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NOTES AND COMMENTS

The Mount Royal Kennel Club, Montreal, begin their season's operations with an evening show which is to be held on or about October 22nd. These little shows were most successful last Winter, a happy state of affairs that will doubtless be duplicated during this Autumn and Winter.

We heard of a good many sick dogs returned from London, some of which had been shown the previous week at Toronto. The distemper seems to have taken the form of a hacking cough, combined with a high temperature and loss of condition. We have heard of no actual deaths, but with many the safety margin has been a narrow one.

Mr. Ted Ward paid us a parting visit on October 5th. He left for Montreal on October 7th, and was booked to sail from Montreal on October 8th. He greatly enjoyed his Canadian trip, and all being well expects to come out again next Spring.

We are asked to correct a statement made in the report of Edmonton dog show in last issue in regard to Mr. P. O. E. Clute acting as ring steward. Mr. Clute took no active part in the show with the exception of showing four dogs which he did not handle in person.

Even in war "our friend the dog" takes a part that is not to be despised, both as a draft animal for light guns, and in connection with the Red Cross work. A touching little story is current in Paris and is recounted in the following:

"The Petit Journal publishes a story from a Le Mans correspondent telling how an infantry soldier from that town was saved by the regimental dog. Wounded thrice in the Battle of the Marne, the soldier lay in a faint on a heap of corpses when Tom, the regimental pet, revived him by licking his face. The animal had been trained to carry caps, and the soldier, having lost his cap, tried to persuade the dog to take his knapsack to the encampment. After a while Tom seemed to realize what was wanted. He ran to the camp, seized the coat of the nearest man, and tried to drag him to the battlefield. Finally they followed the dog and found their wounded comrade."

The Beagle and Hound Trials of the Toronto Kennel Club are now looked upon as a fixed annual outing, and the promoters and

those taking part in them receive a great deal of pleasure and benefit from the trials.

The third annual event will be held on Wednesday, October 21st, next, when a private car will leave the C. P. R. tracks for the hunting ground, which is only a short distance from the city. A good day's sport is assured those who take in the trip, and the car should be full. Dr. J. A. Campbell, V. S., Mr. Arthur Atkinson or Mr. DeGeer will be glad to give further information to any dog loving sportsmen who would like to view the trials or whose dogs might be entered in the contest. Mr. Harry Taylor, who officiated before, will be the judge, assisted by Mr. Lance Farewell and Mr. James Sercombe.

Ottawa Show ran in pretty hard luck this year. The entry was down and the catalogue was a freak. Ottawa was not advertised in Canadian Kennel Gazette, or rather the business announcement sent us by the Secretary did not reach us in time to appear in August issue. What a pity it is that some arrangement cannot be made that would permit the London and Ottawa shows having different dates, and not as they now are, both on the same days.

TERRIERS. Mr. Joe Meehan, Montreal, has sold to Mr. and Mrs. Sturdee, St. John, N. B., a very promising Irish Terrier puppy by the imported sire, Kilbaron Statesman.

We heard that the Ward Bros. have a commission from a well known Canadian fancier, for an Airedale Terrier dog good enough to beat anything in Canada. Ted says, "he won't come out unless he is a cracker."

That the dog business has all gone to pot must be arrant nonsense. We have evidence of it in many ways. For instance, Mr. Joe Perkins tells us that he sold all the Wire Haired Fox Terriers advertised in last issue of Canadian Kennel Gazette.

Mr. S. Black, probably our oldest Airedale breeder, is offering a number of puppies this month, of the best possible breeding; also a brood bitch of Clipstone and Oorang blood.

While in London, Mr. Ben Lewis purchased from Mr. W. H. Short, the Wire Haired Fox Terrier bitch, Maid O' Mist, winner of three first and reserve winner at Toronto.

Mr. Ben Lewis must have had rather a find in his London purchase, for we notice that Maid O' Mist did some winning at Rome, N. Y., including special for best Terrier, best sporting dog or bitch, and best dog or bitch in show.

BOB TAILS. We are sorry to learn that the Old English Sheepdog, winner at Ottawa, Mr. Ernest Sharp's Wharn-cliff King, was found to have succumbed en route from Ottawa to Toronto, at the close of the show. As the puppy beat his dam at Ottawa the loss is a severe one.

SPANIELS. Mr. Wm. Herne, Goderich, Ont., has sent his Parti-Colored bitch to Mr. Jackson's kennels to be bred to the most suitable dog in this gentleman's estimation. Mr. Herne styles himself a novice and believes in putting breeding operations in the hands of some one more experienced than himself.

Mr. E. Sutton of the Major Oak Kennels, Winnipeg, has bred his good bitch, Snowdale Irene, to Ch. Durbar.

Mr. E. S. Crookenden, Woodstock, has sold Mr. W. J. Jackson, Hamilton, a very promising young Black dog.

By the way, Mr. Jackson himself has a very excellent young Black dog called Durbar Jr., who has just recovered from a very severe attack of distemper, recovery due to nothing but patience and perseverance.

A breeder in Saskatoon writes: "Being a subscriber to your magazine, Canadian Kennel Gazette, for a short time with view of continuing, I would like to ask you two questions. I have several books on breeding of dogs but none of them go so far as to answer. I will give you as clear as possible what I want to know. If we breed a Black Cocker Spaniel dog to a Red Cocker Spaniel bitch we'll get pups, Black, Liver color, and Red. Now take these Liver color pups, say an average colored one, and breed it to a similar Liver colored one and we'll get quite a number of Liver colored pups, also a Black and a Red one. Now repeat this breeding with the Liver colored pups for three generations and we will have a thoroughbred Liver colored Spaniel.

Question No. 1. If we breed a thoroughbred Liver colored Spaniel dog to a thoroughbred Red Cocker bitch will there be any Black pups in the litter?

Question No. 2. If we breed these pups (bred from thoroughbred Liver colored Spaniels and thoroughbred Red ones), to thoroughbred Red Cocker Spaniels will there be any Black pups in their litters?

On the whole I want to know if these dogs will throw back to the Black Cocker Spaniel dog that went to make up the Liver colored Spaniel after the Liver colored pups have been bred for generations enough to make them thoroughbred stock. These are important questions for me to know when you realize the time it would take me to experiment and find it out. I consider myself indebted to you for a correct answer to these questions and an answer will be appreciated at the earliest possible time."

Taking both questions together, in Cocker breeding the colors are now so inter-mixed, especially Red and Black, that you are liable at any time to get both Blacks and Reds from any mating, in fact the mating even of two Reds will frequently produce some Black puppies in the litter. There are comparatively few Liver colored, the principle colors being Blacks, Reds and Parti-colored.

We do not think that Black can be bred out entirely, and a throw-back is liable to occur at any time. Such has been our experience. What do some of our old Cocker breeders say?

Rather an unusual offering is made this month by the Dreamwold Kennels, Egypt, Mass., in an Irish Water Spaniel dog and bitch and nine puppies. Irish Water Spaniels are very infrequently for sale on this side, and no doubt these will be quickly picked up.

BULLDOGS. Mrs. B. Horton advises us of the advent of a litter of eight from her Bull bitch Kentish Queen (C. K. C. 14089). At time of writing both puppies and dam were doing well. They were whelped on September 26th, the sire being Crumpsall Eli (C. K. C. 13696), the dog imported by Mr. Thorley, and this is the first litter sired by Eli in Canada. From the breeding on both sides great things are expected of these Canadian-breds. Mrs. Horton is canine nurse at the establishment of Dr. Campbell, V.S., well known to all Canadian dog men.

The large business announcement of the Dreamwold Kennels gives Canadians, and in fact others too, an opportunity of picking up a number of good Bulldogs at very reasonable prices. These are not kennel castoffs but comprise a real reduction sale, many of them are winners, and all are bred the right way. We hope to see several of these dogs change their location.

The long discussion in the States, as to the admission of the Dudley nose Bulldog into show ranks, has at last been settled. At a recent meeting, with Mr. J. F. Collins in the Chair, it was agreed that the new Bulldog Standard will make it plain that the Dudley nose will be disqualified, and further, that all judges will be expected to disqualify Dudley nose dogs. The amendment presented at the meeting reads as follows:

"The nostrils should be wide, large and black, with a well-defined line between them. Any nose, other than black, is objectionable and Dudley absolutely disqualifies from competition."

COLLIES. We find we have got to revise what we said in Notes and Comments about London Show, for since writing that paragraph we learn that Mr. Jack McCormack's good tri-color puppy, The Clansman, who did so well at Toronto and London, has succumbed to a severe attack of distemper. Clansman was a good kind and one that with time would have improved and have brought added credit to the Otterburn prefix. It is too bad that "the good die young," but as our correspondent says, it's all in the game. Isn't it though rather a poor game for the dog?

Otterburn Delight is nursing a litter of seven, by Parbold Picaroon, five dogs; and Otterburn Fashion Plate is heavy in whelp to same dog. Blond Beauty's litter of eight by Wordall Lord have all survived, and at six weeks old are a pretty husky lot.

Here are some questions that a Hagersville Collie breeder asks:

"What is the difference between a Scotch and English Collie? Does a White Collie show good breeding? Is a Sable with a dark face and a little white on him good points? What would you think of a White with a dab or two of Sable? Give me all the points you can, or let me know where I can get to know more about the Collie dog. What about the Black and White Collie?"

There is no difference between the so called English and Scotch Collie, they are all headed under the head of Collie. There is the Old English Sheepdog, or Bob Tail, quite a distinct breed. Any mixture of sable and white is permissible, as quality depends largely on other qualifications than color. The same applies to the tri-color or black, white and tan, etc.

Dr. Webster has had a couple of postal cards from Dr. Ford, who, as we announced in last issue, is at the front, and in case any of our readers have not seen one of these cards the following form will be of interest. The card is printed with phrases to be struck out. The one we have seen from Dr. Ford contains the uncanceled items, "I am well," "Letter follows at first opportunity." It is dated at Rouen, France. This shows how keen is the censor's work:

"Nothing to be written on this except the date and signature of the sender. Sentences not required may be erased. IF ANYTHING ELSE IS ADDED THE POST CARD WILL BE DESTROYED."

Miss Elmes is kind enough to send us the following report of a meeting recently held in Winnipeg, and we are satisfied that the Winnipeg fanciers acted wisely in sticking by the old Club:

"A meeting of the Toy dog fanciers of Winnipeg was held in the Industrial Bureau September 4th, for the purpose of forming a new club. After careful consideration and discussion, it was finally decided to still keep to the T. D. C. of Canada, with an Advisory Board in Winnipeg. The following were appointed on the Advisory Board: Mrs. Campbell, Mrs. Walker, Miss Elmes, Mrs. Rigby and Mr. W. Gore."

Before leaving for England Mr. Ted Ward promised to send us an article on a Toy breed that is now coming to the fore in Canada, the Pekingese. In the meantime the following from the Illustrated Kennel News will be read with interest:

"In an American contemporary we find a screed in which the prominent note is that the type of the Pekingese, as far as the English Fancy is concerned, is changed, and so the idea of twitting the Committee of one of the great clubs on recent enactments seems to have prevailed the mind of the writer. We may surely dismiss the latter tirade, for every reasonable person will agree that the unsightly paralysed tongue, with its inevitable "slobbering," is a fault, and a very bad one, and that nothing but good can result by its elimination from the Pekingese.

The question of partial blindness, when there were but few really good Pekingese, was tolerated; surely it was never advocated that it should not count against a dog; nor do we think but that it was always a severe handicap. But the Kennel Club dictum, "that total blindness is a disqualification" (which practically leaves the question of degree both of the handicap and the extent of the defect in the hands of the judge) effectually deals with this question. The discussion upon the undershot mouth is also touched upon by this authority, and the main point that is dealt with is the very short-faced dog that we have by careful selection produced, but which this critic asserts has been wrongly construed "in the English fashion."

Then follows an insinuation that a cross of the Toy Spaniel is evident, especially in the parti-colors—a very remarkable assertion

in reference to the club's description that the face of the Pekingese should not be "over-hung nor pointed," nor should he be; but the writer of this somewhat disjointed article seems to have an objection to an up-faced dog as the ideal. This is sheer nonsense. No really competent judge will tolerate a down-faced dog in the variety, and the nearer the nose is to being between the eyes the better the head and the better the expression. As to the implied Toy Spaniel cross, that is really too ridiculous. One of the best and most characteristic points in a Pekingese head is the "flat top" and the quite distinct set on of the ear, together with the setting of the eye, which is totally different from the "bolting" eye of a Toy Spaniel. If anything were wanting to prove the rather absurd deductions thus set forth, one has only to think how many generations it would take to breed out the totally distinct characteristics of the Toy Spaniel if any breeder were fool enough to introduce them; and then again, with thousands of Pekingese sires to pick from, one wonders the why and wherefore of the experiment, especially when one remembers that there is absolutely nothing to be gained by making such an experiment, unless, indeed, domed skull, low-set pendulous ears, and a "pretty" face are desirable.

By the way, we have dealt many times with the undershot mouth question in this column, and some of our remarks on this particular point are commented upon and partially reproduced, and the writer goes on to infer that level mouths have in a great degree 'been lost.'

We wonder if the writer of these remarks is aware that the level mouth is quite a modern innovation, and that the original importations were not level-mouthed in a Terrier sense; in fact, in this particular point were much on a par with the best dogs of to-day.

We have searched this article through, and cannot grasp its "raison d'être." It brings forth nothing new, no great grievance, and only seems to be an attempt to throw ridicule upon the splendid results and the great improvement that years of breeding have achieved. The general tone seems to cast some reflection upon the bona-fides of the present-day Peke, both as to type and breeding, a cruel injustice, as anyone conversant with the variety from its introduction into England will admit. Our best dogs to-day are as good in type, shape and general character as the originals, they have shorter faces, better coats, and are quite as sound in every way as their progenitors. They have lost no good quality, but, on the other hand have gained many, and what more can be said in their favor, or what greater proof adduced of the correctness of their breeding and the skill of their breeders.

Through the favor of Mr. Campbell, Mrs. Sturdee has received a pair of King Charles Spaniels, the dog being an exceptionally good one. We hope that they may tend to alleviate Mrs. Sturdee's loss recorded in September Gazette.

Mr. J. E. Chandler, Montreal, is giving some one a bargain in French Bulldogs, as he is obliged for the present to give his dogs up. The offering includes the imported bitch Bouton's Marie, the dog Batuse D'Athos, and several fine puppies from the above brace, the puppies being about two months old.

Mr. F. C. Hunt's splendid Pekingese, that we spoke of so highly at the Canadian National Exhibition, is illustrated in this issue, and his services are offered breeders of this unique breed. He has won every time exhibited, including Queen City, Canadian National, London and Shelburne, in Canada. His photo will show him to be a dog carrying an enormous coat, with the correct type of head, and with splendid plume and feathering. The stud fee for a limited time has been set at \$15.00 to approved bitches, and this is the kind of dog that should produce puppies like himself, as he is strong and vigorous as a Terrier.

By the way Mr. Hunt tells us that on Mrs. Lamouree's recommendation, a bitch is coming all the way from Kansas City to be bred to Dodetainme.

OTTAWA SHOW

By the Judge, Chas. Lyndon.

It gave me great pleasure to meet such a good lot of fanciers as I met at Ottawa, they take their defeat like true sportsmen. The show was spotlessly clean at all times. It is a great pity that this show conflicts with London, as it must curtail the entries in both.

The judging started with Toys. Pugs had two, the winner, Ch. Dundee Princess, is a real nice one. The Pomeranians were a hot class. Puppy dogs, 1 Prim; 2 Chocolate Spark. The winner won easily enough. Novice dogs, repeat. Open dogs, any color under 7 pounds, 1 Little Snitch, a nice little black I liked very much, short in back and in best of condition; 2 Sir Bruce, a nice little dog, but absolutely refused to show himself, however he had to get 2nd; 3 Windsor Masher. Limit dogs, 1 Little Snitch; 2 Sir Bruce; 3 Bradley Prim. Little Snitch got winners; Sir Bruce reserve.

Puppy bitches, 1 Cairndhu Tricksy, a nice puppy, all out of coat. She got 2nd to Cheeky Bo Peep in novice class, beaten only in coat. Open bitches, any color, under 7 pounds, introduced us to that grand little Pom, Cairndhu Beauty, a little gem all over, a real flyer put down in the best of condition. She afterwards won special for best dog in show. 2 Cheeky Little Nipper; 3 Cheeky Harrogate Duchess. In this class there was a little sable bitch out of coat, when in bloom she should make the best of them stand up. I like her very much. Limit bitches, brown or chocolate, 1 Hillside Beauty. Sable, 1 Cheeky Harrogate Duchess. Cairndhu Beauty got winners, with Cheeky Little Nipper reserve.

Yorkshire Terriers, just two, the winner, Queenie, just fair. French Bulldogs, three, 1 and 2 real good little dogs. English Toy Spaniels, 1 Queen Bess, a nice headed King Charles; 2 a very fair Blenheim; 3 a King Charles. Black and Tan Toy Terriers, just one fair dog. Toy Poodles, 1 Wee Girl; 2 Sis; 3 Bud. The winner was shown very dirty, but won on type and curl. Pekingese Spaniels, one very nice dog, rather low in flesh.

St. Bernards, 1 Beethoven, a very nice dog all over; 2 same owner, Thanksgiving, a very nice bitch. The dog got winners. Open bitches, Thanksgiving got 1 and winners. Mastiffs, just one rather nice dog. The same can be said of Great Danes. Open bitches, 1 Biddy, also winners.

Russian Wolfhounds, two, dog and bitch, and really good ones, fit for any competition.

Blood Hounds, 1 Dartmoor Chief, a very fair hound. I did not like his color. English Greyhounds, 1 Queenie, a fair one all over and well worth her ribbon. American Foxhounds, 1 Baldwin's Paltren, a real nice Foxhound. Limit bitches, Gibson Girl 1 and alone. English Setters, only two, 1 Rex; 2 Jack. Irish Setters, novice dogs and bitches, 1 Red Bird, alone.

Limit dogs and bitches, 1 Red Bird; 2 Queenie. Open dogs, 1 Montrose Shamus O'Brien; 2 Red Bird. The winner is good all around and a grand mover. Open bitches, 1 Montrose Nora Law, the winner is a grand bitch but was sluggish owing to her just leaving puppies.

Cocker Spaniels, Grip won winners dogs, with Lionel reserve. Winners bitches, Corktown Moya. Reserve, Dido. As a whole the Cockers were a high class lot, three of them stood out very much from the rest, the winning Black dog and that typical particolor, Ch. Ottawa Romeo. Mr. Armstrong also showed a nice red bitch.

Collies, 1 won on size and condition; 2 and 3 being very light in flesh. Dalmatians were a large class with two standing out from the rest. Windholme Forever got winners, a beautiful, big, upstanding dog, nicely marked, a little gay in tail carriage. King Bond is very near him.

Bulldogs, the winning dog, Royal Albert, is fit to go anywhere, a sound one all over and should do the breed a lot of good. The winning bitch, Belgrave Lady, is a fair one, her hind action not very pleasing.

Bull Terriers, that sterling fancier, R. H. Elliott, producing the winner in dog and bitch class, Haymarket Patricia, is a lovely Terrier and I should judge would be a laster. The winning bitch, Haymarket Patricia, is one of the greatest light weights I have ever seen, barring an unevenness in her mouth.

Airedale Terriers, two fair ones will do better later on.

Boston Terriers, there were three good dogs shown, 1 Peter Noodles, 2, I like very much, grand head, short back, nice markings, and best of all a real Terrier. The same might be said of Terrible Bill, just beaten a little in face; 3 Cliffside Dipper, is also a good one all over, just lacking the dash of the other two. The winning bitch, Cliffside Corby, is a real nice one, short, cobby body, beautiful head marred by a very bad eye from an accident, but she won well any way. Queenie, reserve, a nice bitch, moved badly behind.

Beagles, the winning dog and bitch, Bugle, and Queen of Trumps, are really high class Beagles, the bitch got winners. Dachshunde, had a pair of very nice ones.

Fox Terriers, Smooth, I like Rock-sand very much, the winning smooth puppy, a nice head, ears and expression, short in back, he must not grow any bigger and if he gets upon his front will make a good one. The winning bitch is just a fair one. Fox Terriers, Wire, had two good dogs, the winning puppy, Donington Resurrection, has only to come right in front to be a real topper. Walnut Regalia, the open dog winner, I can only find fault with his head a trifle short and lacks finish. I think he is now at his best, he has a grand coat, body, legs and feet, he got winners, with the

puppy reserve. There was one good Wire bitch, Hillcrest Feature, a nice size, fair head and good coat, she won winners.

Irish Terriers had two really good ones. Bob Ross introduced a new one, a good dog all around and should do himself a lot of good at stud. I put his bitch over him on Terrier character alone. Scotch Terriers, Bob Ross had also the winning dog and bitch here, the bitch won winners. Black and Tan Terriers, Mr. McLean had a grand team benched, I guess the best we have in America. Skye Terriers had just one.

LONDON SHOW

Dogs 253—Winners Value Two Points

The dog show held by the London Canine Association in connection with the Western Fair, London, was the most successful by far ever staged by the Association. The actual number of dogs present was two hundred and fifty-three, which was a big increase over any previous show. Mr. Chas. H. Mason judged all breeds, and it speaks well for his popularity in London that he attracted such a large entry. The show in itself was clean and well looked after. Capt. Walter Smith was in charge, and had everything in ship-shape order. Messrs. Ben Lewis and Bert Swann both took big strings of dogs to London, and among them were many Toronto winners.

The catalogue and judges book were in none too good shape. Omissions and mistakes were frequent enough to cause, in some cases, quite a bit of confusion. The manner in which the specials were catalogued was very confusing, and led to a lot of delay. In a great many cases a special read: best specimen, silver medal donated by C. K. C., open to members only; the next special read: second best specimen. The latter special was open to all. No doubt this will be corrected another year. Mr. McCarroll and Mr. Snellgrove worked hard and faithfully in the interests of the show. Taken altogether it was a very pleasant and agreeable show, and a pleasant outing.

Bulldogs, Wire Haired Fox Terriers and Cocker Spaniels were possibly the largest classes. The general and more important specials were as follows: Best specimen American Foxhound, Wink; best Pointer, Malwyd Florence; best English Setter, owned in Canada, London; best Cocker Spaniel, Ch. Lansdowne Debutante; best Beagle, Lansdowne Ransom; best Dachshund, Ch. Fitz Frost; best Collie, Parbold Picaroon; best Bulldog, Moston Mar-

shall; best Airedale Terrier, Swale Lady; best Bull Terrier, Inferno Buster; best Boston Terrier, under 17 pounds, Sparkling Beauty; best, over 17 pounds, Chinchonidina; best Smooth Haired Fox Terrier, Sabine Radical; best Wire, Leeds Waltz Dream; best Irish Terrier, Jonesboro Pat; best Bedlington, Haslington Pride; best Poodle, Silk; best Pomeranian, Kelvin-side Kewpie. The two specials open to members of the London Canine Association for best sporting and best non-sporting were won by Mr. P. Baldwin's good Airedale Terrier bitch, Swale Lady, best sporting. Mr. F. C. Hunt's good Pekingese, Dodetainme, best non-sporting.

Bloodhounds mustered three. St. Bernards had only two, Halo The King, a good headed one, with a nice big body being put over the same owner's bitch, Lady of Pearls. In Great Danes the winning dog was Zebra of Sudbury, a big one and the best in head. Reserve was Falcroft Viking, a dog with a very nice head, but in poor shape. Schwartz, the winning puppy is of the weedy type and stands on very bad feet. Tonado, the winning bitch is a nice headed Harlequin.

Russian Wolfhounds only mustered two. The winning dog lacks substance, and is but a fair one. The bitch is also too fine and weedy. Four Greyhounds were benched, Mr. B. Lewis Jr., easily winning with his good team Ch. Lansdowne Butcher Boy, and Lansdowne Artemis. Foxhounds, both American and English, made a nice little showing, and had some good specimens in each. Pointers had but five of which Bob White Maxim Dan and Bob White Pam were first and reserve winners dogs. Malwyd Florence and Lansdowne Prim headed the bitches. These we have reviewed at Toronto.

English Setters came out in goodly numbers, and were for the most part

very nice quality. The winning puppy, Quail, is small, light in eye, and lacking in muzzle; 2 King is a fair one, thick in skull, very fair muzzle and eye. Novice puppy, 1 Monticello Fly, is a very fair one, thick in skull, very fair muzzle and eye; 2 Lady Park, is too fine, very fair type of body, bad head; 3 Roger, has a poor head, with a nice body. Lansdowne Ruler was 1 limit, open and winners. He has a good head and muzzle, and nice body, but stood out at the shoulders when shown in the ring; 2 limit, Pride of Rockland a nice one, good in head; 3 limit, London, a fair one all over, very fair head, but light eye. Irish Setters, only three benched and they were shown at Toronto. Mrs. Sturdee's Corry Law was alone in dogs. In bitches Miss A. B. Lewis' Lansdowne Noreen headed Moroney & Johnston's Annie Law.

Cocker Spaniels were big classes in every section. In novice dogs, Scotland Yet was 1st over Max. They are both on the large side, and the latter was shown very fat. A nice one is Black Dufferin. He was 1st limit, open and winners. In novice dogs, A. O. C., Red Willard, is a nice colored one, good eye, but high in skull; 2 Rob Roy, is light in eye, but a very fair one with a bad front. First limit, any solid color other than black, Red Max, a good one, but a bit light in color. Limit, parti-colored, 1 Volatile a very nice bodied one, has nice head, but gone in mouth and wrong in hindquarters; 2 Braecough Pacand, a very fair one, nice muzzle, but heavy in skull. Ch. Speculator was 2nd in open dogs, other than black. He was shown too fat. First puppy bitch was Gertrude, a very fair one, light in eye and rather foreign in expression. In novice bitches, black, Jessie was placed over Gertrude, both owned by Mr. Tomlinson. Winners, any other color than black, was Mrs. Lewis' Ch. Lansdowne Debutante, a good one not in the best of condition. Reserve was Oakley Red Rose, a nice headed one. Mr. Tomlinson was successful in novice, any color other than black, with Topsy, she was placed over Mr. Lewis' Lansdowne Bettina, shown too fat.

Beagles were a nice showing, F. E. & L. Smith taking the winners' dogs with Smithfield Pioneer; and reserve winners with Smithfield Pirate. Lansdowne Ransom was the winning bitch with Lansdowne Ruby reserve. In Dachshunde the same winners that were at Toronto won here. They were ably handled by Mr. Lewis.

Collies. The Clansman was alone in the puppy class. He has a nice head, eye and muzzle, but is out of coat. His muzzle is a bit fine. Novice dogs, Prince, was first. He is big and coarse, light in eye and round boned. Dr. C. Y. Ford's Parbold Picaroon came out in the limit class, and easily went through to winners; 3 limit was Max Laddie, a fair one, gay in tail and prick ears. Rose was alone in puppy bitches. She is but fair, a weedy one, lacking in bone and coat. Novice, 1 Glenholme Venus, a very fair headed one, light in eye,

and bad mouth; 2 Col. Robt. McEwen's Holyrood, a nice one, but over short, a bit round in eye. In limit Dr. Ford's Otterburn Fashion Plate was the winner. She has a good skull and is a nice bitch, bit full in eye. Weston All Quality, a nice headed one with a good muzzle and body, but bit light in eye, was 1st. She is a well known winner, bred by that good Western fancier, Mr. Tom Milner. There were two Dalmatians, but Mr. Mason did not consider either of them worthy of winners.

Bulldogs were a good class all through, two came out in the puppy dog class. Rough Diamond, the winner, is a good bodied one, plain in skull. The winning dog was that good one, Moston Marshall, a well known winner, but getting up in years. Reserve winner was Jos. Perkins' Worsley Dreadnought, lacking bit in wrinkle, big, good legs and feet, a nice one. Tom Sawyer, 2 limit, a good headed, nice bodied one, lacking in lay back. In open, under 45 lbs., Black Diamond was alone, a nice cloddy one, failing in underjaw. In bitches, Cheetah Countess was returned the winner, with Worsley Candida reserve. Little Diamond, a nice, small one was first in open bitches, under 40 lbs.

Watlands Marksman was the winning Airedale dog, he is a fair one all over. Moorside Bonsor was reserve, a nice headed one, not in shape, heavy in shoulders. Adam Bede won in novice, a very fair one all through. In puppy bitches, Midland Patricia beat Rockley Military Maid, the former is a nice coated one but on the light side. Mr. Bawden's Franklins' Wanda was third. Swale Lady, the winning bitch, is a good one, but showing age. Midland Patricia was reserve.

In Bull Terriers Mr. Miles' Inferno Buster was placed the winning dog. He was looking well after Toronto show. Mr. McFarland's Franklyn Dynamo was reserve. Sheridan Blazer first puppy and novice, is a nice one, weak in face. Inferno Mischief was second to Blazer. Bitches were small classes, Jno. Miles took winners with Inferno Fire Fly. Wentworth Lizzie, a very fair one was reserve. Shirley Blazer was third open, has a nice front and feet, but light in eye. Only two French Bulls were shown.

Boston Terriers were the best and biggest show ever held at London. Chinchonidina, a nice light brindle, was the winning novice dog, with another good little one, Little Jeff, second. Mr. Harding is anxious to establish a strain of high class workers and we hear a record price has been paid for one of the dogs, Bill of Fortune, who gives great promise of working abilities.

Mr. Geo. Thomas leaves Liverpool on October 1st for his home in the United States, taking with him about thirty dogs mostly Terriers, and this time more Scotties than usual. George expects Scotties are to go in America.

Price will not stop her because she states that up to two thousand dollars will be put down for a really high class Diehard.

Betty, the pick of the bitch classes, a sweet white and black of great quality, won all the way and also secured the special for best dog or bitch in the show. She was, too, in splendid condition. A bit more bone would improve her, but what she has is good and hard. Duck is just fair.

STARTLING FACTS ABOUT FURS.

Mr. I. Abraham of St. Louis, who has just returned from the seat of war in Europe, says that the losses on American raw furs caught last year alone and held by dealers in different parts of the world will exceed ten million dollars. This loss is directly due to the war, as most of the fur manufacturers are located in Germany and France.

There were approximately 25,000,000 fur-bearing animals caught in North America last year, whose pelts had a cash value of about \$20,000,000.00. The greater part of these skins were left on dealers' hands, owing to a large surplus from the previous year.

Most of the fur-bearing animals are trapped by farmer boys, many of whom have derived a neat little income as well as a great deal of sport in pitting their wits against the cunning of the various wild animals, which roam the unsettled places on this great American continent, and while they will still have an opportunity to enjoy the sport of catching Mr. Coon, Shunk, Possum, etc., they will have to content themselves with a much lower price for his hide after they have caught him, according to Mr. Abraham, who is the head of the I. Abraham Fur Co. of St. Louis, one of the largest exporters of furs in the United States.

desirable, won. Good shape, shoulders a bit heavy and back a bit slack. Best head and type. Laddie, a good sort, but not in good shape. Sally is a fairly good puppy, and the novice, limit and open for bitches were won by Valley Flash II., whose head and shoulders might be better. Freckles, Flirt and Molly possess enough of merit for the average show but their condition needs attention. Mr. Smith's dogs, in several cases, were too fat and soft, and this was the rule with others, including Rex, whilst not a few had failed in becoming acquainted with soap and water as a wash. Show dogs ought to be in show condition.

Irish Setters mustered seven with the quality much better than one sees at the average show. Mr. J. C. Hanna's old favorite, Champion Shamus O'Brien, again proved his superiority in the open and winners for his sex, whilst in limit Mr. Charles Conway's Barney won after an interesting (to the judge) contest with Miss Audrey McLeod's Pat Grand, whose splendid legs and feet and magnificent color are unsurpassed. The winner is rather heavy in head which is too wide, and in set of stern, as well as in carriage of stern, he is faulty. However, as the Irish go today he can do some winning across the border if asked the question. Pat refused to answer all of the persua-

sion of his pretty little mistress to show himself, but that did not beat him, for the judge got him in hand himself and no doubt found all of the good and the bad in him. His head is not clean cut, and he is on the small side; carries his stern too high and was not in the best of condition, save in coat where he excelled. In bitches Champion Pride of Erin, better in head, legs, feet and body than Red Maizie, won easily, and in addition to structural features, she had all the better of her opponent in condition. Ch. Shamus O'Brien, who had all the advantage of the expert handling of the Redoubtable Robert Ross, tried hard for the special for best in the show, but age is beginning to handicap the old winner, whose feet, never quite of the best pattern, were in prominent evidence, and although in good shape for his years, he lacked the bloom of the Pointer bitch, and the Redoubtable Robert found consolation in the fact that he was "licked by a good one."

Marsdon Banker was easily the best of the seven Field Spaniels, scoring heavily in head, in coat and in length of body, and yet his head lacks some in length, in fact it is here one finds his most prominent failing. He is quite a show dog and ought to do a lot of winning in the future. He was imported, I believe, by Mr. B. F. Lewis.

Cocker Spaniels had twenty-six. The black dogs were a poor lot, the bitches

a great deal better with the Blossoms much in evidence. But there was nothing high class, and their owners, like many others, must keep on trying to approach the Standard, remembering that success will be their reward in the end. Parti-colors were better than blacks, and Mr. L. W. Lehrle's Sir Bonnie Kelso scored in open, in winners, and for best of all classes. His one prominent failing is that he is too heavy all through, yet on correct lines. If his breeding is good, and it almost surely is good, he ought to be of value in the stud. With the exception of being too fat he was in good shape. There is good in Sport, first in novice, but Sir Bonnie Kelso held him safe in most points, head with the rest. Durban Dora, first in limit and open and winners, fails in head especially, and yet there is some good in her.

A dozen Bulldogs made quite an average entry and in the absence of Royal Albert, Mr. D. Laurence McLaren's Silver Reflex won comfortably in dogs, albeit a bit on the leg and lacking some in volume of chest, which gives him the appearance of being rather long in body. Kingsdale Nipper was the runner-up, but in head properties especially, he was outscored by the winner. Ivanhoe Violet, first novice, limit and open (under 40 lbs.), and first winners was the pick of the bitches, with Patricia of New York, much longer in body but equally good in most other respects, second;

and Duchess, some way behind, third. The winner had been nursing puppies and was not at her best. She is a little one, of nice quality and may win again across the border lines, if shown. She beat the dog in the specials. Pitland's Blackberry, winner in the 40 lbs. and over classes, is not quite so good in body as Violet, but elsewhere it is close.

Gaby D'Athos was easily the best of the French classes, scoring in head qualities.

Ten Bull Terriers of much better than average quality proved something of a surprise. Charlwood Imperial, a youngster that needs a little time, together with more power in foreface and better eyes, won right through the dogs, and his owner, Mr. W. S. McDonald, had him in excellent shape. Trump, that was second in limit and in open, and Bromley Crib, that was third, are only fair. Mr. H. J. Short's Bonny Jean romped away with the bitch classes including winners, followed by Topsy and Snook-em, both inferior in head properties. Pit Bull Terriers were bad show specimens taking a chance amongst the Bill Sykes fraternity. These classes might be discontinued to the show's advantage. The C. K. C. should not permit them.

Fourteen Collies were only moderate, the bulk of them being in poor condition, whilst not a few were just dog. Mrs. W. A. Steipor's Watch won right through his classes. His face

is rather short, eyes too prominent and he is a bit on the leg. Length of body would also improve him. He was in excellent condition, but does not carry all of the coat one likes to see. Miss F. Wall's Scotti, quite faulty in head, rather short and by no means perfect in ears or in hind parts, was a close second; with Baron Scott, open in coat and quite wrong in expression, an equally close third. These should not cross the border in quest of blue ribbons. By all odds the best of the Collies was the winning bitch, whose name unfortunately does not appear in the catalogue. She has a nice head and her body and limb formation are all correct. She carries her ears wide and is not in full coat. Neither the second to her in open, nor any of the others compared with her in head, in body or in hind part formation.

There were sixteen Bostons but not all of them were catalogued. Mrs. Le B. Driscoll's Driscoll's Spider was the best of the dogs. He is just a fair one, and not more can be said of Princess Patricia that outscored the bitches. With the catalogue incomplete on these classes I pass them with the reminder that very many of the exhibits were very poorly marked, and not a few of poor color as well.

Smooth coated Fox Terriers were quite up to the average, but the Wires were a very indifferent lot. Bad heads, eyes and coats were prominent features in their make-up. Elore Ruler, first in Smooth dogs, limit, open and winners may be heard from again, and so may Oxford Nemo, that is also a good sort, albeit not in the shape of the winner. Blue Nose Billy was a good third, although on the leg and not very good in front of the eyes.

Moleds Midge had little to beat in her classes.

Eight Airedales had Colne Express Order and Scottie Briar easily first and second. They are not of high class.

Irish were very much better with twelve dogs in all. Thornecroft Dictator did the big things in dogs. Big and on the coarse side, with only moderate head, coat and color, he did not appeal very much to the judge and was hard pressed by Iroquois Spalpeen notwithstanding the latter's poor head and —. Bitches, however, had a good one in Mr. L. H. Powers' Champion, Aroostock Brendon Belle, that, with the exception of slightly defective pasterns and feet, and one ear not well handled, is a splendid specimen. Katie Brogan (Redoubtable Robert Ross owner), couldn't catch up with the winner, which wasn't Robert's fault at all. However, Katie did it in novice and limit where competition was limited.

Scottish were a nice lot with Drumclaph Laird and Jack Scott prominent in dogs, the latter losing by reason of his not very good front.

Mrs. R. A. Ross also won in the bitch division with York Scotch Highball, the only one in sight.

Mrs. Gruenwald's Pomeranians were all over the best of the Toys, her Little Nipper being especially deserving of mention.
