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## NOTES AND COMMENTS

Mr. Harry Nash of Edmonton, writes us that he was not one of the officials of the Edmonton Show, not even handling his own dogs. He was to have been assistant director for the bench show, but owing to the appointment of local judges, which he is always strictly opposed to, he tendered his resignation to the Exhibition Association. At Mr. Nash's request we give this explanation.

The idea that dogs are now being used in war for the first time is quite erroneous. We have seen old pictures and prints of dogs, and cats too, with lighted torches on their backs, the evident purpose being to set on fire the habitations of the enemy. Report tells us that dogs have gone to wars from the very earliest times. They barked at the siege of Troy. In those early days however, they were used as sentinels and for purposes of defence.

In the middle ages they attacked. The tracking mission of the Scottish Bloodhound has been noted, but the dogs were also used to attack cavalry. For this duty they were clothed in coats of mail studded with spikes and scythes to confuse the horses. And when firebrands were also attached to the mail the opposing camp looked for the extinguishers.

That these dogs played no mean part in the field is proved by the fact that Henry VIII. offered the Spanish king, Charles V. 40,000 auxiliaries and 4,000 war dogs to help him against Francis I.

Mr. G. W. Dunn of Port Arthur, tells us that they had a very excellent show, just a few entries short for a two pointer. He adds that the dogs were of grand quality and were generally shown in good condition.

We have no official information regarding the C. K. C. Patriotic Fund, and do not know how it is progressing. We would impress on all breeders and owners of dogs, whether members of the C. K. C. or not, that in this fund they are given an opportunity of proving their liberality and sportsmanship. Those who have not subscribed should do so at once. Our

own subscription has been in the Secretary's hands for some time.

Mr. John Milner, Winnipeg, tells us that the show just closed was of a very high class, but only 284 entries were benched. The results, he says, were satisfactory in every way.

A letter from the Secretary of the Edmonton Kennel Club referring to what we said about Mr. Clute in last issue, makes the statement that while Mr. Clute did not take any active part in the show after it opened before the opening he gave specials for himself, but at the last moment declined to take an active part in the show. For this reason the Secretary tells us the name of Mr. Clute and those of several others were included amongst the officials.

"Westerner" is evidently a mathematician of some renown as well as a keen critic of current events in the dog world as his letter in this issue of Gazette will show. He takes dangerous ground in his statement that the C. K. C. promised to pay the judges' fee at Winnipeg. We have doubts if this is absolutely correct, as it is not within the function of the C. K. C. to pay, as a club, any part of the expenses incurred at any show, whether for judges' fees or for other expenses that should be borne by the individual clubs. It would of course be quite legitimate for the members of the C. K. C., as individual members to make any donation towards the expenses of any club that they thought well of, Winnipeg or others. This becomes not a club matter but one of individual support. We make this reference here, and this only, to "Westerner's" letter, for we are strongly of the impression that he must have been misinformed.

An interesting dog case was settled in the Court of Review, Montreal, by Mr. Justice Greenshields, together with Justices Tellier and de Lorimier. The learned judge confirmed the judgment of the lower court in the actions of Morley Walters vs. Lumen B. Seward, and the latter against the

former. The case is reported as follows:

The cases are known as the "Dog Actions." Mr. Walters, of the City of Hull, sued Mr. Seward for \$200, said to be the value of a white liver colored Pointer dog, which was maliciously shot and killed, it was alleged, by the defendant in July, 1910. Justice McDougall gave judgment for the plaintiff in the sum of \$200, with interest and costs, except as to the costs of enquete and exhibits, the defendant being condemned to pay one-half of these.

In the action of Lumen B. Seward of the City of Hull, vs. Morley Walters, the plaintiff sued the defendant for \$500, claiming that the latter had from July 30th until August 22nd, 1910, accused him, in the presence of others of having maliciously killed the defendant's dog, and stating he would have the plaintiff arrested. It was also alleged by Seward that Walters, as President of the Corporation known as Walters and Co., Limited, refused to take delivery of goods ordered by his firm, saying that he would not receive goods from a man who had killed a dog, this causing plaintiff real damage. Mr. Justice McDougall dismissed the plaintiff's action, with costs generally, except costs of enquete, half of the latter to be borne by plaintiff.

His Lordship, Mr. Justice Greenshields, in sustaining the lower court judgment, said it was plain that Walters' dog had been shot by Seward, and that the latter had suffered no real damage.

This will interest Mr. McFarland, Hon.-Solicitor of the C. K. C., who for years has been accumulating legal lore referring to the dog and his owner.

It is with regret that we learn that the recent show in Winnipeg resulted in a very considerable financial loss. It is not more than we expected, as where expenses are heavy, dog shows help apart from exhibitions will, under the present conditions, be almost foredoomed to suffer loss. We are not making this statement in any pessimistic mood but simply facing things

as they are, not alone in Canada, but all over the British Empire.

For instance the Kennel Gazette, the official organ of the Kennel Club, England, reached us for October in a very emaciated condition, due to the war. In it an announcement is made that the Committee of the Kennel Club at their meeting held on October 7th, decided not to hold their annual show as the Olympia is in the occupation of His Majesty's Government. This is one reason—and there are others.

On the other hand we have nothing but admiration for the splendid paper that "Our Dogs" continues to issue each week, and for the cheerful optimistic tenor that runs through its pages.

In reading the horrible war news with which our papers are now filled, one comes across, even here, a pathetic little note that brings the moisture to the eye. For instance the following touching incident. Both man and dog deserved far better fate.

A soldier recounts: "There was a big awkward gawky lad of the Camerons who took a fancy to a Scotch Collie that had followed us about a lot, and one day the dog got left behind when we were falling back. The big lad was terribly upset and went back to look for it. He found it, and was trudging along with it in his arms, making forced marches to overtake us, when he fell in with a party of Uhlans on the prowl. He and his dog fought their best, but they hadn't a dog's chance between them, and both were killed."

The Mount Royal Kennel Club have decided to resume their evening shows again this season and will hold the first on November 12th in the Mount Royal Riding Academy, 1 Hillside Avenue. It is hoped that entries will be sent in to the Secretary, 109 Place d'Youville, as early as possible to facilitate the work of the committee. Dogs must be at the Academy at 7.30 the night of the show. Dogs winning special ribbons in their breeds will be eligible to compete for



cups for the best Terrier in the show and the best specimen any other breed in show. The Mount Royal Kennel Club proposes holding other evening shows during the winter months, when breeds not included in the coming show will be featured. The following are the classes for the fourth evening show and who will judge the entries:

Mr. R. A. Ross will judge the following:

Puppy class (Terriers)—Six months old and under twelve. Puppies of the following breeds eligible: Airedales, Fox Terriers (Wire and Smooth), Irish Terriers, Scottish Terriers, West Highlands, Sky Terriers, Bull Terriers, Dandie Dinmonts, Manchesters and Welsh Terriers. Blue ribbon to be awarded best puppy.

Toy class—(Of the following breeds)—Japanese Spaniels, Schipperkes, Pekingese, English Toys and Yorkshires. Blue ribbon for the best specimen.

Airedales—Novice dogs, novice bitches, open dogs, open bitches.

Manchesters (Black and Tan)—Open dogs, open bitches.

Bull Terriers—Novice dogs, novice bitches; open dogs, open bitches.

Irish Terriers—Open dogs, open bitches.

Pomeranians—Novice dogs, novice bitches; open dogs, open bitches.

Dachshunde—Novice dogs, novice bitches; open dogs, open bitches.

Mr. F. E. Stewart will judge the following breeds:

Scottish Terriers—Novice dogs, novice bitches; open dogs, open bitches.

West Highlands—Open dogs, open bitches.

Fox Terriers (Wire)—Novice dogs, novice bitches; open dogs, open bitches.

Fox Terriers (Smooth)—Open dogs, open bitches.

Sky Terriers—Open dogs, open bitches.

Cockers—Novice dogs, novice bitches; open dogs, open bitches.

Field Spaniels—Open dogs, open bitches.

Mr. Robert K. Mills will judge the following breeds:

Boston Terriers—Open dogs, open bitches.

French Bulls—Open dogs, open bitches.

English Bulldogs—Novice dogs, novice bitches; open dogs, open bitches.

This is the first of a series for the present season and will be followed closely by others. All no doubt will result as satisfactorily as did the pleasant little shows of 1913-14.

Scissors and Paste gets so many hard knocks that the following from the Canadian National Exhibition, Toronto, under date of September 26th, is doubly pleasant because it is different:

Mr. A. P. Mutchmor, the tireless Secretary of the Dominion Kennel Club, has been on a ten days shooting trip, and we hope he enjoyed himself as much as we could wish him to. Mr. Mutchmor takes few holidays, he is a lover of hard work and lots of it, so that this trip will be all the more enjoyable to him.

No less than four prominent members of the Dominion Kennel Club are now serving their country across the water. These include Mr. Jack Adams, owner of the Mersey Bulldog Kennels; Mr. Fred Gates, a leading Whippet breeder; Mr. Harry Sampson, who owned the Alpine St. Bernard Kennels; and Mr. Tom Roach. They all left with the 34th Fort Garry Horse. Mr. Sampson is a naval man. Our wishes for good luck follow them.

The Western Canada Kennel Club, of which Mr. Geo. P. Sterling is President and Mr. E. W. Mermagen, of Irish Terrier fame, Secretary, will hold their annual show in February. Some of the Western fanciers are already talking about this fixture. The actual dates have not yet been set, but they will doubtless occur sometime in February. Further details will be forthcoming in ample time.

We are informed by a member of the Committee that the gentlemen appointed at the annual meeting of the C. K. C. to confer with the Humane Society on the cropping question, have not yet met. Perhaps a case of letting sleeping dogs lie.

We are anxious to procure a few copies of Volume 3 of the C. K. C. Stud Book, which is now out of print. Probably some members of the Club, who do not value this volume too highly would let us have them at the published price. If there are any such, we would be glad to hear from them, as we are desirous of completing a few sets and having the volumes published to date with the above exception.

We do not think that dogs up to the present have been used in Canada as collectors in aid of the relief funds inaugurated to help sufferers from the horrible war existing in Europe. It is not so in England where dogs of various breeds may be seen all over the country with little collection boxes strapped on their backs, and of course in care of their owners. Very considerable sums have been secured by this method, one that somehow appeals to those sympathetic people, who love dogs as well as humans. This is now to be changed in Toronto and following the Queen City, doubtless other centres will take up the plan. At a meeting of the Police Commissioners held on November 3rd, permission was given the North Toronto Red Cross Association to use dogs as

agents for subscriptions. The Commissioners were waited upon by a deputation of ladies, who explained that a good deal of money could be secured in this way, by collection boxes strapped on the backs of their dogs. The commissioners at once acquiesced to the request of the Red Cross Association, so that we expect to see numerous canines on our streets carrying collection boxes.

At a recent meeting of the Delegates of the American Kennel Club it was decided to adopt a standard form for entry blanks to be used at all shows to be held under American Kennel Club rules, on and after January 1st, 1915. An additional clause has been added which reads as follows: "I certify that, to the best of my knowledge and belief, there has been no case of distemper within the period of six weeks prior to this date in any kennel in which the dogs herewith entered have been quartered."

That this will prevent all cases of distemper is of course beyond the mark, but that it will tend to reduce the number of fatal cases cannot be questioned. Something of this kind is needed in Canada, for whether distemper came from the air, old buildings, old dog boxes or benches, or what-not, the number of cases following the Canadian fall circuit was entirely too great. Dogs contracting the disease, and others in their owners kennels with which they came in contact have died by the dozen.

There is nothing more disheartening to exhibitors, especially those in the novice class, than to lose through no fault of their own the dogs that they prize so highly, and in many cases which they have secured at very considerable monetary expense.

We don't hold with those who say that every dog must have distemper, but no doubt the disease is sometimes brought on by a simple cold, exaggerated by the confinement and excitement entailed on dogs on exhibition.

**TERRIERS.** Mr. J. A. Meadows, Oakville, is advertising at stud his new Boston Terrier, Sir James, one of the blocky headed kind, seal brindle with white markings in color. He combines the blood of the best Boston Terriers of present and past years, and his fee being fixed at the low figure of ten dollars, Sir James should have all that he can do. He is fifteen months old, and the result of two matings have been four seal brindle dog puppies, perfectly marked, in each case. Mr. Meadows thinks so much of his puppies that he has purchased two of them out of a Ch. Ted Shongo bitch. These puppies are small and are bred from small stock.

Mr. McKellar of Oakville, is accepting the congratulations of his friends over the attainment to championship honors of his Argyle Lad, who attained the necessary points, and over, at the Canadian National Exhibition. The winnings were made under three different judges, Dr. C. Y. Ford, Mr. James Mortimer, and

Mr. Offerman. He also won at the Canadian National, 1st brace Scotties, and 1st brace in White West Highlands.

Dr. F. Vanderlip, Malton, Ont., is an Airedaler who has a good imported bitch that now has four beautiful puppies.

Mrs. J. Wright's Airedale, Lancashire Lass, whelped eight puppies on September 20th, four of either sex, the sire being Soudan Prince, a son of Soudan Swiveler. They look good and are showing the Terrier spirit already.

It looks as though the Airedale Terrier Club of Canada would be under the necessity of electing a new Secretary, for the present energetic incumbent, Mr. H. Dudley-Waters, is holding himself in readiness to leave for the seat of war with the Second Canadian Contingent. We can badly spare him here, but the Motherland wants him more.

At the annual meeting of the Boston Terrier Club of Canada, it was decided to hold the next annual show on the regular date, January 1st. Preparation is already under way for the show, which it is hoped will be bigger and better than those preceding it.

Ch. Clipstone Betty, the dam of Ch. Clipstone First Shot, our most famous Airedale, is nursing a litter of future winners.

Mr. Aitken has safely received, through Mr. Bailie Dalgliesh the Scottie dog, Teviotside Tinker. He is described as a dark brindle, and one that has done a good deal of winning across the water. He is three years old, and carries plenty of bone, and is a cobby short backed one. We hope to see him at the Mount Royal Kennel Club Evening Show on the 12th.

It came as a surprise to us to know that Mr. Caverhill of Montreal, who used to be so prominent in Skyes, has again a very excellent kennel of the breed, including a grand imported bitch called Prudence. We hope this means that this gentleman's kennel will once more be represented in the show ring.

Mr. Harlow is congratulating himself on a beautiful litter of four dogs and two bitches by the imported Milton Magpie, whose portrait appears on the front page of this issue of Gazette.

We are sorry to hear that Mr. McGlynn of Winnipeg lost soon after whelping, that excellent Boston bitch,



Ch. May Saxon. Somehow it is the good ones that always go, the mutts live.

Another Western Boston to succumb is Mr. Taylor's winning bitch, Little Pearl, who died soon after whelping. She was last shown at the Thunder Bay show, where she went to winners.

The winning Bull Terrier, Stipendiary, imported by Mr. Harry May of Winnipeg, has changed hands, her new owner being Mr. J. C. Graham.

Mr. Sid. Perkins, otherwise "The Optimist," points out a couple of errors in our award list that we are glad to correct. His Airedale bitch, Rockley Paragon, reported by us 2nd at Ottawa, won right through her classes. At Shelburne we gave Rugged Mr. Bub as winning 2nd. It was Mr. Perkins' dog that got this award, Bub not being present.

Just too late for last issue Mr. Sam Bamford sent us word of a number of sales he has recently put through, which goes to prove again that the dog business in Canada is not in a comatose state. These transfers include the following: A Scottish Terrier dog to Mr. Budge of Montreal, one to Mr. Humphrey Elliott of Ottawa, the Bull Terrier expert; one to Mr. Ferguson of Ottawa, better known as an exhibitor of Boston Terriers; and one to Lieut. Scott, who was then located at Valcartier, Que. Then the winning Airedale, Lambton Boy, is now owned by Dr. Kidd of Ottawa, and one of the latest importations, known in England as The Scarlet Pimpernel, was transferred to Mr. Thos. Harlow of Toronto. This smooth coat Fox Terrier should do much for the breed in Canada, being sired by Ch. Defacer, ex. the good bitch, Flame Flower.

**COLLIES.** Col. Robt. McEwen tells us that at the present time he is entirely sold out of Collie puppies, but expects shortly to have something good by Policeman, out of Ch. Parbold Proclamation. Policeman is a black dog, with little white, with a wonderfully good head, nice dark eye, good ear carriage and beautiful Collie outline. After the New York show he had a very bad time of it with dis-temper, and went into such bad shape that he could not be creditably put on exhibition. Policeman is now coming into good form and will again give a good account of himself when given the opportunity.

On opening a letter headed "On His Majesty's Service," a few days ago, we found it to contain a brief note from Dr. C. Y. Ford, dated September 23rd, and simply headed "The Front, France," so that this good Canadian Collie breeder must be right in the thick of it. He says he was so sorry to miss the Toronto Show, but is in a big show now, and feels that his work lies there. He concludes with best regards to all old friends and Collie breeders.

Just as we are closing we have a Field Service post card from Dr. Ford, dated October 12th, in which he tells us he is quite well. It is evident this prominent Collie breeder and judge does not intend to let himself be forgotten by his Canadian associates.

Mr. J. B. Guarnera of Winnipeg, has added to his already big string of Collies, three grand young bitches. They will be exhibited at all the shows in the Western spring circuit.

**BULLDOGS** If every Gazette reader would take it on himself as Mr. "Bob" Mills of Montreal, did to secure us three extra subscribers, our list would soon grow to the proportions we wish and that the sport deserves.

Mr. Mills had a fine litter of six puppies by Royal Albert, but the usual Bulldog fate happened, and they all died in whelping. We wish him better luck with the next lot.

Mr. J. A. Meadows of Oakville, takes the loss of his light weight Bull bitch, Dundee Lady Betty, philosophically. He thinks that if something of this kind didn't happen that Bulldogs would become very plentiful, but we have our doubts. Kennel fights are responsible for the death of many good ones.

Mr. J. J. Adams reports several important sales made recently and including Ch. Mersey Pilot, who goes to the well known Boston Terrier fancier, Dr. Glenn Moody of Vancouver.

The latest addition to Mr. Sam Bamford's Walnut Kennels, is the light weight Bulldog Walnut Crib by Mersey Skipper, ex. a Parkholm Crib bitch. We have seen a photo of the dog, which shows him to be a very typical light weight and one that we can do with.

Mr. Wilson, Toronto, has sold the Bulldog, Black Diamond to Mr. Ryder of the same city, for a good round figure, one that is satisfactory to this keen breeder of England's typical dog.

**SPANIELS** Mr. Henry R. Moore, Medicine Hat, referring to the Spaniel column in last issue is kind enough to write us as follows, giving his experience in color breeding:

"Re the breeder of Cocker Spaniels who writes from Saskatoon, I would like very much giving this friend fancier a little of my past experience along the lines of good mating for color, etc. The question on the board, re the Liver bitch bred to Red dog. If for three generations your stock has been mated to solid Red stuff of different pedigrees, and the stock from this strain taken again and mated likewise, the result is absolute sure solid Red. My personal experience along the lines of Cocker Spaniel breeding has been this.

It is not necessary for you to cross Red and Black in order for your bitch to produce either, but should you want Irish Setter Reds in Cockers, and get Black from Black cockers, breed

Black to Black and Red, likewise Lemon, Buff Washed out Reds. On the other hand rusty color in black often found on pasterns and hocks is the result of breeding Reds and Blacks together.

For future success breed your Liver Roan bitch to a White and Red dog. The results will be good. Your Red to Red and Black to Black. Then the judge cannot say in his criticism 'good specimen, but bad color.'"

The following paragraphs are from "Our Dogs:"

Mrs. Ralph Fytche has sent to Toronto the Cocker Spaniel, Fulmer Toff, by Beau Bowdler ex. Fulmer Why, winner of many prizes, and reserve champion to his kennel companion, Ch. Hampton Marquis, at Cruft's Show, 1913; and a black and white prize winning bitch. Princess Alexander of Teck, who recently visited Mrs. Fytche's kennels, is also taking out to Canada a Cocker from this celebrated kennel.

Mr. H. S. Lloyd has sold to Mr. Justice Townsend Scudder, of New York, the Cocker Spaniel, Sonison of Ware, a black, white and tan dog, by Truthful of Ware, a winner of many 1st prizes this year at all the principal shows. Also to the same gentleman, Grindon Geraldine, the best blue roan daughter of Grindon Gerald. Both these dogs should do well for their new owner. Performer of Ware, recently sold to Mr. Ernest Britton, has changed hands, and is now the property of Mr. Oppenheimer. Mr. Lloyd is congratulating himself upon having a very promising red bitch pup by Performer of Ware, who is a son of Galtrees Raven, which should render a good account of herself later on.

We shall be interested in viewing these English type Cockers and seeing how far they really are from our Canadian and American dogs.

Mr. Ed. Sutton of the Major Oak Cocker Kennels, Winnipeg, advises us of the following litters of Cockers: Three dogs and three bitches by Ch. Major Oak I., ex. Ch. Brookdale Blossom. Six dogs and three bitches by the same dog ex. Ch. Ferndale Goldie. Four dogs and two bitches by Ch. Durbar, ex. Brookdale Irene. This should give the Winnipeg kennel a strong hand in this popular breed.

Mrs. Pat. Kieley, a Winnipeg Cocker fancier, who was recently in Toronto, paid a visit to the kennel of Mr. Lance Farewell, and persuaded him to part with two very promising Black Cocker puppies, which we hope will do well for her.

Mr. Ed. Sutton of the Major Oak Kennels, Winnipeg, has imported a stud Cocker from a well known English breeder. We understand it is a black and white parti-color.

**DACHSHUNDE.** Mr. Aitken of Montreal, since the Canadian National Exhibition has had a mighty hard time with his Dachs-hunde, in fact has lost through virulent distemper his imported black

and tan bitch, Melita. His other imported bitch, Wheatfields Pride, has also been very sick with the same trouble, but with care and night and day attention he hopes to be able to pull her through. The reds he showed were not affected.

**TOYLAND.** During a lecture given in Toronto by Madame Vanderveld, a talented Belgian lady, who is touring Canada on behalf of the Belgian refugees, a little Pomeranian puppy, the gift of Mrs. Howorth, was put up to auction and realized the handsome sum of one hundred dollars.

Mr. Jack Webb, the Secretary of the Toy Dog Club of Canada, kindly gives us the following report of the Executive meeting held on the evening of Wednesday, October 21st:

"Practically every member of the Executive was present. The beautiful Macgregor and Terra Cotta cups have been finally won outright by Mrs. Gruenwald (Cheeky Boy), and Mrs. Wylie (Cairndhu Beauty), and our very generous president, Mrs. Jas. Carruthers has kindly donated another cup to replace the Macgregor cup to be called the Espero cup, and our genial Hon-President, Mr. John G. Kent has promised another handsome donation.

Our Winnipeg members, especially Miss Elmes and Mrs. Campbell, are working very hard getting new members, Miss Elmes sending in no less than five brand new members this week, which is most encouraging. Mr. Hirst's 12-year-old bitch was matched against Mr. Hingley's Pi Pi. As Pi Pi's owner was nursing his sick dogs the grand old lady had a walk over. She is a beautiful bitch and carries her age wonderfully.



Owing to the death of Goldmine Midget, Mr. Eyden also had a walk over with his Black bitch, Little Eva.

It was decided to hold a few more matches at the next meeting on November 18th and all interested are heartily invited to attend.

Mr. Hingley, of Toronto, reports the sale of his little Black dog, Magpie, to Dr. Campbell of Toronto.

We are sorry to report the death of Mr. Jack Webb's little Chocolate bitch, Goldmine Midget, a winner at the C. N. E.

All Pom fanciers should become members of the Pomeranian Club of Canada. There are good reasons for this as the Club intends holding a membership show about Christmas time, and a host of specials have already been offered.

Another loss in the Pom line is that good little Sable dog, Wee MacGregor, owned by Mr. Wm. Johnston of Winnipeg. Death came through the breaking of a blood vessel in the head.

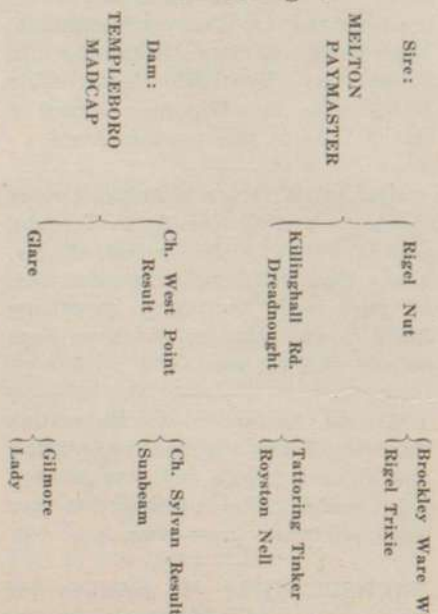

## THE WINNIPEG KENNEL CLUB'S FIRST ATTEMPT

This much tooted fixture was held at the place as advertised, but was just twenty-four hours behind schedule time in all details. Judging was to have commenced on Tuesday the 13th at 11 a.m., but the benching was only being placed long after that hour. The dogs had not even arrived, at least the local ones, and on the closing of the first day we find the Corona, Weston and Mr. St. Lawrence's entries not benched, but were told they would be the second day. Is there anything in the C. K. C. rules that allows of a special privilege being given any exhibitor, in the nature of a twenty-four hour delay? One might understand the necessity of such arising in the case of an out-of-town exhibitor, but there is no valid excuse for a local exhibitor. Some of the outside exhibitors travelled their dogs hundreds of miles and were forced to bench them the first day, but the local man was allowed another twenty-four hours, and had a fresh dog to take in the ring. Entries were to have closed on the 6th, but on that date things looked so disappointing, that it was decided to extend the time to Saturday, 10th, at 10 p.m. This was afterwards changed to Sunday the 11th, and I am informed that they were seeking entries on Wednesday 14th, the day after the show opened. There was a reason. The Club had written the C. K. C. that they could bench a five point show, and beat the D. K. C., if they were given financial assistance. They were promptly assured that if they could bench a five point show, that the C. K. C. would pay for the judge. I have learned that this was afterwards changed.

Five o'clock of the first day found 132 dogs benched, and nine o'clock of the same evening 190. Seventy dogs had to be provided by some means, hence the necessity of another appeal. The daily papers for sometime have contained items of what was being done, and the great success of the venture. None of them materialized, and the result is nothing short of a fizzle. The following article appeared in one of the local papers on the 13th:

#### Raising the Roof are the Dogs at the Industrial Bureau.

"The immense roof of the Industrial Bureau Convention Hall is being raised, not literally, but figuratively, and the raisers are the 600 dogs of all breeds which are almost momentarily being benched to-day for the first annual bench show of the Winnipeg Kennel Club.

While the show opens this evening, judging will not be started before tomorrow morning, Judge Mortimer, a well known judge of dogs, acting in that official capacity. The present show is held under the Dominion Kennel Club rules, while those formerly held in Winnipeg were all under Canadian Kennel Club rulings."

That 600 dogs looks good on paper. The Dominion Kennel Club wish it

distinctly understood that they had no connection with this so called show. Nothing doing.

Here is a portion of another appearing the second day:

"I consider this dog show arena one of the finest, if not the finest in Canada, and it would be hard to beat in New York. It is light, airy, dry and healthy for the dogs and a most commodious show ring," remarked Dr. Boulbee, Secretary of the Canadian Kennel Club, under whose auspices the Winnipeg Kennel Club are working."

"Great Danes were the next class judged and were fairly represented in quality and numbers. D. W. Wright, of Toronto, came in first with his good brindle pup, Olga, the best specimen from Winnipeg was the black dog, Otto, a really creditable specimen, owned by J. S. McGregor, of Winnipeg, and this dog might observingly have been awarded the blue ribbon."

"The Winnipeg Kennel Club are to be congratulated on their first dog show. The attendance promises to be very large, first of all because the proceeds are to go to the Patriotic Fund and the superior accommodation and the ease with which one can get around and look at the aristocrats of the canine world will be heralded far and wide and the vast auditorium will no doubt be taxed to capacity before closing day. This afternoon the rest of the Hounds are being judged and then the Setters, Pointers and other field dogs will be given a chance for honors."

It will be noted that the official of the C. K. C., as quoted refrained from remarking on the quality of the exhibits. Good judgment this, and most diplomatic. Reminds me of the story of the lady asking a certain judge for his opinion as to her dog, and being told that it was a beautiful collar the dog had on. It does not say whether this was "unofficial" or "official. From the above article Mr. D. W. Wright might think that he had been given an award in Great Danes that he did not deserve. Not so, Mr. Wright, you won it fairly and not by streets but by miles, and then you know what your dog is. You see, we had to promise so many of the local men that they would win, to get their entry, so we must ease things down a little and the handiest way is to blame it on the judge. That last paragraph gets my goat. The boquets having arrived, and there not being sufficient visitors at the show to throw them, we will start our "first and last annual futurity stakes," to be based upon a probable attendance, and in the meantime, let us shake hands with ourselves and congratulate each other on the great success it might have been, IF—, let us go back and count the dogs again. We are doing well. There are 240 now and this is only the second day. It is most



amusing when one stops to think that this attempt was first started "to beat the D. K. C.," and now the aim is "in aid of the Patriotic Fund." It will be interesting to hear the amount that is paid over to the Fund.

I do not think the Executive of the Club would feel flattered if they heard some of the remarks and comment on the show. You can fool the public, but a dog show usually attracts those who have some knowledge of at least some one breed, and this visitor is looking for quality and not just quantity.

One well known fancier said "it is the deadest looking dog show I ever saw, and even the dogs look disgusted on being found there."

Three men were looking at the dogs, and on arriving in front of one particular kennel, recognized the occupant at once. They live close to each other and both knew the dog to be ownerless, and as being a tramp in their neighborhood for over a year.

"Take out fifty of the dogs, mostly from Toronto, Lethbridge and Edmonton, and none of the balance could get winners awarded them, where the judge was allowed to exercise his own judgment in this respect."

"It must surprise Mr. Jas. Mortimer to see the quality, after the splendid string Winnipeg sent him at Toronto last November, and it is to be hoped that this show will not lead visitors to suppose, that it is Winnipeg's or the West's best."

"In every class in which a local dog appears, I can think of from one to ten local dogs, that are not here, that can and have beaten all local dogs I see benched."

Let us count the dogs again. Going up! 245 now, and 15 that are not here, makes the total 260. But this is only the evening of the second day. As this evening's Tribune announces "there will be more benched tomorrow" (the third day).

Local fanciers have been wondering who the man is that has undertaken the writing of kennel notes for the Tribune. When he referred to a certain Cocker Spaniel "to the end of her perfectly hanging tail" he just hung himself. In the same article he states that this Cocker puppy, "although but three months old, promises to be one of the very best in the Cocker class." Now, he might have got away with both of these. Blamed it on "poor copy" or a blunt pencil. Any old thing. But when his exhibits were discovered at the show, well, well. I heard one man remark "just about the kind of dog I thought the man would own that wrote such articles." You all know that little story "Don't get gay."

To quote the Superintendent, "we are running this show strictly on Kennel Club rules." Such a statement could only be made by a man that did not know of the existence of show rules. In this case I would not be surprised at such a condition of affairs. It is a new one on me to hear of rules—

That allow of an extension of five days on the advertised date for closing of entries.

That allow any exhibitor to bring his entry in the third evening of the show, and this its first appearance.

That allow of a canvas of entries at noon of the second day of the show.

That allow of the benching of puppies under six months (and these counted in the official count). Exhibitor says the date of birth was changed on his entry form.

It might be useful to the readers of the Gazette to see a comparison of the results obtained by this show as compared with Winnipeg shows held the former part of this year.

The afternoon show of the Western Canada Kennel Club on June 20th, benched 167 dogs for thirteen breeds. Being only for the afternoon, it was not expected that any outside dogs would come, and they did not. Take the outside dogs away from this show, and they bench a great many less for the same thirteen breeds. So much for the local feeling.

From the above it will be seen that the dogs entered were:

You can usually get the outside dogs if you pay enough for them. The question is, does it pay. This will put to one side, any attempt to laud

this show as an improvement over other Winnipeg shows. It will be remembered how "all the best and most prominent fanciers in the West were joining their ranks," "of a bigger show to be held than even Toronto," "cars of dogs will be here from Toronto, Montreal, Ottawa, Hamilton, Vancouver, Calgary, Edmonton and Moose Jaw," "we are getting entries from places that we never heard of before," (I have not heard yet), "the show will be the biggest ever staged in Winnipeg, and we can now guarantee 700 dogs to the Exhibition Association." We leave it to Winnipeg readers as to how close they came in any of their forecasts.

Their campaign has been anything but a clean one from beginning to end. Nothing has been left unsaid or undone in an effort to gain sympathy. The same bait would not catch all so it had to be altered to suit the particular canvas. For instance, here is a sample of the talk of one of them. The Boston, Ch. May Saxon, belonging to J. A. McGlynn, died. The day that the death of Dr. Bell was announced, this man telephoned a friend that his two worst enemies were dead, "Dr. Bell and May Saxon." He has also been heard to remark that he now had the whip hand and intended to use it on Mutchmor and Fletcher. He did not say which hand, but I think that either of these men can look out for themselves.

I was never quite clear on the disqualification rule of the C. K. C., but it does not appear to be quite so formidable as at first thought. "Join the Winnipeg Kennel Club and you will be reinstated" is the password. Note the difference in the undoing. The power of cancelling the disqualification is given to a local body, but it took a specially called meeting at Toronto, and at a time when no outsiders would be there, to pass the resolution of disqualification. If I was disqualified, I think I would insist on being reinstated by the same body as disqualified me, before I would consent to go back. It has been denied that the rule is an attempt at coercion. The manner of lifting the disqualification is proof of its being so. We are condemning German militarism, but what is wrong with Canadian doggy-ism as it is trying to be applied.

Prior to the Exhibition show in July last, it will be remembered that three different attempts were made to change the show from D. K. C. to C. K. C. rules. Amongst other things the city was canvassed by members of the Winnipeg Kennel Club. Each canvasser had a list, and it was headed something like this: "We, the undersigned, hereby promise to exhibit the number of dogs set opposite our respective names, if the show is held under C. K. C. rules." Nothing was said that they would not show under any other rules. As I remember the list when it was presented to me, the Corona Kennels were down for eight. They have one in this show. The Weston Kennels down for several. Two dogs shown here and a Pug (apologies to the breed). St. Lawrence shows one. This is the best that three

of the self-styled "four largest and most prominent kennels in the West" could do. Five dogs. And remember this was their own show. This will give a fair estimate as to the probable chances on their guarantee of entries. They have been kidding you fellows in the East ever since they got going, and my surprise is that you swallowed the bait. You have been here and have seen for yourselves. Did they make good all they have written you?

Sitting at the ringside, I saw a number of supposedly "good things" upset. Those "sure things" that some wise one forecasted some time before the show, and was foolish enough to pass it on to the papers and some other exhibitors. The Airedale "Midland Romulus" (not Oceleus, but while on that subject, where did they get the "eus" in the word) did not, but he is a better dog than I was led to believe he was, from his performance at Port Arthur. I cannot understand how he was beaten there, as I saw the dogs that beat him, here. The article appearing in one of our papers recently, to the effect that the cause was in one of our leading Collie men having been knocking the dog, would appear to be correct. I have not seen any denial of this item. But, surely this Collie man would not dare to approach the judge to be, in this manner. And would that judge listen to such talk? You got one raw deal "Pete," in any event, but I could have told you of this before the dogs left Winnipeg for the show. It was common property (I heard it from three different sources), "that Mr. Harry Ruttan's dog had to win, as Harry was beginning to take an interest in C. K. C. matters, and they wanted to hold him." Harry's best dog might not have got it, but it was one of them, and not being the best, it gave more color to the report. Did the same Collie man "butt in" on the Bostons. I like that dog Opie Dildock, and he looks much the best of those that were reported to be at Port Arthur.

One of our local papers reported the Bull bitch, Kitty Karnation, as being reserve for best dog in show at Toronto Exhibition. In looking over the awards of that show I noted that she did not even get best of her own breed. She got it here also. What was the "official fixer" doing to let this go by? This started those "good things" going wrong and the howl began. But you cannot shake the Hon. James. What a busy bunch they were.

And where were all those good Collies of the most prominent and noted Western breeders? Both winners ribbons left Winnipeg. "The father of the fancy." Poor father, your dope is bad medicine. Roll over, you're on your back. Your claim to have put other breeders in the fancy is not backed up, unless, unknowingly, you let the good ones go.

When the winners ribbon went to Chinook Courtenay Coronet, old Rip Van Winkle looked over the ring and said, "that is Good Shot." The man beside him replied, "Good nothing,



unless it is good night." And when the winners ribbon for bitches for the same breed, went to the same kennel, oh, calamity! It was a most popular win from the amount of applause from the ringside.

You were warned beforehand, Doc., as to what you were going to get.

This is the second time they gave it to you. You may take a tumble after awhile.

The Collie bitch, Seedley Smile, was a disappointment, and by no means up to the standard that newspaper reports led us to believe she would be. I could name three local bitches (not shown here), that can beat her. Ch. Imera Whyzetta can beat her easily.

But where were all those champions, the St. Bernard, the Fox Terrier, the Boston and the Collie? Hereby hangs a tale (or tail).

#### WINNIPEG KENNEL CLUB SHOW

The Winnipeg Kennel Club held a show in the Convention Hall of the Industrial Bureau on October 13th-16th. Mr. James Mortimer judged all breeds.

This is the first show under C. K. C. rules which has been held in Winnipeg for several years and it is unfortunate that the great efforts of the promoters were not rewarded by better results, both as regards entries and quality of the dogs benched. Indeed it must be frankly admitted that the dogs, as a whole, were just about the most mediocre lot ever benched in this city, while the number benched, in spite of a car from Toronto in charge of Bert Swann, fell short of what was expected by at least 200 dogs.

Under the circumstances we feel rather reluctant to criticise the management of the show, but there are one or two matters to which it is probably as well to draw attention.

In the first place, it is only a few months ago since "Oceus" writing in the Kennel and Bench offered some criticisms on the management of the show held under D. K. C. rules by the Western Canada Kennel Club. Indeed so awful (in "Oceus'" opinion) was the management of that show that poor "Oceus" was almost "moved to tears." One of his strong objections was that the benching was too close together. Now this gentleman is a prominent official of the Winnipeg Kennel Club and when I visited the upper end of the Convention Hall and tried to pass along the benches I thought to myself "Goodness: if 'Oceus' comes along here it's going to be a deluge." Where was the necessity of crowding the benching in this way. The number of dogs to be benched must have been known a week beforehand, still although the hall could easily accommodate 500 dogs it was practically impossible to pass along the Toy section. Perhaps "Oceus" has now a higher opinion of the management who benched at least 100 more dogs in a very considerably smaller building. I might also say that the custom of allowing

dogs not entered to be taken into the show and kept there at the owners pleasure without veterinary inspection of any kind is not one to be recommended. Again, I imagine it is a distinct breach of C. K. C. rules to take entries for puppies under six months old and bench them in the ordinary way. There were at least two puppies in one breed the age of which could not have been more than four months as they still retained all their milk teeth. The owner of these puppies says he entered them as 4½ months old but the date of their birth is given in the catalogue as April 7th, 1914.

Another point that I would like to mention is that the Superintendent of a show should not be allowed to act as handler in the ring, especially of his own dogs. No doubt as the C. K. C. Secretary was present he will have something to say on these matters.

Well, to get to the dogs. The championship of the show was rightly awarded to the Collie, Parbold Picaroon, with reserve to the Bulldog, Chinook Courtney Coronet. It was a close tussle between these two dogs and it took Mr. Mortimer quite a little time to make up his mind. Special for the best sporting dog went to the Airdale Moorside Rock, a lucky win. Reserve to the Greyhound Master Butcher. It seemed to me that the Russian Wolfhound, Ch. Genest, should have been in the fight.

In the larger breeds the quality of the exhibits was poor with the exception of the Russian mentioned above. In Pointers and Setters—usually very strong classes—the entry totalled 19, as against nearly 80 at the summer show and the quality was very poor. This of course is accounted for by the fact that practically all the prominent fanciers in the West are strong adherents of the D. K. C. and refused to exhibit under C. K. C. rules. There is really no criticism to offer on these breeds.

Airdales were a fair entry but the quality was not what we are accustomed to see at Winnipeg Shows. The winning dog was Moorside Rock, a good showman but he is dished in face and short in head. I thought him lucky to beat Midland Romulus, who is longer in head and good in coat and color. Neither, however, are well off in bone or good in front or feet. The soundest Airedale on view was Woodhall Bobs but he was shown much too fat and has gone thick in skull. Caerphilly General, 2nd in limit, is a stylish dog but gone badly in shoulder and poor in color. Thunder Bay, 3rd in limit, I do not like and much prefer Kingsway Mack, a stylish little dog who just requires a little better finish of foreface.

I think the kindest thing I can do regarding the bitches is to write them down as "fair sorts." They were just Airdales.

In Irish Water Spaniels there were two typical ones on view from Edmont. Cocker, I venture to say, was the worst entry ever seen at a show in Winnipeg. The winner in Black dogs, Durbar Donald, was very

fortunate in not meeting any competition. One of our local would-be critics describes him as "superfine texture of coat and beautiful hang of tail." Well I will let it go at that. Bitches (Black) were no better than the dog but parti-colors showed a little improvement but here again the only competitor was F. Gorth.

With the exception of the winning dog in Collies the quality was "way down." Parbold Picaroon is a real nice dog shown in good condition but he seemed to me rather listless in the ring. Sceptre, who took reserve winners, is an eight months puppy of considerable promise. Weston Emperor was not mentioned in despatches.

In bitches the winner, Seedley Smile, was lucky to have no serious competitor as she was completely out of coat.

English Bulldogs brought out a few good specimens. The Chinook Kennels, Lethbridge, captured both winners classes with Courtney Coronet and Tenacity. These dogs are usually handled by Jack Fletcher but as Jack was unable to act at this show he had to content himself with getting the dogs into the best possible shape and their owner travelled to Winnipeg to handle them personally. In open dogs, Courtney Coronet, 1st, is a sound, typical specimen, very good in body—big ribs—nice depth of brisket, tremendous skull and active as a Terrier; 2nd, Trafford Bill, another nice dog, loses to winner in length of body and is not so good in skull. 3rd, Moston Marshall, is well known and was a close third. Good Shot was outclassed. In bitches we expected to see something real good and we did see it but not the one expected. The winner was the young fawn bitch, Chinook Tenacity, a real Bulldog from "stem to stern." When fully matured it will take something hot to stop her, she was an easy winner over the much-boasted Kitty Karnation. Personally I cannot see much good in her and she strikes me as being considerable of a "flat catcher." I looked in vain for that beautiful "pear-shaped body"—poor Mr. Mortimer—I understand he is never to get another chance!! However, the majority of people will probably take the opinion of an acknowledged expert before that of a newspaper critic.

Fox Terriers, Smooth, were very moderate and the entries of several of the largest local kennels were sadly missed. The winning dog, Madison Magnet, is just a fair sort, full size, longish in back and bad in feet. The only decent wire on view was Leeds Waltz Dream.

Boston Terriers made a very decent showing and I was glad to have the pleasure of looking over that sweet little bitch, Ch. Bright Eyes IV. She is certainly worthy of her title. The winning dog, Ingram's Little Man is a nice little dog but not up to the class of the bitch. Mr. Mortimer withheld winners in Irish Terriers which is a fair indication of their quality.

In Greyhounds, Master Butcher had a bloodless victory. He is a nice dog, but we doubt his ability to live in keen competition. He does not seem to cover sufficient ground.

Poms were a good entry and some nice specimens were on view. The winning dog, King of the Sables, is a very stylish sable—we would like to see him of a darker shade and not so wide in front. Still he is very typical.

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#### COCKERS AT WINNIPEG.

My visit to the show happened to be on the evening of the first day of opening and as there were no catalogues at hand I was somewhat handicapped as to the names of some of the dogs benched, so will have to content myself with a general review of the breed, and as I believe a fair criticism on any breed is an education, I feel sure the respective owners of the dogs reviewed will not take offense at my remarks on their dogs. I may say here that I think it unfair to throw bouquets when they are not deserving as it oft times makes an amateur think he has a better specimen than he has, thereby misleading him, or her, as the case may be. In this brief report I have aimed to do justice to all dogs regardless as to who may own them.

The first of this grand old breed was the puppy class, which brought two Black dogs, glorying in the names of Father Face and Towser, and as their names would imply they were not flyers and our old friend James Mortimer took one look at them, re-adjusted his spectacles, took one more look and promptly gave the order of the gate. These were closely followed by Durbar Donald and Tip I. The judge refused to take the Tip, in fact he followed very closely on the heels of the before mentioned knights of the gate, thus leaving the bold Durbar Donald the sole occupant of the ring, and much to my surprise Mr. Mortimer gave him first, but I suppose he thought he would have to start handing the ribbons out sometime and might as well hand one to Donald as not. The only claim he could lay to being a Cocker was in his color, but when it comes down to Cocker he was a long way out. To start with he was fully five pounds over weight but this was a matter of small importance at this show as there were no scales in the ring during the judging of Cockers, and as a suggestion, judging by the long backs of some of the Cockers there, a three foot rule would have helped some, in fact some of them looked like long coated Dachshunde. But I am getting away from my story. To get back to the said Durbar Donald, as I can find very little good in him to write about I will pass on to the next class, which contained two in Manitoba Minnie and Trixie L. Manitoba Minnie far too small and light in eye and bone. Trixie L., well Mr. Editor, she looked like Trixie L., and we will pass her up. She was lucky to be alone in novice, limit and



open. The next three classes had no entries at all. I was beginning to think I had seen the last of the bunch of poor Cockers when open dogs, A. O. S. C., was called. In walked Ch. Blazer, another lone competitor, being alone in his class. While not being a flyer, he was the best I had seen up to that time, but he is showing age and is very thick in skull and shoulder. Next class found no entries, with only one in the next in Peerless Red Bell, by Calmo Billy, out of Manitoba Bessie, and I think she must have got all her bad qualities from her sire for Bell, like Calmo Billy, was not a good one by any means. Limit bitches, A. O. S. C., than Black. 1st, Alberta Rose, a nice type of brood bitch but out of place on the show bench. Open bitches, Manitoba Corette, this is quite a favorite of mine, having once owned her, but has gone past her show days. She is good in body, coat and color but has not got a Cocker head. 2nd, Alberta Rose, already mentioned. Novice dogs, parti-colored, only two here, in Manitoba Victor and Jimmie Bennett, the first named being quite the best of two poor ones, but at that he is far too long in leg and body, with a fair head and eye. Limit dogs, Jimmie Bennett. Open dogs, parti-color, 1st Ch. Manitoba Swift, who stood out from the rest by a big margin, in fact quite the best Cocker on the bench, but could be improved in skull and shoulder put down in good form; 2nd, Jimmie Bennett. Puppy bitches, parti-color, 1st Manitoba Darling, the only entry, she is on the small side, sweet head, fair body but bad in front. Novice bitches brought out Golden Freckles. As her name would imply she is a golden and white, very attractive, but lacking type and quality. Open bitches, parti-color, 1st Black Hawk Fairy, good coat and color, nice body but wrong in head and front.

This brought to a close the classes of the poorest lot of Cockers I have ever seen on the show bench. I am afraid you will think by my criticism that I have been a little severe on this breed but in my opinion, with the exception of Ch. Manitoba Swift, Ch. Blazer and perhaps Black Hawk Fairy, the balance of the Cockers shown at this fixture were quite out of place on the show bench, but there is one thing to be said for this poor showing of the western Cockers and that is that the best Cockers owned in Winnipeg were not shown at this show. In blacks alone I have in mind five champions, in fact we missed such good ones as Ch. Brookdale Blossom, Ch. Deer Park Junetta, Ch. Black Bess, Ch. Major Oak I., Ch. Silver Obo. In fact could mention several parti-colored and reds that might have been benched. For my own part I am looking forward to the time when there will be no East and no West and the fanciers of Canada will join together with one aim in view, and that is, the betterment and advancement of their respective breeds.

Yours for a good Cocker—no coercion—and good fellowship.

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#### BULLDOGS AT WINNIPEG.

Bulldogs were about the feature of the show. In point of numbers there were not so many but the quality, taken as a whole, was excellent throughout. Some new faces were forward, but the old favorites more than held their own. In the puppies there were only two forward, and these were only very mediocre specimens. Novice dogs and bitches were not very much better, but the open classes light and heavyweights, dogs and bitches, were keenly contested.

In the open dogs, four faced the judge, and without hesitation he put Chinook Courtenay Coronet at the head, and this award was well merited. This dog has not had a very brilliant ring career in Canada, but how some judges can put him down is very hard to understand. He is a dog of outstanding merit, and one very hard to fault. If he had a little more sweep of underjaw, and probably a little more bone, he would almost be styled a "perfect Bulldog." He is a low cloddy dog, wonderful front, perfect ears, and has the best expression of any dog being shown in this class today. He was awarded reserve to the Grand Champion of the show, the Collie, Parbold Picaroon, and if the judge had awarded the other way, it would not have been surprising as the Bulldog is just as perfect a specimen of his breed as the Collie. Trafford Bill was placed second, after some hesitation with Moston Marshall a very close third. If it were not for the unavoidable traces of old age the latter dog would undoubtedly have scored second, but he was not quite sound, and the judge decided in favor of the younger dog. Both are first-class specimens of the breed, and worthy of a place in any show ring. The home bred one, Good Shot, was V. H. C. and a very creditable product. He has wonderful development for a young dog.

Bitches were a first rate show, keen competition in every class. In the light weights Kitty Karnation, a new importation of an enterprising fancier, easily won. She is a very useful type, low to ground, perhaps a little rough in head, which makes her expression not quite true to type, but otherwise a splendid specimen. Chinook Queen and Tilly Clenan fought it out for second place, but as the little red fawn Queen was a little off color she lost out. Both are very useful bitches, and little to choose between them. In the over 40 lbs. class, Chinook Tenacity had a walk over, as she is without doubt the best headed bitch being shown in Canada to-day and with a little more condition and age she will develop into a wonderful specimen. She is only fourteen months old, and was shown in very lean condition, but at that she was quite worthy of being given the winners ticket over Kitty Karnation, although the latter was shown in the pink of condition—very fit. This award seemed to be very popular with the crowd, as it seemed like the meeting of Champions, as both bitches have recently been imported from England, where both have enviable records.

#### COLLIES AT WINNIPEG.

On the whole they were far below par in quality and numbers, save Parbold Picaroon, owned by Dr. C. Y. Ford, who was in a class by himself and rightly deserved his winnings, including championship of the show. He is a fine upstanding specimen, nice in head and expression, nice small eyes well placed, well coated with plenty of frill and good brush, good legs and feet, plenty of bone, nice spring of ribs, good mover, a well balanced Collie that will make his presence felt anywhere.

The winning bitch, Seedley Smile, owned by Dr. Petit, got home with ease. She is a good old "has been," but cannot repeat the same performance in fast company. A big disappointment was Weston Emperor, who was lucky not to get the gate.

Mr. James Mortimer handled this breed in his usual painstaking way, and his judging was most acceptable and left no room for criticism.

## THUNDER BAY KENNEL CLUB SHOW.

### Report by the Judge

The dog show held in connection with the fair of the Twin Cities, Port Arthur and Fort William, was a grand success, and being held under C. K. C. rules brought out a good entry, and above all a number of Canada's best dogs. The show throughout was clean and well managed. Below is a review of the breeds that were well represented. Airedales reigned supreme for a large entry, there being 24 dogs benched which took some careful judging to select the winners. In some of the classes it was just a case where they could not all win. Open class in dogs brought out 12 entries, 1st went to H. A. Ruttan's Caerphilly Thunder Bay, a grand type of Airedale and shown to perfection, a dog that is hard to find fault with, has good bone, good coat and a good clean cut head, could be a little better in ears; 2nd went to G. T. Holmes' Red Rock, another good type of Airedale, but loses to the winner in skull and coat, but a good showy dog; 3rd went to Peter Ross' Midland Romulus, a grand showy dog, put down in fine condition, had he more bone he could have done better. Winners, Caerphilly Thunder Bay. Reserve winners, Red Rock. Open bitches in Airedales was another good class and brought out some classy type, there being seven entries and most all of them good type. 1st went to S. C. Taylor's Elmwood Illustrious, a grand type of Airedale, good bone, good coat, and finished off with a good long head of the proper type, and a good shower; 2nd went to Dr. R. W. Kenney's Betty Sharp, another good type and gave the winner a very close call, but did not show so well. To reverse the decision would do no great harm. 3rd went to S. S. Naylor's Woodland Gipsy, a good type and made a good third but did not show quite so good a coat and lacked expression. Winners, Betty Sharp.

Collies brought out another large entry being next to Airedales and

there were some hot classes. Another case where they could not all win, although some of them fairly begged for the ribbons and showed more love for one another than did the Airedales, and by the tossing of shavings by Mr. Picard and Mr. Village they all managed to keep their ears in proper style. The open class in dogs was a class that would do justice to any show ring and a class where the ribbons would only go half way around, as there were six dogs in the class. 1st went to W. Bartlett's Corona Cyclone, a good big sable and white, good bone, good head and fairly good coat, and above all a dog that shows well in the ring; 2nd Geo. Gerrard's Napoleon, another sable and white dog that made a good second, and a dog that can make the best of them travel to pass him for honors. Could stand a little more foreface. 3rd went to Weston Emperor, of the Weston Collie Kennels, a Collie of the correct type, good bone and was much the best in coat in the class, but lost to the above mentioned dogs in skull and eyes. Winners, Corona Cyclone. Reserve Napoleon. Collie bitches not quite so strong as dogs, but showed some fairly good type, winners going to J. D. Strachan's Coltness St. Mary, a good sized sable and white with good bone, good head, good ears, but could stand more coat and ribs. Being quite a young bitch no doubt with age, will make a great showing. Reserve to F. McDonald's Tinie, a good showy young bitch that does justice to her age, being only eight months old, no better could be expected.

Fox Terriers were well represented, they came third in number benched and there were some real Fox Terriers of the proper type, the winners in dogs going to Rustem Sutton, of the Sutton Kennels. He is one of the finest type of Fox Terriers, a dog that has no glaring faults, being well ribbed up, good deep chest, good legs, well tucked up loins, good ears, good coat and the real expression. Re-

serve winners, J. Slater's Slater's Jack, another good type of Fox Terrier of the same class, but loses to the winner in chest, stifles and foreface. Bitches not so well represented but there was some real type, the winners in bitches going to S. C. Taylor's Texas Sutton, a real classy bitch and a good shower. Could stand a little more rib, but she can make the best of them go some for the ribbons. Reserve winners going to Madison Arabella II., of Madison's Kennels, a good, showy, young bitch, the making of a good show bitch, but too young to compete against the winner. Among the other notable Fox Terriers that graced the bench was Ch. Arabella Madison of the Madison Kennels, which was entered for specials only. Wire Fox Terriers brought out but one entry, Madison's Dare Devil, a good type.

Pointers were another great credit to the show and brought out some grand specimens. The open class of dogs was a real class of Pointers, 1st going to Joe. Bright's Great Sport, a good showy Pointer, but a little bit on the heavy order, but has no glaring faults and was put down in much the best condition of any dog in the class. 2nd J. Kenyon's Gunsmith, another fine type of Pointer, and had he been in a little better shape no doubt would have taken first. A dog when put down in proper condition can show with the best of them. 3rd Dr. C. E. Johnston's Ch. Yuma Tonti, a dog that is too well known to need any introduction, but owing to his just returning from field trial was in no condition for the show ring, and as show dogs should be in show condition could not be placed higher. Winners going to Great Sport. Reserve, Gunsmith. Bitches not so many in number but brought out a pair of classy ones. Winners going to Dr. Johnston's Ozark Belle, a grand young bitch that does credit to her sire, Ch. Yuma Tonti, and with time to shape up no doubt will put Ch. before her name. Reserve winners to R. W. Abraham's Kant Tango Tonti, another nice young bitch, and a good shower.

Cocker Spaniels brought out some real showy type. Heading the list came Manitoba Swift, another dog that is too well known to need any comment, and a dog that only needs to be shown to win in his class. He went from winners to the best sporting dog in the show. His kennel mate, Corette, a grand red bitch made another good showing and added to her list of wins by taking highest honors in bitches. In Black Cockers, Percy E. Dunn's Dunbrae Nora Obo, took highest honors, defeating every Black Cocker in the show and gave the Red bitch a close call for highest honors.

Boston Terriers brought out some nice stuff, a fairly good number being benched, the winners in dogs going to Geo. A. Huston's Ch. Opi Dildock. This was one of the real Boston type as he has shown many times, and they will have to bring out some of their best champions to beat him, although in this show he showed



quite a little stiffness in one leg, which went a long way to help his defeat when he came up against S. C. Taylor's Little Pearl for the best Boston in the show. Little Pearl surely is all Boston and fit to show against any Boston her weight that they can bring out. If she has any faults it surely would take an expert on Bostons to find them.

Bulldogs brought out but two, but they were of the real British type. Trafford's Kitty Karnation took the highest honors over all bitches in the show and finished up with the grand championship. Kitty is a grand specimen of the British Bulldog, and one that is hard to find fault with. She is one of the real low-to-the-ground type, and with plenty of bone, spread and rib, and a head that scarcely could be improved on. Next in Bulls came Good Shot, owned by F. Goodman, another good type of Bulldog, and a good shower. Good Shot is a good heavy weight, brindle and white dog that would do credit to any kennel. He is a good heavy boned dog, with a grand spread and good barrel, ribs and a good head, could stand a little more width of under jaw, but a good, vigorous, young dog. Another notable dog that attracted attention was the St. Bernard, Ch. Pedro, of the Sutton Kennels, a dog that is too well known to need comment. Pedro took special for best dog in show.

## VANCOUVER SHOW NOTES.

By "Coastguard."

The Vancouver Exhibition Association Dog Show was held on September 7th, 8th and 9th in the new dog building at Hastings Park. The building is large, light and well ventilated and easily accommodated the 264 dogs that were present.

It was the largest show of dogs ever benched by the Association, and the largest ever held in the building. Show was held under D. K. C. rules. In the spring the T. C. K. C. held a show in same building under C. K. C. rules when only 210 dogs were benched. Mr. R. Thompson of Calgary, judged all breeds excepting Bostons and there were few kicks. Those most severe were in Pomeranians, for none of the Coast fanciers could follow the judge in that breed. The least said of the gentleman that judged Bostons may be better for all concerned. Nobody on this continent had ever heard of him as a judge, breeder or exhibitor. He had about twelve Bostons to pass on and during that time gave ribbons to two dogs with docked tails and reversed his decisions in two classes with only three dogs in each class.

Mr. J. E. Owens was Superintendent, but somehow things in general did not go right from start to finish, but thanks to a well known fancier who was in no way connected with the show, gave a helping hand and

therefore the show was run better than it would have been.

The Bulldogs, Ch. Mersey Pilot and Ch. Coronet, and the Airedale, Ch. Clipstone First Shot, all from Winnipeg, were much admired and many of the oldest fanciers stated that either of the Bulldogs was far ahead of anything ever seen in B.C., and that the Airedale was the king of all Terriers ever benched in the North West. At this show quite a few notable breeders joined the D. K. C., a few of them being: (Pointers) Mr. Jack Wolfenden of Victoria, B.C.; (Fox Terriers) Miss M. Winsloe of Victoria, B.C.; (Cockers) Ronald Gamwell, Bellingham, Wash., U.S.A.; (Airedale and Fox) Mr. and Mrs. Cocksedge, Whonock, B.C.; (Setters) W. P. Anderson, Bellingham; (Collies) Colin F. Jackson, North Vancouver, B.C.; (Setters) J. E. Owens, Vancouver, B.C.; (Airedales) A. E. Harris, Vancouver, B.C.; (Fox Terriers) Mrs. G. O. Alsen, Vancouver, B.C.; (Airedales) Theed Pearce, Vancouver, B.C.; (Fox Terriers) A. Turquand, Vancouver, B.C.

Best dog in show was won by Ch. Clipstone First Shot. Reserve, Ch. Mersey Pilot.

J. E. Owens won Spratts' Challenge Cup, value \$125. This cup had to be won three times by same person, but not necessarily by same dog.

The Vancouver Kennel Club (Inc.), offered three cups, members only, and they were won by: Mr. J. Simpson's Pom, Beauty, for best Toy. Mr. E. E. Langford's O. E. Sheepdog, Ch. Sir Alex, for best non-sporting. Mrs. O. G. Alsen's Wire Haired Fox Terrier, First Attempt, for best Sporting.

Dr. T. Glendon Moody exhibited one Boston Terrier, viz., Miss Charming, who won special for best bitch in show.

The Bull Terrier, Ch. Dorian Grey, who is seven and one-half years old, won cup for best in show defeating the local dog, Ch. Edgecote Colin, and two champions from Winnipeg.

# FRAE BONNIE SCOTLAND

No greater authority can be found on the Scottish Sheepdog than James Hogg, the Ettrick shepherd, and many amusing incidents are told by him of their doings. He tells us that no species of animals are so varied in their natures and propensities as the shepherd's dog, and these qualities are preserved intact in the same breed from generation to generation. For example he tells us of his uncle, John Hoy's breed of Sheepdogs which excelled at gathering wide out, that is to say they would carefully gather all the sheep on a hillside together when quite out of reach of their master's command, but they were not so good at close work or what is known as hand work.

Hoy's dogs were known all over the country as excelling in hirsle running, as Hogg himself states, "often have I stood with astonishment at seeing him standing on the top of one hill, and Tub, as he called an excellent snow white bitch that he had, gathering the head of a hope or glen quite out of her master's sight, while all she heard of him was now and then the echo of his voice, or whistle, from another hill. Yet from the direction of that echo she gathered the whole flock of sheep with perfect acuteness and punctuality.

John Hoy had a very clever bitch called Nimble, and the following incident is told of her sagacity. One drift day in the seventy-four, after gathering the ewes on Chapelhope, he found that he wanted about one hundred of them. He again betook himself to the heights and sought for them the whole day without success and then began to suspect that they were covered over with snow in some ravine. Towards evening it cleared up a little and as a last resource he sent away Nimble. She had found the scent of them on the hill while her master was looking for them, but not having received orders to bring them she had not the means of communicating the knowledge she possessed. But as soon as John gave her the gathering word she went away, he said, like an arrow out of a bow, and in less than five minutes he beheld her at about a mile's distance bringing them round a hill called the Middle, cocking her tail behind them and apparently very happy at having got the opportunity of terminating her master's disquietude with so much ease.

This summer on more than one occasion it was our privilege to witness the work of the Scottish Sheepdog in the Hogg country, and we would say to our Canadian fellow fanciers if you are interested in working Sheepdogs when you visit the Scott country don't forget Ettrick and Yarrow. A day amongst the high hills and a short conversation with the lonely shepherd will be something you will always look back on with pleasure.

Death has removed a good border yeoman in the person of Mr. John Riddell, of Rink Selkirk, one of the

oldest dog fanciers in Scotland. He was a great follower of the Sheepdogs, both at work and exhibition and in the dogs of Ch. Rutland and Mitchley Wonder, owned some real good ones. Latterly he interested himself more in Dandies and all his stock were of the working stamp, and still he bred some of the very best such as Ch. Ellwyn Belle, Ellwyn Blossom, Ellwyn Daisy, etc.

Never do we pass along the Greyfriars district of Edinburgh without looking at the statue to the most noble of all dogs, Greyfriars Babby, who for nine long years lived in all weather in the old church yard of Greyfriars. So much devoted was he to his old master that he was not happy away from his graveyard. It is a most interesting subject to discuss because there is quite a number of people still living who have clear recollections of the little Scottish Terrier. One of the friends to this hero has passed away in the person of Mrs. Traill, the widow of Mr. Traill who occupied the small but popular restaurant at the corner of Forest Rd., and Babby was one of their most regular customers. When rheumatism developed so bad in the faithful dog, Mrs. Traill was the lady who carried his food to the graveyard and cared for him in his dying hours. She was a big hearted Scotch woman, and loved little Babby.

The want of dog shows in England falls heavy on many handlers, trainers and others, but they are not whining or complaining, all are playing the game, but the consoling thought is that they are out to win and while there is great difficulties, without such there would be no victories.

Bearded Collies and Dandie Dinmonts are wanted just now to act as companions and watch dogs in our homes through the long dark nights of winter. Their rugged and shaggy appearance is enough for evil doers, and worse than all their powerful jaws with the sharp set of ivory teeth are not to be desired.

A very good Dandie Dinmont has gone out to a Canadian homestead from the Ellwyn Kennels. He is not a show dog but a demon on gophers, and can guard the homestead in a way by which only a Dandie can do.

Mr. William Aitken of Montreal, instructed his friend Mr. Alex. Telfer, Edinburgh, to ship him a good Scottish Terrier, and last Saturday there sailed from Glasgow on the Letitia, that good son of Ch. Lightnavarlock, Teviotside Tinker, which was so successfully exhibited by his breeder, Mr. John Maxwell of Kelso, at many of our leading shows, gained honors such as Glasgow, Carlisle, Kelso, Jedburgh and Ayr, where he won the breeder's cup.

Tinker has sired some promising young stock and should prove a pillar

to the Scottish Terrier fancy in Canada.

Fanciers in the old country, like their fellow fanciers of Canada, are not shirking their duty in this terrible crisis. They go into battle with a light heart. The other day while passing along the docks at Leith we met a company of regulars and territorialists en route for shipment. They were singing that very inspiring war song, "It's a Long Way to Tipperary." Amongst them were fanciers we knew and we await their return. But one thing we know, whatever happens they can be depended on to do their duty even unto death.

News of battle is anxiously awaited, crowds of people stand about the street corners with anxious faces in every city, town and village, everyone is trying to do something for his country and dog fanciers are doing their best. When shows cannot be held lectures are given, illustrated by lime light views, and the proceeds are handed over to the Relief Fund. We heard that the Ayr Fanciers Club after their lecture handed a very handsome sum over, and we are not surprised knowing as we do the very patriotic spirit which abounds in the west.

Mr. Simbert of Restalrig, Leith, an old Collie fancier, has just had a visit from his son now settled in Canada, and who is speaking highly of the country of his adoption and says there are great openings for dogs in the new world, and as the country matures dog fanciers will increase. He sailed from Glasgow on Saturday per Letitia, taking care of his old friend "Bill" Aitkens' "Diehard," Teviotside Tinker, on the voyage.

Our Dogs' National Relief Fund amounts to £364. There is every prospect that the Caledonian Kennel Club will hold a show in Edinburgh on New Year's Day.

## COLLIE RECORDS.

Editor Canadian Kennel Gazette:

I have read with much interest and not a little amusement, an article headed "Correction," in the Winnipeg Tribune of September 28th, and in which the writer, H. Leslie, states that an apology is due to two Collie Kennels, viz., The Weston Collie Kennels and the Corona, for publishing an article in which the Imera Collie Kennels were alluded to as Canada's Premier Collie Kennels. As owner of the Imera Collie Kennels may I be permitted to make a few remarks as to the article in question. In the first place, I did not write the original article to which the correction refers. It was written by a well known doggy man who writes for some of the kennel papers. Where Mr. Leslie got his copy is none of my business. The correction does not appear to be much of an apology as there are so many errors as to facts, that it takes on the appearance of having been dictated by some one who was looking for "cheap advertisement." Tom Milner, of the Weston Collie Kennels, gets quite a little share of the advertising, but it is well when boasting one's self to stick to facts, as they are matters of record, and well known. The Weston Collie Kennels claim to have bred three Champion Collies, while the Imera Kennel have only bred one in Champion Imera Peacock, their other champion, Imera Whyzetta having been imported. The statement, so far as the Imera Kennels is concerned, is quite correct, and I have never claimed otherwise. The claim of the Weston Kennels is quite different. The claim is not made as to whether they were "cheese champions" or otherwise. That is not the idea of the article. Their records will show whether they were worthy of the prefix or not. We will start off with Ch. Weston Queen O' Quality. This bitch is now dead, and as it is bad form to speak ill of

the dead, we will say she was a good one, notwithstanding the fact that the writer witnessed her handed the order of the gate, followed by another from the same kennels, under one of England's greatest Judges, Mr. Theo. Marples. I never agreed with Mr. Bert Swann's criticism of her in one of the Toronto papers and in his statement that she should be home watching her master's sheep. The point I wished to get at is did the Weston Kennels breed her and as is so stated in the Stud Books. I understand that the breeder, is the owner or lessee of the dam at the time she was bred. It is a known fact that the dam, Ormskirk Fanny, was bought, in whelp to Ormskirk Foxall, from Mr. Thos. Stretch. Fanny whelped in transit some place between Montreal and Winnipeg and Queen O' Quality was one of the puppies. It looks to me as if Mr. Stretch was the breeder.

The next claim is a championship on Riverview Quality. I can only find a record of her having got just half way to the honor and it is the other half that counts. This brings the claim down to one, in Weston All Quality, and he is welcome to all the glory and honor in having bred this one. Ch. Imera Whyzetta beat Ch. Weston All Quality on three consecutive occasions and under three prominent judges. Had the article stopped with the claims for champions it might not have appeared so ridiculous. Mr. Tom Milner claims to have put me into the fancy by selling me Ormskirk Fanny. This transaction only took place four years ago and I am in a position to prove that I have been breeding Collies for the past eighteen years. Mr. Milner's memory is bad and needs a little refreshing. In July, 1908, I exhibited at the Winnipeg Exhibition, under Mr. James Cole, of Kansas City. My entry, Imera Victor and Imera Conqueror had an easy time defeating the best the Weston Collie Kennels could produce, including the imported dog, Ormskirk Admiral. I am not looking for notoriety so will not mention the number of times since then, that results have been the same. My only object in writing this is to correct a wrong impression.
