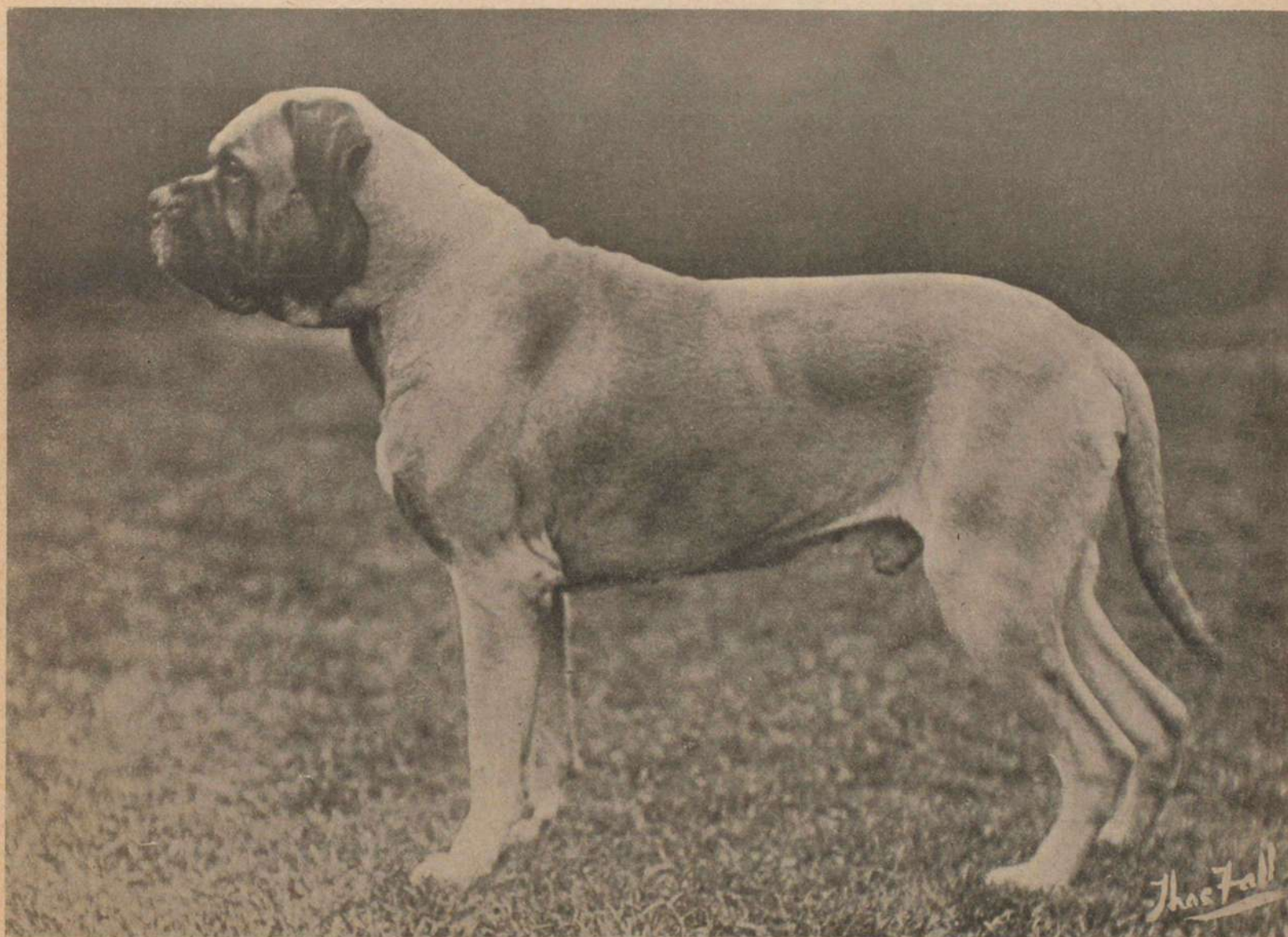

NOTES AND COMMENTS

A rumor was current in Toronto that the proposed Dominion Exhibition, Victoria, B.C., to be held September 21st to September 26th, had been called off. This came as a surprise to us as the Association had been advertising that a sum aggregating over eighty thousand dollars was available for the show. We hope that this dis-arrangement will not affect the other shows in the B. C. circuit.

✕ When we saw that the British Government had, quite rightly, prohibited the shipping of food stuffs of any description, whether for human beings or animals, we began to wonder what our four-footed canine friend would do without his regular Spratts' biscuit. Messrs. F. Hughes & Co., Montreal, who are distributing agents here for Spratts, tell us the difficulty has been overcome by an arrangement which has been entered into with Spratts Patent Ltd., Newark, N.J., who as long as the present disturbing war continues, will take the place of the London house, as far as Canadian shipments are concerned. This means that Messrs. Hughes & Co., will be able to supply their regular trade as usual, but necessarily with some readjustment as to prices.

Some weeks ago our Boston confrere of the American Fancier and Stock-Keeper, accused us of "barking" at Mr. Joe Reid. We can get back at him now for he gives us the information that Mr. "Charlie" Hopton returned, still on crutches, on the Olympic. Even though on crutches we are glad that he is safely back. Fancier is solicitous about some others of our well known dog people, and we can set H. W. L.'s mind at rest as to Mr. Dan Lynn and family, for we spent a couple of hours with the Wire Haired enthusiast in Montreal the day of his return.

Mr. and Mrs. Bert Finch are also safely home and we understand that Mr. George Thomas is just about ready to come back with a string of forty-five.

Mr. Aitken of Montreal, is another across-the-sea traveller who made a safe return, accompanied by five Clydesdale horses, a good Wire bitch and two very special black and tan Dachshund bitches that we mention elsewhere.

The annual meeting of the Canadian Kennel Club is reported elsewhere in this issue. The attendance was rather disappointing and it is surprising how little interest the dozens, yes hundreds, of members of the Club attending the Canadian National Show take in this meeting, the one important meeting of the year. There were twenty-three members present, which can hardly be said to be representative of a membership of nearly five hundred. It is the duty of every member of the Club to take an active and live interest in the affairs of the Canadian Kennel Club and this is not too much to expect.

Our Canadian National report in this issue covers the ground so fully that it leaves little else for us to say. The show was a success in every way and the entry of six hundred and sixty-seven, with six hundred and fifty dogs present, came as a surprise to the management as it must have done to others, considering that the British Empire is in a state of war. The weather was beautifully cool, the show was clean and attractive and as much as possible was done with the old building. There was lots of good straw, it was used freely and benches and aisles were kept clean and tidy. This as a result of having a man of Mr. Arthur Atkinson's experience in complete charge of the outside work. Mr. Fred Jacobi was as efficient as ever and his work was carefully and conscientiously done. Exhibitors should remember that, as a wheel in a piece of machinery, Mr. Jacobi is compelled sometimes to say no to requests for certain privileges where his personal inclination would be to say yes. If this were not so, the slipping of a cog or the stopping of a wheel here and there would tend to disrupt the whole elaborate machinery. This by the way.

If the Canadian National could so arrange matters that the judging could be all completed by the close of the second day, it would be an inestimable blessing to the exhibitors of some breeds, especially those that are nervous, and the white breeds, like Bull Terriers, that require special cleansing and care. Put this under your "thinking cap" Mr. Jacobi. The attendance at the show was excellent though perhaps not up to some former years. We did not hear of many sales being made.

Spratts biscuits were used to feed the show and there was a liberal quantity, so that no "barker" went hungry.

Now for 1915, let us aim for at least seven hundred dogs.

The Rules Committee of the A. K. C. has decided that the matter of cropping is not within the jurisdiction of the Club and that the various specialty clubs must decide it for themselves. The A. K. C. feels that it is not within its powers to change breed standards. The same view was expressed by the A. K. C. in 1906.

Mr. S. C. Taylor, the Secretary-Treasurer of the Winnipeg Kennel Club, informs us that the Winnipeg Kennel Club are sending a carload of ninety dogs to the Thunder Bay Kennel Club Show at Fort William and Port Arthur, September 16th-17th. This is a large consignment and the W. K. C. has been fortunate in securing a regular passenger baggage car for the shipment.

A Marconi tells us that Mr. C. H. Mason was entertained in Montreal en route from St. John, N.B., to London, Ont. Mr. Campbell showed him the hens and the pigs at Macdonald College, and a lot of water running down the St. Lawrence. Mr. Meehan showed

EDMONTON SHOW

The Annual Bench Show held in conjunction with the Edmonton Exhibition proved to be a success from every standpoint. The conduct of the show was left to a Committee from each of the local kennel clubs and the work was well looked after. Frank Mahan makes a good superintendent, while Messrs. May, Clute, Pinchback, Irwin and Nash, cannot be improved upon for ring stewards. Two judges were employed this year, Messrs. Jackson and Griffin, the breeds being evenly divided between them. Two hundred and sixty-six dogs were benched. I was very much impressed with the manner in which Mr. Griffin went through his classes, and it was quite apparent from the ringside as to what he was looking for. It was his first appearance in Canada, but with the increase in numbers of shows in the West, he will no doubt be given plenty to do with the opening of the new season.

The Winnipeg contingent was handled by our old friend J. C. Fletcher, the Calgary being looked after by Bob Thompson. The old veteran, Dan Thody, was there in all his glory, in his white pants, etc. He again led to victory that good bitch Bullacity who again secured the cup for best dog or bitch in the show, reserve going to the good Airedale, Clipstone First Shot, which made old Jack smile. That real good Smooth Fox Terrier, Levenside Levanger, being a good runner up. Bobbie, no doubt, was rather disappointed, but his day is bound to come.

Ch. Mallard Prince was there and again scored in English Setters. What a grand stud dog, this, he should do the fancy some good in this country. It made dad take his hat off when he won.

Bally Water Mike, the Irish Water Spaniel owned by Harry Nash, again won. Pat O'Brien being a good second. What a grand fronted one this! That good Whippet from Winnipeg had a walk over.

Russian Wolfhounds brought together the litter brothers, Ch. Odin of Roseau and Ch. Genest of Roseau. These are the grandest Hounds ever benched in Edmonton. It was hard to say outside which was the best dog, but the judge after careful study, awarded honors to the former. These two Hounds are frequently changing places, so it must have been a very near thing. Yugor stood out in Samoyedes, they were a nice entry and should prove a popular dog in Canada.

The miscellaneous class brought out a new face in Earlsmead Bobby, a Yorkshire Terrier. He is a good all-round little fellow, good fall and color, the shortest of backs, good legs, feet and expression.

Brawny Kim, the Calgary Dandie Dinmont Terrier, came out on top. He is a good all rounder.

Airedales were a large entry and the quality extra. A start was made with puppies, in which Betty Shot won. He is a good long headed pup, good top, legs, feet and coat; second Hackleberry Finn, a sound dog all over, will do better; third Gill Blas, a big, upstanding youngster, great length of head, should make a great stud dog. In open dogs Clipstone First Shot won, well known; second Ellwan Oorang, pressed the winner closely. He is of true Airedale type just a little strong in skull. Airedale bitches limit, saw Clipstone Betty win; second Early Half Shot, nice head, eye and ear, good coat. Ellwan Oorang third, good legs and feet, nice top. Open, first Clipstone Betty; second Venus, nice head, clean in shoulder, fails in

legs and feet; third Peg O' My Heart. Clipstone Betty won winners. Mr. Fletcher won the brace.

Bostons were a fine collection. Mrs. Wheeler cleaned up the principal prizes. They were in fine condition. Major Reno, the light-weight, at last beating that good bitch Ch. Victoria II., in the final specials. I hear that Victoria is to be withdrawn from the show bench and she now claims the privilege of International Champion.

Bulldogs were heavy classes, but no new faces, and the judge upsetting previous decisions.

American Bull Terriers were large classes and were fine specimens and required a lot of sorting.

Chesapeake Bay dogs saw a new young dog in Chesdale Ginger, a good allround specimen, good coat, color, head, eye and ear, pressed the Champion Chesdale Baby closely for winners.

Collies, puppies saw Rattling Mac win, a fine young dog in rather bad condition. He was followed very closely by Jack, a pup of good all round quality. Otterburn Dearest came up into second place in novice. Open dogs saw the Winnipeg dog Ch. Braemar Bonds Boy an easy first. In open bitches Imera Whyzetta, the Winnipeg bitch romped home.

Dalmatians saw Tootsie win, with Gyp an easy second. Toy Spaniels were small classes.

Fox Terriers, Smooth, puppies, Sandy Short Stock, a pleasing puppy, good head, eye, ear and front, with nice legs and feet; second Punch, a nice pleasing little Terrier which should make up into a nice one; third Queenie, not quite ready, will do better. Novice were repeats. Limit dogs saw Broker Boy win. He is the size, and is well balanced. Open dogs, Levenside Levenger. This dog, in my estimation, will make history in Canada, he is all a Terrier with an exceptional length of head of beautiful shape, with the true Terrier eye, ear and expression, sound in front and boned to the ground, very short back, extra hard coat and strong hind quarters. I make him a sterling Terrier. Second, a nice desirable little dog, loses to winners in legs and feet. Open bitches saw a brace of nice ones hard to find fault with. Wires, only two entries, the dog Dunkirk Gamester winning.

Greyhounds, Nigger went through his classes, a fine upstanding young dog; Rataplant taking second place.

Great Danes, an entry of three. Venus III won, a Harlequin, on small side. Newfoundland, Calgary Prince, the only entry, a black, of nice type and expression.

Old English Sheepdogs, Scona Rags won in puppies, but was beaten in limit and open by Seathone Monarch, both nice dogs but out of coat, the bitch, Seathone Lassie winning in limit and open bitches.

Pointers, Mr. Esdale of Edmonton, came out on top in limit with Edmonton's Best. He is a real nice young dog and is a credit to his breeder. I predict a great future for this youngster. In open dogs he took second place to Crusoe, another local dog of great merit. Limit bitches saw Judy on top, a light weight bitch of especial merit, she is lovely in head, neck, front, legs and feet, with a nice body; second Helen, a nice quality bitch, but shown much too fat. Flossie came into second place in open, with Judy leading. Mr. Hunt won the brace.

Pomeranians were not numerous. In White, Little White Teddie won, a good allround specimen, afterwards

taking winners in White. Black puppies, Eastwood Jackie won, he is sound in color; second Little Wonder, is compact, loses to winner in coat. San Toy won in limit and open dogs, he is all a Pom, and in nice coat. A. O. C. puppies saw Snookum win, a nice taking youngster, will do better when in coat. Maycliffe Gold Place won in open and limit, a very nice little fellow, short of coat. He has a nice foxey face, small ears, short back and nice fine bone, he afterwards won winners. Delton Model second, a nice dog and put down in lovely bloom.

Poodles were fair with three entries, the Winnipeg Corded winning, a fine active dog, built on capital lines. Curly Rado won with Flossie a White Toy of merit, second.

Retrievers, curly, a nice entry. Puppies, three of the same litter faced the judge. Lassie won, nice head, body and coat, body not over good in coat yet. Strathcona Bess and Strathcona Sambo followed, not so good as winner in coat. Novice, Lassie again won with Buller second and Strathcona Prince third. In open and limit, Beechgrove Rock won, a fine upstanding liver dog, long head, nice eye, good in feet and body and fine in tail carriage and curl; second Niger, is also good everywhere, but loses to winner in neck and shoulders; third, thick in head, light in eye and bad tail carriage. The others were altogether wrong in expression and coat. Open bitches, Beechgrove Ruby, nice bitch but snipy, others were repeats. Retrievers, flat, limit, Attingham Ted won, a most lovely type of dog, on the small side, but the best shoulders, legs, feet and front possible. Open dogs saw Ch. Mallard in front, he beat the winner only on size and length of head. Limit and open bitches, Miss Jean was the only entry, a nice allround specimen.

Scottish Terriers, novice dogs and bitches, first Craignair, a nice stylish youngster, good in coat, color, head, ear and tail; second Lassie, nice little bitch, but as yet unfinished; third Scottie II., slightly long in back. Open dogs saw Ch. Albertay Emigrant in front, a true Scottie, excellent head, eye, ear, front and body, with good stern; second and third previously reviewed. Open bitches, first Lassie, with Craignair Lass following on.

English Setters started with puppies, Woodland Boy won, a big raking youngster, on racing lines, good head, coat and color, if he goes on right should make a good one; second nice type, out in shoulders, third Blondie, pleasing head but too young. Novice, King Pilot won, a good youngster, real nice head, of good length, with the nice desirable expression. Tinjik Magnet and Tinjik Slad, from the same kennel, followed, two real nice Setters. Tinjik Rex won in limit, a fine young dog, he is good in color, head, legs, feet and body. Tinjik Magnet pressed him very close; third, Woodlands Boy, the winning pup. Open dogs, nine lined up, they were a grand

bunch of dogs and were a credit to the show, any one of them a man need well be proud of. The well known Golden Rule won, a real nice one, out of coat and not in the best condition; second Lenox Prince, pressed the winner close, is well known. Tinjik Rex came third. Golden Rule took winners. Limit bitches, Dot was a nice winner, she has nice body, coat, legs and feet, good neck, tail and action, but slightly plain in head; second Lenox Patsey, a Setter all over, loses to winner in front and bone; third Blue, a nice type, this should breed a good one, rather plain in skull. Open bitches, Victoria won, well known, shown heavy in pup; second Dot and Lenox Patsy following. Victoria came in for winners.

Irish Setters, novice, Sheeny first, a nice young dog, good color, good shaped head, of nice action; second June Rose, a real nice little bitch, showing age; third Queen, nice stylish bitch, plain in head. Limit dogs, first Killarny Tim, a nice Irishman, out of coat; second Athboy, not quite as good in color as winner, but a near thing; third Sheeny. Limit bitches, Auburn Beauty won, a nice evenly balanced bitch. June Rose followed; Queen third. Auburn Beauty took winners. Capt. Clifford won the brace.

Gordon Setters, Ulster Jack won, and afterwards went through his classes and captured winners, should make up into a very nice one; second Sunny, good coat, color, loses to winner in bone. Skye Terrier, one entry, Crescent Surprise won, he is long, low and level, good coat and action.

Cockers, black, Jet won, very nice coat, short back, fair head and front; second Rex, very much like winner not quite as good in front; third Rover, curly in coat. Novice, repeats. Limit, Major Oak I., a true Cocker, very short back, good bone, front and feet, he has the desired Cocker head. Abo second, another good one, not quite as good in foreface as winner. Jet won in limit and open. Cockers, red, 1st, Dyantha won, good in color, short in back, nice head, skull and feet; third Juno, another nice one. Novice, first Young Victor, a classy dog, hard to find fault with; second Juno, pushed the winner close. Limit, 1st, Boston Victor won in this and open dogs, he is very classy, of the right type, true in front and good skull, with the correct placement of ears; second Creska Red Michael, is also a nice dog, of good type, he has an exceptional length of foreface but not quite the thing in skull. Boston Victor won in winners. Dyantha won in open bitches, previously reviewed. Alberta Rose second, a nice cobby bitch, good color and style. Dyantha took winners. Cockers, any other color, first Sylvia, she went through her classes to winners. She is a nice corky black and white, good head, eye, ear and body; second Lady May, fails to winner in length of back.

One hundred and sixty-eight special prizes were given in open classes, consisting of large silver cups, kit bags, gold medals, etc.

CANADIAN KENNEL CLUB ANNUAL MEETING

August 9th, 1914

The annual meeting of the Canadian Kennel Club called for eight p.m., was opened at eight-thirty, Mr. James W. Bain, K.C., on motion, taking the chair in the absence of the President. Twenty-three members were present, including two ladies. The minutes of the last annual meeting were read and adopted.

Notice of motion to increase the number of the Executive from twelve to fifteen, had been made by Mr. Bain, who gave as his reason for the change, that the Executive was so distributed, that with twelve members only it might frequently be unable to get a quorum and that the object was to avoid this by increasing the Toronto

members of the Executive. Mr. Bain's motion was seconded by Mr. Bawden, and carried.

The Secretary-Treasurer's report, perhaps not quite correctly headed "Annual Report of the Canadian Kennel Club, Incorporated for 1914," as the report covers eleven months, ending July 31st, 1914, was then read. It showed the membership of the Club to be four hundred and eighty-three, a very substantial gain over last year's membership of three hundred and eighty-seven. The number of dogs registered during the eleven months was nine hundred and fourteen.

The report was optimistic about the future and prophesied greater things for the coming year.

The cropping question, now before the American Kennel Club was brought before the meeting by the reading of a letter to the Club from the Toronto Humane Society. Mr. John Miles spoke strongly in favor of cropping, as did Mr. McLean, the Black and Tan breeder, the latter making the statement that Mr. James Mortimer told him that the American Kennel Club would surely turn it down. Mr. Miles moved, seconded by Mr. Sid Perkins, that a committee of five be appointed by the Chairman to confer with the Humane Society and report to the Executive. This motion was put and carried.

A letter was read from the Manitoba Advisory Board, outlining a basis of agreement between the Advisory Board and the parent body. After considerable discussion it was thought that this was too important to pass without mature consideration and without reference to the Hon. Solicitor of the Club, so that the authority of the Canadian Kennel Club would not be reduced or delegated to any branch body or committee. It was finally, on motion of Mr. Donovan, supported by Mr. McLean, referred to the Executive Committee, who were given power to act.

At this point the chairman named the following gentlemen, Mr. Barron, Mr. Miles, Mr. McFarland, Mr. Joe Perkins and Mr. Dickenson as the committee to confer with the Humane Society, Mr. Barron to act as chairman of the committee.

Mr. Miles spoke strenuously in favor of having the puppy rule restored, whereby puppies winning in limit or open class be retained at the show where exhibited until the close of that show, and gave notice of motion to this effect. This will be voted upon at the next general meeting of the Club.

On motion, Sealyham Terriers were added to the list of recognized breeds, and dated back to September 1st, 1914, so that any wins made at the Canadian National Exhibition and other shows might receive recognition.

The everlasting complaint about the Canadian National Dog Show building was the cause of a good deal of adverse criticism, and the two representatives of the Canadian National Board were given power to add to their number and were requested to interview the Canadian National Exhibition authorities as to the erection of a new, or renovation of the old building, the providing of proper exercising rings and sanitary accommodation, and to report to the Canadian Kennel Club Executive inside of two months.

Mr. G. F. McFarland was re-elected Hon. Solicitor and Dr. J. A. Campbell, V.S., Hon. Veterinarian.

It was thought that the Club had reached such proportions that a chartered firm of accountants and auditors should be employed to audit the books, and on motion of Messrs. Donovan and Bingham, Messrs. Clarkson, Gordon and Dilworth were appointed.

Mr. J. W. Bain and Mr. G. F. McFarland were elected representatives to the Canadian National Exhibition.

The Chairman introduced the subject of the Club subscribing to some of the existing funds for the alleviation of distress caused by the war in which the British Empire is engaged. After a very full discussion it was decided, on motion of Mr. Bawden, seconded by Mr. Bingham, that the members of the Club be circularized for subscriptions to a fund of this kind and a list was immediately opened and met with a ready response from several members. There is no need to confine this to C. K. C. members and we hope that every member of the Club will take a personal interest in the subscription and send to the Secretary-Treasurer, not alone his own subscription but that of others whom he may be able to influence in joining. One hundred dollars was one amount mentioned. Why not aim at five hundred?

Cockers made quite a good little lot, Collies were down, in fact in the ladies' division there was but one. Haymarket Patricia was winners in Bull Terriers. Rockley Military Man won for Mr. Perkins in Airedale dogs, and the same owner's Rockley Paragon had an easy victory in bitches.

Bostons a big class that we must leave for next month. Rocksand, that we had at Toronto, won in Smooth Fox Terrier dogs. Walnut Regalia beat Resurrection in Wire dogs. There were only the two. Ch. Dundee Princess was the best Pug. The Pom entry was heavy, Little Snitch was winners dogs, with Sir Bruce reserve. Cheeky Little Nipper was reserve winners in bitches.

THE A. K. C. REFUSE TO INTERFERE IN THE CROPPING QUESTION.

The New York Herald of Sept. 15th says: "The American Kennel Club at its quarterly meeting yesterday declined to adopt a rule that would abolish the practice of cropping dogs' ears. As the Club is the controlling influence in all bench shows throughout the country and prescribes the rules which govern them, the turning down of the proposal yesterday is interpreted as meaning that the delegates believe that cropping of ears is proper or advisable.

Advocates of the proposed new rule, which would prohibit the exhibition of dogs with cropped ears, were greatly disappointed by the action of the delegates. The amendment was ordered laid on the table, equivalent to defeating it, and no vote was taken that would place the individual delegates on record. Unofficially it was announced at the meeting that there would be no further discussion of the matter.

The proposed amendment reads:—'No dog born on or after January 1st, 1915, whose ears have been cropped shall be eligible for competition at shows held under these rules.'

Twenty delegates attended the meeting and so strong was their opposition to the amendment that had a vote been taken the advocates of cropping would have won easily."

"Jack" Fletcher left on Friday last for Vancouver show. Arrangements had been made for a stop over at Calgary to take on the Calgary dogs and for a rest. He had forty-three Winnipeg dogs, and Calgary has asked to have space reserved for at least ten, so that he should arrive in Vancouver with over fifty. The trip is a long one and it was agreed to limit the number to fifty, in order that a larger ring than is usually allowed in the car, could be made for exercising purposes. Wire partitions (similar to those used in benching) were placed in the car, and owners were given the privilege of using the compartments thus formed, or crates.

Unfortunately, the Field Trials of the Western Canada will be held at the same time as this show, so that it was impossible to send any Pointers or Setters. Word was received here from Vancouver, before the closing of entries, that they expected about two hundred and forty dogs to be benched. Robert Thompson, of Calgary, judges all classes.

Fort William and Port Arthur are giving a show Sept. 15th to 18th, under C. K. C. Rules. It is not a question of rules with them but as one of their officials writes, "As far as we are concerned the one that gives us the most dogs is the one we want." Geo. Kynoch promised them 65 dogs, but the Winnipeg Kennel Club are credited with coming through with a guarantee of 100, and this settled the auction. This is "some dog." By the way, I am informed that the listing fees collected at the show of a year ago, were never paid over to the Dominion Kennel Club.

The Fort Garry Horse left for Valcartier on Sunday, August 30th. The City turned out in force to see them march to the train. The company of "disqualifieds" were particularly noticeable. Headed by the "Bulldog King," J. J. Adams, with a Bulldog for a mascot, then followed "Tommy" Rosche, "Freddie" Gates, "Jack" Cooke, and J. Samson. "Scottie" Kynoch was itching to go also, and I think if someone had volunteered to look after his boarding kennels, he would have been away with the others. The "Bulldog King" has agreed to put on a show when he gets to the Continent, and Jack Fletcher has promised to bring him a car of dogs. Be careful Jack, it should be beneath the dignity of any kennel club to guarantee a show any number of dogs.

There was a time when a win at Darlington counted something, in fact the dog which could get in the money at this popular north country fixture was looked on as much above the average, but times have changed and while we look back with pleasure on the Darlington days because they were happy ones, we regret to say the competition has gone, the dog show is nothing like what it used to be, but it looks to us that Hexham is to take the place of the good old Quaker City. It was our privilege to visit the Valley of the Tyne on Bank Holiday and while many, owing to the declaration of war, were not in the frame of mind for sport, crowds were en route for the quaint, old world town of Hexham, and great was the competition to witness. The Labradors were a sight worth looking at, while Terriers, specially Fox Terriers and Airedales, were very good.

Scotland's best young dog in Airedales, crossed the border but had to give place to Nevelles Double, a very much improved dog and he certainly had the best of Rosebank Squire, who does not own the substance of the winner but is a beautiful quality dog. We saw him at Kelso where he headed a large variety class under Mr. Midgley Marsden.

Hexham is the meeting place for many North of England sporting men and we usually rub against many of the best of the old school.

Mr. Edward Dent, the trainer of the great Greyhound, Fullerton, was looking on. He is a smart man at his age. It was he who trained all Colonel

North's successful Hounds, winning the Waterloo twice and was once the runner up with Fullerton, the dog of all times.

Speaking of Greyhounds, we had a shake of the hand from Mr. Jim Dodd of the Coach and Horses, who was busy on the Border Terrier section.

A great attraction at this gathering was the Sheepdog trials. Mr. Isaac Herdmen conquered with Tyne, a typical trialer. Other competitors were the Telfords, Wallace, and many from the North Country. Sheepdog trials continue to grow in popularity.

We visited Laugholm, our native village, on the common riding day and met with many dog fanciers. Mr. John Beattie the trainer of two Waterloo winners, Long Span and Jabberwak, was there. Mr. Archie Kennedy of Klip River fame was competing in the saddle, and pulled off two events, but what pleased us most was to rise at day-break and walk out to the top of the hill and view the best Hound trail we can remember looking on. The morning was cool, the scent was good and the position from which we witnessed the band of runners was the best, so much so that we could see the dogs for miles going out, crossing the stream, then along the hillside and on the homeward journey. The Hound from over the border belonging to Mr. Grant, M.P., for the Egermont Division of Cumberland, was the fastest and made a brilliant finish and looked so fit that he could have gone the journey over again. CANADIAN NATIONAL EXHIBITION

Six hundred and fifty dogs present. Winners value five points

Mastiffs had three. Far the best in skull, face, eye and type is Hertford Nancy, the winner. Carnoustie Lion is light in eye and weak in foreface, while Prince is a plain looking red one. We were glad to see some signs of revival in this noble old breed.

St. Bernards were not large classes but there were several good ones including Mr. Stuart's new Smooth, White Eagle, the puppy winner, as his name denotes, is almost white in color, with a fair skull and bone. He was well beaten in the novice class by the grand smooth, Claverhouse. He is of good type, with typical head, plenty of substance and true St. Bernard expression. Thanksgiving, winner in junior bitches, is a big one, with good head and expression, and beat her only opponent in this class with some ease. The winner in novice bitches, Hellgate Isabella, is a bitch of good size, excellent head and expression, good bone, and wins well here. Lady Dufferin was second. Silver Bell, a fair one, third. The splendid headed Alta the King, was best of the dogs, White Eagle being the runner up for winners. Lady Dufferin is a fair St. Bernard, immature yet and with a gay tail.

Bloodhounds are coming along. There were six entries with five exhibitors. Dr. Russell is the best in type, size, head and wrinkle, and about the same remarks apply to his kennel mate Queen R.

In Newfoundlands there was nothing to beat Earl of Suffolk in type, coat and head. It should be remembered that immensity is not characteristic of the Newfoundland. Black Bess is a very fair one, a black with white points. She is a bit light in eye and low in skull. Ch. Rover carries plenty of coat.

Great Danes made an excellent showing. The now well known Harlequin, Ch. Geneva, looking very fit, went to the head of the lady division. Zebra of Sudbury is a dark Harlequin, with an immense, but not too classical head. Adrain, second, is a dark brindle, full of type, with pleasing head. Niagara Queen, a golden brindle and a quality one, good type, clean skull and neck, stands well on good pins. Lady Minto second, is a quality brindle of size. Leonine unfortunately was not at home when we called at his bench, so that we did not see him.

Five Russian Wolfhounds with Ramsden Aviator at the front. An upstanding Hound, good in chest with a fair coat and long lean head, with Borzoi expression. Sophia, runner up is beaten in front and coat, quite a nice headed one. Betty, a nice type, but a bit cheeky. Rover was poorly shown and is light in eye, but not a bad one.

In Greyhounds the Lewis team had it pretty well their own way, with Lansdowne Deodora Fleetfoot, Lansdowne Miss Glendyne, Lansdowne Treyew Blue Bonnet, and Ch. Lansdowne Butcher Boy. Mr. Coulter, as he always does, supported the show with two, Prince, second, a moderate black with a light eye, and his well known Queenie.

Smooth Fox Terriers were not the classes of years ago. Puppy dogs introduced us to Sandbar and Rocksand shown by Mr. Newton, both by Clapton Varnisher and very fair puppies, dark headed like their sire. Rocksand, the winner, has the best of it in head and face. Varnisher was made the best dog, a trappy Terrier, whose shoulders

are gone, and he was shown in wretched coat. Sabine Radical, second to him in limit, is nice in head and eye. Quite a good Terrier with a long foreface. Broadway Dona, third, a nice sized Terrier with a good dark eye, shown a bit thin. Rolleston Defacer, a tan headed dog of fair type. In open, Sabine Ringgold, well known, was second to Varnisher. Sabine Radical coming third. There was not an awful lot to beat in the bitches. We made Winsome Jess, who took reserve winners, better in head points than the winner. She is quite a good Terrier, but a bit off the ground. Danby Blue Bud is quite a sweet little Terrier, with a nice short back, and is of nice size. Sabine Filme a nice Terrier of quality, rather spoiled by a light eye. Sabine Fashionist, a sterling Terrier, a bit over sized.

When we come to the Wires we jump right into quality. All around they were far ahead of the Smooths, and they have been going this way for some years. There were exactly 33, and not a really bad one in the lot. The winning dog was picked in Mr. G. W. Quintard's Ridgeway Corker, a grand type of a Terrier and a great shower. He has a nice short back, great bone and very decent front, with a splendid foreface, not perfect in shoulder. He is a Terrier that should be an immense amount of good to the breed. His mouth is perfectly even, but he is not an attractive color, if this counts for anything, and carries his tail a bit gay. He is all Terrier through and through. Mrs. Frothingham's Ridgeway Speed Limit, runner up, is a stylish short backed Terrier, with a good dark eye and nice expression. Well beaten by the winner. Milton Magpie the puppy winner is a most attractive dog, well set up on good pins, nice short back, good front, excellent head and foreface, and a splendid shower, he is a dark colored one and was shown with a bit too much coat, and this coat perhaps a bit over groomed, a very attractive dog all through. Second went to Ingleby Arndcliffe, that we saw from the ringside only, as he was not on his bench when we went to make further acquaintance with him, a very attractive, good all round Terrier. Donington Resurrection third, of good sturdy type, has plenty of bone, good skull, long in foreface, just a bit light in eye, a nice type of dog shown short of coat. Novice dogs was won by Ingleby Arndcliffe, a stylish Terrier; second, Regal Result; third, Donington Resurrection. Limit dogs saw Ridgeway Corker to the front, followed by Ridgeway Speed Limit, and these positions they kept to the end. Walnut Regalia, with his beautiful top, was third. Reserve going to Milton Magpie. In open dogs it was Ridgeway Corker, Walnut Regalia, Ch. Hawes Broom, in none too good coat condition, and Milton Magpie. In limit dogs Ridgeway Speed Limit won; Walnut Regalia, second; Milton Magpie, third; Donington Resurrection reserve. Our award list shows the position of the others. The bitches were not nearly as good as the dogs, Mr. Quintard's Cromwell Cheeky taking winners. This lady has a temper of her own and it is none of the best. She is a nice sized one, full of fire, good coat, front and bone, with excellent skull and foreface, a varminty Terrier. Maid O' Mist reserve winners, quite a nice Terrier all through. Leeds Waltz Dream is a harsh coated white bitch, good face, nice dark eye, and has plenty of bone. Mr. Atkinson showed a very decent one in Oxspring Pickle, and Regal

Dolly, shown by Mr. Short, and Oxspring Pearl, shown by Miss Maud Atkinson, are nice ones.

Mr. Offerman, who took the place of Mr. Walter Glynn, the latter being unable to leave England owing to the present trouble, is an acquisition to our judging ranks, and impressed us with the coolness with which he handled the dogs that came before him. In Airedales he evidently went for the smaller specimens. Possibly he found the most quality there. In one or two cases we think he passed hind quarters that were not according to Hoyle, and we did not—and we watched him closely—notice him examine very many of the mouths of the Terriers that were brought in. Little criticism can be found with his judging, apart from that difference of opinion that must always exist, and this is not necessarily criticism. We hope to see Mr. Offerman with us again in a like capacity.

We wish we could say nice things of the Irish Terriers, but really they appear to be going from bad to worse. The breed this year was saved by the beautiful bitch taking winners, Clover Hill Nooudden, a splendid headed one, very clean skull, nice foreface. She carries a coat of good texture, which she is at present dropping. Has plenty of bone, full of type, and a good dark eye. Jonesboro Pat has a good hard jacket, a nice Terrier with a dark eye, and with an unbalanced headpiece, being wide in skull and pinched in muzzle. The runner up, Carnlough Caesar, is better in skull, foreface and ears, quite a good Terrier, casting his coat, which does not improve him. Carnlough Patrick, a good hard-coated Terrier. Carnlough Polyanna, a nice all-round Irish Terrier.

That no better choice of judge could possibly have been made than Mr. Theo Offerman, of New York, was conclusively proved by the number of dogs entered, which topped all previous records. The ability of Mr. Offerman cannot be questioned, and his placings should go far towards assisting the fancy in their aims and objects.

Big fat dogs, with big heads, big feet, and shoulders like a bullock, were not the order of the day, but dogs of sterling Terrier qualities, where weight did not reach fifty pounds.

It is greatly to be hoped that the lesson will have been well learned, and that it will be the means of a general improvement.

Mr. C. F. Neilson is to be congratulated on having two such sterling Terriers as Rosecroft Red Feather and Rosecroft Research, who carried all before them, the former going through to winners, also winning the A. T. C. of C. challenge trophy.

Mr. Sid Perkins, as usual, was in the running, and carried off no less than four firsts and winners with Rockley Paragon, a bitch of great merit who happened to be in full coat but who could not be denied.

Mr. H. North, of Hamilton, who with Adam Bede followed close on the heels of R. Research, is a fancier we shall hear from again.

Others there were who happened to be caught most inopportune, their dogs being past full bloom, particularly Mr. G. F. Smith, who would undoubtedly have done better with Betty Briar.

A start was made promptly at one o'clock, with puppy dogs, Buster, Caesar and Rockley Military Man being placed in the order named, with Rugged Iron Duke, the runner-up, a very promising puppy who gave a lot away in age.

Junior dogs found Rosecroft Red Feather the winner, a capital Terrier with the best of coats, lovely color, grand legs and feet, a keen dark eye, and who could move like a Terrier. Second, Adam Bede, a good sort, wants more quality. 3rd, Buster.

Novice dogs, 1st Rosecroft Research too good for this class, albeit not in the best of coats and a shade light in eye, but who still had a margin to spare. 2nd, Adam Bede. 3rd, Lambton Boy, a quality one, but too high on the leg, and much too short of coat.

Limit dogs, Rosecroft Red Feather, Rosecroft Research. 3rd Watlands Marksman, a long way behind, might have given away to Military Man.

Open dogs, 1st, Rosecroft Red Feather. 2nd, Rosecroft Research. 3rd, Adam Bede.

Breeders dogs and bitches, 1st, Rosecroft Red Feather. 2nd, Rosecroft Research. 3rd, Rockley Military Maid.

Canadian bred dogs, 1st, Adam Bede, an easy win. 2nd, Moorside Bonsor, a big one, good length of head, altogether too heavy in shoulder, a poor mover and a bad shower. 3rd, Rugged Mr. Bub, a good bodied dog, lacking in head qualities and very light in eye.

Winners, Rosecroft Red Feather. Reserve, Rosecroft Research.

Puppy bitches, 1st, Rockley Paragon, a nice bitch, good head and ear carriage, dark eye with the right sort of expression, a splendid mover and very game. 2nd, Morning Fascination, a good stamp of bitch, with size and substance, failing to winner in quality. 3rd, Midland Patricia, good color and coat, but altogether too light. Junior bitches, repeat.

Novice bitches, 1st, Militant Maid, a good young one who should greatly improve with age. 2nd, Budge, a fair sort with nothing to beat. 3rd, Midland Patricia. Limit bitches, 1st, Rockley Paragon. 2nd, Morning Fascination. 3rd, Budge. Open bitches, 1st, Rockley Paragon. 2nd, Morning Fascination. 3rd, Swale Lady, a good old has-been, now showing age. Winners, Rockley Paragon. Reserve, Morning Fascination.

The Airedales taken altogether were a good showing, both in numbers and quality, over previous years, the young stuff especially of an improved sort which bids fair for some keen competition at future shows.

Irish Water Spaniels had only two entries, 1st Midkiff Nora, a good specimen; 2nd, too much like a Cocker.

Field Spaniels, with three entries, brought out two fair ones but shown in poor condition; 3rd, lacked type.

Cockers, three puppy dogs, 1st, Crescent Sun Guide, a fair specimen, will improve with age; 2nd, Walden Black Beauty just fair; 3rd, Kruger. Novice dogs, black, 1st, Calmo Bingo, good in front, slightly plain in head; 2nd, Turk, could have a better front, lacks type; 3rd, Midkiff Romeo, coarse in head, very plain. Limit dogs, black, 1st, Obo Henry, a grand body but shown in bad coat, slightly coarse; 2nd, Calmo Bingo; 3rd, Turk. Open dogs, black, 1st, Midkiff Kermit, well known by reason of his wins at New York; 2nd, Obo Henry; 3rd, Durbar, a grand headed dog but out at elbow and shown much too light in flesh. Novice dogs, red, 1st, Paddy B.; 2nd, Buster; 3rd, Kruger. Just a moderate lot. Limit and open, red, 1st, Calmo Blanko, long in body, just a fair dog; 2nd, Brookdale Toby, not just a show type; 3rd, Paddy B. Novice dogs, parti-color, 1st, Master Brandy, a good headed dog, doesn't show well. Limit, 2nd, Lucky Deever, nice type dog, but off in shoulders, slack behind; 3rd, Crescent Sun Guide. Limit dogs, 1st, Master Brandy; 2nd, Lucky Deever; 3rd, Braeclough Pacand, very flat in rib, toes in badly, plain all over. Open parti dogs, 1st, Midkiff Rex, this is a nice fronted dog and a good specimen all over, shown in beautiful condition; 2nd, Lucky Deever; 3rd, Wentworth Billy, just fair, not improving with age. Puppy bitches, 1st, Calmo Tango, nice body but off in front; 2nd, Crescent Ladema, should improve with age; 3rd, Betty, a nice front also nice body and good shoulders. This will make a good one with age, but too young yet.

Novice bitches, black, 1st, Midkiff Madam Melba, a nice headed and typical bitch, good mover; 2nd, Calmo Tango. Limit bitches, black, 1st, Madam Melba; 2nd, Calmo Tango; 3rd, Lady Flossie II., very bad in shoulders and behind. Open bitches, black, 1st, Now or Never, well known all over the continent, with a perfect front and shoulders, nice body; 2nd, Madam Melba; 3rd, Calmo Tango. Novice bitches, red, 1st, Midkiff Valma, a beautiful head for a red and a grand mover; 2nd, Crescent Bonita, light in bone and plain; 3rd, Rosebud II., off in shoulders. Limit and open bitches, red, 1st, Midkiff Valma; 2nd, Oakley Red Rose, good fronted but lacks type; 3rd, Crescent Bonita. Novice parti, 1st, Midkiff Mazda, a fair specimen, will improve as she develops; 2nd, Crescent Ladema; 3rd, Golden Sally, just fair. Limit bitches, parti, 1st, Mepals Clarita, won all the way; 2nd, Midkiff Mazda; 3rd, Golden Buttercup. Open, parti, 1st, Mepals Clarita; 2nd, Lansdowne Debutante, a good one, not in the best condition, had to give way to first in front, shoulders and type; 3rd, Midkiff Mazda.

AMERICAN FOXHOUNDS.

The exhibit was a good one, a number were very superior. The awards, with possibly two exceptions, seemed right. W. C. Baldwin's entries were of good type, as also that of A. Hergoth, a very sorry lot. Lucy, winner of 1st in her classes, is deserving of special mention, a wonderfully good bitch, with a bit more size there could hardly any fault be found with her. She is attractive in head, has good shoulders and chest. Dandy, a good one also, is strong in forearm, with a body in every feature all that could be desired, loin and quarter excellent, legs and feet good. Pattern, 2nd, loses to the winner in head. W. J. Archibald's pair of Hounds, particularly the bitch Fly, a big rangy bitch, good in body, legs and feet, with a nice clean head. Should have been placed. Puppy dogs and bitches, 1st, Baldwin's Gaiety, he is attractive in head, has good shoulders and chest,

is strong in forearm, with a body in every feature all that could be desired; 2nd, same owner, Hobo, loses to winner in head and body; 3rd, Fannie II, she is fair in head and expression, a little thick in shoulders. Junior dogs and bitches, 1st, Lucy, described above, wins over Gaiety in head, coat and body; 3rd, Hobo; 4th, Fannie II. Novice dogs, 1st, Dandy; 2nd, Hobo; 3rd, Bally; a good Hound, wins over Colonel, 4th, in head and coat. Limit dogs, 1st, Dandy; 2nd, Baldwin's Pattern, excellent in body, well ribbed, good legs and feet, was only beaten in length and depth of muzzle; 3rd, Hobo; 4th, Bally. Novice bitches, 1st, Lucy, a good one, beats Gaiety, 2nd, another good one too but she loses to Lucy in head and substance; 3rd, Fannie II., loses to winner in body. Limit bitches, 1st, Lucy; 2nd, Baldwin's Gaiety; 3rd, Baldwin's Gibson Girl, she stands on good legs and feet and is of same type as Gaiety; 4th, Wanda. Open bitches, 1st, Lucy; 2nd, Gaiety; 3rd, Gibson Girl; 4th, Wanda.

The Beagle classes were of good quality and fairly large in numbers. Puppy dogs, two entries, both owned by the Messrs. Smith of Guelph, Prompter winning. I liked Pirate on account of evenness of head and good body. Novice dogs, 1st, Pioneer, a well put up little Hound but inclined to be skully; 2nd, Warner, another grand bodied one; 3rd, Buddie O'D. Limit dogs and bitches (not exceeding 13 inches), 1st, Bugle, one of the old brigade, good all over and all round in appearances, but beginning to age; 2nd, Patience, nice in head and body; 3rd, Wee Gipsie, a grand headed little Hound. Limit dogs (over 13 and not exceeding 15 inches), 1st, Lansdowne Benedict, Ben Lewis' entry, a grand Hound, beautiful houndy head, clean in skull, of nice length and fairly good muzzle, nice attractive color and good coat; 2nd, Pioneer; 3rd, Warner. Open dogs, 1st, Lansdowne Benedict; 2nd, Bugle; 3rd, Smithfield Pioneer; 4th, Smithfield Warner. Breeders' dogs and bitches, 1st, Meddlesome, grand head, good body, an attractive Hound and entitled to her win, beats Smithfield Pioneer, who was 2nd, in head; 3rd, Smithfield Petite, a fair Hound. Puppy bitches, 1st, Meddlesome; 2nd, Smithfield Patience. Novice bitches, 1st, Meddlesome; 2nd, Wee Gipsie. Limit bitches (over 13 and not exceeding 15 inches), 1st, Queen O'Trumps, one of the best Beagles in America, a beautifully headed, sweet faced Hound that is so attractive to a fancier, clean neck on a good pair of shoulders, with a good running gear, hard to fault; 2nd, Lansdowne Ransom, another good one who has been defeated before by Queen O'Trumps under Mortimer. Ransom loses in head to the winner; 3rd, Lady Primus, a fair one who loses to both in body, bone and head. Open bitches, 1st, Queen O'Trumps; 2nd, Lansdowne Ransom; 3rd, Lansdowne Ruby, not quite as clean in head as the others; 4th, Meddlesome, loses in size. These were four grand Hounds, any one of them almost deserving of first prize, and were a treat to see.

Pointers were rather disappointing and did not contain much of merit outside of possibly four or five specimens. There were two entire in novice dogs and bitches, neither out of the ordinary, Midkiff Lilas better in eye and muzzle and finer in head than Dolly Dollars. Bob White Maxims Dan, the winning dog, came out in the limit under 55 lbs. He is a good one, bit heavy in skull, stands on good legs and feet, nice back. Second Midkiff Malt is a nice bodied

one shy in muzzle and light in eye. Third, Bob White Prairie, a fair one. Bob White Pam was first in limit over 55 lbs., a nice headed one, good in muzzle; second, Midkiff Rex, out in front, heavy ear and skull. Second in open was Bob White Rifle, a nice headed one. In bitches, Mallwyd Florence the winner, a nice one, good in head. The reserve winner, Lansdowne Prim is a clean shouldered one, nice in head.

English Setters, like the Pointers, had a handful that stood out of the rest, were if anything below the average. Glencho Indicator was alone in the puppy, he lacks depth of muzzle, a fair one, wants age. In junior dogs and bitches the three winners were all of the same stamp and of but fair quality, lacking in muzzles and light eyes. Bob White Montecello Fly was the winning novice dog, a very fair one, but thick in skull. Lansdowne Ruler was the winning dog, a nice muzzled, good one. The reserve winner was London V., a nice one, light eye, but very fair head. Pride of Rockland was the winning bitch a nice one in head; with Bob White Queen reserve.

Irish Setters were a good class. Buster Law, first puppy dog, is a nice one, wants age and condition, not quite right in hind legs and heavy in ear. Second, Erin's Paddy is young. Lansdowne Noreen, first junior, a nice bodied one, bit heavy in skull and light eye. Third, Erin's Jeane, a very fair one, not of good color. In novice dogs Reddle Ranger was first, needs trimming badly. It would improve him greatly. Commander Law, first limit, a nicely set up one, not in show shape. Corry Law came out in open, taking first and completing his championship. He was shown fit. Reddle Rip Rap, second in breeders, light in color, needs trimming badly. Erin's Jess, second in puppy bitches, a nice one could be darker in color. Peg Tyrone, third is bad in eyes and heavy in skull. Annie Law, the winner, came out in the limit, a good colored one and a fair, all round bitch. One Gordon Setter was benched, and one Doberman Pinscher.

Collies were a nice big show. Cleophas, the winning puppy dog, a nice one with a good dark eye and nice muzzle; second, Walden Type, nice clean muzzle and head, not as good ear carriage; third, The Clansman, a long muzzle which is a bit fine, a nice Collie. Parbold Picaroon, the winning dog, came out in the limit, a nice one, good head and muzzle, nice coat; third, Prince, off in foreface and light in eye. Ormskirk Oberon was second, in open and reserve winner; good in head, a fluffy coated one; Walden Wizard was third. Victor Wild, second in limit, A. O. C., out of coat, has a very nice face, light in eye. West Darkey, second limit, A. O. C., bad ear carriage, big round eye, nice foreface, but foreign expression. Otterburn Direct was first in breeders' dogs, a nice one, good in eye and face, bit heavy in skull. The winning junior, Holyrood Trivial, was gone when we looked them over. Willow Patience, the second puppy, and Duchess Perfection, third puppy, had also left. Corona Sweet Rosie was first limit sable and white, and captured reserve winners, she is a nice bitch. Otterburn Fashion Plate was second, has a good skull and is a nice bitch, with a rather full eye. Bedford Splendour, third, is a very fair, all round one. Weston All Quality was the winning bitch and is a good one. Otterburn Odette not in show shape and shy, is a nice promising one. Walden Witch, nice but thick in skull.

Old English Sheep dogs mustered six entries, they were a nice lot but all were out of coat.

Dalmatians were better than usual with eight entries, some nice ones

shown. In Poodles, other than toy, one was benched.

Bulldogs were a good entry as usual and were well up in quality. First puppy dog was Dick Whittington, high on leg, plain in head and face; second, Oakville Moses, is a good headed one, long in face, we think the pick of the class; third, Rough Diamond, a good bodied one, small and plain in skull. Punch was first in novice dogs, a nice one all over, but bad ears; second, Cheetham Marquis, has a good head and foreface, could be improved in body; third in limit over 45 lbs., Pentland Clansman, one that will improve with age, good body and bone, weak skull. Delamere Precursor, second limit over 45 lbs., a good skulled one, short body, big rib but foreign expression. Moston Marshall, second open 45 lbs. and over, a good one showing his age. First in 45 lbs. and over, was Cheetham Squire, the reserve winner, a good one, wins well, nice face and body. Ridgeway Kingcraft was the winning dog a nice balanced one all over, but to us appears too fine. Second in limit under 45 lbs., Black Diamond, is a cloddy one, weak in underjaw; third, Ashland Little Nipper, best in class outside his bad feet, nice head, body and face, carries a typical pair of ears. Little Diamond was second in breeders, a nice light one; Ashland Lady third is a nice short faced little bitch shown light. Sunny Morn, first puppy bitch, a cloddy promising one; White Patch second, light bone; third, Dufferin Belle, fair. Netty Diamond, second novice, is high on leg, has a nice head and face; first, Ashland Sally, good skull and type, but straight in hocks. Cheetham Countess and Cheetham Daughter, litter sisters, were first and third respectively. The former is a nice one beating Ch. Layham Pride, well known but weak behind, in the over 40 lbs. open. Cheetham Daughter is a nice one, good in body.

In limit, under forty pounds, Taf-ford Kitty Karnation, nice all over, was first, and deserved her place. She has a massive skull, good ribs, nice bone and shoulder placement; second, Belgrave Lady of Lambare, is a nice heavily built one, poor in under jaw.

French Bulldogs had eight entries, of which F. W. Lamb's Phil Au Rum D'Athos was awarded the best. Thos. Lawless' Prince De Cellemare getting reserve.

Scottish Terriers made a nice showing and showed improvement all around. Mr. Donald McKellar's Argyle Lad was the winning dog. He has a well balanced head, sound body, and good front. Very typical one all over, a bit large in eye. Bellvue Bob, the winning puppy dog has a well balanced head, good in front, but is big. Cloverhill Defender, second puppy, has plenty of bone, good front and head, but will likely be on the large side when he matures. In novice dogs the new winners were, Ashburn Premier, second, and B. Sandy, third. The latter is too coarse all over. Mr. Ellison accounted for winners bitches, with his good one, Avondale Altcar, a nice typical bitch and one that deserved her place. Reserve winning bitch was Mr. McKellar's Argyle Lily.

White West Highlands were not a large class, but contained a few nice ones. Rosebank Jock, the winning dog is the right type, has a good rugged outlook, but hardly sound in front. Second, open, Laddie, rather high in leg, a very fair face, with a nice black nose, but a bit long in back and coat hardly white. Third, open, Lothian Laddie, is much the same type as second, carries a good hard coat, and jet black nose. The winning bitch, Lansdowne Worry, is a typical White West Highland, she was not in coat. Second, open, Dhownan White Lily, is a good typed one, short back, and

good white coat. Third, Scofus White Rose, a good colored bitch with a straight front.

Bull Terriers were, we think, the best showing of this breed we have ever seen in Canada. Twenty-nine entries, all of an even high quality. In puppy dogs, Haymarket Patrician, a good faced one with a nice head and eye was first. He looks like a comer; second, Glenedyth Tarquin, is also a good faced one, but a bit long in back. Sheridan Blazer, first limit, under thirty-five pounds, a very fair one, weak in face; second, Inferno Oakland, has a strong head, a bit cheeky, but good body. Inferno Buster, second in limit dogs, over thirty-five pounds, improves with every appearance. He has good eye, nice body, is a bit cheeky; second, Inferno You Know, is a nice headed one, his worst fault being his bad feet. Open dogs brought out the well known winner, Glenedyth Imperator, looking in elegant shape. His condition, as was the condition of all the Glenedyth dogs, was a credit to Mr. Fred Smith, their kennel man. Imperator went through to winners, and deserved it. He is a Bull Terrier all over. Third, open, Inferno Douglas, is a nice one with bad ears, and he is a bit coarse. Dufferin Venus, second in breeders', is a very nice one, light in eye and a bit pinched in foreface. Inferno Queen, third, a nice one with a good eye, but bad front. Inferno Prince, second in junior, is a fair one, heavy in head, carries a big eye. The winning puppy bitch, Haymarket Patricia, was gone when we reviewed them. Wentworth Lizzy, third puppy, was a very fair one, lacking in foreface, and light in eye. Charlwood Rose has a good dark eye, but round. She has a nice clean face, and good body. Miss Shirley Blazer is light in eye, has good front and feet. Charlwood Rose, the winning bitch, has a good face and is a nice type of bitch, shown out of coat. Glenedyth Elfin is a nice dark eyed one, a poor shower.

Three Skye Terriers put in an appearance. Talixter Nell being the winner, with Sandy Scott second. Bedlington had three entries, with Woodley Blue Bird getting winners, and John Kenyon's Haslington's Pride, reserve.

Black and Tan benched six, five of them being from the kennels of Mr. F. C. McLean, who carried all before him, taking both winners and reserve winners, dogs and bitches.

Dachshunde made a nice little showing. Aitken & Silver having six entries, and John Sinnott four, the latter handled by Ben Lewis. Whippets had eleven entries. Mrs. B. Lewis taking winners, dogs and bitches, with her nice team, Lansdowne Sun Dial and Lansdowne First Flight. Pugs had three entries; and Italian Greyhounds one.

Pomeranians came out well, and showed a nice improvement in quality over former shows. In many cases dogs had to be content with a V. H. C., which formerly would have been well up in the money. Mendipside Phiffin was the winning puppy. He is a promising little chap with good color, but wants coat. Hingley's Magpie, second, is a very nice one, could be better in hind quarters. Winnie, third, a nice orange shaded sable, not in coat and not quite right in eye. Kelvinside Blackie was the winner in novice. He is a nice colored one but flat coated. It must have been a close decision between him and Kelvinside Kewpie, who is another good one. Young Comedian was first in limit dogs under eight pounds, any color. He carries a tremendous coat and is a cracking good sable, nice in head and good body; second, Sailor Prince, is a nice one, holding his color well. Third, Little Black Masher, a shaded chocolate, a color which does

not appeal to us, and which is a rather poor color to breed from. In open dogs under eight pounds, brown or chocolate, Dandy, a very typical one of good color, was second to Sailor Prince. In open dogs under eight pounds, any other color than black, brown, chocolate or white, Goldmine Birdie, a nice shaded sable of good color, but little heavy in ear, was second. Elderslie Gem was third. He lacks coat for his size. Kelworth Little Billie was alone in open dogs, any weight, white. He is a nice, neat headed one, carrying a good coat. Open dogs and bitches eight pounds and over, any color than white, brought out the winning bitch, Cairndhu Narcissus, a good one and a showy, short backed and good colored little one, but not in coat. She is a good Pom, and should make a name for herself. First limit bitches under eight pounds, any color, Kelworth Gipsy Girl, a neat black of good color; second, Cairndhu Beauty, another nice one but out of coat. Beauty Girl, third in open bitches, under eight pounds, a nice good coated chocolate, good short back, nice head and ears. Orange Cracker was first, under eight pounds, any other color than black, brown, chocolate or white, a nice sable, short back, good head and ears, but out of coat. Sable Duchess, third, is a nice one, bit long in back.

Toy Poodles, under eight pounds, had eight entries. Fluff was returned the best dog, with Fluff of Evergreen the best bitch.

English Toy Spaniels had four entries. King Charles Spaniels, three. Of these Mrs. M. M. Lester's Miss Ruby was awarded winners.

Prince Charles Spaniels had four entries. King Charles Spaniels, three. James Pollock, taking winners. Blenheim Spaniels had two, of which A. W. Steel's Toddlers was considered by Dr. Jarrett the better. Ruby Spaniels had one fair one, Glencho Deermont Firefly.

Yorkshire Terriers made a nice little show of nine entries. Victor of Roundhay, owned by Mrs. J. W. Weldon, a nice bodied little one, was the winner, with Derby Ted reserve. The latter is a longer coated one, but a little larger. Ch. Churchill Pansy, Mr. J. H. Kenyon's good one, was the winning bitch, and the same owner's Minnie, reserve.

Toy Terriers, Black and Tan, eight pounds and under, had thirteen entries, Izzy Busy was the winning dog, with Mrs. Delaney's Gay Boy, reserve. Mr. J. E. Dickert was successful with Busy Huzzy in the bitches. Mr. J. L. Tomlinson's Wanda taking reserve.

Schipperkes had but two entries. Maltese Terriers six. Here Mr. Raymond Card took both winners and reserve with Herman White Knight and Highbury Snowball.

In Pekingese Mr. F. C. Hunt's Dode-tainme, won, a nice headed one with a good face, when in coat would trouble the best. He has a good front, nice body. He was only carrying half his coat at this show, and must have a tremendous coat when in shape. There were some nice ones behind him, particularly among the youngsters, where we noticed some that showed promise, but he was far ahead of everything else, and a good sample of what a Pekingese should be.
