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

In this number we publish in full the Application for Incorporation, Constitution, By-laws and the Certificate of Incorporation of the Canadian Kennel Club under the "Live Stock Record Act" of the Dominion of Canada. The object of this Act is to nationalize all records of live stock under one association in order to avoid confusion, duplication and friction, and in such an important matter as pedigrees of pure bred stock the wisdom of this is very apparent.

The Canadian Kennel Club investigated the advisability of this proposed move last August and immediately decided to seek incorporation. This was a long process, occupying many months, in fact, the Certificate of Incorporation was not granted until the fifteenth of last month. The reason of this was in order that the Constitution, By-laws

and Rules of the Canadian Kennel Club should be modified and altered to conform with those of the National Live Stock Record Board. It might well be understood, the above board have had a very extensive and varied experience in such matters, as under their government are some dozen or more other associations covering horses, cattle, sheep and swine, and from their experience many of our rules were changed to be more workable and more exact. Some rules we were asked to adopt in order to conform with those of other associations, and we readily did so, though they were hardly in accordance with our ideas. In consequence of these many changes, the constitution had to be amended and altered many times, even after it was thought to be acceptable to all parties.

It should be pointed out at the beginning that it is only for a regulation of records that we are incorporated. That means chiefly registrations and membership. Our show rules are entirely our own, and not in the incorporation. It is also important to note that only one Kennel Club can be incorporated under the Live Stock Record Act, and that anyone disqualified by any association under this Act is debarred from all the others and all their privileges.

One of the first rules is the hardest of all to accept, being that of membership. It states: "Members shall be those persons, resident in Canada," which appears to prohibit many good members in the United States, but we are assured that it will not be enforced against those who are members at present, and it is hoped that some way

will be found to overcome the prohibition entirely. The chief intention of the rule is that no one outside of Canada may held office. The rules of membership are very definite. To leave the club a resignation is required. Non-payment of membership dues removes every right and privilege of the club, such as points towards a championship cup, or such specials as the club offers to members, and the subsequent payment of dues does not restore the rights or privileges won during the period in arrears.

A member cannot restore himself into good standing at anytime by rejoining and paying his dues, but must also pay up all his arrears. It all simply comes down to a business principle of requiring a resignation from a member on leaving the club, and the prompt payment in advance of membership dues.

The change of the year of the Club to the calendar year is done in order to be uniform with the other associations. It will necessitate the four last months of this year being added to 1916 and the collection of a fee of \$4.00 from the members for the sixteen months of 1916.

It will be observed that the name Executive Committee has been changed to Board of Directors. The composition of the Board of Directors has been increased to twenty-two in order to allow a larger representation to the Western Provinces, and yet not to so reduce the number as to make a quorum at meetings in Toronto improbable.

The registration of dogs may seem complicated until understood, but in reality it will be the same as at present only that applications will go direct to Ottawa and be returned to the owner of the dog. Of course, they may be sent to the office of the Canadian Kennel Club to be forwarded to the Record Board at Ottawa. The form of certificate used will be most complete, as it will contain the full pedigree of the dog and be officially stamped. Membership applications should, however, be sent to the Kennel Club to be first passed on by the Club, though, as in the case of registration, they may be sent to the Record Board at Ottawa, who will, of course, only issue a receipt and send the application on to the Club for approval. All applications for transfer will also be sent to Ottawa, as well as applications for certificates.

The only other changes of any moment are in the fees. These were made on the recommendation of the special sub-committee of the Canadian Kennel Club. It is very evident from the general increase in prices that the Club must look for more revenue, both to meet the increased expenditure and to keep a proper balance on hand, therefore the changes recommended by the committee were incorporated in the constitution and by-laws. These have been made in such a way as to be least felt by the members, namely, the doubling of all fees to non-members. The

desire is not to increase the fees to anyone, but to increase the membership to such proportions as to make the club self-sustaining, and by leaving the annual membership fee at the original modest amount, it is hoped to attain this desired result.

The result of the incorporation will be far-reaching. The value of registration and membership in the Canadian Kennel Club will be trebled. In registrations the very close scrutiny of the Record Board will make the Canadian Kennel Club Stud Book the most exact and authentic Stud Book in existence, and the only one under Government supervision. In membership the incorporation will doubly protect members from liability, fraud or irregular and unfair opposition. The Canadian Kennel Club, and therefore Canadian dogdom, will profit by a stability impossible under any other conditions than the present. The great wonder is that the Club were so slow in finding out the advantages of such an incorporation. It should have taken advantage of it years ago.

Other changes have been made in the Show Rules, on the recommendation of the special committee on finances. The first requires that the number of a registered dog must be given in the catalogue, also that it must be registered in the name of the exhibitor. The means that the dog must be transferred to the exhibitor. This will be a deterrent to the practice of lending dogs and will greatly facilitate the checking of catalogues.

The rule for winning championship cups by a member has been amended by the additional stipulation that the owner of the dog must be a member of three years' standing, though in order to comply with this rule he may pay his membership fees in advance. Under the present system it is obvious that a championship cup may be won in one year with the payment of one year's membership fee only. It is to eliminate this unsportsmanlike possibility this amendment has been introduced.

Finally a system of fines have been established to enforce the proper carrying out of the show rules. The proper proceeding under the present rules would be disqualification of the dog for these technical breaches, but it is considered that in most cases they are pure carelessness and not intended to defraud, therefore a nominal fine would be a sufficient deterrent. The object is not to collect the fine, but to lessen carelessness.

CONSTITUTION AND RULES OF ENTRY.

THE CANADIAN KENNEL CLUB.

APPLICATION FOR INCORPORA-TION.

WE, THE UNDERSIGNED, hereby make application for incorporation as an Association or Club under the Live Stock Pedigree Act.

THE NAME of the Association is to be:

"THE CANADIAN KENNEL CLUB."
THE OBJECTS for which the Association is to be formed are:

- (1) To keep a record of the pedigrees of Dogs;
- (2) To collect, preserve and publish data, information and documents relating to Dogs;
- (3) To encourage the breeding of pure bred dogs in Canada and to protect the interests of owners and breeders, to make grants to dog shows and field trials and competitions, and in such other ways as it may seem fit, en-

courage, guide and advance the welfare of dogs and their owners.

The Constitution and By-laws of the Club, are as follows:

Name.

1. The Club shall be "THE CANA-DIAN KENNEL CLUB."

Objects.

- 2. The objects of the Club shall be:
- To keep a record of the pedigrees of Dogs;
- (2) To collect, preserve and publish data, information and documents relating to Dogs;
- (3) To encourage the breeding of pure bred dogs in Canada and to protect the interests of owners and breeders, to make grants to dog shows and field trials and competitions, and in such other ways as it may seem fit, encourage, guide and advance the welfare of dogs and their owners.

Members.

- 3. (a) Members shall be those persons, resident in Canada, who pay an annual membership fee of \$3.00 on or before the first day of January of each year, in advance.
- (b) Application for membership shall be made in writing to the Secretary, accompanied by the requisite fee, who shall then submit the same to the next ensuing meeting of the Executive Committee to be voted upon. Voting shall be by ballot. Two-thirds of the votes of the members present must be in favor of the applicant before he can be elected.
- (c) All partners of a kennel must be separately members of the Club in order that the kennel may be recognized and have the privileges of membership.
- (d) All members shall as a matter of contract and except as hereinafter provided enjoy the same rights and privileges and be subject to the same liabilities as if each had signed the application for incorporation of this Club,

- or this Constitution as amended from time to time.
- (e) No member who is in arrears for membership or other dues shall enjoy such rights and privileges.
- (f) The liability of each member shall be limited to the amount of membership or other fees or dues which he may owe to the Club.
- (g) Any member may, provided he is not in arrears for membership or other fees or dues, at any time withdraw from and terminate his membership in the Club by giving the Accountant of the National Live Stock Records three months' notice in writing of his intention so to do.
- (h) If any member shall be in arrears for membership or other fees or dues for a period of three years, the Board of Directors may terminate his membership in the Club by resolution, a notice of which shall be mailed to him at his last known post-office address as on record in the books of the Club, but any member whose membership is so terminated, shall not again become a member unless arrears owing at time membership was terminated, are paid.
- (i) Each member of the Club shall receive, free of charge, publications which are issued during each year of his membership, for which he has paid the membership fee.
- (j) No member shall hold office or be entitled to vote at a meeting if at the time in arrears for membership fees
- (k) The Directors shall have full power by a vote of those present at any of its meetings to suspend, disqualify or expel for improper conduct any person, whether a member of the Club or not, and the person so suspended, disqualified or expelled, shall have no claim against the Club, or be allowed to enter into any competition held under the rules of this Club. Such person shall have the right to appeal to the Club from the action of the Directors at the annual meeting, or any special meeting, provided notice of appeal has been given to the Directors. Suspension, disqualification or expulsion shall be either for a definite period, or for life; and the person thus suspended, disqualified or expelled shall be reinstated only on application to the
- (1) Anyone having personal knowledge of the facts, may prefer charges of improper conduct against any individual. The person making such

- charges must send them in writing to the Secretary-Treasurer of the Club. The charges thus forwarded must be accompanied by a deposit of \$5.00, as a guarantee of good faith, for each charge preferred, which shall be retained should the charges be deemed on investigation to be frivolous or malicious. In the case of non-members, a fee of \$1.00 shall be charged for investigation.
- (m) Any person suspended, disqualified or expellel in accordance with the provisions of Section (k) of this bylaw shall be debarred from all privileges of the Club, including registration;
- (n) Any person expelled from membership by any other Association incorporated under the Live Stock Pedigree Act, shall be ineligible for membership in this Club and if he is a member at the time of such expulsion, his membership shall thereupon forthwith terminate automatically, subject to appeal to the Club.

Offices.

4. The Head Office of the Club shall be at Toronto and the Office for the registration of pedigrees shall be the office of the National Live Stock Records, in the City of Ottawa, Ontario, under the supervision of the Record Committee of the National Live Stock Record Board.

Fiscal Year.

The fiscal year of the Club shall correspond with the calendar year.

Officers.

- 6. The officers of the Club shall be a President, a First and a Second Vice-President, and one Vice-President for each Province, and Secretary-Treasurer, all of whom, with the exception of the Secretary-Treasurer, shall be annually elected as hereinafter set forth, and shall hold office for one year or until their successors shall be elected.
- (2) The Board of Directors shall consist of the officers named (except Secretary and Treasurer) and twenty-two other members, elected at the same time and in the same manner, of which two members who are residents in such Province, shall be elected as representatives for each of the Provinces of Manitoba, Saskatchewan, Alberta and British Columbia. It shall convene in September during the time of the Dog Show held in connection with the Canadian National Exposition, and in January, April and June, at such time and place as shall be nominated by the

Board of Directors, and as often besides as may be deemed necessary at the call of the President, or the written request of six members of the Board of Directors.

- (3) The Board of Directors shall exercise a general supervision over all the activities and affairs of the Club, and shall have, in addition to the powers specifically granted herein, full authority to take any action which in their opinion is advisable or necessary in order to carry out the objects set out in By-law 2, Sec. (3) of this constitution.
- (4) All candidates for office must be nominated by a member in good standing.

Nominations shall be made in writing and sent addressed to the Secretary, to be in his hands on or before August 1st.

When the nominations are closed, a ballot slip showing the nominations for officers and Board of Directors shall be sent by registered mail to each member, with instructions to return same to the Secretary. All ballots must be mailed to members at least twenty-one days before the annual meeting.

All ballots must be sent to the Secretary, and be in his hands before the first day of September.

Ballots shall be returned in a specially printed envelope; marked "Ballot," to be supplied by the Club, and shall be counted at the Annual Meeting, and result of elections announced. All ballots must bear the initials of the Secretary-Treasurer.

In case of a tie vote, the tie shall be decided by a majority vote of the members present at the annual meeting.

- (5) The Board of Directors shall have power to fill vacancies for the unexpired terms.
- (6) An Honorary Solicitor, Honorary Veterinary Surgeon and Auditors shall be elected at the annual meeting without previous nomination.
- (7) The President shall order all meetings of the Club and Board of Directors, except as hereinbefore provided, and when possible preside at the same. He shall see that the affairs of the Club are managed according to the terms and spirit of the Constitution, By-laws and Rules; and shall at the annual meeting report on the working of the Club during the past year.

(8) The First Vice-President, or one of the other Vice-Presidents, shall perform all the duties of the President in his absence.

(9) The Secretary-Treasurer shall keep the Minutes of all meetings of the Club and the Board of Directors, conduct the correspondence and have charge of and be responsible for all the books and papers of the Club, collect all fees, and deposit same in a chartered bank to the credit of The Canadian Kennel Club, or forward the same to the Accountant, National Live Stock Association, as hereinafter provided. He shall submit a report of the general financial standing of the Club at each ordinary meeting of the Board of Directors.

The Secretary-Treasurer shall submit at each annual meeting a financial report, up to the 31st of December of that year, which report shall be duly audited and certified to be correct. He shall also submit at the same time a report of the general condition of the Club.

He shall keep a record of the names and addresses of all members of the Club. He shall furnish a Guarantee Company's bond to an amount satisfactory to the Board of Directors, at the expense of the Club. His remuneration shall be fixed and determined upon by the Board of Directors.

- (10) All accounts shall be submitted to the President or his duly authorized representative by the Secretary-Treasurer for inspection and approval, and shall be paid by cheque signed by the Secretary-Treasurer and countersigned by the President or his duly authorized representative, and a complete report thereof shall be submitted to the next meeting of the Directorate.
- (11) The National Live Stock Record Committee shall assign to this Club a person to act as Registrar, and fix his remuneration at such reasonable sum as may be proportionate with that of Registrars acting for other Association in affiliation with the Canadian National Live Stock Records.

The duties of the Registrar shall be: To keep the Pedigree Register of the Club, to enter therein all pedigrees and transfers in such form as may be determined upon, to sign all certificates of registration and keep a record of the same and to perform any other duties or work in connection with this Club as may be directed by the said Record Committee.

Pedigree Committee.

(12) The President, Secretary-Treasurer and the Registrar shall be a Committee whose duties shall be to adjudicate all questions of eligibility of animals for registration. Their decision if unanimous shall be final, otherwise the question shall be submitted to the Directors for decision. Each decision of the Committee shall be reported to the Directors at the next meeting thereafter.

Examining Committee.

(13) The Directors may from time to time as occasion may require, appoint two members of the Club who shall during the time for which they are so appointed be an Examining Committee who shall examine and report on all imported animals for the registration of which application is made.

Auditor.

(14) The Club at each General Annual Meeting shall appoint an Auditor and fix his remuneration. His duties shall be to examine the books of account of the Club, vouchers for all payments and present the usual Report thereon to the next General Annual Meeting, accompanying his Report with a detailed statement of assets and liabilities and receipts and expenditures for the year.

Representatives.

(15) Delegates to the National Live Stock Record Board shall be appointed , by the Directors.

Meetings.

- (1) The annual meeting shall be held at such time and place as shall be appointed by the Board of Directors.
- (2) At the written request of twenty members, the President shall call a special meeting of the Club. Twenty shall be a quorum at a general or special meeting.
- (3) Notice of all general meetings shall be given in the official organ of the Club, or by special notice to each member, published or posted at least twenty-one days before date of such meeting. At least ten full days' notice shall be given by mail to each member of the Board of Directors.

Expenses, Income and Property.

8. The income and property of the Club, from whatever source derived, shall be applied solely toward the promotion and furtherance of the objects of the Club and no part thereof shall be paid or transferred directly or indirectly by way of bonus or otherwise as profit or gain to members past, pres-

ent or future of the Club or to any person claiming through any member; provided, however, that nothing herein contained shall prevent the bona fide payment of remuneration, to any Secretary, Treasurer, Registrar, Editor, Officer, Clerk, Servant or other person or persons for services actually rendered the Club whether such are members of the Club or not; and the expenses of the Directors or other officers incurred in doing the business of the Club.

Amendments.

9. The Constitution and By-laws of this Club may be amended at any general or annual meeting of the Club, provided notice of the proposed change is given in the official organ of the Club, or by special notice to each member, published or posted at least twenty-one days before the date of such meeting, and provided also that twothirds of the members present at the meeting in person vote in favor of the amendment, and no amendments shall be valid until approved by the Minister of Agriculture for Canada and filed at the Dominion Department of Agriculture.

Registration and Membership Fees.

- 10. (1) All membership and registration fees shall be paid in cash to the Accountant, National Live Stock Records, and shall forthwith be deposited by him to the credit of this Club in a chartered bank arranged with by the Record Committee of the National Live Stock Record Board.
- (2) In case membership fees to the Club are received by the Secretary-Treasurer of this Club they shall be immediately forwarded to the Accountant, National Live Stock Records, Ottawa, for such deposit.

Corporate Seal.

11. The Seal as stamped in the margin hereof shall be the Corporate Seal of the Club.

Registration of Pedigrees.

- 12. (1) A Register shall be kept at the office of the National Live Stock Records. This Register, to be known as the Canadian Kennel Club Stud Book, shall contain a copy of the Constitution and may be examined by any member on demand on any business day during business hours.
- (2) There shall be delivered to every person recording an animal a certificate of registration in such form as may be decided by the Directors.

- (3) All certificates of registration shall be submitted for the approval of the officer appointed for that purpose by the Minister of Agriculture, and shall not be issued until so approved;
- (4) Stud Books shall be published at such time and in such form as decided by the Directors.
- (5) Any person expelled from membership shall not be allowed the privilege of recording pedigrees on the Books of the Club.
- (6) Any member in arrears of membership fees shall not be allowed the privilege of recording pedigrees on the Books of the Club at non-members rates.
- (7) Any member prohibited from recording pedigrees by any other Association incorporated under the Live Stock Pedigree Act shall not be allowed to record pedigrees in The Canadian Kennel Club Stud Book.
- (8) The Club may allow the prefix "Champion" to be recorded and used in the Stud Book Record and Pedigree Certificate of any dog which has become entitled to the use thereof by winning at the bench shows authorized by the Club and held and conducted in accordance with such rules and regulations as may be laid down from time to time in that behalf by the Club, such number of points or such prizes as according to such rules and regulations entitle it to the use of such prefix.

Such application must be made on the form supplied.

A dog already registered in the English Kennel Club Stud Book may be registered with only two generations of pedigree, provided the application is otherwise complete and the applicant submits the registration certificate from the English Kennel Club.

- (2) No dog which is already registered in the English Kennel Club or American Kennel Club Stud Book, shall be registered in the Canadian Kennel Club Stud Book under any other name than that under which it is already so registered.
- (3) The registered name of any dog may be changed on payment of a fee of \$5.00, subject to Sec. (2). Provided that if the application for change is received during the fiscal year of the Canadian Kennel Club in which the original registration was made, the fee shall be reduced to \$2.00.

Pees and Privileges of Membership.

- 14. The following fees shall be charged:
- (1) Annual membership fee \$3.00, payable in advance.
- (2) (a) Cost of registration \$1.00 each. One free each year to each member.
 - (b) Cost of listing, 25c each show.
 - (c) Fee for search of pedigree, 25c.
 - (d) Copy of pedigree, 50c.
 - (e) Transfer of registration, 25c.
- (f) Registration of prefix, affix, and kennel name, \$3.00. Annual renewal of same, 50c.
- (g) Transfer of prefix, affix and kennel name, \$3.00.
 - (h) Duplicate of certificate, 25c.
- (i) Certificate for kennel licence, \$1.00.
- (j) Any other certificate or search,

The above fees (2) are for members in good standing only. To non-members they will be double in every case.

(3) A fee of \$1.00 to cover average cost is charged for the investigation of each complaint not arising out of misconduct of shows, held under Canadian Kennel Club Rules. No charge is made to members.

- (4) Failure to renew prefix or kennel name shall involve the cancellation of the registration of same, but no prefix or kennel name so cancelled shall be re-registered until after the expiration of ten years from the date of such cancellation. At any time during the said period of ten years the person or persons in whose name or names the registration stood at the time of cancellation may re-register the said prefix or kennel name on payment of all arrears of renewal fees.
- (5) The Annual Stud Book shall be supplied free to members.

EXECUTIVE MEETING OF THE CANADIAN KENNEL CLUB.

The meeting was held in the offices of the Club at 8 p.m. on May 5, 1915.

Mr. John G. Kent, the President, in the chair.

There were present at the meeting Messrs. Barron, Bingham, Jacobi, Jeffrey, Ormsby.

The Secretary read the minutes of the last meeting, which were confirmed.

Moved by Mr. Barron, seconded by Mr. Jeffrey, that Mr. D. G. Macdonell, of Vancouver, be reinstated as his name had been used as having acted in an official capacity at the Vancouver Kennel Club Show without his authority.—
Carried.

Communications were read regarding the disqualification of A. F. Hochwalt, from the American Kennel Club.

Moved by Mr. Jacobi, seconded by Mr. Jeffrey, that the Secretary write to the American Kennel Club, stating that, in view of the suggestion of the American Kennel Club that Mr. Hochwalt be reinstated by the Canadian Kennel Club, if Mr. Hochwalt make application to the Canadian Kennel Club for reinstatement in order that this Club may have it on record, his application will be entertained.—Carried.

The Committee on Finance reported and recommended the following changes in the By-laws:

Fees, Privileges and Membership.

- 14 (d) Copy of pedigree, 50c.
- (i) Certificate for kennel licence, \$1.
- (j) Any other certificate or search, 50 cents.

The above fees (2) are for members in good standing only. To non-members they will ge double in every case.

Dog Show Rules.

3. Last sentence to read, "If the dog is already registered in the Canadian Kennel Club Stud Book, the Stud Book number of the dog must be given with the entry, and the dog must be registered in the name of the exhibitor.

XV.—6th. — Paragraph concerning winners points to end "he shall be entitled to a championship cup if his owner be a member in good standing for three years. In order to comply with the latter condition, owners may pay their annual dues in advance."

V.-There shall be a fine of \$1.00 each for all technical errors (unless fraud is obvious) in entries at Dog Shows. These errors shall consist of: Failure to give Stud Book number of registered dog, or for giving the wrong number of a registered dog; for giving a wrong pedigree; for giving a wrong name of breeder; for giving the wrong date of birth; when the name of the dog exhibited differs from that under which it was registered; when the name of the exhibitor differs from that under which it was registered; but exhibitors must abide by any errors in entries in respect to class or sex.

Moved by Mr. Jacobi, seconded by Mr. Barron, that the report of the Committee on Finance be amended as above and adopted.—Carried. The Secretary read the following report of the Pacific Advisory Board:

"As the result of the Board's investigations in this matter they beg to report as follows:

"That W. W. Hocken in consideration of the sum of \$5 furnished to Jas. Folsetter a pedigree to the Airedale Terrier 'Briar Performer,' knowing the pedigree to be a false pedigree, and fully realizing the nature of the offence.

"That James Folsetter accepted the said pedigree and made use of it for the purpose of registering the dog Briar Performer,' knowing the same to be false, but being a novice in the game and not fully realizing his offence, a lenient view might be taken of his case.

"The Pacific Advisory Board recommend for the consideration of the Executive Committee of the C. K. C. the following resolution: In the case of W. W. Hocken, that he be suspended from entering, exhibiting, judging, acting as agent, or handler for an exhibitor or taking a dog into the ring at any show, or be connected in any capacity with dog shows held under C. K. C. Rules, such suspension, however, to be removed immediately upon the said James Folsetter returning to the C. K. C. the certificate of registration of 'Briar Performer,' No. 15311, undertaking when exhibiting 'Briar Performer' again to enter him 'pedigree unknown,' and tendering to the C. K. C. an apology for his action in this mat-

The report of the Pacific Advisory Board was confirmed and adopted.

The report of the committee on amalgamation of the Dominion Kennel Club with the Canadian Kennel Club was read and discussed. It was moved by Mr. Jeffrey, seconded by Mr. Barron, that the Canadian Kennel Club having submitted their Constitution, By-laws and Rules to the Department of Agriculture and received letters of incorporation embodying said Constitution, By-laws and Rules, it is now impossible, in view of said incorporation to vary this Act, and further, the Canadian Kennel Club understood that the Dominion Kennel Club would fall in line.-Carried.

NOTES & NEWS FROM ENGLAND.

The determination of Mr. Cruft to prove that the panic with which dog owners seemed to be struck on the declaration of war has not affected him, has met with its just and due reward. His proof that he had confidence in the "doggy" public took the shape of "keeping on" with the show at the Royal Agricultural Hall, London, which he established in "another place." just thirty years ago, and though not getting all the guarantees against loss which were asked for-and, not unnaturally, expected after his experiences in previous years-he has secured the enormous aggregate of 3440 for the show, which took place on the 10th, 11th and 12th of February last. Apart from that of the Kennel Club, Cruft's is the one dog show in the United Kingdom which runs into a third day, and being held in so easily-reached a place as the Royal Agricultural Hall, an excellent opportunity is provided for the London and suburban lover of the dog to study his favorite variety at his leisure during the evening. The World's Fair, which had provided amusement for North Londoners since Christmas, attracted the largest crowds ever seen at the above hall up to within a few days of the date of Cruft's Show. The entries were as follows: Bloodhounds 56 Borzois 36, Bulldogs 204, Chow Chows 71, Collies 120, Dachshunds, 58, Dalmatians 44, Deerhounds 57, French Bulldogs 31, Great Danes 135, Greyhounds 27, Griffons Bruxellois 39, Irish Wolfhounds 10. Italian Greyhounds 2, Japanese 32, Maltese 29, Mastiffs 32, Newfoundlands 35. Pekingese 86, Pointers 25, Pomeranians 123, Poodles 54, Pugs 56, Retrievers 249, Samoyedes 19, Schipperkes 31, Old English Sheepdogs 37, Setters 71, Shetland Sheepdogs 39, Spaniels 191, Spaniel Toys 36, Airedale Terriers 128,

Bedlington Terriers 41, Black and Tan Terriers 24, Bull Terriers 56, Cairn Terriers 94, Fox Terriers 326, Irish Terriers 65, Scottish Terriers 113, Sealyham Terriers 122, Welsh Terriers 48, West Highland White Terriers 127, Working Terriers 2, Yorkshire Terriers 48, Whippets 34, Foreign dogs 18, Gamekeepers' classes 80, Heroes 16, Variety classes 21, Auction 40. The general quality of the exhibits was as good as in former years. Amongst the interested spectators from the colonies was Mr. Ivor G. Tredway, a member of the Calcutta Kennel Club. whose predilection are Fox Terriers, I believe.

Canine heroes have been found accommodation once again, and it is pleasing to know that among the celebrities included in Messrs. Spratt's Canine Heroes' League was "Lassie," the cross-bred sheep dog, whose praises have been so persistently and deservedly sung for the part she took in saving the life of Cowan (A.B.), of the Royal Fleet Reserve, one of the crew of H.M. S. "Formidable," which was sunk on New Year's Day off Lyme Regis. Cowan was placed on the floor of the Pilot Boat Hotel, Lyme Regis, believed to be dead from exposure, all efforts to restore him, after he had been lifted out of the boat, having apparently failed. All he had on was a thin pair of pants and a vest, and he had passed through all his terrible experience in this meagre dress for about twenty-two hours. As he lay there, unconscious and unattended-for he had every appearance of being far beyond attention-"Lassie" came on the scene and laid alongside the lad's body. She showed great uneasiness and began licking Cowan's face. This went on for quite half an hour, when a movement of the body and signs of joy on the part of "Lassie" attracted the notice of one of the attendants, and it was seen that the warmth of the dog's body against Cowan's heart and the constant licking of his face had induced circulation. Without a doubt the conduct of the sagacious animal saved the lad's life. "Lassie" had quite a "levee" at Cruft's Show, and attention has also been paid to "Tony," a Berger de Malines, the type of dog used in the French and Belgian armies in the field.

The sale by auction is reserved for the last day of the show, and though the bulk of the class awards was completed on the first day, there was quite a full programme on the second day, for not only are the entries in the wellfilled gamekeepers' section to be judged, but the numerous valuable special prizes were to be awarded in the large ring in the main body of the hall by a judicial jury. Though most of the sporting groups were as representative as ever, it cannot be doubted that gundogs and terriers formed the backbone of the show, and it must be some time since such magnificent groups of the latter were seen in public. The section formed close on one-third of the entire show, Fox Terriers alone making an aggregate of 326, while Sealyhams, now so popular among men who refuse to allow their terriers to eat the bread of idleness, number 122, a total only exceeded in the same section by Airedales (128) and West Highland White Terriers (127). However, to be hypercritical, I must say that the general quality of the Fox Terriers, especially of the smooth males, was not very good. The progress made by the hardy product of West Wales is remarkable, but the entry of 94 Cairns proves that the position is being strongly assailed by the plucky Highlander of the old type. The Retriever and Spaniel entries are another gratifying proof that the show retains the support of the sporting public even in these troublesome times, and it is especially gratifying to find patrons of field trials among the shooting men and women who sent dogs to Cruft's. In one word, "Charlie" Cruft has no reason to com-

On the 17th, 18th and 19th of February was run the Waterloo Cup, at Altear, near Liverpool, and the winner of the cup was "Winning Number," the property of Sir Thomas Dewar, by Lottery ex Shady, a fawn dog, with plenty of style and form. The winners of the Purse and Plate respectively. were: Jules Mumm, the property of Mr. Jones, by Beaded Brow ex Tipula, a fawn dog puppy, and False Forecast, the property of Mr. Fawcett, by Friendly Foe ex Penso, a fawn dog puppy. To be quite correct, I should say that the above two puppies divided the Purse and Plate respectively with Martini, a brindle dog puppy, by Heavy Weapon ex Mark Up, the property of Mr. Mevall, and Harmonicon. also a brindle dog puppy, by Heavy Weapon, out of Camorra, property of Mr. Hulton. Winning Number had been purchased by Sir Thomas Dewar at a sale of the late Mr. Peterson's Greyhounds for 280 guineas. The dog weighs 62 lbs. and was entered at last year's Waterloo Cup, but did not run on account of the death of Mr. Paterson. This winner's trainer is Denny Smith, who had also turned out Heavy Weapon and Hung Well, so that Smith has surely established a record, having turned out three Waterloo Cup winners within five years.

A very interesting and sympathetic dog show took place in London on the 9th of February last; it was the show of the Griffon Bruxellois, with about 200 entries, in aid of the Belgian Refugees' Fund. It was a very successful show, and the support was, of course, a very deserving one.

After having spent about five months at the front in France, with the British expeditionary force, as sergeantinterpreter and motor car driver attached to the 8th Division, Ammunition Park, I returned home very ill after the severe hardships I had undergone at the front, but, feeling better now and never forgetting my old friend, the dog. I again grasp the pen, or rather, the typewriter, in order as before to regularly chat with the readers of this journal. Of course, as heretofore, I shall again be very pleased to execute commissions for purchasing and shipping dogs of all breeds, and in view of this terrible war, I think that purchases could now be effected at prices below those that existed before the

Notwithstanding the war and the very troublous times we and our gallant allies are passing through, England is as keen on dogs as she ever was before, especially as far as dog shows are concerned, and were it not that several of the prominent buildings in London had been taken up as hospitals, concentration camps for the alien enemies, for troops, etc., we would have even more shows in London. With regard to our ally, France, they do not seem to have either forgotten the dog, in view of the number of purchasing orders that continue to reach us. The only drawbacks consist in the difficulties to ship dogs to France, for the railways there, having been taken over by the military authorities, cannot always undertake the regular "safe transport of dogs," but even this can be overcome, with "patience and work," as the Russians have it. Our friend, the dog, has proven himself very useful in this war, for Red Cross

work, in the British, French and German armies in the field, and this work done by the dog forms very interesting reading. First of all, let me, however, as in former years, acquaint your readers with the tendencies of breeding which prevailed in England during the year 1914, and in this respect I cannot do better than to quote the "Kennel Gazette," the official organ of our Kennel Club, so ably conducted by Mr. Jaquet:

"BASSET HOUNDS (Mr. A. Croxton Smith) .- So little change is apparent in the position of this fine little hound that my remarks in last year's retrospect might very well be Queen Alexandra, with repeated. praiseworthy constancy, goes on breeding them at Sandringham, producing medium-sized hounds on sound legs and feet. Her Majesty also owns a few stylish roughs, notably for their wellbalanced proportions, and soundness. With these somewhat perfunctory remarks the purely exhibition side of the breed may be dismissed, and the outlook might well make one despair if the thought of the various hare-hunting packs did not bring some consolation. Some masters prefer the little hound, while others swear by those of medium size. It is again a case of many men, many minds. Of one thing I am convinced-the big hounds are of the utmost value for stock purposes, considering the tendency of the Basset to lose size.

"FLAT-FOOTED RETRIEVERS -(Mr. J. Beaumont-Neilson) .- The past year has certainly been an uneventful one. I cannot recall having seen any new faces of great merit on the show bench. Challenge certificates having on several occasions been won by dogs long past their prime. In Scotland the flat-coats seem to have been almost entirely superseded by Labradors. The majority of gamekeepers are naturally going in for Labradors, the latter being the most saleable commodity. On enquiring the reason of the change, I am nearly always told that the flat-coats are too soft, and cannot stand a hard day's work. I cannot say that this has been my experience, although the appalling amount of inbreeding that has gone on for some years was bound to have a bad effect on the breed, both in brains and stamina. That excellent rule that no dog can become a champion without gaining a working certificate has not yet had time to bear fruit, but I am glad to think that we shall no longer see the unbroken champion Retriever advertised at stud, though, of course, according to the owner, had he been broken, he would have been a topper. I am glad to see that the over-sized dog now stands little chance of winning when judged by an expert, the short, compact one, with a strong jaw of no exaggerated length, being the type, I imagine, most of us are trying to breed.

"MASTIFFS. (Mr. W. K. Taunton). -There is, unfortunately, very little of interest to place on record concerning Mastiffs of the past year. Little encouragement has been offered to Mastiff owners to extend their breeding operations on account of the difficulty experienced by many in disposing of their stock, especially during the last six months, although in the early part of the year there was a fair demand for puppies. Nevertheless, it is satisfactory to note that there are signs of the Mastiff regaining its former position in public favor. I have noted with regret an increasing number of Mastiff's on the show bench with weak pasterns and bad feet. In some instances this may be a fault in the individual dog, but in others I am inclined to think that it is hereditary and that if enquiries were to be made it would be found that more than one or two of the dog's ancestors had the same fault.

"OLD ENGLISH SHEEPDOGS (Mr. H. A. Tilley).—1914 has again seen advances made in the Old English Sheepdog. Breeders and exhibitors have been striving with increased energy to obtain a higher level and more general consistency in the breed, and with marked success. One has noticed with satisfaction how the big coarse houndy specimens have almost completely disappeared, but it is doubtful if the color and coat one sees are all they should be.

"SHETLAND SHEEPDOGS. (Miss Beryl Thynee). — In 1914 Shetland Sheepdogs made great progress, both in numbers and type. Also many new people have taken up the breed. There is a lot of room for improvement, both in type and looks. I think the best are now in the south of England and not in Scotland. Fifteen inches is the ideal height.

"YORKSHIRE TERRIERS. (Mr. Wm. Shaw).—The Yorkshire Terrier,

like all other breeds, has not been able to gain quite so much prominence during the latter part of 1914, owing chiefly to the dearth of exhibitions. doubt competition will be very keen, interesting and exciting during the spring and summer of 1915, when we refer and think back to our important exhibitions, latter end of 1913, and in the early peaceful period of 1914, we well remember many promising young specimens of great promise, not quite sufficiently developed in coat, color, etc., when more matured had every appearance of keeping well to the fore the required type."

"I shall continue the retrospects in my next letter.

Before closing, I must mention that while at the front in France I met several well-known dog fanciers in the British expeditionary force, now serving as officers, privates, etc. Notwithstanding the many terrible hardships some of them had to undergo, notwithstanding the little time they could, even in thought, give their friend, the dog, we contrived to have some chats about dog shows, about breeding, etc., so that one can safely say, "Once a dog fancier, always a dog fancier."

A CHARITY SHOW CONTINUED. Chas. H. Mason.

Cocker Spaniels in their total entry, are third or second at the W.K.C. Show, when they have a strong judge, and at the latest W.K.C. show they were fifth, whereas at the Charity they tumbled to ninth and came near being twelfth. Location figures some at the small shows, but at the big ones it is the judge, as a rule, that is responsible for the entry. I did not think the Bulldogs at this show were good. The bitches were better than the dogs as a rule. French Bulldogs were only six below W.K.C., which showed confidence in the ability of Mrs. Malcolm Strauss, as Frenchies are usually remarkably strong at the old show.

I must not forget the variety classes, which were judged by two judges, with a third as referee. The arrangement is a very stupid one and leads to loss of time and argument without any compensating result. All classes at dog shows should be judged by one or by three judges, and variety classes, which serve no good purpose, should be wiped from the list. There were several grave errors of judgment, the result no doubt

of a craze for terriers over everything in sight. In variety classes and unclassified specials, the prize should go to the dog most nearly approaching the standard of its breed. One would imagine from awards during the past ten years or so that nothing approached perfection excepting a terrier, which indicates that big prices and newspaper reports count for much more than actual merit in the dogs or knowledge in the judges.

DOGS AND DOG OWNERS. By Charles H. Mason.

In my report of Sporting Spaniels at New York there appears the statement that in sporting dogs a faulty mouth is not a cardinal defect. If the reader will remember that this should be "sporting spaniels" instead of "sporting dogs," no harm will be done and that, of course, is what I intended writing. A defective mouth is a serious failing in dogs that have to punish or to draw and many of these dogs are included in the sporting division.

I notice also in your columns of the March issue of Kennel and Bench that you had received news of "the death of Mr. James Watson, at the age of 63 years." Our news purveyors of the present time, with few exceptions, know very little about kennel history, or the pedigrees of kennel men, and you owe it to your readers, I think, to accept their "news" cum grano salis. Unless you do this I fear Kennel and Bench will gradually work into the same rut and condition as the majority of our papers in the States. Mr. Watson, I believe, was in his seventy-fifth year.

There is a great deal of the unvarnished truth in your remarks, anent the judging of Bull Terriers in the United States, and especially where you said, "In the United States they have peculiar ways, among others it is common for a clique to get possession of a specialty club and make the standard to fit their own dogs." This is exactly what was done, but the trouble came when it was found that in time the dogs didn't fit either the new standard, made to order, nor the old standards, which aimed at perfection, nor was it possible to keep on changing the standards as the dogs changed, because if this were done they would need a standard factory and the hands would be kept working overtime and Sundays as

The cliques in charge of the specialty clubs will not offer their prizes unless they can have a judge who will give their dogs the prizes, hence, to get the prizes for the shows, the managers practically agree to return them to the club bosses when they accept their judge! This is one of the choice features of the "system" that the writer has done much in exposing and, if Kennel and Bench will help all the time—not just when Canadians and their dogs are the victims—the "system" will have to go and, in fact, it is going now.

The most amusing bit of news I have for you is that one of the specialty clubs is out with a list of judges which contains the name of a blind man! When I say a blind man, I do not mean a man who can find neither the good nor the bad points in a dog. I mean a man actually blind, so blind that he has to be led around by a nurse! Whether this is to introduce the system of judging by touch I cannot say at present and yet I believe that such a novel feature might increase the size of the "gate," which, of course, is of paramount importance.

Perhaps you will understand how easy it is to find men who are willing to ignore standards when by doing so they can "judge!"

As to Dalmatians winning in the Bull Terrier class—a mere nothing, Doctor! I asked one of our "judges" who was judging Dalmatians, what colour their ears ought to be and he said "Why, I suppose they ought to be black!" And why then should not our Bull Terrier judges be permitted to suppose that Bull Terriers ought to be black and white or any other old color?

I am pleased to be able to assure you that Mr. Hark's splendid Cocker Spaniel bitch puppy that did so well at New York in February, and which was absent from the Charity Show and reported down with distemper, is rapidly recovering. Her owner advises me that the attack was a mild one and that the bitch was never off her feed, thus is one of the grandest little dogs ever seen on a show bench, saved, and I hope all of you may get a look at her one of these days. We can't afford to lose that sort.

THE COLLIE CLUB OF AMERICA.

Open Letter to Its Members.

March 31, 1915.

The Executive Committee of the Collie Club of America recognizes that if the club is to occupy the position which it formerly held it needs not only new blood, but the assistance of its old and former members.

It is not necessary to go far into history to establish sufficient cause for the dropping out of some of our older members and for a lack of enthusiasm among those who have remained. The active management has been modified. Executive Committee meetings will be held in Boston instead of New York and a serious attempt will be made to make it, as it should be, the Collie Club of America, and not of any one section.

The Committee recognizes that in the past history of the club there is much that is good, worthy of respect and retention; also a good deal which is bad and which should only be remembered long enough to be dropped and then forgotten. The Committee assumes the right to inherit all that is good and develop it, as it does to reject that which has been cheap, selfish or bad and forget it.

The Committee is willing to assume the responsibility for a safe, conservative and accurate management, but the success of that management will depend largely upon the response of its old members to its call for interest and service. Will you not forget that which has been unsatisfactory and unwholesome in the recent past and join with your Committee in putting the club where it belongs?

The Collie, perhaps more than any other breed, stands for unselfish devotion and is not easily turned aside by obstacles or unpleasant conditions in its path. You have been the recipient of this devotion. Do you not owe something to the Collie which you can never entirely pay? Is not the Collie worthy of a national Club which stands among Dog Clubs for what the Collie stands in the home? Your Committee believes that the Collie is worthy of all that we can give it and for that reason that it has the right to call upon you for your attention, your assistance and your advice.

In order that it might be made easy for our wandering members to return, the Committee has voted that all of those whose names appear on the Club book published in 1912 and who have since that time withdrawn, should be returned to active membership simply by the payment of dues for the current year. If you have dropped out, we want you to come back. If you have not, we want you to continue and whichever may be the case we want an expression from you of your ideas and some advice as to what can be done in your district to increase the strength of the Club and to further the interests of the Collie.

The Committee wish to have it perfectly clear that in bringing the Executive meetings to Boston there is no intention of making such an arrangement permanent. As a matter of fact we should at least partially fail in our efforts if the active control of the Club permanently rested in Boston. At this particular emergency there were a number of Collie men in and about Boston who were willing and glad to help the Club and give it a start upward. It is hoped that during the next two years the interest in Collies will have so far developed that in some centre, whether in the West or the South or the North, there will be a number of enthusiastic. well-balanced men who will be willing to take the work off our shoulders and carry it on for a time and then pass the pleasure and responsibility on to another group in another location.

Your Committee believe that in this way the Club will become a real national organization, and a power for good along the lines for which it was created.

Dear Dr.,—Would kindly request that you give this publication in the coming issue of "Kennel and Bench":

I notice in your March issue an article headed, "Review for 1914, Balance of Breeds in New Brunswick." Now I take the class, Fox Terriers (smooth). Since when has New Brunswick, Nova Scotia or probably Cape Breton, been dumped into our little but fertile Province of New Brunswick? I have now reference to the Mr. G. S. Jackson, called our (New Brunswick's) most successful breeder of smooth Fox Terriers;

so, therefore, now mention his dogs, viz.: The bitch Nigger, the dogs Clapton Strike, Eloree Ruler, Blue Nose Billy and John Halifax; of these dogs Blue Nose Billy is now owned by Miss Kaye of St. John, N.B., also is John Halifax owned by Mrs. R. L. Johnston of our town, of course, Mr. Jackson having the honor of being their breeder.

Not wishing, Doctor, to further encroach upon yours and other Kennel and Bench fanciers' time, but would they, just here, kindly note Judge Charles H. Mason's report on the sixth annual show of the New Brunswick Kennel Club, of which I have the honor to be a member, held here in September last, and said to be our most successful show yet. It was as follows: Smoothcoated Fox Terriers were quite up to the average, but the wires were a very indifferent lot. Bad heads, eyes and coats were prominent features in their make-up. Eloree Ruler, first in smooth dogs, limit, open and winners, may be heard from again, and so may Oxford Nemo; that is also a good sort, albeit not in the shape of the winner. Blue Nose Billy was a good third, although on the leg and not very good in front of the eyes. "Moledo Midge" had little to beat in her classes.

Of the dogs above mentioned, "Moledo Midge," which is my bitch—a Niola, by the way—was up against Mr. Jackson's "Nigger," needless to say further, as I leave the rest to Judge Mason as one having true knowledge of the Fox Terrier.

The dog "Oxford Nemo," also owned by me, and a Sabine of six years, showing age, was handled by my friend Bob Ross, who fought to win over Eloree Ruler without success. Just here I would say that even in defeat I appreciate Mr. Mason's opinion, as my dog was truly out of condition.

Mr. Jackson, our dog friend from Cape Breton, should not lay claim to New Brunswick domination in Smooth Fox Terriers, according to my humble opinion, so I write this in the spirit of rather rendering unto Caesar the things which are Caesar's, and as well as that Mr. Robert Magee of this town, our eldest Irish Terrier fancier, thought it to be in order of comment.

CRITICISM OF MASTER BUTCHER.

Now that Master Butcher, Mr. John G. Kent's greyhound, has reached the pinnacle of fame, it is well worth going back over some reviews given of him since his arrival in Canada. First and foremost place must be given to the report on him on his first appearance at Winnipeg, where the great expert remarked as follows: "He is a nice dog'' (copyrighted), but we doubt his ability to live in keen competition, he does not seem to cover sufficient ground." It is to laugh. Reserve winners, New York (to his sire, Butcher Boy, since defeated), first in sporting variety, winners at Rochester, first sporting variety. Winners at Charity Show, New York, also first sporting variety, special best greyhound, defeating Butcher Boy, never before defeated in America, and second best dog in the show, all breeds, in a competition of about 1400 dogs, being beaten only by Wire Boy of Paignton, the sensation of the year, and even then only after the judges disagreed and a referee had to be called in. In addition to this, of course, he won special for best dog, all breeds, at Oakville, and the Toy Dog and Cocker Spaniel Club of Canada. Keen competition, ye gods! He was also specially mentioned by those that know, including the judge at the Charity Show, as covering more ground than his competitors. Time to wake up from your dream, oh Winnipeg.

Master Butcher has also been criticized for being bitchy in head, by experts who think they know. Dr. De Mund, who judged him at Rochester and also at the Charity Show for specials, states that up to now it has been said that heads don't count in Greyhounds, but that now since the advent of Master Butcher, heads must count. He has also been criticized as being small. At all these shows the only ones that were larger than himself were big, coarse brutes, absolutely devoid of type and quality, and never placed. All the good ones that were in the running with him were smaller, some to a marked degree. It is also being said, this by some of the experts in Toronto, that he lacked muscle and condition. The universal opinion of the daily papers in New York and of the public and of the judges freely and openly expressed, was that he was a model to go by in muscle and condition. All try again.

THE BOSTON TERRIER CLUB OF WESTERN CANADA

On the evening of March 23rd fourteen local Boston Terrier enthusiasts met in the south committee room of the Industrial Building, Winnipeg, Man. and formed a club that is to be known as "The Boston Terrier Club of Western Canada." Officers elected were as follows: President, Wallace H. Mc-Millan; vice-president, Geo. C. Peters; Secy.-Treas., C. A. Dickerson, Jr. A temporary executive was appointed to deal with any matter that might come up previous to the drawing up and aeceptance of the constitution and bylaws.

There has been considerable agitation here for some time about forming a club of this kind and now that the initial step has been taken the idea is being eagerly taken hold of and inquiries are coming in fast.

For the present it has been decided by the executive to keep the club entirely independent. All of the members to date are either affiliated with the D. K. C. or C. K. C., so that they are eligible to exhibit at any show regardless of the rules it is held under. Any party joining the Boston Club who is not a member of either of the governing organizations, by the payment of a 25-cent listing fee can exhibit.

The object for organizing this club is to promote the breeding, locally and throughout the West, of better Bostons. Enlist and assist new beginners at the game. Adopt and maintain an organized and unvarying standard. Promote and advance the interests of Boston Terriers generally.

The club itself and several of the members are offering cups and medals to be competed for at the different shows held from the Lakes to the Coast. The club cup that is to be offered at each show for the best specimen is a beauty. The order has been placed with Henry Birks & Sons for a number of these, as it is the desire of the club to offer one at each show where three or more members compete. Besides the cup, the club offers a silver medal to the member who has the best dog, open class, in show. A duplicate goes to the member who has the best bitch, open class, in show.

Bronze medals go to the best puppy dog and best puppy bitch owned by member. The executive are very desirous of enlisting the interest and assistance of out-of-town fanciers. It is their idea to make it easy and profitable for our Western friends to exhibit their dogs here and in return they will swell the entries in out-of-town shows.

At the D. K. C. show to be held the latter part of this month, besides the Club Cup and medals, our president, Mr. Wallace H. McMillan, is offering a cup for the best local bred dog.

Mr. Geo. C. Peters, a cup for the best local bred bitch.

Mr. C. A. Dickerson, Jr., a cup for the second best local bred dog.

Mr. J. P. Kilgour, a cup for the second best local bred bitch.

Mr. J. W. Inglecon, a cup for the best local bred puppy, 6 to 9 months. Mr. C. A. Wickerson, Jr., a cup for the best get, Bostonia II.

These cups are all limited to members only. Twenty-two cups and specials are being offered for Bostons in this coming show. We most cordially invite all exhibitors to write the secretary-treasurer, Mr. C. A. Dickerson, Jr., 244 Arlington St., Winnipeg, for particulars and application blank.

If you are interested in Bostons we want you to join. If you intend exhibiting drop the secretary a line and he will see that your dog is looked after while here.

CAPT. FORD'S BRAVERY.

We visited a large school which had been transformed into a hospital, and in which one of our Canadian physicians, not long since was working, Captain C. Yates Ford, formerly of Kingston, Ont .. This hospital had been literally blown to pieces by great German shells which tore off the roof and burst the walls in every direction. We stood in the remains of a ward into which a "Jack Johnson" shell had fallen and the iron beds and fixtures were twisted into a tangled mass. Fortunately, before this, the patients had all been transferred to the cellar and very few were killed. Another shell came hurtling through the main entrance, exploded in the hall and shattered everything about it. In the yard we were astonished to see several large, perfeetly round holes, like great earthen cauldrons, capable of holding a baby whale. There was no earth piled about the edges. These were the homes of "Jack Johnson's," and somewhere deep below are imbedded the fragments of shells, which, through the terrific impact, never appear on the surface. During this severe bombardment Capt Ford saved many lives and all accounts of his actions prove that he is a hero of whom Canada may well feel proud. He has had many miraculous escapes and in the great fight at Ypres was one of those who assisted in carrying to safety the Belgian nuns into whose convent a sacrilegious shell had burst. The great rent in the wall still bears gaping evidence to the cruelty and wantonness of the Huns.

BOSTONS AT WESTERN CANADA KENNEL CLUB SHOW.

It may be said that the Bostons were the only breed in the show that were properly or well benched; that was because the enthusiastic members of the newly-formed club took it upon themselves to decorate and bench their favorites or they might have suffered as some of the other breeds did.

The judge, Mr. Griffin, from Edmonton, it must be said, was very conscientious in his work, but that did not deter him from some serious mistakes. The review is as follows:

BOSTON TERRIERS-Junior puppy dogs-1st, Hippy Happy Who, a wellmarked dark seal brindle, good tail and fair body, but his head is anything but what a Boston should have; he is long and snipey in muzzle, with no stop, too long in skull and no expression. 2nd to Irwin's This Is Me, well, rather, he was; very coarse specimen and too heavy, light in color, ears badly cropped. 3rd, Billy, just a happy very ordinary pup. Senior puppy dogs-1st, Buzz Boy, a fair type, lacking markings, ears badly carried, could stand more weight, shown too thin. 2nd, Buster Boy, his name does him credit, very coarse, light colored dog, lacking type, Only two shown in this class. Novice dogs (under 17 lbs.)-1st, Hippy Happy Who. 2nd, This is Me. 3rd, Billy, described above, placed right. Limit (under 17 lbs.)-1st, Tony Ringmaster Jr., a small dog, improved since the last show, but room for more, as he is entirely too light back of his shoulders and poorly gaited. 2nd, McGlynn's Delight, true to type, but bad in muzzle and skull, had he shown better he might have won this class. 3rd, Hippy Happy Who, rightly placed. Open (under 17 lbs.)-1st, Tony Ringmaster Jr. 2nd, McGlynn's Delight. Novice dogs

(17 lbs. to 22 lbs.)-1st, Buzz Boy, described above. 2nd, Brownie, a nice little dog, good mover and shown well; if his tail is O.K. should have been placed first, some comment about his tail being cut. 3rd, Kewpie, a large. off-colored dog, bad eye and expression. Limit (17 and under 22 lbs.)-1st, Bostonia II., fair bodied dog, but as far as his head is concerned he is not like a Boston, very small eye, long narrow skull, most of his front teeth missing, no expression whatever, not the kind we are looking for at all. 2nd, Buzz Boy. 3rd, Brownie, who, if he had a right to third, should have been first and Bostonia third. Open dogs (17 to 22 lbs.)-Here is where the judge lost himself entirely. Sydenham Star was easily the best dog in this class and was not placed at all; barring a slight narrowness in muzzle, he had this class won. 1st, to Bostonia II. 2nd to Buzz Boy. 3rd to Brownie. Novice dogs (22 to 28 lbs.)-1st, Muggs Mc-Graw, a very coarse one lacking color. expression and type, a poor specimen, only dog in class. Limit (22 to 28 lbs.) -1st, Conewango, pretty well known to all, is well along in years but still full of vim and type. 2nd, Muggs Mc-Graw. Open (22 and under 28 lbs.)-Repeat of limit. Winners dogs-Here, I am sorry to say, had the judge adhered to type he would have placed Conewango 1st, Sydenham Star reserve, but he placed Tony Ringmaster 1st, Bostonia II reserve, both unsound dogs. And here it might be said the owner of Tony Ringmaster Jr. was showing Conewango against his own dog, who was handled by L. May. This is against the interest of the sport. Jr. puppy bitches-1st, Fritzie Scheff, a wellmarked, good-colored one, and showing well, is slightly high in station, a bit long in muzzle, she may make up better with age. 2nd to Dotty Baker Barcus, a very poor one, lacking marking, expression, long body and tail. Senior puppy bitches-1st, Norma, fair type, half white face, trifle long in muzzle, a fair bitch, only one shown in this class. Novice bitches (12 to 17 lbs.)-1st, Redwing, a perfectly marked, dark seal brindle, teaming in quality, just the kind of bitch we are looking for, slightly wrinkled in muzzle, but good otherwise. 2nd, Fritzie Scheff. Bell Rock Trixie, well marked, good in color, poor head, long in body and shown in poor condition. Norma should have been 3rd in this class. Limit

bitches (12 to 17 lbs.)-1st, Redwing, defeating the crack, Lady Mirthless, who went 2nd, losing in substance. Redwing being truer to type and confirmation. 3rd, Bell Rock Trixie, who should have been reserve to Norma. Open bitches (12 to 17 lbs.)-Repeat of limit. Novice bitches (17 to 22 lbs.)-1st, Ruby Victoria, a fair one. 2nd, Edgewood Spot, a splashed one, lacking in type and conformation. Limit and open (17 and under 22 lbs.)-1st, Ruby Victoria, only one shown. No heavyweights entered. Winners bitches, Redwing, Reserve, Lady Mirthless, correctly placed. Special for best in show went to Redwing, as did the reserve special for best non-sporting dog or bitch in show. Redwing was easily the sensation of the show.

FOOD AND FEEDING. (Kennel Encyclopædia).

(Continued from February Issue).

Greaves.-Greaves or graves is the residue left when refuse meat, etc., is boiled down to extract the valuable fat for commercial purposes. This residue is pressed into cakes, which are dried, and eventually broken up to mix with broken biscuit for sale as houndmeal. All is fish that comes to the tallowboiler's net; and few who have seen the actual process of manufacture have afterwards any use for greaves in any form in their kennels. While the thorough boiling ordinarily neutralizes poisonous properties of decomposed animal matter, and the drying of the greaves makes them keep good much longer than they would otherwise do, it is the experience of most unprejudiced users that dogs fed much on

greaves are liable to sudden and unaccountable attacks of diarrhoea. Within the writer's personal observation the feeding of stale greaves has produced the gravest gastric derangements. Where other animal foods are unobtainable greaves is better than nothing; but in such cases it is generally wise to buy directly from the maker, and only in such quantities as can be used up while still quite fresh.

Milk.-Milk is naturally produced for the special purpose of adequately satisfying the nutrient needs of young mammalian animals. In it nitrogenous compounds (protein) and mineral salts-the building nutrients-are combined with fat and carbohydrates (in this case milk-sugar)-the carbonaceous or fuel nutrients-in proportions adapted to the requirements of the system during early existence. Now, the milks of various species of domestic animals, though all containing the same constituents, are unlike in their total content of nutritive matters and in the proportions in which the food constituents occur. For instance, the milks of the bitch and ewe are particularly rich in protein and fat. Milk is often described as a "perfect" or "ideal" food, and it unquestionably is a perfect food for the young of the animal producing the milk. Thus, cow's milk is an ideal food for the newly born calf, and the milk of a bitch an ideal food for the very young puppy; but cow's milk is not a perfect food for the puppy, because a bitch's milk contains considerably the larger proportions of protein and fat. Indeed, the milk of the bitch is approximately thrice as rich as that of the cow. Hence it follows that, when we feed a puppy on cow's milk, we must so modify this milk as to nearly simulate that which the puppy would have received if nourished by its dam under normal conditions. This broad principle applies generally where the young of other species are fed on cow's milk. For instance, cow's milk fed to a colt should have its sugar content considerably increased and also be diluted with water, as mare's milk is the richer in milk-sugar but weaker in other respects. Milk is not a perfect food for older puppies or mature dogs, because it contains from 84 to 90 per cent. of water, and great quantities of it would have to be consumed to obtain the necessary nutrients, but it is well adapted for use with other foods as a means of increasing the proportion of protein in a ration. For instance, a pudding made with milk is considerably more nutritive than one prepared with water. There seems to be no doubt, too, that the addition of milk to some other foods somewhat increases their digestibility. Skim milk is milk from which most of the cream has been removed—that is to say it is milk deprived of a considerable proportion of its fatty content. Buttermilk is the residue left when butter is churned from cream. It contains slightly less fat than skim milk. Skim and buttermilk are much alike in value and composition. Both contain practically all the nitrogenous matter, mineral salts and sugar of the original milk and some of its fat, so that, though not, of course, so valuable for food as is whole milk, they are by no means insignificant in nutritive value, and they can often be used as a nutritive and palatable addition to dogs' food. Condensed milks are now obtainable very cheaply, and are largely used in diluted form for feeding puppies. The writer freely admits that many puppies seem to relish the sweet brands, to grow plump on them and to apparently thrive for a time, but it is his experience that the plump appearance is due to a delusive accumulation of fat, and that puppies fed in this way really possess very little vitality and are frequently victims of diarrhoea. Condensed milk should never be used when fresh, wholesome milk can be obtained, for though theoretically a given quantity diluted with an appropriate volume of water should give ordinary milk, the milk so produced is not nearly so useful for feeding the young of any species of domestic animal. Despite the fact that milk alone is not an adequate diet for normal adult dogs, life can be sustained on it for a long time, and-especially when strengthened with casein or plasmon-it possesses special value as an accessory food for invalids, as it is usually taken readily, and digested without irritating the alimentary sys-

Cream.—Cream is really milk into which a greater or less proportion of the milk-fat has been collected. Good, commercial cream should contain from 18 to 22 per cent. of fat, which is the normal richness of cream raised by the old-fashioned gravity process and then skimmed off. With a centrifugal separator, however, cream of almost any fat content desired can be obtained;

and poor commercial samples may contain as low as 8 per cent. of fat, while very rich cream may have 35 to 40 per cent. Cream is ordinarily sold without any guarantee as to fat content; and can, practically speaking, consist of anything the purchaser is induced to accept as cream. This unsatisfactory variation in quality and the high price which must be paid for really good cream militate against its use as a source of fat for young puppies. Where it is necessary to add fat in quantity to the diet of such puppies, the writer has found it better to give it in the form of butter rather than to add large quantities of cream to milk, because butter is of practically uniform composition, while its fat is already partially prepared for absorption and is a large quantity of cream. Many owners who would not go to the trouble and expense of purchasing cream would probably not hesitate to use butter.

Casein.—This is the principal building nutriment of milk, though there is always present in addition a small amount of albumen. It is the chief constituent that goes to form tissue when milk is used as food. Casein is coagulated from skimmed milk, finely ground, and perfectly dried, and in this state it forms an important ingredient of many infants' and invalids' foods. In miscible form it is of considerable value in the kennel as a means of cheaply and conveniently increasing the protein content of milk for puppies and sick dogs.

Eggs.—Raw eggs are a nutritive and easily digestible food, very much more concentrated than cow's milk, and slightly more so than bitch's milk. They are of special value for puppies and sick dogs, and are indispensable when forced feeding is needful during sickness. The rate of growth of dogs can be markedly increased by feeding eggs in place of a part of the ordinary food, so that where the greatest growth is desired, eggs should be added to the diet of puppies at as early an age as possible.

FISH.—Fish is not as nourishing, satisfying or stimulating as flesh meat, and so is of much less value for feeding dogs. It requires to be eaten in larger quantity and more frequently than meat.

Cod-Liver Oil.—This is a food-fat procured from the livers of fishes and other marine animals. It is usually

easily borne by the stomach, and is peculiarly suited for weakly or ricketty puppies, aged dogs, and convalescents from general weakening diseases. It should be given in small quantities once or twice a day after or with the food; and dogs generally relish it. Teaspoonful doses are large enough to begin with; but the quantity may, if needful, be gradually increased provided it is borne without too great looseness of the bowels. Small quantities are often extremely beneficial, while large ones tend to irritate the stomach and intestines, so doing harm by disordering the digestive tract at a time when every care should be taken to maintain it at a time when every care should be taken to maintain it at its very healthiest

Rice.—Rice is characterized by its high content of starch and the very low proportions of nitrogenous, fatty and mineral matters it contains. Associated with liberal meat feeding, it constitutes a very valuable food for dogs. Its starch granules are easily digestible, and exert no laxative action as most cereals do, so that it is better borne than any other farinaceous foods in disordered states of the alimentary canal. Though commonly considered to be rather binding, rice is really neutral in this respect—neither constipating hor laxative.

Wheat Flour.-Wheat flour is a useful alimentary material for dogs, to which it is generally fed in the form of bread, biscuits and puddings. lightness and friability of stale bread make it an easily digestible farinaceous food, but new bread is much less desirable, as its softness favours clogging into a close and heavy mass in the stomach. Bread baked to a biscuit colour is digestible and generally much relished. Bread and flour, if kept for long in a moist place, are prone to become sour or acid, in which state they are likely to set up gastric derangements. Under similar conditions they are also liable to turn mouldy owing to the growth of parasitic mould fungi in them. Mouldy foods should always be destroyed, as their use is attended with positive danger. Biscuits owe their property of better keeping to their being dried as well as baked. Stored grain, biscuits, flour and meals are subject to injury by various insects, popularly classed as "weevils." Apart from the resulting loss in weight, the presence of such pests in any quantity deteriorates the alimentary value of the produce. Within the writer's personal experience the consumption of very weevilly food by dogs has occasionally resulted in severe diarrhoea. It is the poorest kind of economy to feed inferior or damaged food because apparently cheap. A good dog deserves the best of food; and it pays in the end to provide it.

Oatmeal.—Oatmeal is rich in nitrogenous matters, fat and minerals, and is a much valued farinaceous food in many kennels. Its starch granules are inclosed in hard-walled cells, so that it requires very thorough cooking. The writer's personal experience of oats as an animal food is that they are specially adapted for the feeding of horses. He finds oatmeal too laxative, irritating and heating for his dogs and much prefers rice.

Cornmeal or Maize-Meal.—Cornmeal contains a much larger amount of fat and a somewhat smaller amount of protein than wheat flour. It is essentially a fattening food. Owing to the action of the air on the fatty matter present, cornmeal acquires a rancid taste when kept for some time.

Barley-Meal. — Barley-meal occupies an average position with regard to all its constituents. It is sometimes used for feeding dogs, but is less palatable and less digestible than wheaten flour, and it has rather laxative properties. It is certainly not a suitable food for dogs with impaired digestions.

Potatoes.—Potatoes are about threequarters water, the balance being largely starch, so that they constitute an exceedingly bulky and innutritious article of diet for dogs.

He has been shown but seldom winning special for best dog, any breed, at the Toronto Kennel Club evening

show, beating many of our best dogs, and reserve winners at Shelburne. He has proved to be an absolutely sure stud dog.

His breeding is a study, containing as it does all the great strains, Mersey King being one of the great sons of Ch. Prince Albert; John Campbell, the greatest producer in the stone strain, and, in addition, two crosses of the celebrated Parkholme Crib. These dogs were all noted as great producers, not simply bench winners.

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
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
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
