ALL those present at the general meeting of the Canadian Kennel Club on the evening of December 15th will agree that it was a very business-like meeting, with great enthusiasm in the right direction. Members voiced their opinions concisely regarding some difficulties in present registration, which were all discussed separately, and these were asked to put them in writing and send them to the Complaint Committee. The appointed committee will no doubt look after these complaints and have matters adjusted wherever possible.

The rule for registration, viz.: "On and after January 1st, 1917, no dog whelped in Canada may be registered unless his sire and dam are registered in the Canadian Kennel Club Stud Book" was voted to be extended for another year. However, this will have to be passed on by the Minister of

Agriculture at Ottawa, before it becomes effective. There has been a question raised as to the possibility of this, and it may be necessary to call another special general meeting. We would urge all breeders, therefore, to make registration applications of all their breeding stock as soon as possible.

There is no getting away from the fact that the new registration rules are working out splendidly, as both breeder and owner of sire are protected. Dog owners and breeders generally find that it is the only method after all. In a few years' time they will reap the benefit, and it will be easier to register then than it is even now, as most ancestors will be registered.

We are anxious to get together an Honor Roll of Canadian Kennel Club members who are giving their services at the front. A good many members have gone overseas without advising the Secretary. If our readers will therefore, kindly write and give the names and addresses of such members, it will greatly help in getting out a complete list. An Honor Roll will be published in "Kennel and Bench," and another list put up for inspection in the members' room of the club. All members on the Honor Roll will be allowed full privileges of membership without payment of any fees. If you have any addresses of those now at the front, send them in, and we will send them a copy of "Kennel and Bench" each month.

The double envelope system to be adopted in the coming election at the annual meeting on February 9th, is a very good move. Each member will receive two envelopes, one is that for the ballot alone, the other a return envelope, addressed to the club. At the bottom of this latter envelope there will be found a space to fill in your full name and address. These envelopes will then be checked by the scrutineers with the list of members paid up for the year 1917, which will make certain that no member is voting that has not paid in his 1917 membership fee. Ballots will only be sent out to those whose 1917 membership is paid. We call attention to the fact that all ballots must be in the hands of the Secretary before 12 o'clock noon of the day of the annual meeting, and that all ballots MUST be mailed. None other will be accepted.

We would specially call attention of our members to the fact that nominations are now open for officers of the Canadian Kennel Club for the year 1917, and that all such nominations shall be made in writing and sent addressed to the Secretary, to be in his hands THIRTY DAYS before the annual meeting. As the annual meeting will be on February 9th, 1917, nominations will close on the 10th of January. It would be to the interest of all members if they would take an active interest in all nominations. In fact, the general welfare of the club would be greatly benefited by their support.

The subject of taking over "Kennel and Bench" as an asset to the club will be taken up at the annual meeting, and it is the wish of the Directors that all members who are unable to attend the meeting send their views in writing.

It was moved and seconded that the Assistant Secretary write to the National Live Stock Records and ask them what they term as a "Canadian-bred."—Carried.

It was moved and seconded that the Assistant Secretary write to Mr. J. C. Stockwell, Danville, Que., and ask him if he still wishes to maintain the use of the prefix "Diamond."—Carried.

It was moved and seconded that Mr. Walter M. Berwick be requested to forthwith apologize to Mr. Jos. Perkins, and that such apology be satisfactory to this Board and published in "Kennel and Bench," and in addition Mr. Berwick be suspended for a period of three months from the date hereof.—Carried.

The letter of apology to Mr. Joseph Perkins from Mr. W. M. Berwick, which was accepted by the committee, reads as follows:

"In a letter, dated the 4th day of May, addressed to Mr. R. J. McGregor, Edmonton, Alta., I made certain statements whereby I impugned your honesty. I now find I was entirely mistaken. I withdraw the accusation and apologize therefore.

Stock Board at Ottawa. That this meeting take place as soon as possible and that said committee have full power to report to the Board of Directors, which is then to be taken up finally.—Carried.

The meeting then adjourned.

MINUTES OF GENERAL MEETING OF CANADIAN KENNEL CLUB.

A general meeting of the Canadian Kennel Club was held in the offices of the club on the evening of December 15th, 1916.

The meeting was called to order at 8.15, over which the President, Mr. Jno. G. Kent, presided.

Perkins, Sid. Perkins, Jos. Russell, M. P.P., and James D. Strachan.

Mr. L. Parker, Toronto, who appeared among those present, was asked by the chairman to retire, as he was disqualified by the club.

Moved and seconded that the following notice of motion given at a general meeting of the Canadian Kennel Club, viz:

"On and after January 1st, 1917, no dog whelped in Canada may be registered unless his sire and dam are registered in the Canadian Kennel Club Stud Book, or the sire is registered in the American Kennel Club Stud Book, or the Kennel Club of England Stud Books,"

be extended for another year, and that said notice of motion is to read "On and after January 1st, 1918."—Carried.

Moved and seconded that the Canadian Kennel Club keep all members on in good standing, with full privileges, without payment of any dues, who are giving their services at the front. That the Secretary be requested to get a list of all members who are at the front.—Carried.

Moved and seconded that a Complaint Committee, consisting of Messrs. Geo. R. Farquharson, Peter Herd, F. W. Jacobi, Jos. Russell, M.P.P., John G. Kent and Geo. Barron, be appointed to investi-

gate complaints and difficulties in registration, etc., and to forward same to the National Live Stock Records to take the matter up with them. That said committee have power to add to their members if they deem it necessary. Any Complaints to this committee must be made in writing and sent addressed to the Secretary of the Canadian Kennel Club, 774½ Yonge St., Toronto. Said Beard is to meet frequently. It also being understood that this Board does not in any way effect the present Pedigree Committee.—Carried.

Moved and seconded that a meeting of the Board of Directors be called at once to pass on new members added to the club, in order that they be eligible for nomination, and that they may take part in the annual elections.—Carried.

Moved and seconded that the double envelope system be used in the coming election, and that each member signs his or her name and address on the outside envelope, in order that the scrutineers might check ballots received, with membership list, to make sure that no one votes whose fees are not paid for the year 1917.—Carried.

Notice of motion was put that all United States citizens be accepted in this club for membership, but that they could not hold office, owing to it being a national organization.—Carried.

Moved and seconded that "Kennel & Bench" interests be finally discussed at the coming annual meeting, in February, and that it be taken over by the club as an asset, if deemed advisable by the majority of members.—Carried.

The meeting then adjourned.

SHORT BARKS.

Mr. S. W. Speigel, of the Blackstone Kennels, Winnetta, Ill., bought of Mr. W. J. Jackson, Hamilton, three red Cocker dogs one year old, that were up to the usual high standard of Cockers that come out of this well-known kennel.

Mr. C. W. Dickinson has at last struck the gold mine of luck in breeding Mastiffs. His Duchess of Wingfield whelped, on Christmas Day, three dogs and four bitches, by Priar of Wingfield; also on Dec. 26th, his Parkgate of Wingfield whelped eight dogs and four bitches by the same sire.

OUR LONDON LETTER

The lines which follow are sure to touch the heart of every true sportsman, be he or she an Ally or an American. At the moment, one of the most vital needs of our fighting men on all fronts is ambulance transport. The waste of ambulance vehicles is very large, while the numbers of sick and wounded increase daily. It need hardly be pointed out that any unexpected curtailment of the ambulance supply, due to the fortunes of war, at any given time might not only have serious consequences, which need not be specified here, but would lead to endless suffering and loss, which can easily be avoided by the exercise of a little foresight and self-sacrifice now.

It is with the object of assisting to keep the ambulance transport up to the requisite standard of strength and efficiency that the British Sportsmen's Ambulance Fund (under the presidency of the Earl of Lonsdale, vice-president of the Kennel Club) has been formed. Up to the present the result of the appeal to sportsmen is very highly gratifying, 50 cars having been equipped, and they are now running. What sportsmen, as a class, have already done to help in the efficient conduct of the war need not be detailed here. It should be sufficient to say that they have given freely, not only of their money, but of their blood, and it is certain that they have not yet reached the limit of their resources in either respect.

The British Sportsmen's Ambulance Fund hopes to be able to provide a fleet of at least 100 ambulance cars, at a cost approximately of £400 each car. It is of the essence of the scheme that these cars should be despatched to the front at the earliest possible moment, and the committee of the Kennel Club, therefore, appeal to the associations, clubs, and societies registered at the Kennel Club to subscribe to the fund and to use their influence in making known its objects.

All subscriptions will be acknowledged in the press. They should be addressed to Mr. E. W. Jaquet, secretary, Kennel Club, 84 Piccadilly, London W. Cards for the purpose of collecting subscriptions are ready and will be forwarded on application. From the list of the subscribers already published it can be seen that several asso-

ciations have already subscribed, and the secretary feels sure that many more will wish to be associated with the meritorious scheme for which this appeal is made.

The ambulance cars will be divided between the British Red Cross and our Allies. It is common knowledge that our gallant Allies are suffering seriously from a deficiency of motor transport. Will you then help to show that British sportsmen and their friends are not unconscious of the valor of their Allies and their heroic self-sacrifice, even although the calls of our own service may be ever so persistent and pressing? It has been arranged by the promoters of the fund that individuals or bodies presenting cars may have them distinguished by the names of the donors being placed upon them, and it has been decided that each car which will be provided by the efforts of the Kennel Club shall be named "The Kennel Club Car."

The most interesting dog show of the year was the 37th annual championship show of the Fox Terrier Club at Nottingham, on the 24th and 25th of October, with Mr. Robert Vicary and Mr. Walter S. Glynn as judges of Smooths and Wires, respectively. The Wire-haired section was the better one, as usual, with regard to the quantity and the quality, but neither in the Smooths nor in the Wires anything new came out, owing, probably, to the war. The 50-guinea challenge cup in the Smooths was won by Ch. Help-a-bit, property of Dr. Hosker, whereas in the Wires the cup went to Lapworth Wire Boy, property of Mr. W. C. Davies. Messrs. Howard and Morton's Smooth dog, Barnard's Chief, won the challenge certificate, beating the Champions Darell, Dandyford, Cromwell Ochre, and in Wire bitches the American bitch, Wincanton Vixen, property of Mr. Geo. Thomas, won the same distinction.

The general meeting of the Fox Terrier Club took place on the evening of the 23rd October. A great deal of dis-

cussion was produced by Mr. Glynn's motion that Fox Terriers, which are the only Wire-haired terriers, with the exception of the Bedlington which were by the vote of the club consigned to the Kennel Club's category of breeds which may be trimmed, should be restored to their status quo ante principle. This discussion ended in favor of the breed remaining where it is on the Kennel Club's list.

Speaking of Fox Terriers, I must mention that the Duchess of Newcastle has sold her good Wire champion, Chequebook of Notts, to Mr. Geo. S. Thomas, of America. Our leading kennel organ "Our Dogs," says: "The price is not disclosed, but it must have taken a big 'cheque' out of Mr. Thomas' 'book' to draw the dog from his 'of Notts' lair.'"

In "Our Dogs" of the 27th of October appears a letter from Lieut. A. E. MacAuley, founder and honorary secretary of the Fox Terrier Club of India, Calcutta, written on the 24th of September last, re "A Fox Terrier Club for India." The writer says in that letter, amongst other things: "There is something wrong with the management of our kennel affairs in India. The committee of the Indian Kennel Association consists of six members, and I had the written support of four of the committee, including the president. Still, in spite of this, it would appear that there is a great jealousy existing as regards the formation of this new club." "Our Dogs" remarks on that letter as follows:

"The letter points to the incidence of club-land in that important British possession not being as satisfactory as it might be. Of course, the particular branch of sport is new and there are many drawbacks, including climate and distances which will ever have a more or less deterrent influence on dog clubs ever reaching the ideal of those in the Old Country. . . . Everything, however, must have a beginning, and though dog shows and dog clubs are somewhat in a crude condition in India, we have no doubt that if followers of the fascinating pursuit will meet difficulties and drawbacks in a thoroughly fancier and sporting spirit, much of the difficulty and all misunderstanding may be removed, and the dog club and dog show obsession be made a great institution in the country."

IRISH TERRIERS AT TORONTO BLUE CROSS DOG SHOW.

There were 55 entries made and 21 dogs exhibited. This is not only a local record entry for this breed, but also one of the largest entries made in Canada for some time past, and exceeded the number shown at the last Canadian National Exhibition Dog Show by eight dogs and ten entries.

Patriotism, together with the splendid list of special prizes offered to be won outright, must have induced admirers of this popular breed, who are many, to show their pets and companions.

Mr. W. P. Fraser was selected, according to the premium list, to judge this and other breeds of terriers, but for some reason or other could not attend. Mr. Thomas Moore was appointed as a substitute.

The awards were as follows:

Puppy class—1st, Quarrywood Terry, all alone in his glory, a fair specimen.

Novice dogs and bitches brought out an entry of eight competitors. 1st, Quarrywood Sally, a bitch with a good length of head, nice eye, rather plain expression and badly carried ears, good bone and substance, with a fair coat, which is inclined to curl, and the pads of her feet are undesirable. 2nd, Fiscal Regina, a symmetrically built terrier, nice long head, good eye, ear and expression, best of legs and feet, shown in rather poor condition and short of coat, which is, however, of the desired texture and shade. When in show form will give a first-class account of herself. 3rd, Sir Robert, a good stamp of terrier, on the large side and might be finer in skull. He has a great long head, good eye and expression and sound in coat, legs and feet.

Limit dogs—1st, Coast Native Prince, a high quality dog, although not shown to advantage, got home first with consummate ease. He is real Irish with intense style and character, could do with slightly more spring of rib, but when put down fit and shown properly there are few terriers that can get by him. 2nd, Mr. Blight's Quarrywood Paddy, a shapely terrier, good eye, ear and expression, nice coat and color, good outline, legs and feet. He might be closer in front and his head formation is not quite correct. 3rd, Mr. Ryerson's Tim, shown in his natural condition, a hardy, stylish, active terrier, on similar lines to Quarrywood Paddy, fair head, good eye and expression, ears badly carried.

Open dogs—Seven entries, 1st, Coast Native Prince, already reviewed. 2nd, Quarrywood Barney, a stylish terrier, put down in good form and shown to advantage. This dog has a good head, nice eye, ear and expression, good in coat and color, sound legs and feet, a nice mover and a great shower. He might be a little finer in shoulder and is inclined to get his tail down near his back. 3rd, Sir Robert, already reviewed.

Breeders' dogs and bitches—1st, Quarrywood Sally, already reviewed. 2, Fiscal Policy, shown too fat. This is a typical terrier, nicely balanced head, small, well-placed eye, good coat and color, excelling in body, front, legs, feet, size and character. 3, Fiscal Regina, already reviewed.

Limit bitches—1st, Baughfell Banshee, a quality bitch put down in nice show form. She has a nice eye, ear and expression, a very fair coat and color, nice outline, neck and shoulders, good in front, legs and feet. 2nd and 3rd, Fiscal Policy and Fiscal Regina, already reviewed.

Open bitches—Only two entries. 1st, Baughfell Banshee, already reviewed. 2nd, Kelvin Glory, a compact terrier, shown in good condition, nice eye, ear and expression, good in coat, color, legs and feet, could do with more strength of foreface.

Green class—Six entries. This was their first appearance and they apparently came unprepared, as they knew nothing of the edicts of the show ring or of the skilful hand of the artist to hide their imperfections (if any). 1st, Mr. Ryerson's Tim. 2nd, Mr. Tew's Paddy. 3rd, Mr. Rolph's Brentmoor Borax, a rather nice terrier.

SHORT BARKS.

Mr. A. J. Lewis, of Gray Creek, B.C., has just purchased the exquisite little King Charles, Sir Celamo, from Celamo Kennels, of Rochester, N.Y. This little dog weighs only five and a half pounds and is from the smallest of stock, consequently breeders need not hesitate to send their tiniest matron to him for service. The blood lines are also the best to be had, being a direct descendant of Ch. Ashton-More Baronet, Ashton Pharaoh, Tasso, Liscard Punch and many others equally as good.

Mr. Lewis also purchased the Ruby, Red Dame Celamo, sired by Celamo Richard, a noseless King Charles. Her breeding also is extra fine and with

this pair Mr. Lewis expects to add some championship cups to his collection. Both dogs are small in size, well built, have short broad muzzles and are correct in type.

Messrs. McGinley and Nieve, well known fanciers and breeders of Scottish Terriers, in St. John, N.B., have recently purchased a site for building an up-to-date kennel and will start work on it right away. The McGinley and Nieve entries will be prominent in all the big shows next year and make the going fast.

Mr. Jack R. Almon, of Westmount, Que., has transferred his kennel of Boston Terriers to 22 Stanley St., Montreal. He states that he has all the facilities for an up-to-date kennel. In future his kennel will be known as the Burley Kennels. Mr. Almon is the owner of that well-known dog, Auburn Burley, and we understand he will shortly have one of the best 17-pound dogs in America. This should be a great addition to the breed in Canada. Mr. Robert Magee, of St. John, N.B., when meeting Mr. Sam Bamford, of Lambton Mills, Ont., at the recent New Brunswick Kennel Club show, disposed to him his good bitch, Baughfell Banshee. Owing to a recent bereavement in Mr. Magee's family, Banshee was not entered this year, to the disappointment of the fanciers down East.

Winnipeg Kennel Club Show

The Winnipeg Kennel Club Show, under C.K.C. rules, held in the Industrial Bureau on October 24th to 26th, was probably the best yet promoted by the club. An entry of 256 dogs must be considered very good, taking all circumstances into consideration, but such an entry does not represent what Winnipeg can do in the show game. Double this number is nearer the mark.

Unfortunately the reasons which prevent a representative entry are only too well known, but thanks to the efforts of a few who are not in the game for what they can make out of it, the end of a well night disastrous dispute is in sight. All disqualification of western exhibitors being now removed by the C. K. C. the way is clear for an understanding between the C. K. C. and D. K. C. I think everyone will admit that there should only be one governing body in canine matters in Canada, and with the authority of that body properly distributed we may safely look to the dog game coming back to its proper footing.

Here in Winnipeg we have two clubs holding shows, the W. K. C. and W. C. K. C., and, personally, I am of the opinion that in the event of an amalgamation between the D. K. C. and C. K. C., it would be an advantage to have both local clubs retain their individuality, provided support is given to both shows, as with a little friendly rivalry in evidence no doubt we would see keen work to put on the best show, but if, as in the past, the idea is to knock the other show, then the only hope I see is one club combining the better elements of both the present clubs.

A few notes on the classes I had the honor to judge may be of interest to your readers.

RUSSIAN WOLFHOUSES—Four entries, Jellicoe Red got winners dogs, plenty of substance and good depth of brisket, straight in front, head not as good as it might be. Duke Alexis, a very promising puppy got reserve winners. He only needs to mature to go right to the top. Good head, and is straight and sound all over. He later won best any variety puppy. Prince Czar, a big dog, was handicapped by lameness, owing to an accident. Thelma III., the only bitch, is a nice quality one, well made and sound.

BLOODHOUNDS—Mr. Simpson, of

the Malachi Sporting Kennels, had his well-known winner, Malachi Charon, an immense dog, great bone and substance, his head is slightly deficient in peak and wrinkle.

POINTERS (14 entries)—The number entered, while an improvement on recent shows, does not compare very favorably with the 35 or 40 we used to see. V. C. Kobold's Riga Raps Dan, a descendant of the famous field trial dog, Manitoba Rap, got winners. He is a very nicely made dog, good head, shoulders and front. His worst fault is throatiness. Tonti's Prince, reserve winners, a very strongly made dog, giving one the impression of strength rather than speed, strong in skull and heavy in shoulders. Billionaire Bob, a promising 7-months puppy that should develop into a useful dog. Yumas Fly, winners bitches, a quality bitch, perhaps a trifle long cast and a little flat in skull. Tonti's Nellie, a very well-made bitch, too strong in skull. Sessen, a real good little bitch, handicapped by the fact that she was shown in whelp. Belle Pearlstone, a litter sister of the winning dog, a high quality bitch not in her best form.

ENGLISH SETTERS (14 entries)—Glen View Major, winners dogs, a beautiful headed and coated dog, loose in front and not in good flesh, but I could not get away from his quality. Crusoe, another nice dog, good front, but not the quality of winner, would do better with a few pounds of extra flesh, as he looked long in coupling. Toby Lewis, a well-made nicely-marked dog, a little coarse in head. Cornish Lass, a quality bitch, on very similar lines to winning dog, a little more substance would improve her. Betty, an exceptionally well made bitch, too flat in skull.

COCKERS (14 entries)—With few exceptions were hardly up to the quality usually seen at Winnipeg shows. Manitoba Swift, winners dog, had very little serious opposition. Durbar Donald is too coarse all over, but sound and active and good coat. Petite Sunny Boy, a beautiful bodied dog, nice size, but fails in head. Pathfinder Queen, a quality little bitch, needing to develop in body. She will then trouble the best.

AIREDALES were the largest entry of the show, but apart from the winners there was nothing of much merit,

the younger generation seeming to lack substance and terrier character generally. Midland Master G, winners dogs, is a very typical Airedale, nice size, plenty of bone and full of vim, he has improved wonderfully in this respect since I saw him last, his skull might be finer, but his head generally is of good type, does not stand quite true in front at times. This dog was my choice for championship of show. Whinbush Maxim, Walter Brown's new importation, is hardly yet at his best, as he is but just out of his puppyhood, extra good in coat color and eye, needs to furnish in foreface and flatten out over temples. Midland Romulus is now approaching the veteran stage, but his value as a sire was amply demonstrated at this show. Midland Patricia was an easy winner in bitches, a very good type of bitch, but hardly in her best shape. Western Hearts Key, a nice quality young bitch that should improve with age, ears at present erratic. Harnside Torch, hard to beat in body, coat and color, could do with more size, but she has still plenty of time to grow on into a good one.

In Smooth FOX TERRIERS the Sutton Kennels carried all before them. Ceour de Lion Sutton, winners dogs, is a particularly corky little dog and a great shower. Sabine Firebox, winners bitches, a quality one, as might be expected from her breeding. Admiral Don, the well-known winner, had practically no opposition in Wires.

BOSTON TERRIERS were a good entry and the all-round quality seems to be improving at every show, thanks no doubt to the efforts of the Boston Terrier Club of Western Canada. Biller & May's Chums Model, winners dogs, is a very taking terrier, combining quality with substance to a rare degree. His head is clean cut and expression good, perfectly marked and a great shower. He is perhaps a trifle long cast. McGlynn's Delight, reserve winners, is another good Boston, fails to winner in face and expression, and while shorter in body he is not so well finished behind. Hippy Happy Hoo is good in body and markings, but fails in head. Redwing II., winners bitches, a very nice type of lightweight, shows a little wrinkle and a bit weak in underjaw, otherwise hard to fault. McGlynn's

Booty, good in body and skull, markings a little smudgy, and is perhaps a shade high-stationed.

IRISH TERRIERS—There was, I am sorry to say, nothing here to merit much mention. Ch. Earlsbar Badger, now a veteran, is past his best days, but he still shows type. Tipperary, good coat and color, but on Airedale lines. Malachi Rose, extra good in body, coat and color, but head is not the thing. Katie Brogan is better in head than winner, but fails in all other points. Feet corny.

WHIPPETS—Some excellent specimens were exhibited. Worley Fox, a fawn, is an extra good dog, beautiful front and shoulders, deep brisket and nice roach. Peeping Tom, another very good Whippet, close up to winner. Roda, a beautiful little bitch, flashy markings and a rare quality one all over, she won the any variety sporting (Terriers excepted) and with a pound or two less flesh would have been a hot contender for highest honors.

We must pay tribute to the skill of Dr. McCord; also to our well-known western Ch. Courtenay Coronet. Nine and eight are common for Coronet, but eleven is better.

The above is a good photo of the late George Douglas, well known to the travelling public as the proprietor of the New Dufferin Hotel, Woodstock, which brought him in close touch with all classes of people and was liked and respected by everyone.

He had a big heart and a kindly disposition, and more than one young man in his home town can thank "George," as he was familiarly known, for a start in life, as he was always ready with his kindly advice and pocket-book to help anyone that he considered at all worthy, and no one ever appealed to him in vain.

He was very fond of dogs, the Cocker being his favorite, and had a wonderful knowledge of the different points, and also how to breed them to perfect the type that catches the judge's eye. He was also a past-master in the art of conditioning them for the show ring, as his many wins bear testimony.

Ch. Black Duke, the dog that made him an international reputation as a successful breeder and winner at all the prominent shows, was also a great stock getter, as he sired such well-known ones as Ch. Premier, one of the very best of all times and will be long remembered as one of the old dog's greatest sons, also Havoc and others too numerous to mention.

He also judged many of the leading shows on the American side, and for years after he practically quit the game for lack of time to give them proper attention, he had letter after letter from the late James Mortimer to judge

the New Westminster show held annually at New York city. This in itself is a high tribute, coming from one who was universally known as one of the greatest critics in the United States.

Mr. Lance Farewell, Fred Lewis and J. Hill, of Toronto, and also many others from long distances, Chicago, Grand Rapids, and numerous outside points, attended the funeral, which was held under the auspices of the Masonic Order, and was one of the largest ever held in the city of Woodstock.

He leaves a sorrowing wife and two small children to mourn his loss, but as he was a careful and shrewd business man he left them in comfortable circumstances.

The writer having known him practically all his life, both socially and in a business way, is in a position to know and realize how he will be missed, especially by the boys of his home town, as he had a regular following of the young sporting element of the city, that rarely ever failed to make him an evening call and discuss the latest sporting events.

No one of the old-time dog fanciers will be more sorely missed, as there are few left, and none more popular. We can only say he had done his best, and we wish there were more like him and the dog game would be more popular.

New Brunswick Kennel Club Show

The eighth annual bench show of the New Brunswick Kennel Club, held at St. John, N.B., Oct. 10, 11 and 12, showed the best quality of dogs ever judged in the Maritime Provinces. Mr. George Steadman Thomas was the judge.

Although conditions were not favorable for holding a show this year, a small and hard-working committee undertook the task. To the show committee must be given credit for securing the services of such an able judge as Mr. Thomas, also much is due for the effort put forth by the show secretary, who, while practically new in the dog show business, proved to be a most efficient and obliging officer.

Local exhibitors were pleased to meet Messrs. Bert Swann, Sam Bamford and H. T. Armistead, who attended the show in force with some of their best specimens, adding much zest to the competition. In Mr. Armistead the New Brunswickers met a new club member who has supported our shows before, but this was our first chance for personal acquaintance. Mrs. R. A. Ross was on hand again with the usual good quality of dogs, but we missed her good man, Bob Ross, this year. With Mrs. Ross was a new exhibitor for these parts, Mrs. J. H. Cameron, of Ottawa, with some Bostons. Mr. J. Wallace Sheehan attended from the North Shore with a classy string. It is always a pleasure to meet him and he comes back stronger each year. Fredericton, our capital city, supported the show with a strong entry, the dogs being well looked after by Wm. W. Laskey, who always has good ones following him. The Fredericton entries and exhibitors were Lord Ashburnham, Mrs. W. W. Laskey, John McSorley, Mr. and Mrs. J. McCaffrey and Miss C. Phyllis McCaffrey. The latter benched three nice Bull Terriers that added class to the "white gladiators". Mr. and Mrs. L. H. Powers, of Houlton, Maine, were with us, again. We look forward to their annual visits with pleasure, and their terriers always make the going good.

The big breeds were not so numerous as in previous shows, but in Hounds we had a few new faces. St. Bernards showed no exceptional quality, Mandy Leigh, the winner, is a young bitch, nicely marked and right size, but needs time to finish. In Great Danes, Leo von de Rohn Gloria stood alone in his class, a dark fawn, stylish dog, owned by Mr. Johnston, of Chatham, N.B.

BLOODHOUNDS—One exhibitor, Mr. W. Sheehan, benched five. He showed a new one in Prince Sandy, a well-built dog, good in body and with a shapely head, but wants more leather and wrinkles. He was shown for specials only.

RUSSIAN WOLFHOUSES showed one, Countess Elka, color a lemon and white, with nice outline in body, good feet and shoulders.

GREYHOUNDS benched two, a local black and white and that good Canadian dog, Ch. Master Butcher, too well known to describe, shown hard and fit, as usual, and well handled.

POINTERS were few in numbers, only one new one facing the judge, Mysterious Billy, a very showy dog, but a puppy yet.

ENGLISH SETTERS were a real good lot, thirteen were benched, all local entries. In puppy dogs and bitches, Chas. O'Neill took first honors with Nancy, a well-made bitch, black and white in color, nice size and a good shower. John McGrath's Mayfriar was second, a neat youngster, cobby in body, right in shoulder, but lacks length of head and is not so clean cut as the winner. Winners bitches brought out a sturdy young bitch in McGrath's W. V. Sally, white, with black markings, well set up, short body, ears placed right, but could do with more finish of head. Chas. Perkins' Hex, who took second, is larger, but not so neat in body as the winner. This class also showed James McKelvie's Flash II., a limmer for size, evenly balanced, with splendid headpiece and a bitch that should produce some good ones. Winners dogs gave the blue to Robert Smith's Welcome, a blue belton with almost a black headpiece, the latter a nice, well-chiselled head, correct skull and ears, clean of cheek, lovely ear, certainly a dog nicely balanced throughout, well ribbed and good quarters and feet. Welcome is a credit to Mr. Smith, who is the breeder as well as exhibitor. Reserve winners went to James Latimer's Laddie, a larger dog, well ribbed and with good feet and shoulder, but not quite up to Welcome. Special for best English Setter in the show went to Welcome.

IRISH SETTERS were a good class, 11 showing. Winners dogs went to Tyrone Terry, owned by E. Howard, of Montreal, a dog of good size, short back, nice color and showed well. 2nd went to Chas. Conway, with Barney, a big dog and a good one. There was a

good one in Montrose Shamus O'Brien III., a young dog of quality, shown in good condition, not quite as large as the winner, not quite developed as yet, but shows careful breeding. The bitches were in the majority and strong at that, the winner being E. Howard's Sonora Norma, who also won for special in this breed. She is a sturdy bitch, doggy almost, with nice color, good body and quarters. 2nd went to Wm. Hanlon's Gypsy Grand, a local bitch showing a cleaner outline than the winner, but lacks spring of rib yet, is a youngster and undeveloped. We also had two old veterans of the ring in Robt. Laskey's Ch. Montrose Pride or Erin and Thos. McCullough's Molly Grand, both of whom have travelled in fast company before.

COCKERS, always popular in St. John, had a long entry list, blacks being largest in number and the quality was better than ever. Winners dogs, black, went to F. E. Stuart's Revelation, a sound young dog, shown in good form, strong in feet, body and limb. Reserve winners went to Mrs. E. J. Wallace's Rockfield Hope, a local one. In winners bitches we had Chas. Conway's showy little Blossom's Baby, a dog hard to find a fault in. She got the special for best local Cocker, any color, also. In parti-colors, Bob Ross's Drumelaph Baronet, a red and white, got winners, a lovely headed one this, with good feet and shoulders, plenty of bone and a right mover. Reserve to Baronet was Geo. Lawson's Pal, a black and white, a good dog and looks like a real worker. Winners bitches was Mrs. Gillard's Baby, a black and white, rather racy and up on the leg. Winner for any solid color other than black went to W. H. Parkinson's Welch Queen, a red, good bodied bitch, but not so clean cut in the head as we like them. James Sproul showed a promising puppy in Teddy that will win honors in the future.

FIELD SPANIELS—We had but one that was a credit to the name, E. A. Morton's Gyp, a fairly good black.

SPORTING SPANIELS were a variety, the winner, Rover, a heavy dog, looked good for thick cover, though Flora or Peter, awarded as named, looked better for field work.

DALMATIANS showed a real good one in Mr. Constantineau's Ch. Windholme Forever, a big upstanding, clean-spotted dog, which got winners, while

reserve went to A. P. Ryan's Dot, a very taking bitch.

COLLIES were a fairly good lot, 11 benched. Let it be said here that the coat on a Collie is just as important as the coat on the best Toy, and the undercoat and the topcoat make the coat complete, and it takes both. J. D. Strachan's Coltness Clinker, got winners, a tri-color, rather a stylish dog with a shapely head, correct ears and eye, good feet and body. 2nd was awarded to Coila Swatch, a big able dog, but shown in poor condition, and R. Irwin's Tony might have changed places with him with no offence. The winning bitch was a right sized one of Geo. Aiken's, Hannel Lucille. Reserve, J. D. Strachan's Coltness Cymbeline. The special for any Collie the judge decided should go to Norman K. Swire's Canute Treasure, a real good one and with type.

ENGLISH BULLS—12 entered the ring in various classes. In the light-weights, John P. Condon's Callaghan Mac, a red fawn, was first. Reserve went to Miss Eileen Keenan's Garden Joffre, a white, with a splendid skull, stop, eyes, ears well placed, short body and a sound young dog. Winners dogs went to J. E. Dowling's Baron of Lambare, a well-made brindle with good headpiece, big of bone and right in body. Reserve winner was Silver Reflex, owned by Robt. W. Short, a pied brindle, a massive dog and showed well. E. L. Jarvis showed a good one in Lord Argo, a big brindle, pied, with fine skull, good ears, but a little too fat in body to pass the winner. In bitches we had good ones in Chinook Tenacity, Ivanhoe Violet and Birmingham Treasure, placed in the order named. Chinook Tenacity, who took winners, is a well-made bitch of excellent type, with a massive head and underjaw, big of bone and shoulder, and with a shapely body, a dog of type and character. We also had a good bitch shown in Geo. A. Margett's Trouble, a brindle of good type, useful and a credit to the exhibitor, who was also her breeder.

FRENCH BULLS showed one, owned by G. Rex Ganter, young, but full of promise.

BULL TERRIERS, a nice exhibition, ten benched, and not a weedy one in the lot. Winners dogs went to a New Glasgow entry, E. E. Frehill's Roseland Challenger Major, a dog full of pep and go, has a neat head and strong body. Reserve went to Miss C. Phyllis McCaffrey's Haymarket Glendon, only a young one, but looks good now, has lots

of type. F. A. Hollis' Mike was another good one, a youngster, but worthy of mention. The bitches produced the winner for the special, Miss C. Phyllis McCaffrey's Haymarket Jessie, topped the lot, and is a rare good one, neatly put together, has right length of head, clean in mouth, good feet, legs and body, pretty near a perfect specimen and will surely go high in show circles in the future. 2nd went to E. E. Frehill's Maritime Lucy, a splendid specimen of Bull Terrier, but not fast enough to stand with the winner. Another good one was Elizabeth Ritchie's Roseland Baby Doll, a very useful terrier, but not in good condition, showed signs of railway travel.

BOSTONS were a mixed lot, but showed better quality on the average than in previous years; the outside exhibitors had the class and won handily over locals. Winners was a correctly-marked, trappy dog, W. B. Levack's Dowd's Glory, shown by Bert Swann. The winning bitch was Lady Butterfly, owned by Mrs. J. H. Cameron, a specimen of much quality, nice head, feet and shoulders, cobby body, the latter if anything extreme in roach, otherwise hard to find fault. Local dogs and bitches showed a few nice ones in Margaret Gilmour's Teaser, Tipperary Floss and Hooker's Dolly, placed in the order named, also Ed. Bates' White Lake Dewey and Amos Downey's Delmar Baby. Both of the latter are young yet, but full of promise, and will make the going hard at future shows. The local special for Bostons went to Miss Gilmour's Teaser, and the special for best Boston went to Dowd's Glory, both popular awards.

AIREDALES—This popular terrier is improving every year in St. John, and local fanciers are striving for better quality in breeding and the Airedale is coming strong down this way. Fifteen were benched and all of better class than in any former show. Winning dog was no other than the redoubtable Polam Maxim, owned by Norman McKenzie, put down very fit and right on edge. He swept the board, winning the special for this breed, also in the variety for best dog in the show. He looked darker in coat than we have seen him before, black saddle quite distinct from the tan, good show size, evenly balanced throughout and built on good terrier lines. Reserve in dogs was Leeds Reformer, shown by Sam Bamford. This one had lots of type and character, he is a new one to us and we liked him.

It was an interesting sight to those at the ringside to see this dog and Polam Maxim in the ring together, both on edge and superbly handled by those masters of the show ring, Bamford and Swann. In bitches the winner was N. McKenzie's Sunshine, and John McSorley showed a nice one in Celestial Dream, a dog of quality, strong head, well-finished before the eyes and with a nice body. Celestial Dream also won first honors in local dogs and bitches, with Thos. Coughlan's Rowdy a close second, and W. C. McKay's Rockley Laddie third. There was plenty of pep in the local class and much interest.

DACHSHUNDE—We had four, owned by W. R. Aitken, and all good ones.

FOX TERRIERS, Smooth, were a fair entry, with 12 benched. Winners dogs was an Ottawa entry, Clapton Sensation, owned by Geo. W. Bailey. Reserve went to Percy S. Clark's Sabine Razor, a very racy dog that has lots of quality, but lacked a little of the sturdiness of the winner. Winners bitches went to Bellam Trizie, shown by Mrs. P. S. Clark, a very neat terrier, nice head, ears and neck, and a showy bitch. Reserve bitches, Allen Shaw's Gyp, much the same stamp of dog as the winner, though lacking the quality. In local dogs and bitches, Sabine Razor carried off the honors, and the reserve was Bellam Tim, only a puppy, but a real comer.

FOX TERRIERS, Wire, entries were small, but had a few dogs of quality, the winner being A. Lepine's Dusky Bounce, all wire and put down to win, though hard pressed for the special by Thos. Moore's Killendine of Chuffs, which we liked very much. A. Lepine's Virgiedot of Malden was another good wire of quality. In the class for bred by exhibitor, H. T. Armistead's Westpark Ranger, one of the best sons of Ch. Hawes Broom, carried off the ribbon. He is a credit to the breeder. We had another splendid wire in Northern Regalia, bred and owned by Le Baron Wilson, a dog built on good lines of right size and with a noticeable fine body. One puppy and alone in the class was Mrs. L. H. Powers' Wire Boy of Aroostook, an all-white dog, full of promise, but just now a baby.

IRISH TERRIERS were few, the winner, Ch. Aroostook Historic, looking as fit as ever and a dog hard to pick a flaw in. He also won the special, with Kelvin's Glory, a nice bitch, for reserve. Arthur Blight's Quarrywood Paddy, and A. E. Francis' Lord Bobs

were both good specimens and well liked, though not quite up to the class of the winner.

SCOTTISH TERRIERS proved a nice entry, with local dogs predominating, although the special for best in breed went to Mrs. R. A. Ross for Drumclaph Kate, a grand bitch, brindle black, of carthorse build, low to ground, with good head, eye and shoulders, certainly a dog of quality. Winners dogs was Thos. Dickson's Jock Scott, a fine specimen of the breed, strong and sturdy, dark brindle black in color, well-placed eyes and classy all the way through. Reserve winners went to McGinley & Neive's Jock, a young puppy that looks awful good and will surely set a hard pace in competition as he grows older. Another year they will have to travel fast to beat him. Winners bitches was Drumclaph Kate, with Nora Blaine's Drumclaph Mary a close second. The latter is a well-balanced Scottie, dark brindle, one of the cobby kind, plenty of substance, nice ear, eye and with good head. Mrs. W. W. Laskey showed a good bitch in Drumclaph Helen, and McGinley & Neive had another good specimen in Drumclaph Laurel, a splendid bodied bitch and a good shower.

WEST HIGHLANDS showed only two, Miss Eadie's Morag Bhan and J. D. Eagan's Ardock Model, both good ones.

MANCHESTERS had two entries, both nicely marked black and tan, the blue going to A. Belanger's Tommy, this one had the pull in body lines over Thos. Collins' Don.

TOY varieties were not upto former years, the Countess of Ashburnham's Pekingese, Brownie, being the best of the variety.

POMERANIANS were not many, Mrs. Flavin O'Brien, from Halifax, with Erin, taking the special for this breed, with the Countess of Ashburnham 2nd with Darkie. A good local entry was G. Dayment's Teddy, and Dr. A. J. Boyce showed three good specimens.

YORKSHIRES only showed one that would stand the acid test, J. B. Paton's Duchess, correct size and color and showing well.

TOY POODLES had a nice entry in Miss Edna McCormick's Cricket, all white, small and smart.

Mrs. Harry Atchison carried off all honors in French Poodles, with Jepp, shown in good condition and well handled.

The variety classes were keenly contested throughout with many entries. The best for Sporting dogs and bitches (open) went to the Greyhound, Ch. Master Butcher, owned by John G. Kent, with reserve to E. Howard's Sorona Norma, an Irish Setter. The non sporting variety (open) winner was Chinook Tenacity, an English Bull, with the Bull Terrier, Haymarket Jessie, close up to the winner in favor. In the Terrier variety, Polam Maxim captured the honor, with the Wire, Dusky Bounce, 2nd. In best sporting brace, E. Howard's Irish Setters, Tyrone Terry and Sonora Norma, won out over all competition. Reserve, Chas. Perkins', with a brace of English Setters. Best Terrier brace had good entries, and A. Lepine's Wires, Dusky Bounce and Virgiedot of Malden, were the winners. The breeders' gold prize, open to members of the N. B. Kennel Club only, was taken by H. T. Armistead, with Westpark Ranger, a wire, with Robert Smith's English Setter, Welcome, coming close behind the winner. Local special for best sporting dog or bitch went to Miss Winnifred Ross for the Pointer, Betty, who also took the Oak Hall special for best local specimen. Best local terrier, smooth, went to Miss C. Phyllis McCaffrey for that good Bull Terrier, Haymarket Jessie, and honors for best local terrier, rough, went to the good Scottie, Jock Scott, owned by Thos. Dickson. Special for local Cocker puppies went to James Sproul for the parti, Teddy. Mrs. Arthur Gillard's black and white parti, reserve. Children's variety was won by Miss Nora Blaine with the Scottie, Drumclaph Mary, with Miss Marretta Clark and her smooth Fox Terrier, To To, neck and neck right up to the wire with the winner. The Roy Morrison gold prize for best local bitch shown with two of her get went to John Scott, for the Cocker, Fan, a liver color and a good one.

Polam Maxim, was the hero of the day and gained the highest possible honors by winning 1st limit, 1st open, winners, special for best Airedale in show, and numerous other trophies. Mr. Jos. Novice dogs and bitches—1st, Mr. Blackwell's Foxey Prince, a very nice chocolate, over weight, nice head and well-carried ears, good legs and feet and a good shower, wants a little more coat, but a trifle long in back. 2nd, Mrs. Emmett's pup, a black, very nice in head and ears, loses to winner in color, she is not sound in color, but a nice shaped little bitch and moves well, with good legs and feet. 3rd, Mrs. Wather's Queenie, an orange shaded sable, very fair in head, nice color, but a shade strong in bone, wants more coat, but will make a nice brood bitch.

Limit dogs (any color)—1st, Mrs. Eyden's Sailor Prince, good in head, very small ears, well carried, very short in back, carries his age very well indeed, but age is beginning to tell, a very good Pom., and lasts wonderfully well. 2nd, Miss Morrell's wolf shaded sable, about the best overweight we have, was put down in fine coat and bloom, very nice color and good head and ears, and a shower. 3rd, Orange Prince, Mr. Baskerville, very fair head and ears, good legs and feet, but shown too fat, which counts against him.

Limit bitches—1st, Mr. Nightingale's Cumberland Pride, a lovely shaped little

bitch, very nice head, small ears well carried, and very short and compact in body, but color is not quite sound, a very nice bitch. 2nd, Mrs. Briggs' Little Gem, a very nice little bitch, very nice head and small ears well carried, sound in color, wants a little more coat, but not the best of showers, when she mends her show ring manners she will do better. 3rd, Mr. Foster's Clinton Queen, a very nice little bitch, good legs and feet and a nice shower, but loses to winners in coat, which is a little inclined to be flat and not quite the quality of the others.

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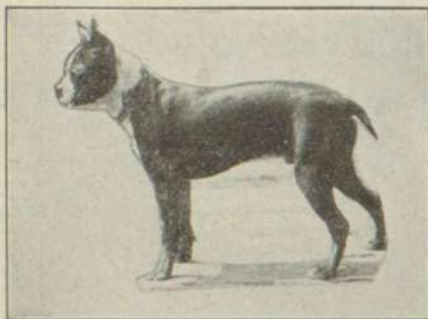
