Charges against Mr. R. J. Hotston, by Bulldog Breeders' Association, and Mr. G. R. Farquharson: First charge was for removing dog from show without permission; 2nd charge was for using insulting language about the judge and Mr. Farquharson, ring steward, and the third charge was for selling a dog which was only out on breeding terms.

Moved and seconded that whereas the first charge was a technical breach for removing the puppy from the show, he did all he could to obtain the necessary lence, and the committee doesn't think it necessary to do anything further in the matter.— Carried.

Moved and seconded that in connection with the second charge that Mr. Hotston be asked to apologize to the secretary of the Bulldog Breeders' Association and Mr. Geo. R. Farquharson for using such language.—Carried.

Moved and seconded that the third charge be withdrawn, as it was a personal matter.—Carried.

Letter Blue Cross Society: Moved and seconded that as the Blue Cross Show is being held in aid of horses and dogs at the front, and as all specialty clubs are represented on the show committee, that all fees be waived.—Carried.

Mr. Geo. Barron, the honorary secretary, presented to the meeting the correspondence in connection with the Vancouver Exhibition, and it was resolved that the Canadian Kennel Club recognize all wins made at the Van-

couver Exhibition Show, for the years 1914 and 1915.—Carried.

Moved and seconded that the Quebec Advisory Board agreement be accepted as follows:

Memorandum of agreement entered into between the Canadian Kennel Club and show-giving kennel clubs in the Province of Quebec, Canada, regarding the government of kennel affairs in Quebec.

1. That an Advisory Board be established in the Province of Quebec.

2. That the Advisory Board have full powers to deal with protests, disualifications, suspensions, etc. To receive and approve of premium lists and catalogues of clubs in the Province of Quebec, giving shows under C. K. C. Rules. All powers subject to clause (5) of this agreement.

3. That the Advisory Board be made up of five (5) members of the C. K. C. resident in the Province of Quebec. The chairman of the Board to have the casting vote in case of a tie.

4. That the members be lected annually by the Executive Committee of the C. K. C.

5. That the Advisory Board have the practical management of kennel matters in the Province of Quebec, subject to C. K. C. rules, i.e., that any question regarding kennel interests in the Province of Quebec shall be submitted to the Advisory Board and dealt with by them, subject to the approval of the Executive of the C. K. C. in Toronto.

6. That the Advisory Board have power to grant dates for the holding of shows in the Province of Quebec.

7. That the Advisory Board shall meet at least twice in each year, and that notice of such meetig be given to all members.

8. That a full report of the proceedings at all meetings of the Quebec Advisory Board be sent immediately after each meeting to the C. K. C. at Toronto.

9. That nothing in this agreement shall be retroactive.

He will make his debut at New York in February.

Mrs. J. W. Weldon, of Galt, Ont., has sold two Scottish Terriers and two Bulldog pups to Mr. Reuben White, of Galt.

Mr. Dan Thody, of Edmonton, Alta., who is visiting in Detroit, Mich., advises us that his Boston Terrier, Wampagne Marie, won 1st novice, 1st limit, 1st open and winners, special for best Boston in show, and best opposite sex to best dog in show (60 dogs benched) at Detroit State Fair. Also, at Grand Rapids, Mich., she won 1st novice, 2nd limit, 2nd open, special for the best Boston in Michigan, dog or bitch (champions barred).

OUR LONDON LETTER

If I were asked which breed of purely show dogs will be, commercially, the most popular after the great war, I would unhesitatingly say, the Fox Terrier, and, especially the wire-haired variety of same. In England, of course, the Fox Terrier was, is, and will always be the most popular breed of dogs; in France, where I have judged, it is in great favor, and some of their homebred ones could easily hold their own with our best; in Italy, where I have also judged, they are very popular; and Russia, whose shows I visited, possesses some splendid specimens of the breed, especially in the smooth-coated variety. That, in England at least, the Wire Fox Terrier will, after the war, beat the smooth hollow, goes without saying, and the young, but very go-ahead Wire Fox Terrier Association will surely see to that. Apropos of this association, I must say a few words of the very useful Year-Book and Register for 1916, which has just been published by same, under the very able editorship of Mr. W. J. Cecil Hayward, the honorary secretary and honorary treasurer of the association. Published at 1s. 6d., plus postage, that book, with its 125 pages, contains a lot of very important information, as well as a register of pedigrees of 241 wire dogs and 244 wire bitches. In the words of Mr. G. C. Anne, the original idea was to provide a means whereby small owners, who cannot afford expensive stud books, could trace the pedigrees. Every year the pedigrees of all Terriers qualifying for free entry in the Kennel Club's Stud Book were to be included. Gradually the pedigrees of past useful Terriers would be worked in. In making up the first instalment of the Register, Mr. Anne took five or six Terriers whose names are household words, and worked their pedigrees back as far as was useful-Collar of Notts was one. one or two of the Royston Terriers others. But in this way you get such animals as Admiral All Bristles, All Cackler, Art Critic, etc. Once entered, a Terrier should not have to be put in again. He gets a number, and if his name crops up as a sire, the searcher after knowledge is referred back to his number; say it is Dusky Collar, sire Collar of Notts (20), the number takes one on.

In his article, "The Past Year," Mr.

Hayward says that "a great many Terriers still keep going across the water. Chs. Wireboy of Paignton, Corker of Notts, Cromwell Bantam's Model, and the record-breaker, Ch. Wycollar Boy, are but a few. Happily, good ones keep coming to light to gladden the hearts of their breeders, and to uphold the prestige of the fancy."

In her article on the "Wires, 1915," H.G. the Duchess of Newcastle airs her views on the size-of-sire controversy. She says that the chance-bred, goodlooking one can never be depended on to reproduce himself. She proceeds: "As to size, it depends entirely on what you are mating: a tall, light, longbacked, long-shouldered bitch mates best with the thick-set, strong, little dog, and the stuffy bitch to the quality. long-necked and shouldered dog. One point, however, never to lose sight of is that if either your little dog's sire or dam was a big one, the chances are strongly in favor of big bitches breeding over-sized ones to him, and the contrary applies to the big dog from small parents."

Mr. Theo. Marples and Mr. L. P. C. Astley have articles, the former on the "Fox Terrier, Size, etc.," and the latter on the "Influence of the Smooth Cross on Wire-Haired Fox Terriers," reproduced from "Our Oogs" and "Illustrated Kennel News," respectively.

Mr. T. Reeks' remarks are of great interest. He says: "I am personally a strong believer in using sires on the big side, but I am not going to say a small sire should never be used; on the contrary, both are necessary in producing what we are all trying to get-a well-balanced Terrier, with substance and of medium size. I have looked up the pedigrees of the champion dogs and bitches shown at the Club Shows from 1901 to 1914, and find that out of 14 dogs. 11 were by dogs on the big side, and 3 were by small dogs. The dams of these 14 dogs include 11 small ones. The size of the other 3, including the dams of Gipsy Joe and Levenside Luke, I cannot state. Out of the 14 bitches, 8 were sired by dogs on the big side, and 6 by small dogs, or, I should state, dogs the correct size. The dams of these bitches were all a nice size. This proves that a dog on the big side does not necessarily get big stock unless there is big blood behind him."

Of other articles I must quote that of Mr. Holland Buckley on the "Wires in America." Here it is: "The sight of that amazing crowd of great dogs and bitches at Mineola Show, last May, gave me 'furiously to think': will our fellow fanciers over the other side make as much progress in the cult of the Wire as they indubitably have done in the case of the Airedale Terrier; indeed, I feel certain that a challenge will be thrown by these keen breeders. whom I met in America, in the by no means distant future. I am reminded that it will only be a case of history repeating itself. For that old-time genius in the cult, Mr. Reggie Mayhew, almost 'put it across us' some years ago, with a Terrier who enjoyed the piratical piece of nomenclature of 'Hands Up,' who only missed by a narrow margin being the greatest Terrier of his generation. . . Mrs. M. E. Gates, who has bred a few good Airedales, scored with Malvern Darby, One is interested to know that the popular Mr. Theo. Offerman is the breeder, and Bishop's Selected the sire, while the Northampton breeder, Mrs. M. Smith. would be delighted to know that St. Giles Sonia, who has bred his before, is the dam. Mr. Daniel Lynn, who made the acquaintance of many-of us in 1914, is generally thereabouts in the prize list. His Lynfield Adriatic being much above the average, he being by the expatriated Wireboy of Paignton. Others could be mentioned, but enough has been written to show that our cousins are just as apt at putting two and two together as our English breeders. I personally am strongly convinced that, given the right stock, fanciers the other side possess as much breeding flair as we do ourselves, and this I know will be amply and scientifically proved as the years roll on, and what a line of 'all the talents' they have to go on. Just think of the galaxy of stars that could be seen altogether at a really great show in the States. Brockley Crasher, Antiseptic, Wireboy of Paignton, Raby Dazzler, Guyeroft Salex, Vickery Revoke and Emroy Patrol Leader. And then the dazzling array of charming Fox Terrier ladies: Cromwell Cheeky, Matford Vic, Biddy of Holyport, Vickery Estelle, Gipsy Moth, Tuckley Tart, Kiumaju of Chuffs, Collarette of Paignton, Clonmel Satiety. Holmbury Rene, Vickery Wimetka, and many others. If some of the grandest whelps ever seen could not be evolved from the above creme de la creme, then the breding by high-class show stock is all a delusion and a snare."

The Fox Terrier question being of great interest and France playing a very important part in this breed, I will, in my next "Letter," give the opinion of French breeders, gathered during my peregrinations from one big show to another in France.

DUNCAN, B.C., SHOW, SEPTEMBER 20-21, 1916.

The Cowichan Agricultural Society are to be congratulated on the success of their efforts to promote a dog show, which was held under C. K. C. Rules, in conjunction with the annual Fall Fair, and probably proved the most attractive feature of the exhibition.

Some 108 dogs were benched, and the quality on the whole was excellent. Duncan, B.C., where the show was held, is quite a sporting little town, and although the majority of the eligible male population are absent, serving their King and country, the local entries surpassed expectations, both in numbers and quality. Victoria, Vancouver and Nanaimo also contributed largely to the making of a good show. The dogs were housed in a section of the Agricultural Hall, a well-lighted, spacious building, with ample ring accommodation, and the benching and other arrangements left nothing to be desired for the comfort of the exhibits.

The success of the undertaking was mainly due to the untiring energy of the president of the society, Mr. P. W. Anketell-Jones, of Chemainus, and the

secretary, Mr. W. A. McAdam, of Duncan, the latter having on his hands, in addition to the dog section, the whole of the secretarial duties incidental to an agricultural show, no light task, considering the efficient manner in which the work was handled. Members of the Bench Show Committee who did good work were, Rev. F. G. Christmas, Messrs. E. Stock, H. W. Bevan, W. H. Mahon and H. J. Ruscombe Poole, the latter excelling as a ring steward. Dr. A. W. Lehman was the veterinary surgeon. Mr. J. W. Creighton, of Victoria, was the judge of all breeds, his awards being received with very little adverse

ENGLISH SETTERS were represented by such high-class specimens as Ch. Arbutus Swallow, Arbutus Lady Bird, Cinderalla, Victoria Colonel, etc.

In IRISH SETTERS, Pat and Rouge were quite above the average, the latter, in the opinion of the judge, being one of the best seen on the coast for a long time.

Sport is a GORDON SETTER of great merit.

POINTERS and FIELD SPANIELS showed quality. In the latter breed, Mr. D. W. Campbell's Yoho Laddie is a puppy of great promise.

CLUMBERS were a fine show, some really good specimens being benched.

Miss Wyllie was showing some JA-PANESE SPANIELS recently imported, which should go a long way towards improving this breed in Canada.

Mr. Heaton's kennel was well to the front with his COLLIES, FOX TER-RIERS, smooth and wire, and a crackerjack in the way of a COCKER SPAN-IEL puppy.

Mr. J. J. Jackson's brace of BULL-DOGS, Failsworth Buckler and Failsworth White Countess, can give points to any Bulldogs lately seen on the coast. The latter had just returned from a successful tour in California. The owner is to be commended on his enterprise in importing such good ones, and we wish him the best of luck in his venture. Mr. Watson's Bulldogs from Nanaimo also made a fine show.

BOSTONS were not numerous, but included such well-known winners as Wildwest Dimples, Kitchener, and Lord Buster Arden.

Smooth FOX TERRIERS were moderate, with the exception of Coat's All Rustem, Filey Flittergirl and Salome. In the wire-haired variety, the Madrona Kennel team were a show in

themselves, and Mrs. A. H. McConnell is to be complimented on the fine trim in which they were put down. Ch. Madrona Match is a sweet bitch, improving with age, correct size, nice head, ear carriage and expression, coat like wire, to be critical, a little more bone would make her hard to fault. Mr. Heaton's puppy is a smart one, good head and eye, short back, heaps of bone, and full of terrier character. Jeatt & Tyndall's Longstone Evasion should make a useful brood bitch.

SCOTTISH TERRIERS were well represented by Mrs. Russell and Robbie Burns.

AIREDALES brought out a good one in Lion Swiveller, long, clean head, good coat and body conformation, put down in tip-top form, might be little more compact in feet. Oakdene Chinook is a good type, but inclined to coarseness in skull, and not shown in the best of trim. Gipsy Queen is a nice sort, and should be valuable as a brood bitch.

Mr. Hickling's POM, Lindum Imp, had the distinction of winning special for best of all breeds in the show; a big win, considering the quality with which he competed.

Hanna's Ch. Montrose Ruminantly Rhu, a quality one, loses in condition only to winner. 3rd, Brownie.

AIREDALES, with Mr. J. J. Lynn, the Port Huron expert, on the woolsack, were a big collection, 40 dogs being actually benched, whilst nearly every point of the compass was repre-

sented, including Montreal and Winnipeg. Puppies on the whole were an improvement on last year, and were noticeable for the fact that representatives of the stock of Ch. King Nobbler's Double lifted the Airedale Terrier Club's shield for each sex. Puppies dogs, 1st, Silver Birch Nobbler, a youngster with grand bone and substance, nice color, strong foreface and nice set-on of hindquarters, too big in ears, and lacks ring manners. 2nd, J. Russell's Clayfield Terror, a very attractive dog, with good head, nice color and coat, plenty of bone and substance, should like to see him with smaller ears. 3rd, G. Higbee's Pelham Master Key, a big, stylish dog with grand coat, nice bone and sound, his ears are set on too high and he lacks face character. Junior dogs. Here the sensation of the day appeared in Polam Maxim, who spreadeagled this class with ease, afterwards going through to winners. This was Maxim's first appearance before the Canadian public in real competition, and a description of this great terrier will not come amiss. Comparing him with his first appearance, when I saw him at New York in February, he has improved beyond recognition. Granted he has the same grand head, coat, dark eye, beautiful long face, rich color and the correct terrier expression, but maturity has improved his body lines, strengthened his pasterns, let down his brisket, settled his movements and to-day Polam Maxim is one of our greatest Airedales, past or present. Critics would have more of him, but the dog is absolutely up to standard and on the day put down and handled in Swann's best form, he won by the biggest of margins. 2nd, G. H. Cass' Brant Ranger, a well-balanced dog, failing in coat and color. 3rd, Clayfield Terror, a well-balanced dog. Novice dogs. 1st, J. Russell's Clayfield Second Sight, a nice little terrier, fails in head. 2nd, Silver Birch Nobbler. 3rd, E. W. Billinger's Morning Recruit, a promising youngster of fair all-round quality. Limit dogs, 1st, N. Mackenzie's Polam Maxim. 2nd, E. W. Billinger's Morning Admiration, a wellbalanced dog, full of terrier character, not shown in his usual good form. 3rd, Brant Ranger. Open dogs, 1st, Polam Maxim. 2nd, Morning Admiration. 3rd, J. Russell's Clayfield Pennant, a stylish dog, possessing lots of bone and substance, grand legs and feet, and a coat of the right texture, fails in skull and

face finish. Breeders' dogs, 1st, Morning Admiration. 2nd, Brant Ranger. 3rd. P. Hamer's Newbold Commander, a fair dog, grand coat and nice bone, shade thick in skull. Canadian-bred dogs, a repeat. Puppy bitches, 1st, J. Russell's Clayfield Cricket, a typical young bitch, shapely body and nice bone, weak in foreface. 2nd, J. Russell's Mary Pickford, just a fair one, lacks bone and poor ear carriage. 3rd, H. Clayton's Silver Birch Princess, a useful stamp of youngster and very promising. Junior bitches, 1st, H. North's Mona Liza, nice size and bone, fair coat, fails in feet and placement of ears. 2nd, Clayfield Cricket. 3rd, P. Hilborn's York Ryburn Clover, nice size, fair bone and coat. Novice bitches, 1st, J. Russell's Clayfield Peggy a very typical bitch with the correct terrier expression, grand body and bone, nice legs and feet, fair coat. 2nd, York Ryburn Clover. 3rd. J. Perkins' Jane Straight, a nice all-round specimen, a shade houndy in ears. Limit bitches, 1st. N. Mackenzie's Sunshine, a big, upstanding and typical bitch, grand foreface and skull, lots of bone, fair coat and color, should like to see her shorter coupled. On the day she won easy and went through to winners. 2nd, J. Russell's Rhosdue Victory, a typy one, put down fit, nice bone, and a good harsh coat, fair head, could be improved in placement of ears. 3rd, Mona Liza. Open bitches, a repeat. H. Clayton's Ch. Brickfield Molly must have been overlooked in this class, despite the fact that she was a little out of coat, her other sterling qualities should have landed her near the top. Questions must be brief. In every case breed, sex, age and conditions observed should be given; proper name and address must be given (not for publication), also nom de plume over which he wishes questions answered.

R. S., Toronto:

Q. I have a Great Dane dog, eighteen months old, who suffers from a sore at the tip of his tail. He is constantly banging it against the sides of his kennel, which makes it bleed profusely. What can I do for it?

A. This is a common thing in Great Danes, and is most difficult to cure. Thoroughly cleanse the wound with antiseptic lotion, and when well dried dust over with powdered iodoform; cover with gauze, and over this place some good sticking plaster. Keep the dog chained in a large room where he cannot injure the tail.

Fort William, Ont .:

Q. I have ten Airedale puppies in one litter, which have done well with the

exception of two. They seem to go off on their feet when they attempt to walk. After going a few steps, appear to have cramps in their forelegs, stop for a very few seconds and often roll over, and push themselves along the ground with the help of the nose. What do you think is the matter with them, and can anything be done?

A. You have not stated what age your puppies are, which would assist in making a more definite diagnosis, but there is no doubt that the trouble is rickets, and I would advise you to destroy the sick pups. The bitch will have all she can do to raise the remainder of the litter. Next time you breed the bitch you should see that she is properly fed with a liberal supply of meat while she is carrying pups.

F. J., Toronto, Ont.:

Q. What is good for sore eyelids in a French Poodle?

A. Bathe the eyes with a fresh boracic acid solution, twice daily, afterwards smearing the lids with vaseline and boracic acid ointment.

S. Y. M., Toronto .:

Q. Is it advisable to breed a Cocker Spaniel two and a half years old, that had pups last April. I expect her in season next month. Her last litter of three pups died when they were a week old, through no accountable cause. I am told that there may be risk in breeding her so soon again.

A. It is not advisable to raise puppies in the depth of winter; I think it would be the wiser plan to wait till next spring, and be on the lookout for a foster mother, when she is due to whelp. I would not trust her with pups again.

BULLDOG BREEDERS' EVENING SHOW.

The first evening show of a series of shows to be held this winter by the Bulldog Breeders' Association of Canada was held at Occident Hall, Wednesday, October 11th.

The crowd was small, but select, all being interested in the breed. As usual the old fanciers were there, the new ones seem to be growing in numbers, showing the good work this specialty club is doing. There were over thirty entries. Considering that there were only classes for puppies and novice bitches, it was very good. The average quality was very high, not a mutt among them. We are very sorry that for lack of time we cannot critize the classes fully. The judging was very ably done by Mr. R. Scott Wilson, of Oakville, general satisfaction being expressed on every side.

The outstanding dogs were Mrs. H. Peabody's Cheetham Double, well named, who was first in novice, and landed the special for best in show, beating Mr. Johnston's Oakland White Mar-

quis; Mr. Gubb's Oakwood Marquis, a very cobby pup with lots of promise, was first in the class under four months, and went through all the other classes, only being beaten when he got to the eight to twelve months. The results of the different classes are as follows:

The specials were given out as each class was judged, and this method proved popular and successful.

BULLDOG BREEDERS' SHOW.

The Bulldogs Breeders' Association of Canada held the first of a series of evening shows on Wednesday, October 11th, at Occident Hall. The classification was unusual. The Show Committee confined the classes to puppies and novice bitches. This arrangement was quite successful, as was apparent from the entries, there being thirty in all. Six classes were provided and a handsome silver trophy was given for best dog in each class.

Mr. R. Wilson, of Oakville, made the awards. His decisions were well received and supported by the armchair judges. (Armchair judges are appointed from on high to judge the judge). We liked especially Mr. Wilson's determination to see each dog move and move plenty. You will never get away with a bad mover under this judge.

First class, for puppies up to four months old; there were four entries in this class, three of them under 3 months; the winner, Mr. Gubb's Oakwood Marquis, a compact, deep-bodied brindle, with an exceptional long, deep skull, nice ears and square muzzle, good bone and nice tuck-up of loin, showed like a veteran. 2nd and 3rd prize win-

ners were Gaul's Sandfield Molly and Sandfield Marquis, respectively, a pair of likely looking white and brindle puppies, but, like the 4th pup, Mr. Rann's Bud, too young to be criticized.

Class for puppy dogs, 4 to 8 months old—1st, Mr. Gubb's Oakwood Marquis, low to ground pup, nice spring of rib, lots of bone, good skull, wants to open out in shoulder. 3rd, Mr. Renwick's Lucky, it was lucky for him that there were only three in the class.

Class for puppy bitches, 4 to 8 mos. old-Six entries in this class. 1st prize to Mrs. Peabody's Black Pearl, a very dark brindle pup, with a grand head and expression, well sprung ribs, very short in back, a real nice pup. 2nd, Mr. Munson's Snowball Louvain, a white and brindle, teeming with quality, beautifully shaped head and foreface, nice turn-up of underjaw, small ears, good shoulders, we make her to be too light. 3rd, Mrs. Graburn's Pudge, a very taking pup, but was never seen to advantage owing to bad handling. Exhibitors should have one eye on the judge and the other on the dog and always be ready to obey the judge's requests.

Class for dog puppies 8 to 12 months old—4 entries. 1st prize, Johnston's Oakland White Marquis, a big white with a smashing big skull, good turn-up of underjaw, and the correct sour expression. He has let down considerably in brisket since last we saw him, a much improved dog. 2nd, Mr. J. E. Dowling's Gammon of Lambare, a pied white and brindle; he owns a big, wide, flat skull, short back and nicely tucked up body; he moved badly. 3rd, Oakwood Marquis.

Puppy bitches, 8 to 12 months old—Six entries. 1st, McEwan's Topsy Turvy, a big, useful white and brindle dog, good bone and low to ground, moved well, little long in body. 2nd, Mrs. Peabody's Black Pearl. 3rd, Mr. Marsden's Woodley Duchess, a much improved pied bitch, very low to ground, good bone and excels in body qualities, doubtful in ear carriage.

Novice bitches—1st, Mrs. Peabody's Cheetham's Double, a striking white and brindle; this bitch has about the best head and expression of any of our bitches, her skull is both long and deep, well filled in before the eyes, good muzzle and Bulldog expression, short in back and deep body. 2nd, Mr. Giles' Sunny Morn, this bitch is "the type," low, cloddy, heavy boned, barrel ribs, short back, active and strong; we can

only fault her in front of the eyes. 3rd, McEwan's Topsy Turvy.

Mrs. Peabody's Cheetham's Double was judged the best dog in the show, and Johnston's Oakland Marquis best of opposite sex.

There are two cups to be competed for during the series, one for the best dog, donated by Mrs. Graburn, and the President's Cup for the best of opposite sex.

The following is some valuable information to Breeders:

All litters born after January 1st, 1916, must be reported to the Canadian National Live Stock Records within 60 days of date of birth, otherwise individual registration will be refused. Forms for the purpose supplied on application.

After January 1st, 1917, only the produce of recorded sires and dams will be eligible for registration. Be governed accordingly.

Individual pups of a litter with unrecorded sire and dam placed on record will be eligible for registration this year. After January 1st, 1917, only produce of recorded sires and dams will be eligible.

Dogs out of bitches recorded in the Canadian Kennel Club Stud Book which are sent over to the United States to be bred will be eligible for registration providing the sires are recorded in the American Kennel Club Stud Book in the name of the party who certifies to the service.

When a pure-bred dog is sold, to go to the United States, the vendor should fill in an application for transfer of ownership, and forward it with the certificate of registration, along with the necessary fee for transfer, to the National Live Stock Records, Ottawa. The name of the purchaser will be endorsed on the back of the certificate, which should then be sent to the purchaser.

Below is printed some information regarding shipping of pure-bred animals to the United States.

"Animals to be eligible for free entry into the United States must trace, in all their crosses, to registered animals in the country where the breed originated, or to animals which are proved to the satisfaction of the Department of Agriculture, Washington, to be of the same breed, and that have been imported into the United States or Canada from the country in which the breed originated.

"Export certificates are issued in order to assist Canadian exporters, and are not a guarantee that the Bureau of Animal Industry at Washington will issue certificates of pure breeding entitling animals to free admission to the United States. It is advisable that export certificates and Canadian certificates of registration be forwarded to Washington a day or two in advance of shipping, so that there may be as little delay as possible in issuing cer-In no case are certificates issued until animals have been examined at the port of entry into the United States and their description forwarded to Washington. Certificates are not sent to the importer, but to the Collector of Customs at the port of entry.

"In the absence of certificates of pure breeding the importer may give the usual bond under the regulations of the United States Treasury Department to provide certificates within a period of six months.

"You must sign the Export Certificates as vendor, and then send them to your United States customer, who must sign as purchaser, and then forward with the Canadian certificates to the Chief of the Bureau of Animal Industry, Washington, D.C., U.S.A.

"The fee for an export certificate is 50 cents.

Register your litters now. This costs you nothing, not even a postage stamp, and saves you a lot of trouble when registering the dogs of that litter, as it will not be necessary to fill in the certificate from the owner of the sire, after the litter is registered.

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
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
