminal City, Nanaimo and Victoria Kennel Clubs, and all these clubs were unanimously in favor of holding their shows under C. K. C. rules.

The Vancouver Exhibition here is being held under D. K. C. rules, but, gentlemen, what could you expect from the people that held their show under

American Kennel Club rules two years agof

I have been on the coast now for three years, and have studied local conditions very carefully, and have no hesitation in saying that the "few" fanciers (?) here that are working in the interest of the Dominion Kennel Club are the men that are absolutely responsible for the unsatisfactory conditions that have existed during that

At a recent meeting of the Terminal City Kennel Club (the only club in Vancouver holding regular monthly meetings during the past twelve months) it was moved that the members of the Terminal City Kennel Club support no show, except held under the rules of the Canadian Kennel Club. It carried unanimously.

The best circuit of dog shows ever arranged in British Columbia will be held in September, and all under Canadian Kennel Club rules.

Nanaimo starts the ball rolling with a two-day show, held in conjunction with the Nanaimo Fall Fair on Sep: 16th and 17th. The judge is the wellknown Victoria fancier, Mr. J. S. Hickford.

The fanciers then have a day to get over to Vancouver, where the Terminal City Kennel Club are putting on a oneday only show, which will probably be held in the open. Mr. J. J. Jackson, of Collie fame, will judge all arge breeds. Mr. A. Greenwood, of Jubilee, will judge all Terriers (except Bostons and Toys). _rs. A. G. Halstead of Eburne, will judge English Bulldogs, French Bulldogs and Boston Terriers.

Then the fanciers have till the 23rd to go over to Victoria, where the live club over there are holding a four-day show, in conjunction with the Dominion Exhibition. Mr. E. N. Barker, of Cardstone, Alta., will judge all breeds.

This circuit of shows should appeal to the prairie fanciers, and these clubs would esteem it a favor if the C. K. C. members there will advertise these shows amongst their friends as far as possible.

In conclusion I wish to inform the loyal C. K. C. members that the D. K. C. has not got the hold on British Columbia that they say they have. It is just plain "bluff." Also that C. K. C. members don't have to resort to non de plumes, like the supporters of the D. K. C. do.

His front and bone are of the best, and his coat the proper strong, harsh, wiry texture, lying straight, close and compact. At Mount Royal Show he was still a puppy, but fully developed and full-grown, weighing about 171/2 pounds, and likely to stop at that. He has been very freely used to bitches, both around Toronto and at a distance, and we predict a great improvement in the quality of our Wires by the use of this sure stud.

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
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
